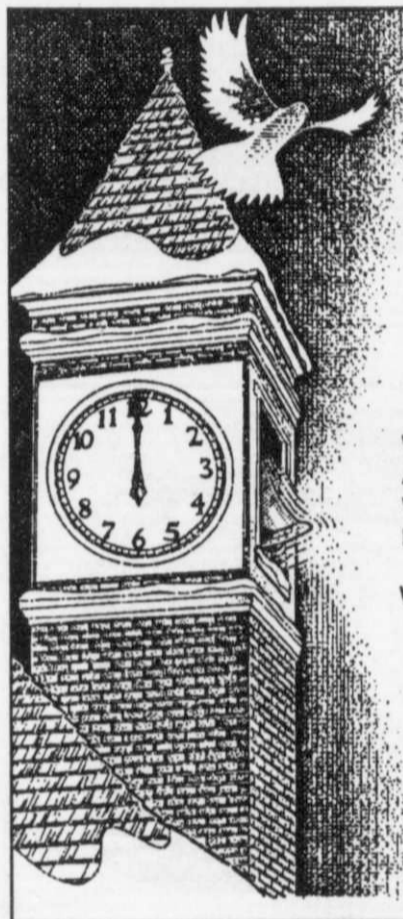

Silver Platter Opens Monday

Tammy and Roy Garbisch of Kewaskum will officially be in business beginning January 4th at 6 a.m. when the Silver Platter Family Restaurant opens its doors to morning customers.

The new restaurant is located at 1041 Fond du Lac Avenue (formerly Eckl's) in Kewaskum, and has experienced a "roll-up-your-sleeves" makeover/remodeling/cleanup marathon this past month.

"We've been working since December 1 to get the place ready. There's a lot to do when you open any business," Tammy explained.

The Garbischs had been

searching for the right place to open their own restaurant for the past five years. "Nothing has really panned out until this spot opened up," she said. The couple lease the building from Russ Heberer.

Working in the same line of business for the past 12 years, Tammy brings with her expertise in cooking, managing and waitressing. For the past two summers she operated a seasonal drive-in at a local resort.

Traditional tried and true recipes have been passed down to Tammy from her friend and mentor, Ruth Campbell (former owner of Campbell's Village Inn, now the Kewaskum Kafe) and Carrie Struebing.

Homemade dinners, pies, breads and desserts will be featured on the menu for breakfast, lunch and dinner.

The Silver Platter Family Restaurant will be open daily Monday through Saturday from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Sunday from 6 a.m. to 3 p.m.



New Town of Scott Assessor Recommended to Board

A citizens committee, headed by Dallas Wixom, is reviewing qualifications in an effort to select a new assessor, whose name will be recommended to the Scott Town Board for a final decision. Three assessing firms are being considered.

Wixom said that his committee feels it is important that the chosen assessor should have knowledge of the area which he or she is assessing and understand town assessing as opposed to village or city assessing. A decision is expected for the January meeting.

Beginning in the new year, Zoning and Variance Fees will be raised to \$150 per application.

An unnamed resident who has been ignoring regulations at the recycling center, will be having a visit from two town officers in an attempt to explain the importance of complying with the town's recycling ordinance.

It appears that on numerous occasions, this resident and sometime her young son, appear at the recycling center with their garbage in a bag of their choice, dump whatever they have into the dumpster, ignoring separation rules and then leaving 50 cents with the attendant to compensate for their actions.

Town of Scott regulations

require that all persons who use the facility are to purchase bags imprinted with the "Scott" name on them to be used for collecting each individual's garbage and recycle material.

The money obtained from the sale of these bags is used to offset the costs of operating the center. Bags come in two sizes: a small one for 50 cents and a large one for \$1.00.

If this action is not effective, the board is considering that \$200 dollars be added to the violator's tax roll each time the regulations are ignored. Further action will be taken at the January meeting.

Winter recycling hours go into effect next month. During the months of January, February and March, the Recycling Center will be open every other Saturday. Open dates are January 2, 16, 30, February 13, 27 and March 13 and 17. Discarded Christmas trees can be brought to the town hall any time between January 2nd and 16th and piled next to the salt shed on that property.

Glen Karass questioned the board on action taken by building inspector Frank Mayer who has refused to issue him a building permit for a house which Karass intends to move into the Town of Scott from the Village of Random Lake.

Mayer explained his action stating that he is

unable to issue the permit because Karass has not obtained a sanitary permit. The access to the lot which he has purchased from David Stange, Hwy. 28, does not meet the 60 foot width right of way, making this a substandard or non-conforming lot.

Karass faces another obstacle to his plans in that the house was to be removed from its location in the village by December 15th. He has paid for the house and paid in advance for the moving expenses and now has no place to go with it until he is in compliance with the zoning ordinance.

He was advised to obtain an attorney to assist him in this matter. As far as the town board goes, there was nothing that it could do for him at the present time.

With the appointment of a new Clerk/Treasurer not far off the board is looking for ideas on improving the office space at the Town Hall and to remodel the existing office and small meeting room. At the present time interviews are underway to hire a deputy treasurer to assist during the tax season. The Clerk/Treasurer appointment goes into effect on the 13th of April.

A conditional use permit was issued to Scott Fechter to allow a house to be built on 70 acre parcel in Section 34, zoned as A-1. A petition

by Beth Bales for a zoning change from A-2 to A-6 which will allow a 4.68 acre parcel to be split was granted. The lot had been split nearly 20 years ago but the zoning change was never implemented. The lot is in Section 29.

Action to add an addendum to the zoning ordinance which was defeated at the November meeting was reconsidered and "acknowledging the wish of the people of the town expressed in the recent survey" was approved at this meeting.

Resolutions to contract with the Beechwood Fire Department, Batavia Fire Department and Batavia First Responders was approved. Contracts will be negotiated in January.

Poll workers chosen for the 1999-2000 term include Reuben Harter, Alice Harter, Adeline Held, Irene Giese, Merly Melius, Patty Schaller, Carol Prom, Barb Laux, Russell Melius, Marion Becker and Ione Wheeler.

Two alternatives were considered in settling an overcharge of taxes to Dennis Janz. This has occurred for the past two years due to an error made on Janz's lot assessment. Lowering the assessment for two years so Janz could recover the \$726.69 overcharge was one alternative, the other was to pay him that amount out of the gen-

eral fund. In order to settle the matter as quickly as possible, the board chose the second alternative.

Remaining tax collection hours at the town hall will be on December 30 and 31, from 8 to 11 a.m. and on January 9, 16, 23, and 30th from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Dog licenses can also be renewed at these times. Proof of vaccination must be shown.

A beer license was issued to the Beechwood Nite Flyers for their brat fry on January 17.

Night of Love

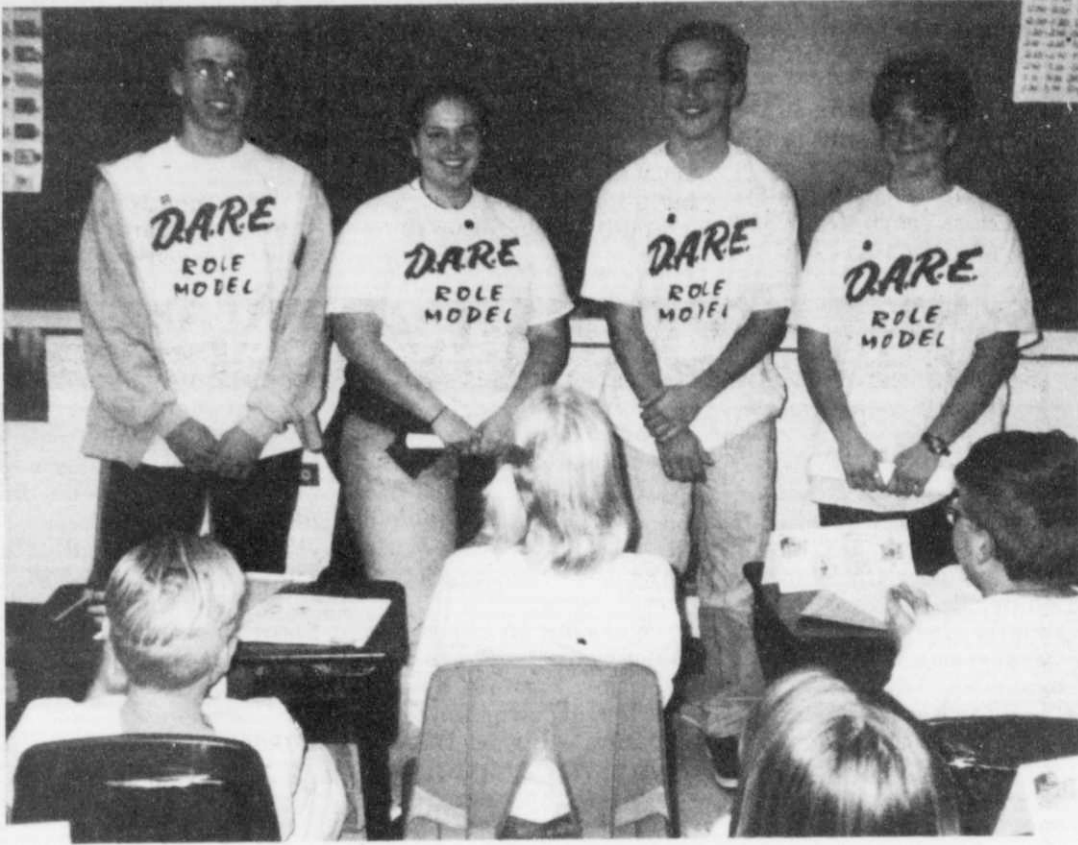
St. Mary's Parish, Little Kohler, (Mission of St. Rose, Fredonia), is sponsoring an all night vigil of the Blessed Sacrament.

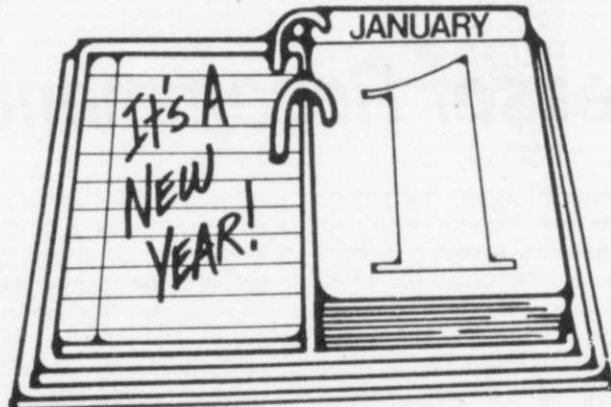
D.A.R.E. Role Models Present Program at Farmington School

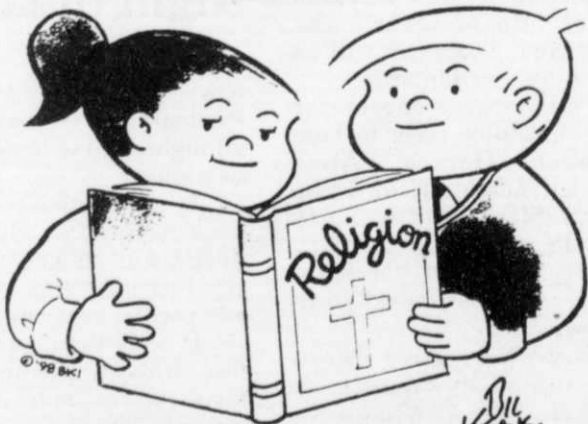

Also this evening the audience will be blessed by singer/songwriter Kim Stout from Freeport, Illi-

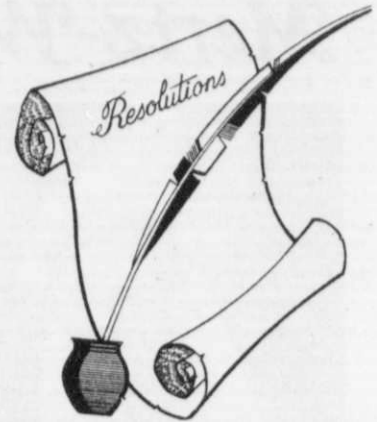

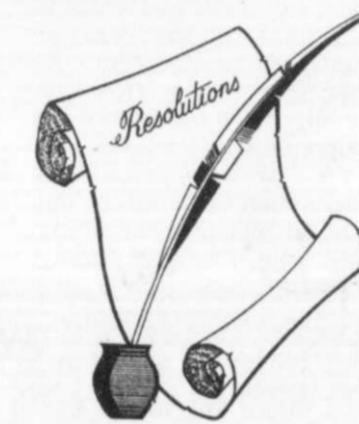

January 15 is Deadline for 1999 Bear Harvest Permit Applications

The 1999 bear season will see a similar number of permits available as in 1998. The application deadline for Class A licenses is January 15.

Hunters will find a new box to check on application forms for 1999 and should know sooner if they have drawn a harvest permit. The new box on the application is referred to as "Class A License Refusal and Preference Acceptance." This new box allows hunters who want to maintain their preference points but for whatever reason won't be hunting during the 1999 season to indicate their intentions and avoid time consuming additional mailings.

"In recent years it's taken three separate drawings to issue the Class A licenses (harvest permits)," explained Mytton. "The process would start in December and would not finish until the end of May. This occurred because thousands of applicants that were offered Class A licenses declined them. Although the process worked, it left many of the 44,000 plus applicants wondering if they were going to receive a permit or not. Also, if permits

were still available after the third drawing they were not issued, making it difficult to harvest the prescribed quota of bears.

"If an applicant checks the box 'Class A License Refusal and Preference Acceptance' on the application, they'll be in the drawing for available Class A licenses but if selected will receive a preference point instead of the option to purchase a Class A license in 1999. Essentially, this will give applicants an opportunity to turn back their Class A license before they're offered it. The purpose of this option is to sort out applicants that are not interested in purchasing a Class A license in 1999."

Also new for 1999, applicants have the option of applying as a group. Up to four hunters can apply together. The group will be treated as one applicant. If applicants have different preference status, the lowest preference will be used for the group. Remember that one applicant in the group needs to be the "group leader" and the rest of the group will use the group leader's application number.

For hunters who have

applied for a Class A bear license within the last three years, renewal applications will be arriving soon. New applicants can get an application form at any DNR service center. Applicants are urged to remember to include the \$3.00 application fee with their application to make the application valid.

Next year's bear hunting season dates will vary by zone as well as whether hunters hunt over bait or with hounds. The seasons will run during the period from September 11 through October 8 with those hunting with dogs receiving permits to hunt first in those zones where hunting with dogs is allowed.

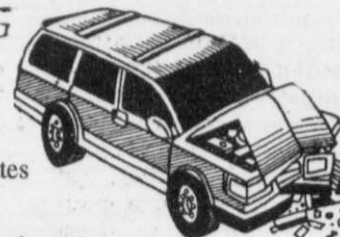

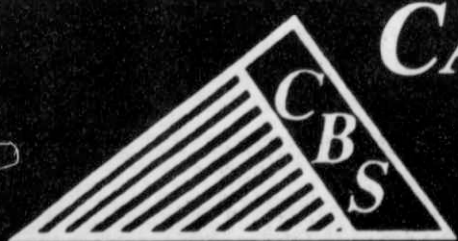
