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Fire Department Responds to Barn Fire

Officer's Quick Action Saves Local Boy's Life

A five-year-old Kewaskum boy was rescued from underneath his family's car by a team effort, that may very well have saved his life.

Kewaskum Police Officer Thomas Bauer responded to a call at 2:45 p.m. on Friday, March 29, when 911 was alerted that a child was trapped underneath a vehicle.

According to the boy's mother, Kathy Tange-man, of 218 North Avenue, she had arrived home from an outing with her two children and her sister, Becky, and parked the car in the driveway. "Normally, I set the emergency brake," she stated, "but we all had our arms full carrying things into the house, and the car was left out of gear." Everyone had gone into the house, while her son was the last one out of the car.

"Suddenly, I heard

Special District Space Feasibility Study Meeting Links School, Village, Townships

A well-rounded blend of village and area township officials joined the committee comprised of district residents, staff, board members and administration at the March 28th Space Feasibility Study meeting in the Kewaskum High School cafeteria.

School Board member Mary Andera, chairman of the committee, opened the 7 p.m. meeting by welcoming all in attendance and by explaining the objective and mission of the committee. She stated, "We're trying to take a look not just right now what we need, but we want to take this five, ten, even twenty years into the future."

Committee members who introduced themselves included: Maurie Hovland, Town of Farmington; Rosie Asmonday, Town of Wayne; District Administrator Dr. Charles Johnson; Lu Ann Potter, a worker at Farming-

ton School; Shirley Schlice, Village of Kewaskum; Terry Weber, Town of Scott, and Michael Lettow, Town of Kewaskum.

Committee members who could not be at the meeting due to previous commitments were Dan Beske from Wayne Elementary School, Kieth Kriewaldt, Principal of Farmington School, and Joyce Schlieff of the Town of Auburn.

Andera added the reason for the meeting was for the township representatives to give the committee some type of direction as to what their opinions are. Andera stated, "In order to make any well-founded decisions for the district, we really need to hear from the townships."

Dave Dorn, a representative from the Town of Kewaskum, opened the comments and stated his Township had sent out surveys and from those surveys they found the main item residents stressed and were concerned about was limiting

growth.

Jack Theusch, a member of the Town of Farmington Board for 20 years, said he has seen extensive growth and amazing inflation of land values. Theusch added when he began on the Farmington Board the township had approximately \$27 million of equalized value and they are now at over \$146 million.

Theusch stated, "Our population has gone up from around 1,500 people when I started and I think at this point in time, we're at 2,799." Theusch also gave an explanation of how the Farmington School came to be a part of the Kewaskum School District.

George Allmann, Chairman of the Town of Kewaskum, stated the Town of Kewaskum has actually lost population from ten years ago due to the fact a trailer park, comprised of 80 to 100 residents, was closed down and the Bonne Lane area was annexed to the Village of

Kindergarten Registration

This year's annual "round-up" for the parents/guardians of all prospective kindergarten pupils in the Kewaskum School District will be held on Monday, April 22, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and 4:30 to 7:30 p.m. to accommodate those unable to come during the day. Registration will again be held on Tuesday, April 23, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. **ONLY.**

All registrations will take place in the Farmington, Kewaskum, and Wayne school offices. Please register your child at the school in your area on one of the above days. It is not necessary to bring the child while registering.

To be eligible for enrollment in kindergarten, children must have attained their fifth birthday on or before

September 1, 1996. Evidence of date of birth, either a birth certificate or a baptismal certificate, must be brought to the office at the time of enrolling. Parents will need their child's social security number as well.

Parents will register their children for next year's term and be given the necessary health forms. If you know of any new families in this district, please pass this information on to them.

Richard E. Zarling, Principal/Director of Special Education would like to impress upon you the importance of registering your child on either of these two days so that the Kewaskum Community Schools may plan for them and know staff requirements for next year.

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Summer School 1996

The 1996 summer school schedule for Kewaskum Public Schools will be sent home to parents next Monday.

Included this year are a variety of enrichment, remedial, and sports classes to give the students opportunities that they are not usually able to get during the regular year.

Summer school '96 will begin on Monday, June 10, and the last day will be Wednesday, July 3. However, some classes will begin on different days and will run for different numbers of days, from one week to 3 1/2 weeks. The brochure sent home to parents will include details on each class and registration procedures.

The deadline for registration will be May 7. Parents will be notified of the classes and schedules for their children before the classes start on June 10.

Enrichment classes for grades 1-8 will be: Arts and Crafts, Band Lessons, Bugs! Bugs!! Bugs!!! Creative Writing, Early Childhood-Pre-School Activities, Fantastic Foods, Fun in the Kitchen, French, German, Little Explorers, Keyboarding, Playwriting and Acting, Rocketry I, Rocketry II, Sign Language, Spanish, Video Camera Magic, and Writers and Illustrators at Work. The age groups for each of these classes are listed in the summer school brochure.

Also for enrichment, some sports classes will be offered: Baseball, Basketball, Football, Tennis, and Weight Lifting and Speed Improvement.

To help build basic skills, the following classes are offered: Come Read with Me, Early Intervention Reading, Improving Math skills, Improving Written Language, Jumpstart Math, and LD Resources.

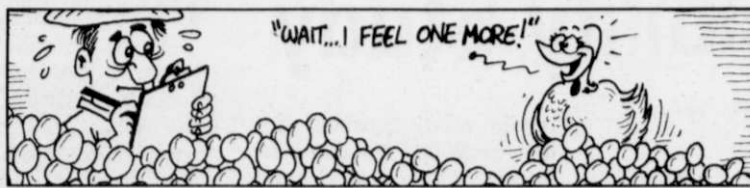
At the high school level, the following credit classes will be offered for students who have failed them in the regular year: English, World History, Mathematics, and Physical Science.

Kewaskum.

He also said the township very seldom grants zoning changes to smaller lots and almost one-quarter of the township land is Kettle Moraine State Forest.

Allmann added there was only one subdivision in the township in 15 years, but they now have another in progress. He also stated they have been averaging only three to ten houses being built, at the most, in a year.

Joanne Oneska of the Town of Farmington interjected that Farmington had 31 to 33 new homes last year.

The Village of Kewaskum, represented by Village President Robert Wagner and Village Administrator Daniel Schmidt then addressed the group with Wagner stating Kewaskum has been growing considerably. He added the village is currently working with SEWRPC on a comprehensive Land Use Plan, which should be completed by the end of 1996. "The Village is very open to working with the school district on this," Wagner said, "because the major part of the school district is located in the village."

Dan Schmidt added the village has seen substantial growth from 2,300 in 1985 to 3,000 in 1996. He said it is anticipated the growth is projected to increase by 1,100 by the year 2010. In regards to multi-family housing, the village is actually 1% below West Bend in relation to a multi-family/single family ratio.

Schmidt stated the village is "averaging 12 homes a year for the last few years, and would anticipate that to

remain pretty constant until the year 2000." He added the village shows "a real good blend" and has retirees as well as families with children. Population is projected to be 4,100 by the year 2010.

When asked about school location, Schmidt stated in the Land Use Plan and during Plan Commission discussion, basically neighborhood schools are probably supported more so than a centralized complex.

In regards to pinpointing location and timing, Schmidt said two sites had been briefly touched on with one being to the northeast of the village and the other to the southwest of the village. When cornered on time factors, Schmidt replied in order for a specific land plot to be designated, the village would have to know by late summer or early fall.

He added this is all in the very preliminary discussion stages and has not been addressed by the Plan Commission, only by SEWRPC.

When asked about specifics, Schmidt stated the southwest location had been earmarked for an elementary school whereas if a high school was planned, the northeast location would be better suited because of the land area.

Allmann added he felt there really isn't a choice as far as putting a large school in a township because of the sanitation and sewer. He stated almost all larger schools have to be located in cities because of city sewer linkup.

Frank Mayer of the Town of Farmington disagreed, stating, "We have some projects in our township that are major projects on septic systems that have been approved." Mayer added the township has a golf course and a potentially larger facility besides and they have no qualms about having a septic system out in the Farmington area. Mayer stated, "I don't think that we can discount the Town of Farmington School because of septic. We have open space, nature trails developed out there and a real good healthy atmosphere for children."

Mark Strobel of the Town of Wayne added that new procedures are being developed for different types of septic systems which will accommodate substantial growth.

Mayer added that technology is here and the rest will come.

Rosie Asmonday interjected projections show there will be 37 children enrolled in Wayne Elementary School kindergarten for the 1996-97 school year which will necessitate having two classes. She was curious as to what will

happen next year, when these 37 children reach first grade.

Mark Strobel asked District Administrator Johnson when the results of the school district survey would be compiled and available to the general public. Dr. Johnson explained the procedure on the compilation and stated the survey data would be available for the April 17th meeting.

Lester Benzschawel of the Town of Scott added they have a new subdivision in Batavia and another in Beechwood. He said, "It looks like a lot of younger people are moving into our area." He felt having a school is a big factor in a small community. He added, "A trend is coming our way and we know it is coming our way. We can see it."

Terry Weber, also from the Town of Scott, explained town residents were recently given a survey on what three options might be available for the Beechwood School: A) Leave the school as it is and rent it to residents for community use; B) The township should take over the maintenance of the school and the township would schedule its uses to stop the deterioration of the school, or; C) leave the school as it is.

He stated residents agreed the first option was the route to go by almost 70%. They received 97 responses to their survey.

When asked if the Town of Scott desired future growth, Weber answered it all depends on how you define growth. Weber also inquired if it was actually possible to control growth, and what the approach would be to accomplish this.

George Allmann stated Ozaukee County was a prime example of trying to control growth, but nevertheless, Fredonia just hasn't been able to control that growth because of the dollar signs on the lots. Allmann added there is a \$30,000 difference in prices from communities south of here compared to us. Commuters are willing to drive further every day for \$30,000, especially with the proposed bypass.

Dan Schmidt added that it's been proven that "growth cannot be stopped. You have to look at managing what type of growth you have and you do that with a Land Use Plan. The better control you have over the Land Use Plan, that's the control you have. You just have to plan for good growth."

Commenting on the bypass, Schmidt also explained in the late 60's two bypasses were proposed with one located to the east of Kewaskum and one located to the west. It would have been an ideal situation to go with the one on the east because all that land now is not usable because it has been declared wetlands. The

bypass has been considered ever since the '70's and runs west of Kewaskum, but is all angles. Schmidt stated, "I would venture to say I will not see this road in my lifetime." He added it was mainly because the road is still classified low priority. In his opinion, a lot of high priority roadwork won't be completed until the year 2010.

A discussion followed on what the participants preferred in regards to the small neighborhood schools.

Rose Asmonday stated she definitely preferred the small community schools. Even though Wayne School needs more room, there is a lot more parental involvement in the smaller schools.

Village President Wagner also stated he was in favor of retaining the neighborhood schools.

Dan Schmidt interjected, "Seeing the village is the only unit that has multi-family to speak of, about a year ago, we did a survey of the multi-family, and looking at single family homes here in the village. The perception is when you have multi-family they don't pay their fair share in taxes to the school district. In the village of Kewaskum situation, that's not true. The first unit of multi-family building actually supports the school district and village government at a higher rate than our single family homes."

Dr. Johnson added the group that was present at the meeting was a sub-committee that was looking at a strategic plan for the district and would feed back to the board of education. Then the board with community reps will meet to try to develop an outline of a strategic plan. There will also be other groups involved in developing an implementation plan.

Board president Neal Weare asked the people in attendance and members of the audience to give some indication as to what direction the board should go.

Lester Benzschawel stated schools like Farmington, Wayne and Beechwood are really an asset to the community. He said there's an advantage to having schools "in the country."

Lisa Maul of the Town of Wayne added she would fight tooth and nail to keep the Wayne and Farmington schools open. She said, "Beechwood people are still angry that their school was closed and I don't blame them."

Mark Strobel stated that he felt the small schools are great and the majority of the people on the survey will show this to the school district. Frank Mayer added the people in the Town of Farmington really support that school.

Dr. Johnson explained that you can only expand schools to a certain level. The neighborhood community school concept is dependent on

parental involvement. It's good for the children, but it does cost more. He said, "There's a price to pay in what we want for our children." He added Kewaskum is the fourth largest district in the state in regards to mileage, and we have to commit to some kind of plan. The decision point is coming upon us, and he commented, "You do have a very good understanding of tax implications. It does eventually come down to your tax dollar."

Frank Mayer added that if you close any school it costs money. You have to get technical support to find out what the limitations would be and what the cost would be.

George Allmann reiterated that there are not just cost factors. You also have to think about what value that school has on the community. Schools closing have a tremendous effect on the community. Then you have to consider and look at Kewaskum Elementary School's old building. He stressed MAJOR repairs have to be done to that building to keep it functional.

Further discussion was held, followed by Mrs. Andera closing remarks, and her thanking everyone for their input and taking the time to attend

The groom, a graduate of Random Lake High School, is employed by GTE Phone Operations in Plymouth.

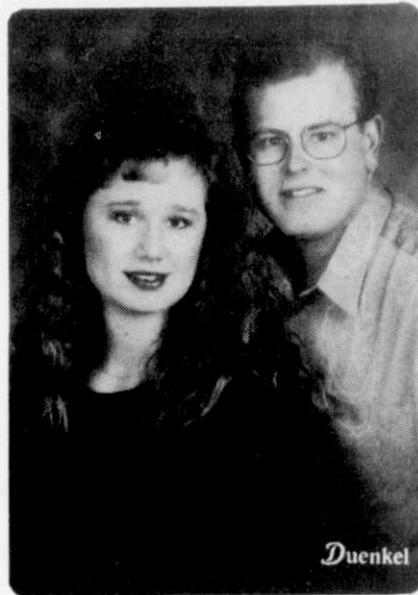

him screaming, and tore out the door," she recalls. "I saw the car rolling down the driveway. Apparently, my son was trying to stop it, he was so afraid it would crash into the house across the street."

Kathy jumped into the moving vehicle and stopped it. Meanwhile, her son had fallen down, and rolled under the car, which left him wedged beneath it with his legs up over his head, cutting off all circulation. Screaming, Kathy tried to get the car off, then ran into the house to get the keys.

The Tangeman's neighbors, known to Kathy as Sue and Dorothy, came running over to help, and with the aid of Becky and Kathy, tried to lift the car off the boy, but were unable to do so. At this point, neighbor Sue left to call 911.

According to Mrs. Tangeman, Officer Bauer responded to the call within thirty seconds, and lifted the vehicle off the boy, with the aid of three of the women. The responsive, and Kathy resuscitated her son by administering mouth to mouth.

The Kewaskum Rescue Squad arrived and transported the child to St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend, where he was treated with oxygen, and underwent a CAT scan to check for further injuries. None were found.

"Other than one red and bloodshot eye, he's fine and running around," Kathy related. "It was miraculous he suffered no major injuries. If he'd been trapped under the car another minute, he would've been gone."

Thank God for small miracles, and the quick efforts of one of Kewaskum's finest, Officer Tom Bauer.

51 Years Ago

February 23, 1945

William Schaub of this village received a telegram from the war department on Monday afternoon, February 19, informing him that his son, Pvt. Homer Schaub, was slightly wounded in action in Germany on February 7 while serving with an infantry unit. After receiving the telegram, Mr. Schaub received a letter from his son in which Pvt. Schaub wrote that he was shot in the leg but is able to be up and around again. Homer was a member of a ground forces replacement pool.

The tractor of a large tractor-trailer truck owned by K.A. Honeck and Sons of this village burned up early Tuesday evening on Highway 36 some distance southwest of Milwaukee, when the gas line broke and fell on the exhaust pipe, causing the gasoline to ignite. The truck was being driven by Kilian Honeck Jr. who was on his way home from Decatur, Illinois with a load of 10 horses. Honeck brought his truck to an immediate stop and although the flames spread very rapidly, he succeeded in removing the floor matting and cushions from the cab and unloaded the horses who were choking from the smoke. With the aid of other drivers, he succeeded in getting the trailer unhitched which prevented it from catching on fire.

Staff Sgt. Lester A. Eichstedt, who was wounded in action in Germany last Nov. 30, and who returned to the states on Jan. 27 from England, arrived in this village last Friday to spend a 15-day convalescent furlough with his parents Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Eichstedt and family. Sgt. Eichstedt, who sustained a broken right arm and shrapnel wounds in his right arm

and left hand in the fighting on the front lines, is now a patient at the Schick General Hospital in Clinton, Iowa. He still wears a cast on his arm and will report back at the hospital for further treatment March 2. The pieces of shrapnel have been removed. Sgt. Eichstedt has been awarded the bronze star medal for bravery under fire and the infantry combat badge. He also wears the Purple Heart award, good conduct medal, European theater ribbon containing three bronze stars, denoting his participation in three major

campaigns and other special awards.

A daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. Elroy Uelmen of Route 1, Kewaskum, at St. Joseph's Hospital, West Bend, on February 17.

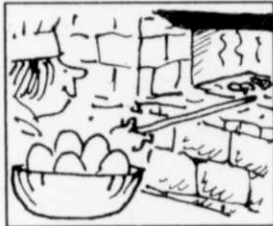

Grothman Lauds Student Lawsuit

MADISON... An announcement that three University of Wisconsin - Madison law students are suing the campus over mandatory contributions to left-wing student groups met with the approval of a West Bend legislator recently.

State Representative Glenn Grothman praised the efforts of the three students, who are suing over a UW system rule which transfers part of their tuition payments to student organizations with which they do not agree. "I think these students are right on target," Grothman stated. "At a time when the UW system claims it is so short of money that it will have to close a campus, I can't believe it's going to waste money defending this confiscatory student fee system."

Grothman was the author of Assembly bill 778, which failed to receive legislative consideration this year. Grothman's bill would have allowed students at the UW system to choose whether or not to pay that portion of their tuition which is distributed by student governments primarily to liberal student groups.

While UW policy is supposed to prevent student fees from being used to fund political or lobbying organizations, groups like the UW Greens, The Gay and Lesbian Student Alliance, Amnesty International and others receive tens of thousands of dollars annually in

involuntary student contributions.

"It is unfortunate that the Legislature did not take up my bill," Grothman said. "Under my bill, students would have been free to contribute voluntarily to these groups. That way, wealthier students could have supported the groups, while students who can barely raise enough for tuition now could have exempted themselves."

"I wish the students luck in their lawsuit," Grothman commented.

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Cold Water Can Be Deadly!

The long, cold winter is finally coming to an end. (??)

Boats are coming out of storage and fishermen are anxious to get them on the water for some early spring fishing. This rush to get on the water can, in some cases, be deadly.

Early season boaters should be aware of the dangers that cold water can present and be sure that they and their equipment are ready to go. Take time to check over your boat for the proper safety equipment.

Do you have the wearable type, personal floatation devices (PFD's) on the boat? Are they the proper size and in serviceable condition?

Remember, boat cushions are no longer legal PFD's, on boats of any length. You must have a wearable type PFD which is required on boats 16 feet or longer. The requirement for a wearable PFD went into effect in May of 1995.

Consider wearing your PFD at all times during cold water periods to protect yourself against an accidental fall into the cold water. Even an experienced swimmer suddenly falling into icy cold water can find themselves in serious trouble,

if not deadly trouble.

Then even if you do survive the initial plunge into the water, you need to get out of the water quickly or risk hypothermia setting in, which is also life threatening. You have only minutes to get out of the water that is below 40 degrees F.

Take time to make

sure that your boat's motor is operating properly. Make your first trip on the water a short one to make sure everything is operating properly. By making the first trip a short one, and you do run into a problem, you will have only a short trip back to the landing to make repairs.

Slow down and be aware of submerged hazards which may be hidden below the surface of

high water in early spring, especially on the rivers.

Some of the best fishing is in the early spring and I encourage you to take advantage of it. Remember the danger cold water can present. Prepare for the unexpected and **be careful!**

Resolution No. 96-8

Village of Kewaskum Washington County, Wisconsin

This agreement is made and executed between the Village of Kewaskum (Village) and Marcus Cable Partners, L.P. (Grantee).

WHEREAS, the Village adopted Cable Television Franchise Ordinance No. 96-4 on April 1, 1996, which authorizes the Village to issue a Cable Television Franchise; and

WHEREAS, the Village has publicly evaluated the renewal request of the Grantee, and has determined that the Village should renew the cable franchise under provisions established by the Cable Act of 1984, as amended;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

THE VILLAGE hereby grants to the Grantee, for mutual and other valuable consideration hereinafter provided, a non-exclusive Franchise to construct, erect, operate and maintain a cable television system within the public ways of the Village in strict accordance with the terms of this agreement and the Cable Television Franchise Ordinance. The Franchise shall commence on the date both parties have signed this agreement and shall continue for a period of 12 years.

THE GRANTEE hereby agrees to upgrade the cable system in the Village to a capa Village of at least 450 MHz by September 30, 1997. The Grantee agrees to furnish a \$50,000 completion bond with the Village in a form acceptable with the Village Attorney, which shall be released when the upgrade is complete and available to all areas required to be served under the franchise ordinance, or is forfeited to the Village if the conditions of this agreement are not met.

THE GRANTEE hereby agrees that any modifications in equipment or wiring needed to make existing PEG access facilities compatible with any upgraded system will be provided by the Grantee at the time of the upgrade.

THE GRANTEE hereby agrees to provide to the Village a capital grant of (\$30,000) to support programming on access channels on the cable system. The grant shall be paid on the following schedule: (\$10,000) within 90 days upon request of the Village of Kewaskum. The Village may require, and the Grantee must provide, within one year of the Village's notification of the requirement, the remainder of the capital grant, although the Village may require less than the capital grant at any one time. If the Grantee requests a transfer of the cable franchise before all payments have been made under this provision, the remaining amounts shall become due before any such transfer may take effect.

THE GRANTEE agrees to reimburse the Village for the costs incidental to the franchise renewal, not to exceed (\$2,000).

THE GRANTEE hereby agrees that it has negotiated this Franchise in good faith and with due knowledge of its rights and responsibilities under relevant local, state and federal laws.



If at any time there shall be on hand insufficient funds from the aforesaid tax levy to meet principal and/or interest payments on said note when due, the requisite amount shall be paid from other funds of the Village then available, which sums shall be replaced upon the collection of the taxes herein levied.

In the event that the Village exercises its prepayment privilege, if any, then no such direct annual tax shall be included on the tax rolls for the prepayment so made and the amount of direct annual tax hereinabove levied shall be reduced accordingly for the year or years with respect to which said note was prepaid.

In each of said levy years, the direct annual tax so levied shall be carried into the tax rolls each year and shall be collected in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes of the Village for such years are collected; provided, that the amount of tax carried into the tax roll may be reduced in any year by the amount of any surplus in the debt service account for the note. So long as any part of the principal of, or interest on, said note remains unpaid, the proceeds of said tax shall be segregated in a special fund used solely for the payment of the principal of, and interest on, said note.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that there be and there hereby is established in the treasury of the Village, if one has not already been established, a debt service fund, separate and distinct from every other fund, which shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Sinking funds established for obligations previously issued by the Village may be considered as separate and distinct accounts within the debt service fund. Within the debt service fund, there be and there hereby is established a separate and distinct account designated as the "Debt Service Account for Promissory Note dated April 16, 1996," which fund shall be used solely for the purpose of paying principal of and interest on said note. There shall be deposited in said fund any accrued interest paid on said note at the time it is delivered to the Lender, all money raised by the taxation or appropriated pursuant hereto, and such other sums as may be necessary to pay principal and interest on said note when the same shall become due.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the "proceeds" of said note shall be used solely for the purposes for which it is issued, but may be temporarily invested until needed in legal investments, provided that no such investment shall be in such a manner as would cause said note to be an "arbitrage bond" within the meaning of Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, or the Regulations of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue thereunder; and an officer of the Village, charged with the responsibility for issuing the note, shall certify by use of an arbitrage certificate that, on the basis of the facts, estimates and circumstances in existence on the date of the delivery of the note, it is not expected that the proceeds will be used in a manner that would cause said note to be an "arbitrage bond."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the projects financed by the note and their ownership, management and use will not cause the note to be a "private activity bond" within the meaning of Section 141 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and that the Village shall comply with the provisions of the Code to

.02 **GRANT OF FRANCHISE.** This chapter allows the Village of Kewaskum to grant to a Franchise Grantee, its successors and assigns, a nonexclusive license to install, maintain and operate a cable television system for the distribution of television signals, frequency-modulated radio signals and any other electronic signals capable of being transmitted over a fiberoptic and/or coaxial cable network and closed circuit television programs for a term not to exceed 15 years, provided that the Franchise Grantee conforms to the conditions, limitations and requirements of this Ordinance. This Ordinance may be amended from time to time by the Village through the enactment of amendments thereto.

.03 **DEFINITIONS.** For the purpose of this Ordinance, the following terms, phrases, words and their derivations shall have the meaning given herein. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words in the plural number include the singular number and words in the singular number include the plural number.

- A. **CABLE.** Coaxial and/or fiberoptic cables, wave guides or other conductors and equipment for providing television or other services by cable or through its facilities as herein contemplated, and including closed-circuit special event programs and educational television.
- B. **VILLAGE.** The Village of Kewaskum, Counties of Fond du Lac and Washington, State of Wisconsin, in its present incorporated form or in any later recognized, consolidated, enlarged or reincorporated form.
- C. **VILLAGE BOARD; BOARD.** The present governing body of the Village or any future body constituting the legislative body of the Village.
- D. **GRANTEE.** A person or entity to whom or which a Franchise under this chapter is granted by the Village, along with the lawful successors or assigns of such person or entity.
- E. **GROSS REVENUES.** Any revenue, derived directly or indirectly by a Grantee, its affiliates, subsidiaries, parents and any persons or entities in which a Grantee has a financial interest of five percent or more, from or in connection with the operation of a Kewaskum cable system including, but not limited to, basic or extended basic subscriber service monthly fees, pay cable fees, installation and reconnection fees. The term does not include any taxes on services furnished by a Grantee and imposed directly upon any subscriber or used by the Village, State or other governmental unit and collected by a Grantee on behalf of said governmental unit.
- F. **NORMAL BUSINESS HOURS.** Those hours during which most similar businesses in the Village are open to serve customers, plus at least one night per week until 8 p.m. and at least four hours on the weekend.
- G. **NORMAL OPERATING CONDITIONS.** Those conditions affecting service within the control of the Grantee. Those conditions presumed to be outside Normal Operating Conditions include natural disasters, human-caused disasters and civil disturbances, power or telephone outages, and severe or unusual weather conditions where such condition limits the

Grantee's ability to provide service. Those conditions presumed to be within Normal Operating Conditions include special promotions, pay-per-view events, rate increases, regular peak or seasonal demand periods and maintenance, rebuild or upgrade of the cable system.

- H. **STREET.** The surface of and space above and below any public street, road, highway, freeway, lane, alley, court, sidewalk, parkway or drive, now or hereafter existing as such within the Village.
- I. **SUBSCRIBER.** Any person or entity legally receiving for any purpose the services of a Grantee herein.

.04 **RENEWAL.**

A) To the extent applicable, Federal law shall govern the procedures and standards for renewal of any Franchise awarded pursuant to this Ordinance.

B) To the extent Federal law is not applicable, the Village shall, in its sole judgment and discretion, have the right to grant or deny renewal, provided that, at a minimum, Grantee provides written notice of its intent to seek renewal at least 30 months but no more than 36 months prior to the expiration of the applicable Franchise term.

.05 **TERMINATION OR EXPIRATION.**

A) A Franchise granted under this ordinance may be terminated by the Village for just cause, which may include, but not be limited to, a material breach of the provisions of this ordinance, a Franchise agreement issued under this ordinance, or other violation of local, state or federal law. The Village shall not terminate a Franchise without notice to the Grantee, reasonable opportunity to cure, and a public proceeding offering the Grantee and other interested parties the opportunity to comment.

B) Should a Grantee's Franchise be terminated or expire and there is no judicial or administrative review of the termination or expiration taking place, the Grantee shall begin removal, within 90 days of termination or expiration, of all property owned by the Grantee and placed on a public right-of-way unless permitted by the Village to abandon said property to the Village or to a purchaser.

C) In the event that a Franchise has been terminated or has expired, the Village shall have options, to the extent then permitted by law, to purchase the tangible assets of the Grantee's cable television system previously governed by the Franchise at its fair market value which may be determined by a bona fide offer to purchase the system, to assign such rights to purchase, or to require removal of all Grantee's property located within the public ways of the Village at the Grantee's expense. Such an option must be exercised within one year from the date of the termination or expiration of the Franchise, the entry of a final judgment by a court reviewing the question of the termination or expiration, or the entry of a final order upon appeal of the same, whichever is later.

.06 **TRANSFER PROCEDURE.** All of the rights and privileges and all the obligations, duties and liabilities created by this Ordinance shall pass to and be binding upon the successors of the Village and the successors and assigns of a Grantee. The Franchise shall not be assigned or transferred by the Grantee without the written approval of the Village hereunder, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld without a showing of good cause; provided, however, that this section shall not prevent the assignment or pledge of a Franchise or system by a Grantee as security for debt without such approval; and provided further that transfers or assignments of a Franchise between any parent and subsidiary corporation or between entities of which at least 51% of the beneficial ownership is held by the Grantee or any parent corporation shall be permitted without the prior approval of the Village. The sale, transfer or assignment of a material portion of the tangible assets of a Grantee to an unrelated third party shall be considered an assignment subject to the provisions of this section.

A) The parties to the sale or transfer of a Franchise shall make a written request to the Village for its approval of a sale or transfer of the Franchise.

B) The Village shall reply in writing within 30 days of the request with a written notification of any information it needs to evaluate the request. Within 30 days of such information being provided, the Village shall indicate approval of the request or its determination that a public hearing is necessary.

C) If a public hearing is deemed necessary pursuant to subsection B, the Village shall conduct such hearing within 30 days of such determination. Notice of any such hearing shall be given at least 14 days prior to the hearing by publishing notice thereof once in a newspaper of general circulation in the area being served by the Franchise. The notice shall contain the date, time and place of the hearing and shall briefly state the substance of the action to be considered by the Village.

D) Within 60 days after the public hearing, the Village shall approve or deny the sale or transfer request and notify the Grantee in writing of its decision.

E) The parties to the sale or transfer of a Franchise only, without the inclusion of a cable communications systems in which at least substantial construction has commenced, shall establish that the sale or transfer of a Franchise only will be in the public interest.

F) The new holder of a sold or transferred Franchise shall, within 30 days of the sale or transfer, file with the Village a copy of the deed, agreement or other written instrument evidencing such sale, transfer of ownership or control or lease, certified and sworn to as correct by the Grantee. The new holder shall within the same period file with the Village any and all required bonds, proofs-of-insurance and certifications, and accept in writing all responsibilities relating to the Cable Franchise and System.

.07 **FRANCHISE TERRITORY.** A Franchise granted under this chapter is for the present territorial limits of the Village of Kewaskum. For any households or areas existing or added to the Franchise territory during

the term of the Franchise, service shall be extended within one year wherever density reaches 20 dwelling units per mile.

.08 SUBSCRIBER PRIVACY.

A) No monitoring of any authorized terminal connected to the system shall take place without specific written authorization by the user of the terminal in question on each occasion and written notice to the Village, except as may be required for normal maintenance of the system.

B) A Grantee shall not, except as required by governmental action, provide any data concerning specific subscribers or users or their use of subscriber services without first securing written authorization from the subscribers or users as required in the Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984.

C) Subscribers and users shall retain the right to deactivate their terminals, but shall continue to be responsible for charges until the Grantee is notified to terminate service.

.09 TECHNICAL PERFORMANCE. The cable system shall be operated to comply with or exceed all guidelines and standards set by the FCC for signal quality and leakage. The Village reserves the right to test the system or any part thereof and independently measure the signal quality. The Grantee shall provide reasonable access to its facilities and any assistance necessary for such testing. The system shall comply at all times with the applicable National Electrical Code of the National Fire Protection Association.

.10 OPEN BOOKS AND RECORDS. A Grantee shall manage all of its operations in accordance with the policy of totally open books and records vis-a-vis the Village. The authorized officers or agents of the Village shall have the right to inspect, upon notice, during normal business hours all books, records, maps, plans, financial statements, service complaint logs, performance test results, records of request for service and other like materials of the Grantee that relate to the operation of the Franchise.

.11 SUBSCRIBER SERVICE.

A) A Grantee shall be required to provide a location within the Village open during Normal Business Hours to receive customer payments, and to deliver, exchange or accept return of cable equipment.

B) The Grantee shall provide access to a local or toll-free telephone number for programming questions and service requests. The number shall be either staffed or provided with answering capabilities 24 hours a day.

.12 DESCRIPTION OF THE SYSTEM.

A) A Kewaskum cable system shall be at least 450 MHz in bandwidth when newly built, rebuilt or significantly upgraded.

B) A Grantee shall, upon request of the Village, provide a complete written description of the cable system in the Village of Kewaskum. Such written description shall be updated as substantial changes are made.

.13 RATES.

A) Rates charged by a Grantee for service hereunder shall be fair and reasonable. Before any service is sold to any customer, the Grantee shall file with the Village Clerk its schedule of rates for installation, monthly service charges and any other charges related to the operation of the cable system, together with a statement of the rights and obligations of subscribers.

B) Subsequent additions or amendments to rates and service charges shall likewise be filed with the Village Clerk at least 30 days before the same become effective.

C) The Village reserves the option to regulate rates for cable service, should such power be allowed under federal and state law.

.14 CONDITIONS ON STREET OCCUPANCY.

A) USE. All transmission and distribution structures, lines and equipment erected by a Grantee within the Village shall be so located as not to cause interference with the proper use of streets, alleys and other public ways and places, and not to cause interference with the rights of or reasonable convenience of property owners who adjoin any of the streets, alleys or other public ways and places.

B) RESTORATION. In case of any disturbance of pavement, sidewalk, driveway or other surfacing, the Grantee shall first give notice to the Director of Public Works of any contemplated disturbances of pavement, sidewalk, driveway or other surfacing, and shall, at its own cost and expense and in a manner approved by the Director of Public Works, replace and restore all pavement, sidewalk, driveway or other surface of any street or alley disturbed in as good condition as before such work commenced. The Grantee shall otherwise comply with Village ordinances relating to street openings.

C) RELOCATION. If, at any time during a Franchise, the Village shall elect to alter or change the location or grade of any street, alley or other public way, the Grantee, upon 72-hour notice by the Village, shall remove, relay and relocate its poles, wires, cables, underground conduits, manholes and other fixtures at its own expense. If any construction by the Grantee is in violation of the provisions of subsection A, the Grantee shall likewise, upon reasonable notice by the Village, remove, relay and relocate its property in such a manner as to remedy such violation at its own expense.

D) PLACEMENT OF FIXTURES. The Grantee shall not place poles or other fixtures where the same will interfere with any gas, electric, telephone or other fixture, water hydrant or main. All such poles or other fixtures placed in any street shall be placed between the outer edge of sidewalk and the curb line where such boundaries exist, and those placed in alleys shall be placed close to the line of the lot abutting on such alley in such a manner as not to interfere with the usual travel on the streets, alleys and public ways. However, nothing in this chapter shall prohibit the use by the Grantee of existing public utility poles where practical, providing mutually satisfactory rental agreements can be entered into with the Grantee.

E) UNDERGROUND SERVICE. The Grantee shall install underground service in areas where electric and phone services are underground. Unless a greater depth is required, the minimum depth for underground cable service at the time of initial installation shall be 12 inches.

F) TEMPORARY REMOVAL OF WIRE FOR BUILDING MOVING. A Grantee shall, on the request of any person holding a building moving permit issued by the Village, temporarily raise or lower its wires to permit the moving of buildings. The expenses of such temporary raising or lowering of the wires shall be paid by the person requesting the same, and the Grantee may require such payment in advance. The Grantee shall be given advance notice of at least five working days to arrange for such temporary wire changes.

F) TREE TRIMMING. The Grantee, to the same extent that the Village has such authority, may trim trees that overhang streets, alleys, sidewalks and public places of the Village so as to prevent the branches of such trees from coming in contact with the wires and cables of the Grantee. The Grantee must apply to the Village for a no-fee permit before trimming trees.

.15 INDEMNITY.

A) INDEMNIFICATION. The Grantee shall defend and save the Village and its agents and employees harmless from all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including attorney's fees, sustained by the Village on account of any suit, judgment, execution, claim or demand whatsoever arising out of:

(1) The enactment of this Ordinance and granting of a Franchise thereunder.

(2) The installation, operation or maintenance of the cable system except for acts of the Village, its agents or employees, unless said acts are at the request of and under the direction or supervision of the Grantee.

B) NOTIFICATION AND FILING. The Village shall notify the Grantee within 10 days after the presentation of any claim or demand, either by suit or otherwise, made against the Village on the part of the Grantee. The Grantee shall furnish to the Village, before any Franchise becomes effective, satisfactory evidence in writing that the Grantee has in force and will maintain in force during the term of the Franchise public liability insurance.

C) LIABILITY INSURANCE. 1) A Grantee shall maintain throughout the term of the permit a general comprehensive liability insurance policy naming as additional insured the Village, its officers, Boards, commissions, agents and employees, in a company approved by the Village and in a form satisfactory to the Village Attorney. The policy shall protect the Village and its agencies and employees against liability for loss or damage for personal injury, death or property damage occasioned by the operations of Grantee under any Franchise granted hereunder, in the amounts of (a) \$1,000,000.00 for bodily injury or death to any one person with the limit however of \$2,000,000.00 for bodily injury or death resulting from any one accident, and (b) \$1,000,000.00 for property damage resulting from any one accident. The Village shall be named as an additional insured under such insurance and a copy of the current in-force policy shall be deposited with the Village Administrator.

2) On every third year anniversary of the granting of a cable franchise, the Village shall have the power to reasonably increase the amount of liability insurance required, and the Grantee shall have 60 days after notification to file proof of such increased coverage.

.16 BOND, SECURITY FUND AND REMEDIES.

A) BOND. During the construction or substantial rebuild of a cable system, the Grantee shall file with the Village a performance bond in the amount of \$50,000. The bond shall be released when the Grantee certifies to the Village that the construction or substantial rebuild is complete, and the Village accepts such certification as proven.

B) SECURITY FUND. At the time a Franchise is accepted, the Grantee shall file with the Village and maintain through the term of the Franchise a bond in the amount of \$5,000.00 as a common security fund for the faithful performance by the Grantee of all the provisions of the Franchise. Provision shall be made to permit the Village to withdraw funds from the security fund pursuant to subsection C. The Grantee shall not use the security fund for other purposes and shall not assign, pledge or otherwise use this security fund as security for any purpose. Within ten days after notice to it that any amount has been withdrawn by the Village from the security fund pursuant to this section, the Grantee shall replenish the bond to the required amount.

C) FAILURE TO COMPLY. Any violation by a Grantee, its vendor, lessee or successor of the provisions of a Franchise or any material portion or portions thereof, or the failure promptly to perform any of the provisions thereof shall, after 30-days written notice and opportunity to cure is given to the Grantee, cause the Grantee to be fined up to \$100 a day from the Security Fund until proper correction is made. The Village also reserves the right to forfeit the Franchise and cancel all rights hereunder. A Grantee is not responsible for failure to provide adequate service when that failure is caused by acts of God, strikes, governmental or military action, or other conditions beyond its control including the unavailability of material or parts.

.17 FRANCHISE FEE AND FINANCIAL REPORTING.

A) FRANCHISE FEE PAYMENT. As compensation for permission to use the streets and public ways of the Village for the construction, operation, maintenance, modification, and reconstruction of a cable system, and for the Village's costs in establishing a regulatory program for a Grantee, the Grantee shall pay to the Village each year an amount equal to 5% of the Grantee's annual Gross Revenues.

B) PAYMENT SCHEDULE; ESTIMATED PAYMENTS; LATE PAYMENTS. The Franchise fee shall be paid on a quarterly basis according to the following schedule: revenues for January through March shall be reflected in a May 15th payment; revenues for April through June

shall be reflected in an August 15th payment; revenues for July through September shall be reflected in a November 15th payment; and revenues for October through December shall be reflected in a February 15th payment.

The Grantee may make estimated payments for the first three quarters of a calendar year, provided that no estimated quarterly payment is less than 25% of the previous year's total annual payment, and that any discrepancy between the estimated quarterly payments and the total owed for the calendar year is corrected by the February 15th payment.

Payments made after any due date shall be subject to a late payment fee in the amount of 25% for any portion of a month the payment is late, with a maximum of one late payment assessment in any one calendar month. Late payments owed in any second calendar month will be assessed the 25% charge based on the previous month's assessment, including that month's late payment assessment.

However, if the Grantee agrees to charge a subscriber no more than actual costs the Grantee incurs in collecting that subscriber's late payment, the Grantee shall pay to the Village a late payment fee of 1.5% per month or portion thereof for any late franchise fee payments.

C) **ANNUAL REPORT.** No later than April 15th of each year, the Grantee shall present to the Village a report of system finances for the previous year, which shall include gross revenues from all sources and detail of the amount contributed by each revenue component within the franchise territory. In addition, upon request of the Village the Grantee shall present to the Village an audited, consolidated financial statement showing operating expenses, net income and an end-of-year balance sheet.

D) **ACCEPTANCE NOT CONSIDERED RELEASE.** No acceptance of any payment by the Village shall be construed as a release or as an accord and satisfaction of any claim the Village may have for further or additional sums payable as a Franchise fee or for the performance of any other obligation of the Grantee.

.18 VILLAGE RULES.

A) The Village hereby reserves the right to adopt, in addition to the provisions contained in this Ordinance and existing applicable ordinances, such additional regulations as it shall find necessary in the exercise of its police powers. Such regulations, by ordinance or otherwise, shall be reasonable and not be in substantial conflict with the rights granted in this Ordinance and not be in conflict with the laws of the State.

B) The Village may, during the term of a Franchise, free of charge where aerial construction exists, maintain upon the poles of the Grantee within the Village limits wire and pole fixtures necessary for a police and fire alarm system, such wires and fixtures to be constructed and maintained to the satisfaction of the Grantee and in accordance with its specifications.

C) The Village may inspect all construction or installation work during such construction or installation, or at any time after completion thereof, in order to insure compliance with the provisions of this chapter and all other governing ordinances.

.19 WAIVER OF CHARGES.

A) During a Franchise, a Grantee shall provide one free outlet and basic and expanded basic cable service to each municipally owned or leased building passed by the cable system and used substantially for municipal purposes, as well as to any and all schools, whether private or public, within the Franchise territory.

B) The Grantee shall be required to provide one dedicated, non-commercial access channel, including wiring and insertion equipment needed to connect to the cable system.

C) Upon 270 days notice by the Village, the Grantee shall, at the option of the Village, be required to add an additional access channel, including wiring and insertion equipment needed to connect to the cable system, at a location within the Franchise territory chosen by the Village.

D) The Village shall have sole authority to administer the community access channels unless it chooses to delegate such authority. A Grantee shall not be responsible for the equipment or operating costs for community access channels, except as provided for in a Franchise Agreement.

E) The Grantee shall provide the Village with an emergency alert override capability, capable of securely accepting from a remote location and displaying Village information on all channels.

.20 **SEVERABILITY.** Should any word, phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or portion of this Ordinance and or a Franchise thereunder be declared to be invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of this Ordinance and or the Franchise as a whole, but shall only affect the portion thereof declared to be invalid; and the Village hereby expressly states and declares that it would nonetheless have passed this Ordinance and or granted the Franchise had it known that any such word, phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or portion of said Ordinance and or Franchise were invalid.

.21 **ACCEPTANCE BY GRANTEE.** A Franchise granted under this Ordinance shall be effective upon written acceptance of the Franchise being filed with the Clerk of the Village. The filing must take place within 30 days of the offer of the Franchise being made by the Village.

.22 **INCORPORATION OF AMENDMENTS.** This Ordinance and a Franchise granted hereunder may be amended to incorporate amendments to the statutes, rules and regulations of the Federal government as they are promulgated by the Federal government. Any provision herein in conflict with or pre-empted by said rules, regulations or statutes shall be superseded.

.23 **PROTECTION OF NONSUBSCRIBERS.** A Grantee shall at all times keep its cables and other appurtenances used for transmitting signals shielded in such a manner that there will be no interference with signals received by radios or televisions not connected to the Grantee's service.

.24 **GRANTEE RULES.** A Grantee may promulgate such rules, regulations, terms and conditions governing the conduct of its business as shall be reasonably necessary to enable the Grantee to exercise its rights

and perform its obligations under the Franchise and to assure uninterrupted service to all its subscribers. However, such rules, regulations, terms and conditions shall not be in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance or the laws of the State.

.25 **WAIVER OF OBJECTIONS.** By the adoption of this chapter, the Village expressly waives all objections it has or may have to the legal rights of the Grantee to attach its cables, equipment and transmission lines to the poles of the Village, pursuant to an agreement.

.26 **GRANTEE WITHOUT RECOURSE.** A Grantee shall have no recourse whatsoever against the Village for any loss, cost or expense, or damage arising out of any provisions or requirements of a Franchise or because of the enforcement thereof by the Village, or for the failure of the Village to have authority to grant all or any part of the Franchise.

Grantee expressly acknowledges that in accepting a Franchise it does so relying on its own investigation and understanding of the power and authority of the Village to grant the Franchise.

By accepting a Franchise, a Grantee acknowledges that it has not been induced to enter into the Franchise by any understanding or promise or other statement, whether verbal or written, by or on behalf of the Village or by any other third person concerning any term or condition of the Franchise not expressed herein.

The Grantee further acknowledges by acceptance of the Franchise that it has carefully read the terms and conditions hereof, and is willing to and does accept all the risks of the meeting of such terms and conditions.

.27 WORK PERFORMED BY OTHERS.

A) A Grantee shall give prior notice to the Village specifying the names and addresses of any entity, other than the Grantee, that performs substantial services pursuant to the Franchise, provided, however, that all provisions of the Franchise remain the responsibility of the Grantee. All personnel of the Grantee or its subcontractors shall carry and display if requested a photo I.D. identifying themselves as representatives of the Grantee when performing services at subscriber locations in the Village.

B) All provisions of a Franchise shall apply to any subcontractor or others performing any work or services pursuant to the provisions of the Franchise.

.28 **CONTEST OF VALIDITY.** Grantee agrees by acceptance of a Franchise that it will not at any time set up against the Village in a claim for proceeding any condition or term of the Franchise as unreasonable, arbitrary or void, or that the Village had no power or authority to make such term or condition, but shall be required to accept the validity of the terms and conditions of the Franchise in their entirety.

.29 **CUSTOMER SERVICE STANDARDS.** The Grantee shall maintain resources sufficient and near enough to the franchise territory to provide the necessary facilities, equipment and personnel to comply with this section and other provisions of this ordinance.

A. **Service standards.** The Grantee shall render efficient service, make repairs promptly and interrupt service between the hours of 7 a.m. and 1 a.m. only for good cause and for the shortest possible time. Service may be interrupted between 1 a.m. and 7 for routine testing, maintenance and repair, except on nights commencing on Saturday and Sunday and on holidays. Scheduled or predictable service interruptions, except for weekly routine maintenance, insofar as possible shall be preceded by notice, which may be provided across the cable system. The interruptions shall occur during periods of minimum use of the system to the extent practicable. The Grantee shall maintain a written log or an equivalent capable of access and reproduction of all service interruptions and requests for service, which log shall be available for Village inspection during the franchise period.

B. **Telephone lines.** The Grantee shall provide local toll-free or collect call telephone access to its subscribers within the franchise territory. Any calls should be answered by a customer service representative during Normal Business Hours; calls outside this period may be answered by an automated response mechanism, but such calls should be processed by a Grantee's representative within 12 hours. The Grantee shall provide sufficient phone answering capability that customer calls are answered on average within 30 seconds 90% of the time; and that customers receive a busy signal no more than 3% of the time. Violations of these standards shall be subject to penalties under provisions of Section 16.

C. **Installation.** The Grantee shall complete requests for subscriber installations within seven business days of order placement when the installation is within 150 feet of the existing cable system. Installation requests required to be honored under this ordinance beyond the 150-foot standard must be completed within 14 days. If the Grantee fails to meet these standards the Grantee shall provide the subscriber with a free month of the requested service. The Grantee may request the Village toll these periods for reasonable circumstances beyond its control.

D. **Repair standards.** The Grantee shall maintain a repair force capable, under normal operating circumstances, of responding to service interruption and degradation complaints made during Normal Business Hours within four hours. For complaints made outside Normal Business Hours, the Grantee must respond within 16 hours. For the purpose of this subsection, "response" shall mean at a minimum contacting the subscriber by phone or in person. Where a Grantee misses either of these deadlines, Grantee must provide the subscriber with one free month's service. The Grantee may request the Village toll the repair period for reasonable circumstances beyond its control.

E. **Service call scheduling.** When the Grantee needs to arrange an service appointment at a subscriber's location, the Grantee must offer the subscriber a service window not to exceed four hours in duration. Grantee may not cancel a service window without the subscriber's consent. Where a Grantee misses a service window, Grantee must provide the subscriber with one free month's service. The Grantee may request the Village toll the service call period for reasonable circumstances beyond its control.

F. **Service interruptions and significant degradation.** When the

Grantee has failed to provide a subscriber with appropriate service due to service outage or significant audio or video degradation not due to the subscriber's equipment or action, the subscriber may request a rebate of any fees paid for the affected service(s) under the following schedule, and the Grantee must provide such rebates. For the purposes of this section the outage or degradation period shall begin when the subscriber provides notice to the Grantee of the outage or degradation. For the purposes of this section any complaints of outage or degradation by a subscriber within any month shall be cumulative. The Grantee may request the Village waive or modify the rebate provisions for reasonable circumstances beyond its control.

1. For periods at least four hours long but under 24 hours, a rebate of one-thirtieth of the monthly fee for affected services for each instance.
2. For periods of at least 24 hours, a rebate of one-tenth of the monthly fee for affected services for each 24-hour period or portion thereof.

This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as provided by law.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel reviewed with the Board the bids received for the Fire Tank Truck as bid.

J & B, Shawano, WI - \$43,820 (Tank); Cooleys, West Bend, WI - \$45,999 (Chassis); first two combined - \$89,819 (Unit); Monroe, Monroe, WI - \$44,863 (Tank), \$45,999 (Chassis), \$90,862 (Unit); 3-D, Shawano, WI - \$49,219 (Tank), \$66,420 (Chassis), \$115,639 (Unit).

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel informed the Board that the Equipment Committee is recommending to the Board that a combination of the J & B bid and Cooleys bid be accepted. It was further noted that the J & B bid did not include liquidated damages or a performance bond. They had asked that they would be exceptions to the bid. Delivery of the tank truck will be in 150 to 180 days.

On a motion by Trustee John Borland, seconded by Trustee William Kulas and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board authorized the purchase of the Chassis from Cooleys for \$45,999 and the tank from J

& B for \$43,820. This was the low combined bid of \$89,819.

Trustee Gary Gavin asked Fire Chief Mark Groeschel if the EMT roster was sufficient in number to adequately take care of the community. He indicated it was; they had 19 EMT's and 3 trainees. He added that there have been periods of less personnel and the Department is always looking for good personnel. It was noted that the loan for the purchase needs to be worked out but that Bank Wisconsin said they would work with the Village with an interest rate of 5.75%.

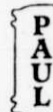

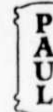

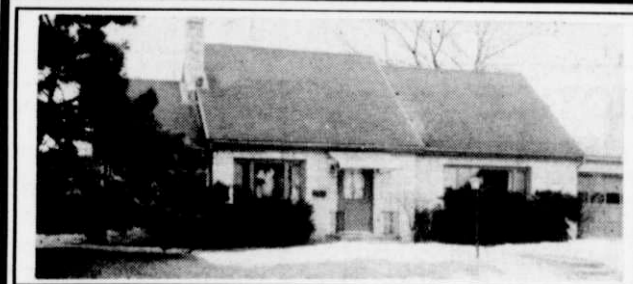

KHS Records Fall As Lady Indians Compete

After winning the Washington County Indoor Meet, the Kewaskum girls track team headed north to Oshkosh for the UW Oshkosh Indoor Invitational. With 40 teams competing in this meet the competition is fierce, but it gives coaches a gauge as to what type of team they are going to have in the upcoming season.

It looks like the KHS girls are going to do well again this season as they finished third, just 4 1/2 (38.5) points behind the winning Manawa team (43) and 2 1/2 points behind Berlin (41).

Leading the way for the Indians was junior Marni Lynn as she shattered two long standing KHS school records. First Lynn won the 1600m run in a time of (5:27.91) breaking Sandy Klein's old record of 5:39 by nearly 12 seconds. Klein's mark had stood since 1984.

The race itself was one of the more exciting ones as Lynn and New Holstein's Sheila Kabat ran the last 50m stride for stride with Lynn pulling ahead the last 10 meters to win by two strides.

In the 800m run Lynn once again excelled as she broke Linda Larsen's 13 year old mark (2:33) with a new time of 2:28.07, good enough for second place. Marni has worked very hard in the off season after a very successful sophomore year and that hard work is paying dividends right now.

The shot put looks like it will once again be strong, as two Kewaskum girls placed in a field of 80 throwers. Junior Rachel Nysse led the way with a throw of 35'8 1/2" good for fifth place while junior Katie Yogerst placed eighth with a throw of 33:7 1/2."

Rachel has picked up right where she left off last year (upper 35's) and is expected to have a great year.

Katie increased her throw from last week (32') by more than a foot and will make this a very strong event for the defending EWC champs.

The 800m relay, a traditionally strong event for the Lady Indians, once again showed that they are a team to be reckoned with as they tied for second place (1:55.07) just missing the

school record by 3/10's of a second.

The team returns three state qualifiers in the event, seniors Jenny Strobel and Erin Stockhausen, and junior Jenny Jagielski. Running with the elite trio was sophomore Kenzie Downs. There will be a lot of competition for the fourth spot in this event.

Jagielski was very impressive in the 55m dash (7.73), placing third. Jenny is one of the better sprinters around and will be a key to the team's success this year.

The very young 1600m relay team (two sophomores and two juniors) ran very well together tying for sixth place (4:31.17) with Hortonville. Ann Bodden, Jamie Gaffke, Laura Weiss and Carrie Wiesner all ran with alot of heart to give the Indians

the extra points needed to move the team into third place.

Other competitors who performed very well were: Laura Weiss, Ann Bodden, Jamie Gaffke and Carrie Wiesner in the 3200m relay (12:04.35); Carrie Wiesner, long jump (15'0 3/4"); Kathy Deshotels, triple jump (29'3 1/3"); JoAnne Thull (10:24) and Carrie Wiesner (10:26) 55m hurdles; Carol Neumann, 800m run (2:47) and Laura Weiss, 400m run (67.57).
