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Drug Paraphernalia Found in KHS Student's Car

An 18 year-old Kewaskum High School senior is facing charges for possessing drug paraphernalia.

Kewaskum High School principal Robert Ganka told the Statesman Monday "we received a tip, followed up on it and took the appropriate action."

The tip given by a high school student stated that there was a drug transaction to take place at the high school.

The information was then passed on to the school's liaison police officer, Troy Ellis.

A search of the suspect's vehicle led to the discovery of a 12" marijuana pipe with burnt residue and a 5" marijuana pipe also with burnt residue. Also found was a pack of cigarette rolling papers.

The student admitted to smoking marijuana in the past but was not involved in any drug sale.

The teen was issued a citation and received an immediate out of school suspension and faces an expulsion hearing.

Police chief Richard

Knoebel stated that having the liaison officer in the school has helped a lot. Knoebel commented "We have been able to apprehend more individuals with Troy in the schools," he further stated "drug use has not visibly gone up in the schools, but we know it is present."

West Bend Police Department Hosts Law Enforcement Memorial

Police officers from the entire county, including state patrol officers, gathered Monday at the Washington County Fair Park Pavilion to celebrate Police Week and Peace Officers Memorial Day.

A crowd of over 50 atten-

dees, most of whom were retired law enforcement officers and their families, assembled. Also attending were families of Washington County's two fallen officers.

Germantown Police officer Robert Backes was killed in the line of duty March 21, 1981 when he stopped to assist a motorist who had been driving with a flat tire. The motorist then attacked Officer Backes resulting in a struggle between the motorist and the officer. During that struggle the two fell to the roadway and were struck and killed by a passing motorist.

Backes was 35 years old and a 12 year veteran of the Germantown Police Department.

Kewaskum native John M. Schmitt, who was killed in the line of duty on September 7, 1998, was also honored. Schmitt was a passenger in a squad that was answering a call for mutual aid from the Kewaskum Police Department. Prior to arriving in Kewaskum the squad was involved in a multi-vehicle rollover accident. Schmitt

died as a result of the injuries he sustained in the accident.

Officers participating in the ceremony wore a black band over their badges to symbolize mourning for fallen officers.

"National Police Week" was enacted October 1, 1962 in the Congress of the United States. This resolution authorized then President of the United States, John F. Kennedy, in 1963, to proclaim May 15th of each year as Peace Officers Memorial Day, and the calendar week of each year during which May 15th occurs as Police Week.

The preceding week is "Correctional Officers" week.

Each year people across the country gather during the week to honor those who serve their communities through law enforcement and to remember those who gave the ultimate sacrifice.

The First Recognition of Police Week and Peace Officers Memorial Day—Public Law 87-54, signed by President Kennedy in 1961 states:

"Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that the week of May 13-19, 1962, is hereby designated as Police Week, in recognition of the contribution the police officers of America have made to our civilization through their dedicated and selfless efforts in enforcing the laws

School Releases Results of Start Day Survey

The Kewaskum School District has released results of their school start survey.

Results from the survey came at deadline Wednesday morning from superintendent of schools Wayne Graczyk. He was unavailable to comment on the results.

The results will be reviewed with the public and the school board at the monthly board meeting Monday evening at 7 pm.

Comments from district residents sent a clear message to eliminate the week long Easter vacation. Most agree students should be given a 1/2 day on Holy Thursday, and remain off until the following Tuesday.

Total amount of surveys mailed to district residents were 426. Over half, 227 wanted to begin school after September 1. One hundred stated they thought school

should begin the fourth week of August. Ninety two want school to begin the third week in August. Seven individuals returned them without a preference indicated.

One resident commented "Students do not need the Easter break, this is a mindset that the teachers have from their college days. The teachers were spoiled with this spring party time and now they think it is their privilege to have this when they are an adult employee. I do not know any other type of employment where this happens. The teachers have all summer to take a vacation or pick up extra training."

Staff members returned 177 surveys. A clear difference was made between staff members and district residents on the issue of beginning school after September 1. Only 32 staff members liked this option. The favorite, to begin the

fourth week of August, was agreed to by 92 staffers. Fifty three want school to begin the third week in August.

Many of the staff members surveyed wished to keep the week long Easter break.

One staff member wrote, "I have learned the value of having a week-long spring or Easter break. Being face to face for seven months tends to build up a lack of tolerance for each other. A week long break forces you to get out of your daily routine, thus you come back more ready to give the last push to the end of the year. Without the length of vacation, you're still in the same routine, still less tolerant and not any more ready for the push to end strong."

Two hundred forty three district parents also agreed that school should begin after September 1. One hundred thirty nine thought school should begin the

SFC William Ida to Present Memorial Day Address Here

On Monday, May 28, the Robert G. Romaine Post No. 384 of the American Legion will hold their annual Memorial Day Parade and ceremonial program.

The parade to honor those who gave their lives will be held at 9 a.m. beginning at the Kewaskum High School and proceeding to the American Legion on Fond du Lac Avenue in Kewaskum. A short memorial service will be held there.

The Memorial Day address will be delivered by SFC William J. Ida. Ida was born in Puyallup, Washington, and was raised about 20 miles outside of Great Falls, Montana near Morony Dam on the Missouri River.

He enlisted into the United States Army in December of his senior year at Great Falls High School where he graduated. He attended basic and initial entry training at Fort Benning, Georgia and his first assignment stationed him in Heilbronn, West Germany, where he traveled throughout Europe while serving as a Light Infantryman, and later as a scout for the 2nd of the 4th Infantry.

While assigned there, SFC Ida attended NATO Site Security Course training, platoon confidence training, and earned the coveted Expert Infantryman's Badge and the Silver German Protectors Badge.

His next assignment took him to Fort Riley, Kansas. While at Fort Riley, he worked as a 77F for Headquarters Company of 5th of the 16th Infantry. SFC Ida shortly after was selected as the 1st Brigade Commanders Driver and was directly responsible for all the command vehicles, equipment and personnel.

During this time, SFC Ida courted and married his wife Stacy A. Neal. He later was assigned to A Company 5th of the 16th Infantry as a Dismounted Squad Leader. He was charged to lead his dismounted squad through Desert Storm/Shield.

SFC Ida was decorated with the Combat Infantryman's Badge for his efforts during Desert Storm/Shield and appointed as the Platoon Leaders gunner for the redeployment from Southwest Asia.

Once back on American soil, he was placed in charge of a Bradley Section. SFC Ida participated in several field-training exercises, some of which being five rotations to the National Training Center, Cadre on the EIB Committee, Reserve training in Fort Stewart, Georgia, and numerous gunnery exercises in which he and his various crews scored Distin-

guished.

While at Fort Riley, he attended several other courses along with graduating from Kansas State University.

SFC Ida also attained the Army Recruiting Course that took him, his wife and newborn son, Ethan, to Sacramento Recruiting BN with duty in Redding, California. SFC Ida earned the Gold Recruiting Badge with three sapphires and the coveted Army Recruiting Ring but most importantly, SFC Ida's wife gave birth to a beautiful baby girl Abigail.

After three years of recruiting, SFC Ida was a MUNCHU of the 2nd of the 9th Infantry stationed in South Korea, 13 kilometers from the DMZ. While in Korea he attended Combat Lifesavers Course, Small Group Instructors Course and the Consideration of Others Course.

From here he was stationed in Fort Carson, Colorado in the 1st of the 8th Infantry as the Assistant Operation NCO for the Battalion.

While there, SFC Ida attended Microsoft NT, Microsoft Word, Microsoft Excel, Microsoft Access and the second Army Recruiting Course prior to him returning to the Milwaukee Recruiting Battalion with duty in West Bend, Wisconsin.

Since he has been in the Milwaukee Recruiting Battalion, he has attended Advance Noncommissioned Officer School, US Army Recruiting Station Commanders Course.

SFC William J. Ida's awards include the Army Service Ribbon, National Defense Medal, Liberation of Kuwait Medal, Southwest Asia Liberation Medal, Southwest Asia Campaign Medal with three bronze stars, three NCO Professional Development Ribbons, four Good Conduct

Medals, five Army Achievement Medals, five Army Commendation Medals, The German Silver Protectors Badge, The Expert Infantryman's Badge, The Combat Infantryman's Badge, The Valorous Unit Award, and the Superior Unit Award.

SFC Ida enjoys sporting activities such as hunting, fishing, golfing, climbing, and paintball. He is the Chairman of the Army Cub Scout troop located in Kewaskum, is actively involved with the West Bend Jaycees and is a member of Our Savior's Lutheran Church. He strongly believes that instilling family values and sound leadership within today's youth will make a better tomorrow for all to appreciate.

His future goals include returning back to college and getting his degree in accounting.

of our cities, counties, and States of the United States regardless of the peril or hazard to themselves, and May 15th is hereby designated as Peace Officers Memorial Day in honor of the Federal, State, and municipal peace officers who have been killed or disabled in the line of duty. Through their enforcement of our laws our country has internal freedom from fear of the violence and civil disorder that is presently affecting other nations.

"To this end, the President is authorized and requested to issue a proclamation inviting the people of the United States to observe such period, with appropriate ceremonies and activities, as a tribute to the men and women who, day and night, stand guard in our midst to protect us through enforcement of our laws, and to honor those who have lost their lives in service to the community.

This year's memorial service was hosted by the West Bend Police Department. Chief Lloyd R. Uelmen was master of ceremonies.

The two fallen officers were honored by a wreath from each of their departments.

Guest speakers included Washington County Board

of Supervisors Chairman, Ken Miller.

The foundation of Miller's speech was that no matter what the situation calls for, no one in law enforcement backs away.

He continued "We as citizens thank you, God bless all of you in law enforcement."

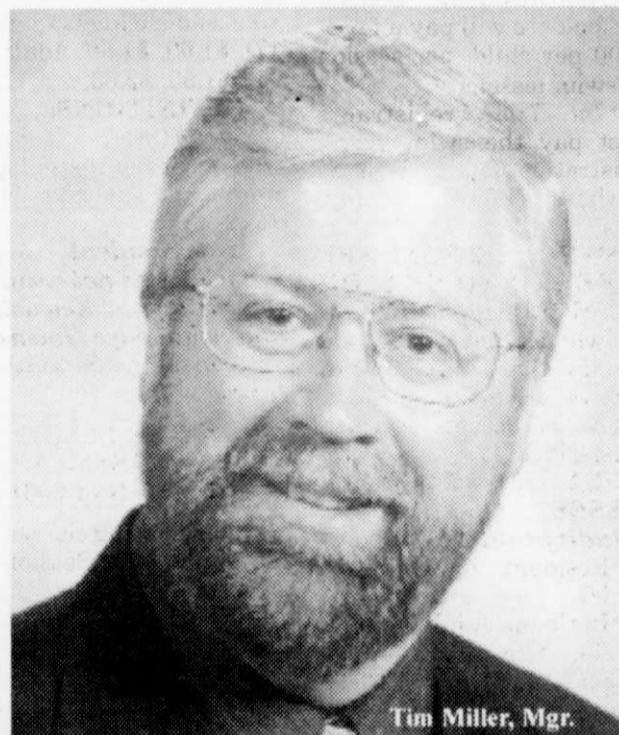

Anderson Sentenced to 12 Months Jail for KHS Vandalism

Exactly a year ago the Statesman broke the story to it's readers about a vandalism that took place at Kewaskum High School, Monday, May 15 2000. At that time it was unknown who the vandal was but it took only a short time for the Kewaskum Police Department to find one individual who had a hand in the senseless act.

A jury only took 30 minutes back in March to convict the Kewaskum teen who was alleged to have ransacked certain areas of the high school, mostly in the teacher's lounge where cabinets and a microwave were destroyed. The school's main office was also ravished. Access was gained through an open gym door.

Eric Anderson was sentenced to a 12 month jail term, three months without Huber privileges and probation. Anderson must also

pay restitution to the school district and get his high school equivalency diploma.

Anderson was also alleged to have another individual with him during the destructive spree, but there was a lack of evidence to prosecute a second party.

Damages to the school are estimated at \$9,800 according to school officials.

Garlic Rosemary Potatoes

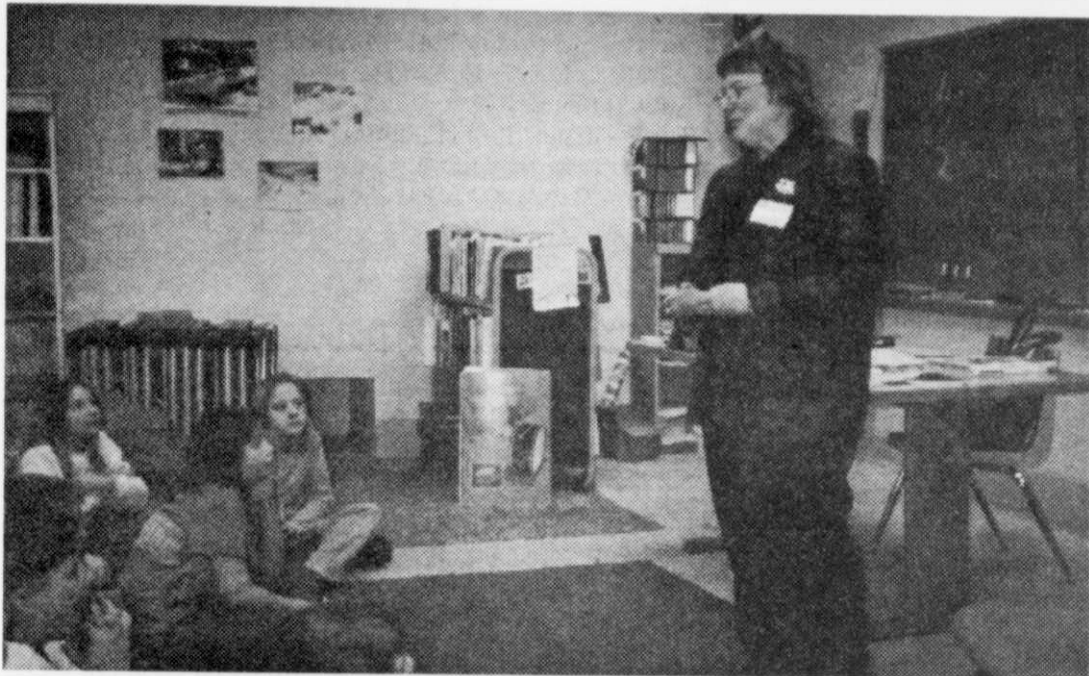

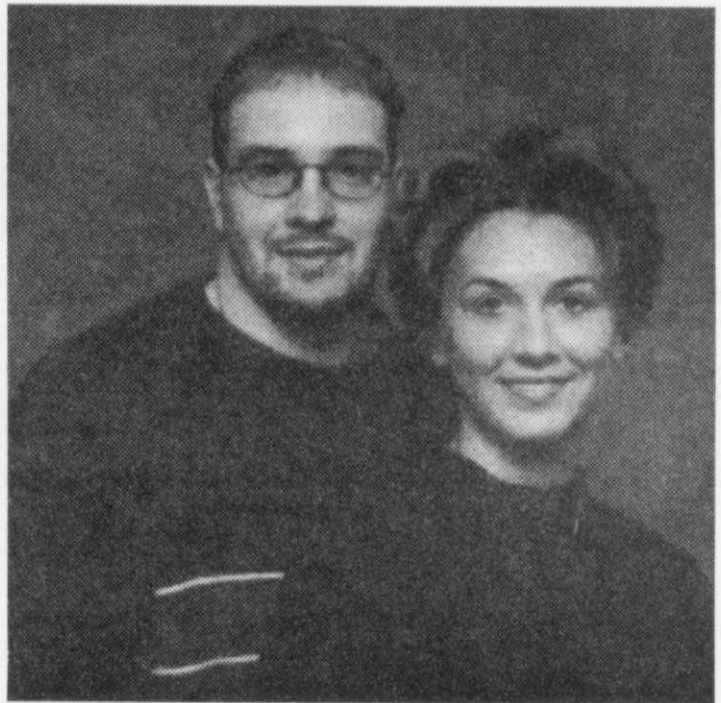

UWWC to Break Ground May 23 On New Science Building

WEST BEND -- The University of Wisconsin-Washington County will begin construction of its new science building in groundbreaking ceremonies now set for 11 a.m. Wednesday, May 23, at the university.

Speaking at the ceremony will be Bob Ramsthal, president of the UWWC University Council; Dr. William Messner, chancellor of the University College system; Ken Miller, chairman of the Washington County Board of Supervisors; Michael Miller (no relation), West Bend Mayor; Ms. Megan Camin, president of UWWC's Student Government Organization, and Dr. Joel Rodney, UWWC Dean and CEO.

Construction on the new science wing is expected to begin May 29, with completion set for late 2002.

"This is good news for the students who will be coming

here to study in state-of-the-art facilities," said Rodney. "It's also good news for the employers of the area, who are going to be getting graduates with a world-class UW education on their resumes."

Rodney said the project has presented the area with further good news, as well.

Construction bids, accepted by the University Board of Commissioners Monday, came in \$1.4 million lower than originally expected.

Initial estimates set the total price of the new building, plus remodeling and repair of the older buildings, at about \$9.6 million. However, bids now set the total project cost at about \$8.2 million.

Additionally, \$950,000 in private donations and pledges have cut public funding down to \$7.3 million.

Rodney said the unanticipated cost savings may also

allow the university to speed up badly needed repairs, which originally had been set for funding between 2003-2005. Now under consideration for accelerated repairs are a leaking roof, several massive air conditioning units, the 20-year-old gymnasium floor and the school's front entrance.

RECYCLING TIPS

ALUMINUM BEVERAGE CONTAINERS AND TIN & STEEL CANS

TYPE OF ALUMINUM: Aluminum cans generally used in the beverage industry.

TYPE OF TIN/STEEL: Tin cans generally used in the food industry.

PREPARATION: Simply empty, rinse and remove any labels. This is the most important aspect of a successful recycling program. Aluminum, steel and tin containers that are contaminated with residue cannot be recycled.

Place aluminum, tin or steel containers in your dark green recycling bin or blue recycling bag. Flattening containers, although not necessary, will save space in your recycling bin or bag. Place the bin or bag at the curb on the same day that your solid waste is to be collected. Pick up will be Wednesdays for both solid waste and recyclables. Multi-family dwelling of six or more, remember, your recycling pick up will be the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month.

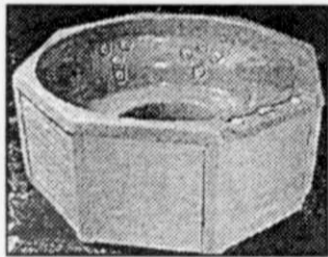

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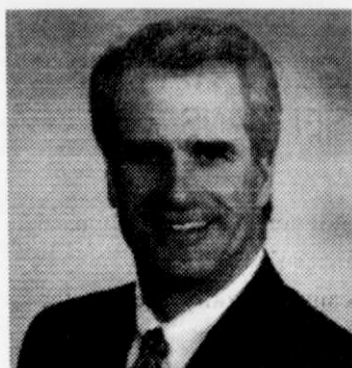
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Ziegler Named to West Bend Savings Bank Board

Read any good books lately?

I am asked this often by friends of mine who seem to think that I do nothing but read. Of course, this belief had been fostered by my insistence, for years, that a good book is the best kind of entertainment, that books somehow convey knowledge intrinsically in a way that is absent in other forms of diversion. I am no longer such a print romantic, but I do believe in the value of becoming engrossed in a good piece of fiction. It not only stimulates the learning of grammar, spelling, structure, plot, character development, etc., but it also fosters your imagination. Stephen King expounds on this in his auto-biographical/writing manual *On Writing*. He writes a scene into existence that forces the reader to see what he sees. Reading has that mystical connection between author and reader. Reading also relays the ancient art of storytelling. Granted, most tribal storytelling was verbal rather than written communication, but the idea remains similar. One person, the writer, passes a story to another, the reader.

All of that is to admit this: No, I've not read any good books lately. Which is a half-truth. I've read some good books: Dave Eggers' *A Heartbreaking Work of Staggering Genius*, David Sedaris' *Me Talk Pretty One Day*, Humphrey Carpenter's *The Inklings* but these are not the kind of books people mean when they ask if I've read anything good. They mean fiction, and not just any fiction, but those few authors who end up every quarter, whether their book is good or not, on the NYT Best-seller list. The truth is, I don't read a whole lot of fiction anymore much less the *Grisham/Higgins Clark/Parker/Binchy* kind. Not that I necessarily avoid best-selling mainstream fiction, it just doesn't appeal to me. Besides it's easier to say No than to explain the post-modern irony of Eggers' autobiography or the spiritual connection I feel with C.S. Lewis. It's easier to pre-

tend that I haven't gotten any new music lately than to reveal my affinity for trip-hop, acid jazz, indie rock, and folk music. I don't recommend movies because I don't want to explain that most of the films I see are either in subtitles or end with a rain of frogs.

So what's the point of all this? Am I just trying to gain attention for my preference of alternative and art culture? Partly. But I also want some help from the community. I can only write so many extended metaphors about reading, so I'd like to occasionally use this column for review of new materials, fiction and non-fiction, children's, young adult, magazines, videos, etc., by members of the community. And you know who you are. Most likely the same people (or only people) who read this column are the ones who routinely check-out several new books each week. Ackerman's Grove County Park Grand Opening Held

The Washington County Planning and Parks Department celebrated the successful completion of the Phase 1 construction of Ackerman's Grove County Park with a grand opening Tuesday afternoon, May 15, as part of the County Board meeting. The park is located just several miles southwest of West Bend at 4875 Cty. Hwy. Z in the Town of Polk.

The property contains 73 acres, including 15 acres of forested land and three acres of wetland. The park has over 1500 feet of Little Cedar Lake frontage. The new facilities include picnic areas, play equipment, a heated reservable shelter with a deck that overlooks Little Cedar Lake, handicapped accessible fishing pier, swimming beach, flush restroom and boat launches.

There is also a wet detention pond to reduce sedimentation and improve the water quality of Little Cedar Lake. The property boasts many spectacular views of the lake.

The property had been in the Ackerman family since the early 1860s. Louis and Helen Ackerman had owned the property since 1944. Before 1930, the Ackerman family began to lease a portion of the property near Little Cedar Lake for cot-

tages and mobile homes purchased by the tenants.

In the early 1950s, the Ackerman's added a boat launch business including piers to allow people access to Little Cedar Lake for fishing. There were 17 cottages located on the property.

The original property was purchased from the Ackerman's in September 1998. An additional 10 acres adjoining the park was purchased from the Thoma family in June 1999. Washington County received \$450,000 in Stewardship and Lake Protection grants from the Department of Natural Resources toward the acquisition of Ackerman's Grove County Park.

Continuing projects at the park include the development of hiking trails, prairie restoration projects, addition of the Little Cedar Lake Protection and Rehabilitation District storage building, addition of plantings along the shoreline to help reduce runoff, a new stair access from the bathroom to the beach, a walk from the bathroom to the shelter, access walk from the beach to the fishing pier and launch and construction of a soccer complex.

Plans are already underway for the construction of a

soccer complex located along Cty. Hwy. Z that will contain two match fields, four practice fields and several warm up areas. The plans for this area also include two storm water ponds, prairie restoration areas, berm with plantings along Cty. Hwy. Z and areas for temporary concessions, picnic area, portable restrooms and a future picnic shelter and playground.

There is no entrance fee to Ackerman's Grove. There is a \$5 boat launch fee. Park hours are 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. seven days a week.

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Alfalfa Scissors Cutting Program to Be Held In County

Proper timing of the cutting of first crop alfalfa hay can have an impact on forage quality and the profitability of dairy and livestock operations. The alfalfa scissors cutting project will be held in Washington County again this year to help you monitor the developing maturity of alfalfa.

The project involves taking a weekly sample cutting from the Ed and Harvey Klumb farm in the northern part of the county and the Dan Neuburg farm in the southern part of the county. This year samples will also be taken by Hilltop Agronomics from other areas. Samples will be taken starting on Monday, May 21st and on the following Mondays until the crop is ready for harvest. Samples will be tested and information will be available to producers on a 24 hour basis through your touch tone telephone. Weekly information will be placed on the Infosource system by Wednesday noon each week.

This system is accessed by calling the toll free number 1-800-441-4636. A computer message will lead callers through the process. When the message asks, "To select a topic from the Infosource brochure touch 1" do so. It will then ask for you to enter a three-digit code to listen to a message. At that time enter 713 for the message.

Information will also be available on the Internet for those that have Internet access. The web site is <http://www.uwex.edu/ces/cty/washington/scissors.html>.


New this year: Results can also be sent through e-mail. If you have e-mail and would like the results sent to you through an e-mail message either provide your name and e-mail address by sending it to Jack Trzebiatowski at jack.trzebiatowski@ces.uwex.edu or call the office and provide the information.

Information is also available by calling Farmers Inc. at (262) 306-9265 or (262) 629-4126 or Hilltop Agronomics at (262) 629-5564. Results are also available at the Washington County UW-Extension office by calling (262) 335-4477 or (414) 342-2929.

The goal is to harvest alfalfa with an average relative feed value of 150. This means that harvest should start at higher levels to obtain this average. It is also needed to find that scissors cutting samples usually test 15 to 20 points higher than forage tested coming out of storage. Producers may wish to start their harvest season when RFV levels are in the 170 to 180 ranges. This may depend on the number of acres to harvest and expected days to complete harvesting the first cutting.

This project is a cooperative effort of Washington County UW-Extension, Farmers Inc., Hilltop Agronomics, and Rock River Labs.

News From The Capitol

Regents Should Try Harder to Monitor UW-Madison

The University of Wisconsin at Madison is an internationally respected research institution. I personally received both a law and an accounting degree from the University. Unfortunately, in addition to the positives associated with its schools of business, engineering, and natural sciences, as well as its cancer research facilities, there is a strong negative side, which reared its ugly side last week. That is the strong influence of the far left wing on its administration.

First, the UW-Madison Foundation decided to put a plaque on the outside of Sterling Hall. Sterling Hall, home of the Physics Department was bombed in 1970 by four radicals, killing one graduate student. The plaque, entitled "Reform and Revolt" is hard to interpret in any other way than that it is honoring the most extreme protestors of the sixties. The agenda of the protestors is described as social justice, a term used by the left to describe a communist agenda.

Then, almost \$4,000 in segregated student fees was used to bring in self-described "sexpert" Susie Bright to discuss sexual perversion. The University had previously spent countless attorney hours to protect their ability to force students to pay for these fees which are used for activities other than those of an academic nature. Curiously, the same UW-Madison that ought for the right to collect these fees is now trying to politicize students into asking for more tax dollars to prevent increases in tuition.

Last year when Ward Connerly, nationally known advocate for ending affirmative action, spoke in Milwaukee, he singled out Madison as the university most intolerant of his views. A raucous crowd prevented

his ability to speak on campus.

I realize that most American colleges are more liberal than society as a whole. But when national publications discuss the university with the strongest left wing leanings, Madison is always mentioned in the same breath as Berkeley, Harvard and a few others. Other states such as Minnesota, North Carolina or Illinois seem to have developed great institutions without this extremism. Impressionable young people cannot help but be influenced by the strong leftward tilt of some pockets in the University. Most graduates are able to get back to the views of the mainstream after leaving the University. Some, who take up permanent employment, may never recover. Even, in the seventies, when I went to Madison, professors of Sociology or Economics taught views that were long discredited outside academic circles.

The University is gov-

erned by the Board of Regents, a seventeen-person board of which Governor Thompson appointed fifteen. I see no reason why this board, which was appointed by a governor, shouldn't be taking some initiative in trimming departments which foster the left wing elements.

Most of these departments are not very rigorous academically anyway and also offer degrees, which do not lead to employment. Not only does such extremism cause a blot on the University's otherwise fine reputation, but it also can take a while for impressionable young people to recover the ideals that have been the backbone of our society.

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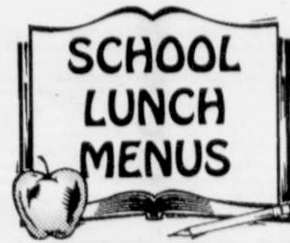

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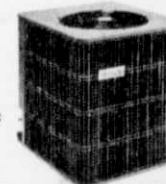
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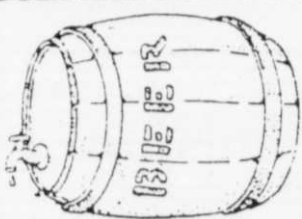

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in Regular Session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President John D. Kenworthy presided. Trustees Elect Thomas Piwoni and Kevin Scheunemann were present. All other Trustee Members were present. A quorum was present.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

The minutes of the April 2, 2001 were tabled until the next meeting.

Mr. John Knepel of the accounting firm of Virchow, Krause & Company, LLP. was present to review and answer questions on the latest audit prepared for the Village of Kewaskum for the year ending December 31, 2000. Mr. Knepel explained the entire audit process and financial statements regarding the General and Utility Funds portion of the audit and associated financial statements. The audit revealed the Village to be in a healthy position.

It was further noted the General Fund ended with a positive balance however the undesignated fund balance is basically depleted. The Water Utility reflected a balanced rate of return; this rate of return being 5.82%. It was noted that the PSC has authorized the Village Water Utility to have a rate

of return of 8.25%. The Auditors suggested possibly looking into the short form PSC rate adjustment process to account for inflation, that being the routine 3.0% type increase. The Sewer Utility also ended the year with a positive balance. The sewer utility rate of return was 1.01% and it was recommended to follow that closely and to look at a minimal rate adjustment. The Villages overall debt is at an estimated 20% of what the law provides, a very good position to be in.

A variety of questions was asked of Mr. Knepel which he answered. Mr. Knepel thanked the staff for their assistance and good records. He further indicated the Administrator and Deputy Clerk do an excellent job on maintaining good records and control over spending, etc.

President John D. Kenworthy and Trustee Robert Stoltzmann also thanked the staff for a job well done and also thanked the auditors.

On a motion by Trustee Andy Pesch, seconded by Trustee Larry Ammel and carried by the majority roll call vote, the Board suspended the rules to take action on IX. New Business point A. (1)(2) relating to the acceptance of the audit report. Roll call vote was 6 "Aye" 0 "Nay" 0 "Absent".

On a motion by Trustee Robert Stoltzmann, seconded by Trustee Andy Pesch and unanimously carried by voice vote, the Board accepted the audit report as pre-

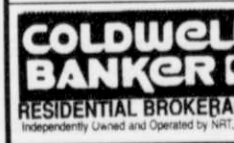

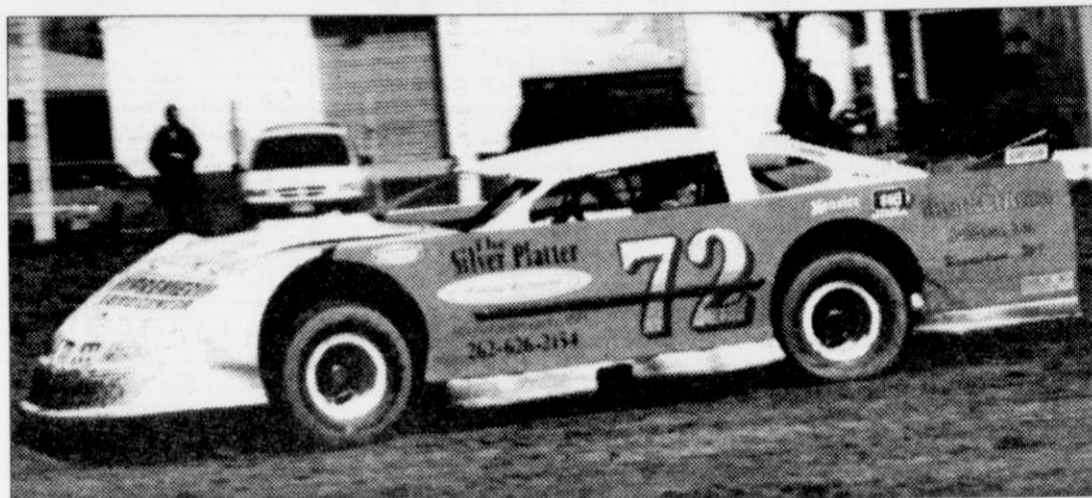

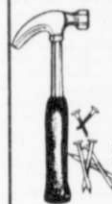

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NOTICE VILLAGE KEWASKUM WOOD CHIPPING SERVICES

Curb side chipping of brush and limbs is on the first and third Monday of each month during the summer and fall.

Please FOLLOW THESE REQUIREMENTS!

1. Place large (butt) end toward the street, at the curb. Long branches and pieces are ok.
2. Pile branches no more than 2 feet high; a long low pile is best for feeding the chipper. Leave a gap in the pile every 8 feet.
3. For small brush, TIE IN BUNDLES with string or twine. No boxes, bags or cans of branches will be chipped. (Reason, is that stone, gravel, wire, metal or dirt enters the chipper it will destroy the knife edges on the chipper, delaying our chipping until the knife is replaced and resharpened).
4. No roots of any kind, or material with any dirt on it.

NOTE: Grass and Leaves may be brought to the DPW Yard and emptied into the Grass/Leaf recycle bin M-F 7:00 to 3:30 PM and Saturdays from 10:00 AM - Noon.

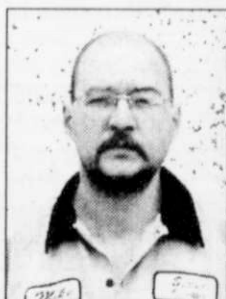
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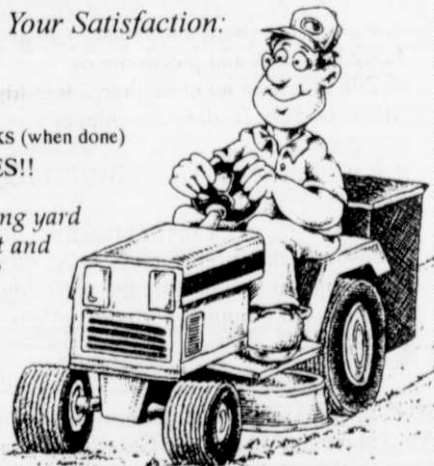
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Girls Win Four Events; Place 2nd At EWC Track Championships

"Both the 4x200m and 4 x 100m relay teams ran well," commented coach Jerry Gosa.

Jolene Clark placed second in the high jump with a jump of 5' 2" and again tied the school record. "I kidded her that she has to break the record. There are already two names on the record board and it would be real difficult to squeeze a third name in there. I am very pleased how Jolene did this year at the conference

meet," commented coach Jerry Gosa.

The Kewaskum 4x400m relay team of Herriges, Donath, Jenna Roecker and Jessi Graham ran a great race finishing second to Two Rivers with a season best time of 4:18.5. The all sophomore Kewaskum relay team dropped five seconds off their previous best time. Kewaskum led for over half the race until Two River's Taddy got the baton and ran her split under one minute. The top three were only separated by 0.1 seconds. "Both Charlie and Chris had a great meet. They're both great competitors," commented coach Jerry Gosa.

The Kewaskum 4x200m relay team of Canter, Fitts, Tom Ogi and Sparks placed second with a school record breaking time of 1:32.25 - almost two full seconds faster than their season best. "I know that the team definitely wanted to finish higher in the team standings. They did however, score 101 points against some very tough competition. I am happy with their effort and the progress they have made," concluded coach Gosa.

The Indians take their perfect record of 4-0 into Germantown on Monday May 14th to take on the Warhawks.

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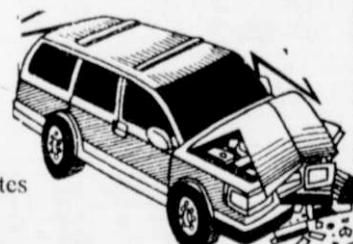
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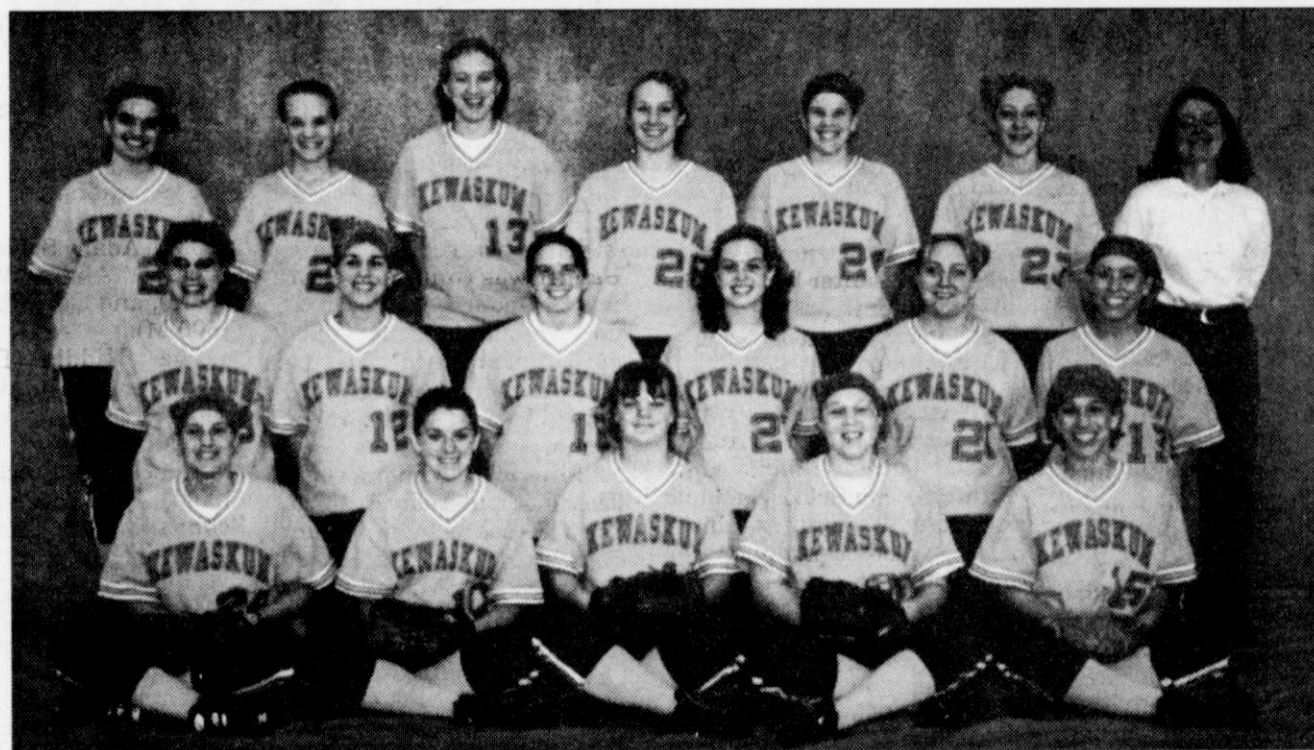
