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## Village agrees to support local Boys and Girls Club

Total for local branch estimated to be about \$24,000

**KEWASKUM-** The possibility of a Kewaskum branch of the Washington County Boys and Girls Club is becoming more of a reality for youth in the community. Both the village of Kewaskum and Washington County Social Services have made a financial commitment to fund the program.

Kewaskum Elementary School Principal Tom Fischer appeared before the Village Board at their meeting Monday, August 6. Jay Fisher, Director of Boys and Girls Club of Washington County, also joined him.

Fisher stated he received a call about six months ago from parents inquiring how to get a group started in Kewaskum. He contacted Fischer at KES shortly thereafter and the ideas snowballed from there.

Fisher explained that he envisioned the Kewaskum branch starting out in the same fashion as the successful Jackson branch did. The branch

would be operated out of Kewaskum Elementary School. He explained that currently the Jackson center has a full-time director and oversees the village's park and recreation program.

The model for the Kewaskum branch would include the hire of four part-time program administrators/facilitators at a cost of about \$24,000. Fisher estimated about 200 youth taking part in the program that would be run part-time, three days a week during the school year.

Trustee Kevin Scheunemann had a number of items he was unsure of. "My issue is, if we have parents interested in this and there is all this excitement, isn't there enough volunteers in the community, to oversee this?" he questioned.

Fisher replied by explaining that funding would come from a number of local and national sources as well, but to move the project forward, the board of directors at the county level wanted to see a financial commitment from the local units of government.

He explained that when the West Bend center started, the city made a financial commitment and likewise in Jackson. Ultimately, the local and national organization does not want to see a branch start and then fade out.

Village President Matt Heiser stated he enjoyed the idea of the partnership and that funding might come from a variety of sources.

Trustee Andy Pesch agreed, "It's a good opportunity to partner with the schools. I feel our kids in the village need some form of entertainment which we don't have in Kewaskum right now. You see kids on their skateboards; I wish they had some sort of supervision."

Fischer explained the program would be available for all Kewaskum area kids, including those in Farmington and Wayne townships. The program would run after school three days a week and would not run during the district's Wednesday early

## School District may see \$1.7 million surplus

**KEWASKUM-** School District officials released unaudited financial results for their recently ended fiscal year. The preliminary results saw over budget on revenues and under budget on expenditures.

Business Manager Paul Reichert informed members of the new finance committee that according to his records, the district will see a \$1,799,193 surplus added to the district's fund balance. Reichert reported an excess of \$54,554 in revenue and \$1,744,639 under budget for expenditures.

Reichert also explained that funding for the remodeling at the high school was coming out of fund balance so the almost \$1.8 million will help restore monies in the fund balance.

Currently, the district has between 18-19 percent of their operating budget in fund balance. The district strives to have 15 percent however, board policy required 10 percent as a minimum.

After the remodeling expenses are paid, Reichert said he expected the fund balance to be more like 13 percent of the operating budget.

The fund balance as of June 30, 2007 was \$2,670,400.

## Kewaskum township brings lawsuit against Sterns



The town of Kewaskum filed two civil lawsuits in Washington County Circuit Court on Friday, August 3 against Donald A. Stern and his wife June Sandra and David Stern and his wife Darlene. The lawsuit stems from violations of town ordinances regarding the condition of the two agricultural properties on Moraine Drive in the township. Town records show that correspondence with the two Stern families began after the town began investigating licensing junk dealers in March of 2005 while June Sandra Stern was the town's clerk. In April of that year the township informed Donald and June Stern that they would need to hold a salvage license in order to continue their salvage operation. The same correspondence was sent to David and Darlene Stern. Throughout the past three years inspections have been performed and records indicate the parties can not come to an agreement on the issue. ### Village investigating enacting sexual predator ordinance

**KEWASKUM-** The village will jump on the bandwagon in the idea of developing an ordinance stipulating where registered sexual predators can reside within the village. Village President Matt Heiser is behind the ordinance that is being investigated by Chief of Police Richard Knoebel.

Heiser's idea garnered support from the village board even though he stated he had not heard support from village residents. Trustee Kevin Scheunemann reported that he has heard from a number of residents who were in favor of the idea.

Chief Knoebel said he wanted to see clarification in the ordinance that distinguishes a sexual predator and sexual offender. He also reported that only about five communities in the state have passed ordinances. "Let's take our time and do this correctly," he replied.

Trustees agreed to have Chief Knoebel investigate the idea further and bring back additional sample ordinances from various communities.

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

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
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## Farmington man arrested for OWI after crash Sunday



The Boltonville Fire Department responded with the Washington County Sheriff's Department to a two vehicle crash on Sunday, August 5 at 8:32 p.m. According to Captain Steve Gonwa of the Sheriff's Department, Kyle J. Isaacson,

18, of Kewaskum, was driving a Chevrolet truck westbound on County Road H when Anthony T. Lutz, 21, of Farmington, drove through a stop sign while southbound on Eagle Ridge Drive. Lutz then entered County Road H, turning west in front of Isaacson who consequently attempted to pass Lutz in the eastbound lane to avoid a collision. That didn't help however because Lutz swerved into the eastbound lane and the vehicles collided. Lutz's Jeep slid out of control, entered the southwest ditchline of County Road H, struck a tree, then finally coming to rest on its passenger side. Isaacson's truck came to rest on Indian Lore Road. Lutz was later arrested at the scene for operating while intoxicated. Isaacson and his passenger were uninjured. Lutz suffered an eye injury but was treated at the scene by Boltonville First Responders. Gonwa reported Lutz had a blood alcohol level of .16. According to Circuit Court records Lutz has two prior convictions involving alcohol, both for underage possession in 2003. He has not yet been charged in this latest case.

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

### Ziegler sworn in as Supreme Court Justice

WEST BEND- It's official, Annette Ziegler, 43, is now a state supreme court justice. Washington County's first female judge became Wisconsin's sixth female supreme court justice during a noon swearing-in ceremony on Wednesday, August 1 at the Washington County Courthouse.

Fellow judge David Resheske administered the oath of office in Ziegler's now former courtroom. Ziegler said she had never seen her courtroom so packed. She thanked her family and friends, fellow judges, members of law enforcement and courthouse employees for their help during her time on the bench in Washington County.

Ziegler, who has an ethics case pending before the state judicial commission, is in the awkward position of joining a court that could soon sit in judgement of her. In May, Ziegler paid \$17,000 to settle a case with the state ethics board. The case unfolded as news surfaced that she made rulings on cases for West Bend Savings Bank, where her husband is a paid director.

A more formal investiture will take place this fall when the state's supreme court returns from its summer recess. Ziegler replaces Jon Wilcox who recently retired. She is Wisconsin's 80th justice.



Wisconsin Lutheran is a liberal arts college located on the west side of Milwaukee.




## The Bookworm Sez

### Dirty Martini

By J.A. Konrath

Who can resist the smell of baking bread?

Or something sizzling-hot on the grill? Or cookies, fresh from the oven and still warm? Who can walk past a donut shop and not pause for a sniff, calorie-free?

Hold on a second, though. Do you know what's in your food? Taste of Chicago can get you cooked when you listen to the new mystery audio "Dirty Martini" by J.A. Konrath, read by Susie Breck and Dick Hill.

Since last year, Detective Jacqueline "Jack" Daniels' life has changed quite a bit. She bought a house in the suburbs of Chicago and moved her mother in with her. Latham, Jack's boyfriend, asked her to marry him. And Jack's notoriety within the Chicago Police Force has grown. Jack's brought down more serial killers than practically anybody on the Force.

Now, Superintendent O'Loughlin is calling on Jack's expertise again. Chicagoans are being poisoned by a man who calls himself The Chemist, and this serial killer is more like a cereal killer. Delicatessens, restaurants, grocery stores, and sidewalk vendors are inadvertently selling food contaminated with deadly toxins, but - unbelievably - the PR man hired by the city has recommended that the public not be notified. Mass panic could ensue, he says. Chicago's tourism industry could be permanently crippled and tens of thousands of livelihoods could be affected. Instead, Jack is given the case to solve, with the help of a so-handsome-he's-distracting agent from the government's Hazardous Materials Response Team.

But this case will be one of the hardest that Jack has ever had. The Chemist is a master of disguise, and is slipperier than mercury on a tabletop. He darts into crowds - literally - as he injects poison into food and into his victims. He loves weapons, toxins, booby-traps, and killing cops. Thousands will die, he says, if the Chicago Police don't give him what he demands.

The Chemist wants \$2 million, and he wants Jack to deliver it. With Latham lying near-death in a hospital bed; Jack's partner, Herb, requesting a transfer to a tamer department; and so many lives at stake, will Lieutenant Daniels' world be shaken and stirred?

Author J.A. Konrath is known for his home-grown, finely told mysteries that ooze with gruesomely nasty killers, but this book is toned down quite a bit from the past ones. The Chemist is nefarious, true, but Konrath's normal, lovingly-described bloody murders are missing from "Dirty Martini" and that isn't necessarily all bad.

Jack, too, seems to have lost a little of her edginess but none of her sass, so fans of Konrath's past novels will be happy to hear the same kind of humor they've come to expect. Narrators Susie Breck and Dick Hill are back with first-rate performances that will keep you sitting in the car, wanting just one more track of this fourth installment in the Jacqueline "Jack" Daniels mystery series.

Belly up to the bookstore and ask for a shot of "Dirty Martini" in audio form. With seven discs to listen to, Happy Hour will last a good long time.

## Mango Chutney Chops With Asparagus

- 1 red bell pepper
- 4 mangos peeled, pitted and sliced
- 10 fresh pineapple chunks (about 1 inch) with 2 table spoons juice
- 1/2 cup brown sugar, packed
- 2 tablespoons Diamond Crystal Kosher Salt
- 2 tablespoons cider vinegar
- 1 tablespoon ginger root, peeled and chopped
- 1 jalapeño chili, seeded and chopped
- 8 boneless pork chops (1/2- to 3/4-inch thick)
- 1 bunch asparagus, trimmed





"FOR THE BIRDS..."

Poynette game farm stocks pheasants statewide"

A bird in the hand may be worth two in the bush. But 58,000 in the pen, from the perspective of the Manager of the State Game Farm at Poynette, can't guarantee how many ultimately find the brush when the pheasant season opens. Not when red foxes and Mother Nature have demonstrated little regard for the best laid plans and hopes of wildlife biologists and hunters.

The game Farm is responsible for hatching and raising pheasants solely for hunting purposes. The birds are stocked throughout the season on 71 public hunting properties spread over most of Wisconsin. The work literally, is unending year round.

With funding sources for the State Game Farm at Poynette mandated to increase last year and in 2007 by action initiated by Joint Committee on Finance of the State Legislature, it plays logical that hunters should expect to see more pheasant stocked. Game farm manager Bob Nack is in fact planning an increase of 6,000 birds from an already high 52,000 released for public hunting in 2006. Recent history tells him not to count his chickens though...even after they're hatched.

"Secure funding is a good thing for the State Game Farm," he said. "State statute mandates that 60 percent of the funding raised from pheasant stamp sales be used to operate this farm. Last year the stamp fee increased to \$10.00. This year is the first year that a stamp is required statewide for all pheasant hunters. Because of that secure funding stocking increased from 19,000 pheasants in 2004 to 52,000 in 2006. This year we're planning on 58,000. But these birds find a lot of ways to kill themselves."

Mother Nature and natural predators, despite the intended secure housing for the birds on the Poynette property, can add significantly to the mortality rate. Last year, for example, just a pair of red foxes gaining sly entry to some of the 110 pheasant pens on state property killed an estimated 700-800 pheasants before being successfully trapped. Because foxes "thrill kill", only a few of those pheasants were targeted for food. An "early, heavy and wet snow fall" tore pen nets, resulting in an additional loss of 500 birds. The netting was repaired; Farm personnel counted their losses and moved on.

According to Nack, be-

tween the intricately planned tasks necessary to operate the farm efficiently and unexpected challenges, the work load at the facility solely to bring hunting to the hunter is enormous. Seven permanent and 10 seasonal employees are needed to operate the farm efficiently and stock birds from the week prior to the season through the conclusion of the season. Even with secure funding, those monies covered only 40 percent of the facility's overall operating budget, including staff salaries, in 2006.

The State Game Farm, Nack said, is responsible for stocking Wisconsin properties from the far south as far north as Eau Claire and Marathon counties. Planning begins the spring before the next year's hunting season with the selection of hen and rooster breeders. For example, 7,900 hens and 700 roosters were kept this spring to produce stock for the 2008 fall season.

Breeders must display desirable characteristics to pass on to offspring. Birds can't be too light or heavy, cannot have long spurs or display too much red facial coloring. Breeders are immunized against avian cholera, kept for one year to produce the stock necessary to reach release goals and then also are released on public hunting terrain.

Breeding is triggered by artificial lighting in indoor barns and natural lighting in outdoor pens. Artificial lighting indoors, he said, enables farm managers to initiate production at any time. Production begins in February with farm employees already picking eggs in March. This year the

hatching season began April 12 and will continue weekly until mature stock at 18 weeks old is sufficient to supply the properties from a week prior to the first day of the season October 20 through the final day of the season December 31.

The property also holds two brooder barns where up to 6,000 chicks are raised for the first six weeks of life before being moved to the 108 large outdoor pens with standing corn, pellet feeding stations and water. Outdoor brooder houses also are ready in the event a hatch exceeding 6,000 chicks occurs.

The last hatch at the end of June enables the state to release mature, "fully colored-out" pheasants throughout the fall season. Three Farm trucks leave the facility daily with stock to meet DNR wildlife trucks and personnel, who release the birds regionally on the hunting properties.

"It is amazing the amount of preparation, time and work that goes into the Game Farm all year just so that we can provide hunting in the fall," said Nack. "Most hunters would never imagine."

## 25 Years Ago

Three Kewaskum players, including the conference's strikeout and earned runs allowed leader and the top batter were selected on the Eastern Wisconsin All-Conference Baseball Team Monday night. Jeff Geidel, pitcher, Dave Donath, second baseman, and Ric Leitheiser, outfielder, were among the six unanimous choices on the 10-man squad picked by EW coaches. Geidel, the senior right-handed fast baller, struck out a total of 126 batters, while walking just 20. His ERA average was a sparkling 0.80. Donath led the league in batting with an excellent .440 average. Leitheiser came back from an early batting slump to end up with a .393 average. Kewaskum's Jim Braun was named on the second team.

Conference champion West Bend East, as expected, dominated the Scenic Moraine All-Conference Team. Four Suns were selected. The two Indians selected were senior Dave Donath at second base, who batted .296 in the conference, and sophomore Jim Braun at third base, who batted .277 in Scenic action. Without a doubt Kewaskum's star pitcher, Jeff Geidel, would have been named to the all-conference team but Coach Perry Koth did not use him in the Scenic Conference. One of the best pitchers in the area, Geidel was used only in his team's Eastern Wisconsin contests. Receiving honorable mention for the Indians were Brian Larsen, senior center-fielder, who batted .378, and Tim Heberer, the lefthanded senior pitcher, who also played first base when he wasn't pitching.

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


So, start planning a trip to the Wisconsin State Fair this year or next. You can make the day your own personal adventure to be nothing short of a blue ribbon experience.

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
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## Kewaskum wins Western Division title

## A game for the record books but no happy ending for the A's

The first part of the conversation on Sunday's Kewaskum Athletics home talent baseball game, pitcher/spokesperson Jim Ziegler was the one asking the questions.

"We lost 5-3, in extra innings. Guess how many innings we played?" Ziegler asked, and when this reporter took a stab at 15, he said, "You're not even close. It was 21 innings."

That's double the length of a regular game, plus three more innings, and it all added up to a marathon session between the Athletics and visiting Hustisford.

When asked if this was a record in Rock River League play, Ziegler said, "It's gotta be for us, I guess. It didn't get over until 6:30 p.m."

Three Athletics pitchers, starter Jake Lathers, Ziegler and Nick Whitty, the eventual loser, all turned in good outings in the loss, giving up just 14 hits and single runs in the third and fifth innings before Hustisford scored three in the top of the 21st.

Lathers lasted five and a third, according to Ziegler, who said he came on in relief and pitched through the 15th without giving up a run.

"We didn't have a whole lot of strikeouts, maybe eight or nine," Ziegler said.

The A's scored two in the

first inning and had several other scoring opportunities until Jim Wittrock, the winner, came on and pitched the final six innings.

In the first, young Austin Sarauer, fresh off a successful career at Campbellsport High School, blasted a home run over the right field fence.

Jon Olla followed with a single and eventually scored on a single by Adam Sarauer, giving the A's a 2-0 lead.

Hustisford scored single runs in the third and fifth, then there was a steady stream of zeroes on the scoreboard.

The A's best opportunity after that came 15 innings later. "Jason Strobel led off with a double in the bottom of the 16th ... he ended up getting stranded at third and we had a runner at second," Ziegler said, indicating the final two outs were recorded on a pop up and a fly out.

Hustisford broke loose for three runs in the top of the 21st, and try as they might, the Athletics could not come back, scoring just once while leaving the bases loaded.

Dan Shea led off with a single, and after Matt Parrent grounded out, back-to-back walks loaded the bases.

Austin Sarauer came up next and hit a long sacrifice fly ball, scoring Shea, and then Olla grounded to second for the final out of the game.

"Dan Shea had five hits. He was five for seven," Ziegler said, reporting Austin Sarauer was

the only other Athletic player to have two hits.

"Austin, Dan Shea and Matt Parrent just came up from high school (teams). They are all doing real well," Ziegler said.

Last Sunday, July 29, the Kewaskum team was shut out by Slinger by a score of 4-0, "which ended our small playoff hopes," Ziegler said. "We didn't have too much offense ... I think we just had three hits."

Lathers took the loss for the A's, and Ziegler said, "He pitched really well, but we didn't give him any runs."

On Wednesday, July 25th, the A's traveled to Oshkosh and defeated the hosts 6-4.

Whitty got the win, after pitching seven good innings. The team was down 3-1 at the time, but, "We scored five in the top of the eighth," so Whitty was still the pitcher of record.

Sarauer was a perfect 4x4, while Ziegler went 2x4 with a pair of runs batted in (RBI) while Brandon Banton went 4x5, Whitty was 2x4 and Ty Schill 2x5.

"We played a real sloppy game, but still managed to win. I think we had six errors," Ziegler said.

With the single win and the two recent losses, the A's record is 4-9 in RR action and 7-11 overall. Kewaskum is at Hartford this Sunday. On Aug. 18th, the team entertains Slinger and on the 19th finish up the year at Horicon.

## KHS is looking for a new baseball coach

The desire to do a little fishing and spend some more time at his cottage has prompted Dave Donath to step down as the head baseball coach at Kewaskum High School.

"I handed my resignation letter in yesterday," Donath said last Wednesday after leading the Indians to a second place finish in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and a 21-9 record overall.

"After seven years ... it's a lot of time. You start with open gyms in March," Donath said about his reason for giving up the job.

When asked about his overall record, Donath said, "somewhere in the neighborhood of 125 (wins) and 85 (losses)."

Concerning his best year, Donath pointed to 2006. "Twenty six and five," he said, adding, "In 2001, we were 21-9, the same as this year."

During his seven-year tenure, the Indians captured one Eastern Wisconsin championship, that coming in '06, and,

"I think we were second three times."

As far as a successor, Donath pointed to Doug Gonring, who had a very successful run at West Bend East High and is currently an assistant at Concordia College in the spring.

"I would think he would be (interested)," Donath said. "I would hope he would be. He's been the JV coach for the last two years."

And Donath didn't rule out the possibility he would be an assistant coach, if school officials would want him to continue in the program.

Donath certainly leaves the program in good shape and with some talented players among the juniors on the squad.

"There should be some good pitching there," Donath said, referring to the fact John Holt and Nick Ebert were selected to the all-EWC second team and both posted earned run averages (ERA's) of below 1.75, which is very impressive.

"Yeah, the pitching and the defense should be solid," Donath went on, indicating he told his players at the end

of the year, "If I could have bought 10 more hits (this season), we could have won four more games ... We had our chances (to win the EWC title)."

Donath grew up in a baseball family. His late father, Robert, loved the game and instilled a lot of his enthusiasm in Dave, who played on the KHS varsity as an infielder from 1979 to 1982.

"My senior year, I was actually all-conference in two conferences, the Eastern Wisconsin, and the Scenic Moraine," which was formed so the two West Bend schools, Slinger and Campbellsport had a summer league to play in.

Donath is proud of the school's baseball program. "I think it's a program that's respected in the conference. I hope I haven't done anything to damage it too much ... we've been competitive."

He also leaves with the assurance "the numbers are up, and we have some good players from youth teams coming up."

## Parrent ends athletic career with an all-state selection

For the second straight year, Kewaskum High School has a representative on the Wisconsin High School Baseball Coaches Association All-State team.

Senior Matt Parrent was named to the second team in a balloting that wound up including a couple players from state champion, West Bend West, and New Holstein, which edged out the Indians for the Eastern Wisconsin Conference title this summer.

Parrent, a four year varsity starter, was named to the first team in all-EWC battling as a sophomore. He was on the second unit as a junior and the first team as a senior.

"Matt was a good leader ... very coachable. He did everything you asked of him," KHS coach Dave Donath said of the center fielder/pitcher and added, "He hated to lose."

For his senior campaign, Parrent batted a crisp .400 with a .688 slugging percentage. Donath said he had 32 hits, including eight doubles and five home runs. He drove in 24 runs, scored 30 and was a perfect 14 of 14 in stolen bases.

Originally Parrent had planned to attend Ripon College where he hoped to play basketball and baseball. His current plans are to enroll at UW-Washington County for a year and then transfer to a place where he will play one

or the other or both sports.

Donath indicated Bill Albrecht of the state champion West Bend West team was the coach of the year for the summer balloting. Two of the Spartans, Paul Hoenecke and Matt Schilter, were both selected to the first team. Both of these players have Kewaskum "connections." Hoenecke lives in Kewaskum but after attending Kettle Moraine Lutheran for a year, transferred to West under the open enrollment program. He was declared ineligible late during the 2006 season and West had to forfeit all the games he played in, but the situation was rectified for this year.

Hoenecke, who will be a senior starting this fall, batted in 60 runs during the season and wielded a hot bat during the three games of the state tourney.

Schilter, a handy infielder who is also an excellent hitter, is the son of Henry Schilter, who once starred for KHS in basketball and baseball. His younger brother Ryan is the Spartans' starting catcher.

Including Josh Heisdorf and the Rohlinger boys (Matt, Adam and \*\*\*\*), Donath said "There is a long list" of West Bend baseball players with Kewaskum roots.

New Holstein also was honored by having two of its players, senior center fielder and junior catcher Taylor Schrage, named to the dream team.

## No feature wins this time, but Goeden is happy with a pair of top-5s

It didn't matter that Kewaskum's Don Goeden had never raced the tracks in Arlington, Minn., and Jim Falls, WI.

He did well at both of them in IRA (Interstate Racing Association) shows held on Saturday, July 28 and Sunday, July 29.

"This was the first time they had 410 Sprint Cars there in 20 years," Goeden said Sunday night about the race held on the half-mile oval located southwest of the Twin Cities.

By the looks of the crowd, people in the area were excited to come out and see some thrilling action on the dirt track. "They probably had 2,500 people there," Goeden said.

In the 30-lap feature, Goeden piloted his No. 11 car to a third-place finish, and, "I was close to getting second," he said about the event in which he had started sixth.

The winner of the event was Sheboygan's Steve Meyer. Goeden was 12th in tim-

ing in a large field, and he quickly learned where to be on the track and used that knowledge to win the heat race.

Kewaskum was also represented by another local driver, Scott Biertzer, who finished ninth in the main event.

The next day, the drivers and their crews pulled up stakes and headed for Jim Falls, which is just north of Eau Claire.

"They've got a small quarter-mile track there," Goeden said, and "This was the first time Sprint Cars were here also. (The IRA drivers were scheduled to race here in 2006, but the event was rained out.)"

Once again, Goeden did well, finishing fifth in time, fourth in the heat and fifth in the 30-lap main event after starting fourth out of 22 cars who qualified.

In this race, it was Sommerset's Jerry Riekert taking the checkered flag.

"We were running between second and fifth the whole race," Goeden said, adding, "That was a packed house also."

Biertzer, who recently won

his first feature race of the season, finished second in a heat race and just missed a top-five effort in the A-Main, coming in seventh. Biertzer is currently seventh in the standings with 2,251 points.

Goeden who is currently fifth in the points race with 2,395 points, despite not competing in all the shows, was off this past weekend, and he will not be racing the weekend of August 10-12 because of the Knoxville Nationals that will be held in Iowa. The finals of that event is normally shown live on ESPN on Saturday evening.

The next show Goeden will race in will be in Wilmot on Friday, Aug. 17th. The following night the IRA drivers head north and take their show to Antigo.

Travis Whitney is the leader in the battle for the IRA championship for 2007. He currently has 2,621 points.

"We have 12 shows left," Goeden said, and after winning six features during the 2007 campaign, he is obviously excited to see what he can do between now and the end of September.
