Theresa man dies in C-Sport Crash



A 65-year-old Theresa was killed in a three-vehicle crash just east of Campbellsport on Tuesday afternoon, January 4. The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office and the Campbellsport Fire Department and Ambulance reported to the head-on crash near the intersection of Highway 67 and River Dr. in the town of Ashford. Deputies determined that an eastbound SUV driven by Ronald Justman of Theresa crossed the center line and struck a westbound pickup truck driven by Nicholas Braatz, 21, of Eden. A third vehicle driven by Thomas Bakken, 29, of Fond du Lac was also eastbound and struck Justman's vehicle after the initial impact as he swerved to attempt to avoid the crash. Justman was trapped inside the vehicle and was pronounced dead at the scene. Braatz suffered significant injuries, but they do not appear to be life threatening, he was transported to St. Agnes Hospital for treatment. The Sheriff's Office reported that Justman and Braatz were not wearing seatbelts. Bakken, who was wearing a seatbelt, was uninjured. The Sheriff's Office is working with the Medical Examiner's office to try to determine why Justman's vehicle crossed the center line.

Political change imminent

Major leadership changes will take place this spring as several elected officials are not running for their seats in April's election and one local board has its deadline extended to Friday.

As of Tuesday's 5 p.m. filing deadline, Kewaskum School Board president John Kenworthy hadn't filed for non-candidacy so the deadline for candidates to file automatically moves to Friday at 5 p.m.

Running for two seats on the School Board are incumbent James Leister and newcomers Troy Hanson, Andrew Kuehl, Timothy Ramthun and Sue Ann Mueller.

Incumbent Sally Cochran is not running for re-election.

If one more person files for candidacy, a primary election will knock the finalists to six as no more than two people may run for one seat in the general election.

In the Village, three people are running for three trustee seats - two incumbents and one former incumbent. Incumbents Norman Kufahl and Jim Hovland are running for re-election, and former trustee Kevin Scheunemann is running. Tom Piwoni filed for non-candidacy.

Trustee Craig Garbisch is

challenging Andrew Pesch for village president.

In the towns of Farmington and Kewaskum, at least two of the three elected officials will change on each board.

In Farmington, Town Chairman Gary Schreiber and Supervisor Art Seyfert filed non-candidacy. Incumbent Mark Foyse is running for re-election, along with newcomer Duane Wollner for the two supervisor seats. Chris Elbe is running for town chairman.

In the Town of Kewaskum, Chairman Ellis Kahn and Supervisor Allen Hron aren't running. Incumbent Daniel Schmidt is running for chairman, and newcomers William Butzlaff, Scott Wollner and Michael Otten are running for two supervisor seats.

Treasurer Daniel Stoffel and clerk Nancy Boden are running unopposed.

In the Town of Wayne, Town Chairman Carl Klemme is being opposed by former chairman Leander Herriges. Incumbents Robert Schulteis and Mike Samann are running for the two supervisor seats.

Treasurer Gerald Schulz and Clerk Julie Kriewaldt are running unopposed.

Raise vote redo in Kewaskum

Raises for non-union village staff will be given another vote at Monday's Village Board meeting after Trustee Harry Roecker requested to have the item brought up for a vote again.

A proposal to have the Village's non-union employees receive a two percent raise (one percent in January and one percent in July) and have their step increases (eliminated in 2009) restored, was eliminated when Trustee Craig Garbisch presented a motion to freeze the wages. His motion received a second from Trustee Harry Roecker and saw a passing vote of 4-3. Voting against the motion was Village President Andy Pesch and Trustees Tom Piwoni and Norman Kufahl.

While Trustee Roecker voted in favor of the wage freeze at last month's meeting, he stated this week he made the request because he thought the issue was important and the vote was made hastily. He further stated he doesn't yet know if he will have a change of heart on the matter.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser stated it's not common practice to have items that fail on an agenda again however Robert's

Rules of Order states that an item can be brought up again if it is requested by one of the Trustees casting a favorable vote. In this case, Trustee Roecker voted in favor of the freeze that was passed so he could request it be brought up again. Those trustees who voted against the freeze could not have requested it be brought up again.

The board in November approved two contracts with the unions with which it negotiates. Both votes were 4-3, with Harry Roecker, Craig Garbisch and Norman Kufahl voting against.

The contracts include a wage freeze for 2010 and a split raise for 2011. Employees receive a 1 percent raise on Jan. 1 and another 1 percent raise on July 1.



Special assessment, back taxes may lead to Schmidt property foreclosure

WEST BEND - A years-long soap opera in the Town of Kewaskum may be coming to a final resolution in the next several months.

Washington County could soon set a foreclosure date on the property of Wilmer Schmidt unless he is able to pay the county nearly \$21,000 in taxes (through December) and the town \$36,000 in real estate taxes and assessments.

County Attorney Kim Nass last week said Schmidt has been making regular payments, but "it's not even chipping away at the interest and penalties."

The Town Board, town attorney James Danaher and Nass met Dec. 23 to determine the next step in dealing with the property.

If the property is foreclosed, it would be put up for sale via a sealed bid process. The foreclosure would be an in rem procedure, which cleans off all liens and mortgages off the property, Danaher said.

The Town Board had declared the property a nuisance and allowed five years to get it cleaned up. That didn't happen and the Town sent in a company to start the

cleanup process, and then billed Schmidt for it.

The danger, the Town Board determined, is if it doesn't take action against Schmidt other town residents could get away with the same thing.

Nass and Danaher will meet in closed session to determine an agreement between the town and county. The Town Board had encouraged a minimum bid price so that the county and town could both get paid what they are owed. By statute, the county receives its money first, then the town. Any surplus beyond that would go to secured creditors and then the property owner.

The agreement is scheduled to be completed and ready to be signed by the Town Board at its next meeting, Jan. 17. The agreement will remain a closed document throughout the sale process.

"We just want a check," said Town Chairman Ellis Kahn. "What the county wants, that's your problem. We just want our money."

Any buyer of the property would be subject to town rules and further cleanup requirements.

If the property is not

sold, the county could take ownership and the town wouldn't get paid. But Nass said the county has no interest in owning property unless it has a "good prediction" of what will happen with it. The county wants it back on the tax rolls, she said.

What exactly would happen should the property not be sold could be determined in the closed agreement between the county and town.

The property is assessed at \$197,000 - \$97,000 for land and \$107,000 for improvements.

Since the process may take several months, the nearly \$21,000 owed to the county for taxes will increase, Danaher said.

"The meter is running," Kahn said.

One potential buyer has so far expressed interest in the property.

Editor's note- This newspaper does not typically report on the misfortunes of foreclosures and back taxes. However, because of the unique situation, history and most importantly, use of tax dollars used to remedy this reported nuisance, we felt it appropriate to report on this situation.

Wisconsin ends 2010 with fewer than 600 traffic deaths for third straight year

For the third consecutive year, Wisconsin had fewer than 600 traffic deaths in 2010. The last time that occurred for three years in a row was from 1942 to 1944.

Wisconsin ended 2010 with 564 traffic deaths, which is 22 more than 2009 but 112 fewer than the five-year average, according to preliminary statistics from the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT).

In addition, December 2010 was the safest month of December in terms of traffic deaths in Wisconsin since World War II. A total of 38 people were killed in 35 traffic crashes last month. The five-year average for the month of December is 51 traffic fatalities.

"We are encouraged that traffic fatalities in Wisconsin are staying at levels not experienced since the early 1940s when the number of vehicle miles traveled was minuscule compared to today," said WisDOT Secretary Mark Gottlieb.

Traffic deaths among occupants of passenger vehicles and light trucks declined in 2010 compared with 2009 by about 4 percent from 413 to 396.

"Most of the fatal crashes involving passenger vehicles and light trucks are caused by bad driving habits and irresponsible decisions, so motorists deserve a great deal of credit for saving their own lives and lives of others by slowing down, paying attention, buckling up and

driving sober," Wisconsin State Patrol Superintendent David Collins said.

WisDOT Secretary Gottlieb also credited law enforcement officers, emergency medical responders, highway engineers and the entire traffic safety community for their relentless and effective efforts to prevent crashes and save lives.

There are some areas of concern in traffic safety efforts. Motorcyclist fatalities increased from 84 in 2009 to 104 in 2010. That's an increase of approximately 20 percent. To reduce deaths and injuries from motorcycle crashes, the Wisconsin Motorcycle Safety Program will offer new and more comprehensive training courses throughout the state in 2011 for beginning, intermediate and experienced riders, while reminding all motorists to watch out for cycles.

"Too many motorcyclists who have not ridden for years are not aware of their limitations when they begin riding again. They definitely need refresher training to avoid crashes caused by excessive speeds, loss of control, impaired riding, and lack of awareness of potential hazards," Collins said.

In addition to motorcyclists' deaths, pedestrian fatalities increased from 36 in 2009 to 54 in 2010. "Although pedestrian fatalities increased significantly in one year, the 36 deaths in 2009 were strikingly low while the

2010 total was close to the five-year average of approximately 50 fatalities," Collins said. "Nevertheless, we're going to intensify our efforts to prevent pedestrian deaths in 2011."

WisDOT Secretary Gottlieb said, "Everyone involved in traffic safety is encouraged but certainly not satisfied with the results of the last three years. We will always remember that 564 people died in crashes last year, and many of those deaths could have been prevented. As always, our ultimate goal is to reduce the number of preventable traffic deaths to zero in Wisconsin."

Kewaskum man crashes truck, leaves scene

KEWASKUM- Washington County Sheriff's Department says a 23 year-old Kewaskum man is facing citations for inattentive driving and failing to report an accident after a crash on January 2.

Nathan M. Laatsch, of Kewaskum is alleged to have crashed his pickup truck on Kettle Moraine Dr., 2/10 mile north of Highway 28 in the Town of Kewaskum. Captain Steve

Gonwa explained Laatsch's vehicle was southbound on when he failed to negotiate a curve in roadway, left roadway and entered southbound ditchline area and overturned.

Gonwa stated the crash was alcohol related and Laatsch was uninjured.

A bit of the Old West in New Fane

NEW FANE - Dawn McCambridge's passion for the part-time jobs of bartending and waitressing that she held for more than a decade became the catalyst for her present career -- owner and manager of the Rusty Spur Saloon, located on County Road S in New Fane.

A Theresa native, McCambridge was employed for 17 years (1992-2009) as a travel agent, first for Carlson Wagonlit Travel, Milwaukee, and later for Triple A in Fond du Lac. "During that time, I worked nights and weekends as a bartender and waitress at places such as Wise Guys and Hon-E-Kor in Kewaskum, she said."

As the current recession progressed, she felt a need to change her career path. "The poor economy put a damper on many people's vacation plans," McCambridge said.

She began doing her homework regarding an alternative vocational path and decided she would like to purchase a tavern. It was at that time that she discovered her present business, then known as the Twin H, was listed for sale. However, she said she was not in a position to finance the business and building at that time, in 2009.

"So some dear friends helped me," McCambridge said. "They bought it for me, and I managed it, until the opportunity was right for me to buy it from them."

While the renovation was in process, McCam-

bridge and the two owners brainstormed for a new business name and decided upon "Rusty Spur Saloon."

"We chose that name, because of the saloon's Western theme," she explained.

"Everything is old, like the rusty spurs on the wall."

In the renovation, the bar was enlarged; a new floor was installed; a large screen tv was added and the interior was cleaned and painted.

Then, on July 3, 2009, McCambridge began managing the Rusty Spur Saloon. Her dream of ownership became a reality this past Sept. 1, and she continues to manage the business as well.

In addition to serving drinks to her customers, she is in charge of rentals for the facility's hall, which can accommodate up to 150 guests and is used for meetings, and special occasions, such as birthday parties and dances. Although she, like the majority of business owners, is faced with the challenges ac-

companying the current recession, she is convinced she has found her career niche.

"I am a people person," McCambridge affirmed. "I like talking with people and enjoy organizing things. I like to work."

She said the Rusty Spur Saloon is a popular place because of its comfy, cozy, home-like atmosphere. "Everybody knows everyone here," she said. "And many customers compliment the four bartenders here."

Another benefit she pointed out is that the Rusty Spur Saloon, unlike many other saloons, opens early -- at 10 a.m. every day of the week. The bar closes at 2 a.m. from Sunday through Thursday, but is open until 2:30 a.m. on Friday and Saturday. McCambridge invites area residents to check out the Rusty Spur Saloon. "It's a very friendly place," she said.

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

Other characters include Dr. Molineaux's ditsy young wife (Yvonne); his gorgon of a mother-in-law (Madame Aigreville); an outrageously aggressive and mischievous female patient (Suzanne Aubin); her violently jealous Prussian husband (Gustav Auvin); a well-intentioned friend with a serious lisp (Bassinet); a valet with an attitude (Etienne); and his pragmatic yet saucy maid (Marie). The story includes more slamming doors than realistic architecture should ever accommodate, all adding up to a hilariously zany and infectiously charming farce.

Similar to American vaudeville, French farce was the most popular style of theatre in the 19th century. Written by George Feydeau in 1886 and freely translated and adapted for Tailleleur pour dames by Charles Morey, the story takes place in Belle Epoque, Paris. 





Boys and Girls Club members keep busy



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Seibel doubles his pleasure; Indians soar to third in On the Waters test over break

OSHKOSH- Kewaskum High School's senior wrestler Bo Seibel has added another accomplishment to his already impressive resume.

In last week's annual Oshkosh Lourdes On the Waters Classic, held on the UW-Oshkosh campus, Seibel surpassed the 100-victory mark and captured the title at 189 pounds.

The team effort by the Indians was also impressive. The 12 who competed — Kewaskum had no entrants at 103 and 112 pounds — combined to score 232 points, good for third place out of 59 teams behind only Coleman (322) and Hortonville (241.5). It was the best finish a Kewaskum team has posted in the event, which started in the early 1990s and has blossomed into a good test of endurance and athleticism for some of the upper echelon wrestlers in the state.

As the announcer announced just before the finals late Thursday afternoon, the 28 finalists had a current combined record of 498 victories and just nine losses.

"To come here with 12 guys and take third place is a pretty nice team effort," coach Dennis Aupperle said afterward.

Individually, the Indians had a fifth place by Brett Scoles, a pair of thirds by Jared Koffke and Rob Maertz, a second by Brad Bentz and the win by Seibel who used a second-period escape to edge Austin Bellile of Tomahawk 1-0.

"(I feel) Pretty good, pretty excited," Seibel said after accepting his award. "This is a big tournament to win. I took third here last year. I was beating the kid who won it, and I got tossed."

This year it was Seibel doing the tossing or maintaining control over his opponents. On Wednesday, he started with a bye, then manhandled his next two opponents with first period pins to move into the quarterfinals. He finished off the evening with a 6-0 shutout win over Cody Moon of Laconia.

In the semifinals, Seibel took a 5-2 lead, then pinned

Mark Lyzenga of Illiana Christian High School (Il.) in 4:46, putting him against Bellile in the finals.

There was one anxious moment in that match when Bellile executed a good switch and was looking to score the reversal as he had Seibel's legs covered.

Never fear. Seibel recovered and came up with the win.

"I knew I could get out. I just got my hips up, fought hard and got back in control," he said.

About reaching 100 victories — he is now unofficially 105-24 — Seibel said, "It's always a good accomplishment to reach 100. Hopefully I can get a lot more than 100."

Seibel (17-1) is still miffed about breaking his ankle as a sophomore. "I only had about 25 wins (that year)," he said.

Kewaskum fans were hoping for Brad Bentz to take a second OTW title after winning the 145 pound crown last year, but it wasn't to be as he lost in the finals to Kegan Genrich of Hortonville, 5-3.

The loss was the first of

the year for Bentz (17-1) who had taken a 2-0 lead in the first period and was about to go up 4-0 when he was whistled for an illegal hold.

"There were a couple of questionable calls," Aupperle said. "I don't know what that changed there, but that changed the whole perspective of the match." He went on, "It was just two good kids going after it."

Bentz escaped in the second period to go up 3-2, then Genrich escaped and scored the winning takedown in the third period with 1:08 remaining. To reach the finals, Bentz had two pins, a 15-4 major decision and a 7-2 decision to put him in the semifinals where he defeated Culin Kowalczyk of Bonduel 8-1.

Aupperle praised Scoles, Koffke and Maertz for their efforts. "They all came out of here winning their last matches," he said.

Koffke, now 16-4, looked solid throughout. After receiving a bye, he posted a pin, a 12-0 major decision and a 46-second pin on Wednesday, then suffered his only

loss, a 9-3 loss to Brillion's Brock Kasten in the semis. In a wrestler, he won 4-0 over a wrestler from Wisconsin Lutheran, then defeated Colin Schubert of Southern Door 5-1 for third place, moving up three spots from his sixth in 2009. He also placed ninth as a sophomore.

Maertz (14-5) finished his four-year career at the tournament with his fourth straight place. After taking 11 in 2009, he was focused on making the top four, which he did with good technique and determination. In his final match, he shut down Spencer Peterson of New Holstein by a score of 4-0.

Maertz's only loss came at the hands of Hortonville's Matthew Gray, the eventual champion, in the semifinals. One false move put him in a 5-0 hole, and the match ended 11-3 in Gray's favor. On the opening day, Maertz received a bye followed by two pins and a 3-2 decision.

Scoles (15-5) had to wrestle nine times in the two days and finished with a 4-3 win over Jason Romitti of Green

Bay Preble/East, giving him fifth place for the second year in a row. In a flurry at the end of the match, Romitti scored a reversal to take a 4-3 lead and with :04 to go, Scoles reversed him.

Scoles' two losses in the tournament came to the same wrestler, Kyle Severt of Wilmot, and both were by a single point.

The next closest to placing was Austin Goeden at 135. He finished 4-2, losing a tough 5-2 decision to reach the top 12. "Austin's getting to the second day is quite an accomplishment," Aupperle said.

With his two pins, an 8-2 win and 4-0 win, Goeden improved his record to 10-7.

The other KHS wrestlers finished as follows: Logan Dreher, 119 pounds, 3-2 and is 8-5 overall; Joey Seitz, 3-2 and is now 8-7; Joey Wollner, 145 pounds, 1-2 and 3-11; Derek Aupperle at 171, 1-2, 7-6; Cole Roberts, 189 pounds, 2-2 and is now 9-8; and Brandon Ehn at 275, 2-2 and 8-9.



KEWASKUM- Once Kewaskum's wrestlers got going Tuesday night, there was no stopping them.

After spotting the Random Lake Rams wins in four of the first five matches, the host Indians went on a pinning rampage en route to a 48-27 non-conference victory. Seven Kewaskum wrestlers posted pins from 125 to 189 pounds, with Bo Seibel ending the evening's activities with a swift 37-second pin over Joey Schanen.

The match started at 215

where Cole Roberts had to overcome an early 4-0 deficit to defeat Joe Schneider 10-4.

Random Lake then won back-to-back pins, followed by a forfeit win and a 2-0 decision by Mark Meyer over Logan Dreher in the closest match of the night.

Meyer, a state qualifier last year in Division 3, got the only points on a takedown late in the first period. Dreher had been close to getting one on the corner of the mat before the official called a stalemate.

"Then we kind of got

rolling," coach Dennis Aupperle said, looking at the fact Bret Scoles and Jared Koffke were able to end their 125 and 130-pound matches early, Scoles in 3:38 and Koffke in a mere 56 seconds.

Now the Indians were within six points of the Rams, 15-21 and Austin Goeden evened the score when he used an ankle pick to put Wyatt Gessner right to his back in 41 seconds.

Kewaskum won five of the final six matches, including pins by Rob Maertz at 152, Brad Bentz

at 160 and Seibel. Also Derek Aupperle scored five points (on a takedown and nearfall) in the final 45 seconds for a convincing 11-5 win over Ben Bahr.

Maertz used the "Saturday Night Ride" for his pin and said, "I use that more often now."

In that stretch, only Joe Seitz suffered a loss and it came at the hands of two-time Division 3 state champion, Justin Mudlaff, who is 19-0 on the year after winning both the Marty Loy and On the Waters titles.

"That one was a tough one for Joey. Hopefully he'll learn from it," Aupperle said.

The senior Mudlaff was at 135 pounds at the On The Waters test and was set to wrestle Goeden but did not make the lower weight for the match. His younger brother, Nick, also a former state champion was in street clothes Tuesday, still out after reportedly suffering a concussion at the Loy outing. Had he been ready, Nick Mudlaff would

have gotten Joel Wollner. Instead, Wollner picked up a forfeit win.

"Rob looked good ... Brad, Derek and Bo, they all looked good," Aupperle said. With the win, his team is 6-4 overall. "Now if we could just stay healthy," he said.
