While a majority of the Washington County residents attending the first of two public hearings on a countywide library system were for the idea, there was little agreement on how the plan should be financed.

Approximately 100 people attending the meeting held at the Kewaskum Fire Station last week listened as the County Library Study Committee presented their recommendations for a system which would provide service throughout the county. The plan would include service to over 44,000 residents who currently have no legal access to a library. The group said that \$218,750 would be needed to expand present services.

If implemented, county service would honor the cards of all participating libraries and the system joined. The participating libraries would be reimbursed for making their facilities and resources available to all county residents. The committee also recommended that a county library board be established to oversee the system and administer funds appropriated by the County Board of Supervisors. The plan would also include joining the Mid-Wisconsin Federated

Trial Date Is Set in Wayne Shooting Case

The trial of Richard R. Bonenfant 51, who has been charged with first degree murder in the July 16th shooting death of Malinda Jaeger, the owner of Spitz and Lindy's Tavern, Town of Wayne, has been scheduled to begin October 14, 1985. Three days have been set on the court calendar for the trial. Bonenfant pleaded not guilty to the charge at his arraignment August 5th.

aspects of this plan is taxation without representation," said Allmann. He suggested that a referendum on a countywide system be put before the residents.

Leonard Peter, representing the Town of Wayne Board, agreed with Allmann. "We're as far as we can go with taxation," stated Peter. He noted that farmers are struggling now and another levy would just increase that burden.

Jack Theusch, Town Chairman of Farmington, also stated that his board was against a tax levy proposal. Theusch asked the committee to consider a 'user fee.' "Like when you take your family to a baseball game," said Theusch. Those who use it would be paying for it. Theusch noted it

would cost Farmington \$24,000 for 54 people who are using the library.

Norbert Dettmann, Washington County Eleventh District Supervisor, suggested the committee consider other alternatives such as opening the high school libraries to the public.

A second public hearing was scheduled at the Polk Town Hall, Slinger.

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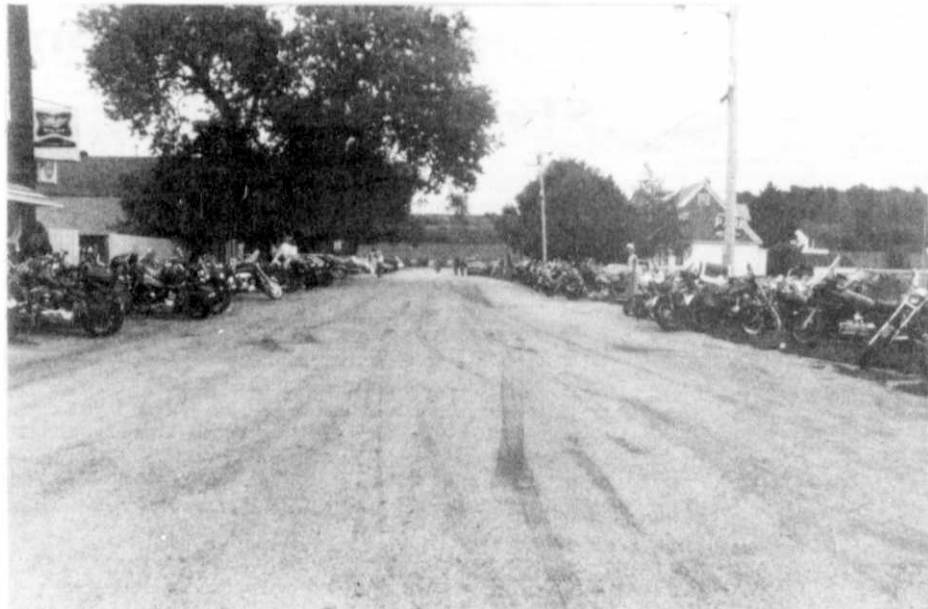

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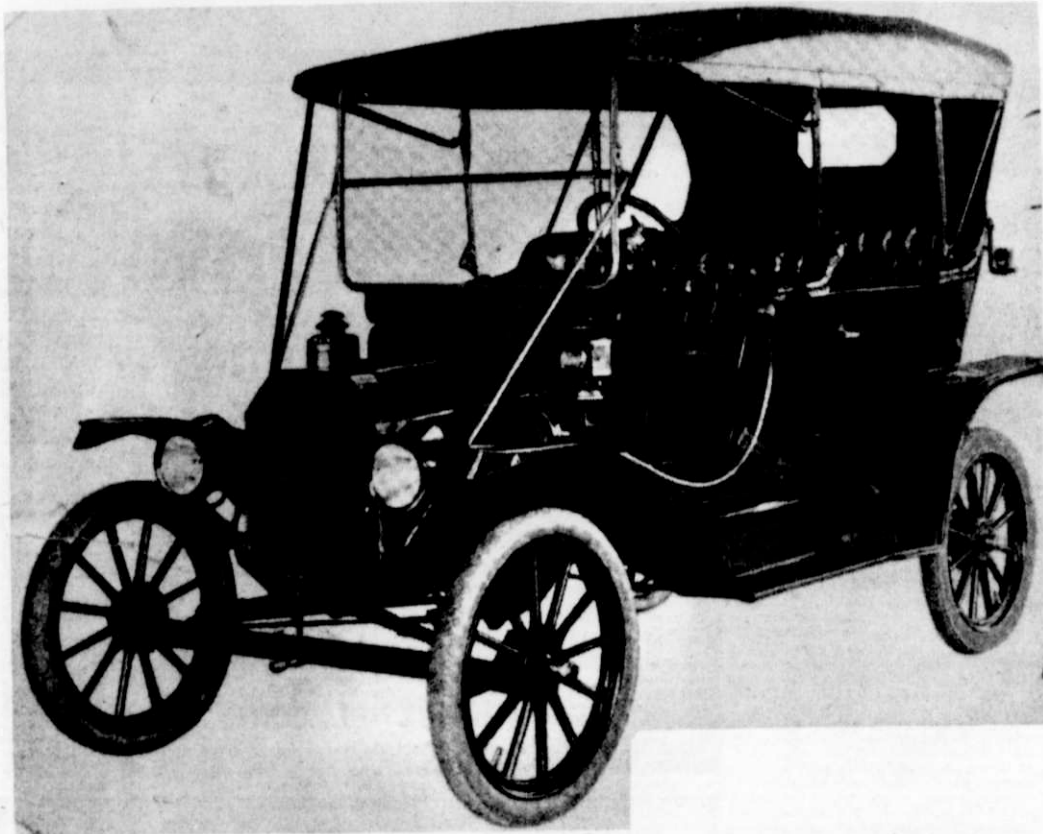

The Kewaskum Lions Club will be holding their twelfth annual chicken bar-b-que on Sunday, August 18, at River Hill Park.

Serving will be from 11:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. with carryouts available. Prices of the dinner which includes mashed potatoes, gravy, cole slaw, hot vegetable, roll and beverage will be \$4.00, adults - 1/2 chicken and \$2.50, children - 1/4 chicken.

There will be games, beer and soda, and hamburgers will be served. Music will be provided by the Ralph Buchel Orchestra.

In conjunction with the bar-b-que, the Lions will also run their Kettle-20 foot race. Along with the K-20 (12.4 miles), a new 5 mile race and the 3.5 mile will be held. The races will begin at 9:00 a.m. from the River Hill Park.

There will be 5 divisions for men and 3 for women in the K-20. The 5 mile race will have 4 divisions for men and 4 for women. The 3.5 mile will have 3 divisions for men and 3 for women.

Trophies will be awarded to the first male and female finishers in K-20. Medallions will be awarded for 2nd - 3rd place and ribbons for 4th - 5th place. In the 5 mile race medallions will be awarded to first place in each division and 2nd - 5th place will receive ribbons. Ribbons will also be awarded 1st - 5th place in the 3.5 mile.

To date there are 30 runners who have pre-registered as of August 1. It is expected many runners will return who participated in previous years.

Entry fee is \$5.00 in advance with a T-shirt and \$3.00 without. Runners may register the

day of the race at a cost of \$6.00 and \$4.00.

Runners may also purchase tickets for a chicken dinner at a reduced cost of \$2.50 if purchased before race time.

Nehrass, 68, was born on Oct. 19, 1916 and lives in Jackson.

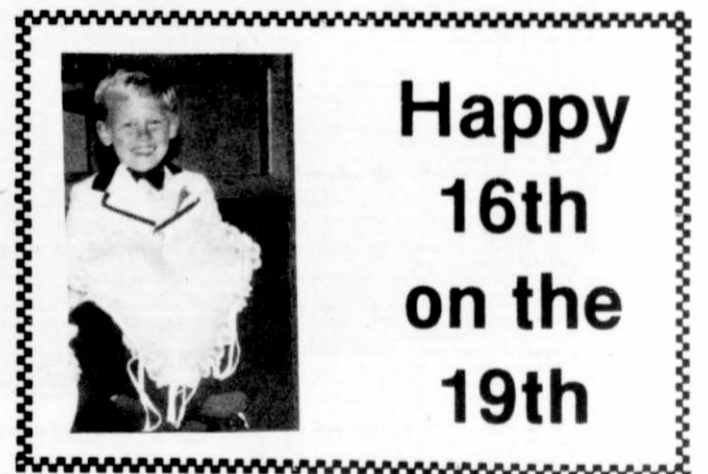
Schmah reported the County's Administrative Committee will search for a replacement to fill out the balance of his term shortly, while looking toward a successor at the September county board meeting.

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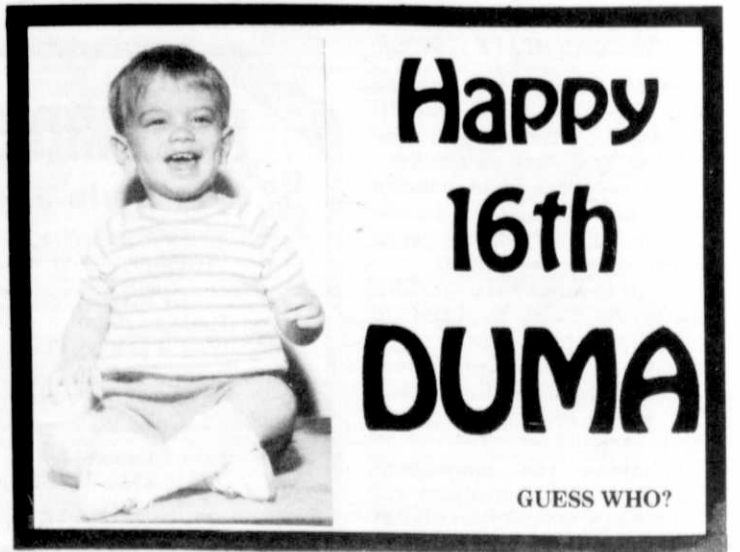

Attends 4-H Training Program At Washington D.C.

Debi Seideman returned to Kewaskum on July 20 following a week-long stay in Washington, D.C., to attend Citizenship-Washington Focus—a citizenship and leadership training program at the National 4-H Center. Debi was among 38 4-H members from Wisconsin and 45 other states who participated in the summer program.

Citizenship - Washington Focus is designed to help young people understand their rights and responsibilities as citizens and increase appreciation of their American heritage. Throughout the week the teenage participants took field trips to historical and cultural sites, visited federal agencies and community organizations and learned about government procedures. On Wednesday, July 17, they spent the day on Capitol Hill to get a close-up view of the political process and to meet with members of Congress. They were allowed to sit in on the senate and the house of representatives.

In workshop sessions at the National 4-H Center, the young people learned and practiced life skills, discussed and debated legislative issues and policies, proposed possible solutions to domestic and international concerns, and held simulated senate hearings and county council meetings. They also developed a plan to incorporate what they learned into ongoing 4-H programs in their home communities.

Citizenship - Washington focus is arranged by the National 4-H Council in support of the 4-H program of the Cooperative - Extension Service of the state land - grant universities and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Program support and fellowships for 16 college age 4-H alumni to join the Citizenship - Washington Focus staff were provided by The Auxiliary to the American Optometric Association; Conoco, Inc.; Dorothy Emerson Commemorative Fund; Farmland Industries,

Inc.; Hallmark Cards, Inc.; Illinois 4-H Foundation; Georgia 4-H Foundation; Minnesota 4-H Foundation; Morman C. Mindrum 4-H Education Fund; Sterling Drug, Inc.; American Speech - Language - Hearing Association; Resource Developers, Inc.; Cy DeCosse, Inc.; and Pet Incorporated.

Debi was selected to attend on the basis of her involvement in 4-H in the past nine years.

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Policy Statement for Free and Reduced Price Meals

The School District of Kewaskum, on August 14, announced its policy for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program. Each

school office and central office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used

for determining eligibility. Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free and reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a notice to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

For the school officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following information listed on the application: Names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a notation that the household member does not possess one; total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) or a food stamp case number if the household is on food stamps; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information

provided is correct. Households are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal policy, the business manager will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent or guardian is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he/she may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on an informal basis. If the parent wishes to make a formal appeal, he/she may make a request either orally or in writing to: Ms. Penelope Kleinhans, District Administrator, 1450 School St., Kewaskum, WI 53040 Phone (414) 626-8427, for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size changes, the family should contact the school. Such changes may make the household eligible for reduced price meals, or for additional benefits such as free meals if the family income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for

these benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals for them, the household should complete an application for a family of one or contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household on the application is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age, or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

Any questions regarding the application should be directed to the determining official.

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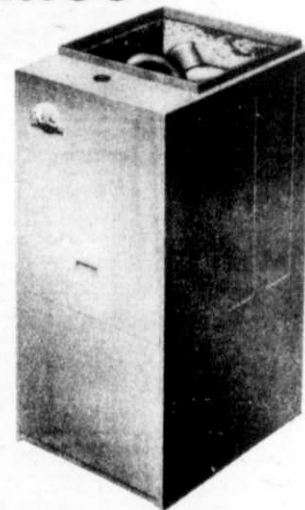
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25 Years Ago

August 12, 1960

August 6, 1960 marked the 15th anniversary of the founding of Regal Ware, Inc., Kewaskum, manufacturers of aluminum and stainless steel cookware, giftware, electrical and industrial items. This milestone in the firm's history was fittingly observed with a reception and open house for all employees. The founders and original executive group present at the reception included J.O. Reigle, president; L.N. Peterson, executive vice-president and general manager; C.E. Reigle, vice-president; Edna M. Oster, assistant to the president; and A. G. Hron, who recently retired after having been chief engineer and general superintendent. Coincident with the anniversary, J.O. Reigle announced that a new 16,000 sq. ft. building - the 11th addition to the factory in the 15 years - was nearing completion and would be ready for occupancy by Sept. 1. The short history of Regal is replete with extraordinary achievements. A world's record was established in 1950 when Lever Brothers Company, New York, ordered 2,000,000 kitchen utensils. Up to that time it was the largest single order for premiums ever placed in the aluminum industry. Regal was among the first American industries to develop and successfully manufacture 105 mm. shell cases out of steel and produced over 3,000,000 for the U.S. Army during the Korean War. In 1952, a special committee of NATO, including military, government and industrial experts from 11 different countries visited Kewaskum to study Regal's methods and techniques. Regal Ware maintains offices in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles and has field representatives throughout the United States, as well as in Canada and Hawaii.

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Researchers Say Salt Could Be Reduced In Hot Dogs, Baked Goods

Corned beef, hotdogs, and baked goods could be made with less salt, still taste as good, and help people cut the salt in their diets.

That's the outlook of U.S. Department of Agriculture scientists who, after a two-year study, have developed new formulas for lower salt in processed foods.

Food technologists Richard C. Whiting and Eugene J. Guy of USDA's Agricultural Research Service worked to see how much the table salt, or sodium chloride, content could be reduced and still protect the safety and quality of processed foods. These foods are the source of over 30 percent of an American's intake of sodium. Nutritional and medical research have linked high levels of sodium in diets to high blood pressure and other health problems.

Many brands of corned beef, hotdogs, and processed meats could be made with 20 to 25 percent less table salt, according to Whiting's findings at the agency's Eastern Research Center, Philadelphia.

Lower-salt hot dogs compared well with conventional hot dogs in flavor, texture, and shelf life, Whiting said.

Recipes for commercial and homemade leavened breads could call for 50 percent less salt without sacrificing quality, Guy said. A 50-percent reduction could decrease the average

consumer's salt intake 1/2 to 1 gram a day.

Studies confirmed that proper refrigeration is more important than salt in retarding the growth of microbes that cause spoilage and food poisoning, Whiting said.
