

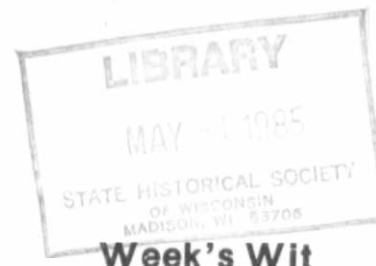

Brigham Elected Board President

1985-86 Preliminary School Budget Up Almost 14 Percent

A 1985-86 preliminary budget containing a 13.85% increase over last year was presented to the Kewaskum School Board at its special meeting Monday night. The board got its first formal glimpse at the budget which carries a price tag of \$6,647,637, up \$808,500 over

the 1984-95 budget.

Reviewing the breakdown, Board Member Tom Brigham asked if it was safe to say 80% of the budget was fixed costs. Business Manager Cherna Gorder told Brigham, over 90% of the objects in the budget could be considered "fixed costs," items over which the district has little direct control. Salaries and Benefits, which

include the various forms of employee insurance, account for 73%, or \$4,842,459 of the proposed budget for 1985-86, said Gorder. Other items such as insurance for workmens comp, property, etc., and Purchased Services, could be considered fixed costs items too. You have to have insurance and you can't do without utilities such as electric and phone service, noted Gorder. Purchased Services account for another \$1,041,368, and Insurance \$81,700, to bring the fixed costs figure up to \$5,986,527, or 89% of the budget being proposed for next year.

Gorder told the board, two reasons for the large jump in insurance costs was the fact that the insurance premiums had not been prepaid last year as had been the policy in past years, and property and liability costs have increased 20%.

Removing all the fixed costs money leaves approximately 10% of the budget or \$682,110 to cover everything else from books to capital improvements. Along with the budget breakdown, Gorder presented a summary covering maintenance and building repairs proposed for school buildings next year. The amount of that report, \$178,500, for routine maintenance and upkeep, such as repairing windows to fixing roofs was not included in the budget figure.

A breakdown listed \$9,000 in repairs for Beechwood Elementary \$10,000 for Farmington (excluding the new roof which will be paid for with Trust Fund money), \$38,300 for Kewaskum Elementary including \$25,000 for a new 3rd floor section roof, \$20,000 for

Fire Destroys Dundee Area Home

A fire of undetermined cause destroyed the year-round home of Robert and Diane Grohall of Kettle Moraine Lake late Sunday afternoon.

The home was a total loss despite the efforts of the Campbellsport and Eden Fire Departments to save the house.

The fire was reported by the Grohalls' neighbor, Mrs. Rosemary Beck, who noticed the fire when she went to open her garage door. Beck saw smoke and a light in a living

room window. While she placed a 911 emergency call, flames began shooting through the windows.

The Grohalls, who were visiting at a nearby cottage, were told by a neighbor that the home was on fire. The couple stood by helplessly as the home burned to the ground.

The state Fire Marshal was called in for a routine investigation of the blaze. Arson is not suspected.

There was no dollar amount available for the loss of the home. The Grohalls and their son are staying with relatives.

Campbellsport Youngster Narrowly Escapes Drowning

Thanks to the efforts of his cousins, a thirteen-year-old rural Campbellsport boy was saved from drowning in the dangerous Milwaukee River in the Town of Ashford.

William D. Kirsch, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Kirsch, 358 Scenic Drive, Campbellsport, had gone fishing Sunday afternoon below the Rustic Drive bridge with his cousins, Donald and Betsy Backhaus of Route 1, Random Lake.

According to the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's report, the three had been fishing and decided to go wading in the river's shallows. The two boys then decided to go swimming and entered the deeper water, where William was caught up in the strong undercurrent.

Kirsch panicked and went

under several times. Backhaus, 17, tried but could not get close enough to grab the youngster. While Betsy went for help, Backhaus managed to regain his own footing on the shore and run along the bank trying to head off the apparently unconscious Kirsch as the current carried him down stream. He waded back into the river and grabbed Kirsch as he came toward him, hauling the boy onto the riverbank.

In response to Betsy's calls for help Kirsch's 19-year-old brother Robert rushed to the boy and began administering mouth to mouth resuscitation.

The Campbellsport Ambulance arrived shortly after William was revived. He was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital, West Bend, and later transferred to Menomonee Falls Hospital where he was listed in stable condition.

No Quick, Easy Solution For Beechwood Lake

Approximately 35 Town of Scott residents attended a meeting Tuesday evening, hoping to hear some good news about the Beechwood Lake flooding problem.

What the audience heard from the three-member committee appointed to come up with some answers was nothing less than frustrating.

"I have to personally apologize to Clara Trapp for not taking her more seriously on this deal," stated Rick Vetter, spokesman for the committee, "we looked up at the north end of the lake today and that is definitely where our problem is. We have a 10 to 12 inch tile

coming into the lake and if that would be running wide open, DNR estimations are that thing would be putting 2,000 to 2,500 gallons of water a minute into the lake."

Vetter said they had located the drain tile which is currently feeding the lake at approximately 150 gallons per minute, or 216,000 gallons a day. A second suspect source of water is runoff from a swamp to the north, which is sending down water, possibly at the same rate as the tile.

Trapp told the meeting, that is what she has been trying to tell everyone including Sheboygan County for the last ten years. Trapp contends the problems began back in 1949, when

Wayne, \$26,000 Middle School, \$68,000 for the High School, and General District \$7,000.

Newly elected board member Perry Ankerson commented, then what we're being told is, to get a true picture of the needs of the district for next year, we should be looking at a combined total of the two reports. Gordor confirmed that no money for the maintenance summary had been included in the preliminary budget.

Addressing the subject of maintenance, District Administrator John Long told the board, "we spend 1% on maintenance, which is way low. We don't budget enough money to keep up on maintenance let alone catch up. Each year you budget \$60,000-\$65,000 and right now you're \$1 million in arrears as far as maintenance goes." People of the district have to begin to realize their buildings are in the twenty-year old range and things have to be repaired and maintained, noted Long.

Looking over a five-year maintenance program proposal, Ankerson told the board, it better begin to look at the district through a long-term aspect. "I think it's foolish to look at one year when we plan on being in business at least another five years," said Ankerson. He felt such a plan would be a major undertaking but it was time the board got together with some type of major long term plans.

Board member Neal Weare was concerned with how such a program would affect the tax levy. Gordor said her recommendation would not be to fund a five-year maintenance program through a levy but rather with long-term borrowing. She said with the district's equalized valuation, of \$290,000,000, you could go to 10% or \$29,000,000 for indebtedness purposes. "With that type of plan," said Gordor "you could spend \$500,000 now, but only levy for \$100,000." Gordor felt long term borrowing was the most feasible solution.

Ronald Theusch, the second new board member, said he could not see setting a set percentage goal such as 5% for maintenance. "Set a dollar figure that you can back up and

people will understand." Theusch said that was his personal opinion. "I don't think people realize something that I became aware of through a letter from a middle school teacher. I would assume that the minimum we provide in our district is a textbook for each kid and now I find out a teacher is going with 25 texts for 115 kids. I think if you approach people that way and give them concrete ideas of what you're doing with the money, that's the way to do it."

Ankerson thought the board should be looking at the budget on the basis of five years. "I don't want things excluded because someone was reluctant to bring it up to the board thinking it will be voted out anyway. Let's bring everything up and throw it all on the table. Then it will be known publicly what is being excluded and hopefully, why." "Then you're not just talking about buildings," said Gordor, "you want me to go back to all the teachers and principals and talk about equipment and textbooks?" "Yes," said Ankerson and the other members appeared to be in general agreement.

The administrators were asked if they had any comments. Kewaskum Elementary Principal Richard Zarling stated, "Amen to the whole concept of long range planning, but it hasn't been done so far." High School Principal LeRoy Kopecky said he thought it was a good idea, noting he had several concerns on which he would like to approach the board.

We'll probably get this great big wish-list and all kinds of people at the meetings supporting their special projects and wanting to discuss them but that's why we're here, commented Ankerson. "There may be an all-night meeting or a couple of them," said Ankerson, "but I think that has to be done." Ankerson said he did not want to give the false impression that these things will be easily approved but rather that these things should be discussed and reviewed.

Zarling stated, "I think it's time we stopped and step back and take a new perspective on things. I think we're all going to be shocked at the dollar figure we're going to come up with."

In other action, the board's new members took their

positions on the board and election of officers was held. Tom Brigham was elected Board President, Neal Weare re-elected Vice President, Lynn Dieringer, Treasurer, and Ronald Theusch, Clerk.

Ankerson was appointed to represent Kewaskum on the CESA #6 Board of Control.






TOOLS TAKEN

the County installed three 20-inch culverts in County Trunk 'SS' northeast of the lake. Since that time flooding in that area has steadily increased to the point at which it is now. Vetter said the tile comes through two different farms who had the problem turned on to them.

"I wish there would have been somebody here from the County to talk on this," said Vetter, "but I think they're steering clear of this." Trapp said she had been after the County to get some action. Harold Lindemann, head of the Sheboygan County Board, was out here and he's beginning to see the light that it may be a county problem, noted Trapp.

Still, at this point, no one is willing to acknowledge the problem or accept responsibility for it. Lester Benzschawel, Town Clerk, said, "we realize we've got a problem and we've got to correct it now or we could end up as a sanitary district like Batavia."

Vetter said his committee had looked into getting the lake pumped as a fast temporary solution. The new problem now is where to get the estimated \$6,000 to pay for the work. He said if all the equipment plus fuel has to be rented, residents would be looking at approximately \$500 a day. The equip-

ment would pump 2,450 gallons a minute into Mink Creek which empties into the Milwaukee River. Vetter said he would like to try the pumping for at least one week to see if any progress could be made. Pumping for seven days would cost approximately \$3,500 depending upon the type of tractor and equipment used.

Benzschawel said there is no local, county, or state money available to pay for the work. We're going to have to dig down in our own pockets if we can't get the funding from somewhere.

Benzschawel was disappointed with the small turnout. It's not just the problem of the residents around the lake, he said. If we don't all work together on this thing and get it solved, it's going to cost us all a lot more. If conditions get any worse, the state might step in and tell us we have to set up a sanitary district, then we'll be looking at a \$250,000 project like Batavia had.

Some of the residents felt an alternative solution, if the problem of runoff isn't corrected, would be to construct an outlet.

The committee agreed it was a good idea but noted it wasn't an immediate solution. Vetter thought the township could be looking at anywhere from six months to two years of red tape and paperwork before the work could even begin, that is, if a permit was granted for such a project. That still isn't going to solve our present flooding problem though, he noted.

One resident said he had checked with a sewer contractor on estimated costs. Using 15-inch concrete tile and back-filling, you're talking \$20 a foot, roughly \$60,000 for 2,000 feet needed to construct an outlet. The meeting voted to hold off

one more week on the pumping, hoping for some better news or money from Madison. A second committee was also formed to look into plans for the construction of a permanent outlet for the lake.

The Sheboygan County Highway Department has now closed Highway S, in the flood area, to all traffic.

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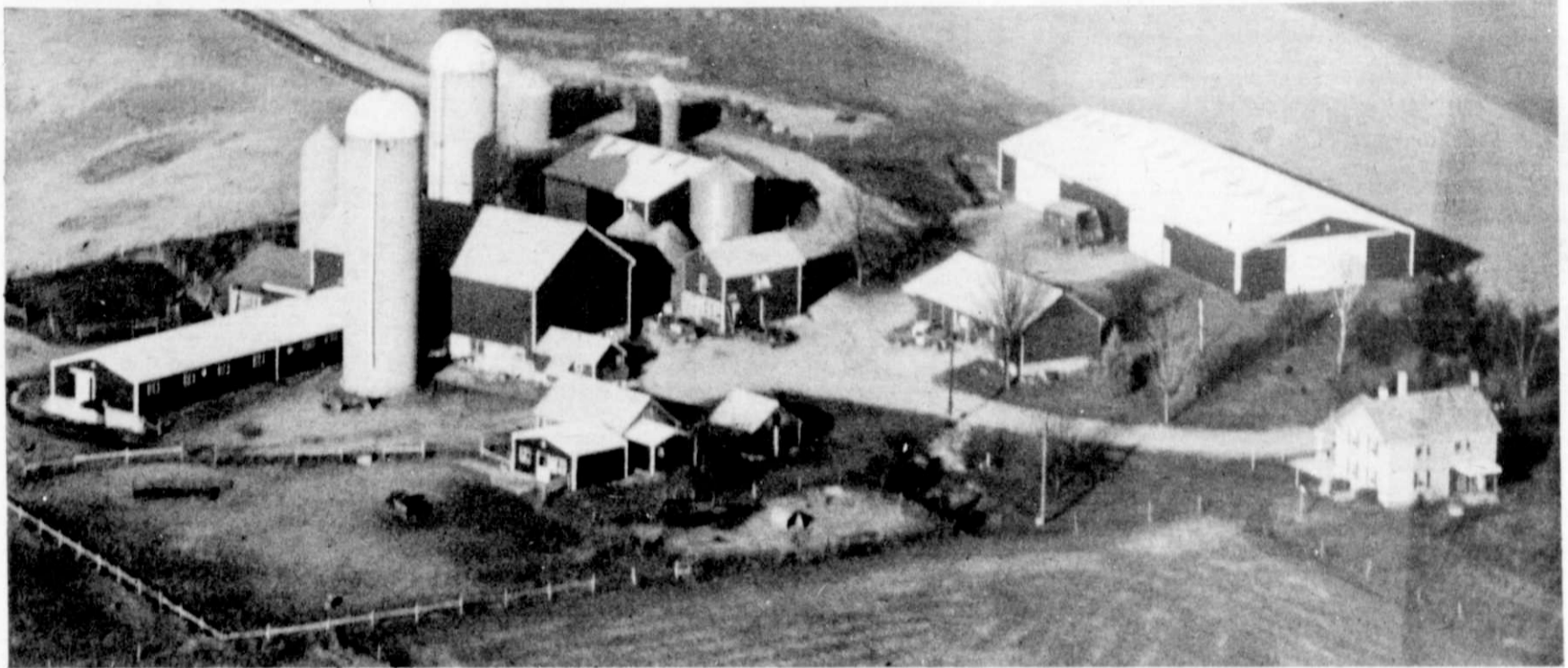
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Farm Dairy Breakfast Scheduled for Dairy Daze Here

Private Property Week Recognizes Increasing Value of Home Ownership

Kewaskum — "Home ownership — a cornerstone of the American way of life—is once again on the upswing, making the investment and personal value of owning a home more attractive than ever," said LeRoy A. Lopas, Hartford, President of Washington Board of REALTORS.

The WASHINGTON Board of REALTORS, together with the NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF REALTORS, is dedicated to preserving real property rights for housing, agriculture, industry, commercial and other uses against unwarranted governmental actions.

According to the WASHINGTON Board of REALTORS, policies at every level of government—federal, state and local—share responsibility for hindering the growth of home ownership. 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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR...

To the people of the area:

Congress will soon act on the forced abortion campaign going on in China. Here is some background information and a request for your help. Your help is really needed.

The government of China has undertaken the most ruthless population control campaign in history. Numerous observers have reported that countless Chinese women are being forced to undergo abortions — even in the final month of their pregnancy as part of the government's "one child" policy. In addition, the government's anti-baby campaign has led to infanticide against hundreds of thousands of infant girls annually.

There is no direct U.S. aid to China. However, the Chinese population control effort has been funded by both the International Planned Parenthood Federation (IPPF) and the United Nations Fund for Population Activities (UNFPA). For years, the U.S. has provided over one-quarter of the annual budget for these two organizations.

As of January 1, 1985 the Reagan Administration declared IPPF ineligible for further U.S. aid because IPPF would not agree to discontinue its longstanding practice of actively promoting abortions overseas, including lobbying for the repeal of anti-abortion laws.

Congress has earmarked \$46 million for UNFPA in 1985. However, the Reagan Administration is withholding payment of this money while it takes a closer look at the Chinese program and UNFPA's role in it.

One of the individuals who will play a key role in determining if the \$46 million will be released to UNFPA is Representative David Obey of Wisconsin who serves as Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee Subcommittee on Foreign Operations. Another individual who will play a key role because of his position as Chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee Subcommittee of Foreign Operations is Senator Rober Kasten of Wisconsin. Kasten has steadfastly supported President Reagan's policy in this matter.

I'm asking you to please write two letters, one to Rep. David Obey and one to your own Congressman, urging them to support a complete cutoff of U.S. aid to the United Nations Fund for Population Activities, as long as the UNFPA continues to fund the inhuman Chinese campaign for population control.

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Lack of Depth Hurts Indians in Triangular

The KHS boys won nine events at last Tuesday's triangular (also their first outdoor meet of the year), but a lack of depth caused them to finish second to New Holstein, 72-57. Chilton was third with 42 points.

The host Indians had many highlights, including Mike Steinhardt's four firsts in the high jump (5'10"), long jump (19' 1/2"), 100 meter dash (11.3), and 200 meter dash (23.6).

Steinhardt Sets Record, Leads Boys Past Falls

Winning eleven events, the KHS boys track team beat visiting Sheboygan Falls, 72-64, on Friday.
