Timblin Rezoning Request Approved by Board

65 New Living Units to Be Constructed Here

Despite the objections of numerous Memorial Drive residents, the Kewaskum Village Board approved a rezoning request by Tom Timblin last Monday night. The approval allows Timblin to proceed with plans to build approximately 65 townhouses in multi-family units east of Memorial Drive.

Village President Mary Krueger and Trustee David Goeden dissented in the Board's 5-2 vote in favor of the request. The vote came after a heated public hearing earlier in the meeting.

Paul Ziebert, of 802 Memorial Drive, spoke on behalf of the neighborhood's residents, reading the Board a prepared statement that voiced concerns regarding Timblin's plans.

"There should be some sort of transition zone between the single-family and multi-family units," Ziebert told the Board, adding that of the village's last 193 residential building permits, 168 have been for multi-family units. "There should be an assortment of residential units."

Ziebert presented the Board with a petition signed by 26 of the 30 single-family homeowners on Memorial Drive, who are afraid that the new units will affect the value of their existing homes.

"We feel that the existing residents are owed some consideration by the village board," Ziebert said.

Timblin countered Ziebert's statement, saying that it was "filled with innuendoes and falsehoods." He noted that the village's current rental units are

all filled, and there is a need for more rental housing.

"I respect what you are saying," Timblin told the residents, "but the village is lacking in multi-family housing units."

Timblin supported the statement by noting that 59% of Kewaskum's residential units are single-family, compared to just 30% multi-family units. Eleven percent are duplexes.

The local developer also touted his record in keeping his units occupied (99.3% over the past three years), and noted that Bank One of West Bend named Timblin as its No. 1 manager in Washington County.

Several other village residents were in attendance, including members of the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce. Many spoke in favor of Timblin's plans,

noting that the Board should promote growth within the village.

In the end, the Board agreed, although not without some anxious moments for Timblin. After Trustee Tom McElhatton made a motion to approve the request, there was a prolonged silence in awaiting a second. Finally, Trustee Harry Roecker seconded the motion, allowing for the vote.

The majority approval allows Timblin to continue developing the units, which will range in size

from 1250 square feet to 1400 square feet. The two-bedroom units, with central air and fireplaces, would be rented at an approximate cost of \$650 per month.

The rezoning request was one of three that the Board approved Monday night. The Board also gave go-aheads to the Farmers Union Milk Marketing Cooperative and Steven Olig for their rezoning.

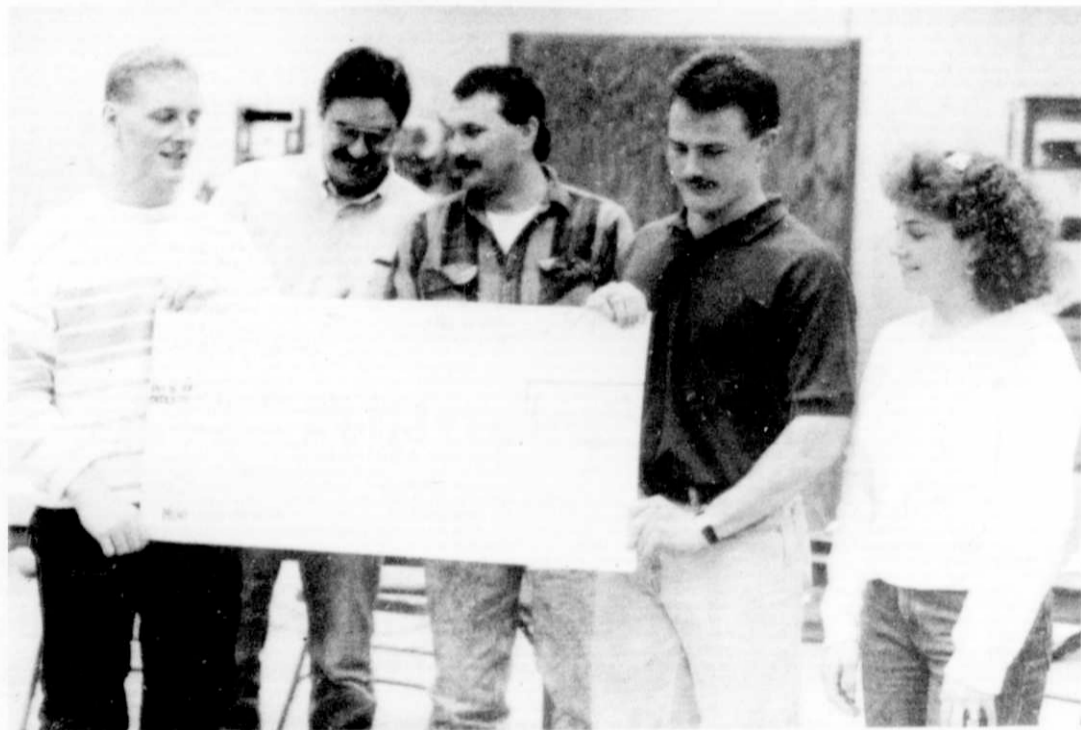

Action was taken on Ordinance No. 93-3 an Ordinance to amend the zoning of the Village of Kewaskum/Steven Olig land adjacent to Wildlife Drive to R-3 and R-1 as attached hereto, after being heard at public hearing earlier.

Action was taken on Ordinance No. 93-4 an Ordinance to amend the zoning of the Thomas Timblin parcel adjacent to Timblin Drive to R-4 as attached hereto after being heard at public hearing. (Discussion again took place prior to the Board's action on the pros and cons regarding the subsequent rezoning).

The Board reviewed the information sent to them by the consensus of the Plan Commission regarding the land survey and control survey work at an estimated cost of \$12,000 and \$48,000 to be funded by the County under the County Land Information System Program. The property will be left as is with only modifications made to the parking lot on the east side of the building to allow for 20 parking stalls. It was further noted the intent of the Village is not to allow for any 24 hour parking in this lot. The closing would first take place upon completion of the new West Bend Savings Bank structure on Fond du Lac Avenue.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Beisbier, seconded by Trustee David Goeden and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the placement of a temporary portable construction and office trailer on the east side of Wildlife Drive for Steven Olig.

Trustee Thomas McElhatton asked that the construction portion of the Municipal Code be amended to include provisions for contractors be-

ing required to provide a portable toilet at the construction site.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Wagner, seconded by Trustee Robert Beisbier and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board directed the bringing of all new single and new multi-family building permits to come to the Board for review prior to issuance for architectural, storm water and design type approval.

A Message from the Postmaster

Hello Kewaskum Statesman readers! Received a great deal of "feedback" from last week's column... THANK YOU. As I have mentioned before, my philosophy is that if one person has a question, and/or problem, many of you may have encountered that same type of question and/or problem.

The "TEAM" at the Kewaskum Post Office looks forward to serving each and every one of you... OUR CUSTOMERS. We also feel that there are so many things in the Postal Service that you are not aware of.

In this week's column, I will answer some common questions that I have had in my 18-plus years as a postal employee.

QUESTION: I received a letter back with a "little hand on it" returning it to me. I put the correct street address on but then erroneously put Kewaskum, WI 53040 when it should have been Campbellsport, WI 53010. I made the correction and got the piece back again, WHY?

ANSWER: Once the "hand" has been applied to the envelope you cannot reuse that envelope as service has been rendered. Please do not apply another stamp (as I have seen many done), as it will still be returned to you. You cannot REUSE THE ENVELOPE.

How are you supposed to know this? You really do not until you make the mistake. Good example of items the customers are not aware of unless it is publicized. We are sorry for the inconvenience that this has caused any of you.

QUESTION: I live on a rural route... just moved there from the city of Fond du Lac. My house sets back quite a bit and I put the little flag up so that I can look out and when it is down, that means the rural carrier has been through. My rural carrier has requested that I refrain from doing that and I cannot really see his point. Please explain.

ANSWER: The little flag is intended to notify the carrier that there is outgoing mail to be picked up. Rural carriers MUST pick up outgoing mail, even if there is no incoming mail and the little flag is his "signal." If you have outgoing mail, please put the flag up and the carrier will put it down after he makes his "stop." Help us to serve you and your neighbors more efficiently by using the little flag properly. Thank you.

QUESTION: I received a postage due notice the other day. I went to the Post Office and the clerk wanted 27 cents for a letter that only had 2 cents on it. I had no idea what it was so I paid the 27 cents, opened it up and it was some type of advertising how "I could save and make a lot of money by just sending my letters for 2 cents." What gives?

ANSWER: This is an ILLEGAL and MAJOR SCAM that seems to pop up every now and then. Many customers have shared the contents of these type of letters with me. They state something like... "this is all legal," "you received this letter for a mere 2 cents," "send this amount of money and I will share my secrets with you."

PLEASE... do not get "caught up in this." Before opening, you have a right to refuse anything, but, if you do open it, bring it to me and I will be more than happy to send it to the Postal Inspectors. THEY will put an end to the sender's scam. Help yourself, help your community, help the Postal Service put an end to things like this by bringing them in. They are ILLEGAL AND A SCAM!

QUESTION: I heard an ad on the radio the other day. Something about 2 days, 2 pounds, \$2.90. Can you give me some information about this?

ANSWER: I will be more than happy to. It is called Priority Mail. For your information, anything 11 ounces and over sent first class, is automatically Priority Mail. But let's say for an example, that you are sending a letter to Florida and you want it to get there quickly. You could go Express Mail (which is the only service with a strict guarantee) for \$9.95. That may be a "bit steep" for many of you, so you ask if there is "anything in-between" that and regular mail for 29 cents.

That is where Priority Mail comes in. Keep in mind, it does NOT carry a guarantee but I personally can give you this example. My parents "winter" in Florida. Normal letters take 3-4 days but at least 100 times I have used Priority Mail and 99 times it arrived in TWO days. The cost — \$2.90, and THE ENVELOPE IS FREE!

Another "biggie" is the FLAT RATE envelope. Whatever you can "get in there" only costs \$2.90... regardless of the weight. My daughter goes to college in Oshkosh and subscribes to a lot of magazines. I send them to her, okay? Now, if I bought my own envelope... 30 cents and then enclosed all of the magazines, it would be very easy to have them weigh in over two pounds. Two pounds, one ounce would cost me \$4.10, plus remember, I spent 30 cents on a mailing envelope. I use the FREE, FLAT RATE ENVELOPE, pay \$2.90 and yes, I saved \$1.50 (\$1.20 on postage plus envelope price).

Please stop in. Take one along and if you feel that you have a use for these... come back and we will be more than happy to give

you as many as you would like as we order them by the CASE. Previous experience has made me realize that this is a "hot item" in the Postal Service and our customers need and deserve to be informed about items such as this.

Well, that is about it for this week. Hopefully, many of you have found this column to be informative and helpful with your postal concerns. "OUR TEAM" feels that it is a crucial part of our jobs to keep you, our customers, as informed as possible. Look extremely forward to writing this column on a weekly basis.

Almost 200 Brownies from all around the area (Campbellsport, Farmington, West Bend, Hartford and Kewaskum) were in attendance.

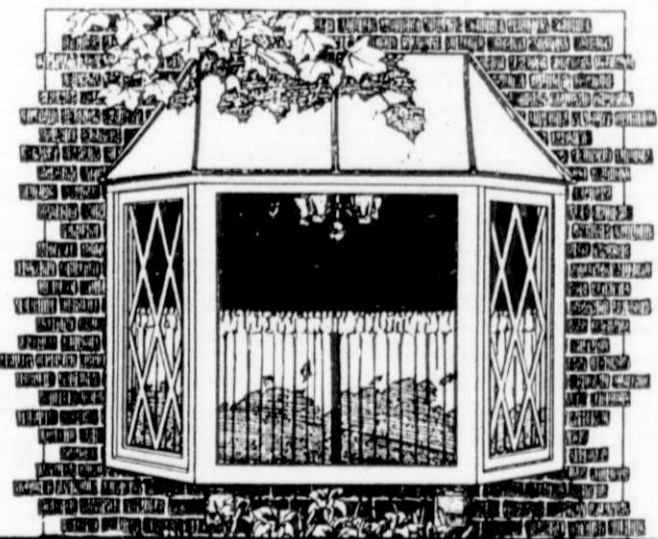
The girls learned how to make three different kinds of puppets: chariottes, finger and paper bag puppets. They also made scenery and put on six different puppet shows for each other.

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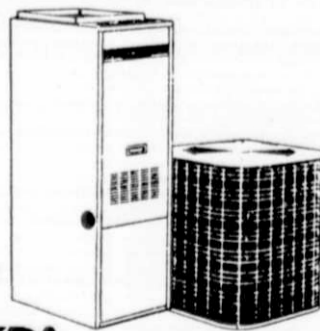
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Minutes of Village Board Meeting

Regular Meeting
March 1, 1993
8:00 p.m.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Mary Krueger presided. All Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

On a motion by Trustee Thomas McElhatton, seconded by Trustee Gary Gavin and unanimously carried by voice vote, the minutes of the February 15, 1993 meeting were approved as printed.

Mr. Leander Kempf, President of the Kewaskum Area Chamber of Commerce asked for permission to speak. In attendance were several Chamber Members. Mr. Kempf read a prepared letter to the Board asking for the Board's support in retaining the existing retail business stores within the downtown area. The letter will be placed on file for further reference.

The public hearing was held on the request of Farmers Union Milk Marketing Cooperative/Mr. Donald Uelmen for the rezoning of the parcel of property located at 1626 Fond du Lac Avenue, parcel 1 of CSM #2678 in section 9, T12N, R19E and known by tax key no. V4-0270 from B-4 General Retail & Warehousing District to M-1 Light Manufacturing District. Mr. Uelmen was present and explained the Cooperative's intentions to construct a medium size cheese manufacturing plant, which would employ 6 to 12 persons. No one else was present to speak. On a motion by Trustee Gary Gavin, seconded by Trustee Robert Wagner and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board closed the public hearing. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye," 0 "Nay," 0 "Absent."

The public hearing was held on the request of the Village of Kewaskum/Mr. Steven Olig for the rezoning of parcel 1 of CSM described as part of the SE 1/4 of the SW 1/4 and part of the SW 1/4 of the SE 1/4 of Section 4, T12N, R19E of the Village of Kewaskum and part of lot 9, in block 24 in the assessor's plat of the Village of Kewaskum in the NE 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of Section 9, T12N, R19E, from M-1 light Manufacturing District to R-3 Two Family Residence District and R-1 Single Family Residence District. No one was present to speak on the matter. On a motion by Trustee Robert Wagner, seconded by Trustee Robert Beisbier and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board closed the public hearing. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye," 0 "Nay," 0 "Absent."

The public hearing on the request of Thomas Timblin for the rezoning of the parcel north northwest of the intersection of Timblin Drive and Courtney Lane, part of the NW 1/4 and part of the SE 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of Section 16, T12N, R19E, from R-1 Single Family Residence District to R-4 Multi-Family Residence District. Several residents from along Memorial Drive were present and voiced their objections to the request. Paul Ziebert asked to read a prepared statement opposing the rezoning indicating the Village is realizing the bulk of its growth in multi-family and not single family. They suggested promoting R-3 two family homes. One concern was the water run off and asked that be addressed no matter what kind of development. A copy of the prepared statement and a petition were submitted to the Board for their review and consideration. The discussion was long with a few peo-

ple speaking in favor of the proposed rezoning as well as some Chamber of Commerce Members supporting the development and promoting growth in general. It was also noted that the Land Use Plan is good and possibly the Village Board should wait until it has been completed before deciding on the rezoning. (Note, an estimated 30 people were present, either for or against the proposed development, including Chamber Members) On a motion by Trustee Thomas McElhatton, seconded by Trustee Robert Wagner and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board closed the public hearing. Roll call vote was 7 "Aye," 0 "Nay," 0 "Absent."

On a motion by Trustee Gary Gavin, seconded by Trustee David Goeden and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board moved to suspend the rules to take action on VIII. Unfinished Business A. Mr. Tom Renner, the Village's Engineer with Ruekert & Mielke was present to discuss the WPC Departments Facility Plan.

Mr. Renner reviewed the options available regarding sludge storage and projected cost involved with the construction as well as alternatives to the handling of the sludge. The estimated cost for the construction of a sludge storage tank was \$856,400.00 and would equal approximately \$30 to \$40 per year per residential customer or equivalent. It was further noted the Board will need to act on a resolution accepting this Wastewater Treatment Facility

Sludge Storage Facility - Facility Plan. This will be scheduled for the March 15, 1993 meeting of the Board.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel did not have anything to report to the Board. Chief of Police Richard L. Knoebel shared the January 1993 monthly report with the Board as follows:

Criminal arrests 32, Criminal investigations 24, Traffic warnings 139, Traffic citations 51, Adult arrests 24, Juvenile arrests 3, Property stolen \$11.00, Property recovered \$257.00, Parking warnings 9, Parking citations 55.

It was further noted by the Police Chief that a \$300.00 donation was received from the New Fane Sportsman Club and will go toward the DARE Program.

Director of Public Works, Jerry Gilles informed the Board he was ready with his man hour report, but that it was detailed and that if they so desired he would wait for the next meeting.

Peter Albers the Lead Plan Operator/Lab Technician was present regarding the Water Pollution Control Department request to purchase a computer and related programs. Several proposals were checked into for both. On a motion by Trustee Robert Wagner, seconded by Trustee Harry Roecker and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the purchase of the computer equipment from Valley Business Equipment, Inc., Oshkosh, WI. at a cost of \$2,409.00 and to purchase the related WPC programs from Dorner Company at a cost of \$4,250.00.

Administrator Daniel S. Schmidt reviewed the year end balance sheet for 1992 with the Board indicating the expenditures were under spent by approximately 1 percent and that the revenues came in a plus 3 percent.

The Bonnie lane project bids were discussed and that it was more than likely the Village would be re-bidding said project for engineering legal technical difficulties. The proposed bid opening would be on March 19, 1993 at 10:00 am. and the public hearing scheduled for April 5, 1993.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Beisbier, seconded by Trustee Robert Wagner and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the amended Park Reservation Policy and Rules to reflect a new #6, a ban and restrictions on glass containers within the parks.

A variety of correspondence was also reviewed with the Board by administrator Daniel Schmidt.

On a motion by Trustee Robert Beisbier, seconded by Trustee Harry Roecker and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board approved the payment of bills as recommended by

the Administrative Committee. The total of all claims as recommended are as follows:

75 Years Ago

MARCH 16, 1918

Sunshine, spring overcoats, here and there a spring bonnet and the welcome chirp of the early robin greeted us during the forepart of last week and we were just about to unbutton our winter coats and take a deep breath of the sun-warmed air, when one of the most terrific blizzards of the winter struck us squarely in the face and made the people of Kewaskum and community duck for shelter and get lined up around the family's heating apparatus. The storm landed in our little city early Saturday morning and continued with increasing velocity until about the midnight hour, completely tying up traffic, blowing down trees and telephone and telegraph poles. The telephone companies experienced considerable loss, the worst trouble was south of West Bend, where poles were snapped off and sleet covered wires broken and left in a tangled heap. All the highways were badly drifted and farmers were unable to get through until late Sunday afternoon. The sun, however, came out in all its glory Sunday and by Monday business was carried on as usual.

Nine applications were filed with Highway Commissioner Charles Johnson and the highway committee for Washington County, in response to the recent notices published in the county papers. Patrol District No. 6 and 7 were awarded to men from the Hartford area. Patrol District No. 1 starting near Kewaskum, was awarded to August Schaefer of the Town of Kewaskum. Patrol District No. 2, starting north of the Village of Kewaskum, was awarded to John Bertram of the Town of Barton. Districts Nos. 3, 4 and 5 are still without patrolmen, as the committee was unable to make a suitable selection from the applicants. Anyone wishing a good position is asked to communicate with the Highway Commissioner.

Harley-Davidson on a Historical Trip

On March 15, "Harley-Davidson: The American Motorcycle" premieres on TBS. It takes an in-depth look at the history of Harley, examining its rise to the top and its vast appeal.

In 1868, Frenchman Louis Perreux strapped a steam engine onto one of his bicycles and a new form of transportation was born. By 1900, bicycle shops all over Europe and America were developing the motorized vehicles. In Milwaukee in 1903, William Harley and the three Davidson brothers saw the need for affordable transportation that could handle a nearly non-existent road system. Their answer was the motorcycle. Motorcycling enjoyed a period of unmatched popularity. The vehicles were less than one-third the price of the cheapest car, and they could travel where a car could not. Companies began racing against one another to prove whose bike was best, and Harley soon established its reputation on the racing circuit. It was from these races that the bike received its nickname. One member of the Harley team always rode a victory lap with his pet pig on the tank. Soon, all Harley riders did the same, becoming known as the Hog Boys, and a Harley was known as a Hog.

In 1922, business took a turn for the worse, as new assembly-line techniques made cars as affordable as motorcycles. Dozens of companies went out of business, and by the '30s, Harley relied heavily on international sales for its profits. In 1947, a motorcycle rally turned into a riot, and the image of motorcyclists changed overnight. The bikes developed a bad reputation and sales suffered; the Harley company also had increased competition from Europe and Japan.

Facing bankruptcy in 1969, the company was forced to merge with the American Machine and Foundry Company (AMF).

Hollywood brought Harley back into the forefront of American's consciousness when the movie Easy Rider crystallized Harley as a symbol of freedom. A popular TV series, Then Came Bronson, reiterated this theme. In 1981, a group of executives and family members brought Harley-Davidson back from AMF. Harley-Davidson went from near-bankruptcy to the most successful motorcycle company in the world. "Harley-Davidson: The American Motorcycle" premieres on TBS, cable channel 17, Monday, March 15, at 7:05 p.m.

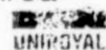

Since colonial times, the bluebird has been one of our most appealing songbirds and a harbinger of spring. Once nearly as common as the robin in our state, the bluebird population has decreased in numbers by an estimated 90 percent over the past 50 years. The loss of hollow trees and wooden fence posts for nesting sites, and competition from more aggressive cavity nesting birds has led to the decline in the bluebird population nationwide.

Bluebirds have been helped considerably in recent years by nest box programs or "bluebird trails", which have been undertaken throughout the state. A successful trail involves properly designing, placing and monitoring the boxes, to attract bluebirds and discourage house sparrows and starlings.

The Lac Lawrann Conservancy, part of the West Bend Park, Recreation and Forestry Department, has scheduled a Bluebird Workshop, on Saturday, March 13 at 10:30 a.m. Mary Holleback and Sherry Ullius, County Coordinators for the Bluebird Restoration Association of Wisconsin, Washington County, will offer a slide presentation, a demonstration on various nesting box styles and answer questions. 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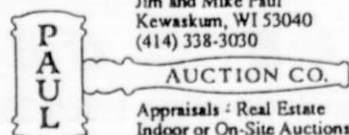

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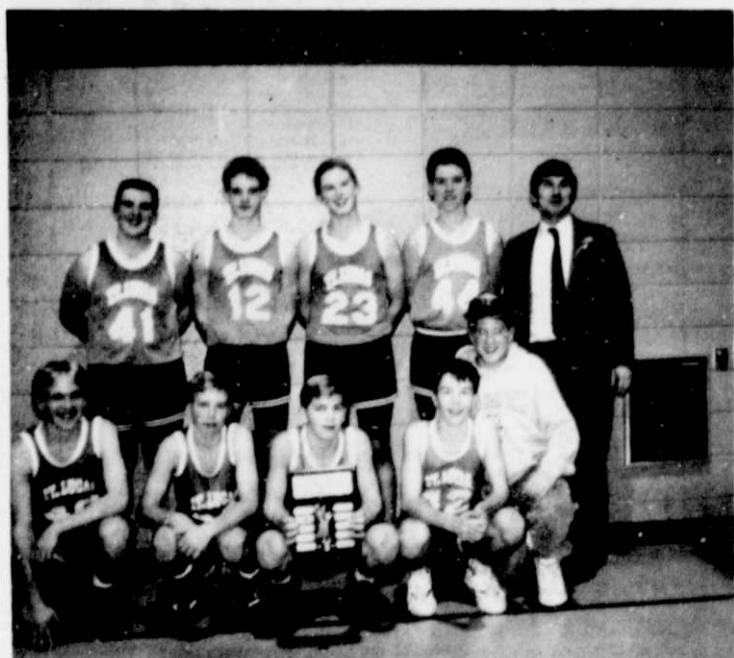
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St. Lucas Captures First at KML Tourney

NEW LONDON, CONNECTICUT — After reaching the NCAA Division III National Championships and not placing last year, UW-Stevens Point heavyweight Dennis Aupperle wasn't going to let opportunity slip by once again.

Aupperle, a 1989 Kewaskum High School graduate, was one of three Pointer wrestlers to finish in the top eight in his weight class at the NCAA Championships here last weekend.

Aupperle finished seventh in the heavyweight division, thus earning the distinction of being an All-American wrestler.

"I could have done better, but I guess I can't complain," Aupperle said regarding the meet. "It's something that I'm going to remember, that's for sure."

Competing on the campus of the United States Coast Guard Academy, Aupperle had to wrestle in four matches Friday. He finished the day with a 3-1 mark, thus earning him the right to wrestle on Saturday.

Aupperle opened against Luther College's Mark Bell, who was no match for the biggest Pointer, who won 5-0. Aupperle drew Eric Thomas of Olivet College (Michigan) next, and wound up dropping a 3-0 decision. Thomas, who came into the match with a 45-2 record, eventually took fifth.

Aupperle picked up two more wins Friday, beating John Mitchell of Messiah College, 3-1 and then downed Tony Cipolloni of Baldwin-Wallace College (New York), 8-2.

On Saturday, Aupperle drop-

ped his first match, a 2-0 decision to Ed Dupuy of Kean College (New York). He came back later in the day, though, and took care of Heidelberg (Ohio) College's Matt Randolph, 3-1.

"I should have beat (Dupuy)," Aupperle said. "I had him in a front headlock four times, but I just couldn't finish the thing."

Augsburg College (Minnesota) won the Division III team title, while Augsburg's Kevin Schiltz, the No. 1 seeded heavyweight, ended up sixth. Trenton State's Glen Sandell won the heavyweight title.

Aupperle helped the Pointers finish in seventh place as a team. Of the six Stevens Point wrestlers who qualified for the Championships, three of them brought home All-American honors.

"We should have had more,"

Aupperle said of the team's effort. "But there were a lot of upsets."

Joining Aupperle as All-Americans were Pointers Jeff Bartkowiak, who took fourth at 134 pounds, and Mark Poirier, who finished second at 142 pounds. Bartkowiak is from Germantown.

The seventh-place finish marked the end of Aupperle's wrestling career at Stevens Point. He finished this year with a 34-14 overall mark.

"It's all over now," Aupperle said, sounding a bit relieved. "It's been a lot of fun. I can't complain at all."

Finish Season With 7-14 Mark

Despite Great Effort, Indians Can't Keep Up with Port

PORT WASHINGTON — After getting smoked by Port Washington in the season-opener, the Kewaskum boys basketball team wanted to hang around long enough to have a chance to beat the Pirates in last Tuesday night's WIAA Division 2 Regional here.

The Indians showed some heart in their effort, but it just wasn't enough, as the Pirates ended the Indians' season with a 93-79 victory. The loss gave KHS a 7-14 mark for the year, but KHS coach Jim Westphal was pleased with the way his team ended its season.

"It was probably one of our best games of the year," Westphal said of the loss. "We had a great effort. They just had too much quickness."

It looked to be another whitewash early in the contest, as the hosts jumped out to a 11-1 lead. The Indians battled back, however, tying the game at one point, but trailed by a 23-17 count after one period.

The margin stayed around a half-dozen points throughout the second frame, before the Pirates went on a late run. Leading 38-31, Port Washington scored 11 of the half's final 13 points, giving the Pirates a seemingly comfortable 49-33 halftime lead.

"We made some turnovers there," Westphal said of the lapse. "They press you all game, and take a lot of chances on defense. But we refused to fade. We hung in there."

Behind the play of senior Jim Marx, the Indians stayed within striking distance in the third quarter. Marx scored nine points in the period, but Port was able to maintain a 12-point edge heading into the fourth (66-54).

A three-pointer by Marx cut the gap to seven, at 70-63 just a couple of minutes into the period. But after the teams traded baskets, Port's Kevin Zirbes nailed a three-pointer, and Jason Gilhooly did likewise seconds later, and for all practical purposes, the gap was too much for the Indians to overcome.

"We were in the ballgame the whole way," Westphal said.

"But every time that we were ready to make a run, they hit some big three-pointers. They are a real explosive team...put up a lot of three's."

The Indians actually scored one more field goal (33-32) than the Pirates, but seven three-pointers and a 21-9 advantage at the free throw line turned the tide in Port's favor.

Marx concluded his fine senior campaign with 24 points, including four three-pointers. Fellow senior Keith Herman had his best game of the year, scoring 18 points in his usual workman-like fashion.

"He played a super game," Westphal said of Herman. "Jim had a real fine game... and Tony Knoeck played very well too." Knoeck finished with seven points, while doing a good job at the point.

Zirbes led Port Washington with 23 points, while Keith Janeshek had 21, and Gilhooly 19, including three three-pointers. "Zirbes really got them going...gave them a real lift," Westphal said of the Pirates low post threat.

"I'm real proud of our guys," Westphal concluded. "We could have hung it up several times when we got down big, but we didn't. We were always close, within striking range."

CHILTON — While it didn't match last year's number of participants, the Kewaskum gymnastics team kept its streak of state qualifiers alive here, Saturday.

The Indians' Carrie Strigenz earned the right to advance to the WIAA State Gymnastics Meet, as she finished third in the vaulting competition with her mark of 7.9. Strigenz thus advances to the state meet this weekend in Wisconsin Rapids.

Strigenz, a freshman, has been one of KHS' most consistent performers this year, and she continued that string Saturday. She finished ninth in the all-around competition, with an average of 6.5875.

In addition to her state-qualifying vault, Strigenz finished 12th on the balance beam (6.3), 14th in the floor exercise (7.05), and 18th on the uneven parallel bars (5.05).

The closest any other Indian performer came to qualifying (the

top five in each event advance) was Vicki McElhatton's 10th on the uneven bars (6.3).

Strigenz's effort marks the fourth straight year that KHS has sent at least one gymnast to the state meet. Chris Ramthun was the first KHS athlete to earn a trip to state, followed by Ingrid Ankerson and Wendy Fideler the following year, and Barb Land

and Kelly Krahn last year.

Land, in her bid for a second straight trip to state, finished a disappointing 18th in her specialty, the balance beam. Land missed her dismount and had to settle for a mark of 5.8.

Valders' Heather Zutz won three events, and finished second in the other, as she helped her team with the sectional team title

with 122.55 points, well ahead of Chilton (113.20). Kewaskum finished fifth in the team standings (97.25), but were just .70 points out of third place.

KHS Dominated EW Boards

KEWASKUM — Looking at the various Eastern Wisconsin Conference statistics, it's hard to believe that the Kewaskum boys basketball team finished with just a 5-7 record this past season.

Several Indians were among the leaders in the EW categories, including an impressive 1-2-3 sweep in the league rebounding totals.

KHS sophomore Travis Jacak led the conference with 122 total rebounds, including 53 offensive boards, easily the league's best. KHS seniors Adam Laatsch and Jim Marx were close behind Jacak, finishing with 1-7 and 100 rebounds, respectively.

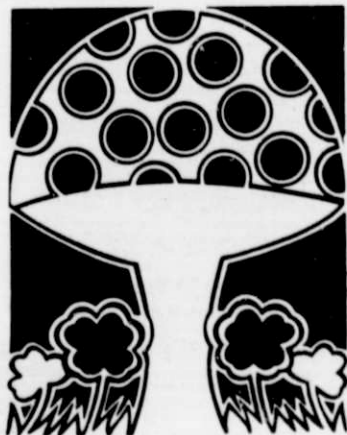
The threesome were the only players in the EW with 100 or more rebounds, with the next closest being Chilton's Chris Hau, who had 89.

Marx, meanwhile, finished third in the EW scoring race, with 176 points (a 14.7 average). No other Indian averaged in double digits.

Senior point guard Tony Knoeck finished third in the conference with 30 steals, and was fifth with his 45 assists. Keith Herman finished with 27 steals, good enough for fifth in the league.

As a team, the Indians easily led the conference with 185 offensive rebounds, and also led the EW in free throws made (152) and free throws attempted (255). KHS' 59.6 percent mark at the line ranked them second.

Defensively, the Indians were first in perhaps the most important category, defensive field goal percentage (37 percent). KHS was also the leader in three-point percentage allowed (23 percent). For the year, KHS was outscored by a single point, 653-652.



Perhaps the main reason the Indians weren't more successful in the EW was their field goal percentage. KHS made just 35.8 percent of their shots, which placed them second-last in the league. The Indians made just 24 three-pointers (second-last), and their 24.5 percent from three-point land ranked them second-last as well.
