

Wessing Presents Preliminary Plan for New Apartments

James Wessing, who recently purchased the former Ideal Land subdivision from the village, came to Tuesday night's Plan Commission meeting to show its members preliminary construction plans for one of the two R-4 multifamily lots in the parcel.

Wessing said that the plans, however, were tentative but he wanted the commission to have an idea of what he would like to build on the smaller of the two multi-family lots.

Wessing said, "the building

we're proposing will fit the lot real well because it slopes a lot." The plans call for a tenunit building with each apartment containing a little over 800 square feet of living space. Each unit would have two bedrooms, one about 10x12 feet and another of about 12x12 feet.

Wessing told the commission that while it would add another cost to the building's construction, extra materials would be built into the flooring and walls to provide greater sound deadening quality between the apartments. "That's one of the

problem with living in an apartment," said Wessing, "the noise."

Wessing said he was not seeking any approval or recommendation from the commission. His visit was simply informational and he wanted the commission members to take a look at the drawings to see if there was anything in the plans which could cause a delay or problem when he formally presented the plans at a later date.

Zoning Administrator Richard Zarling noted the only

Registration will again be held on Tuesday, Feb. 7th from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. only.

All registrations will take place in the Farmington, Kewaskum and Wayne school offices. Please register your child at the school in your area on one of the above days. It is not necessary to bring the child while registering.

To be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten, children must have attained their fifth birthday on or before September 1, 1989. Evidence of date of birth,

either a birth certificate or a baptismal certificate, must be brought to the office at the time of enrolling.

Parents of bus pupils will need their section number and fire number as well and also fill out bussing forms.

Parents will register their children for next year's term and get the necessary health forms. If you know of any new families in the district, please pass this information on to them.

I should like to impress upon you the importance of registering your child on either of these two days so that we may plan for them and know staff requirements for next year.



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Approve Second Aide For KES Fourth Grade

The one and only item on the agenda for Tuesday night's special Kewaskum Board of Education meeting was the discussion and approval to hire either another full time teacher or aide for the Kewaskum Elementary School's large fourth grade.

The meeting came in response to a letter and request presented to the school board at its January 9th meeting from fourth grade teachers John Stephani and Barbara Harju. In that letter they asked the board to provide some assistance with their classes.

At the meeting Tuesday, Stephani told the board he had dealt with large classes in the past, however, this year's two classes of 31 students each have some additional difficult factors affecting them. Among those students are nine pupils who are being mainstreamed from the special education program. He noted that there are also some students who are borderline and do not qualify for the special education program but who still need more individualized assistance.

According to Stephani's letter, "Because of the number of students currently in the fourth grade classes, it is difficult to meet the individual needs of all the students. Students who are experiencing academic difficulty can not receive the help they need while the accelerated students are not afforded the time to achieve to their full potential." He also noted that with 30 students in a class, discipline also becomes a problem.

Stephani indicated the hiring of a full time aide would at least allow the teachers to work more individually with students in the academic areas.

In response to the request, board member Neal Weare made a motion to hire a full time aide for the remainder of the school year. The motion was seconded by Donald Nowak.

Board member Ruth Schmitt said she would not vote in favor of the motion. In explaining her reasons, Schmitt told fellow board members and about twenty parents attending the meeting that, while she was in favor of the aide time, she was against one full time aide.

From her own experience as a substitute teacher, noted Schmitt, she felt it would be better to hire two aides so each teacher could have help at the times she felt they most needed it, during Math, Reading and Science classes. "You can't split a person between classrooms" said Schmitt.

One parent questioned what will happen when these classes move on to the fifth grade. District Administrator Dr. David Heather said, "that remains to be seen, however, one solution that will be looked into is the adjustment of school boundary lines.'

In listening to the discussion, Weare stated "the bottom line figure, one full time teacher's aide would be adequate for the balance of the year.'

principal KES Richard Zarling was then asked for his comments on the motion. "A teacher's aide would be adequate," said Zarling, "but

the teachers have requested another full time teacher.'

"This would again have to come out of Fund Equity and it's a dollars and cents thing as well as alleviating the problem," stated Weare. "We asked for a teacher, but a full time aide would help," said Stephani.

School Board candidate John Schulte asked if there was room for another class at the school and if there would be a lot of facilitating expenses. Heather said there was room, with no expenses except for the disruption and moving of the students.

Paul Reindl, a parent, asked what the difference in cost could be between a teacher and an aide. Heather said, "for the remainder of the year the cost for a teacher would be about \$19,250 as compared to \$4,400 for an aide. A teacher would get \$19,250, so for a full year they'd be getting \$38,000?" asked Reindl. Heather said that was correct, that the average Kewaskum School District teacher's salary is \$38,000 a year, plus benefits.

Stephani was asked what he thought of Schmitt's idea to approve an additional eight hours, but divide it between two aides. He said "Two half time aides would be worse than one full time aide.'

Zarling noted that this year's situation was unusual in that 18 new students came in at midterm and four of them are in the fourth grade.

Board member Clara Trapp said she would like to see the kids stay where they are and work on solving the problem for the next year.

On a 5-1 vote, the board approved the hiring of one full time aide to work with the fourth grade classes until the end of the year. Schmitt voted against the motion and board member Perry Ankerson was absent.

Governor Approves Final Two Contracts for West Bend Bypass

Governor Tommy Thompson has approved the final two paving contracts totaling \$5 million to upgrade the 13-mile West Bend Bypass (US 45) to a 4-lane divided highway between WIS 145 and County D.

The Governor announced last August that the project would be pushed ahead by two years and the contracts are now in place for its completion, according to Harvey Shebesta, director of the Department of Transportation's Waukesha district, which includes Washington County.

The first three contracts for bridge construction and signing were approved last month.

"Two additional lanes will improve the traffic flow and safety on this stretch of highway," said Shebesta. "The region's economic development should also get a boost.

Both paving contracts were awarded to Roddie E. Beaudoin & Son Co. of Menomonee Falls. Under the first contract, seven miles will be paved from WIS 145 to Paradise Dr. The second contract takes care of six miles between Paradise Dr. and County D.

The new roadways will be 24 feet wide with 10-foot shoulders on the outside and 6-foot shoulders on the inside. Six feet of the outside shoulders and three feet of the inside shoulders will be paved.

"Paved shoulders provide motorists with extra room to maneuver in emergencies and reduce maintenance by moving the pavement edge - which is more susceptible to wear and tear - farther from traffic,' said Shebesta.

About 13,400 vehicles - 12% of them trucks - use the highway every day. The bypass is the principal route south of WIS 33 and important to the economic growth of the area.

Work will begin in the spring and be completed in the fall. Staged construction will require traffic to be moved from one lane to the other. Ramps and crossovers will be used at reduced speeds.



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Men, Age 18 Through 25 Must Register for Selective Service

Young men who will turn 26 in 1989 will be reaching an important milestone, according to the Selective Service System.

Beginning on January 1, 1989, men who were required to register with Selective Service in 1981 will be turning 26. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept late registration after a man reaches his 26th birthday.

Selective Service Acting Region Director Ronald V. Meilstrup warned that, with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for certain federal benefits such as student aid, job training, and most federal employment, in addition to facing possible prosecution as a felon.

Some states also require registration for state student aid, entrance to state-supported colleges and universities, state employment, and permission to practice law.

Many of the men who have not registered may be unaware of the requirement or do not understand the importance of the obligation to register. Some may even have served in the military but failed to register either before entering the armed forces or after leaving active duty. Others may have institutionalized incarcerated at the time of their 18th birthday and did not realize they were required to register if released prior to age

Ronald V. Meilstrup points out that men age 18 through 25 who have not yet registered can avoid the risk of prosecution and loss of benefits by registering promptly at any local post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to 5 years in prison, or both.

For those men born in 1963 who have registered, 1989 also marks the year that ends their eligibility for selection for induction under present law.

Over 20 million men, age 18 through 25, have registered with Selective Service since registration was reinstituted in 1980. Of those 20 million men, 311,509 are from Wisconsin.

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




