Snowmobile To Blame In Reindl Farm Fire



Shown above are the remains of the John Reindl farm on Badger Road in the town of Kewaskum. The Washington County Sheriff's Department was alerted of the blaze at around 9:15 p.m. last Wednesday evening. According to a press release issued by the Sheriff's Department a resident was working on a snowmobile that was stored inside the barn. The snowmobile's engine reportedly backfired causing it to ignite. Initial extinguishing attempts, by this party, failed and the fire spread to the rest of the structure. The

Kewaskum Fire Department responded and received mutual aid from the Campbellsport, Kohlsville, Boltonville, Allenton and St. Lawrence fire departments. No one was injured. Damage estimates were unavailable. Inside the barn were several snowmobiles and automobiles, miscellaneous equipment and some hay, all of which including the structure were a complete loss.

Kewaskum Veterinary Clinic Gets Village's Stamp of Approval For Kennel Project

The Kewaskum board of trustees held a public hearing at last week Monday's meeting to discuss a conditional use permit to allow the expansion of services offered at the Kewaskum based Kewaskum-Allenton Veterinary Clinic on Fond du Lac Avenue to board animals. Owner, Dr. Greg Ogi was present and answered questions for the trustees.

The expansion would allow for the indoor boarding of up to 15 animals (dogs or cats) on the upper level of the building that once was occupied as an apartment. Dr. Ogi stated he would only allow animals that were in good health. Ill pets visiting the clinic are kept in the basement of the building.

He says this expansion will give the clinic 60% more space and does not involve

any structural changes.

"We will simply be using the entire building as it currently stands for the growing veterinary needs of our community," he said in a letter to village administrator Dan Schmidt.

The clinic currently holds a permit for medical/surgical/health considerations. The visits normally last from one to three days.

At that public hearing five of Dr. Ogi's neighbors came to hear his plans. One of those five did not approve of Dr. Ogi's plan stating he did not want to be living next to a kennel.

Pets would be boarded from one day to two weeks. Currently Dr. Ogi refers customers to kennels in West Bend and Jackson.

Dr. Ogi stated at one point he used the apartment for a length of time and he had no problems with noise and renters after him have

never complained.

"I understand what it means to be a good neighbor, the permit for boarding is essential for our continued growth and success in Kewaskum," stated Dr. Ogi.

Some conditions of the permit: All animals will be boarded inside the clinic; number of boarded pets shall not exceed 15 and the clinic will apply for a kennel license annually as well as 15 generic animal licenses.

The board closed the public hearing and due to a typographical error could not vote on the item that evening because it was not on the agenda. They voted unanimously in favor of the conditional use permit at this Monday's meeting. Trustee Pesch was absent and did not vote.


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WINTER PARKING

The Winter Parking Restrictions and Snow Emergency Parking Restrictions go into effect at mid-night (12:00 a.m.) on December 1, 2001.

Municipal Code Section 90-96 (c) Night Parking Restrictions, reads as follows: Signs have been erected at or reasonably near the corporate limits as provided in Section 349.13, Wisconsin Statutes, no person excepting physicians or licensed emergency vehicles on emergency calls, shall park or stop any vehicle on any public street or highway within the village between the hours of 2:00 A.M. and 6:00 A.M. from December 1, to April 1, of each year; provided that, notwithstanding such restrictions vehicles may be parked a period of time not longer than 3 minutes for actual loading or unloading of passengers, and provided further that no other regulation restricting parking as to place, time, or manner violated thereby.

The fine for violating the ordinance is:

\$10.00 if paid within three (3) days of the issuance of the parking citation.

\$20.00 if paid after ten (10) days but before 28 days.


After 28 days, the amount is \$30.00 and a notice will be sent to the Motor Vehicle Department to suspend any and all vehicle registrations held by the owner and refuse renewals of the same until the citation is satisfied.

An important fact is the owner of the vehicle is responsible for the payment of the citation whether or not he or she was the operator.

Municipal Code Section 90-96 (d) Removal of Illegally Parked Vehicles. This section covers the issuance of citations to and possible removal of such vehicles in violation of this ordinance. In addition to other penalties provided by Section 7.04(6) of this code, the owner or operator of a vehicle so removed shall pay the cost of the towing and storage.

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
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Holy Trinity Student Receives Balloon Response

Home of the Free, Home of the Brave

It seems odd that my concept of war was formed at a Christmas parade. I was about six, or maybe seven - just a little girl. It was wartime. I knew this, but not really. There'd been talk I'd overheard from grown-ups at kitchen tables discussing places with strange names on the other side of the world and sons called up and drafted out. I didn't know what kind of "draft" this was and never thought to ask. The only kind I'd known about was the kind that blew in the door behind me on cold Wisconsin days.

My brother listened to the soldier talk closer than I did. Maybe because he was older. I don't know. Or maybe because he was a son and wondered if one day his would be a name discussed around another kitchen table. Whatever his reason, he knew what it was and I did not.

There was a pile of army men in his bedroom. Lots of them. Plastic green men in uniforms carrying guns. Little guys, only a couple of inches high, melted and molded into many positions. You could buy a whole bag of them down at the Ben Franklin for a buck.

My brother would line them up around his room; some on his dresser, some on his floor, some on his window sill hidden behind the curtain. This was the total of my life experience with soldier men until the night when one of them came to life.

We were at a Christmas parade - my dad, my mom, us kids. Everything you hoped to see that night came down the street from around the corner: snowmen, elves, Baby Jesus, nutcrackers, marching bands. We had not seen Santa yet. He would be

last, as he always was. And it was almost time.

That's when it happened. From around the corner, the same corner we were expecting to see the Santa float come rolling around, came a long, flat trailer. No lights decorated it. No costumed angels or shepherds or gingerbread men or Scrooge or Marley were riding on top. Nothing of the Christmas sort at all. No streamers hung from its edges, no speakers played pre-taped holiday music from its rear. Nothing. Just a long, flat, stark trailer. Empty in every respect except for a lone man standing there in its center - a green, plastic soldier turned real. Painted on the trailer's backdrop behind the soldier were the words "I'll be home for Christmas."

In a single moment, the curbside crowds fell silent,

staring at the soldier staring at them. Straight-backed and saluting, gun over shoulder, he stood at attention, snow falling around him and on him. And then it started to rain. I'll remember it for always.

It rained from the hearts of old men who saluted the soldier back, old men who knew of other Christmases and other wars. And their memories ran down their cheeks.

It rained from the hearts of young women as they looked at the soldier who, in that moment, was every soldier. Would they see their loves again? Perhaps soon. Perhaps not. The sign on the reverse side of the backdrop answered such a question. It could be read when the plastic man who was real rolled past us, heading down the street. There, in simple black, block letters on the rear of the trailer was painted: "If only in my dreams."

Mothers set their jaws, squared their shoulders, attempted to be brave. Were they thinking about their boys so far away, boys they prayed for as they marched into battle to protect the lives of their loved ones back home?

Something happened on that curbside. I was just a little girl, but I knew it, I felt it, I saw it. It would take a long time before I figured out what it was. I'm still trying.

Looking back at the Christmas of the plastic man, as I've done most Christmases since, usually when I'm on my way to another parade, I remember the night I stood in my little

fur-lined boots in the snow. What was the power in those moments that left its impression on my young life and is with me still?

Was it the contrast of two worlds meeting on that street corner - the contrast of a world where the bounty of freedom is enjoyed and a world where the price of that freedom is paid? Maybe. It's hard to say.

Yet harder still is to remember that there are places where Christmas exists only in the hearts and minds of those who left it

behind them. Those who, like our soldiers, know all too well that there are no Christmas trees in trenches or choirs on the front lines singing about Bethlehem; places where it might be another year before you taste one of your mother's Christmas cookies or popcorn balls because you're sitting in a fox hole instead of in your favorite chair beside the fireside back home.

We kiss our loved ones goodbye and they kiss us back. And then we send

them off to places we'd rather not, and they go willingly because freedom has a price and bravery must pay it.

America has never been short on bravery. Never, ever. It lies in the hearts of the ones who go, and it lies in the hearts of the loved ones who send them - the ones who must wave goodbye and wait and wonder about those places they'd rather not, for this, too, takes courage.

My husband and I will wander down to the Christmas parade again this year - just the two of us. The little ones we used to tote along are now grown - our oldest about the same age as the plastic man from long ago. I'll think about him again and reflect on the price my own children will one day be called on to pay.

Knowing this, I will keep my eye on the chair by the fireside come Christmas.

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And come see our new addition we added to our flower shop. We added a Country Christmas Craft and Gift Shop.





Millions In Tax Checks Returned to IRS List Released of Wisconsin Taxpayers Unclaimed Refunds

The Internal Revenue Service is urging more than 4,800 Wisconsin taxpayers whose income tax refund or advance payment checks have been returned to the agency to act now so their checks can be processed and mailed to them by the end of December.

The agency's list of undelivered checks for Wisconsin taxpayers this year includes 3,900 advance payment checks that the IRS started issuing in July. These advance payment checks total more than \$1.2 million - an average of \$308 per check. Nationwide more than 295,000 advance payment checks totalling over \$95 million have been returned to the IRS. There is extra urgency for taxpayers to act quickly on these checks by December 5. After that day, taxpayers can't get an advance payment check. Instead, they'll have to claim it after January 1 as a credit on their 2001 tax returns.

Another 955 Wisconsin tax refunds were returned to the IRS from the year and previous years. These "regular" tax refunds are worth more than \$729,000 - an average of \$758 per check. These checks range from as low as \$1 to over \$49,000. Nationwide more than 95,000 income tax refunds totaling more than \$88 million have been returned to the IRS.

Taxpayers who think they may be missing a refund or an advance payment check should first check their records or con-

tact their tax preparer. If they believe they are missing a check, they should call the IRS toll-free assistance line at 1-800-829-1040.

To ensure the IRS has their correct address, taxpayers who have moved since filing their last tax return are urged to file a Form 8822, "Change of Address," with the IRS. The form can be downloaded from the IRS Web Site at www.irs.gov or can be requested by calling 1-800-829-3676.

Choosing to have a tax refund deposited directly to a bank account is the best way to ensure it goes to the right place and to guard against loss or theft. The direct deposit option was not available for advance payment checks.

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

The trip to the Bucks game will be December 15.







The Kewaskum High School cross country teams wrapped up their season with an end of the year awards banquet last Monday.


Selected by their teammates to receive the Most Valuable Runner awards were Josh Meyer and Becky Herriges.





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Hunters Harvest 151,929 Deer Over Opening Weekend of Gun Deer Hunt

MADISON -- Preliminary totals from deer registration stations across the state indicate that hunters killed 151,929 deer over the first two days of Wisconsin's nine-day gun deer hunting season.

The deer kill number is down approximately 24 percent from 2000's record opening weekend harvest of 200,628, but is still near the 10-year average for opening weekend of 155,247.

"Coming off a national record year (2000) was a tough act to follow," said Bill Mytton, DNR deer and bear biologist. "In that year, everything fell into place perfectly. We issued two free antlerless tags to every gun hunter, 72 percent of our deer management units were in the Zone-T hunt, and the weather was just about perfect for the opener."

"The weather conditions we experienced this weekend are one of the reasons we need a variety of hunting seasons spaced over time. Without the additional four-day Zone T antlerless seasons held in October and December this year, a weather event like this could really put us in a tough spot in terms of managing deer populations in the state."

For 2001, fewer units were in Zone T and the daytime high temperatures were more typical of September than November. "The most noticeable

drop is in antlerless deer kill numbers," said Mytton. "That's not unexpected since with the warm weather, hunters who were lucky enough to shoot a buck over the weekend got the kill out of the woods quickly to head off spoilage. I hope they'll return later in the week and use the free antlerless Zone-T tags they were issued or pick up a couple of bonus antlers permits available through ALIS vendors and DNR Service Centers."

A number of other factors may also have been responsible for the lower weekend tally.

Large areas of the state reported a heavy ground fog that severely reduced visibility for several hours Saturday morning. The fog made it difficult to see deer more than 50 to 70 yards away but more importantly, made it impossible to take a safe shot since hunters couldn't see clearly what was behind their target. Also, the damp conditions and heavy air made it difficult for hunters to hear deer approaching.

A lack of snow was another factor contributing to poor visibility. It was difficult to pick out deer against the generally brown background.

"Obviously we'd like to see the antlerless harvest numbers go up over the remaining days of the hunt," said Mytton, last week. "I know I've harped on this before but we're over

our population goals in so many deer management units and wildlife damage to crops and forests continues to be a worry for farmers and forest managers, that I really encourage hunters to fill their antlerless tags. If they've got all the meat they can use, consider donating a deer to the food pantry program."

Hunters will have additional opportunity to harvest antlerless deer during the November 26-December 2 muzzleloader season and a late Zone-T hunt December 6-9.
