Subway Burglar Suspect Loses Thumb, Fingers in Fireworks Accident

The same young man suspected in a burglary attempt at Kewaskum's Subway store was again dealing with the law this past Sunday night. This time in Slinger.

Michael A. Landry, 17, was visiting a Slinger apartment when he jokingly attempted to light an M-80 firecracker inside the apartment. According to various reports his joke went sour.

With a cigarette lighter in one hand and the M-80 in the other, the two got a little too close to one another. Once Landry realized this, he made a beeline for a patio door in the apartment. Much to his dismay the door was locked. By the time he got it unlocked it was a little too late. Exploding, the blast shattered the glass patio door and also blew off Landry's thumb.

Two occupants, an 8 and 12 year old in the apartment

also were injured by glass shards.

Landry, along with the two children were taken to an area hospital. Landry was later taken to Froedtert Memorial Hospital in Milwaukee. He was released Tuesday morning.

According to a fireworks distributor the explosive mentioned here is one half an inch in diameter and 1.5 inches long and has less than one ounce of explosive in it.

According to Village of Kewaskum code the only legal fireworks are sparklers and fountains. Anything that makes noise, explodes or goes airborne is illegal.

Permits are issued from various vendors to possess fireworks in that municipality. That permit does NOT permit the lighting of fireworks in the village or townships covered by this newspaper.

Cascade's Levandowski Announces Assembly Candidacy

Town of Scott Holds June Meeting

After a few months of research, gathering of information, altering plans and a public hearing, Scott Fechter was successful in his request for a zoning change from A-1 agricultural to mining for a gravel mining operation.

Without benefit of a positive recommendation by the Scott Planning Commission, the Scott Town Board voted 4 to 1 to allow the mining operation and establishing a pond on the Fechter site. Chairman Steve Jung's negative vote was followed with this comment, "Two neighbors here tonight are against it, the one who was for it last month is not here tonight."

Comments during the hearing indicated that there will be only 4 acres taken out the 70.3 acre farm land being planned for the pit and pond. Actually the "front forty" is the only area to be disturbed. It is predicted that with the planned restoration that the area may look flatter than its present condition.

Negative comment showed concern about disturbing the near-by creek. Steve Rathke, representing Hartman Sand and Gravel assured that a set-back from the area near Mink Creek must and will be observed. Department of Natural Resources will also be keeping a watchful eye on the project.

Safe travel in the area of the driveway was also of some concern. The original plan for the driveway has been altered by moving it 250 feet to the west and plans for signs where needed to alert drivers approaching the pit and the truck traffic.

Two certified survey maps presented by Larry Laux were not approved. One map was for five acres which is in the process of being sold and another for twelve plus acres on which Laux would sell by means of a land contract.

The prospective purchas-

er plans to merge the five acre parcel to the one already owned and to improve the berm which once existed between the two properties, necessary because it has deteriorated over the years and is the cause of a wet basement during the wet seasons.

This same person is interested in the 12 acre parcel but would need to make use of a land contract if it were to be purchased. It appeared that the board feared the possible return of the land to Laux if the contract could not be fulfilled thereby making possible another buildable lot which is not the goal of the Town's zoning ordinance. Laux is expected to return to next month's meeting.

Public input brought attention to a low land area on Boltonville Road which is accumulating junk and objectionable debris. A suggestion was made that a letter be sent to the property owner advising of the situation and requires that it be cleaned up. Discussion led to several other properties of similar condition. Because this was not an agenda item, it will be taken up at a future meeting.

A new sign is being purchased for the former Hilltop building in Batavia. It will advise the public of the existence of the Town of Scott Community Center. Liquor, beer, cigarette, and operator's license applications were reviewed and approved for issue. A complete listing was not made available.

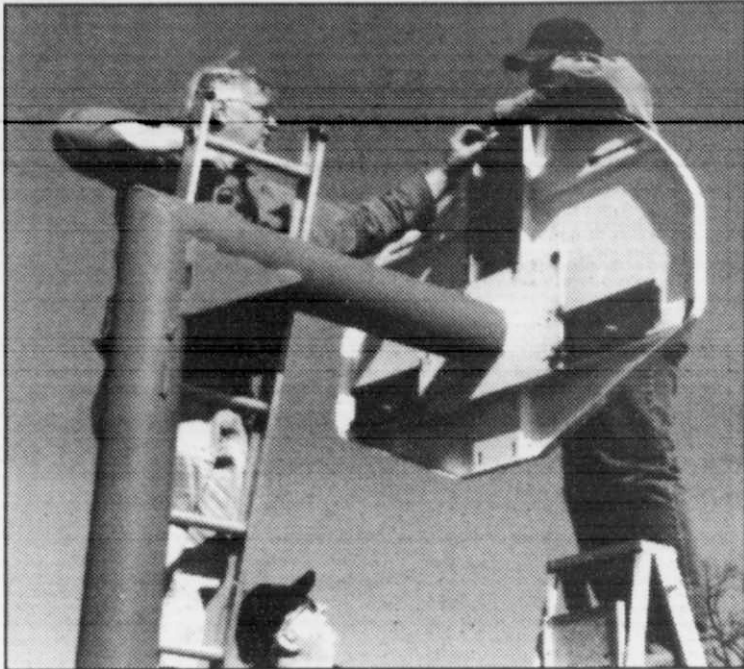

New RC&D Proposed for Southeast Wisconsin

WEST BEND -- Formation of a Resource Conservation and Development area (RC&D) has been proposed for the southeast corner of Wisconsin, and ideas and suggestions are needed from interested citizens.

RC&Ds are non-profit organizations that help solve problems and carry out projects as directed by an RC&D council. The council is made up of representatives from each county -- so local people work together on local projects. The council can help with concerns that the community feels are not being adequately addressed. It can also join partnerships with local groups and agencies to help them accomplish their goals. The emphasis is on developing natural and economic resources in an environmentally friendly and sustainable way.

RC&D facilitates the process by identifying sources of technical expertise from both private and governmental organizations, and by locating funds and applying for grants. To help carry out the work, the USDA through the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) supplies funding for a full time coordinator, a part-time assistant, office space and use of a vehicle.

The result is an organization that "can not only iden-

tify local needs but also set goals and accomplish them, with help from private as well as governmental sources," according to Diane Georgetta, Soil Conservationist with the NRCS who has been given the task of organizing the proposed new group. RC&D is one of the most successful government programs.

Much of the credit goes to the very active local participants. Glacierland RC&D, which lies just to the north of the proposed group, has a long list of completed and ongoing projects. Some examples:

- Plant trees and prairie grasses at a county park.
- Install dry hydrants for fire protection.
- Hold workshops on wetland restoration, woodland management, fish farming, holstein steers.
- Outreach with Hmong and Hispanic populations.
- Vegetable growers and value added conferences.
- Promote carbon sequestration.
- Assist in development of farm market kitchen.

The 13 counties in the southeast corner of the state (see map) are the only ones in Wisconsin not currently served by an RC&D. To get involved in the formation of the new NRCS, 333 E. Washington St., Suite 3200, West Bend, WI 53095.

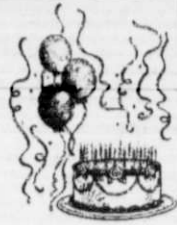

Are you 60 years old or older and a resident of Washington County?

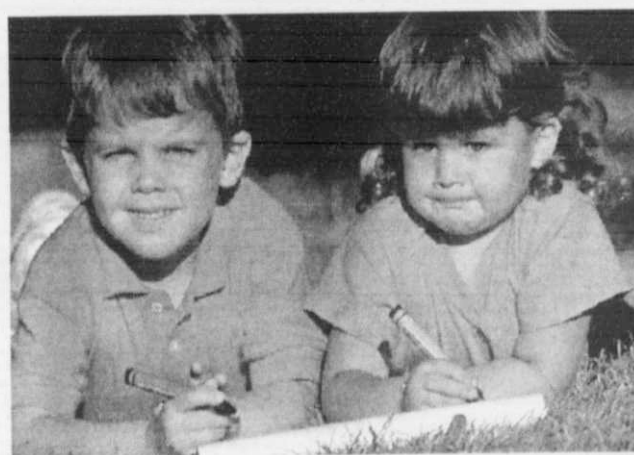

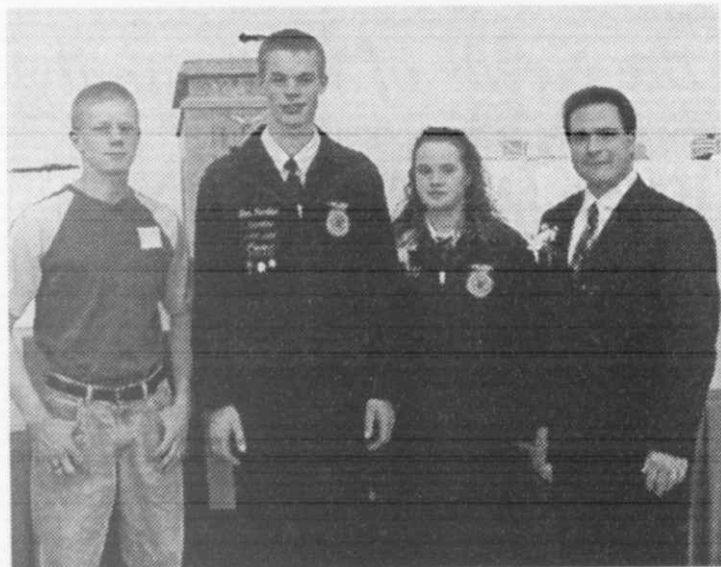

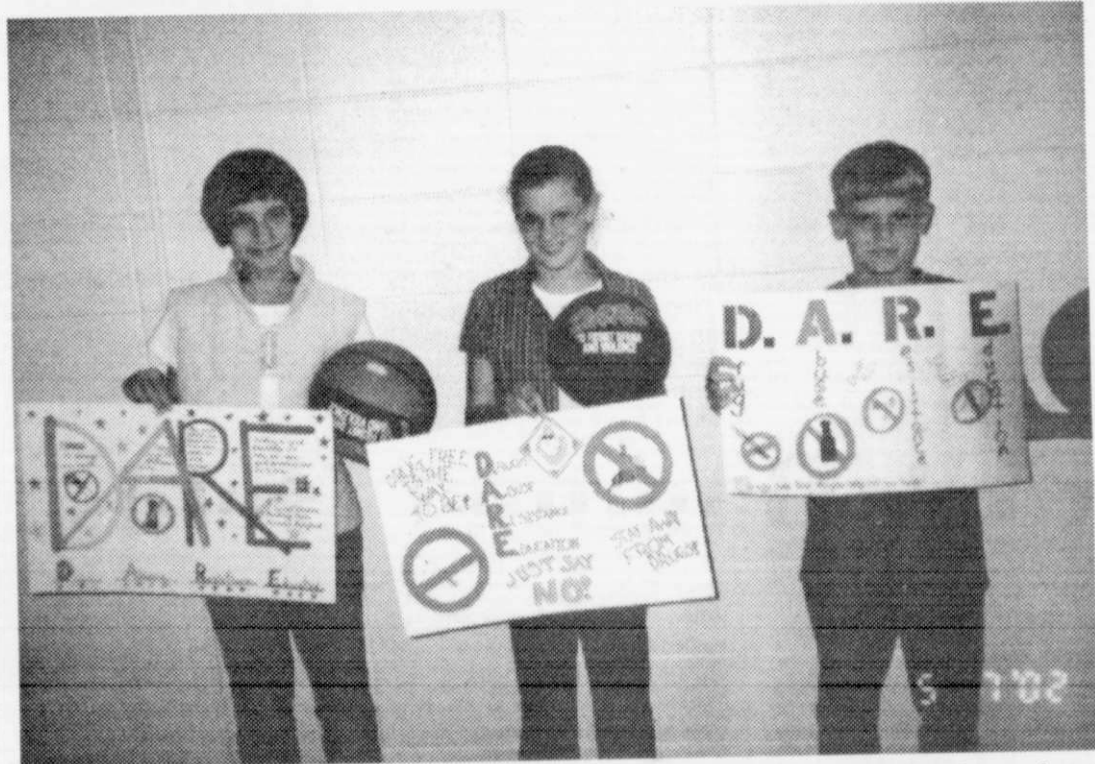

Wayne Crusaders 4-H Club News

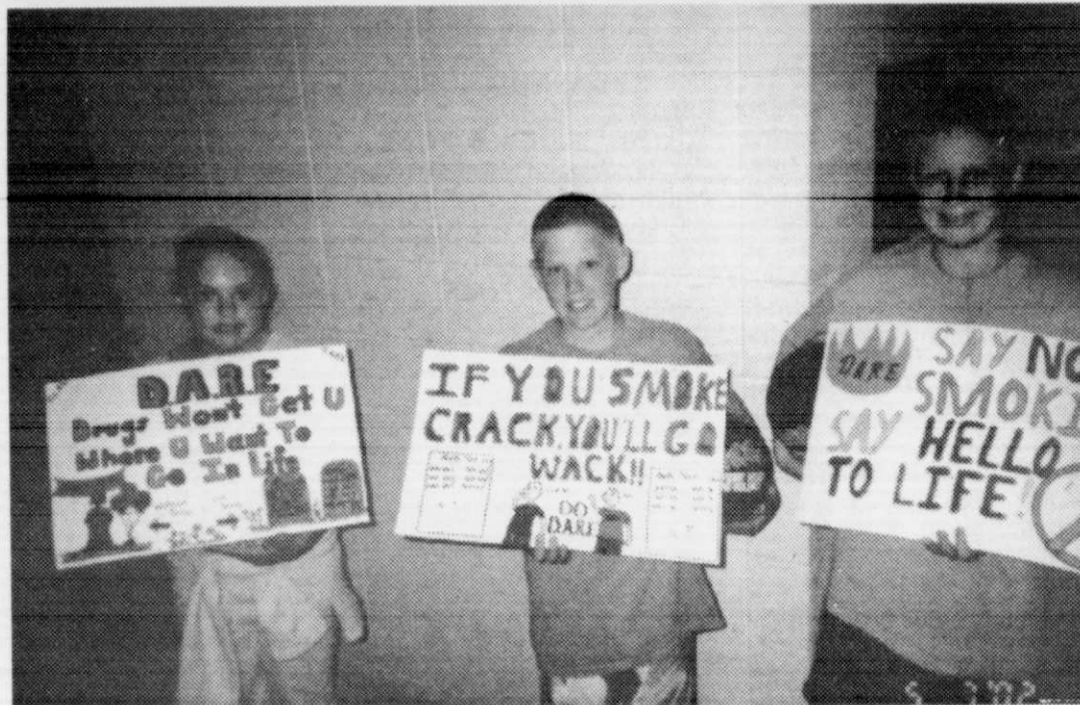

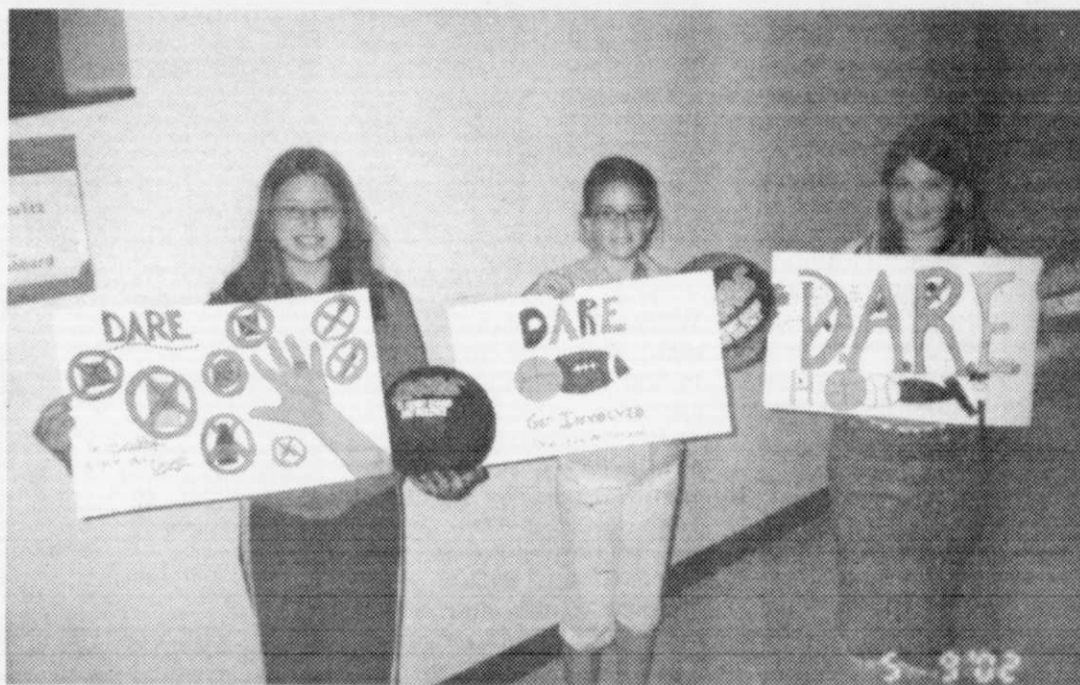

Letter to the Editor

On Monday night June 17th, I attended a village board public hearing in Kewaskum. I accompanied a Kewaskum resident there. This meeting was in regard to the subdivision being planned on the north side of town off of Riverview Drive. How long this has been in the planning, I don't know, but there are more in the works.

While I have heard the saying, "one should be able to do what he wants with his property," I can only agree in part.

People who are affected by such decisions like adjoining or close neighbors should be strongly considered. Their views and concerns should be respected and investigated thoroughly such as: lots being legalized to fit the sellers plan, disregarding any inconvenience, scenario, or a particular concerns of the neighbors involved.

There is at least one such lot in this new subdivision. The house square footage will meet the minimum only because of it's height. It will

have a 7 ft. "backyard." Do you think you could bar-beque or have a get together in a 7 ft. yard?

There is also a pond of sorts. Is it man made or natural? No difference, but it will be drained (where?), filled in and a house will be built there. How will that affect the existing surrounding homes? Would you like to live in that home?

Could there have been an alternate plan that could satisfy most of the neighbors concerned? Does there have to be that many homes there? What was wrong with the original plot map the village had already in place?

What disturbs me is, there is building going on the north, there's a subdivision toward the west and now this one too. What are the consequences of sprawling development? Air pollution, water pollution, flooding, loss of habitat and wetlands.

This new development plans for 23 homes. Possibly 45 or more children will be entering the school system from there alone, eventually. More cars (an average of two per household) will be driv-

ing in and out of Kewaskum's four outlets. There will be more garbage to pick up. You will need more police and fire protection. Services in general will be in greater demand. Water and sewage can become potential problems. Are the homes to be built there going to "fit in" or will they overpower the scenario? Future taxes should also be considered. Who eventually ends up paying for this growth?

Many homes cost more in services than they pay in taxes. In the midwest, the average home costs \$1.20 to service for every dollar paid in taxes, compared to 43 cents for farms, parks and open spaces. (Taken from a pamphlet released by the EPA in 1998) Four years ago! Let's figure this out... Each home could possibly bring in \$3,000.00 in taxes. $\$3,000 \times \$1.20 = \$3,600.00$ to services. A loss of \$600.00 per home. A plot of land (farm, park, playground) would cost 43 cents per each of the same tax dollar, equally \$1,290 for servicing. A difference of \$2,310.00. A savings which could benefit

the community in more ways than one.

We must remember, we are only stewards of the land in our life time - the future generations must be thought of too. What we really need is more job growth and economic vitality.

Antlerless Deer Hunting Permit Deadline July 20

MADISON - The deadline for hunters to apply for Hunter's Choice and bonus antlerless deer permits for the 2002 deer hunting seasons is July 20. Department of Natural Resources wildlife biologists estimate the statewide fall 2002 whitetail population will be around 1.7 million animals.

Last year, hunters harvested 446,957 deer in all seasons according to DNR wildlife managers. A relatively mild winter didn't cause any significant winter mortality and managers expect strong reproduction this spring in regions, including the Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) management zone.

Because July 20 is a Saturday this year, completed applications must be post-marked no later than July 20, or dropped off at a Department of Natural Resources Service Center no later than 4:30 p.m. on July 19 to be accepted. Hunters can purchase their \$3 application sticker and pick up the application form at any of the more than 1,500 locations that sell licenses using the state's Automated License Issuance Service (ALIS), over the Internet through the DNR website <http://www.dnr.state.wi.us> or toll-free telephone at 1-888-945-4236.

There is a \$3 application fee for hunter's choice permit and a \$12 fee for each bonus antlerless permit for residents and a \$20 fee for non-residents.

For the first time this year, hunters will be able to submit their Hunter's Choice/Bonus application through the DNR website via the internet. There is no additional fee to submit the application online, and the hunter will receive an immediate, printable confirmation that their application was received.

"Applying has never been easier, or faster," says Randy Reeg of the DNR Bureau of Customer Service and Licensing. "This service should be available beginning the first week of June."

Conservation Patron license holders are exempt from the application fee, and should receive their application forms in the mail if they purchased their license before June 1. Hunter's choice permits allow hunters to shoot either antlered or antlerless deer, bonus permits allow hunters to shoot an additional antlerless deer; all permits must be used in the unit for which they are issued. Hunters may use the permits in the archery, gun and muzzleloader deer hunting seasons.

Application information for hunter's choice and bonus antlerless deer permits can be found in the "2002 Wisconsin Antlerless Deer Permit Information" packet available at license outlets or on the DNR web-

site at <http://www.dnr.state.wi.us/org/land/wildlife/HUNT/DEER/permitlevels.pdf> in portable Document Format (.pdf) file that requires Adobe Acrobat Reader. It contains information about permit availability and deer management unit boundaries.

2002 Zone T units for the Oct. 24-27 Zone T hunt

There will be a special early antlerless firearm hunt in Zone T units (1-9, 11-14, 19, 20, 27, 28, 29A, 34-36, 47, 49B, 51A, 51B, 54C, 59D, 61, 62B, 63A, 63B, 65B, 66, 67A, 67B, 68A, 70A, 70E, 72, 74A, 75C, 75D, 78, 80A, 80B, and 81) from October 24 through October 27.

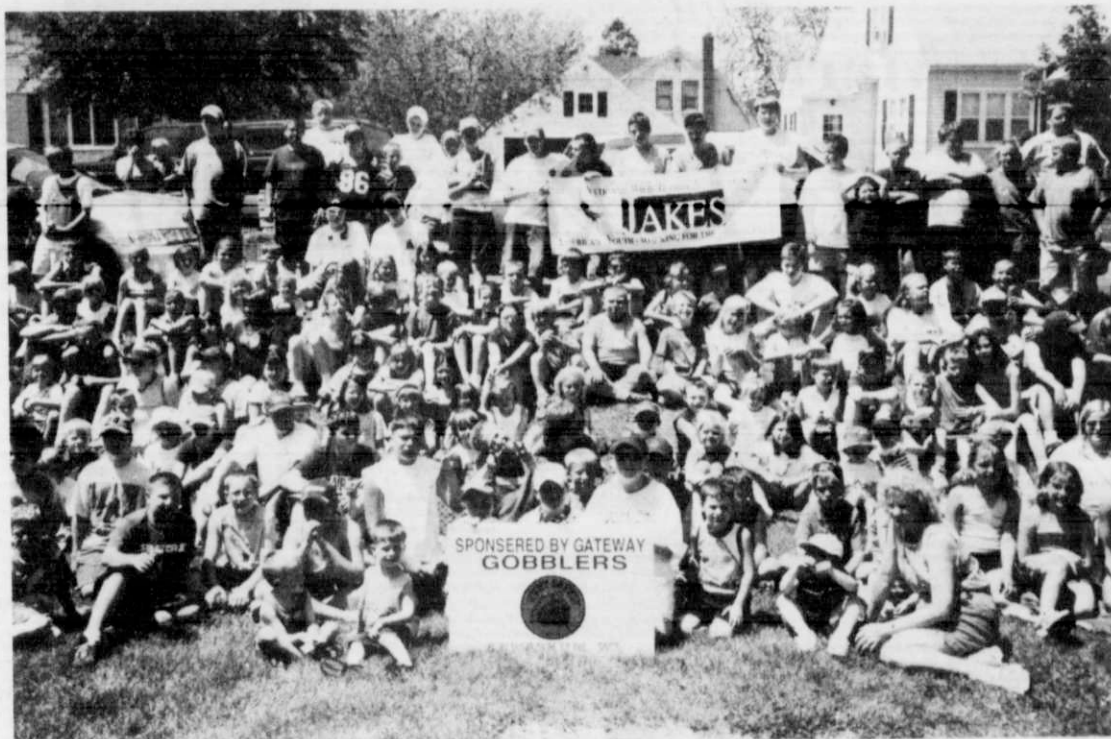
Units 70A, 70E, 75C, and 75D are also part of the CWD Management Zone in southern Wisconsin. In June, the National Resources Board will consider emergency rules that will affect these units by extending the gun hunting seasons in the CWD Management Zone. Specifics of those rules will be issued following the NRB decision.

Hunters should not apply for hunter's choice or bonus permits for Zone T units. Hunters will be issued a free permit for each gun-deer license and another for each archery-deer license. Free 'special' antlerless permits will be available over the counter in mid-August. A regular gun deer license back tag can be used on a buck or antlerless deer in these units. The Zone T hunt was created to help control crop damage caused by deer.

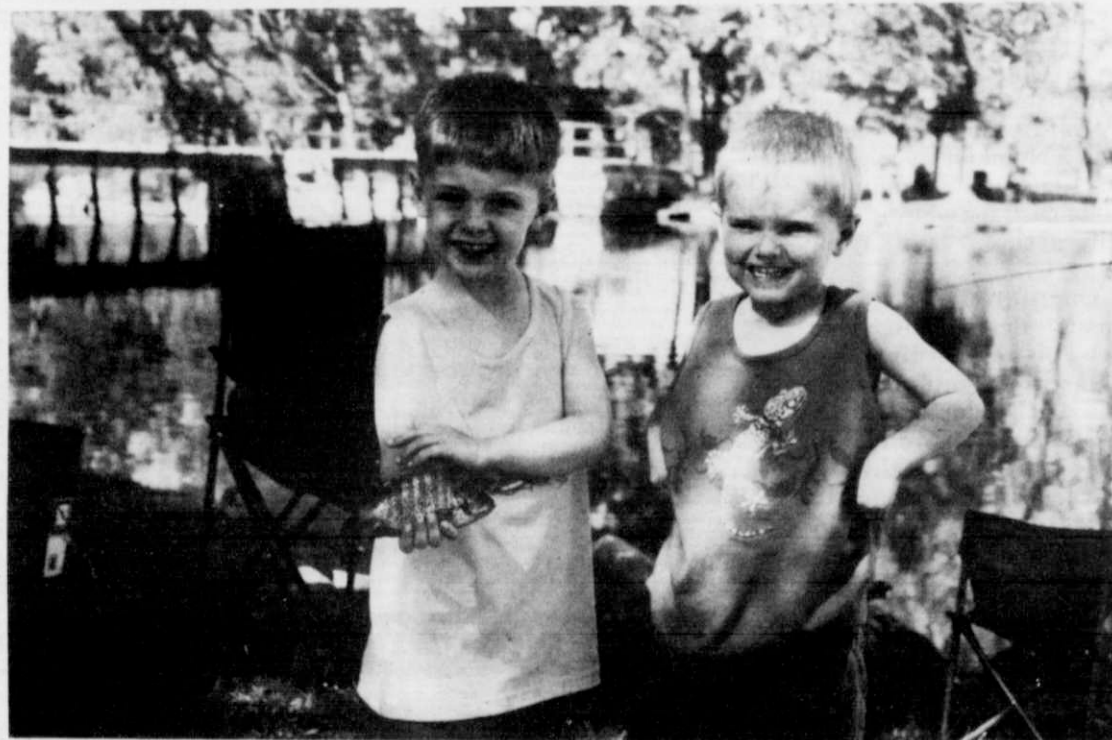
Bonus permits remaining after mail-in application are processed will go on sale over the counter at select DNR service centers around September 9.

First-time graduates of a Wisconsin Hunter Education Course will again be able to harvest an antlerless deer during the nine-day gun deer season using their regular gun deer license in most areas of the state.

Hello friends,

My dad, the late Robert Walters, was an outdoorsman that took his boys on several outdoor adventures each year.

In the winter of '81, Dad wrote a letter to Peter Hagedorn, owner of Chimo Lodge and Outposts, asking for information on his fly-in outposts in northwest Ontario, Canada. The following spring, four of us made our first trip to Shultz Lake. Ever since, we have "owned" Shultz Lake and the only cabin on it for seven days each June.

Sunday, June 16
High 83 Low 54

Each spring and summer hundreds of thousands of fisherman make the journey to Ontario's drive and fly-in fishing camps. Most drivers are short on sleep, using a chunk of their vacation time and spending a wad of cash for what is generally a seven day stay at camp.

Our drive took an unusual detour this year when 100 miles of Hwy. 502 leading from International Falls to Dryden, Ontario, was washed out. We had to drive east to go northwest. This added three hours to our trip and we arrived in Red Lake on Friday after-

noon. We plan to fly to Shultz Lake at sunrise the next morning.

Northern Minnesota and Ontario had received record rainfalls and it may be time to start building an Ark.

Bob (Bobco) Pearson's GPS told him he was 1475 miles from his home in Denham Springs, Louisiana. This morning, Bobco, Roger Frank from Arlington, Wis., and I began our two hour boat and foot journey to Thunder Lake for a day of world class northern pike and walleye fishing. Bobco is my brother Tom's neighbor and the rookie in the "Canada Gang."

After a five mile journey by boat, we made our first portage then another boat ride, another portage and after a difficult trek, reached Thunder Lake.

The "Canada Gang" was on Shultz Lake five years ago when the southern shoreline burned and the northern half was saved by a sudden downpour. The few pines that are still standing are coming down in the quagmire and wreaking havoc on our trek.

My brother-in-law Dick Schuster and good friend Jeff Moll discovered Thunder Lake.

Ten years ago, our crew

carried a boat to it through the bush. Moll and Schuster camped on an island the first night, caught a half a million jacks and eyes and watched a spectacular lightning display. Thus the name Thunder Lake was born.

After that, Pete Hagedorn flew a boat in that remains on Thunder Lake permanently. Since the portage takes four hours (round trip) most groups ignore it.

As always, we had a first fish-of-the-day bet for a dollar.

It took me about one minute to win with a two pound walleye that hit a whistler jig and night-crawler combination.

The real story of the day is the fishing on Trophy Bay. This is where we annually catch and release several northern in the 10-18 pound range.

Last year, Roger Frank used a Red Eye Wiggler and proceeded to take every member of the gang's money by catching lots of big gators. Once again, today would be Roger's day. He hooked into a fish that at first turned our boat around and then began pulling it upstream for a good 10 minutes. The catch measured 39 inches and, in gator terms, was a true pig, easily weigh-

ing 18 pounds. Pictures were taken, she was released and we journeyed back to the cabin.

My brother Mike and friend Danny Gorman had a big surprise for us. They let us know Mikey had also landed a 39 incher. This tied Mikey and Roger for the big northern of the week.

The beer tastes great, the fishing is great and the stress from the real world is a distant memory!
