## Board Tables Bilgo Lane Resurfacing Prom Queen and King

A variety of agenda items were addressed at the April meeting of the Kewaskum Village Board, including the opening of sealed bids and review of the same for the 1996 asphalt pavement work.

Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles reviewed the projects which include ten locations requiring patching, some catch basin work, and spots in Kiwanis Park and River Hill Park. Street work includes Werner Drive, Stark and Highland Streets, a section of Timblin Drive, a section of Roseland Drive, a portion of Brooklane Drive and Bilgo Lane.

Gilles stated the bids came in approximately \$4,000 over the budgeted amount. For this reason he recommended dropping the Bilgo Lane resurfacing, which would bring the bids back down under the budgeted amount.

Gilles added another reason he recommended dropping the Bilgo Lane resurfacing was he had not been aware the school was going to asphalt their portion of the road on the school property.

Gilles stated, "When we looked at Bilgo, we only looked at doing the block between Second and Third; not that short street leading into the high school, because

we weren't aware that was going to be new asphalt. If we added that to the project to make that all one street so that everything was done at once, we'd be going further over budget."

Therefore Gilles recommended postponing that section for one year and do the entire section at one time.

Gilles further explained there was \$65,986 budgeted for these asphalt projects. Without Bilgo Lane, he estimated 1,300 tons of asphalt would be needed on the projects. The bid from Scott Construction would be approximately \$67,100 and the bid from Payne and Dolan would be \$60,465.

Trustee Gary Gavin asked Gilles what the bids would be to include Bilgo Lane. Gilles stated Bilgo Lane would bring the bids up to \$74,582 from Scott and \$69,090 from Payne and Dolan.

A lengthy discussion followed with Trustee Gary Gavin trying to point out that the village streets are deteriorating and repairs are going to have to be made eventually, adding postponing the inevitable will only drive the price up and cost the taxpayer more next year.

Trustee Kulas countered that it was his opinion that they must stay under budget. Taxpayers expect the board

to spend only money that is budgeted for projects and to do otherwise was going against what the taxpayer wanted.

The point was brought up that money could be moved from other funds allocated or the money budgeted for purchase of a new truck could be used and the truck could be postponed until next year.

Gavin pointed out that somewhere along the line money would have to be spent to upgrade the village streets rather than giving them the "band-aid" approach all the time. Gavin added he felt sorry for the upcoming boards that would have to address this issue in the future when it would come up with a very large price tag with taxpayers wanting to know why.

Gavin stated, "It's great to have no debts, but if your streets are junk, what good is it?"

Gavin made a motion to leave everything in the proposed asphalt project, including Bilgo Lane, even if it meant taking the project over budget but the motion died four to three.

The majority of the board then voted to go ahead with the asphalt project, leaving out the Bilgo Lane resurfacing, postponing the inevitable for a future budget.

### How to Help When A Child Is Being Hurt

(NU) - What is an appropriate response when faced with a parent whose loss of control in a supermarket aisle or parking lot results in slap, punch or worse to a child?

Here are some tips from David S. Liederman, executive director of the Child Welfare League of America:

- Sympathize with the adult. Say something like: "She seems to be trying your patience" or "My child used to get upset like that."

- Divert the angry attention away from the child by striking up a conversation. It may allow the parent's anger to subside.

- Compliment or praise the parent or child. Say something positive, such as "What a big, strong boy you have! How old is he?" or "It's a lot of work to shop with a toddler. I admire your effort."

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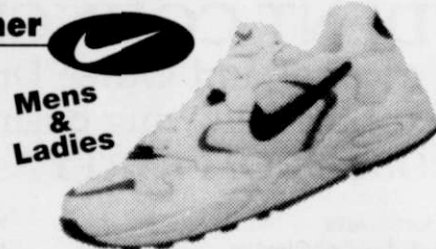

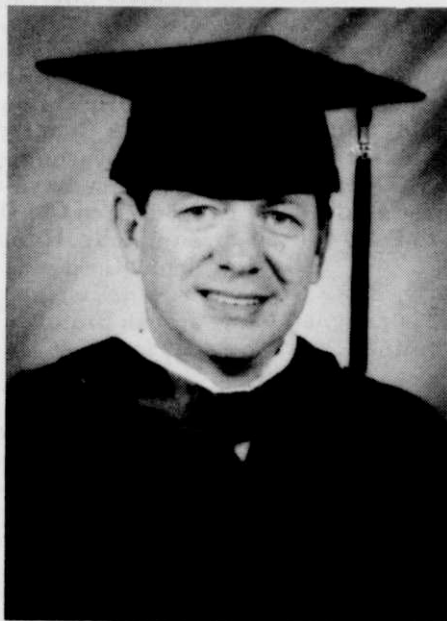

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## United Way Fund Distribution Process Underway In County

Imagine spending hundreds of thousands of dollars in just 90 days. Sound easy? And, imagine that those funds are not yours, but have been entrusted to you by thousands of people in Washington County.

No, it's not the lottery, but the annual fund distribution process of the United Way of Washington County. And for the next few months, approximately 40 volunteers will be involved in reviewing 1997 funding requests from 25 different human service non-profit agencies serving county residents.

An important and often overlooked function of United Way is the distribution and monitoring of funds to local agencies.

The recommendations of the volunteers will lead to final funding approval for 25 agencies when the campaign goal for Washington County is set by the United Way Board of Directors in late July.

"Right now, our community volunteers are hard at work reviewing agency programs and funding requests, and asking questions on effectiveness," said Michael Bloedorn, United Way Board Vice-President and Chairperson of the 1997 fund distribution process. "Ultimately, funds that are needed for our member agencies, combined

with United Way's operating budget, help us determine our financial goal for the 1996 campaign."

Bloedorn continued, "The driving force in setting the Campaign Goal each year is the needs of the agencies. After funding requests were submitted in late April, the volunteers were divided into panels. Each panel is currently reviewing four agencies over a five-week period. Budgets, programs and results for every agency are being evaluated by the community volunteers in face-to-face meetings with agency staff and their governing boards. In many cases, the review also includes a tour of the agency. The panel recommendations for funding will then be brought to the United Way Board for final approval by mid-summer."

The 25 agencies being reviewed cover 10 communities in Washington County: Hartford,

Kewaskum, Slinger, Newburg, Jackson, West Bend, Allenton, Richfield, Hubertus and Colgate.

"We've seen a pattern of increasing financial requests by our agencies. Cutbacks at the federal, state and local levels of government have put a bigger burden on the private sector for a larger portion of the programs and services our agencies provide," said Bloedorn. "The challenge is to evaluate the needs and then provide the necessary dollars through the annual campaign. The job the fund distribution volunteers perform is serious and has wide-ranging impact. It is an effective way to review what the needs are, and how well United Way dollars were spent in the past year," he said.

"In addition to reviewing agency budgets, the United Way Board of Directors is committed to making sure our local United Way maximizes its operating budget

through the use of volunteers and donations where possible. Our board is proud of our low administrative costs. Keeping costs as low as possible ensures that more dollars are available for the agencies. And that's good for all of us," commented Bloedorn.

"We are continually reinforcing the message that United Way dollars are raised by volunteers, and that decisions on how the dollars are distributed are made by volunteers as well. Donors should be assured that we have local control over how funds are raised and divided here in Washington County. Working together, volunteers in the fund distribution and campaign process continue to demonstrate that our United Way effort reflects the quality of our community," he said.

From the earliest school drawings by Marr as a child in Milwaukee during the 1860s to mature sketches done during the 1930s while the artist was in Munich, these drawings reflect the structure and nature of 19th-century academic art training as well as the artist's personal interests.

Scenic sketches of unsettled Northern Wisconsin, figure drawings, portraits, Bavarian village scenes, illustrations for publications and highly-personal greetings illustrated by the artist are included in this exhibition.

Marr's strong composition skills, fluid and sophisticated line quality, chiaroscuro, linear perspective and accurate rendering of proportions is evident in each of these works. Included are works on paper completed with conte crayon, graphite, pen and ink, pastel and charcoal.

Several of the drawings were done in preparation for paintings.

Visitors who compare the drawings to the paintings in the collection will see evidence of this.

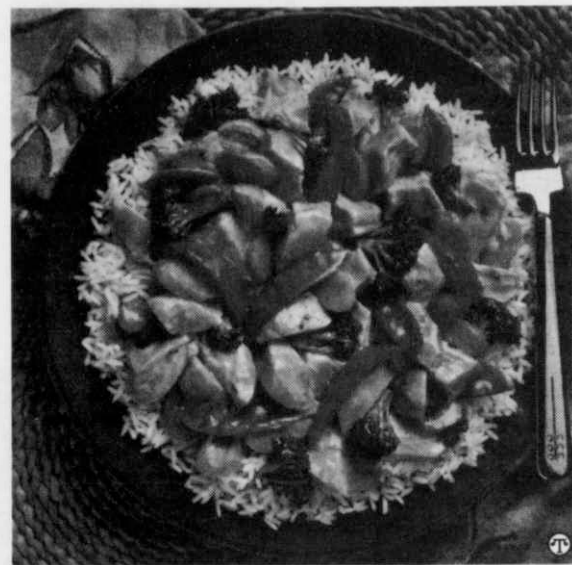

## What is Cerebral Palsy?

Cerebral palsy is a group of movement disorders resulting from damage to the brain that affects an individual's ability to move and to maintain posture and balance.

The brain injury can occur before birth, during birth, or within the first few years of life. Depending on the severity and location of brain damage, symptoms vary widely. About 500,000 Americans have some degree of cerebral palsy and about 3,000 babies are born each year with central nervous system disorders resulting in cerebral palsy. Another 1,000 acquire it in the first few years of life as a result of head injuries, infections of the brain and poisonings.

Cerebral palsy is not hereditary, contagious, progressive or a primary cause of death. The brain injury will not increase or worsen over time. The injury does not damage muscles or the nerves connecting them to the spinal cord -- only the brain's ability to control

the muscles. The ability to move our bodies to perform everyday functions is controlled by our brains.

The brain has three primary functions relative to movement -- (1) to interpret messages from the body about our internal and external environments; (2) to make decisions based on needs and information received, and (3) to send messages to the muscles which in turn move our body.

There are five different types of cerebral palsy, depending on the area(s) of the brain injury. Spastic (the most common type of cerebral palsy) results in tense, contrasted muscles; athetoid is evidenced by constant, uncontrolled motion of limbs, head, or eyes; ataxic cerebral palsy can mean a poor sense of balance, often causing falls and stumbles; rigidity manifests in tight muscles that resist efforts to make them move; and tremor results in uncontrollable shaking, interfering with coordination. The affects vary

from mild to severe and from person to person; some people have more than one type of cerebral palsy.

Because cerebral palsy influences the way children develop, it is known as a developmental disability. In the United States today, more people have cerebral palsy than any other developmental disability. About two children out of every thousand born in this country have some type of cerebral palsy. While treatment can relieve the symptoms of cerebral palsy, the disorder is a lifelong situation and affects a person to varying degrees throughout his or her life.

## What to Do If You're Away When a Tornado Threatens

### THIRD IN A SERIES

Although most people know where to seek shelter from a tornado in their own home, they become confused or panic if a warning is issued while they are at work, while shopping, or in their car, according to the Wisconsin Division of Emergency Government.

Some basic rules apply, no matter what your location. The best shelter is on the lowest level of a building, away from windows and doors. When possible, get beneath a sturdy piece of furniture. Protect your head and chest, since storm-related deaths are frequently due to injuries to these parts of the body.

If you're in a public building, look for a pre-designated shelter. Always stay inside the building. Don't run for your car, since you're generally safer inside a structure than in the open.

Beware of long-span roof areas, like those found in malls and gymnasiums. Instead, try to find a smaller room, such as a closet, restroom or storeroom. Stairwells also make good shelters.

In mobile homes or cars, leave them and find shelter in a building. If there is no nearby shelter, lie flat in the nearest ravine, ditch or culvert with your arms shielding your head. Keep alert for flash floods that often accompany such storms. Share your knowledge with those around you. Direct co-workers, companions, and fellow shoppers to safe shelters if they appear confused when a tornado threatens.

No one can stop a tor-

nado, but there are precautions you can take to safeguard lives and property.

### Tornado Watch/Warning

Do you know the difference between a tornado watch and a tornado warning? These terms are used by the National Weather Service and knowing what they mean can save your life.

A watch is issued when conditions are favorable for the development of tornadoes. If a tornado watch is issued for this area, you should get ready to take emergency action. When a tornado warning is issued, it means that a tornado has actually been spotted or seen on radar. The warning will tell you where the tornado is and the direction it is moving. If you are in or near its path, you should take shelter immediately.

**REMEMBER:** A tornado watch means that tornadoes are possible. A tornado warning means that a tornado has been spotted and may be heading your way. There may not be a tornado in your future, but don't bet your life on it.

"It doesn't make a lot of sense to buy an expensive new suit, a dress or a pair of shoes you'll only wear a few times if your glasses, something you'll wear often, do not look their best," says Norbeck.

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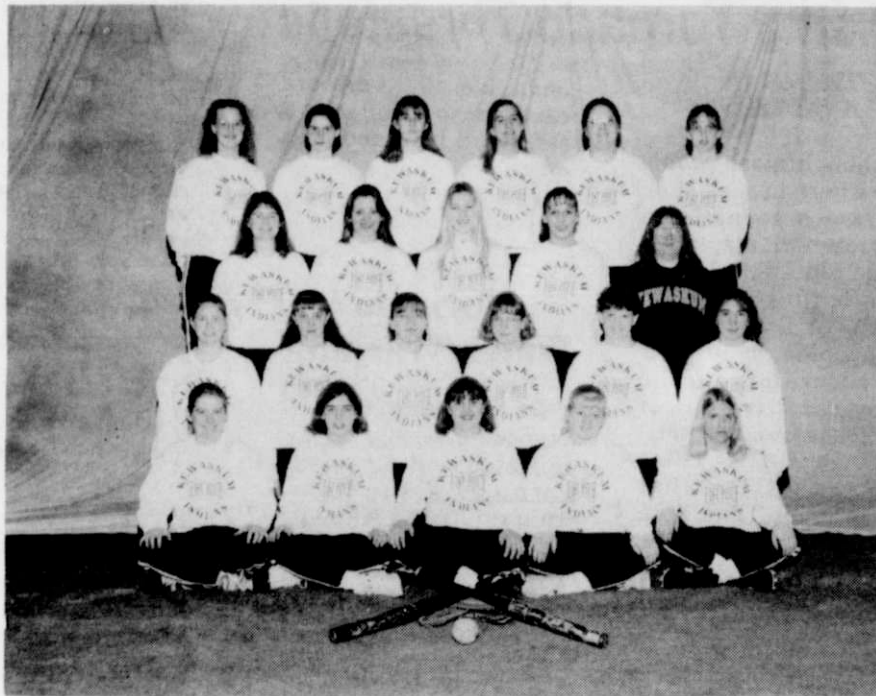

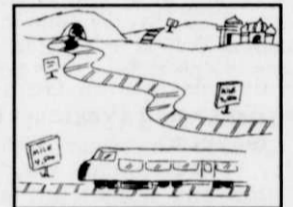

# KHS Girls Track Team Wins Second EWC Crown

"I told you so! I told you so!" That's what sophomore JoAnne Thull kept repeating as an excited team waited for the final results of the EW Conference track meet to be read over the PA system.

Unlike last year when the final standings were in doubt until the results were announced at the end of the meet, Thull and the rest of the Kewaskum girls track team already knew that they had successfully defended their EWC

crown.

As team results were announced throughout the meet, it became clear that the Kewaskum girls were clearly in control and would not be challenged. After seven events KHS already had a 23 point lead. By the 12th event, they led by 47, and by the 16th event they had pushed the lead to 53.

When it was all over, Kewaskum had won over second place New Holstein by a convincing 42 1/2 points, 143 - 103.5. It was the girls track teams' third title in seven years and the second in a row.

Kewaskum won six events, placed two people in eight events, and placed three people in one event. Leading the way for the Indians was junior Jenny Jagielski, who won both the 100 (12.92) and 200m (27.05) dashes, along with running anchor for the first place 800m relay team.

Joining Jenny as an individual conference champion was sophomore Carrie Wiesner who won both the 100m high hurdles and the 300m low hurdles. Carrie also ran on the first place 800m relay team (1:51.8) along with Jagielski, and seniors Jenny Strobel and Erin Stockhausen.

Katie Yogerst, as expected, also won an individual championship, winning the discus with a throw of 112'3", which was five feet further than second place Bohm of Two Rivers.

While winning events certainly makes any team stronger, it was the multiple places which Kewaskum had, which made them unbeatable. In the 100m high hurdles, KHS placed three people. First was Wies-

ner, fourth was junior Heather Downs (17.78), and sixth was sophomore JoAnne Thull (17.8), who pulled a hamstring in practice the night before, but decided to compete hurt.

The 200m dash provided a 1-2 finish as Erin Stockhausen finished right behind Jagielski for second place in a time of 27.63. Other double placings were: 100m dash - Jagielski - first, Strobel fourth (13.45); Discus - Yogerst first, Rachel Nysse, third (105'0"); Shot Put - Nysse, third (35' 3/4"); Yogerst, fifth (33'10"); 1600m run - Marni Lynn, second (5:23.94), Carol Neumann, fifth (5:28.98); 300m low hurdles - Wiesner, first, Jackie Michaels, fourth (51.53), and 800m run - Lynn, second (2:24.83), Neumann, sixth (2:35.27).

Lynn, who has missed most of the outdoor season because of illness, also placed fourth in the 3200m run (12:22.0). Senior Kelly Schreffler finished fourth in the high jump (4'8").

In the relays, the 800m relay placed first, and the 400m relay, second (Kenzie Downs, Ann Bodden, Strobel, Stockhausen) with a time of 53.84. The 1600m relay ran sixth (Bodden, Jessica Repovsch, Laura Weiss, Bridget Baum) in a time of 4:31.67, and the 3200m relay was seventh (Bodden, Weiss, Gaffke, Becky Repovsch) with a time of 12:12. Other members of the championship team who did not place were Jill Wichtowski and Kathy Deshotels.

It was a very strong team effort by a very strong team. The entire team rose to the occasion with many of the girls

having their best performance of the year. With three seniors, seven juniors, eight sophomores and three freshmen competing in the championship meet this year, the future looks very bright for the Lady Indians.

Winning the conference two years in a row is truly another step forward for the girls track team. The successes the girls have had over the years are a result of many things: positive attitudes, believing in themselves, hard work, having fun, leadership by upper classmen, and some very capable assistant coaches. These girls are champions both on and off the track and everyone at KHS is proud of them, especially their head coach.

# 1600m Relay Record Set at Conference Meet

KEWASKUM - The Kewaskum fans had to wait until the last race of the evening to see the host KHS boys team win an event. According to most people the wait was well worth it. The boys 1600m relay teams was seeded first in this event and wasted no time showing the rest of the Eastern Wisconsin Conference that they were definitely the team to beat.

Ryan Herman led off the relay with a very good 400 meters and then handed off to Joe Rettler who opened up an even bigger lead. Rettler then handed off to Aaron Kurth who lengthened the lead and then handed off to Matt Tonn, who finished over five seconds ahead of Sheboygan Falls.

The KHS 1600m relay's time of 3:31.3 broke the school record of 3:32.3, that they had set

only six days earlier at the Vanderpan Invitational at Sheboygan Falls. The previous record of 3:33.5 had been set back in 1980 by Joel Herriges, Scott Brendemihl, Jeff Decker and Steve Beck.

"Again the 1600m relay team ran fantastic," commented the boys coach, Jerry Gosa. "They have been working hard all season and I'm happy for them that they are running so well."

As of May 12th, Kewaskum's 1600m relay time of 3:32.3 ranked 12th overall and third in Division Two on the Wisconsin's Public High School Track and Field Honor Roll.

The 400m dash was also a definite highlight for Kewaskum with Matt Tonn placing second in 52.2 and Joe Rettler placing third in 53.2, both in personal best times. Tonn's 52.2 was only 0.1

off the school record 52.1 set by Miles Shaw in 1988. "Both Matt and Joe ran exceptionally strong races. They both placed higher than they were seeded in the event," reported a very pleased Coach Gosa.

The 400m relay unit of Andy Rix, Aaron Kurth, Brian Butschlick and Ryan Herman had apparently finished in second place in their season best time of 46.2, only to be disqualified after the race. One of the KHS runners had a different color t-shirt on beneath their uniform that caused the disqualification. "We spent a lot of time on Wednesday (the night before the meet) discussing the various rules concerning relays. Brian Butschlick placed fourth in the long jump with a distance of 18' 3/4", just 1/4' out of

third place and Brian Liegl placed fourth in the discus with a toss of 136'11". "We were hoping that both of them would place in the top three and thus earn themselves a medal, but it wasn't meant to be. They were disappointed, but they will bounce back," reported their coach.

Ryan Herman placed sixth in the 200m dash with a personal best time of 23.9 and sophomore Troy Staehler placed eighth in the 800m run with his personal best time of 2:12.2. "I give our athletes a lot of credit. Even though we are short on numbers and have underclassmen in many events, they give 100% effort," commented Coach Gosa.

In the final team standings, Two Rivers won the Conference Championship for the third year in a row with 152.5 points. Placing second was Plymouth with 132 points, Kiel was third with 108 points, Sheboygan Falls was fourth with 98 points, New Holstein

was fifth with 69.5 points, Chilton was sixth with 52 points, and Kewaskum seventh with 38 points.

On Monday, May 13th, the Kewaskum freshmen and sophomores traveled to Chilton for the co-ed Freshmen/Sophomore Conference Championships. Then on Thursday, May 16th, both the boys and girls varsity teams travel to Plymouth for the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Track Relays. Field Events start at 3:30 p.m. and running events start at 4 p.m.

On Monday, May 20, Kewaskum is at Mayville for Regionals. The top three individuals and relays at Regionals will advance to Sectionals on Thursday, May 23rd at Waterford.

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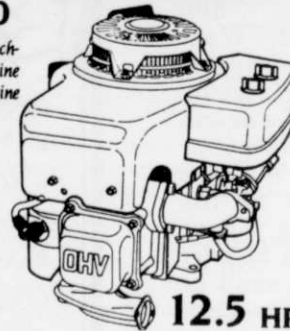


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
