Mobile Home Co-op Seeks Sewer Service Without Annexation

Members of the Kewaskum Mobile Home Park Coop, which is trying to buy the property, asked the Kewaskum Village Board Monday night, to consider the extension of sanitary sewer mains and service to the park without annexation to the village.

Norman Gruber, spokesman for the group, told the board, "The average length of residency in the park is eleven years so you don't have to worry about people moving in and out." Gruber also noted that a recent survey of the park's tenants showed over 80% were interested in the project.

"We formed the coop to purchase the park and correct the sewage problems," said Gruber. He noted the coop would pay all costs involved in getting services to the park.

Trustee Richard Schmidt asked if there had been an 'offer-to-purchase' made yet. Gruber said the group planned on getting something down on paper Wednesday night. Schmidt also asked if the coop had gotten any more cost figures together. Gruber said they were working with the original figures presented to park owner Melvin Thompkins.

Trustee Mary Krueger said the village has never provided sewer service to anyone before without annexation. Trustee Howard Laubenstein said he would like to help these people because he understood their situation. "If we hook them up without annexation we're asking for a lot of trouble" stated Laubenstein. "I don't think, for the village's sake, we can do it without annexation" said Krueger. She asked the park's representatives, "are you interested in annexation?" Gruber said they could not really give an answer and asked if it would be possible to have the Village Board, coop board, and their respective lawyers meet to discuss the idea.

Several of the board members felt a request for service without annexation would not be fair to the village residents who have had to meet all the zoning ordinances. Besides the ordinances governing sewer service, there are others covering items such as water and sidewalks which would also have to be complied with by the park.

The board voted to approve a motion to consider providing service with annexation. The trustees stressed the fact that the motion was not to approve

sewer service with annexation, only to "consider" such service.

Village Administrator Dan Schmidt said he would contact the Village's and Coop's lawyers to set up a meeting as soon as possible. Tenants of the park have until March 31st, to vacate the park.

As with any annexation proposal, noted Board President David Nigh, a public hearing would be held.

In other action the board gave approval for the advertising of bids to dispose of the Police Department's 1985 squad car. After a short discussion, it was decided keeping the car would cost more in maintenance and insurance than any savings which might be realized on mileage payments for use of private vehicles used on village business.

The village's insurance agent, Gene Bohn, addressed the board on the subject of additional insurance for the Fire Department which would cover situations not already covered by the village's present policies. Bohn told the board he was not suggesting the village purchase the insurance, only advising them that such insurance is available.

Parks Committee Chairman

Tom McElhatton advised the board that the village will be advertising for bids on the north ball diamond and redoing of the other diamond surfaces. His committee will also be working on putting together specifications for ball diamond lights at the Kiwanis Park.

McElhatton said the committee was still working on a proposal for canoe facilities on the river. He noted, however, that every time the DNR comes back to the village on the project the amount of funds available from the DNR is reduced. Originally we started at about \$14,000 now we're down to \$7,000, he noted. "But we just want the board to know the project is not a dead item."

Administrator Dan Schmidt informed the board that bid ads for the sidewalk extension program would appear on March 20, and 27, with the opening of bids on April 2nd. He also said that 281 letters seeking easements had gone out last week and approximately 25% have been signed and returned.

The board also adopted a resolution supporting the repeal of the Aids-to-Credit legislation, and a resolution modifying the hour eligibility for the Wisconsin Retirement System.

Fond du Lac Man Charged In Shefond Station Robbery

Kevin Pierce, 19, of 110 Arndt Street, Fond du Lac, has been arrested and charged in the February 16th robbery of the Kewaskum Shefond Self-Serve station.

Pierce was arrested at his residence Thursday, March 12th, by Fond du Lac and Kiel police after he had been identified by the victim of a March 2, Kiel service station robbery.

After a positive identification had been made through the aid of posters circulated throughout the southeastern part of the state, authorities obtained a warrant to search Pierce's residence where they found the clothing he had worn in the robbery and some of the stolen money.

Pierce was charged in Manitowoc County Circuit Court and is being held on \$7,500 cash bond.

Pierce is facing five counts of armed robbery covering thefts in Kiel, Kaukauna, Sheboygan, Fond du Lac and Kewaskum, and one count of burglary in

Fond du Lac. If found guilty, Pierce could be sentenced to up to a maximum of 20 years on each count.

Kewaskum Police Chief Donald Hlavaty said, in his department's questioning of Pierce about the Kewaskum robbery, Pierce told them he had no job so he decided to rob mini marts. Using a map, he told authorities, he selected stations in cities of the same relative size and population. In the Kewaskum robbery, Pierce told police he arrived about 30-45 minutes prior to the robbery, watched the traffic flow and layout of the store. He parked his car on Roseland, north of Clinton, and then held up the store.

When Pierce was asked why he wore the same clothes for each robbery, he indicated he thought no one would pay any attention to someone running down the street in jogging clothes when he ran to his car.

Hlavaty noted with all the charges pending against Pierce, Kewaskum will have to wait in line for a turn at him.

Area Man Found Dead In Car

A rural Kewaskum man was found dead in the garage of his parent's home last Friday, March 13th, the apparent victim of carbon monoxide poisoning.

The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Department said Michael G. Ehnert, son of Richard and Joan Ehnert, 1203 Hwy. G, Campbellsport, was found Friday afternoon sitting in his car inside the family's garage by a friend who had come to help do some cleaning while Ehnert's parents were in Florida.

The Sheriff's Department spokesman said the friend, Wendy Kudek, discovered Ehnert about 3:00 p.m. and authorities receive the call at

3:05 p.m. The spokesperson said Ehnert was dead when the police arrived at the home and had apparently been dead for some time prior to the discovery.

An autopsy was performed and foul play has been ruled out as a cause of death. Preliminary autopsy results indicate death was due to carbon monoxide given off by the vehicle after the automatic garage door was closed.

Complete results of the autopsy are expected within a week and the coroner's office will make a report on its findings.

Ehnert was a 1985 graduate of Kewaskum High School. A complete death notice can be found on another page of the paper.

Students of Kewaskum's Middle School had a very elderly statesman visit with them last week to help celebrate National Middle Education Week.

At the ripe old age of 281, Ben Franklin, portrayed by Robert Bray of Waukesha, told students about his life and times.

A man of boundless curiosity, Franklin became an individual of broad understanding and knowledge. Basically self-educated, he taught himself languages, wrote books, was a scientist who developed the first bifocal glasses, the lightning rod, and played an important part in America's history.

Franklin's life spanned most of the 18th century and because

he was a central figure in many of the major developments of that era it is referred to as "The Age of Franklin."

The likeness and characteristics one would attribute to Franklin were excellently portrayed by Bray as he conversed with the audience and gave

students a closer insight into the lesser known facts of Ben Franklin's personal and public life.

Bray put on two performances at the Middle School and one at the Kewaskum Elementary School.

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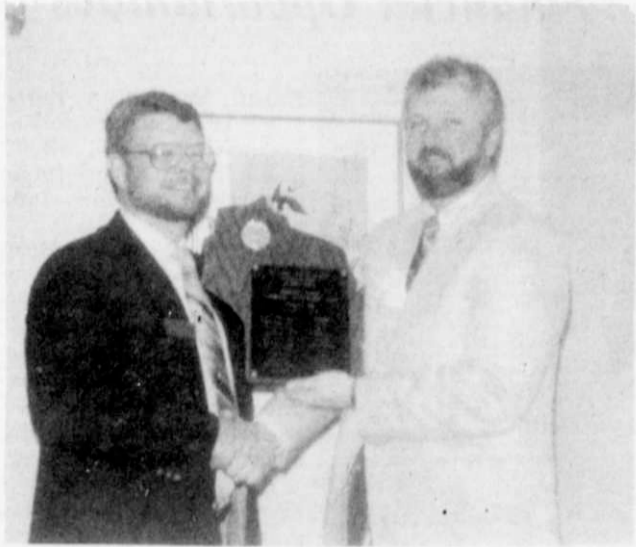


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US Jaycees Award Richard Thiemer Ambassadorship

Fire Damages Town of Wayne Home

A youngster playing with matches may have been the cause of a two-alarm fire which damaged a home located at 5337 Highway 28, Town of Wayne, Monday morning.

The home, owned by Maxine Belger and her sister and brother-in-law, Marge and Rick Bubb, received heavy smoke damage in the blaze which was battled by Kohlsville firemen for over 45 minutes.

Kohlsville Fire Chief Gerald Schulz said he was told by one of the home's owners that a child was apparently playing with matches under the stairwell leading down to the basement. Clothing under the stairs may have ignited and spread the flames.

According to one of the two adults in the house at the time of the fire, a child had been in the basement about five minutes before the fire broke

out. The child's screaming from the basement alerted the two adults to the fire.

The three occupants were safely evacuated without injury. The child had to be removed from the basement through an outside entrance because the stairs had become engulfed in flames.

The Kohlsville Fire Department received mutual aid from the Kewaskum Fire Department and an additional tanker from Campbellsport.

No damage estimate was available.

Belger and the Bubb family are with their brother Morrie Belger and his family at 511 Lin De Lane, Kewaskum, while their home is repaired.

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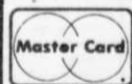
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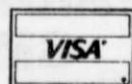

Projects Displayed by New Technical Education Course at KHS

During the past three weeks, students enrolled in a new technical education course at KHS entitled Energy, Power and Transportation, have been hard at work. Their task was to convert light energy into some other useful form of energy.

The class was divided into five groups and each group worked on an energy conversion problem. All projects involved the use of light concentration for increasing the efficient use of the sun.

One group worked on a parabolic curve. Their problem was to devise a solar cooker that

would cook hot dogs.

Another group worked on the Fresnel Lens. Their problem was to devise a device using light concentration to boil water to generate steam. This would turn a turbine and ultimately generate electricity.

A third group was to devise a hot water solar collector. They had to use the sun to heat water for domestic use or hydronic heating.

The fourth group was to make use of passive solar heating unit called the Trombe Wall through convection, radiation and conduction they utilized the sun's energy to generate heat to

warm a model residence.

The last group devised mirror reflection of light to raise the temperature of an air or liquid storage system. Through the use of mirrors, they were able to condense 9 square feet of light energy into a one square foot collector.

Instructor Dave Stradtman said that although not all of the groups were 100% effective with their light concentration projects, they did learn new techniques for utilizing the energy of the sun. The class now plans to investigate small engine design, maintenance and the transportation industry.

Two Teams Going to State

Olympics of the Mind Teams Participate in Regionals

Five Kewaskum Olympics of the Mind teams participated in the Regional Competition at Morse Middle School in Milwaukee on Saturday, March 14. This is what their coach has to say:

The Wayne Elementary School Olympics of the Mind team competed in the Cro-Magnon problem. Their challenge was to present a skit depicting prehistoric life. They were required to make a musical instrument and a tool or utensil out of wood, stone or ceramic material. Also required

was a tool made from bone and the representation of fire. The O M team was responsible for making all the props and background necessary, as well as developing the plot of the skit. All of this required much teamwork and co-operation. Team members exhibited much creativity and they were allowed no outside help. This year's Wayne Elementary School Olympics of the Mind Team

included Kim Resch, Eric Ankerson, Jason Sauer, Greta Kuphal, Sara Boland, Laura Manchester and Becky Yogerst. The Wayne Elementary School Team is coached by Ron Theusch.

The Kewaskum Elementary School team picked Cro-Magnon as their long range problem. Finding background information was difficult but there are now 6 experts on the

Paleolithic Period at Kewaskum Elementary.

The team built a cave complete with cave drawings and tools made from real bones (cleaning them bones was a stinky job!).

The competition was tough and they didn't win but it was great fun trying. Team members are Vicki McElhatton, Karen Koch, Mark Stephani, Jesse Korth, Krysten Ammel. Coach of Kewaskum Elementary School is Mrs. Jan Martinson.

Farmington Elementary School chose the problem POETIC LICENSE. The poem was AFTER THE PARTY by William Wise. It had been stated that poets, through creative expressions, have given us numerous hours of enjoyment and have provided us with opportunities for cultural advancement. Their works describe nature, humor, fantasy, war, death, history, myth and numerous other subjects. Like classical music, the works often allow us to formulate images while reading or listening to the words. The problem for the O M team was to pick one of several poems and to create a parody, satire or an allegory of the poem in poetic form. They also had to make the props, background, etc. and perform the solution. The spirit of the problem was to have the team select a poet who read his/her selection poem, to create a parody, satire or allegory of the poem, and to present the creation in a live performance.

The players this year were: Brian Branchford, Grade 2, Amanda O'Brien, Grade 5, Chad Muckerheide, Grade 5, Michele Gundrum, Grade 5, Todd Krahn, Grade 4, and Jacob Thull Grade 4.

The Farmington Elementary School team is coached by Tom Larsen.

I wish to thank the Kewaskum Middle School O/M Team for all their hard work. We were slow in getting started and had a few team members drop out, but when the chips were down and with only four days to go to the meet, we worked every afternoon to perfect our project.

Our long term "Chain reaction" problem used 50 mouse traps to complete eleven different tasks. The "chain reaction" began with a small metal ball rolling down a plastic tube to set off the first mouse trap. This "mousetrap energy" set off two mouse traps at once; started a battery-operated vehicle which towed a balloon; started a "mousemobile" (non-motorized vehicle propelled solely by the energy produced by a single mousetrap); the mousemobile broke, the balloon towed by the battery-operated vehicle, which was in motion broke a stationary balloon, started music playing, created and completed two free choices by the team, (1) tripped a sequence of 23 mouse traps at one time and (2) tossed a ball into a bowl of water, raised a flag, raised a sign to signal the crowd to cheer and rang a bell. This ended our competition.

The Kewaskum Middle School O/M Team received first place and will be going to the state meet at Stevens Point some time in April. The Kewaskum Middle School team is coached by Ron Beimborn. Team members are Ira Sison, James Dionne, Tisha Stradtman, Mike Kocher and Jenny Beimborn.

The Kewaskum High School team coached by Mrs. M.A. Peterson had the problem OMER TO THE RESCUE. This team took a first and will participate in the state meet at Stevens Point in April. More KHS news in the next edition.

This letter is in reference to exchanges between Mrs. Dieringer, a former school board member and Mrs. Schmitt, a present candidate. Mrs. Schmitt was asked to explain her previous stand in support of the position of Director of Instruction in our district, and her current stand

to eliminate it. She failed to answer that question. It is important that all candidates openly explain their PAST and present views on all issues.

When Mrs. Schmitt DOES answer questions, I urge her to get the correct facts, first. Taxpayers have a right to get honest answers to their questions. The facts and figures, whether financial or merely numbers to compare, can be validated, and should be researched for accuracy. I'm not suggesting the use of foot notes for every statement, but it is necessary to use correct facts and figures. The residents of the Kewaskum school district need honest answers, not fabricated rumors. Lawyer's fees, the number of principals and their job duties, etc. can be verified. "When YOU are asked a question, Mrs. Schmitt, get the facts before you answer!"

The professional background of Ms. Kleinhaus, as quoted, was in essence true, but ALL the facts were not presented. Deerfield, the former school district of Ms. Kleinhaus, had only two (2) schools, and approximately one-third of the students Kewaskum has. Since then, Deerfield has added a curriculum coordinator. Half-truths and statements taken out of context do not make substantial facts and never will.

The statement regarding voters telling the school board they want no more fixed costs in the budget, makes it apparent that Mrs. Schmitt does not understand state mandates. It is very easy for a school board member to vote against the budget, and tell the taxpayers they were against it, when knowing full well that by the 3rd Monday of October the school board must levy a tax sufficient enough to run the school district. If they fail to do so, the state will step in and do this for them.

Election or a re-election of a candidate should not depend on JUST listening to the taxpayers. It should be based on what is in the best interest educationally for our children. Candidates should gather ALL the correct facts, know the limitations in carrying out the voices of the taxpayers, and be able to answer the questions asked of them with substantiated answers. As a member of the Kewaskum School Board, I have had the opportunity to represent the board on many district-wide committees that provide policy direction for the education of our children, our most precious resource.

All are important to the education of our children, and I hope this brief explanation of three of the committees on which I serve will be beneficial to the parents of our children.

The School Evaluation Consortium Steering Committee is responsible for planning and evaluating the school district's curriculum. The members of this committee — school board members, administrators, teachers and parents — provide policy direction to the development of curriculum plans for every grade and course. The professional staff will continue on an annual basis to keep learning materials and textbooks up-to-date.

Because of the various needs of our students, it will take some time for the committee to meet all the curriculum needs of the district. However, with the continued attention by the professional staff and support by the School Board and parents, the Kewaskum School District will be in a position to offer a curriculum to its students that will allow them to compete successfully with others in higher education or on the job in the 21st century.

Two other committees on which I serve are the Protective Behaviors Committee and the Drug and Alcohol Committee.

The Protective Behaviors Program is designed to meet the needs of students who might have been physically, emotionally or sexually abused, as well as to teach them how to avoid dangerous situations. It provides information to all students on "what to do" and "where to go" for help. Parents have been involved as members of the committee, and some teachers have been sent to seminars to learn how to work with these problems.

Associated with the Protective Behaviors Program is the Drug and Alcohol Committee. The importance of the program is shown by the support of the Lions Club for the Quest of the Lions, designed to help middle-school students communicate with family and friends — to make decisions — as a part of keeping them away from drugs and alcohol.

Guidance counselors and a part-time CESA social worker are integral parts of these programs, and contacts between these professionals and family members are kept in strict confidence.

There are some students in our high school who will not graduate from high school because of lack of motivation. Unfortunately for them, choosing not to learn during high school will narrow their choice of jobs when they reach 18 years of age.

There is another category of students that concerns me far more, who also will not graduate. These are the students who do not qualify for special education classes, yet are expected to complete a course in General Math and Pre-Algebra in order to graduate. These are students who do choose to learn, but the course offerings are so difficult, there is little chance for success.

Anyone with an above 70 I.Q. is expected to pass these courses. Even with a math lab and special help, I believe we are expecting too much. If Pre-Algebra is watered down too much, we are penalizing those students who expect to go on to Algebra.

Algebra, Trigonometry, Calculus and computer - programming courses. Why don't we give the same consideration to those students who are not college bound by offering a more realistic math course than Pre-Algebra?

If elected to the school board, I will make it a priority to see that another course is added which will be of assistance for the future in job related and real

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life situations. A diploma should be a reward for students who choose to learn.

NOTICE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM DOG/CAT OWNERS

Pursuant to Section 174.052, Wisconsin Statutes, notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in the Village of Kewaskum that rabies vaccinations and dog licenses are required under the Statutes. The same applies to cat owners under Chapter 12.01 of the Kewaskum Municipal Code.

Vaccination by a veterinarian against rabies is required (Section 95.21(2)) within 30 days after the dog reaches 5 months of age and revaccinated within one year after the initial vaccination. Older vaccinated pets must be revaccinated when the certificate expires or within three years of the previous vaccination. Certificates of current vaccination must be presented when obtaining licenses.

All dogs/cats, 5 months of age or older, require a license. The minimum dog license for neutered males or spayed females is \$5.00, upon presentation of evidence attesting to the same and \$8.00 for the unneutered male or unsplayed female dog. The minimum cat license for neutered males or spayed females is \$2.00, upon presentation of evidence attesting to the same and \$4.00 for the unneutered male or unsplayed female cat.

PENALTIES

A late fee of \$5.00 shall be assessed the owner of each dog 5 months of age or over who fails to obtain a dog license by April 1st.

New dogs must be licensed within 30 days of ownership unless it is a dog that has been licensed and is being transferred to a new owner within the county it was licensed.

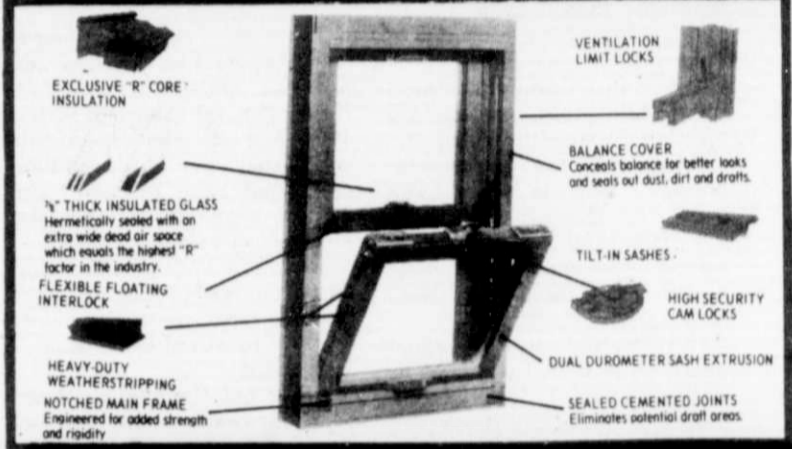

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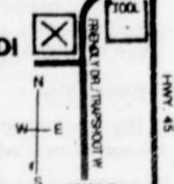


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Michael Ehner Passes Away

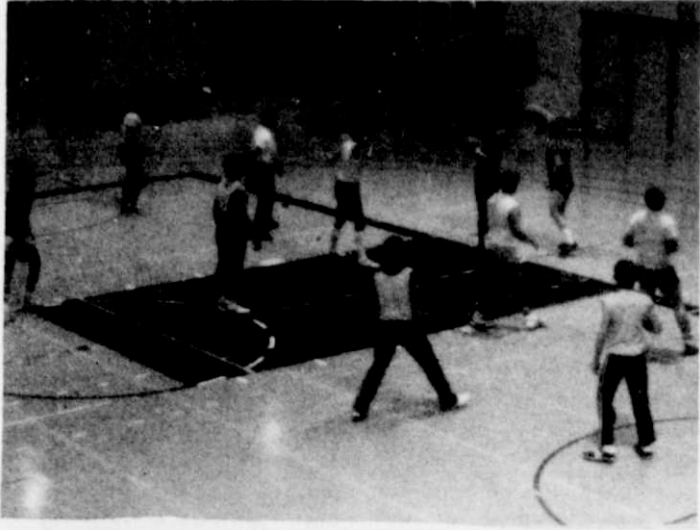


