## 'Medicare + Choice' Understanding Your Options

Did you know that last year Congress passed legislation which will increase your options for Medicare coverage? These changes will go into effect January 1, 1999. This legislation established a program called Medicare + Choice. With more options for you to choose from, it will be especially important for you to carefully consider if you should make a change.

If you are eligible for both Medicare Part A and Part B, you are also eligible for Medicare + Choice. You are eligible for a Medicare + Choice plan ONLY if it serves the geographic area where you live. If you are otherwise eligible, you may not be denied enrollment based solely on your health status.



# Sweet Success in Homemade Fudge At Parkview General Store

Wafting aromas of Amaretto Swirl, Cookies 'n Cream, Snickers and the infamous "Mauthe Lake Mud" are luring fudge connoisseurs to the hills of the Kettle Moraine these days.

Cooking up this sweet endeavor is Julia Desterhofs at Parkview General Store, equipped with a sparkling new stainless steel kitchen and a host of flavorful recipes too tempting to resist. Some are old-fashioned favorites like chocolate fudge and maple nut. Others are one of a kind and invite sampling, with hints of cranberries, cherries, caramel, candy bars and mint.

"It's exciting. It's really fun. It's a whole new thing for us to do," Julia says of the fudge business, which began operation on Memorial Day weekend this year. Catering to tourists and the local community, Parkview is a year 'round '90's style outfitters/country store located in the heart of the northern Kettle Moraine forest, across from the entrance to Mauthe Lake.

"We were looking for something to fill the gap between fall colors and the first snowfall," Julia relates. Having tossed around the fudge idea with her husband Mike, the couple got hooked after attending a trade show in Gatlinburg, Tennessee.

Trained through seminars and on site by sales representatives provided by the company, "Callico Cottage," Julia perfected her

candy making skills, rolled up her sleeves, and set to work using a big double boiler in the custom kitchen built by Mike according to USDA specifications. The kitchen replaced Parkview's video game corner.

The entire process takes about three hours and yields 120 pounds of buttery fudge, which Julia makes on a weekly basis. Preparing for the weekend's Kettle Kountry Kolors fall festival in Kewaskum, 180 pounds of fudge is in the works, available in seven different flavors.

The Desterhofs' product has been approved by the state as, "Something Special From Wisconsin," which allows them use of this special logo on their boxes of "Julia's Homemade Fudge." "It's reserved for smaller manufacturers of goods that include 50% Wisconsin based ingredients and labor," Mike points

out. Requiring both certification of ingredients and inspections, it also earns the business a directory listing in a state pamphlet and on an Internet web site featuring Wisconsin Made products.

"It's a useful marketing tool, and really very few people are involved with it yet," Mike states. "I like the recognizable logo. It sets us apart as having something special."

Julia's fudge business has broadened Parkview's marketing areas, and they're now delving into mail order, wholesale, and supplying to retail gift shops. Currently, the Desterhofs are working up a brochure for mail order fudge, looking into a corporate gift line, and inquiring about wholesaling for community and school fundraisers.

Fudge filled decorative coffee cups in birthday, holi-

day and all occasion themes are being packaged for sale this weekend at Kettle

Kountry Kolors. "They make great gifts for any age," Julia assures, hoping she's made enough for the growing demand. Otherwise, it's back to the kitchen, where the possibilities are endless and the end is sweet success.







# Perfect Day, Perfect Liftoffs

A perfect liftoff -- the balloon dubbed by a classmate as "the Buick of all hot air balloons" was, indeed, the one that appeared to sail highest and farthest.



This balloon with blue and black panels (made by Ben Carlson, Kurtis Cochran, Pat Enright, and Cory Darmody) was the largest balloon launched. It was also the largest of tasks to heat that much air.

The weather was perfect cloudless, with a slight breeze from the south-southwest. Eighth grade aeronautics engineers prepared to send their balloons up outside Kewaskum Middle School.

Student Scott Gillis summed up the day's plan this way, "We're just gonna launch them. When they come down, they come down. Well, that's if they go up."

As part of the "Transportation and Construction" class at KMS, students create hot air balloons by cutting out big panels of tissue paper and gluing them together. Once done, all that remains is to fill the balloons with heated air and send them up.

Crews filled their balloons over a stovepipe on a small gas stove as encour-

agement (and uncertainty) filled the air, with comments ranging from, "That one's the Buick of all hot air balloons," to "I'll bet it won't go up, too, and I'm in the group."

They all went up, though, some flying higher or farther or with more stability than others.

This year's class utilized several different sizes and shapes in creating their balloons -- including a mushroom-like balloon and a cigar-shaped one -- to see if there would be differences in lift and flight. Students found, however, that balloons that flew best were those of traditional design.

Future projects for the class are scheduled to include constructing and

propelling model airplanes and "rocket" cars, fueled by carbon dioxide gas.

For the moment, however, the day belonged to the eighth grade aeronautics engineers and the excitement -- and the pride -- they felt as their balloons headed off into a perfect blue sky.

## HINTS FOR HOMEOWNERS

### Fire Safety

(NAPS)—Here are some tips from fire prevention experts on keeping your family safe at home.

1. **Install and Maintain Smoke Detectors:** Most fire deaths and injuries occur at night when people are sleeping. Smoke and toxic gases kill quickly. Smoke detectors warn you of the presence of smoke before it reaches you. Install one on each level of the home, especially outside bedrooms.

2. **Plan Your Escape and Practice It:** If a fire occurs in your home, you won't have time to think about the best escape route. You and your family should draw a diagram of your home showing all exits. Plan two ways out of every room. Have a designated meeting place outside where the family can gather.

3. **Watch Out for Smokers:** Tens of thousands of home fires start every year because of discarded cigarettes. Have large, deep ashtrays for smokers, and put water on the butts for a minute or two before you put them in the trash. Never smoke in bed.

4. **Children and Matches Don't Mix:** Matches are dangerous for youngsters. Store smoking materials where children can't reach them. Teach children that matches and lighters are tools for adults, and not for youngsters to play with.

5. **Practice Barbecue Safety:** Lighting charcoal and gas grills with matches is a potentially dangerous proposition, experts say. The danger of burning your hand is great. The goal is to keep as much space between you and the grill as possible. The Aim n Flame from Scripto Tokai is a good substitute for matches. Its longer, rounded nozzle allows for greater ease in lighting barbecues and other hard-to-light places.

6. **Be a Cautious Cook:**

Always keep children out of the kitchen when you're cooking. Keep pot handles turned toward the back of the stove so they don't get knocked off. If a fire starts in the pan, slide a lid over the edge of the pan and turn off the heat.

7. **Use Electricity Safely:** Replace any frayed or damaged electrical cords. If an appliance smells like it is burning, unplug it immediately and have it repaired. Never overload electrical outlets, and never run an electrical cord under a rug.

8. **Crawl Low Under Smoke:** If you get caught in a smoke-filled room, get down on your hands and knees and crawl to the nearest exit. The cleanest air will be closest to the floor.

9. **Stop, Drop, Roll:** If your clothes catch on fire, don't run. Stop where you are, drop to the ground, and roll over and over. Cover your face with your hands to protect your face and lungs.

10. **Cool the Burn:** If you do receive a minor burn, run cool water on the burned area for ten minutes. This minimizes the severity of the burn, and eases the pain. Never put oils, butter or salve on a burn. This only traps in the heat and makes the burn worse. It also invites infection. Seek medical attention immediately.

One way parents can keep matches out of the home is switching to a utility lighter. The Scripto Tokai Aim n Flame uses a long, round nozzle for greater ease in lighting barbecues, fireplaces, and pilot lights with greater safety. Available nationally in supermarkets, hardware, drug and mass merchandise stores, the Aim n Flame has an on/off switch to help avoid unintentional lighting and a built-in hanger for storage up and away from children.

As for so very many of us, summer always seems to be "the visitor month" for those who come see every now and again from distant places and climes.



I admire my favorite song bird...little Jenny Wren. She's



S. Schwinn controlled serving. She had a total of three aces for the evening.


"Becky and Laura distributed the ball nicely, keeping Falls off balance." also said, Rizzardi.

The Indians traveled to New Holstein Tuesday and had a disappointing loss. The Huskies are last in the conference.


Tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 pm the girls play a double-header against first place Two Rivers.







# Indians Defeated by Powerful Roncalli, 47-26

If you like offense, you would have liked the first half of the Kewaskum High School football game last Friday night.

Kewaskum traveled to Memorial Field in Manitowoc to take on the Roncalli Jets, who are ranked sixth in the State for small schools, and had to be considered heavy favorites in this Eastern Wisconsin Conference contest.

The Indians had other ideas, however, as they took the opening drive and marched 63 yards on 10 rushing plays for the first score of the game. Dave Lettow scored his first varsity touchdown on a one yard run with 7:56 left in the quarter. The kick failed, but the Indians had the lead and a lot of momentum after they ran the ball right at the usually tough Jets defense.

Lettow and Jason Strobel both had runs of 20 yards before Lettow took it in. The opening drive fired up the defense as the Jets were able to only pick up one first down before they found themselves in a fourth and 13 situation and lined up to punt.

The snap from center was a little high however and the punter dropped the football, scooped it up, and headed around the right end, picking up 20 yards and a Jet first down.

It turned out to be a key play as the Jets then took the ball down the field and scored as Marc Wadzinski ran it in from the one, tying the score at 6-6. Chris Spears blocked the extra point try, one of three he would block on the night.

It was the first of six touchdowns that Wadzinski would have on the night. With six seconds left in the quarter, the Indians lined up at their own 46 after John Immel's 26 yard return.

On the very first play, Josh Gaffke found Jason

Strobel up the right sideline for a 54 yard touchdown pass. Chris Koth's kick made it 13-6 in favor of the Indians after one quarter of play.

The second quarter saw the Jets take the ball down the field converting several fourth down plays to get the lead for the first time. Again it was Wadzinski scoring from the one and the two point conversion made it 14-13 in favor of the Jets.

After Immel's 15-yard kickoff return put the ball on the Indian 49 yard line, it took only two plays for the Indians to score again, and regain the lead. On second and 13, Clint Herrick took a pitch from Gaffke and raced around the right end 54 yards for another Indian score. The kick was no good after a bad snap, but the Indians had the lead 19-14 and were playing well.

The Jets however, were unstoppable as they continued to move the ball through the air. Again they moved the ball down the field as Jason Kowalski hauled in a 19 yard pass and with the two point conversion, led 22-19, as the half ended.

The Indians held the powerful running game of the Jets to 53 yards and Marc Wadzinski who was fourth in the conference in rushing, to 35 yards on 15 carries in the first half. Meanwhile, the Indians rushed for 135 yards in the first half.

The second half began with the Jets marching the ball down the field with

Wadzinski scoring from the four, making it 28-19. After a punt by the Indians, the Jets once again went down and scored (34-19) on a nine yard Wadzinski run and, with it, went the spirit of the Kewaskum players.

Roncalli would score two more touchdowns, including a 55 yard run by Wadzinski. The Indians only had the ball for seven plays in the third quarter, as they watched Roncalli offense chew up the clock. Roncalli did not punt the ball the entire game while the Indians punted three times and gave it up twice on interceptions.

The Indians did score once more late in the fourth quarter as Clint Herrick ran it in from the two, with Koth's kick making the final score, 47-26.

Head Coach Perry Koth said this about the game, "We had a great first half as we scored every time we had the ball. Our offensive line Brian Prost, Scott Willkomm, Nick Martin, Scott Schreffler, Adam Sauer, Jon Ratzel, Corey Radtke, Tim Bonlender and John Warnecke did a great job."

Dave Lettow led the Indians in rushing with 95 yards on 11 carries, while Herrick and Strobel had 67 and 49 yards on seven and eight carries respectively. Gaffke was 7 for 12 passing for 98 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions. Warnecke caught four passes for 37 yards while Strobel had three catches for 61 yards and one touchdown.

The Indians ended up with 298 yards of total

offense while Roncalli finished with 436. Roncalli quarterback Tom Gahl passed for 254 yards on 17 of 21 throws.

This Friday is homecoming as the Indians host Two Rivers. Game time is 7 p.m.

hedge hog, ostrich, alligator, snake, bat and armadillo. Shows are scheduled at noon and 3:30 p.m. on Sunday.




