Town of Kewaskum to Open New Recycling Center

Final touches are being made on a newly constructed recycling center for the Town of Kewaskum residents. The 48' x 72' center is located on Kettle Moraine Drive on the same property as the town hall.

The town landfill was closed by the DNR several years ago. The town has continued to accept recyclable materials and solid waste was placed in dumpsters at the landfill site for proper disposal. Town officials hope to have the new center open by the end of January.

At the time of the landfill closure, the town received a grant from the state for doing the excavating work to properly seal it. For the past five or six years the town has received a portion of that grant. Town officials recently received an early Christmas present when state officials notified them that the grant will be paid in full which will result in over \$10,000 extra for the town.

In other matters before the board, acting on the recommendation of the Town Plan Commission, the board approved the rezoning request of Theodore Moyer

for approximately 38 acres from Transitional Agricultural to Agricultural I. The rezoning approval will permit Moyer to sell a 5.21 acre parcel with a deed restriction which would require only a single residence to be constructed on the property.

The Town Board agreed with the fence grievance committee that an order be executed to obtain bids in the spring of 1995 to repair approximately 1/4 mile of fence between the Schaefer and Stachler properties since an agreement has not been reached between the parties involved.

Ted Meilahn presented a surveyed map of the Town owned Buffalo Cemetery with a plot layout. The board approved the map and directed that it should go before the county board.

Pending action continues on the rezoning request by Marvin Tackes on land located at the end of Mill Road. Further discussion on this matter will be at the February board meeting.

The Town Plan Commission discussed hiring a town planner to create a master land use plan for the township. Plan Commission member, Tom Gibson suggested

determining the long term outlook for the town to give the planner some direction. It was decided the Plan Commission members will prepare a series of questions for a survey to be sent to all town property owners to receive input from them. The board will discuss the survey at the January meeting.

The next Kewaskum Town Board meeting will be held on January 16, 1995 at the town hall.

Local St. Vincent De Paul Chapter Meets Needs of the Community

They only go by first names, and you haven't heard very much about them. It seems they prefer it that way, it creates an atmosphere of equality and focuses attention on what they are doing - not who they are.

The Kewaskum Chapter of the county conference of St. Vincent De Paul has been busy this holiday season putting together food baskets to make things a little bit easier for individuals as well as families on very tight budgets. There are nine members

of the group, just one of several chapters around the area.

Martha, who's been involved for about six years, enjoys doing things for other people. "We don't brag about it or anything," she is referring to their anonymity. "We're kind of behind the scenes, but people know that we are here."

The team works out of Holy Trinity Church, providing their services to anybody that asks and needs it. "We never question needs," she points out. "The service is available to anyone that asks." They also receive

referrals from different organizations, and references come in through various ways.

This year, they put together ten baskets, with funds coming from donations, some anonymous, the church and the group itself. The hams and turkeys were donated from the giving tree at Holy Trinity. "We receive a lot from the children collecting non-perishable items, and from the parishioners," Martha explains.

Their work isn't at all limited to holidays. They supply food where it is needed all year 'round. "This isn't just about putting together food baskets," she adds. "We are here to meet the needs when they arise. We talk to our clients and give them spiritual help and moral support. When we help them out with boxes of food, this helps

them save the money they would've spent on groceries to help pay their other bills, such as rent and electricity."

There is no set routine, some of the clients need help on a daily basis, or weekly, with others as the need comes in. The members of the St. Vincent De Paul Chapter are either retired or semi-retired, so they have the time to commit to the project.

"When we help to meet the needs some of the people have, we help to lessen their problems. I think we have helped most of them over a hurdle. We don't want any publicity for it. Some are hesitant to ask, and most are so grateful that it's well worth all our efforts."

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Kewaskum Christmas

Long-ago images still vivid to writer

The most memorable Christmas I've ever had would be my Kewaskum Christmas. I call it that because the village is so entwined in my memory of that year.

My aunt and her nine children lived in a house on the hill on Riverview Drive just a block from the Hon-E-Kor Country Club in Kewaskum. It was our custom to invite one or the other family over on holidays such as Thanksgiving or Christmas itself.

I remember how the snow lay heavy on the land with the first frigid grasp of winter. The cold chilled beyond the bone, straight to the marrow. We trudged up the steep driveway to the house, then Dad drove the empty station wagon up, as the incline was murder on suspensions and had torn more than one muffler loose.

Inside that sprawling house, noses and cheeks were touched with the first flush of warmth. Caps, scarves and coats wound up on one pile on a bed in a sideroom, while boots stood in another by the heat register, snow melting from them in slushy puddles.

Small talk among adults in the kitchen soon led to urgings to "come into the parlor." We filed in, duck-like. The furniture consisted of a couple beat up sofas, both as hard worn by the years as this house and family.

The center of attraction, through the arched doorway of an adjoining room, beyond a long dining table was, as in all houses during that season, the Christmas tree. As round and full and fully decorated as any I'd ever seen. Every branch contained some ornament or other. When they switched off the overhead light and turned on the tree

lights, that long needled pine came ablaze with the glow of C-7 bulbs shimmering through a snowfall of tinsel.

Our boots had scarcely dried during a hurried board game or hand of crazy Eights before we dragged them on and went back into the cold. My cousin Carl was a few months older than I. Both of us were in that awkward stage: Not yet adult, no longer child. Sledding down the long slope to the river in the nearby park soon paled.

We skidded, skateless, across the frozen river, made shore on the other side, dashed up the bank and through a back alley or two. It was a long, indirect teenager's wandering through town. We stopped at Honeck's Garage where the two of us scraped up enough change in our pockets to buy candy in the vending machine. The Swizzler taffy I bought was chewy soft but soon stiffened into a teeth-loosening slab in my pocket and the colder air.

The cold slipped between the buttons of my coat, numbed my fingers inside their thin brown jersey gloves. The return trip became a trudge, more of a drudge with every step. Ears and cheeks, which scarcely noticed a chill before, smarted with their own reddened glory.

Carl loaned me his mittens and thrust his own hands deep into his pockets. If the cold was sheer misery, it was also an amazing conductor of sound. Cars passing on the streets, the scrape of a shovel on sidewalk, even the drag of our boots, rang out heavily. But nowhere near as bell-like and clear as the chimes of the Catholic church through the crisp air.


My ears, frozen as they were, caught every note. Never have I heard carol played more beautifully. O Holy Night, It came Upon a Midnight Clear, O Little Town of Bethlehem all fell upon the hush between us, seemed to hang in the air. The sound kindled me as no fire could ever do.

We seemed to float those last steps, caught in the

moment, but it passed all the same.

I can't remember what presents my cousins received or much of the supper itself. Still, I'll never forget a scattering of images; The tree, the bitter cold, the stirring of those carols. Or that woven among those recalled bits of color, light and sound was a close knit of love and family that I've seldom found since.



Faith Haven is a three hundred acre parcel of land located on Highway D, just

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outside of Kohlsville, and has been set aside as a sanctuary of sorts that represents the abounding beauty of nature that can be found throughout Washington County.

The land has been nurtured and maintained by a man who sees himself as a visionary, someone 500 years ahead of his time. Always submerged in a project of some sort, whether it's building a new wagon or fixing a sleigh for horse-drawn rides through miles of scenic trails, or suspending finished boards of aged wood from his ceiling because of the "beauty in it," his visions are open to the public.

What has been drawing attention this holiday season, is a clearing just across the wooden bridge that leaps Kohlsville Creek, which is home for a grouping of Amish metal sculptures depicting various stages in the life of Christ.

Very futuristic in appearance, the work is done with symbolism and the intent that they fit in well with nature. Created by Feltie Herschberg of Portage, the sculptures themselves are stark and simple, some almost invisibly

blended in with the surroundings until you are upon them. The beholder is left pondering the meaning of Christ's life, and the Three Wise Men done in PC piping.

A metal A-Frame cradles the manger scene, presenting the divine, simplistic Nativity and Star of Bethlehem. In view is Mary, Joseph, the baby Jesus, as well as a cow and calf lying nearby, the twin lambs, a mother sheep and donkey -- all done in metal symbols. Nearby are three metal shepherd's crooks representing the baby King's first visitors, along with a crook-cross compilation sculpture.

Walking east, are the Three Wise Men and a camel, a combination of metal with stark white plastic tubing rising up as if from out of the ground. The last of the scenes surrounding Christ's birth include Joseph leading a donkey with Mary astride as they flee to Egypt to escape Herod's search. Mary carries a stainless steel cross denoting the child Christ.

Faith Haven's owner believes in allowing the metal to turn brown and rust,

thereby fitting more closely into nature, "like the oak leaves that cling to the trees all year 'round." The stainless steel will get brighter as it ages.

Turning northward toward the creek, visitors can view symbols of Jesus as a young boy, in spiritual discussion with the priestly doctors in the Holy Temple while his parents anxiously sought to find him. Next, the adult man - JESUS, and his baptism with John the Baptist. This sculpture of Jesus was fabricated using both common and stainless steel to signify his God-Man uniqueness. The dove reminds us of the reported voice, stating, "This is my beloved son in whom I am well pleased."

Lastly, as you walk south to return to the bridge, is another compilation sculpture, this time the Cross of Christ and the Native American Thunderbird... announcing Jesus' ministry to all of the earth's humanity.

Next year's plans include the addition of Christ's Ministry, plus the Crucifixion, Resurrection and the

Ascension.

The hiking trails are also open to the public, some of which travel through wetlands that are only passable in winter. Wagon rides as well as winter sleigh rides are available at Haven Wood by reservation, using the farms' seventeen saddlebred horses for that and Monday and Thursday night horsemanship lessons featuring riding instruction and driving old fashioned high-wheel carts.

Located nearby on 59 acres is Faith Haven Farm, with a trail that contains the scriptures done on aluminum plaques which are mounted onto big rocks. The Faith Haven lay people hold a monthly bible study that is open to people of all faiths.

The vehicle will leave a camp and be driven on a safari where it will have to rescue an injured animal, relocate animals and stop poachers. Alex Charland, Joelen Clark, Lindsay Gaffke, Jenny Harter, Zachary Schmidt, Darrin Schulist and Tiffany Trott are all working hard to complete the required tasks.

Kewaskum Middle School is also doing "Scientific

Safari." In the 8 minutes allowed for their problem, they will also be making a trailer that will be towed by the scientific vehicle during part of the safari. They, like the KES team, will have to complete the required tasks and encounter team constructed animals along their safari. Team members, Dave Kletti, Amanda Schulist, Frank Nerad, Colleen Gosa, Brianna Obright, Angela Ritger, and Dan Kletti are coached by Ms. Leslie Bruss, 6th grade teacher.

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





Dyslexia is a language-based disorder affecting 15% of the population. It is characterized by difficulty in learning to read, write, and spell. Campus Notes

Despite a smaller high school pool of students to draw from, UW-River Falls has a 19% increase in freshmen this year, and the second best freshmen class on record, according to Admissions Director Allen Tuchtenhagen.

Of the 1,004 incoming freshmen, more than 43% were in the top quarter of their high school class, according to admissions office figures. Those figures show that 86 percent ranked in the top 50% of their high school class.

Total enrollment at UW-RF is 5,422 students, including 478 graduate students, according to figures released by the registrar's office. Of the total students, 146 are special students taking only one course and 406 students have transferred from other colleges and universities.

This year's enrollment figure represents the last year in a five-year plan of enrollment reductions in the University of Wisconsin System to coincide with a decline of high school graduates.

Traditionally, 32% of all Wisconsin high school graduates enter the UW System, one of the highest proportions of access to public higher education in the nation.

UW-RF has proposed to increase its enrollment by 707 full-time equivalent students by the year 2,000, representing a headcount enrollment of 6,000 students. The full extent of future enrollments will be tempered by the Wisconsin Legislature as it debates funding during its January session for UW-RF in the wake of lawmakers' decision to allocate \$1 billion

in property tax relief.

UW-RF continues to attract more women than men. Of this year's total enrollment, 3,147 are women and 2,275 are men. Married students total 155 men and 497 women.

Some 2,970 students, or more than half of UW-RF's total enrollment are Wisconsin residents, while 48 students come from foreign countries. Of the total enrollment, 252 students, or 4.6% are minority students, according to the registrar's office.
