On Thursday, April 28, the participating students boarded a bus at the high school to begin, as one choir member said, "The best time of my life." Arriving by plane in Orlando in mid afternoon, the students checked into a hotel and then headed to "Wet'n-Wild" Amusement Park for an evening of water slides, inner-tubing, knee-skiing, and a barbecue. The group rose early on Friday morning for a full day at Walt Disney World.

Saturday's events were very rewarding. After a good night's sleep, the swing choir performed at the contest, in the large, beautiful auditorium at Orlando's Colonial High School.

Later that day, the students were very excited to learn they had achieved a "superior" rating from the three judges. The weekend concluded with a journey to Epcot before heading for home Sunday evening.

# Board Okays Final Phase of Sidewalk Extension Project

The Kewaskum Village Board, Monday night, gave its okay to advertise for bids on the final phase of the Capital Improvements Sidewalk Extension Program.

The board approved a preliminary resolution declaring its intention to assess twenty properties for the planned work. Administrator Dan Schmidt informed the board that a public hearing on the project will be scheduled for 7:00 p.m., Thursday, June 9th and that all the concerned property-owners will be notified individually by mail.

If all goes according to schedule, the work should begin by July 1st, with completion by

September 1st. Most of the properties involved in this year's work are in the Werner Drive/Riverview Drive area on the north side of the village. There will also be some work done on the southern end of the village along Prospect Drive and highway 45.

In other business the board and some department heads had a heated discussion over problems related to the fire department's present renovation project.

Fire Chief Donald Ehnert expressed his feelings and frustration that much of the blame lays with the village's engineering firm in not catching mistakes that were made during the project. Referring to some sidewalk work, Ehnert said,

"When you do a thing over four times and the engineers don't catch things one out of four times, this firm isn't doing a very good job."

Augie Bilgo also questioned the project. He told the board he and Administrator Dan Schmidt were caught in the middle. We hear one side from the engineers and one side from the committee. Bilgo questioned the serviceability of the new waterproofing material that had been applied to portions of the fire station which has been having water leakage problems. He told the board he and his men had a lot of other work to do in the village besides spending time up at the fire house. "My crew has had to go up there and put a band-aid on a lot of screwups," said Bilgo.

Public Works Committee Chairman Howard Laubenstein said he had to agree with some of Ehnert's comments regarding the engineers. We're not knowledgeable in these areas, noted Laubenstein, that's why we hire engineers and rely on their recommendations.

The board approved a motion to inform the engineering firm of Reukert and Mielke that the village will expect it to pick up the cost of landscaping and other related costs involved in making repairs around the building.

In other action the board approved the instituting of a voluntary recycling program for the village. The program is expected to go into effect by mid-June.

It was noted that the program is still on a voluntary basis, however, it does provide the groundwork for a mandatory recycling program should the countywide incineration program become a reality.

A recycling center will be set up at the village's municipal garage to accept all recyclable materials such as aluminum, plastic, paper and glass. Residents may still sell their items to commercial recyclers or donate them to collection drives if they wish.

As enacted by previous ordinances, grass clippings or tires will no longer be collected by the village nor will they be accepted at the recycling center. It will be the property owners' responsibility to dispose of those items on their own.

In other action the board approved building permits for

construction of a new home to John Gitter, and a garage addition to James Hansen.

The board approved a bartender's license for Ron Theusch and a Class "B" malted beverage license to the Kewaskum Athletic Club which will allow it to sell beer at its Sunday baseball games at the high school ball diamond.

After reading a report from the Kewaskum Police Department, the board voted to deny the application of Dennis Campbell for a combination Class "A" liquor license for the property at 355 Main Street (J & N Liquor).

The board also approved the hiring of Jennifer Koepke, effective May 23rd, as the Municipal Department secretary, and to advertise for part-time employees to supervise the new recycling center.

Schmidt also asked the trustees to consider a suggestion to install a second emergency warning siren in the village. He noted that after last week's tornado alert he had received calls that some areas of the village did not hear the siren. Schmidt noted, however, that the siren's purpose was to warn people who are outdoors to seek shelter. He asked the board to think about the possibility of installing another siren at the site of the new lift station.

## WTA Speaker to Visit KHS May 23

The Political Science, Social Problems and Current Affairs Classes at Kewaskum High School will learn how they can improve government when Michael McCabe, Education Director of the Wisconsin Taxpayers Alliance, visits them on Monday, May 23.

McCabe, a lifelong resident of Wisconsin and a graduate of the University of Wisconsin - Madison, was a legislative aide in the Wisconsin State Assembly before joining the WTA. He also formerly worked as a newspaper reporter, covering local government for the Racine Journal Times and the Dane County Press Association, a group of weekly newspapers in the Madison area.

His inspirational and educational message deals with government, taxes and citizenship. "Government is only as good as the people it serves," he says. "Our nation needs motivated, involved citizens. Democracy is not a spectator sport."

The Wisconsin Taxpayers Alliance, Madison, is a privately supported, nonpartisan research organization founded in 1932 and dedicated to improving government through better-informed, more-responsible citizenship.

Eligible households will receive butter and processed cheese. In addition they may choose rice and one of the following: flour, dry milk and honey.

Assistance: For more information, the public may phone 338-4610.

Home delivery is available for Elderly and Handicapped if there is no one in the household who can get to a distribution site. To make arrangements, call the distribution site in your area.

Although no income verification information is required, a self declaration form must be signed by the recipient and is subject to state audit. You may also be asked to provide proof of residency.

This program is being coordinated by the Washington County Department of Social Services, and handled locally by various volunteer groups in each community.

## DOT Designates Washington County's Paradise Drive As Rustic Road -52

Washington County's Paradise Drive moved a little closer to its namesake in May. It has just been designated a rustic road by the Department of Transportation, a move designed to maintain its scenic qualities and keep travel down its length at a leisurely pace.

Earl Skagen, Burlington, chairman of the Rustic Roads Board, reports Wisconsin now has 52 of these scenic routes scattered throughout 31 counties, covering over 245 miles of road.

The newly designated road consists of the portion of Paradise Drive east of County Highway M and ends at Wausaukee Road, in the town of Trenton. The road is 1.2 miles in length and will be designated R-52.

The original road has a legal description dating back to 1849. The wooded rural road is located on one of the highest points in the county, offering a scenic panorama of the beautiful countryside. Vistas alongside the road include a log house and field stone house, each about 130 years old. Wildlife and vegetation abound, and the low volume of traffic on the road has led several recreational publications to suggest its suitability as a bike trail.

This is the second rustic road established in Washington County. Rustic Road RR-33 skirts Holy Hill, following County CC between WIS 167 and County Q.

"Rustic roads are selected because of their scenic quality, low-volume local use and their year-round accessibility. They serve travelers who come by auto,

bike or foot to enjoy these rustic features," said Skagen. "We encourage any local citizens, civic groups or local historical societies to consider converting their favorite scenic route to a Rustic Road."

Rustic routes are easily identified by the brown and gold "Rustic Road" signs. Speed limits are no higher than 45 mph. Utility companies are encouraged to bury lines where possible, and advertising signs are discouraged.

Anyone who wishes to nominate a road for the rustic roads system should contact the town chairperson, county highway commissioner or a member of the Rustic Roads Board. Maps and information on the nomination process are available from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, Rustic Roads Board, PO Box 7913, Madison, WI 53707.

Pat Gangnon, a teacher at Badger and a veteran of Theatre on the Hill and other area shows, will direct "Tom Sawyer."

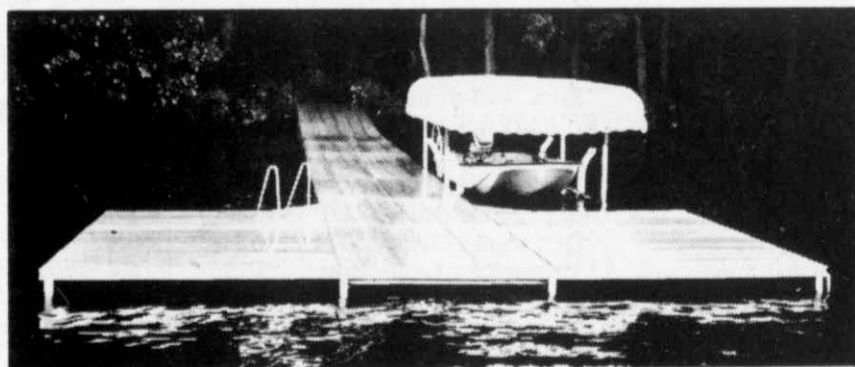
The production will be part of the regular summer repertory rotation with performances set for Thursday

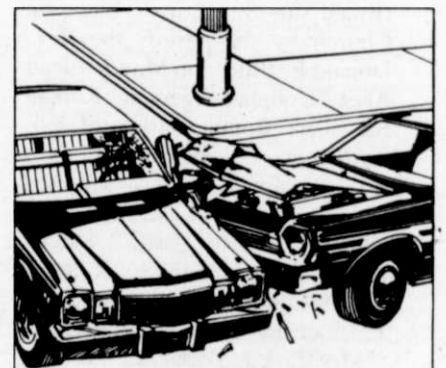

The students were picked during April 26 and 27 elections. Next fall, freshman senators will be chosen to complete the SGA membership.

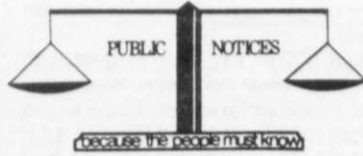

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## Minutes of School Board Meeting

President Ralph Horner called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

Members present: Clara Trapp, Ruth Schmitt, Ralph Horner, Ron Beimbom, Donald Nowak, Ron Theusch.

Member absent: Perry Ankerson  
Ruth Schmitt led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Schmitt/Trapp motion to approve the agenda. Motion passed 6-0.

Student government representation; reports or questions, etc.: none-Jim Piowarczyk and Craig Hubbell were not present. (Craig Hubbell had asked to be excused).

Audience to visitors; receiving of delegations: Principal Tom Larsen thanked the OM teams and coaches for a fine year. Mary Ann Peterson's team from KHS took 2nd place at the state meet in Stevens Point.

Schmitt/Nowak motion to approve the minutes of March 28, 1988. Motion passed 6-0.

Schmitt/Nowak motion to approve policy #3160-Tax levies: Partial Apportionment. Motion passed 6-0.

Schmitt/Trapp motion to approve policy #6180(a) Staff Organizational Chart for SEC process. Motion passed 6-0.

The next Policy-Legislation-Bylaw Committee meeting will be held April 25, 1988 at 7:00 p.m. the Administration Offices.

Negotiations Committee chair Ron Beimbom announced that an agreement had been reached with the KAP for an initial 3 year (1986-1989) contract which includes a 20 cent increase for 1986-87, a 25 cent increase for 1987-88 and a 30 cent increase for 1988-89. The total package increase totals 17.62 percent for an average of 5.87 percent plus an additional 1 percent increased sick leave for 1988-89. Beimbom/Nowak motion to ratify the 3-year master agreement and salary schedule for 1986-89 with the KAP. Motion passed 6-0.

Mr. Beimbom announced that an initial meeting was held with the non-union support staff. No future meetings have been scheduled.

Regarding negotiations with the KEA, investigator Steve Schoenfeld of the WERC has been appointed. Administrator Kleinhaus requested the Board to be present for a meeting with the KEA and the mediator on Wednesday, May 4th at 6:00 p.m. Attorney Spector will also be present.

Nowak/Schmitt motion to approve the payroll and accounts payable in the amount of \$1,809,075.64. Motion passed 6-0.

Principal Kopecky was not present so the Board postponed taking action on the CESA contract for scheduling and grading at KHS until his arrival.

Director of Instruction Backus informed the Board of the progress and success of the SAP program. She spoke about some of the problems as well, especially the need for more prep time and continued inservice for facilitators. Horner/Theusch motion to direct the Administration to write letters of gratitude to the teachers who are donating their prep time to help cover for the facilitators. Motion passed 6-0.

Principal Kopecky arrived and asked the Board to approve his request for approval of a contract for scheduling and grading through CESA #6 for the 1988-89 school year. Cost is estimated at \$6,000. Schmitt/Nowak so moved and the motion passed 6-0.

District Administrator Kleinhaus reviewed a survey published in the January Newsletter which solicited public input on a possible summer school. A survey was also circulated among the teachers asking how many would be interested in teaching and what classes should be offered. The projected start-up costs total approximately \$16,000. Schmitt/Theusch motion to proceed and dedicate funds needed to start a

summer school program this summer. Motion passed 6-0.

Supervisor of Buildings and Grounds Boehlke presented his summer custodial work request to the Board. Nowak/Schmitt motion to bid out the painting and hire four part-time temporary people at the rate of \$5.00 per hour. Motion passed 6-0.

Superintendent Kleinhaus asked the Board to approve a girls softball program at KHS. She based her request on much information provided regarding the inequity of sports offered to girls as opposed to those offered to boys. Ms. Kleinhaus referred to PI 9.03 of the State Statutes which states that "Each Board shall develop policies prohibiting discrimination against pupils" including: "Opportunity for participation in athletic programs or activities. This does not prohibit separate programs in interscholastic athletics for males and females, but the programs shall be comparable in type, scope and support from the school district." Presently there are 8 sports offered to boys at the cost of \$58,278 and 6 sports offered to girls at the cost of \$35,836. A student survey showed that 29 girls would participate in a softball program and 41 were interested and might participate. Initial start-up costs would be about \$5500, and thereafter the programs would cost approximately \$3400 per year. Schmitt/Trapp motion to table the softball program proposal for a month or two until the budget has been reviewed and the Board can determine whether a softball program is affordable and where the Board's priorities lie. Motion passed 4-2 with Clara Trapp and Ron Theusch voting no.

Nowak/Beimbom motion to approve the AHERA inspection and management contract in the amount of \$13,697.34. Motion passed 6-0.

Theusch/Nowak motion to approve the appointment of Gerry Gosa and Chris Harlow as 7th and 8th grade track coaches. Motion passed 6-0.

Schmitt/Trapp motion to accept the resignation of Elizabeth Borneman as KHS Spanish teacher with regret. Motion passed 6-0.

Schmitt/Nowak motion to accept the resignation of Maureen Daley as KHS English teacher. Motion passed 6-0.

Administrator Kleinhaus reported that notice has been received from the Wisconsin North Central Association that the District has been accredited for the 1987-88 school year. It was noted that the District received another great report with no violations for 1987-88.

## Prospective 1988 Plantings

Wisconsin producers intend to plant 3.45 million acres of corn, down 3 percent from last year, according to a March survey by the Wisconsin Agricultural Statistics Service.

Oats acreage is forecast at 1.2 million acres, down 8 percent from 1987. Wheat acreage is up 22 percent, with the increase due to a 41 percent jump in winter wheat planted. However, this is a decrease of 14 percent from 1986. The 1987 crop of winter wheat was small due to the wet weather in the fall of 1986 which made planting difficult. Spring wheat acreage is expected to decrease by 33 percent.

Maintaining their position as a leading hay state, Wisconsin farmers plan on harvesting 3.45 million acres of hay in 1988, an increase of 4 percent from 1987.

Soybean acreage is expected to jump 21 percent over both 1986 and 1987. Barley acreage is expected to increase 14 percent, while tobacco growers plan to harvest 8 percent fewer acres than in 1987.

Nationwide results from the March agricultural survey of farmers indicate 1988 corn acreage is expected to increase 2 percent from last year, but down 13 percent from 1986. Soybean acreage shows an estimated one percent increase.

A comprehensive survey will be done in June which will give a better indication of acreage planted for the 1988 crop season.

## WISCONSIN OUTDOORS AND CONSERVATION NEWS

### Conservation Congress Annual Spring Hearing Results

Attendance at the annual Conservation Congress Spring hearings was up 74 percent from last year, according to hearing results released by the Department of Natural Resources.

This year 7,618 congress members attended the county hearings to vote on proposed changes to Wisconsin's fishing, hunting and trapping regula-

tions. Last year's attendance was 4,372.

"The congress is pleased with the turn-out at the annual Spring hearings," said Roger Britton, Conservation Congress chairman. "The Natural Resources Board had asked us (the congress) to explore ways to increase public participation. We were able to accomplish this with the support of the

hundreds of affiliated clubs and organizations."

"Now, the congress will sift through these questions, address county recommendations and resolutions, and present our recommendations to the Natural Resources Board at its June meeting," added Britton.

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## Indian Boys 4th at Conference Relays

**KEWASKUM** — The Kewaskum boys' track team finished fourth amongst a strong field at the Eastern Wisconsin Relay track meet which was hosted by the Indians last Friday, May 13.

A strong Two Rivers team easily won the meet with 100 points followed by New Holstein (85) and Sheboygan Falls (83). Kewaskum was next with 51 points, only eight points ahead of fifth place Kiel (43). Rounding out the placing was Plymouth (34) in sixth and Chilton (32) in seventh.

The Indians only placed first in two events, the 330 meter high hurdle shuttle and the 900 meter low hurdles. Three juniors, Marty Schulteis, Ryan Degnitz, and Kris Follmann were responsible for both first place wins. In the 330 meter high, this junior trio won with a quick 49.9 second time; however, the real excitement took place in the 900 meter lows where each of the three Indians turned in his personal best. Degnitz ran his leg in 42.1 seconds to break Kewaskum's school record which Schulteis bettered in his leg to 41.3 seconds. This is the third time this season that Schulteis and Degnitz have rebroken the 300 meter low hurdle record. Perhaps overshadowed by the accomplishments of Schulteis and Degnitz was the performance

of Follmann who ran his leg of the hurdle relay in 42.8 seconds, nearly five seconds better than his previous best. Kewaskum's time of 2:07.2 in the 900 meter lows was over five seconds better than the second place New Holstein time.

Although the Indians didn't place second in any event, they did manage to place third in one event, the 1600 meter sprint medley relay. This relay consisted of four members, one running a distance of 400 meters, two sprinting consecutive 200 meter dashes, and the third running a distance of 800 meters. Kewaskum's team of Miles Shaw, Dan Fischer, Mike Lubahn, and Chris Donath placed third with a time of 3:53.4 just one tenth of a second from second place New Holstein.

In the shot put, Kewaskum's team of juniors Jeff Taylor, Cory Opperman, and Degnitz placed fourth with a combined distance of 119'2 3/4."

The 400 meter relay team placed fourth in an event dominated by Kiel. Kiel won the relay in a very quick 44.9 seconds compared to Kewaskum's time of 46.5 seconds which was only good enough for fourth place even though it was Kewaskum's best time of the season. The relay team consisted of

Aaron Miller, David Harju, Fischer and Lubahn.

The triple jump team of Harju, Mark Hartman, and Clarence Fry also placed fourth for the Indians with a combined distance of 108'10."

The Indians will travel to Two Rivers where they will compete in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference meet next Thursday, May 19.
