Ratzel re-hired as part-time police officer

Village to adopt truancy ordinance this month

The Kewaskum Village Board met Monday evening. The first agenda item saw Village President, Matt Heiser and Kewaskum Woman's Club member, Gwen Dreher handed out the Village Beautification Awards to three Kewaskum homeowners. A fourth homeowner was mentioned but was unable to attend.

Dreher stated it took her and the group three hours to travel the entire village in search of winners for the award. The Woman's Club has been keeping up with the project since 1996. Photos of those recognized can be found on page four of this edition.

Heiser was pleased to hand out the awards and concluded, "It's pretty impressive considering the spring we had."

The village then heard a proposal from Kewaskum High School principal, Christine Horbas who tried to sell the idea of enacting a truancy ordinance. Horbas started out by telling the board the high school has 10% of it's school population that are considered habitually truant. Currently there is no law that can help bring that number down.

Horbas indicated that a student may be gone for one hour or a whole day to be considered truant. The school now gives out detentions for truancy but she feels that a detention is no longer an effective measure to deter students from skipping class. Horbas stated, "If a student is

not prepared for a test, it's easier to skip the class and take the 45 minute detention instead of failing the test."

Neighboring community, Campbellsport has a similar ordinance.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel seemed quite favorable to the idea, stating that a judge has the authority to also take away a teen's drivers, hunting/fishing license or impose a financial penalty. He also stated that this would all be handled by the school liaison officer so it would not create extra work for officers on patrol.

With everyone in agreement the board gave the nod for Village administrator Dan Schmidt and Knoebel to draft an ordinance for the board's review at the August 16th meeting.

In his report Knoebel asked for permission to hire back former Kewaskum Police Officer, Alan Ratzel. Ratzel was forced to leave the department three years ago because of his full-time job.

Knoebel stated he hoped to have Ratzel on duty in about two weeks. He will need to go through some in-house training and shooting. When asked about the cost of the additional part-time officer Knoebel stated that hiring Ratzel will actually cut back on the cost of over-time paid to other officers. This will also eliminate a scheduling headache when another officer wishes to take vacation time.

Chief Knoebel also indicated that West Bend Savings Bank will sponsor the Packer football cards handed out by police officers.

Mini golf/batting cage park on hold

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The Town of Kewaskum Plan Commission decided to keep plans for a proposed miniature golf/batting cage park on the fareway, with hopes to get it to the green for approval at the August Plan Commission meeting.

Andy and Nancy Roenke, along with Roger and Ann Neumann petitioned the Town Board to rezone 39.2 acres of their family farm from EA (Exclusive Agricultural) to P1, Park District. The property is located at 4265 CTH. H in the Town of Kewaskum.

At the July Plan Commission meeting, Nancy Roenke, daughter of Roger and Ann Neumann, presented the idea to a standing-room only crowd at the Town Hall. "This is my family farm and I want to keep it intact," Roenke said. "The business would also serve as a buffer between the Town and Village. Roenke also said the business would prevent the land being sold to develop "little houses."

The Plan Commission tabled the vote until the July meeting, where once again the vote was held over another month.

Mike Lettow, Plan Commission chairman suggested the Roenke's consider only rezoning eight of the 39 acres P1, Park District and asked that the Plan Commission reconsider the request at their August meeting.

Nancy Roenke said they were advised at the beginning

of the process in February to only rezone eight acres and was not sure why the Plan Commission had changed their mind along the way. She said the decision to wait another month does not affect their plans to open the miniature golf/batting cage park in the spring of 2005.

A Town of Kewaskum man has been charged with allegedly killing his step-daughter's cat. Ricky Balboa, 36, was in Washington County court last week.

According to a criminal complaint filed in Washington County Circuit Court Balboa shot the cat while trapping it under a laundry basket

on July 15 at his Oak Drive home. The complaint further says that Balboa thought the cat had worms so he shot it with a pellet gun.

If convicted, Balboa faces up to for years in prison. Due to a previous record of felony burglary and possession of a firearm his penalty is more severe.

Wentz is due back in Waukesha County Court for a preliminary hearing on September 2nd.

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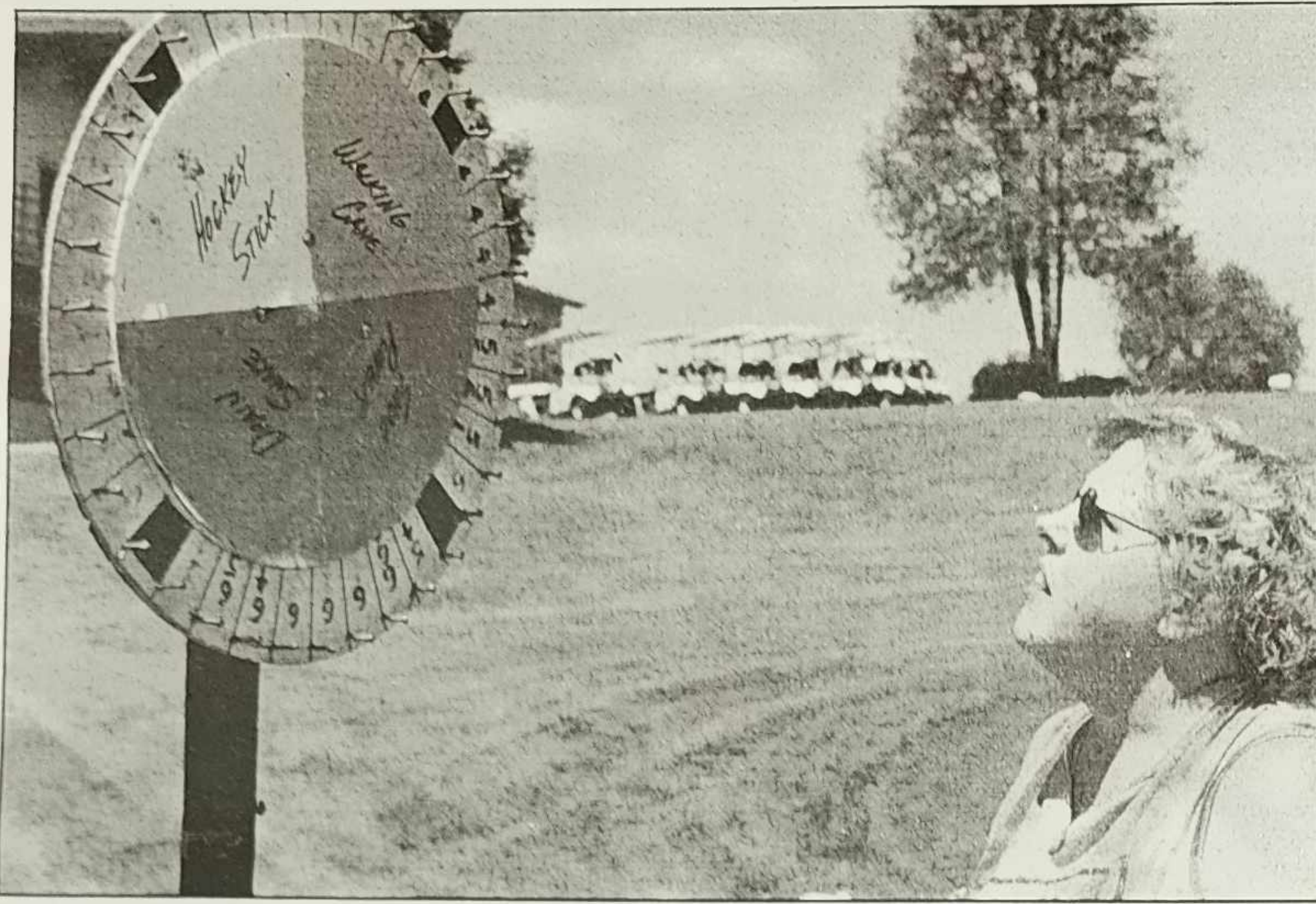

Annual Meeting Accentuates Positive Accomplishments Throughout District

Though the July 26 Kewaskum School District Annual Meeting was sparsely attended, District Administrator Wayne Graczyk presented an upbeat report to those in attendance, highlighting far more positive activities and programs than could be included in this article.

Graczyk said that while "these were but a few of the positive things we have accomplished, they somehow tend to fly under the radar screen and the school district just can't continue to let that happen." He said that staff, School Board and students alike must be willing to "toot our own horns" and let the residents of the school district "know just how good we are. Sometimes even our own parents and students don't fully realize how good we are, particularly our test scores for this year."

He said that we take our accomplishments for granted way too often, adding that Kewaskum is consistently compared to surrounding school districts and the state via the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concept Exams, given to all 4th, 8th and 10th grade students. He shared that residents, even some parents, may not know that in 2003-04, Kewaskum students scored above the state average in Advanced Proficient and Proficient scores in all five subject areas...Reading, Math, Science, Social Studies

and Language Arts.

He went on to say that, "Kewaskum is usually compared to the West Bend district." For the record he said, at the 10th grade level Kewaskum students scored higher in Advanced Proficient/Advanced than West Bend students in 3 of the 5 subject areas, at the 8th grade level they were higher in 4 of the 5 areas and at the elementary level, higher in all 5 areas. "This is information we need to get out," he said.

He took the opportunity to expound on and review many highlights from the past school year. He spoke of approximately \$75,000 in grant and scholarship funding secured for the district. He mentioned special and unique elementary programs implemented that help children achieve and succeed, such as the Tutoring-Coop Program between Kewaskum Elementary and the High School, a new elementary Homework Club, the Shape-Up-Wisconsin program where students participated in biking, walking, running, roller-blading and aerobics, and a new S.I.T (Student Intervention Team) to work with students struggling in their school work. He also mentioned the KES Respect Committee was initiated as an example of students and adults working together for the benefit of all.

At the Middle School he drew attention to the fact

that the Honor Level Discipline program, started a couple of years ago, had 98% of the student body at the two top levels of the 4-step program and that 32% of the student body "did not have a single infraction for the entire school year. Now that is fantastic news for parents at a time when all we tend to hear about are the students who get into trouble," he said.

The Middle School Book Fair continues to be legendary with 3 Fairs generating in excess of \$10,000 in sales. Ms. Airaudi's educational experience in Greenland, sponsored by the National Science Foundation Camp, gave students and staff the ability to feel and share her experience via the Internet.

At the high school level some of the things Mr. Graczyk shared were, the high school girls volleyball team once again were EWC conference champions, that 11 students competed in the state forensics competition, the KEY Club served 146 free turkey dinners for the senior citizens in the community as a community service project, and the successful first-ever Jump-Start Academic Camp was held for two weeks in June for incoming freshman students.

"These were just a few of the many positive things our students and teachers have accomplished and too often

are taken for granted," Graczyk said. He stressed that the 2004-05 school year can and will be even more successful and asked everyone to "help spread the word about how good Kewaskum is" as we strive to become a

Professional Learning Community. He concluded his remarks by asking the administrators, teachers and Board members to give themselves "a pat on the back" for a job well done.

A special thank you to community businesses and residents for water maintenance of the flower planters which is well appreciated during these hot summer days.

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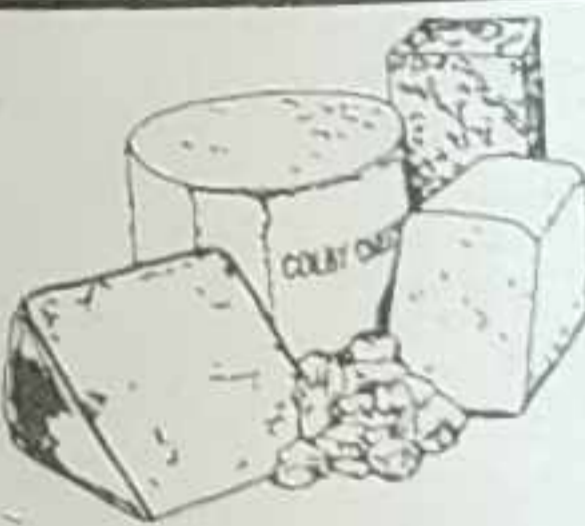

Allenton man killed in crash on Highway 175

An Allenton man was killed Wednesday, July 28 in an accident that shut down Highway 175 in Washington County for nearly two hours. The crash occurred at 10:40 a.m..

Sheriff's deputies say 19-year-old Lee Walzcak was killed when his car was hit by a milk truck. An investigation in the crash indicated Walzcak failed to yield as he was south on Highway W. The driver of the milk truck, Alan Gehl of Mayville was not injured.

Authorities also say that alcohol was not a factor in the crash. The St. Lawrence Fire Department and Allenton Rescue responded to the scene.

This is the eighth fatal accident this year in Washington County.

Washington County will receive \$12,000 for Hmong Refugees

Over the next few months, Washington County and the rest of Wisconsin will be home to over 3,600 newly arriving Hmong refugees. About eight refugees will be placed in Washington and Ozaukee Counties.

To help assist in getting the refugees into the job market the state has received \$1 million in funds. About \$12,000 of that money will be distributed in Washington and Ozaukee.

The funding will help make the transition into the community.

A blurb in the bottom corner says the picture was

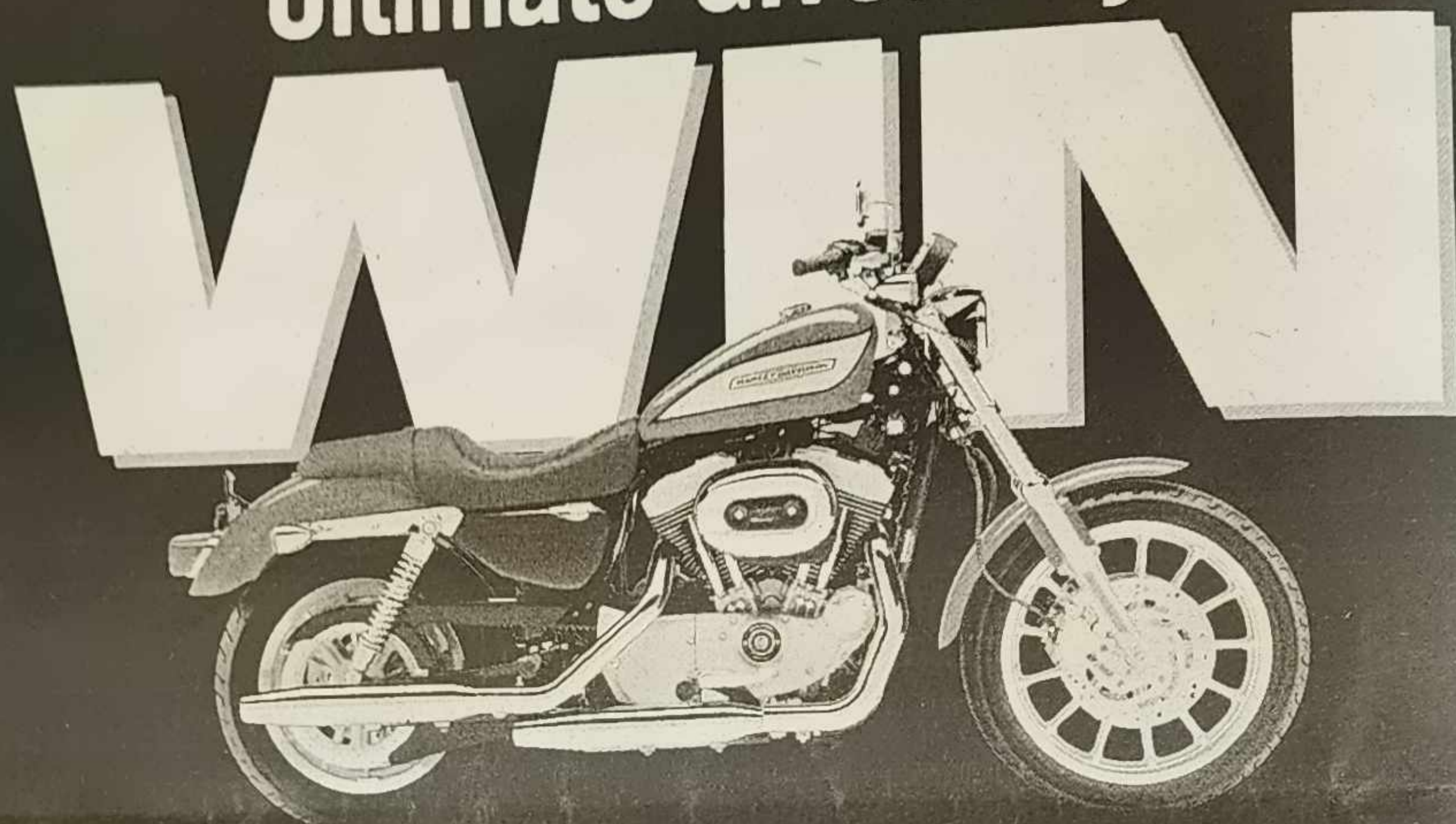
taken while Lynn was in concert in West Bend, Wisconsin July 22nd. On pages 10 and 11 there are three shots of Loretta from her appearance at the fair.

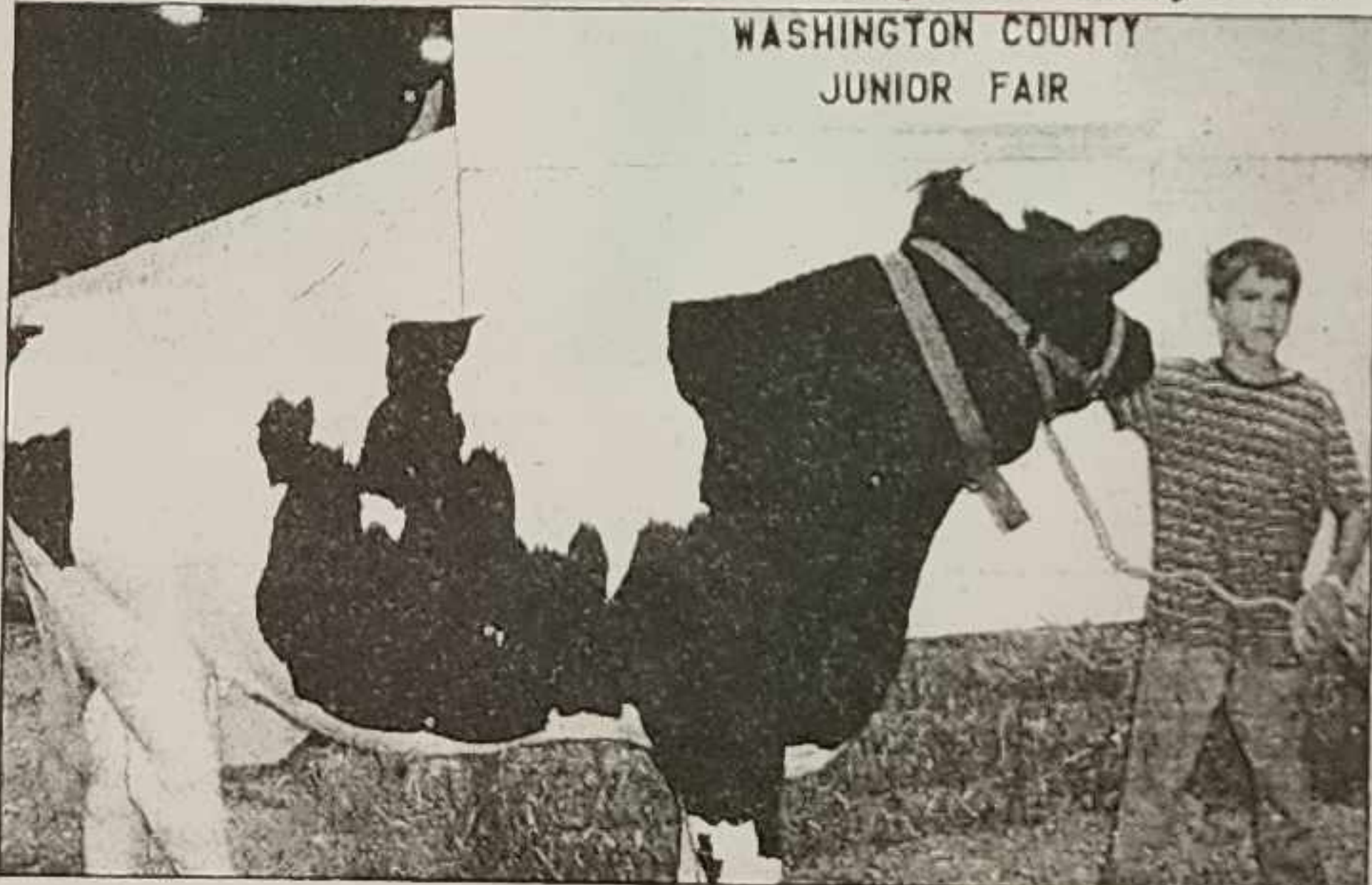

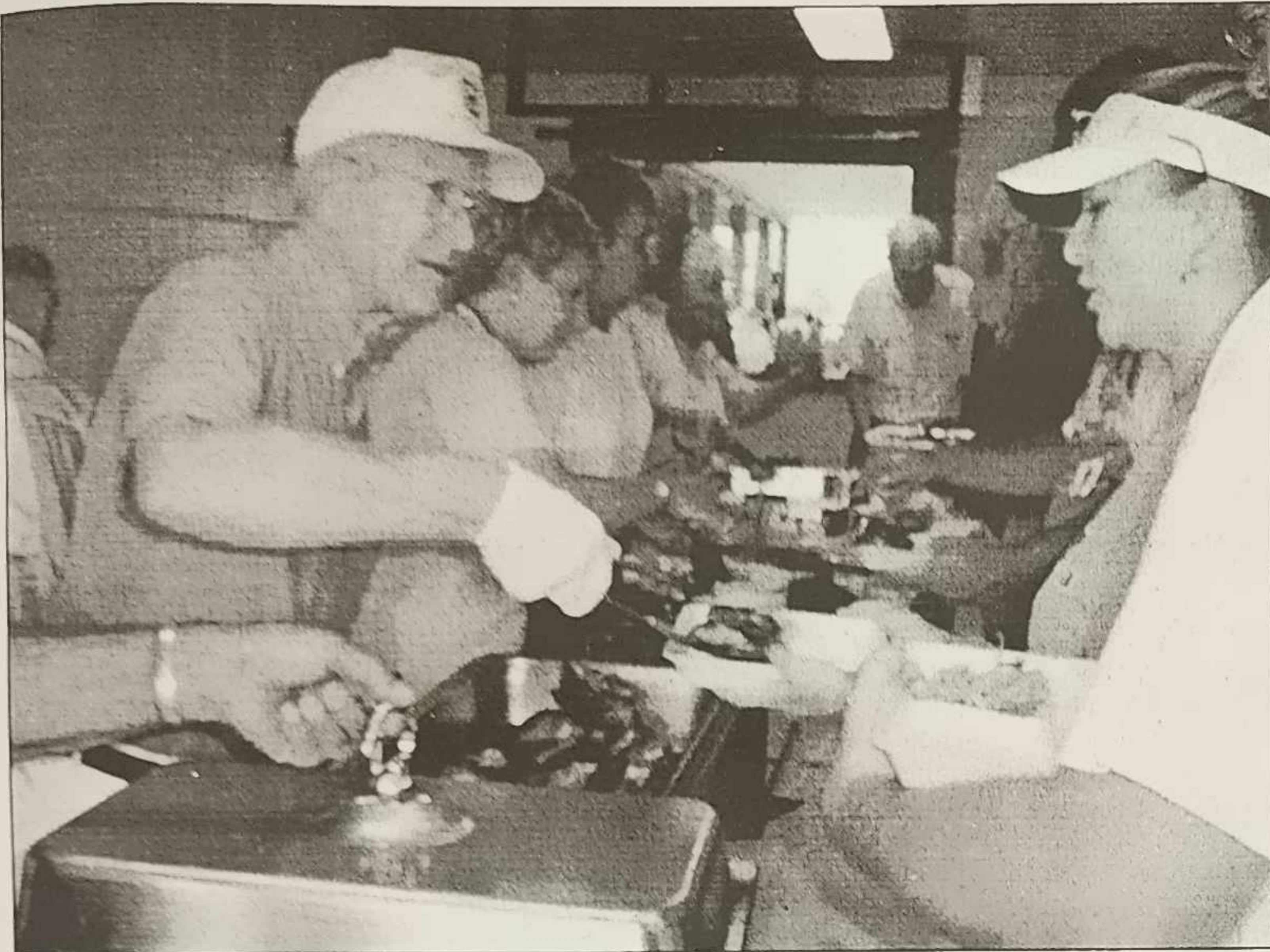

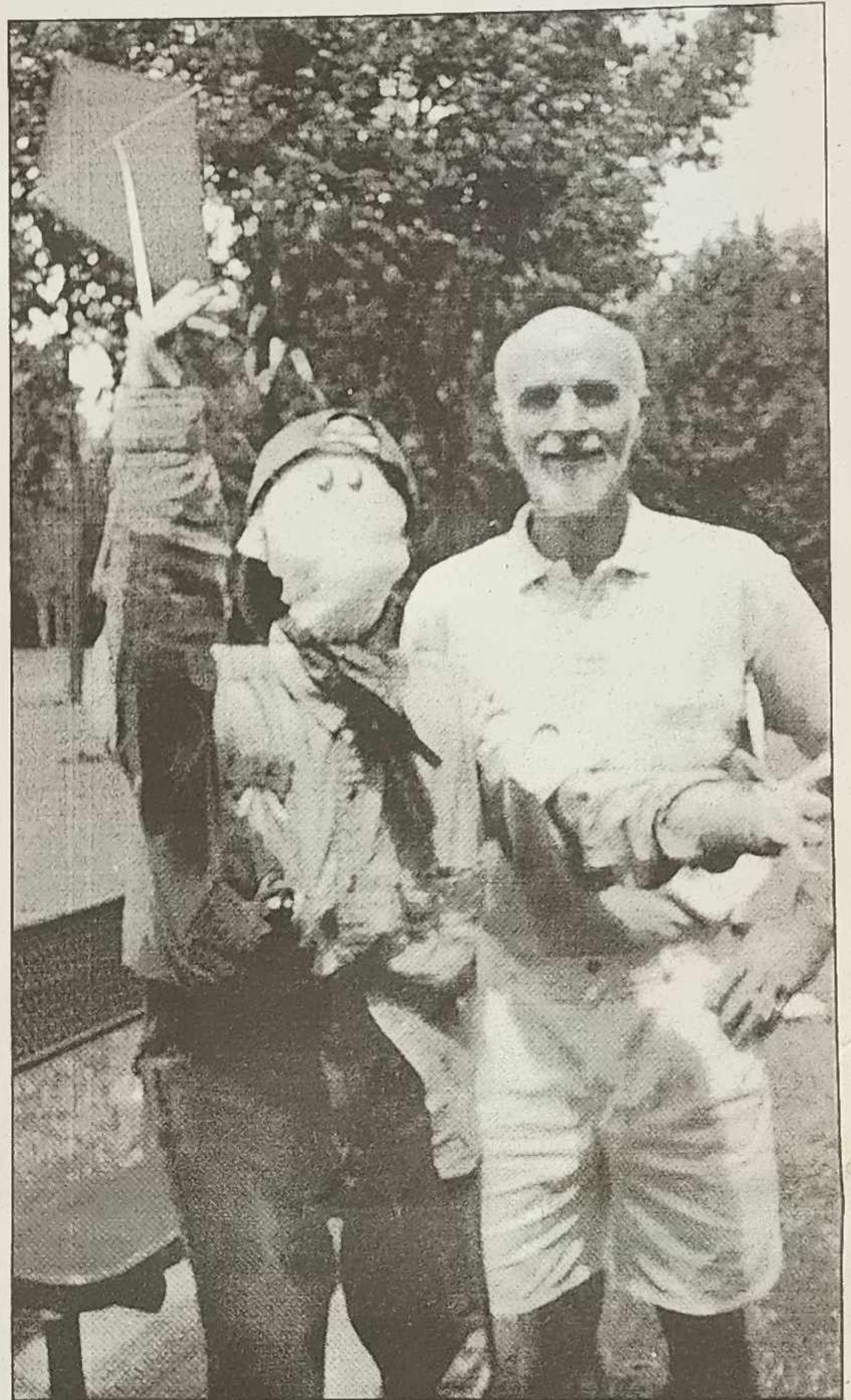

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Wisconsin to South Dakota

Wisconsin Takes Center Stage Next Week

I'm heading back to class tonight, but there are no costs, no books that I know of, no tests, and no final grade.

So what kind of a course is this? It's a two hour session on being a volunteer in the merchandising tent at the upcoming PGA Tournament, the fourth of golf's prize "majors" which is being held next week at the Whistling Straits Golf Course north of Kohler.

Being awarded the PGA on one of his courses was a "golden ring" for Herbert V. Kohler Jr., the owner of the Kohler Company, whose goal several years ago was to put Wisconsin on the national golf map.

The construction of his first two courses at Blackwolf Run and hosting a Women's U.S. Open was the first step. This one, at a magnificent and long track located on the cliffs above Lake Michigan, is a giant leap.

Wisconsin golf fans apparently want to join with Kohler in welcoming America to their fair state because approximately 8,000 originally signed up to help as volunteers.

I was one of the lucky ones chosen, along with Dick Wietor, who has also been assigned to the merchandise operation, Carol Martin, the girls golf coach at Kewaskum High School, and Joel Fehlhaber.

We already have our uniforms, which include wine-colored shirts with the PGA logo and tan pants or bermuda shorts, all made by a top-of-the-line golf clothing manufacturer. They come at a price, however, and the \$160 tag for three items probably scared away some of the original applicants.

There is one major perk, however, that being the pass that allows the volunteers access to the practice rounds (Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday) and the four actual days of the tournament (Friday through Sunday). I love the First Bank Open (formerly the Greater Milwaukee Open), but here we will get to see Phil Mickelson, Davis Love III, Vijah Singh, John Daly, Jerry Kelly, Jim Furyk, and, oh yes, that guy Tiger Woods, who should come to the Straits more fired up than usual because of the two-year drought without a major win.

This being a Ryder Cup year, several other players, including Kelly, who is from Madison, will be focusing on finishing in the top 10, not just solely because of the paycheck it will bring but because of the points it will give them in the race for the final spots in the Ryder Cup lineup.

Kelly just moved up to the 10th spot with his eighth place in the Buick Open, but Jeff Maggert is right on his heels for that spot.

"It will be interesting to see what the pros can do there," Wietor said last week, indicating he played the course on a fall day several years ago. "The holes along the lake are spectacular ... I don't know what will happen on a windy day."

Wietor was especially impressed with No. 12, the first par-3 on the back nine, which is like an hourglass. "It must be like that hole at Pebble Beach" where the green is surrounded by rocks and the Pacific Ocean.

"I don't think the PGA sets it up as tough as the U.S. Open," Wietor said, still expecting rounds in the high 70s, and possible double bogeys for those who stray too far off the narrow fairways.

"It's just an awesome course," Wietor said.

Ditto. I got to play Whistling Straits in the media day several years ago. It was my first and only time ever having a caddy, and help on some of the holes was immeasurable.

I still remember one piece of advice he gave me when I veered off line and wound up in a bunker that was twice as tall as I am. "The head pro here tried to get out of this bunker and couldn't," my caddy said to me.

I heard and I understood, taking out my trusty sand wedge, turning backwards and hitting out of the sandy abyss.

I plan on revisiting that hole next week, just to see what happens if one of the big guns goes in there.

For now, however, it's on to the classroom for listening and learning.

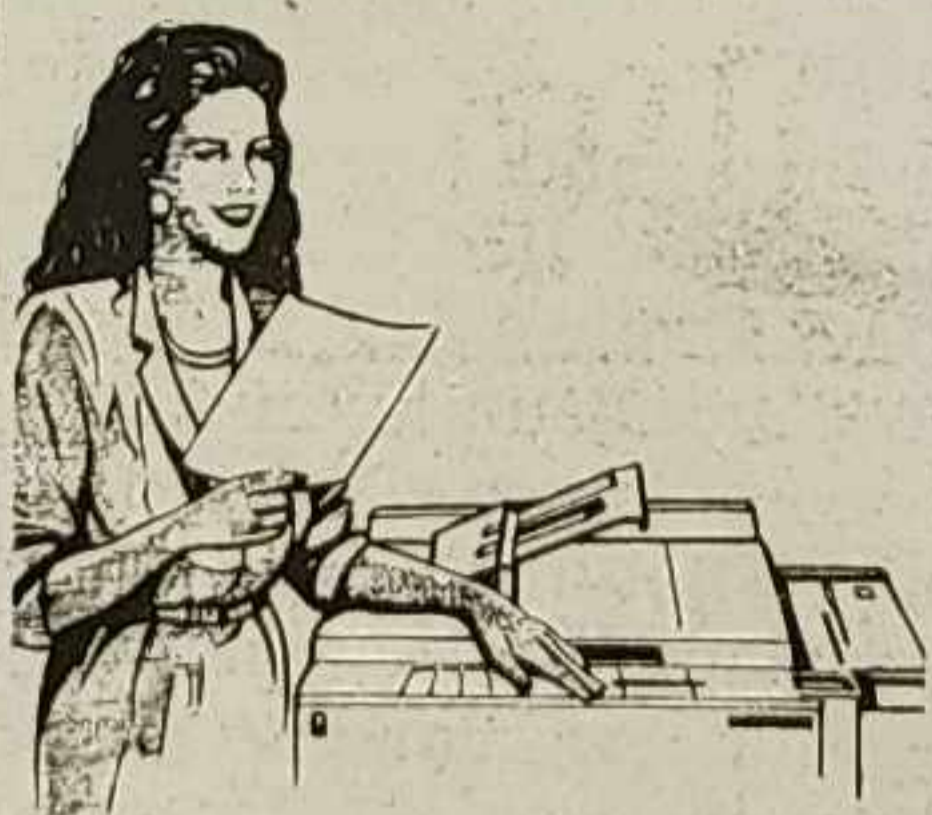

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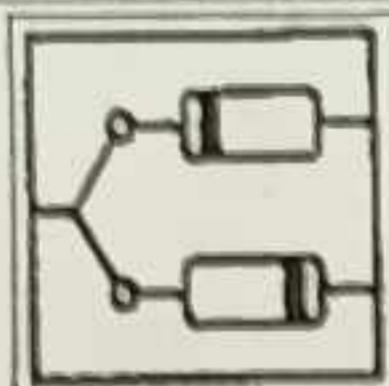

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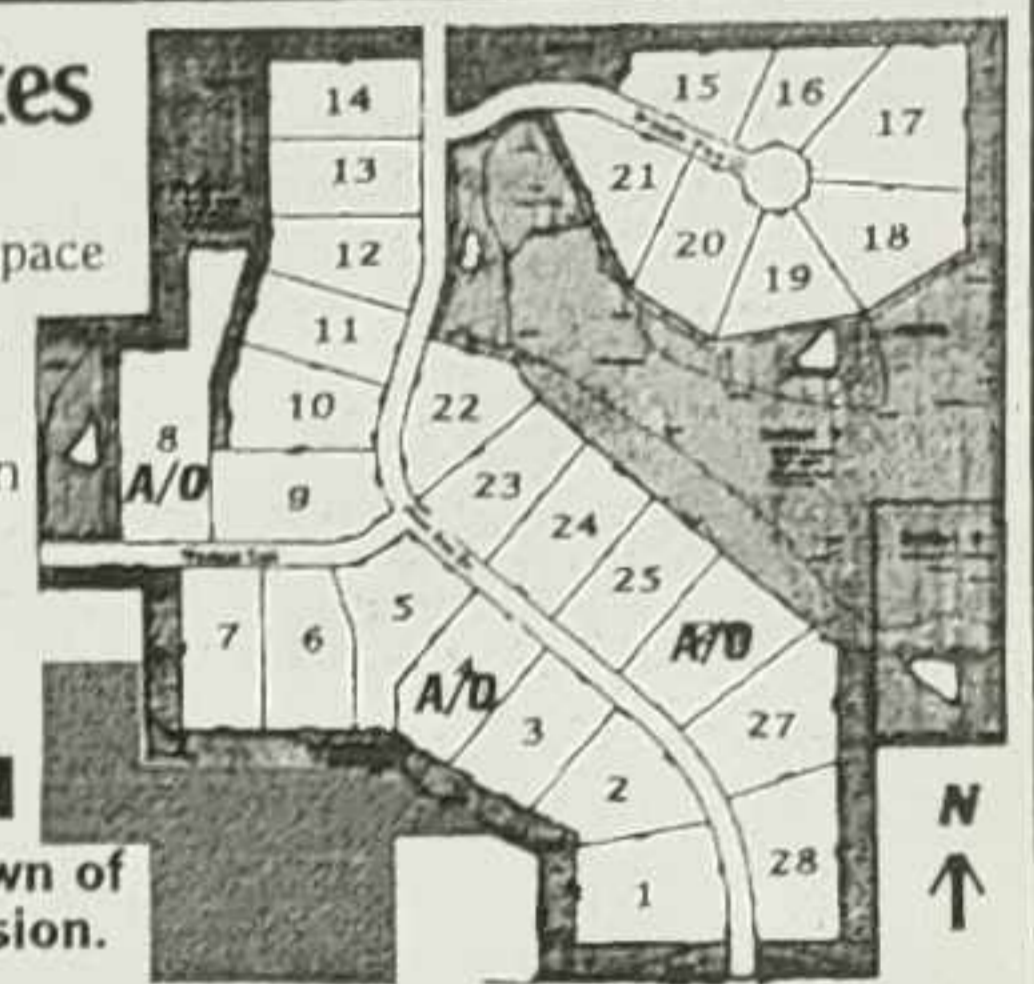

A's Enjoy Successful Weekend

The Kewaskum Athletics home talent baseball team finished up its Tri-County Nite League season on a high note and kept alive its hopes for a Rock River league play-off berth ... all in the same weekend.

The A's definitely saved their best offense until the last inning Saturday when they scored four runs in the top of the ninth inning to edge host Oconomowoc 6-5. Oddly enough, they only hit one ball out of the infield in the winning rally, that being a single by Garrett Donath that found a hole between first and second bases.

Down 5-2 with three outs to go, Kewaskum quickly had the bases loaded after the Oconomowoc pitcher walked Ty Schill, Jeff Panzer and Steve Ketter in order.

Then Jim Ziegler beat out an infield hit, allowing Schill to score, Donath followed with a single that produced two more runs, and after Josh Parrent laid down a perfect bunt and beat it out, Keith Heberer followed with an RBI single.

Parrent returned to the mound where he had been stingy since taking over for Bob Ogi in the seventh. He

stopped the Oconomowoc team cold in the ninth to notch his second big win in recent weeks.

According to A's spokesperson Ziegler, Parrent allowed just one hit, walked one and struck out one in the final three innings.

Ogi struggled early in the game, giving up a 2-run homer to Jeff Rhoads in the first and allowing three more runs in the second. After that, he settled down and pitched shutout ball until the seventh when player/manager Jason Strobel decided to call on Parrent.

The A's wound up with 13 hits, including three by Ziegler, who had an RBI double in the first inning and a solo homer in the sixth.

"That was my first one of the year," Ziegler said of his dinger, reporting the ball cleared the field in left field.

Donath and Parrent both went 2x5, and Ketter finished up 2x3.

The win gave the Athletics a 4-6 final mark in Tri-County action.

The winning ways followed the A's right back to Kiwanis Park on Sunday. Ziegler scattered nine hits and pitched a complete-game 5-0 shutout over Rubicon.

Strobel was Ziegler's best friend in the bottom of the

first when he launched a 3-run blast over the left-field fence. Scoring ahead of Strobel were Panzer, who had singled, and Ketter, who drew a walk off Rubicon's pitcher Oldenwald.

The A's added a single run in the fourth when Donath walked, stole second and raced home on Schill's hit.

Another insurance run was added in the sixth on a couple of Rubicon errors.

Panzer led another 13-hit attack by the A's. He went 3x5, with Ketter going 2x3, Adam Sarauer 2x4 and Schill 2x5.

Kewaskum should have probably had more runs because of all the base runners it had. By Ziegler's count, 11 A's were left stranded in the game.

Ziegler had a great pitching outing, striking out six and not walking a single Rubicon hitter.

"There were no (Rubicon) runners at third at all," Ziegler said, indicating his change-up was really working well Sunday. "I just kept them off balance," he said, also praising the team's defense, which turned a pair of double plays.

The win puts the A's record at 9-6 in the Rock River. Rubicon came in at 10-2 and had been in second place in the RR.

When asked if this was

the A's biggest win of the season, Ziegler said, "This one and Oakfield ... Both were pretty big wins for us."

Next Sunday, the A's will host Hustisford in a 1:30 p.m. game. "The last time I looked, we were tied with Hustisford" for fourth place, Ziegler said. This will be a key game for both teams because only four teams make the RR playoffs.

KEWASKUM — It would be a stretch to say 2003-04 was successful for the athletic teams at Kewaskum High School.

The lone championship came in the fall with coach Dave Rizzardi directing the girls' volleyball team to another Eastern Wisconsin Conference title, the third under Rizzardi in the past five years.

Most of the other teams struggled, finishing in the lower division of the EW, but there were a couple fine individual efforts, like the third-place finish by Nick Bartley in the WIAA Division 2 State Wrestling Tournament, the several individual track records broken in the spring and the fourth place by the Amanda Donath (400 meters) in the Division 2 State Track Meet.

What the 2004-05 season will bring will take several months to uncover, but the fall teams are getting ready for the opening days of practice, which start off with girls golf meeting on Aug. 9th at 9 a.m. at Hon-E-Kor Country Club and the football players picking up gear on the 9th, from 8 a.m. to 10:30 a.m.

KHS Athletic Director/Head Football Coach Jason Piittmann has announced the seniors will pick up gear beginning at 8:00, with the jun-

iors asked to arrive at 8:45, the sophomores at 9:30 and the freshmen candidates at 10:15.

The opening practice will be the following morning at 8 a.m.

Piittmann has also announced the opening days for other teams: girls tennis, Aug. 10th at 8 a.m. at the KHS tennis courts; boys soccer, Aug. 16th at 3:30 p.m. on the KHS soccer field; volleyball, Aug. 16th, at 9 a.m. in the field house; and boys and girls cross country, Aug. 16th at 8 a.m. at the high school.

The opening date for cheerleading practice is still to be determined, according to Piittmann, who reminds all athletes to bring along their physical forms or alternate year cards, their athletic emergency medical form and their \$50 user fees. No athlete may practice until all these items have been turned in to the athletic department.

In addition, all athletes must have attended one athletic code meeting with a parent before starting to practice in any sport.

Piittmann said the last code meetings are being held today (Thursday) at 2 p.m. and on Monday, Aug. 9th at 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. in the field house.

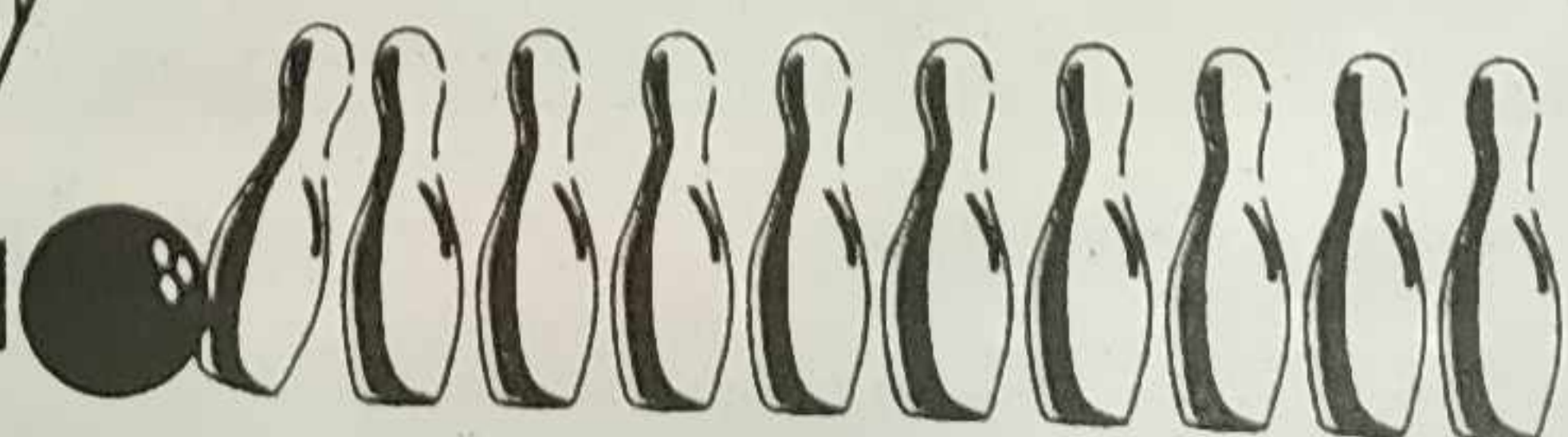

Trott Receives 2004 Gridiron Coaches Scholarship

He was a respectful young man in the classroom at Kewaskum High School, but you didn't want to run into Tim Trott on the football field.

In one-on-one confrontations, Trott, a starting line-backer on the Indians' varsity

football team the last two years, usually won. He won something else in late spring ... the third annual Gridiron Football Coaches Association scholarship, and on Wednesday evening, the award was presented to him at a meeting of the coaches and board members.

In introducing Trott, Joe

Backhaus, the vice president of the Gridiron club and the head sixth grade coach, said, "We think we covered both ends of the spectrum here," referring to academics and financial need, which are two major criteria in selecting scholarship winners.

Trott, who was also a member of the KHS baseball

team, earned first-team all-Eastern Wisconsin Conference honors as an inside line-backer last fall and was one of the Indians' team captains.

In the classroom, Trott carried a 3.4 grade point and plans to attend UW-Milwaukee in the fall, majoring in architecture. He is being raised by his mother, who has one daughter in college and another who is currently a senior at KHS.

"Our plan is to keep this an ongoing thing," Backhaus said about the scholarship. "This was made possible by the active coaches who donated \$500 of their own money," and the Gridiron club chipped in the rest to reach the mark of \$1,000.

Backhaus and Jim "Jonesy" Korth, the president of the Gridiron club and head eighth grade coach, said nine of the 13 seniors on the 2004 KHS football team, qualified for the award. A half dozen sent in applications for it.

Backhaus said Trott played Gridiron football for three years and was a member of the 1999 team that won the Wisconsin All American

Youth Football League title. "That was a heck of a day for everybody here," Backhaus said, and Korth added it was a pleasure to work with Trott in Gridiron football and then for four years in high school.

After the presentation, Trott said the reason he selected architecture as his major was because, "I like seeing things go up from blueprint (to completion)." This summer he secured a lot of practical experience in construction while working for Borland Builders.

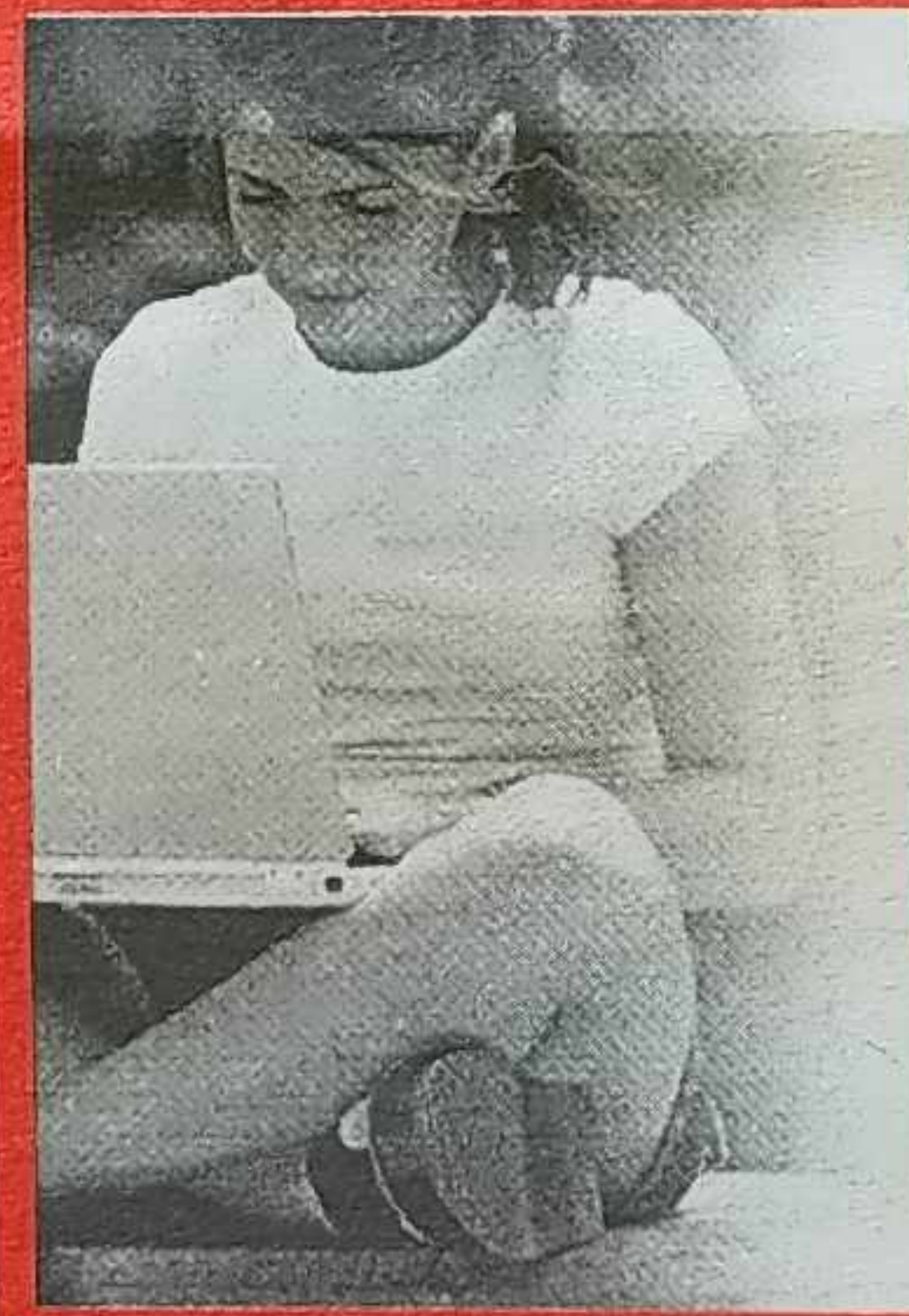
Football marathon
