Industrial Park Out; Residential Housing In

After a public informational hearing held during a special

meeting last Wednesday night, the seven members of the Kewaskum Village Board unanimously voted to scrap

plans for an industrial park and instead put the land up for sale as a prime site for private residential housing.

The decision came after Village Administrator Dan Schmidt presented the board with a report on problems and options for the 23-1/2 acre parcel of land which had been purchased two years ago with the idea of creating an industrial park to attract new businesses and jobs to the village.

During that hearing the trustees heard a detailed presentation on three separate options open to the village as far as the fate of the industrial park was concerned.

The discussion was a result of the fact that the village has not been able to resolve some problems with the Town of Kewaskum regarding traffic useage on Old Fond du Lac Road.

Since several hundred feet of the road are within the township's jurisdiction, there was reluctance by town officials to permit heavy trucks to travel on their portion of the roadway. That resulted in the placing of load limit restrictions on the Town's section of the road.

Development of the park and sale of lots to tentative tenants was curtailed when the Town asked for an environmental impact study of the road by the Southeastern Regional Plan Commission. Recommendations in that subsequent study would have added another estimated \$16,000 to the park's developmental costs.

By the time the report was received, one tenant had withdrawn their offer to purchase a large parcel of land in the industrial park, and instead planned to buy a site in the West Bend Industrial Park, a second prospect placed their plans on hold, and a third potential still indicated an interest in the park.

Schmidt told the board, after that, inquiries and interest in the park dropped off and then stopped completely.

Schmidt said the three options open to the village were, One, continue to try meeting with the township in the hope of resolving the road problem, Two, complete extension of the industrial park road and drop development plans for the time being or, Three, look toward residential development of the land.

As far as the need for residential development, Schmidt told the board the

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Last Big Push to Garner Votes for Tuesday's Election

Campaign signs, like spring tulips, have sprung up in yards and on street corners the past two weeks as political hopefuls make a last ditch effort to get their names in front of the voters before Tuesday's election.

Many of the candidates have been working all summer to capture their constituents' votes while a few have waited until the last days of summer to make the big push.

In some contests the outcome of the September 13th primary will also determine the individual who will get the job. Such are the cases of some of the county races including coroner and sheriff since there are no challengers from the opposing party.

Robert Boltz, who has held the post of coroner for the past 28 years has decided not to seek re-election. With no Democratic candidates, the battle for the \$10,350 a year job will be between Republicans John H. Meyer, a West Bend fireman, James R. Shane, a West Bend police officer, and Edward W. Carroll, Jr., a professor of anatomy at Marquette University's Dental School.

Shane has been serving as deputy coroner since July 1st.

In the race for Washington County Sheriff the situation is similar in that there are no Democratic candidates. There is, however, an incumbent. Sheriff Clarence Schwartz is being challenged for his job

from within his own department.

That challenge is coming from Robert H. Schulteis, Lieutenant of the Washington County Sheriff's Department's Detective Division, who is making a strong bid to win the job away from Schwartz.

Like the coroner's race, the primary for sheriff will virtually determine the final winner.

Washington County's strong Republican background is also evidenced in one other race. Incumbent Washington County Clerk Arthur Degnitz is facing only one challenger for his job and that is also from another Republican, Raymond Keppler.

Incumbents Jon Sanfilippo, Clerk of Circuit Courts, David Resheske, District Attorney, and John Steilen, Register of Deeds, are all running unopposed.

On the state level, incumbent Republican State Senator Carol Buettner of the 18th District will find her only competition coming from Democrat Mary Gropp on the November ballot.

In the 20th District, Republican incumbent State Senator Donald Stitt and Democratic hopeful Rita Liesiefsky will be competing for that post in the next election.

In the Assembly races, incumbent Republican Mary Panzer, Representative for the 53rd District has no challengers.

For the 58th State Assembly District, Republican Steven Loucks will compete against Democrat Neil Willenson for the

Post Office to Restore Window Service Hours

Window service hours at the Kewaskum Post Office, reduced about one-half day a week last February in response to the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act, will be restored on Saturday, September 10 in a way that "best meets customers' needs locally," according to Postmaster Frank Beesten.

The new service hours will be 8:30 a.m. - 5:00 p.m., and Saturday, 8:30 - 10:30 a.m.

The window schedule in effect since February has been 8:30 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. and 3:00 - 5:00 p.m.; Saturday 8:30 - 10:30 a.m.

Postmaster General, Anthony Frank, announced in July that savings generated by other actions, primarily internal, would be sufficient to meet the requirements of the

Budget Act, and that post offices could restore some window service according to local postal needs," Postmaster Beesten said.

"The intent was not to just retreat to the old hours, but to actually determine what will be best for postal service in Kewaskum. The new hours are a result of the deliberation," he said.

The Budget Act requires the Postal Service to reduce federal outlays by \$1.245 billion over fiscal years 1988 and 1989. Additionally, the Postal Service had to defer capital commitments totaling \$815 million and must make payments of \$780 million to cover health benefits and cost-of-living adjustments and cost-of-retirees during this two-year period.

In recognition of his years of service, Village Board President

Paul Blumer presented Hlavaty with a plaque noting his dedication to the department and the Village of Kewaskum. Blumer also presented Hlavaty with a proclamation of recognition from the State of Wisconsin.

While it was a happy occasion for both men, there was a moment of restrained emotion as Hlavaty officially relinquished the last symbol of his title by handing Knoebel his gold shield, the badge which is the emblem for the position of police chief.

Hlavaty's wife Kitty was present for the ceremony as were Knoebel's wife Cindy, daughter Kelly and his parents.

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Board Okays Borrowing for Sewer and Water Extension

The Kewaskum Village Board gave its formal approval to proceed with the borrowing of money for the construction of sewer and water mains along with the construction of a lift station and force main to provide services to the northern and northwestern portions of the village.

In related action, the board approved awarding of the contracts to Zunker Construction of Fond du Lac, in the amount of \$346,386, which covers two of the three projects and a portion of the third project. A contract was also awarded to Super Excavators in the amount of \$174,487, for the construction of a sewage pump station.

The board also approved the purchase of a second section of culvert to meet floodplain requirements for the road extension into the industrial park land parcel.

In other business, the board approved the advertisement for sale of the village-owned land on the northwest side of highway 45, (formerly the Ideal Subdivision). Village Ad-

ministrator Dan Schmidt informed the board he already has several serious inquiries on that parcel of land.

Howard Laubenstein, Chairman of the Plan Commission, presented his committee's recommendation that the village approve a re-zoning request for the land directly east of the Sison Medical Clinic from Retail/Commercial to Multi-family Residential.

The village will now set a date for a public hearing on the request. Mr. Lewis Herro of the Herro Company is proposing construction of two, sixteen-unit apartment buildings on the site.

Schmidt and the village's consulting engineer advised the board that construction crews for the last phase of the sidewalk project are expected to move their equipment in this week, with work to start early next week. One holdup for the project may be the fact that the telephone company has not, as yet, moved several of their poles which must be relocated.

First Assistant Fire Chief Dave Zehren also asked for and received board permission to advertise for bids on the renovation of the department's

Tele-squirt truck cab.

Zehren informed the board that the alternate plan to provide passenger capacity for firefighters in one of the other units is not working out as well as anticipated. He noted there is a problem with communication between the various units when they are in service.

Trustee Mary Krueger informed the board that the village's secretary had submitted her letter of resignation and it will be necessary to advertise for a replacement.

Issuance of a building permit for a garage and two bartender licenses for Early Farm Days were also approved.

Kewaskum Receives Handicapped Education Flow-Through Grant

MADISON - State Superintendent Herbert J. Grover has notified the School District of Kewaskum that it will receive \$40,770 to fund a special education project similar to past years.

Administered by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, the grant is made available under Public Law 94-142, the Education for All Handicapped Children Act.

This federal law requires states to provide a free, appropriate public education for children, ages 3 to 21, with exceptional educational needs (EEN). The grant will serve about 150 handicapped children in the Kewaskum area.

Statewide, all local educational agencies will share in the more than \$24 million available under this program during the 1988-89 school year. Seventy-

At the national level, there is no shortage of political hopefuls making their bid for the soon-to-be vacant seat of retiring United States Senator William Proxmire.

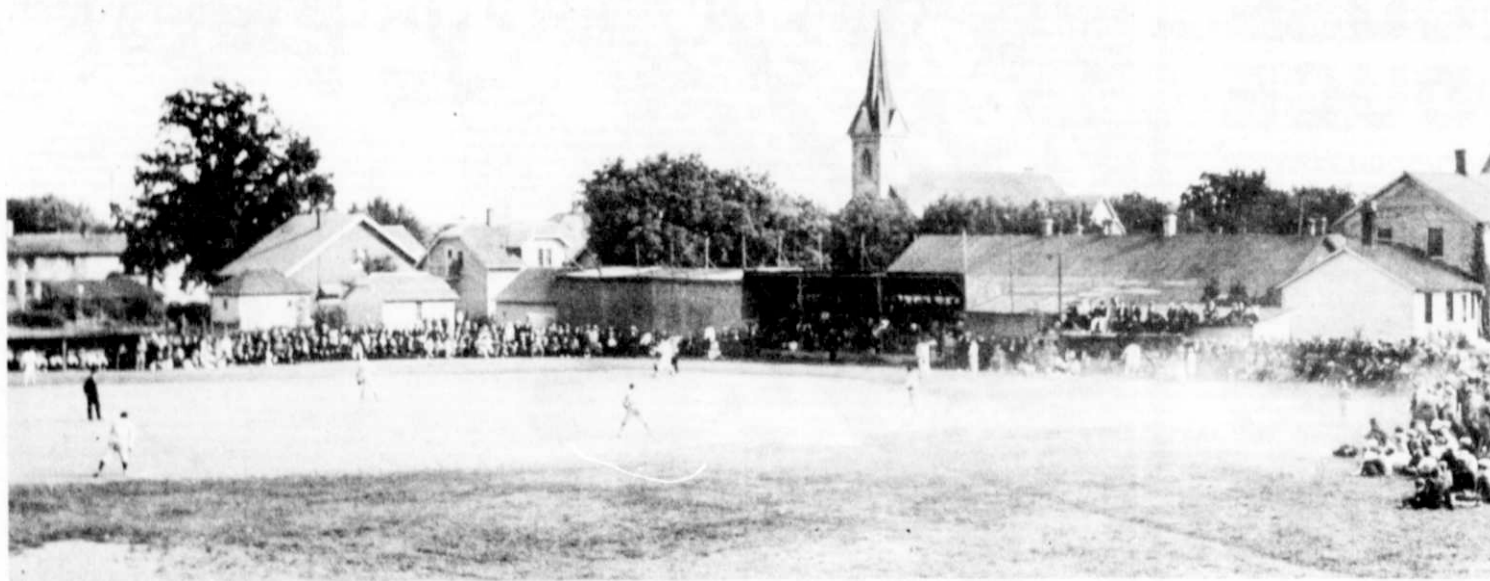

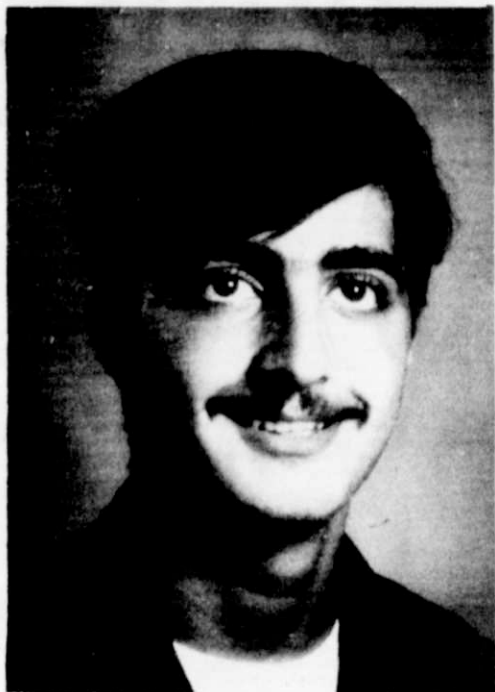

construction of the Highway 45 bypass is bringing more and more people into the West Bend/Kewaskum area.

In West Bend building sites for individual homes are virtually non-existent, noted Schmidt. He said there is little open land left within West Bend's city limits. That means people are looking toward Kewaskum, noted Schmidt.

As to what changing the land over to residential use would mean to the village financially, Schmidt said quite a lot. As an industrial park, the 16 acres of developable land in the 23-acre parcel would bring the village about \$62,000, with an assessed valuation of \$1,581,228 and annual taxes of approximately \$37,000 for the five taxing bodies.

Depending upon how the land was subdivided in the third option, it could mean an additional thirty to fifty residential homesites. That plan would bring the village approximately \$204,000, with an assessed valuation of \$3,852,450 and annual taxes of

about \$91,000, up 146% over the industrial park's figures.

Beside that, the village would also save the estimated \$16,000 required for the Old Fond du Lac Road improvements plus, reduce the costs of sewer and water improvements into the site by \$50,000 for the village because the cost of running lines into a spur road in the park would no longer be required. Once the site was sold, all other improvements would be the responsibility of the developer, indicated Schmidt.

"One other question should be asked," said Schmidt. "If the choice is residential, are there any interested developers and the answer to that question is yes, we have a half dozen of them and the majority of them are very interested."

After hearing Schmidt's presentation, Trustee Mary Krueger told fellow board members, "We might as well just forget about Number One because we're not getting anywhere. I don't think it even pays for us to consider the second option," she noted. "I, myself, would go with the last one," said Krueger.

On a motion by Trustee Ken

Bonlender to take Option #3 and reduce improvements to the site by \$50,000 for the spur road, the board unanimously approved selling off the industrial park land to a developer for the purpose of creating a residential subdivision.

The board members agreed the land would make an excellent site for home construction because of its scenic beauty and the fact that the remaining acres which cannot be used for home construction can be developed into a park area.

Schmidt stressed that scrapping the industrial park plan now did not mean the idea was dead forever. We'll continue to look at other sites for development of a future industrial park. He said several other sites could prove to be acceptable for the plan.

Schmidt also noted that because of the board's action, SERPAC's projected traffic useage figures for Old Fond du Lac Road would be reduced drastically. Those figures should drop 30-50% for private vehicles and down to 0% for trucks, he noted.

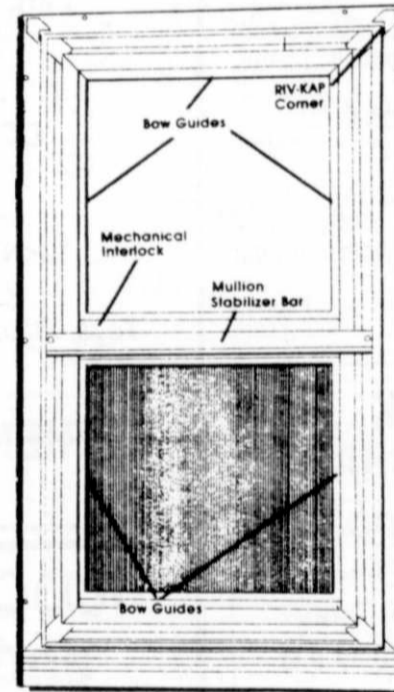

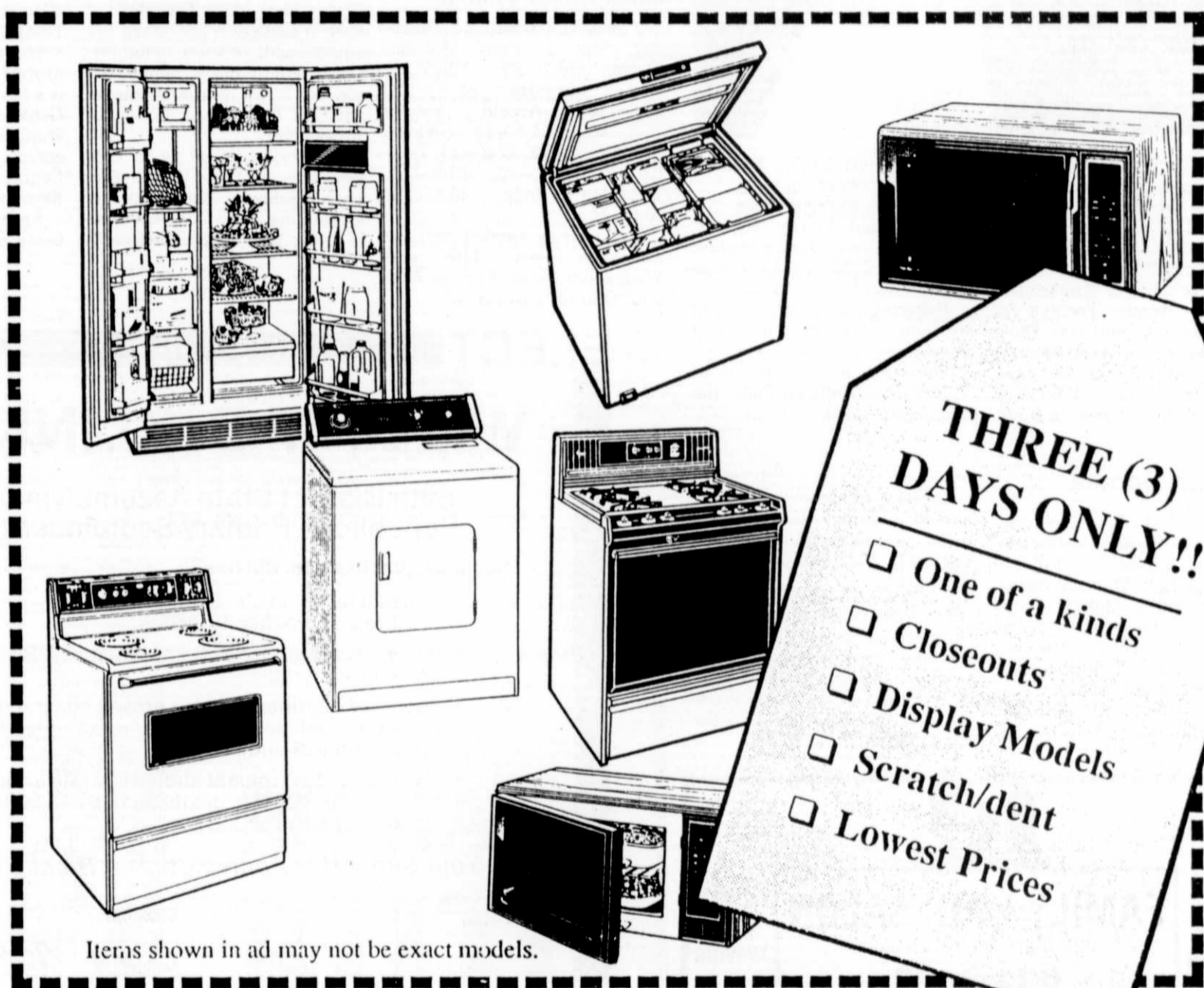

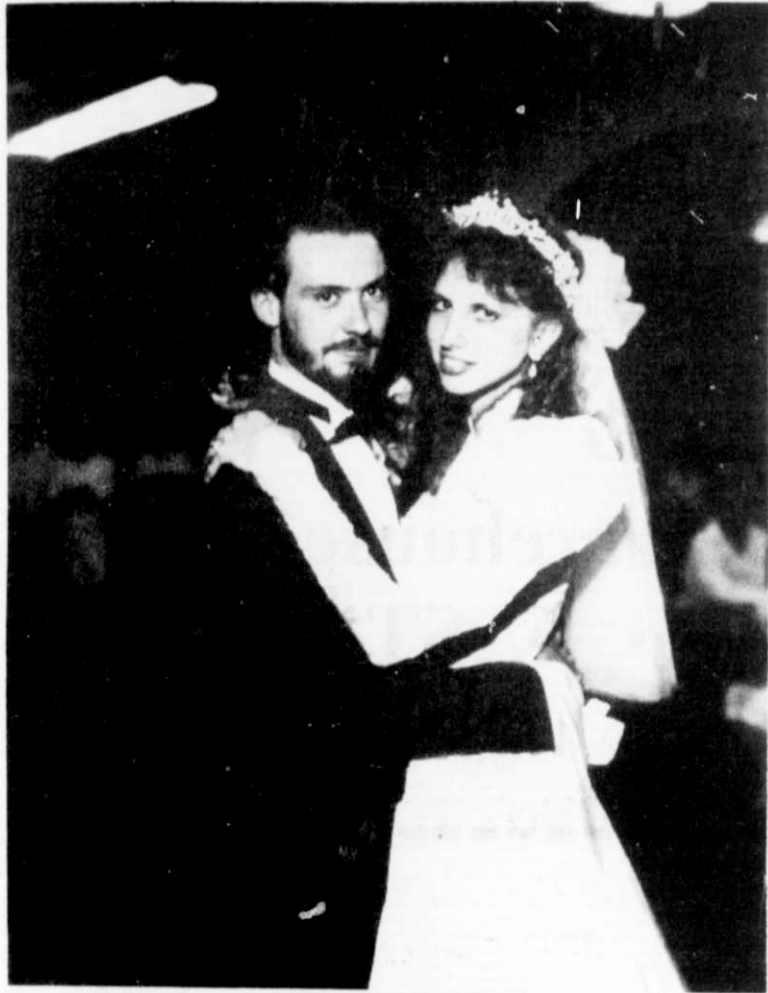

Notice is hereby given of a partisan primary election to be held in the several wards in the County of Washington, on the 13th day of September, 1988, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column.

INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

At the partisan primary, the elector shall designate or select the party of his or her choice and make a punch or a hole at the right of the party of his or her choice. An elector may cast votes for candidates of only one political party. The elector should make a punch or a hole at the right of the candidate's name for each office for whom he or she intends to vote, or write in the name of his or her choice on the ballot envelope provided, or depress the button or lever next to the candidate's name for each office for whom he or she intends to vote, or insert or write in the name of his or her choice for a candidate. In order to qualify for participation in the Wisconsin election campaign fund, a candidate for state office at the September primary must receive at least 4% of all votes cast on all ballots for the office for which he or she is a candidate, in addition to other requirements.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils a ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Unofficial ballots or a memorandum to assist the elector in punching or marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official ballot is punched, it shall be inserted in the envelope provided so the punches do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth or machine, deposit the envelope containing his or her ballot in the ballot box, or deliver the envelope to an inspector for deposit, and shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.

1989 Waterfowl Stamp Design Contest Begins September 15

MADISON, WI — The 1989 Waterfowl Stamp Design Contest begins September 15 and runs through December 15, 1988. The contest is sponsored by the Department of Natural Resources.

Living species of waterfowl commonly found in Wisconsin or subject matter relating to waterfowl hunting must be the dominant feature of any design. The design must be an original creation by the artist, and may not be copied or duplicated from previously published art, including published photographs.

Contestants must be 18 years of age or older and legal residents of Wisconsin. Eligibility is also limited to artists who have not won the contest either of the two previous years.

Waterfowl species not selected as winners the previous three years will receive preference in the 1989 stamp contest. Wisconsin's waterfowl stamp issued in 1986 depicted canvasbacks; the 1987 stamp featured Canada geese; and the 1988 stamp design highlighted hooded mergansers.

Contest judging will take place on or about January 16, 1989 at the Department of Natural Resources' Madison headquarters. Entries will be judged on anatomical accuracy, proper habitat setting, artistic composition and suitability for

reproduction.

Purchase of the stamp is required to hunt waterfowl in Wisconsin. In 1987 more than 94,000 waterfowl stamps were sold.

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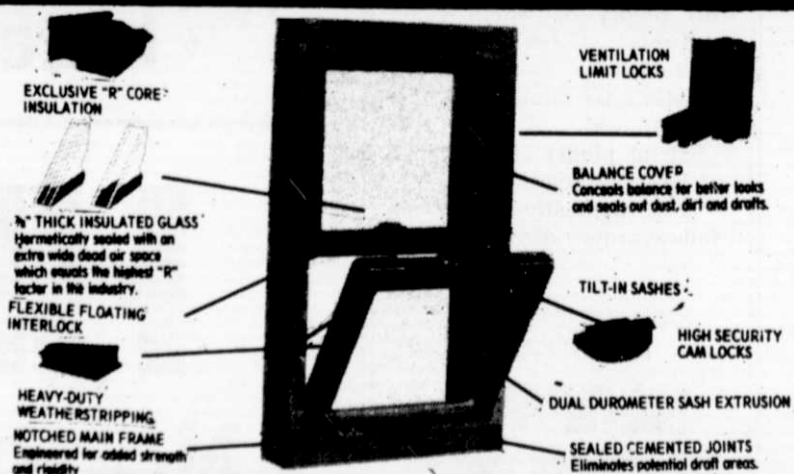
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New FmHA Guidelines to Aid and Assist Drought Devastated Farmers

In responding to the results of a recent USDA drought survey documenting the anticipated Wisconsin statewide crop loss at 52%, Ron Caldwell, State Director of the Wisconsin Farmers Home Administration (WI FmHA) has released information on new FmHA guidelines to aid and assist farmers and businesses who have been devastated by the drought.

As it relates to Farmers, the Drought Disaster Assistance Bill removes the multi-peril crop insurance from eligibility requirements when applying for an emergency loan.

"Now," said Caldwell "100% of Wisconsin's Farmers are potentially eligible for FmHA direct emergency loans, as compared to 2% when the insurance was required."

"These direct emergency loans will be at 4 1/2% interest with a repayment period of up to seven years," Caldwell continued.

The bill will also expand the guaranteed operating loan authority. According to Caldwell, it will allow rural Banks, Production Credit Associations (PCA), and Federal Land Banks (FLB) to advance principal and interest payments to other creditors on 1988 and 1989 installment payments that are delinquent because of the drought.

FmHA regulations authorizing and implementing the expanded loan authorities as a result of the Drought Disaster Assistance Bill are anticipated within the next month.

FmHA Farmers applying for emergency loans will also be evaluated for the expanded loan servicing authorities permitted by recent regulation changes.

"Emergency loans and expanded authorities," said Caldwell "are all tools which will be used to help prevent an act of nature from causing a farm family to exit farming."

The expanded authorities which are anticipated by mid-October include: debt write down, if it is needed to provide a realistic balanced cash flow; increased mediation efforts; and expanded authorities to former owners whose property was, or is acquired by FmHA or as a result of foreclosure action by FmHA or other prior lien creditors.

Also, under these authorities, lenders with guaranteed loans will be able to receive an estimated loss payment if, in order to achieve a positive cash flow, their guaranteed loan is reduced to the present market value of the security.

In addition to helping Farmers, the Drought Disaster Assistance Bill also provides new authority to guarantee loans made to rural businesses who were affected by the 1988 drought.

"Our business loan program," said Caldwell "has become a kingpin of the administration's Rural Development effort by placing increased emphasis on rural businesses which have been placed in distress caused directly or indirectly by the drought."

All loans to Farmers are administered by the various

County Offices, whereas the business loans are administered from the State Office located in Stevens Point.

TODAY'S AGRICULTURE

TEMPORARY SILAGE STORAGE SYSTEMS

With the reduced hay production during 1988, many farmers may be needing to use corn silage as feed for their livestock. If silo facilities are not available, temporary silage storage systems can be utilized. These systems are designed to help producers effectively use drought stressed forage material, primarily corn. The goal of such systems is to get through the 1988-89 winter feeding season. These systems are not intended as continuing practices, nor are they intended for storage into the summer season.

The systems most frequently used are 1) stacks 2) trenches and 3) horizontal plastic bags. All systems should be located where there is adequate drainage away from the silo. In many instances it may be helpful to provide a base surface of gravel, crushed stone or crushed lime rock.

Stack silos are little more than a compacted stack of high moisture material. This will be the lowest investment that will result in the highest losses.

Trench silos reduce losses because of reduced exposure to air and the ability for better packing of the material. Trench silos can be built in a variety of

ways with variations ranging from pre-cast concrete side to a trench dug into the ground or hill side.

One system of constructing a trench silo involves the use of large round bales placed with the flat ends towards the silage material. Plastic can be used to line the inside and cover the top of the material to reduce spoilage. The plans for this system are available from the County Extension Office.

The horizontal silo bag is another good alternative. There are individuals that own machines and will provide custom filling service.

Information and plans on all of these systems are available from the Washington County Extension Office.
