## Ordinances Arrive for Farmington

Clerk Joanne Oneska saved the best news for last when the Town of Farmington Board met July 1. Attorney Harvey returned the package after a lengthy perusal. Several members of the committee involved in the ordinance updates will look through the changes before presenting them to the Plan Commission.

In the meantime, a special meeting of the Town Board and the Plan Commission has been called for July 15, 7:30 p.m. at the Town Hall to

review subdivision ordinances. Clerk Oneska and Supervisor Roell have a number of sample ordinances to look at. The Plan Commission next meets on July 22.

Building Inspector John Derler reported that building permits have been issued for eighteen new homes in this first six months of 2003, compared to thirteen in 2002 and eighteen in 2001.

The Board determined to place "No Trespassing, Town Property" signs up at both ends of a half-acre parcel owned at Green Lake. A nearby resident brought up safety issues last month about chil-

dren bicycling on the property.

Also on Green Lake, the Town will work with the County to widen and reditch the cul-de-sac on Lakeview Drive, improving the road so that buses and other vehicles won't have to use the shoulder to make turns.

With the coming budgeting crunch looming overhead, decisions regarding purchasing versus renting a truck to help with trimming were again considered; Chairman Dieringer asked the audience of about a dozen if they were adverse to renting the equipment. The Wisconsin Towns Association also sent a letter

to all towns officials asking them to call the governor's office and let him know how the budgeting will affect their communities.

In a final bit of surprise, the clerk noted that Washington County sent in its OK for the Rex property subdivision development to the State. "Without its being approved?" asked Dieringer. Oneska replied, "I'm usually the one who sends them in. I don't know if this is how the state wants to handle these things now. Apparently, the county thinks the subdivision is OK."

## Focus on Farmington & Kewaskum

### FARMINGTON HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

Visiting a 150-year-old business is an interesting experience. Our group was excited to explore inside the former Reliance Mill in Boltonville on Saturday July 12. Tom and Kathy Mueller graciously hosted about twenty for the Farmington Historical society friends and members outing. We were fortunate to have Tom's father, LeRoy, join us. LeRoy worked many years for the company and even married the boss's daughter.



Tom bought the mill in 2000, and he and his family have been making steady improvement. New windows and roof, paint and concrete work have been done. Many of the visitors expressed their excitement about actually being inside of the mill. They came with their parents when they were young, but never had occasion to come in and see the workings. Tom took us down the basement with its wonderful old hand-hewn beams, stone foundation and dirt floor. Built about 1854 by Harlow Bolton, a big inside wheel was powered by water diverted from Stony Creek sent through a raceway. The wheel has long been gone, and a gas turbine engine was once used when the race didn't generate enough power. There is water under the mill in a closed off area, but the race now feeds into the pond in Boltonville. The great wheel ran belts that lifted the grains up to the third floor head house. The height of the third story allowed the force of gravity to send the

grain to the mixers. Now, Tom uses a machine called a hammer mill. He showed us the screens used to determine how fine the final product would be ground, with different mesh sizes for finely ground to coarsely ground meal. Feed ground with the hammer mill is blown into a contraption called the cyclone on the second floor, then sent through the mixers on the first floor.

On the first floor, we walked over the dump shoot on the front porch into the main sales area. The scale Tom uses dates at least to 1922, and is found to be quite accurate at each inspection. The mixers are there, also. The group was intrigued by the "Boltonville Mills - the Farmer's Friend since 1848" sign on the wall.

We went up the original stairway to the second floor to the storage bins. Twine to tie the bags still comes on wooden spools. Corn, oats, and soy meal is sent up the cup elevator for storage. Holes in the floor and ceiling

show where piping from the basement used to carry the various products up and down. A couple of our members were thrilled to discover account books from 1868 and 1894. Another sign, "Farmington Hi-Speed Mash," was on the wall. A loading chute that LeRoy once made leaned against the wall. These old pioneers were practical - a license plate from 1968 patched an inconvenient hole in the floor.

On the third floor we saw the head house. Tom and his sons built it out of PVC piping. This is where the grain is diverted into its proper bin. The original flour separators are housed up there, too, but no longer in use.

"It's funny people can pick out things we never even noticed before," said Kathy.

We thank them for allowing us in.

### Slower Traffic Keep Right:

## Drivers Must Allow Faster Traffic to Pass In the Left Lane on Divided Highways

Interstate highways and other multiple-lane roadways are designed for the orderly and safe flow of vehicles. But to keep traffic moving smoothly and efficiently, motorists need to practice "lane courtesy."

Lane courtesy is the simple act of moving to the right to allow faster traffic to pass. This practice reduces tailgating, passing in the right lane, and weaving in and out of traffic.

"When drivers practice lane courtesy, they also defuse situations that cause road rage. Most motorists say that slower traffic in the left lane - is a major irritation and source of frustration," says Captain David Pichette of the state Patrol's district office in Fond du Lac.

Wisconsin law states that any vehicle traveling "at less than the normal speed of traffic" shall be driven in the right-hand lane (or as close as practicable) except when overtaking or passing another vehicle. A citation for violating this law costs \$175.40.

"If you are driving at the speed limit in the left lane and another vehicle is tailgating you, move over to the right lane and let the vehicle pass," Captain Pichette says. "Trying to force other drivers to slow down by blocking the left lane does not make our highways safer. Instead, it leads to more tailgating, road rage and other prob-

lems. We hope that motorists will leave enforcement of speed limits to our troopers."

The State Patrol advises motorists to practice the following lane courtesy guidelines to help maintain a safe flow of traffic on the interstate and other divided highways:

- If you're not passing another vehicle, stay out of the far left lane whenever possible.

- If you're in the right lane, allow other drivers to merge from the left lane into the right lane so that faster traffic can pass in the left lane. In addition, provide space for vehicles to merge into the right lane when they are entering a roadway from an on-ramp.

- If you're in the left lane, don't tailgate or try to make a slower vehicle ahead of you move to the right lane when it's not safe, such as near on-ramps.

Captain Pichette says, "When motorists practice lane courtesy, traffic flows more smoothly with less congestion and road rage. Lane courtesy costs nothing but makes our highways safer and more efficient."

This little scene took place in the 1920's in a little hat shop in the building just east of the "hotel." The milliner was Lula Danis, sister of the pharmacist Miller and aunt of Charlie Miller, your former village president. I was seven or eight.

I had spied a heavenly pink cloud of a hat that I wanted more than life itself it probably was totally inappropriate for me, and mother objected. I went into the snit of my life - foot stamping, arm folding, jaw jutting snit. I really wanted that pink cartwheel hat with a wreath of flowers around the crown and pink satin ribbons fluttering down the back. Mother tried to push an ivory cloche (new at the time).

Poor Lula was between us, desperately trying to at least sell ANY hat. I can still see her distressed expression. Things got pretty testy and the battle was between the three of us, Lula fluctuated taking sides, depending upon which one of us was "winning." It was a struggle to behold, but I showed up in church that Easter with the "icky" cloche. I'm sure I was devastated.

For weeks after that, whenever I passed that shop, I pressed my nose to the window to see "my" pink hat. One day it was gone, and it took me a long time to get over it.

I don't get to Kewaskum often any more, but when I pass that shop, my head still turns as though I expect to see that hat and the scene that took place there so long ago.

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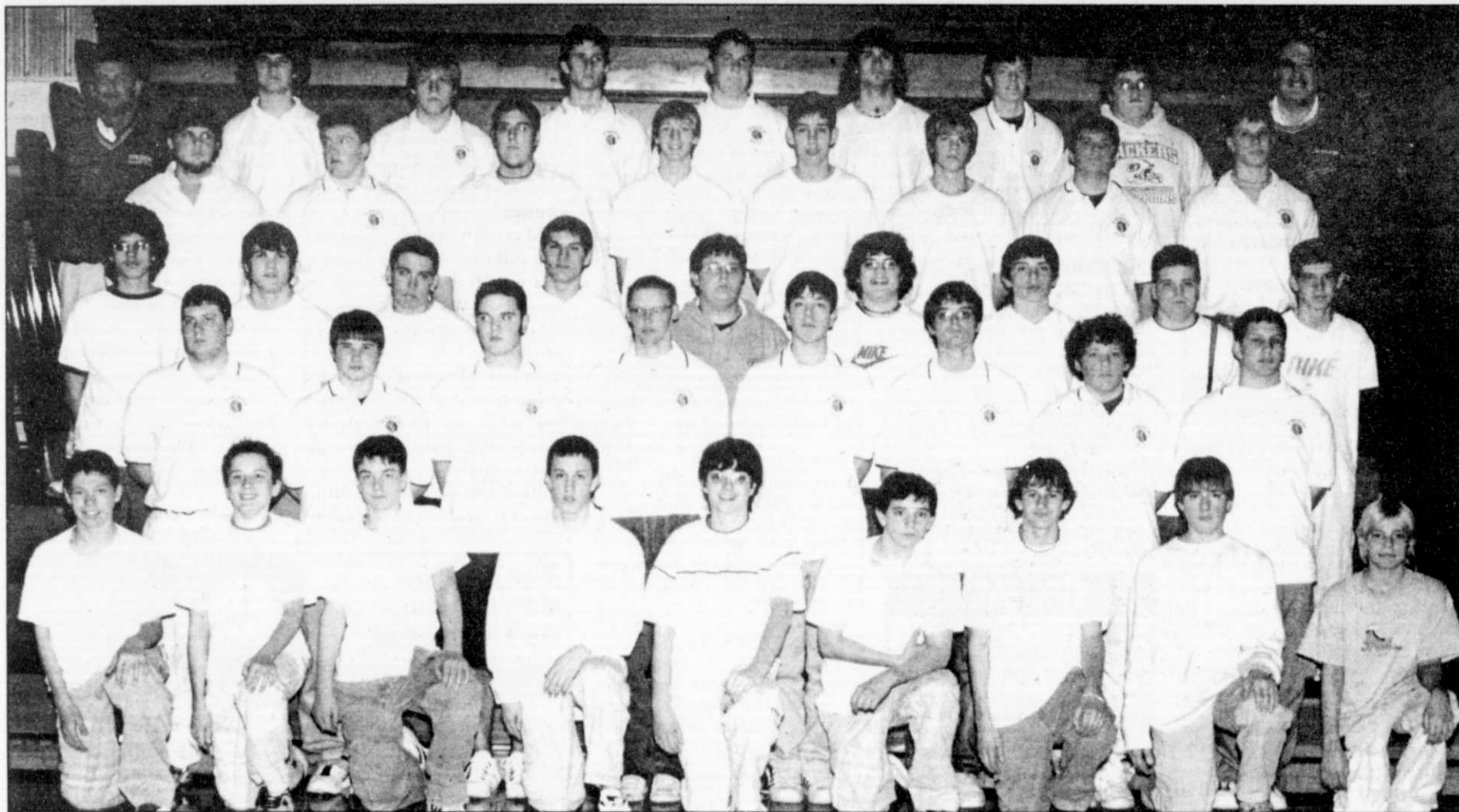
