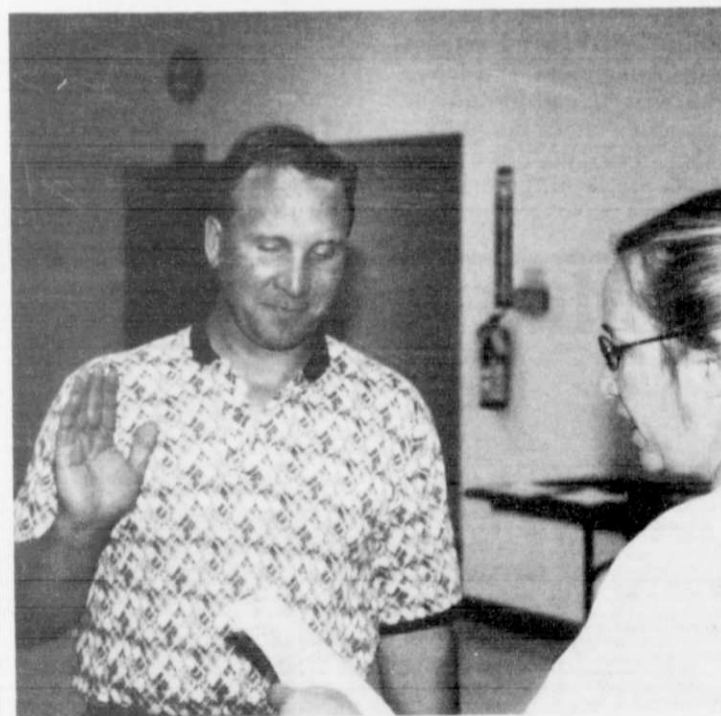

with the sounds the animals make: goats say ruff, cows say meow and lions do not roar but rather speak a cockadoodle-doo language.

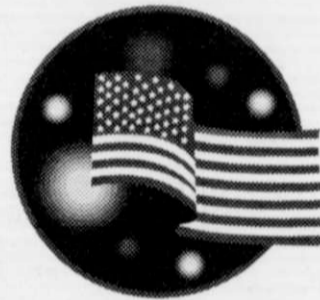
A repeat performance of the Wackadoo Zoo was held May 8 in the main lounge of

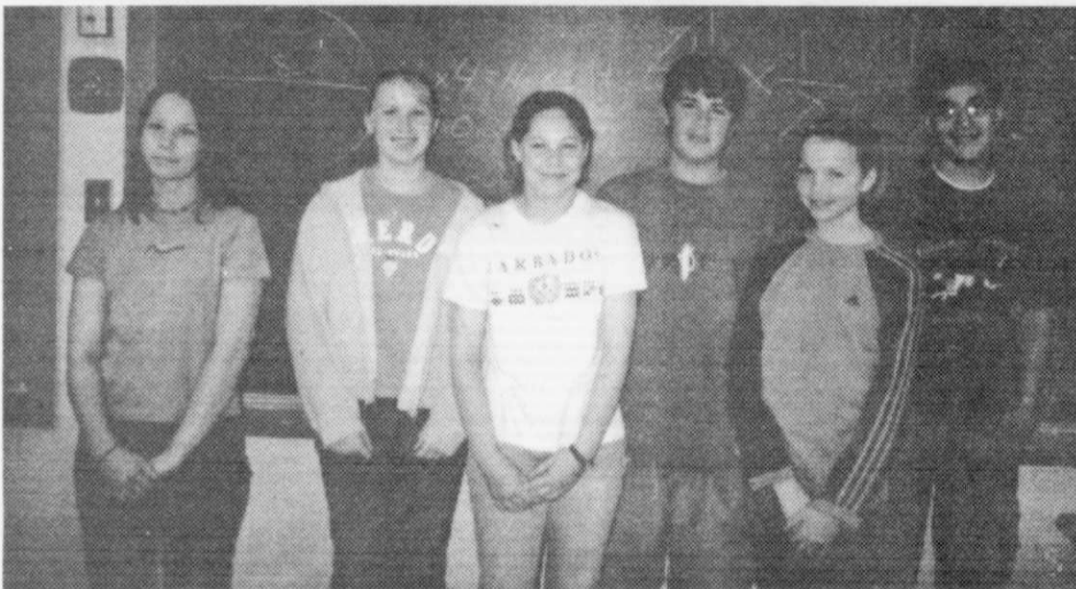

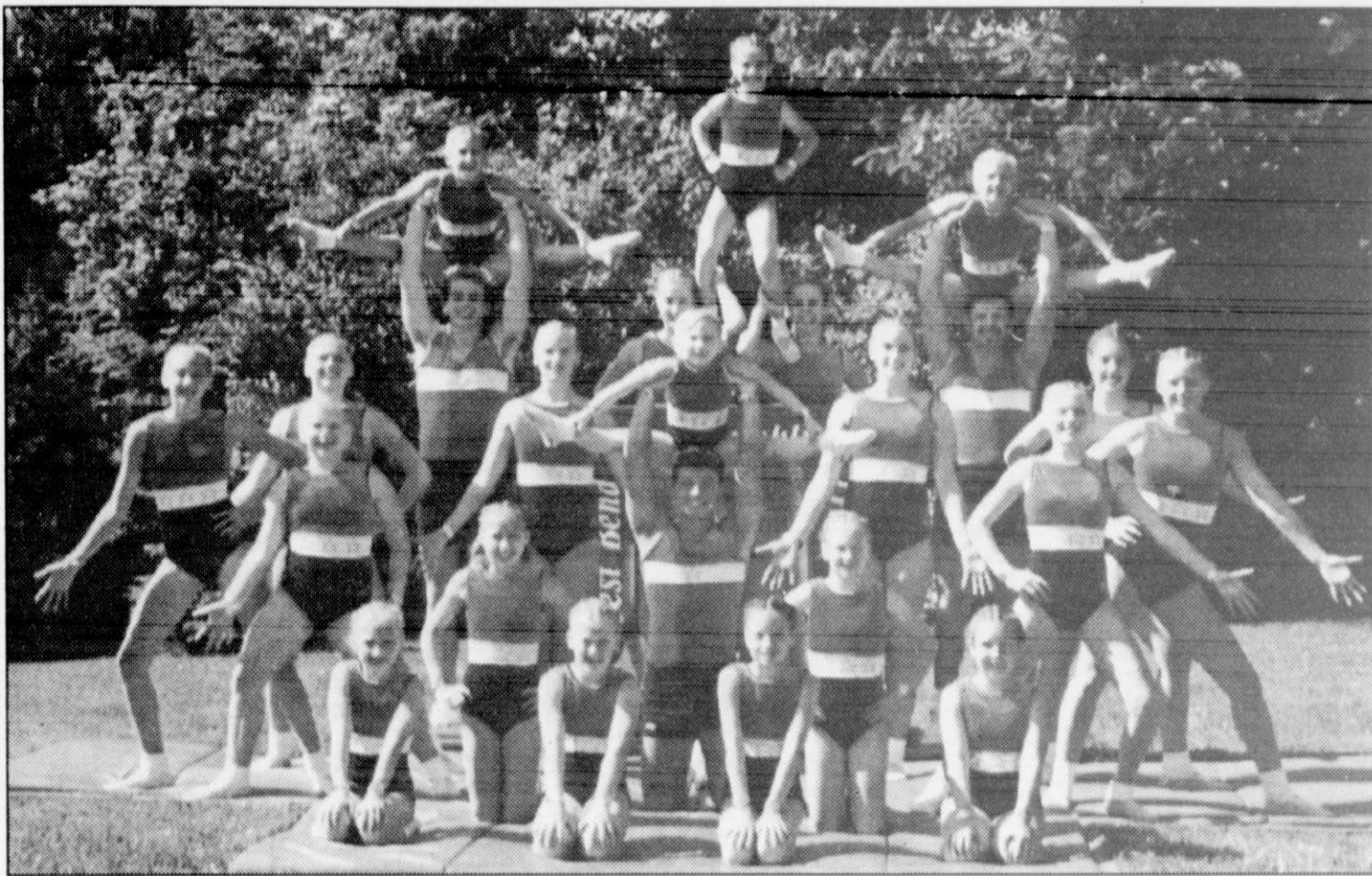

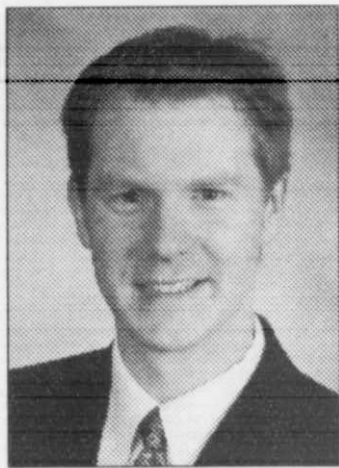

Hospital Offers Relief In Heat Emergencies

With local temperatures rising and humidity high, St. Joseph's Community Hospital of West Bend, a member of SynergyHealth, is reminding residents of the hospital's Heat Relief program.

People with health problems can get a welcome respite from the heat during periods of dangerously high temperatures and ozone alerts. The hospital's program offers daytime cooling-off periods and overnight stays to area residents with health programs that put them at higher risk during hot weather.

Examples of individuals in need are older adults, young children and people who have chronic illnesses, such as emphysema or asthma, and who do not have air-conditioning or other means of staying cool.

People who need to stay overnight to get out of the heat should call the hospital's main number, 262-334-5533, for information on bed availability. The no-cost program is not available to individuals who require medical treatment; no medical care is included. The number of beds available will depend on the number of patients currently in the hospital.

During daytime hours, adults and children accompanied by adults are wel-

come to cool off in the hospital's visitor lobby or cafeteria.

Temperatures exceeding 90 degrees during heat waves can lead to heat stress, a condition that raises body temperatures from a normal 98.6 degrees to 100 degrees or more. Heat stress causes various symptoms such as dizziness, nausea, breathing problems, rapid heartbeat, weakness, headaches and other symptoms and can cause more severe medical problems. Older adults, young children and people with chronic illness are more prone to heat stress.

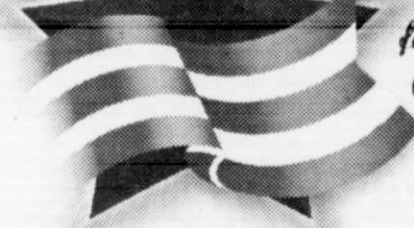



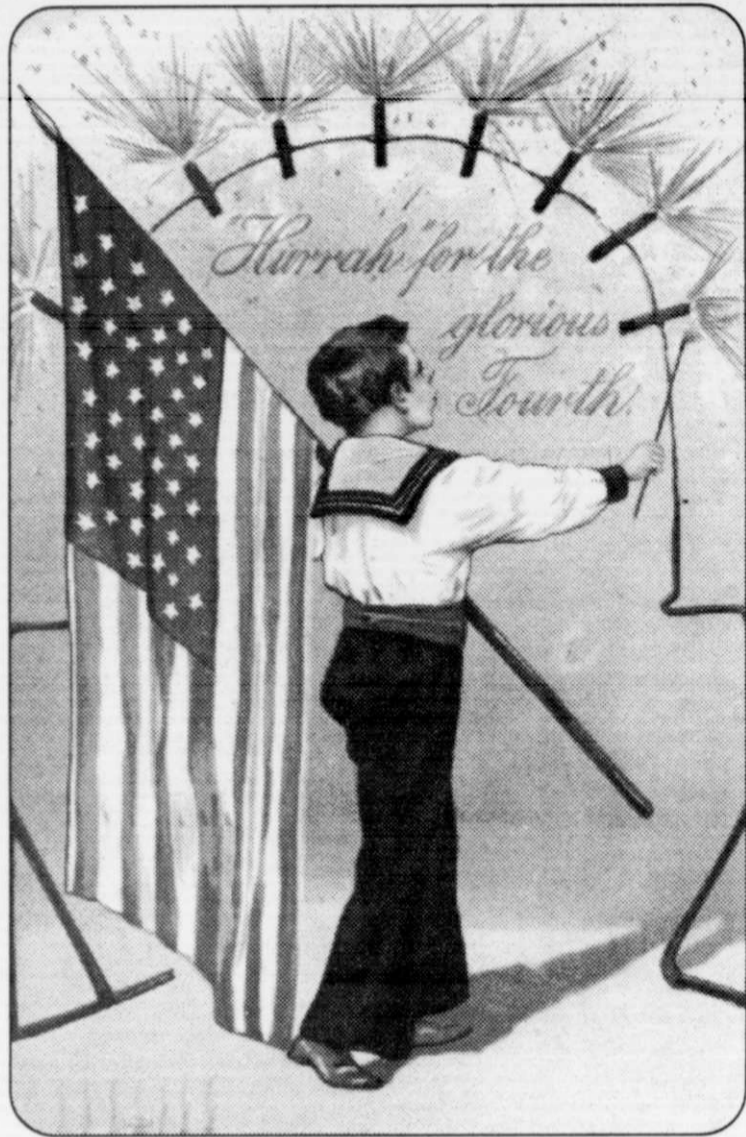

Please be advised of the following requirements to appear before the Board of Review and procedural requirements if appearing before the Board:

No person shall be allowed to appear before the Board of Review, to testify to the Board by telephone or to contest the amount of any assessment of real or personal property if the person has refused a reasonable written request by certified mail of the Assessor to view such property.

After the first meeting of the Board of Review and before the Board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the Board of Review may contact, or provide information to a member of the Board about the person's objection except at a session of the Board.

No person may appear before the Board of Review, testify to the Board by telephone or contest the amount of the assessment unless, at least 48 hours before the first meeting of the Board or at least 48 hours before the objection is heard if the objection is allowed because the person has been granted a waiver of the 48-hour notice of an intent to file a written objection by appearing before the Board during the first two hours of the meeting and showing good cause for failure to meet the 48-hour notice requirement and files a written objection, that the person provides to the clerk of the Board of Review notice as to whether the person will ask for removal of any Board members and, if so, which member will be removed and the person's reasonable estimate of the length of time that the hearing will take.

When appearing before the Board of Review, the person shall specify, in writing, the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

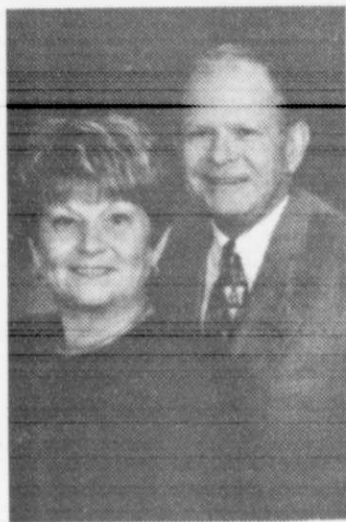
No person may appear before the Board of Review, testify to the Board or by telephone or object to a valuation; if that valuation was made by the Assessor or the Objector using the income method of valuation; unless the person supplies the Assessor all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the Assessor's manual under Sec. 73.03 (2a) of Wis. Statutes, that the Assessor requests. The Town of Kewaskum has an ordinance that is provided to the Assessor under this paragraph which provides exceptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their office or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right inspection and copying under Sec. 19.35 (1) of Wis. Statutes.

Sports Riders' Hill Climb a Great Success

The 19th Annual Kettle Moraine Sport Riders Father's Day hill climb was again a great success. Approximately 2,221 people showed up to watch 101 motorcycles compete in seven classes at Sunburst Ski Hill, near Kewaskum.

Each rider got two runs up the hill and is scored on time to the top or distance up the hill if they don't make it to the top. There were a few brief showers making for soft conditions on the second run up the 300 foot glacier induced hill, but the event went on.

You could, however, spot some of the veteran hill-climb spectators by the supplies they brought with them. Some bring along small platforms with a leg on one side for something level to stand on. Shorty Schnabel was also spotted with a garden shovel in his pocket. While coming to watch his son, Scott and grandson Glen Jr., he picked out their spot, and dug up the dirt under his left foot to put under his right foot for level footing to watch the action.

One of the interesting classes every year is the open stock class. This class has a variety of bikes in it and those in the crowd can relate to this as all the bikes are based on street bikes. The class was won by Craig Amerling from Kewaskum on a 1978 Kawasaki 1000 with a stock frame. This bike was painted like a cow right down to the gas tank that came from a John Deere lawn mower. Amerling cleared the hill in 12.29 seconds.

Second place went to John Dricken from West Bend with a time of 12.38 seconds. John rode a 1972 750 Triumph motor inside a frame built for flat track racing.

Third was his brother Mike Dricken from Barton with a time of 12.74 seconds. Mike was riding a stock frame Triumph dated 1968 and a motor dated 1973.

Fourth place went to Mike Murre of Fond du Lac on a 1980 Yamaha 650 in a stock frame. Other mentionables was sixth place, Dennis Wilkens from West Bend, with a shaft drive 1976 Yamaha 750 in a stock frame, as well as Rick Matous from Saukville on a 1982 Honda Nighthawk 650 with original body work.

Each year the Kettle Moraine Sports Riders have a poker run and hill climb to raise money. The poker run had to be cancelled due to inclement weather so it was nice to have a successful hill climb. A portion of the proceeds each year go to build the float for the Christmas Parade, along with the hill climb if it would ever be needed.

The Sports Riders also donate to the American Motorcyclist Association Legislative Fund, as well as

sponsor people in rides and runs including the Bob Cross Run, American Cancer Society, the American Heart Association, the Leukemia Society, The UCLA Aides Ride, the Alzheimer Association, and the M.S. Society.

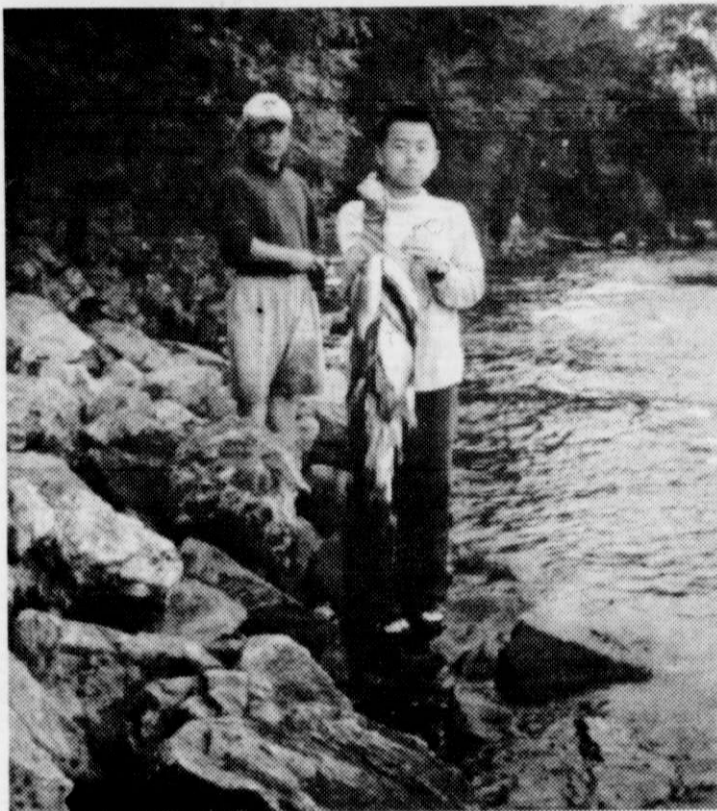

Preparation for a trip is critical for the success of the trip.

April, May and June are like a whirlwind as are October and November. Within a couple of hours "The Canada Gang" will be pulling in my driveway and I am required by honor to be packed and ready to go.
