## Proposed Fire Department Budget Up 4.3%

**KEWASKUM** — The preliminary figures for the Kewaskum Fire Department's 1993 budget are substantially higher than last year, the Village Board learned at a meeting last Monday.

The proposed budget calls for a 4.3 percent increase over the 1992 budget, an increase of \$4,326, according to a formula used for the figuring, Village Administrator Dan Schmidt said at the meeting.

The Public Service Commission's increase on fire hydrant rental, as well as the Fire Depart-

ment's request for a replacement equipment truck are the main factors involved in the increase in the budget.

In other matters tackled at the meeting, a public hearing was held concerning a request by Gary Martin for rezoning at a property located at 1052 Fond du Lac Ave. Richard Larson, representing West Bend Savings Bank, was on hand to explain the firm's intentions for a drive-through window and possible new local office at the location. Trustee Gary Gavin reported that the Planning Commission ok'd the request.

The Board also announced the new Halloween Trick or Treat

hours for this year. Kewaskum's trick-or-treat will be held Saturday, October 31st, from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.

At the request of the Public Works' Director, Jerry Gilles, the Board approved the purchase of a used bucket truck from Meyer Truck Equipment. The 1986 Ford truck will be purchased for \$15,995.

An upgrade of the Municipal Building's computer systems was also approved. The Board reviewed three different bids, and awarded the winning bid to Computer Ease, of Milwaukee, at an estimated cost of \$12,791.

David arrived September 14 from Seville, Spain, and is living with the Jim and Lanielle Dieringer family. Eero, coming from

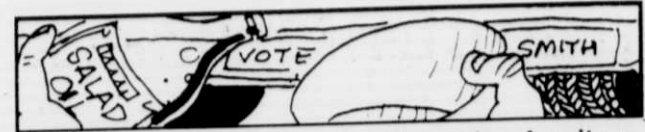
Jyvaskyla, Finland on September 21, is living with the Steven and Diane Liegl family.

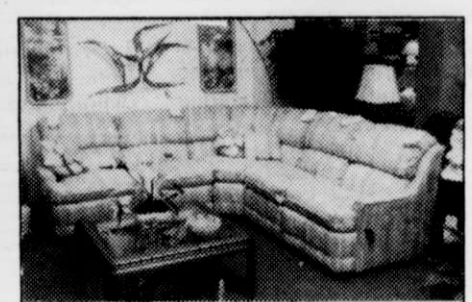

## Help Send Joe to Texas

Friends of Joe Volz of Campbellsport are working together to help send Joe to Houston, Texas for cancer surgery.

Joe faces surgery for liposarcoma, a rare form of cancer that grows on the tissue surrounding the body's vital organs. Because of the rarity of the cancer, surgery to remove the tumor has not been possible in Wisconsin. Only cancer research centers are capable of dealing with so rare a case. And surgery is the only method of treatment for liposarcoma.

Insurance will cover the major cost of medical treatment but there are some expenses, including travel, outpatient housing and meals and that will not be covered.

Because of these costs, Catholic Knights Branch No. 315, AAL (Aid Association for Lutherans), and friends of Joe and Deanna are planning a benefit to help. A fund has been set up at Bank One in Campbellsport. Joe has worked at Regal Ware, Inc., in Kewaskum for over 30 years, many of those as a semi-driver. Buttons are available featuring a semi with the words 'Texas Bound' on the trailer. The buttons are at several Campbellsport businesses as a donation. Joe's friends ask that people wear a button, think of Joe, and say a prayer for successful surgery.

The buttons were provided at a reduced cost by Create A Button, a small Campbellsport business. Union Local No. 849 of Kewaskum sponsored the buttons.

A benefit is planned for Friday, October 23, at Frank's On The Lake. Jim Vollmer and Evergreen will play from 8:30 until about 11 p.m. followed by Laser DJ Service with Tim Weis.

Evergreen is playing for expenses only, with the costs sponsored by Jim and Barb Bub of Kloke Ready Mix. Tim Weis is also sponsored at no cost to the fund.

## ★ KEWASKUM NEWS NOTES ★

### A reminder to all Village of Kewaskum Utility Users.

All water bills that have accrued and remain unpaid on November 1, 1992, shall be placed on the tax roll by the Village Clerk for collection. A late payment charge of three percent (3%) but not less than \$0.30 will be added to the unpaid balance. (PSC of WI Rate File Mg-1)

All sewer bills that have accrued and remain unpaid on November 1, 1992, shall be placed on the tax roll by the Village Clerk for collection. The owner or user of the real estate being served by the Wastewater Treatment Facility shall be liable for interest upon all unpaid balances at a rate of twelve percent (12%). (Municipal Code - Chapter 13 - Penalties 13.62 (2) (d).

All special assessments that have been billed for services or installation of improvements, such as sidewalk, curb/gutter, street, water and sewer mains, etc. that have accrued and remain unpaid on November 1, 1992, shall be placed on the tax roll by the Village Clerk for collection. The owner of said real estate receiving those services or improvements shall be liable for interest upon all unpaid balances at those specific rates as pre-determined at the time of the implementation of the special assessment or as so mentioned in the Municipal Code or Wisconsin Statutes.

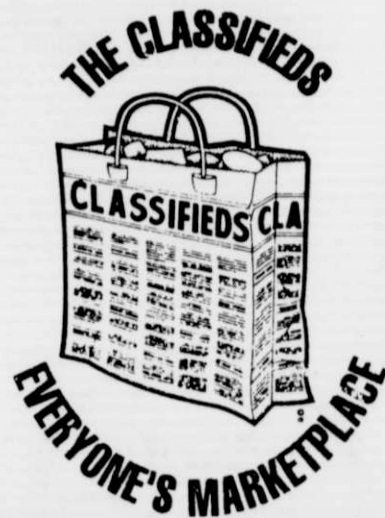

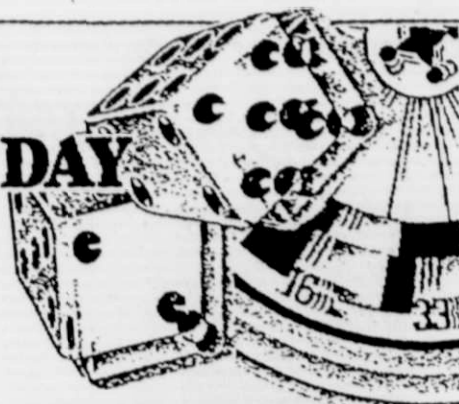

What I can't figure out is why the Town of Wayne has been keeping this guy all to themselves? Do they not realize



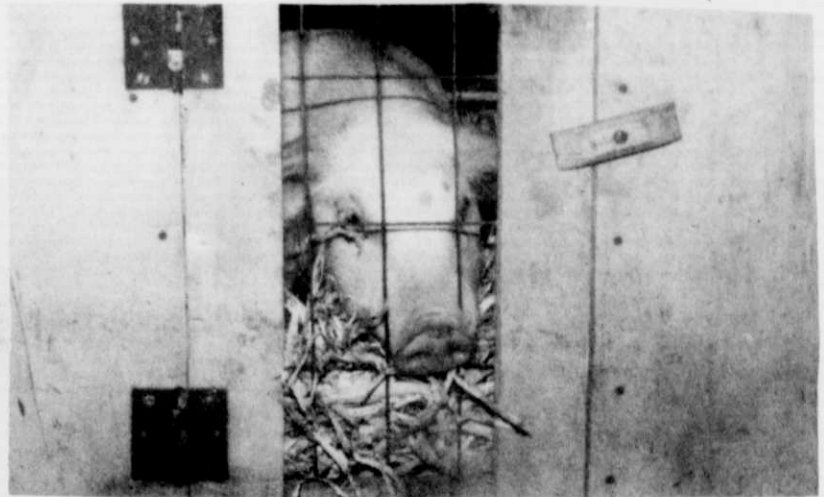

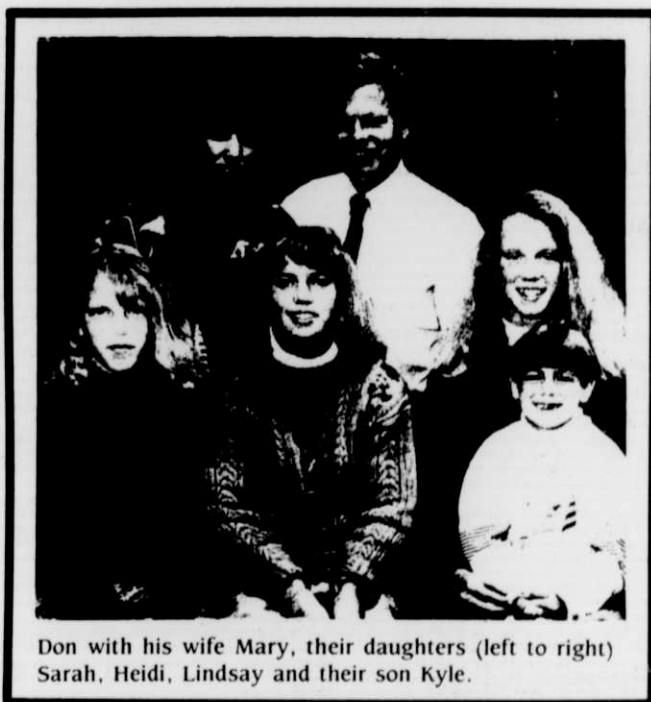

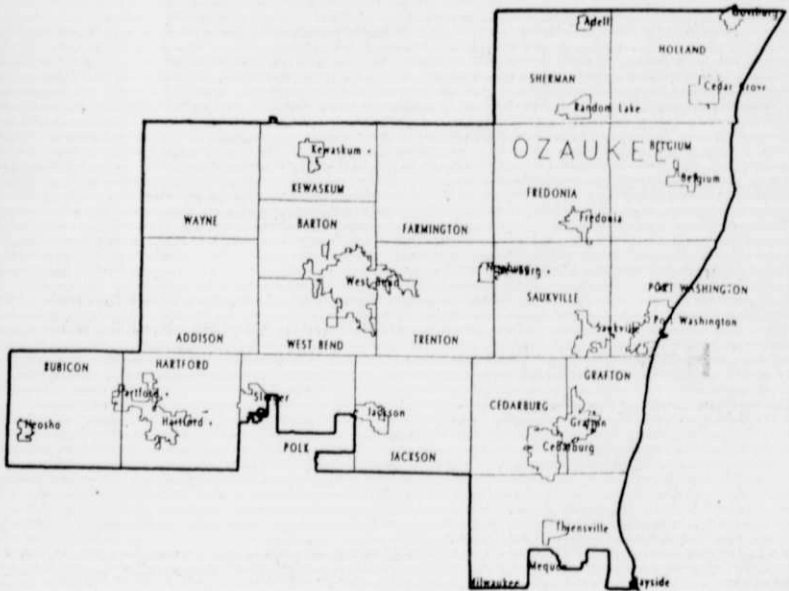

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

At the east edge of Holy Trinity Cemetery there was a road going south known as Slaughterhouse Road. At the end of that road was the Stellflug Slaughterhouse where slaughtering of animals was done.

From 501 south on Riverview Drive, on the east side of the street, the next building to the south was the Kean Shoe Shop and next door to that was the Odd Fellows Hall.

## Falcons End Indian Run in First-Place Showdown

**SHEBOYGAN FALLS** — It looked as if it might be the match of the year in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference volleyball race. Second-place Kewaskum, sporting a 21-game winning streak, headed to Sheboygan Falls to play the first-place and undefeated Falcons.

The result of the showdown was the hosts putting an end to the Indian winning streak, and virtually putting an end to the Indians' title hopes with a convincing 15-3, 15-6, 17-15 win over the guests.

The win raised the Falcons mark to a glossy 10-0, while the Indians dropped to 9-2 with just one game remaining. The Indians could still tie for the EW crown, but Falls would have to lose its final two conference matches, a very remote possibility.

"We struggled the whole night," Indian coach Dave Rizzardi said of the loss, the Indians' first in nearly a month. "We got defensive...very tentative."

It seemed that the Falcon fans

knew the Indians were on a roll coming into the match, as "the crowd was very quiet at the start of the match," according to Rizzardi.

Perhaps part of the reason was that the Indians started out well, hanging with the Falcons in the early going. But Falls then ran off five straight points to take a 7-2 lead, and from there it was all downhill.

"The crowd really started getting into it then," the KHS coach said. "It went back-and-forth for a while...then they were able to run away on us."

"Our passing was very poor," Rizzardi went on to say. The Indian mistakes seemed to give the Falcons even more confidence. "They showed a lot of poise out there."

Even the Indian reserves, a group of juniors who have been playing excellent in the past few weeks, were unable to post a win. The Indians fell behind 13-8 in the final game, before rallying late to take a 14-13 lead. A missed serve stopped the surge, though, and

Falls was able to come back and complete the sweep.

"That was a good sign," Rizzardi said of the third-game comeback. "We made a nice comeback...we just weren't able to finish it off."

Bright spots were few and far between for the Indians, according to their coach. He did cite senior Christa Schmidt for another fine outing. "She expanded her game a bit," he said, noting that she did a lot of hitting down the line, placing the ball. "That should help her in the tournament."

"The setters did the best they could (with the bad passes)," he went on, pointing out that Kim Sabish led the Indians with just five assists. Schmidt tallied seven total points, with the next highest being junior Christa Fleischman, with three.

"Our blocking wasn't very crisp either," Rizzardi said, showing that the team accumulated just four block kills the entire match.

The Indians have one more EW contest remaining as they host New Holstein on Tuesday. They will then set their sights on WIAA Regional action, which gets underway the following Tuesday.

## KHS Regroups; Beats Raider Spikers

PLYMOUTH — For the second straight game, Kewaskum's offensive attack was just that - offensive.

And for that reason alone, the Indians were unable to post another potential breakthrough win, this time falling to a tough Plymouth squad, 12-0 here, last Friday night.

One week after struggling against second-place Two Rivers in a 27-20 loss, the Indians were able to garner just 30 yards of total offense against the Panthers.

"We didn't do well offensively," Indian coach Clark Pearson said in perhaps the understatement of the year. "We just didn't move the ball at all. They beat us pretty bad at the line of scrimmage. That was easily our worst offensive game of the year."

That they did, as Plymouth outgained the Indians 228-22 in rushing yardage, led by Erik Grueschol, who carried the ball 26 times for 126 yards.

Grueschol put the Panthers on the board in the opening quarter, as he finished off a Plymouth drive by romping 13 yards for the score. Kewaskum's Mark Strobel, who was one of the lone bright spots on the night, blocked the extra point try, leaving the score 6-0.

Plymouth made it 12-0 midway through the second quarter, as Tony Hahm, another of the Panthers' fine backs, took off on a 64-yard touchdown scamper. The hosts went for the two-point conversion, but failed, leaving the Indians an opportunity to come back.

But Kewaskum was stagnant offensively in the first half, leaving the Indian defense on the field most of the half. "They were on the field a lot," Pearson said of the defensive unit. "We did absolutely nothing on offense in the first half."

The Indians had a little more success in the second half moving the ball. A couple of stops by the defense gave Kewaskum good field position, and a chance to score early in the fourth quarter.

The Indians made it to the Panther three-yard-line with just over 8:00 to go, and threatened to make things interesting. But a dive play resulted in a bad exchange between QB Jim Marx and RB Jim Rix, and Plymouth recovered the fumble, thwarting the comeback attempt.

"If we score there, it's a whole different ballgame," Pearson said of the turnover, one of two for the Indians on the evening. "That would have brought us right back in it."

The turnover was one of many mistakes the Indians committed. An interception, a dropped touchdown pass, and numerous penalties also hurt the Indians' cause. "We had our chances," Pearson went on. "We just didn't make the big plays."

Mark finished the night one-for-13 in passing, and was sacked "at least three or four times," according to Pearson, who added that "he had a couple of passes dropped too." Dan Schulteis led the Indians in rushing with his 28-yard effort.

Plymouth was helped by the fact that this was the Panthers' Homecoming game, which definitely had the hosts pumped. "They came out pretty fired up," the KHS coach exclaimed, although noting that the Indians held their own as the game wore on. "The second half, I thought, was pretty even."

Pearson had nothing but praise for Strobel, who added an interception and seven solo tackles to his blocked extra point. "He had an outstanding game," he said of the 5-11 junior linebacker. "He did a real fine job all the way around."

"He led us in defensive points...the most we've had in a long time," Pearson raved. The seven solo s "were pretty outstanding."

The loss dropped Kewaskum's mark in the Eastern Wisconsin

Conference to 1-3, with two games to play against New Holstein (this Friday, home) and Kiel (Oct. 22, away). The Indians overall mark dropped to 3-4, but Pearson isn't totally discouraged, as the team can focus on yet another goal.

"We can have only the second winning season in the past 15 years if we win our last two games," Pearson said, noting that since 1976, to his recollection, the 1983 squad (11-1, Div. II State Runners-up) was the only team to manage a winning mark. "We're going to try and hammer that home (to the team) this week."

PLYMOUTH — Players that perform in the clutch are a coach's dream. So when the entire Kewaskum girl tennis team came up big in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference meet here, Monday, Indian coach Glenn Eichstedt was in heaven.

The Indians came into the EW meet in a three-way tie for first place with Sheboygan Power. Two Rivers and Sherboyan Falls. But it was the new kids on the block who took home the prize, as the Indians got firsts at four different spots, thus claiming their first-ever EW conference championship.

"It's more than surprising. It's overwhelming," Eichstedt said of the team title. "We played our best tennis when we needed to."

The Indians, who had three top seeds and another two second seeds in the meet, got big performances from all spots in scoring 20 points, doubling second-place Falls' total in the meet. The meet was actually played over a 72-hour period, as Saturday's action was halted due to inclement weather, and suspended to Monday afternoon.

Heading the list of prime-time

players were the No. 1 and 2 singles players, Melissa Rohrer and Jenny Thull. Rohrer won her second straight EW title, after claiming the No. 4 singles crown last season.

Rohrer had little problem with Chilton's Jamie Kuba in the semi's, winning 6-2, 6-1, setting up a showdown with Falls' Katie Matzek, with whom Rohrer had split in their two previous meetings this season.

After losing the opening set 5-7, Rohrer stormed back to win the last two by identical 6-4 scores. The two should see more of each other next year, as Matzek is a junior, and Rohrer is just a sophomore.

Thull, meanwhile, had a tougher time of things in her semifinals match against Two Rivers' Ragen Prucha. The senior lost the first set 4-6, but also came back, fighting hard to seek out a 6-4, 7-5 win.

Thull then used that momentum to roll in the finals, where she disposed of Chilton's Molly Hofberger, 6-2, 6-1, in the most lopsided final of the meet.

"Without a doubt, she played the best match of the tournament," Eichstedt said of Thull's

semifinal win over Prucha. "That gave us a big lift. That's some of the best tennis I've ever seen her play."

A pair of Indian doubles teams also brought home conference titles. Kim Frank and Nicki Cayner captured their second straight EW title with a 4-6, 6-4, 6-4 win over Falls' Tanya Vorchek and Kate Kuhfass in the final. The Indian duo had rolled over Plymouth's Angie Goetsch and Rachel Seil in the semi's 6-2, 6-0.

Cayner and Frank, both seniors, had won the conference crown at No. 2 doubles last year.

"Those two are going to be the standard by which future teams here are judged," Eichstedt said of the duo. "Not just their record, but the way they go about it. They have just a tremendous work ethic."

The Indians' No. 2 duo, senior Jenefer VanAssche and junior Lisa Berres got a break when Two Rivers' top seeded team was broken up. VanAssche and Berres took advantage, easily winning their two matches (6-2, 6-0 and 6-2, 6-2) to win at No. 2.

"That was a sheer thrill," Eichstedt said. "They are a quiet, hard-working team, and we

couldn't be happier for them."

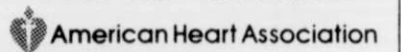
