Kewaskum's Kenworthy, C-sport's Pennington to Speak at WB Book Store

Two local authors, on the way up, will speak about their experiences writing their first books at Little Professor Book Center in August.

On Saturday, August 11, Campbellsport resident Rochelle M. Pennington, who has worked closely with bestselling authors Jack Canfield (*Chicken Soup for the Soul*) and H. Jackson Brown (*Life's Little Instruction Books*) and has provided hundreds of quotation recommendations for both series, will discuss *Highlighted in Yellow: Living Wisely and Choosing Well*, her first published book-length project.

In addition to her contributions to the *Chicken Soup* and *Life Little Instruction* books, Pennington has written stories, articles and plays for numerous other inspirational publications. Her weekly column, "Insights and Inspirations," appears in several Wisconsin newspapers. She has also completed work on two other books -- *God's Math* and *Who Are You in Bethlehem?* -- which she hopes will be published later this year.

Her talk, which begins at 10 a.m., will explain how *Highlighted in Yellow* was developed, but Pennington will focus on her work with the *Chicken Soup* books and explain how prospective writers can have their own contribution submitted, and accepted, for future *Chicken Soup* publications.

On August 18, Kewaskum writer John Kenworthy will discuss *The Man Behind the Mouse*, his fascinating biography of Ub Iwerks, the animator who brought Mickey Mouse to life more than 50 years ago.

Co-authored with Iwerks' granddaughter Leslie, the book tells the story of a man, both artist and inventor, whose technical and artistic creations have been seen around the world, but whose name has remained virtually unknown. In addition to the intriguing information about the early years of Iwerks' association, both as partner and adversary, with Walt Disney, the book presents a rare look into the intimate workings of Iwerks' creative genius.

Kenworthy, who first

fell in love with Iwerks when he was a 14-year-old projectionist at the Capitol Theatre in Newton, Iowa, watched thousands of feet of cartoons and conducted more than 250 interviews while working on the book.

He knows Iwerks' cartoons like the back of his hand and has hundreds of stories to tell. Stop in at Little Professor Book Center, 1331 W. Paradise Drive in West Bend at 10 a.m. on August 18, and listen to a few of them!

Rental Assistance Available in County

The Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority (WHEDA) operates a program for rental assistance under the Section 8 Voucher Program within Washington County and the City of West Bend Housing Authority operates a program within the City of West Bend.

WHEDA and the City of West Bend Housing Authority have both contracted with Horizon Management Group to administer the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Program. Under this program, a specific number of eligible low income families have their rent subsidized. Eligibility is determined by income and family composition. The family portion of the rent is based on their adjusted income and the local Payment Standard.

Rents are payable to the landlord on behalf of the tenants. It is the tenant's responsibility to find a landlord who is willing to participate in the program. All rental units are visited to complete an inspection to ensure they meet minimum HUD Housing Quality Standards.

In response to HUD recently issuing a new funding allocation for both WHEDA and the City of West Bend Housing Authority, names are currently being accepted on the WHEDA (Washington County) and City of West Bend Housing Authority waiting lists.

While immediate or emergency assistance cannot be offered, vouchers may become available and are issued to new families based on the date of application.

The next application intake has been scheduled for Tuesday, August 7, 2001 from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. at the Washington County Public Agency Center at 333 East Washington Street, West Bend, Room 1113A/B.

Applicants should be prepared to share information concerning their family composition and income. Space is limited and applicants should note that there

will be no child care available.

Farmington Historical Society Presenting a Visit to St. Peter's Church

The Farmington Historical Society, Inc. will be presenting "A Visit to St. Peter's Church," on Saturday, August 4, from 1 to 3 p.m.

You are invited to come and see this 1861 fieldstone church, listen to the original 1890 organ, and walk around the beautiful cemetery. Take Highway M to Trading Post Trail to Newark Drive and then travel east to the church. Refreshments will be served. Membership information and souvenirs will be available.

St. Peter's Catholic Church at 1010 Newark Drive East in Section 34 near the shores of Green Lake, was a short-lived congregation in the latter half of the 19th century.

The beautiful fieldstone building that currently stands was built in 1861 following the original log structure first put up in 1855. It is one of only four remaining fieldstone churches in Washington County; the others being St. Matthias in the Town of West Bend; St. Augustine in the Town of Trenton and St. Hubert's in Richfield.

The congregation was formally organized as soon as the immigrants, mostly from Prussia, first settled here, in 1846. The sellers of the land to the congregation were members Peter Schwinn and Peter Wilger. They each sold eight-acre parcels to the Reverend John Martin Henni.

Fourteen of these acres were sold back to Michael Schwinn, son of Peter, in 1901, as the parish had formally closed down the church and did not need so much land. Initially, services were conducted by First Redemptionist Fathers, the Revs. M. Obermuller and Mayer in Peter Schwinn's log cabin home.

By 1861, the congregation was ready for a more lasting structure, and under the direction of Dr. Joseph Salzmann, missionary priest from Milwaukee, built the new building. New

world pioneers readily adapted their old country building methods to familiar new world materials, in this case, fieldstone randomly melded together.

Peter Schwinn and Peter Wilger also helped to build the church. Darker stones were used in a decorative manner to fashion the shape of a cross on the exterior front wall. The apse is formed with a half-octagon shape, unusually beautiful and difficult to create out of the irregularly shaped building material. The congregation was served by resident priest Simon Bartoos until 1867. For the next three years of the official existence of St. Peter's, visiting priests from nearby churches said Mass in German for the congregants.

As more people chose to settle in the Village of Newburg to the east, rather than the Green Lake (formerly Schwinn's Lake) area, the Archdiocese of Milwaukee determined to build Holy Trinity Church there in 1859, and after only nine years of worship service in their beautiful building, the parish was discontinued in 1879, and the congregation encouraged to worship with the Newburg Church.

Not all the families of St. Peter's chose to attend Mass in Newburg, however; several families went other places such as West Bend. Special services were held for Christmas and Easter in German through the 1930's and currently masses are still held twice a year on All Saints Day and for the Fourth of July.

The church and grounds which include the cemetery

and a stone building formerly used as a school leased by the township for 50 years as a public school from 1874, still exude the atmosphere of the devotion of the first congregation. Many former members including the Schwinns are buried in the cemetery and family members and neighbors still clean the church and lay the altar cloth for the special masses and even the occasional wedding.

The incense burner is over 100 years old, as is the crucifix, and the bell is a 30 inch cast piece made by JG Stuckerstede of St. Louis, Missouri in 1862. The organ was made in 1890 by the Earbuff Organ Company and is still used.

St. Peter's Church is a beautiful heritage of the devotion and talent of the Town of Farmington settlers. The property is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and was recently honored by the County Landmark Commission, which only lends formality to its importance as an inheritance to our descendants.

There are many volunteer opportunities at Lac Lawrann Conservancy. Volunteers maintain trails, prepare educational materials, help with office work, and teach scouts and school children on the trails and, soon, in classrooms. If you are interested in volunteering, please call Lac Lawrann Conservancy at 335-5085 or call the Volunteer Center of Washington County.

The Conservancy is open to the public on weekends from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. During the repair of the main parking lot, visitors to the Conservancy should use the Service Drive, the second driveway west of the regular entrance, if the regular entrance is not open.

Lac Lawrann Conservancy is administered by the West Bend Department of Parks, Recreation and Forestry.


