KHS Odyssey of the Mind Team To Compete in World Meet

The Kewaskum High School Odyssey of the Mind "Razzle-Dazzle" Team has, for the second year in a row, placed first in state competition and will be representing the State of Wisconsin at World Competition in Ames, Iowa from May 31 to June 3.

The team of Ira Sison, James

Dionne, Jeff Morlen, Jesse Santoro, Chris Weddig, and Chris Schoofs has been working long hours researching, constructing, and practicing its solution to Geographic Odyssey, the team's long-term problem.

To solve the problem, the young men constructed a

vehicle propelled by a rowing motion then used the vehicle to "travel around the world" to visit three countries, portraying an aspect of each country's culture. Finally, the team is required to use its vehicle to race against time to place ten flags from various countries at

only liberal arts college from Iowa that offers both the Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Arts in Music Degrees.

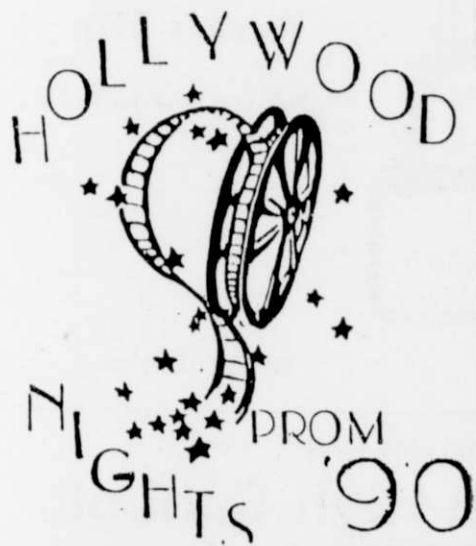

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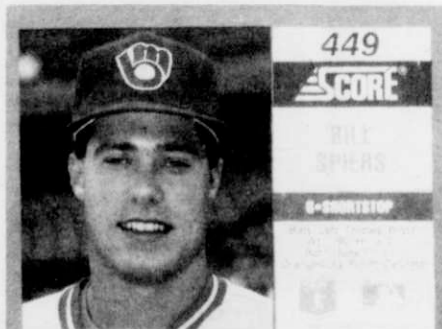

\$300,000 Fire Demolishes Newly-Built Riekkoff Home



A fire early Wednesday morning completely destroyed a home under construction on Hickory Drive north of Hwy. 28, in the Town of Kewaskum.

The blaze was discovered by a neighbor approximately one mile northeast of the residence, who was awakened by the smell of smoke shortly before 4 a.m.

The Kewaskum Fire Department received the first call at about 4 a.m. When firefighters arrived on the scene, the house was totally engulfed by the inferno. The Kewaskum Fire Department then called for mutual aid from Beechwood, Boltonville and Campbellsport.

Boltonville provided full aid, battling the numerous grass fires which broke out from flying embers carried on strong southwesterly winds.

The nearly completed home, estimated to be worth over \$300,000 was being built by Wayne and Rose Riekkoff of 8311 Hilltop Lane, West Bend.

Kewaskum Fire Chief Bob Stoltzmann said the fire was being investigated and no further information was available. Stoltzmann said his department would probably remain at the scene well into the afternoon.

24 KHS Forensics Students 'Going For the Gold' at State This Weekend

This year's high school forensic team started off with a perfect record at the sub-district contest at Hartford on March 3. Every KHS speaker qualified to go on to the district, having received nineteen or more points out of a possible twenty-five from at least two of the three judges.

There were two group entries: John Hazlewood and Curt Ammel in play acting, doing Neil Simon's "The Sunshine Boys," and Heidi Gruhle, Angie Schoofs, Stephanie Gildemeister, Kim Petrie, and Shawn Erdmann in group interpretation, doing Bill Cosby's "The Ark and the Tower."

There were also eighteen individual entries: Dana Neuser in oratory, presenting original material about date rape; Pam Gauger in four-minute, also presenting original material about date rape; Adam Pilachowski in four-minute, presenting original material about love of the U.S.; Jason Sharpee and Jason Miller in group discussion, considering the topic of cheating in U. S. schools; Nathalie Stercq in special occasion, presenting original material about JFK's assassination.

Jennifer Beimborn in demonstration, showing stamp collecting techniques; Becky Manthei and Jill Peterson in humorous solo acting, doing "Audition" and "The Driving Instructor," respectively; Rachel Gosa and Nicole Doherty in serious solo acting, doing "From Mother with Love" and "The Answer," respectively; Jennifer Brigham and Christy Towler in poetry, reading "If I Ran the Zoo" and "Please Hear What I'm Not Saying," respectively.

Stacey Pamperin, Eric Giese and Jeff Brigham in prose, reading "Magic Night," "Johnny Got His Gun," and "Count Dracula," respectively; Erin Hein in farrago, doing selections about war; and Brenda Behling in storytelling.

The two groups and Brenda Behling all received perfect 25's in one of their rounds.

The Eastern Wisconsin Conference Meet was held at Sheboygan Falls on March 13, and quality not quantity was the key word for the KHS team. Because a full team of twenty-five entries was not sent, our team placed fifth with the top four teams having the full quota of entries. Dana Neuser and Pam Gauger were the best speakers of all in their categories, while Becky Manthei, Erin Hein, Jason Miller, John Hazlewood, Curt Ammel, Heidi Gruhle, Angie Schoofs, Stephanie Gildemeister, Kim Petrie, and Shawn Erdmann were the second-best of all those entered in their categories. The conference meet was two rounds this year, which was a new set-up, always having been only one round in years past.

On their march to state, team members excelled at the district contest, which was held at Brookfield East and Brookfield Central on March 31. Each contestant needed to have twenty or more points in at least two of the three rounds. Twenty-four of our twenty-five entries qualified for state competition; that total ties the

largest number of KHS speakers ever to go to state. Only Jason Sharpee, a freshman team member, missed qualifying. Brenda Behling again scored perfect scores — this time in two of her three rounds. Jennifer Brigham also was perfect in two rounds. Also scoring perfect 25's were Eric Giese, Dana Neuser, and Adam Pilachowski. Pam Gauger was near perfect in all three rounds as she consistently scored 24.

The team will travel to the University of Wisconsin campus in Madison this Friday, April 27. All speakers are entered in the 5:30 p.m. round. There are also three rounds on Saturday

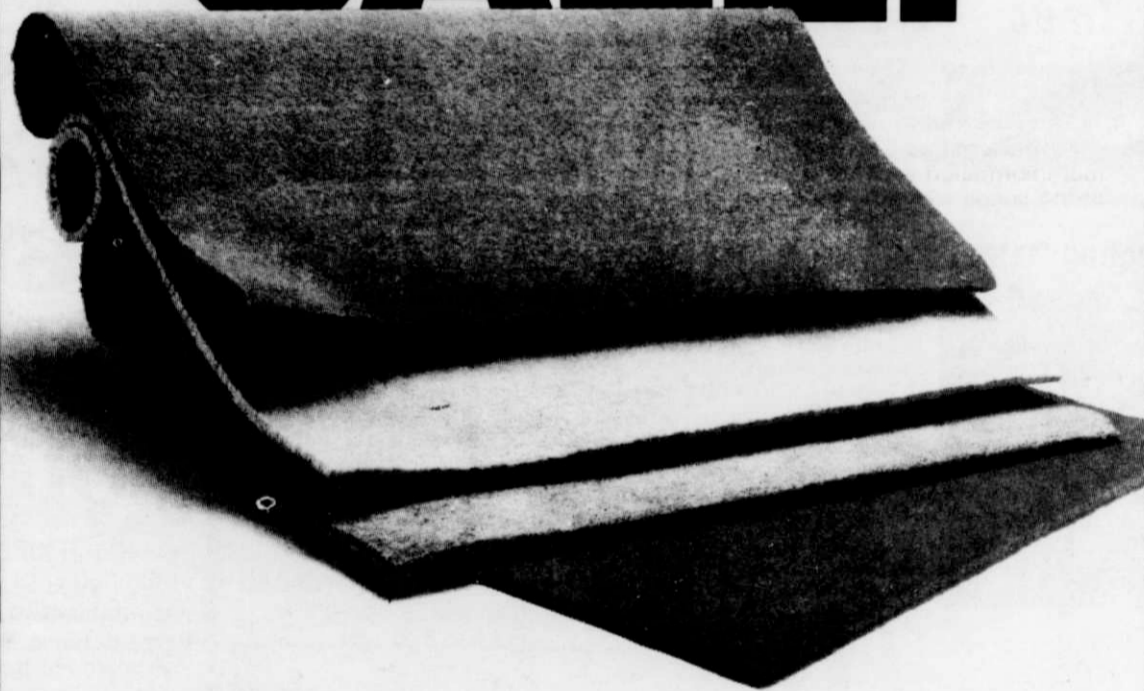
and another one on Friday night because every member school throughout the state will be participating in this epitome of contests. Each speaker will perform only once at state. Barbara York is head forensics coach for the KHS team, and Judy Jacak is the assistant coach. Both have been impressed with the team's continued success and are very proud of the fantastic percentage of team members who have qualified for state. A speaker who receives a perfect score at state is given a gold award, and with such KHS quality this year, a quantity of numbers will be "going for the gold."

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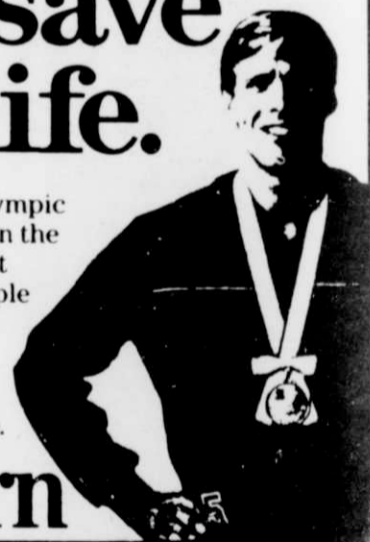

Three KHS Students Receive Tandy Technology Awards

Tandy Technology Scholars, a program designed to recognize academic excellence, especially in the areas of mathematics, science and computer science, announced awards today totaling \$350,000 in cash stipends and scholarships.

One hundred students and 100 teachers became the first group of Tandy Technology Scholars when they were named at a news conference April 4 in Washington, D.C. Lauro F. Cavazos, Secretary of Education, was joined by numerous education leaders to congratulate these outstanding students and teachers.

In addition, the top two percent of each participating high school's senior class was recognized for overall academic excellence. This was based on work done in grades 9-11. More than 15,000 individuals will be recognized for their academic achievement by the Tandy

Technology Scholars program at school awards programs. Included in the top 2% academic awardees from KHS were: Steve Gerhartz, LeeAnn Winninghoff and April Wulff.

The Tandy Technology Scholars program is a national program open to students and teachers in accredited high schools throughout America. The finalists were selected by a panel of educators and approved by a National Advisory Council.

The outstanding mathematics, science or computer science student and/or teacher at each participating high school was recognized. From these nominees, semi-finalists and finalists were selected. Teacher finalists received checks for \$2,500 each. Student finalists received cash scholarships for \$1,000 each.

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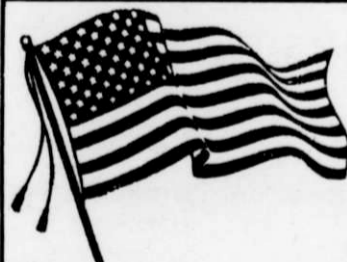
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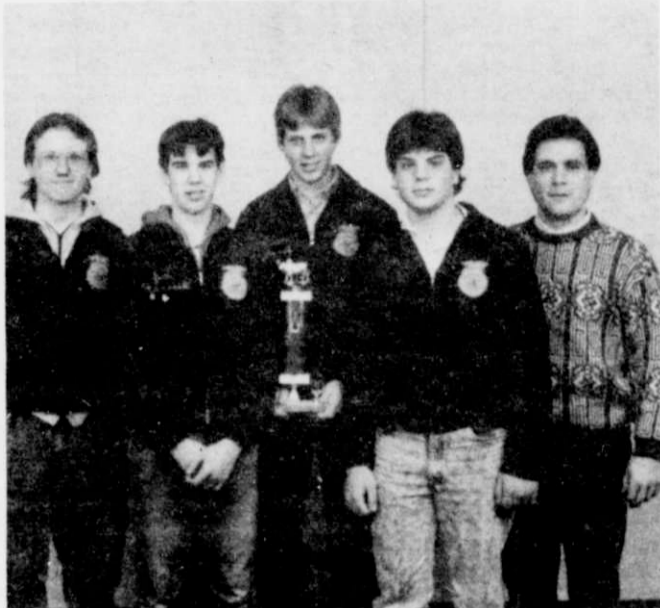

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UWWC to Offer 'Survival German Travelers' Course

WEST BEND — A course on "Survival German for Travelers" will be offered at the University of Wisconsin Center — Washington County in early May.

Classes will be held from 7:00 to 9:15 p.m., Tuesday and Thursday, May 1 and 3. The course is part of the continuing education program at UWWC. The fee is \$25.00.

Krueger, a veteran traveler to Europe, said she sees a high value in having some knowledge of the language of a foreign country where people plan to visit.

She said, "The natives feel you are making an effort to speak their language. That comes across well. Travelers are America to many people aboard. Foreigners get their impression, good or bad, from us."

"Americans have a reputation of not being culturally educated. If we know a little and act appropriately, it cancels out that reputation."

How much can a prospective traveler expect to learn about German in five hours of class? "Hopefully, some basic conversation and a chance to practice pronunciations," Krueger said. She plans to toss in some helpful hints about German culture and customs.

Krueger lists a number of important areas of communication for anyone who hopes to survive a trip abroad, including:

- Transportation. She said that getting around in Europe involves reading bus and train schedules, understanding signs and abbreviations.

- Eating and sleeping. Visitors need to know how to order meals and how to ask for a hotel room with a toilet in the

room. "They're not always available," she said.

- Small talk, including polite things to say, builds relationships, she said. Especially useful is a vocabulary for talking and asking about families.

- Geography and directions — enough to find out "what's where?" she said, including the names of other countries in German.

- Numbers to help in counting money and determining dates. "So you can tell when you are departing," Krueger said. And students will look at Celsius temperatures so they can understand the weather and learn about telling time on a 24-hour clock.

In August, Krueger will be making her seventh trip to Europe.

After her first visit, she admits, "I was bit by the bug."

Krueger has taught a number of continuing education German courses for adults and children. To register or obtain more information on the class, call Joan Laabs, coordinator of continuing education at UWWC, 338-5208 in West Bend.

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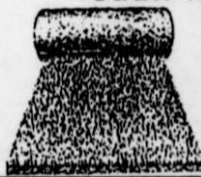
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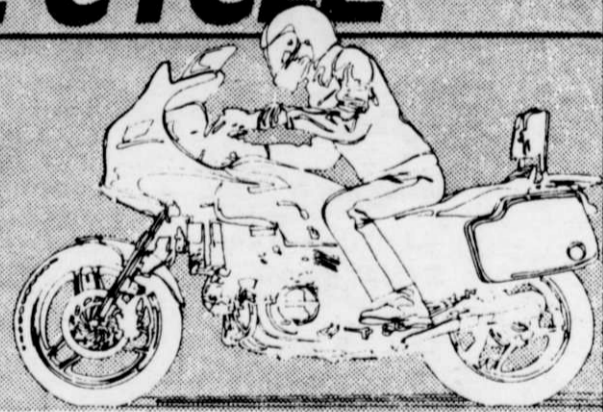
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Kiwanis Clubs Observe Canada-US Goodwill Week

Sensenbrenner Announces Candidacy

(Washington, DC) — Congressman F. James Sensenbrenner, Jr. (R-Menomonee Falls) announced today that he is a candidate for reelection to the Ninth Congressional District seat in the House of Representatives.

"I am seeking reelection to be able to continue the fight to bring the federal deficit under control by reducing spending, not by increasing taxes," Sensenbrenner said. Sensenbrenner was recently rated #1 in the United States Congress by the National Taxpayers Union for his voting record to hold down federal spending. "The next few years will challenge our country to respond to the democratic changes in Eastern Europe, to support the President's National Drug Control Strategy, and to support those measures which will encourage Wisconsin's economic growth," he added.

Sensenbrenner has served in Congress since he was elected in 1978. He serves on the Committee on the Judiciary and its Subcommittees on Civil and Constitutional Rights, and Courts, Intellectual Property, and the Administration of Justice. Science and Applications and International Scientific Cooperation. Congressman Sensenbrenner serves on the Select Committee on Narcotics Abuse and Control.

A 1968 graduate of the University of Wisconsin Law School, Sensenbrenner also received an A.B. degree in Political Science from Stanford University in 1965. He previously served in the Wisconsin Legislature from 1968 to 1978 when he was elected to Congress. He was a practicing attorney until becoming a full-time legislator. Sensenbrenner and his wife, Cheryl, live in Menomonee Falls with their two sons.

Slinger Speedway Practice a Success

SLINGER — The biggest field in the history of the Slinger Super Speedway's annual pre-season practice day turned out Sunday, pushing car count speculation for this week's Leinenkugel Twin 75's racing classic.

In all, 25 late models took to the track during the afternoon affair, including former NASCAR Winston Cup driver Jim Sauter. Preparing for this Sunday, Sauter debuted a new Chevrolet Lumina. Former track champions Al Schill and Tony Strupp also tested during the four-hour session.

A sidelight to the late model tune up was the presence of Milwaukee's WVTU TV-18 cameras. Filming for a special which will air in May, WVTU taped several of the hot lap sessions as well as getting some in-car camera shots with the help of Strupp. The station will be back this Sunday to continue production and will use the Leinenkugel features as a backdrop.

About 20 amateur drivers signed in, along with ten sportsman and a couple of figure 8 cars. There were no major incidents on the speedway the entire afternoon.

Sunday's timetable calls for the pit gates to open at 10:00 a.m., with spectators allowed in the stands at noon. Qualifying will begin at 12:30 p.m., with racing starting at 2:00.

Two 75-lap late model features, a 50-lap sportsman main, and a big figure-eight finale are included on the card.

Following the Leinenkugel event, weekly action returns to the track with the Pontiac Excitement night May 6. Besides the three classes that will run this Sunday, amateur racing will also be included with their first full night of action.

FDL Chapter Whitetails Unlimited Supports Adopt-A-Deer Program

The Fond du Lac Chapter of Whitetails Unlimited has donated \$300.00 to a deer study program being conducted by Prof. Orrin Rongstad and the University of Wisconsin - Madison Wildlife Ecology Department.

The study is taking place in deer management unit 6 in Wisconsin. This area of the state had one of the highest-deer densities in the United States during the 1930's and now has some of the lowest densities in Wisconsin. The study is aimed at finding out what the limiting factors are that are keeping this population down. Is it poor reproduction or poor survival? What is the cause...predation? poachers? poor winter range? poor summer range? Could this happen elsewhere throughout the state in years ahead?

The major cost of the program is in keeping 100 deer radio tagged for a three year period so that vital survival information can be obtained along with information on seasonal movements. Seasonal movements could help to interpret summer and winter range conditions and past survival information.

Whitetails Unlimited, Inc., National headquarters has requested participation from its 35 chapters in the state. The chapters are showing their commitment to sound deer management through their generous contributions.

Good Success for Turkey Hunters

Turkey hunters from the first hunting period of the 1990 season are reporting a slightly higher success rate than for the first period of 1989, according to Ed Frank, Department of Natural Resources upland game specialist.

"Cooperating wild turkey registration stations have reported a total harvest of 1,624 turkeys for the first hunting period which ended April 15," Frank says.

Frank says that translates to a success rate of about 28.8 percent of the hunters who received permits, compared to a success rate of 28.2 percent for the first period of 1989 when 1,502 turkeys were registered. This was the first of six spring wild turkey hunting periods for 1990 that will end May 20.

"We expect a harvest of around 6,000 turkeys this year, compared to a harvest of 4,406 during four spring periods in 1989," Frank says.

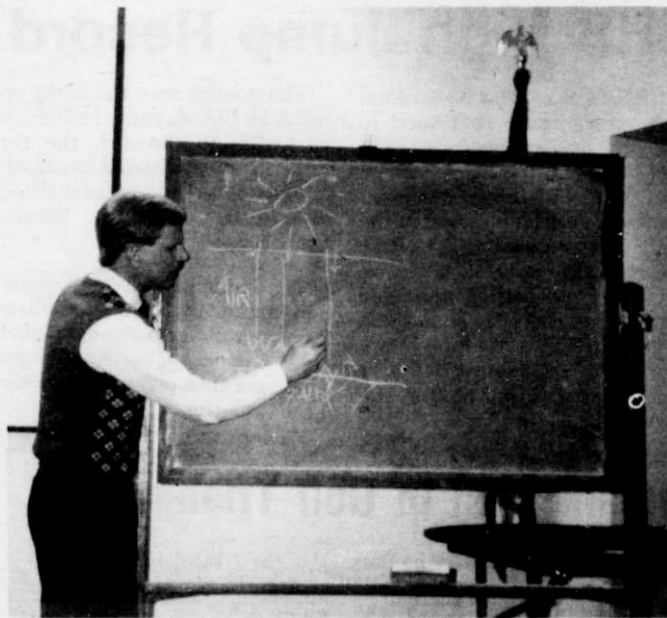

The record was the icing on the cake that day for Osterbrink as earlier in the day, the 6-1 Indian senior signed a letter-of-intent to play college basketball at North Eastern Illinois University.

The Indian girls literally dominated the young Chilton team in rolling to the easy dual meet victory. The Kewaskum girls took first place in 13 of the 17 events run.
