## Superintendent of Schools, Krumm announces retirement



**KEWASKUM-** The Kewaskum School District will search for a new leader for its daily operations. That's after Superintendent Michael Krumm announced to the Board of Education and school employees he would retire at the end of his contract.

Board of Education President, John Kenworthy said the news of Krumm's retirement did not come as a shock.

"Mr. Krumm had always intended to stay for five years so his retirement was not unexpected, but it is certainly going to usher in a time of transition for us. Mike has done a lot of good things in Kewaskum and as a visionary leader has led us in directions that challenged us both as a district and as a community."

Krumm and his wife Melinda came to Kewaskum in 2006, after his retirement from Ballard Schools in Iowa where he served as Superintendent of Schools there from

1994 until his arrival in Kewaskum. He quickly rolled up his sleeves and ushered in a number of changes to the School District and the community.

First on his agenda was a large remodeling project that saw the return of a stage to performers in the district when the Kewaskum Theatre was constructed upon the former high school stage with the help of retired

band teacher Larry Ammel. With that change was the addition of an updated library, the Rose Library, in the former Rose Hall.

Next he would move on to the creation of Early Release Wednesday. The program releases students early so teachers in the district can collaborate and administrators can work on staff development.

Kewaskum University, a partnership with Viterbo University was made available to all educators in the Kewaskum School District. Through the program, educators can take classes here in Kewaskum to earn their masters degrees. The district's taxpayers fund the program.

To the dismay of some community members and district coaches, Krumm implemented a no-cut policy to district athletics. The philosophy allows all youth to take part in the district's sports teams without regard to a player's attendance or ability to play.

## KHS senior injured in single vehicle accident

**TOWN of FARMINGTON-** A Kewaskum teen was seriously injured after he was involved in a single-vehicle crash around midnight on Monday, January 23. Authorities say the driver was in the vehicle for at least seven hours waiting for help and showed evidence of frostbite to his extremities.

Captain Steve Gonwa of The Washington County Sheriff's Office said his department was notified of the crash at 7:12 a.m. Bolton County Fire Department and First Responders called for Kewaskum EMS who later requested West Bend EMS Intercept.

Gonwa explained Cody A. Nuernberg, 18, of Kewaskum was eastbound on State Highway 28, approximately 1/10 of a mile west of County Road HH in light snow when his car left the roadway and entered the eastbound shoulder striking a guardrail. He then re-entered the roadway, crossed the centerline and collided with a deep snowdrift. The car went up a steep embankment and eventually came to rest approximately 40 feet from the roadway.

Nuernberg stayed in the vehicle and stated he was unable to reach his cell phone to call for help. He was transported with serious non-life threatening injuries to St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend but later transferred to Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee. He is believed to have suffered a back injury with some frostbite to his extremities.

Gonwa stated driving too fast for conditions was a factor in the accident however no citations were issued.

Nuernberg is a senior at Kewaskum High School and well known for his high school sports accolades as all-conference Quarterback and Pitcher.

## KHS seniors get real-life lesson when caught in bus prank

**KEWASKUM** - Three Kewaskum High School Seniors have been accused of vandalizing property at Johnson School Bus outside the village in a flopped attempt at cancelling classes on Thursday, January 20. School officials called a two-hour delay due to the situation.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office was notified of damage to numerous school buses at 5:15 a.m. The buses were owned and operated by Johnson Bus Company and had been parked at their Town of Kewaskum terminal on Highway 28. Responding deputies discovered that tires had been deflated and electrical cords heating the engines had been unplugged.

During the day, school officials and authorities were able to develop information

on possible suspects. Three Kewaskum High School seniors, ages 17 and 18, were interviewed by authorities and admitted their involvement. A fourth individual from West Bend, also 18 years old, had driven the other suspects to the bus company where the damage was done.

Captain Steve Gonwa of the Sheriff's Office stated a request for charges of disorderly conduct was forwarded to the District Attorney for each of the four subjects and a request for \$1,200 in restitution for labor costs associated with getting the buses running again.

Names of the individuals are not being published because as of press time, they had not been charged. We will update the story with names when the information becomes available.

# 2011-2012 Public School Open Enrollment

Open enrollment applications for the 2011-2012 school year can be submitted to Wisconsin public schools during the period of February 7, 2011 to February 25, 2011 (4:00 p.m. deadline). Wisconsin's public school open enrollment program allows parents to apply for their children to attend public school in a school district other than the one in which they live.

Under the full-time public school open enrollment program, parents must apply during the application period to the school district they wish their children to attend. Early and late applications are not accepted. The forms are due in the nonresident school district no later than 4:00 p.m. on February 25; a postmark will not meet the requirement. Hand-delivery of application forms to the nonresident school district is strongly recommended.

Any students attending a nonresident school district under a "Tuition Waiver Due to a Move" must apply for open enrollment in order to attend the nonresident district in the 2011-2012 school year.

Parents may submit applications to no more than three nonresident school districts for each child during the open enrollment application period. Submitting more than three applications to nonresident school districts will result in all applications being invalidated.

Parents may request enrollment in a specific school or program in the nonresident school district; however, enrollment in the requested school or program is subject to space and other limitations and is not guaranteed.

Forms must be filled out completely and accurately. An inaccurate or incomplete form may result in denial of an application. Parents will be informed by April 8, 2011 whether their open enrollment applications have been approved or denied.

Transportation is the responsibility of the parent.

However, some school districts may elect to provide partial transportation. Parents with questions about transportation should call both resident and nonresident school district offices to find out if any transportation will be provided. Reimbursement of some transportation costs is available for low-income parents whose children are eligible for free or reduced-price lunches under the federal school lunch program.

Students attending the Kewaskum School District under open enrollment must reapply the February before entering grade 6.

Parents may apply for their children to attend 4-year-

old kindergarten under open enrollment only if the resident school district also offers a 4-year-old kindergarten program for which the child is eligible.

Open enrollment application forms may be obtained from any public school district, from the Department of Public Instruction, or from the DPI's open enrollment Web site. Many will be able to document their preschool teaching experiences in their



## Kettle Moraine State Forest looking for images of the past

The Kettle Moraine State Forest is celebrating its 75th anniversary in 2011. The forest had a humble beginning in 1936 with a donation of 800 acres located around Moon Lake (now Mauthe Lake in the Northern Unit) from the Izaak Walton League. Today the Kettle Moraine State Forest consists of more than 60,000 acres in five units stretching for about 125 from Glenbeulah in the north to Whitewater Lake in the south. The forest was established to protect the area's unique Ice Age landforms, especially the interlobate moraine, and the headwaters of the Milwaukee River, and to create a large public land area for the growing population of Milwaukee. Today more than a million visitors enjoy the wonders of the entire Kettle Moraine.

To celebrate this special anniversary, we want to create a DVD and display of the forest's history. We are currently

looking for photographs to help tell the Kettle Moraine's story from 1936 through today. Of particular interest would be images of:

Dedications of new facilities (campgrounds, towers, buildings, etc.)

People enjoying the forest through the decades

Scenes of the forest in all the seasons and throughout the years

Special employees and volunteers who worked in the Kettle Moraine

The images can either be digital, slides or photographs. Non-digital images will be scanned and originals will be returned to the owners. Please provide any information about the image such as date taken, location, event, and names of people in the photo. Credit will be given to the photographer if known.

## Krumm Retires

A charter school, Kewaskum Career Academy for students in the high school who had difficulties in the tradition high school learning model opened in the former Administration building in 2009. The district moved its headquarters to unused office space inside Regal Ware at that same time.

Krumm was also responsible for a number of community items as well. He assisted in the joining together of other government agencies in the district so each knew what was happening in the district. Taking things a step further he and Village of Kewaskum Administrator Matt Heiser organized a monthly community forum where civic organizations, churches and sports entities could collaborate on various projects.

By bringing together clergy in the district at monthly meetings the need for a community food pantry was brought to the table and quickly

got underway in December 2009 as the Kewaskum High School Student Government took the task of running the pantry in a storage closet of the Municipal Building Annex. Last year, plans for a permanent structure were announced and donations are now being accepted for the building that is for the most part constructed on school district property adjacent to the Kewaskum Career Academy.

Krumm's contract ends June 30, 2011.

Looking to the future, Kenworthy said the board would officially receive the retirement at their February meeting. There have been no discussions as to a replacement for Krumm.

"The board will look at all the possibilities available to us for a smooth and stable transition. The key component for the short term is to not rush that process but instead to give us the stability upon which to base that very important decision," Kenworthy explained.



On Jan. 8, Gehl's granddaughter Deann Johnson, daughter of Gehl's son Kenneth; Deann's husband Gene Johnson and their children, Ashley and Ethan, Merrill residents, visited Gehl to celebrate her 10 decades.

The following day, several more guests arrived at Beechwood Rest Home for a party with Gehl, the new centenarian. Gehl's son Donald was there with his wife Joanne.

Gehl's son Kenneth, a Waukesha resident, was unable to attend as he was recovering from rotator cuff surgery. However, Kenneth's wife Donna and their children -- Vickie Ginster and her husband Steve were present, as were Kenneth's son Scott, his wife M.J. and their children -- Bryce and Sydney Gehl.

Donna's brother Ron Bloedel and his wife Karen were also among the contingent.

"We sat and talked about old times," Donald said. "I also told my mother I'd make her a drink -- blackberry brandy and sour -- which I did. And we had chocolate birthday cake."

To what does Gehl, a Milwaukee resident from 1911-2005, attribute her longevity? "I'm a non-smoker, and I enjoy having my favorite drinks," she said. "I like blackberry brandy and sour, and Blatz beer."

As for her most cherished activities throughout the years, "I loved going to ballroom dances in Milwaukee and enjoyed doing polkas," she said. "My husband didn't enjoy dancing, but he would go along, and I'd dance with others."

"I also liked playing card games, such as Rummy, and making love to the man [my husband]," she added.

During a Jan. 18 interview with Gehl, she was seated in a wheelchair in her room at Beechwood Rest Home. She was attired in beige pants and a striking mauve-colored blouse with flowers, since residents at the Home were commemorating Hawaii Week. Her thick, silver hair was meticulously coiffed, due to the expertise of Sandy Schultz, Beechwood Rest Home's

cosmetologist.

"I've always had a good head of hair," she responded when a visitor complimented her about her tresses.

She remains active at present, taking part in chair exercises, Bingo and crafts, interacting with her fellow residents and enjoys being outdoors in the summer time to soak up some sunshine.

Gehl said she finds that people today are friendlier than they were many years ago. She is in good health, except for poor vision, due to macular degeneration.

"The only time she was in the hospital, outside of having her two children, was to have a stent [tiny tube] placed into an artery when she was 84," Donald recalled.

Gehl was born on Jan. 6, 1911, at the home of her parents, Ernst and Hilda Giese at 1238 Cottage Place, Milwaukee. That former street is now a parkway. A midwife assisted Hilda at her daughter's birth.

Gehl's father was a carpenter, and she had two younger siblings, Howard and Frieda. Both are deceased.

She completed her elementary education, through eighth-grade, at Hopkins Street School in Milwaukee and then went on to attend a Milwaukee-

based vocational school. Following her graduation, she did housekeeping for clients and later worked part-time at a library.

Meanwhile, on a social outing, she accompanied her friends Art and Irene Gehl to a reunion at Wind Lake in Racine County. It was there that she met Art's brother Jerome, and she and Jerome began a courtship, which lasted several years. Ethel Giese and Jerome Gehl were married in Milwaukee on Feb. 15, 1941.

Jerome was employed as a machinist for 42 years at Briggs & Stratton in Milwaukee. He passed away in 1984.

"She was a good mother and kept an eye on us," Donald said.

He has fond memories of his mother's homemade chocolate-chip cookies. "They were to-die-for," he said.

Her homemade bread was in that same category. "She would bake five loaves, and my brother and I would eat four of them," Donald said. "There was just one left for my parents."

Gehl said she liked to bake, especially making yeast-based items.

Reminiscing is a favorite pastime of hers. "I always had a good time," she said. "Whatever I did, I enjoyed myself."





# Long Lake Fisheree....50 Years Ago

Uncle Reuben and Aunt Bernice Drewitz on Long Lake invited my parents and me to see the Long Lake Fisheree. On the way up we drove by Grandpa Ted and Grandma Josephine Dworschack's home in New Fane.

In past summers I have been swimming and fishing on Long Lake, but now in January of 1961 my parents Delbert & Connie (Dworschack) were going to be exposed to the magic of ice fishing.

We garbed in warm winter clothes. I wore an Icelandic style red, white & blue sweater hand-made by Mom. Arriving at the lake, we all entered

Uncle Reuben's primitively heated fishing shanty. It was "bare bones" inside, but we each had some chairs to sit on next to the holes drilled through the ice to fish from. The fishing rods were extra short to fit in the cramped shelter. Reuben dangled alluring bait to hopefully catch fish swimming below the glistening lake's snow and ice.

It wasn't long before the Lakers in the neighborhood near Uncle Reuben stopped by to greet mom, dad and me and to check out our fishing luck. Aunt Bernice told friends, we were coming up. Anglers with my Uncle & Aunt swapped stories.

The fish weren't biting at

our spot on the lake. So, we walked to the main Fisheree location to meet and greet the other fishing zealots. It was a fair walk. I enjoyed seeing the glistening snow and ice on Long Lake. It was a different wonderland than I had experienced in the summer time. There are fun things to do on a frozen lake. Gosh, if I remember correctly, what a cadre of fish were being logged in at the Fisheree including walleye, pike, bass, crappies, bluegills and perch.

Going back to our simple fishing hide-away we hunkered down to have some treats. Aunt Bernice has bought cheese from local cheese makers at Beechwood in Adell, Widmer's in Theresa and Bieri's in Jackson. We ate shelled nuts from area hickory trees, chips with liquid refreshments. We talked, told jokes and enjoyed wintertime

pleasures. Unfortunately no fish were caught. Not to worry! We adjourned to the Drewitz Cozy year-round lake home. Aunt Bernice pan-fried her Long Lake fish caught and frozen earlier. We indulged in her culinary pleasures that melted in our mouths. While warm in their house, we overlooked various custom-made fish shanties on the shimmering lake.

Now simple reminiscence of my ice fishing experience exactly 50 years ago is really the back story of this article. I was a freshman going to Marquette University, enjoying my family and relatives and life was good! Last year with traction steel coils attached to my boots for safer walking on the lake ice I revisited my ice fishing experience. I joined the Long Lake Fishing Club and hope to again go to the Fisheree in Dundee.



## Let's Get Moving Washington County

While the beginning of each new year is the traditional time to think about getting fit, anytime is a good time to improve your lifestyle. A telephone survey conducted in 2006 asked 400 Washington County residents what they believed were the most important health issues in Washington County based on the 2010 State Health Plan. Another survey done in late 2010 asked another 400 Washington County adults the same question based on the new state health plan: 2020 Healthiest Wisconsin. The health issues they had to pick from were all lifestyle related. In the recent 2010 survey available on the Health Department's webpage [www.co.washington.wi.us](http://www.co.washington.wi.us):

- Sixty percent of respondents reported that overweight, obesity and lack of physical exercise or unhealthy food choices as one of the top three community health problems.

- From the 2006 survey to the 2010 survey, there was a statistical increase in the overall percent of respondents who reported overweight, obesity and lack of physical exercise or unhealthy food choice as one of the top three community health problems.

In Wisconsin, local health departments have a responsibility to assess the health of their communities and determine priority needs. Three five-year plans are available on the Health Department's webpage at the address above under the documents section. Federal and state health plans have been developed for each of the last three decades. All of these plans include factors that indicate the health of communities and significantly contribute to death and illness in the community. It is important to note that the factors in the plans are modifiable (meaning they can be changed) and therefore

are preventable and can all positively affect health. Families are the building blocks of communities and a healthy individual and family lifestyle supports positive community health.

Obesity is a problem area because it is a many health problems over time. It is generally accepted that activity and nutrition are basic components of the obesity epidemic. Last February every county in the nation was ranked against other counties in their state. Every state and county was looked at using a consistent set of preventable measures that contribute to the areas in the federal 10 year health plan. This data provides valuable insight about what factors influence the community's health the most. The 2010 report showed that in Washington County the adult obesity rate exceeded the state average. Another ranking report will be released in

March 2011. Obesity is a major underlying cause of many chronic conditions that lead to poor health and contributes to health care costs. Obesity is preventable and treatable with healthy lifestyle changes.

There is no magic solution to the epidemic of obesity affecting the United States. We must work together to find ways that can be incorporated into our daily lives and routines to increase activity and have access to healthy nutritional intake that supports optimum health. Locally a group called the Healthy People Project of Washington County (HPPWC) has been working in collaboration with the Washington County Health Department and Kettle Moraine Y to promote increased physical activity and access to healthy foods. On a national level, First Lady Michelle Obama has launched a nutrition campaign aimed at improving the health of children. The state of

Wisconsin has an obesity plan. It will take everyone's efforts to support healthy lifestyles and improve health.

Lifestyle changes do improve your health. Look for ways to take a few extra steps or pledge to increase the meals you prepare at home. Look for ways to support the schools and worksites that are trying to promote wellness. Take a walk. Take advantage of the great Farmer's Markets in Washington County during the summer months. Get involved and support policies that encourage healthy lifestyles. Healthy individuals and healthy families lead to healthy communities. Let's Get Moving Washington County.



## 100 Years Ago

October 29, 1910

The loss was estimated at about \$2,000.

An entire block was destroyed by fire in the village of Random Lake last Saturday night. The buildings destroyed were the elevator, saloon and hotel of Peter Bechler, meat market of William Rheinganz, saloon and hotel of Nic Schmitz and residence of Dr. T.E. Malloy. The estimated loss was \$20,000.

The first killing frost of the season came last Thursday night. This frost, according to schedule, is several weeks behind with the average date for its appearance being October 7. Snow flurries fell Thursday afternoon for the first time this season.

Just about finishing up with the day's work and while crossing the railroad tracks, a bag of flour which he was sitting on started slipping and fell with John to the ground under the wagon. The hind wheels of the wagon passed over him.

Joseph Weiss, living 1-1/2 miles north of St. Michaels, had the misfortune of sustaining a broken left arm just above the wrist last Monday. Mr. Weiss was about to enter the barn when a wagon pole which was braced against the door, fell down and struck him on the head, knocking him down an embankment of about 12 feet.

## On Wisconsin *Outdoors*

With the Dick Ellis Experts

### Wisconsin Whitefish Wonder...Change in forage changes the game on Green Bay gamefish



Six Wisconsin anglers and one Chicago escapee caught 75 whitefish January 17 on the Bay of Green Bay under the tutelage of Why Knot Guide Service. They include Guide Zack Burgess of Algoma, Roger Mayer of Chicago, Bob Johnson of Mukwonago, Jeff Peterson of Stevens Point, Steve Henske of Stevens Point, Scott Heitman of New Berlin and John Ellis of Muskego.

Outside the two shacks far out on the hardwater of Green Bay, horizontal sheets of snow pushed by howling winds obscured the distant shanty town to the north. Inside, split oak and birch crackled in the wood-burning stoves and seven Wisconsin anglers with one Chicago escapee relaxed in sweatshirts, talked quietly and watched intently for any subtle clue of another whitefish strike.

Subtle indeed. Each whitefish hunter had watched the Swedish Pimples dressed with a wax worm or minnow tumble down through the clear water before the line went slack on the sand shelf shrouded with zebra mussel far below the ice. The trick then, was to jig the bait ever so slightly and to decipher the gentlest of hits in answer from a whitefish 35 feet below.

The strikes came often, and these anglers new to whitefish angling celebrated with growing piles of fish averaging 15 to 20 inches. Roger

Mayer of Chicago, who swore allegiance to the Packers before he was allowed in the shack, Jeff Peterson and Steve Henske of Stevens Point, Bob Johnson of Mukwonago, John Ellis of Muskego, and Scott Heitman and me of New Berlin, also lost countless numbers of the light hitters; despite the regular calls from Zack Burgess of Why Knot Guide Service to set the hook on another slightly twitching rod.

When the hook was buried, each whitefish ascending through the hues of Green Bay to the augured hole proved a worthy battle. Rods doubled over and struggling whitefish were either lost on the ride up or surrendered to an eventual meeting with the skillet.

Once, within seconds, the evolving story of the whitefish here on the Bay was reflected symbolically when first a zebra mussel was brought up pierced by the treble hook of a Swedish pimple and soon after a whitefish was lifted from the water with the tail of

a Round Goby still protruding from its mouth.

According to DNR Fisheries Technician Tim Kroeff of Sturgeon Bay, tremendous fishing for whitefish in recent years on the bay is less a resurgence of the population and more a change in the fish's forage base that has enabled man to target it. Historically, the major food source of whitefish was Diporeia, but the numbers of the exotic invertebrate dwindled when "affected" by the zebra mussel in the Great Lakes. In response, Whitefish adapted to feed on the exotic Round Goby, a vertebrate.

"The goby is illegal to use as bait," Kroeff said. "Fishermen mimic the goby by using Swedish pimples or rapala jigs tipped with a waxie or a minnow, or tipped just a minnow head or tail. Everyone has their own little method they have confidence in. You can pretty much fish for whitefish now throughout Green Bay but the eastern shore is better known to anglers."

According to Kroeff, whitefish can be caught in four to 60 feet of water and normally move in schools. He described angling action as very good, with fisherman allowed 10 whitefish per day. In addition to the whitefish change in diet creating a new sportfish, he said population numbers are also on the rise due to improved water quality.

"There's less water pollution," he said. "Historically, whitefish had fall spawning runs on the Fox, Peshtigo and Menomonie Rivers. Now we're seeing runs again like they used to in large numbers. We just tagged 2500 whitefish on the Menomonie. They've adapted. They're survivors."

According to Guide Zack Burgess, 99 percent of the whitefish are taken on jiggling rods. Open water fishing for whitefish is very difficult, for all practical purposes making the sport an ice bite.

Burgess is a third generation guide also running 34 and 25 foot salmon and walleye charters out of Al-

gomagoma beginning in mid-May. "And we can take care of as many people as you bring because we are part of a charter boat association," he said. At age 26, he has already fished these waters for 13 years beginning on his grandfather's charter boat, before going into business as a captain five years ago. He credits his father, Robert, with teaching him how to catch fish.

"Now, so much has changed over the years that I teach him how to fish," he said.

Change for Zach Burgess includes learning the last several years how to target and catch whitefish that several years before that weren't even catchable. He learned his lessons well. The day before our ice party, a group of 18 anglers under his guidance took home a limit of 180 fish. During a hot January bite, a Burgess group had kept 29 perch averaging between eight and 11 inches, with a one obese fish measuring in at 14 inches.

"The last three years I fished four or five days a week learning how to catch whitefish," he said. "I figured I was ready to guide."

Quite ready. When the day had ended after six hours on the ice, our Wisconsin group had caught 75 whitefish and thrown back many of the smaller fish. Burgess predicted diner's satisfaction whether we smoked, pickled, baked, or deep fried our catch.

"You've heard of the Door County fish boil? He asked. "This is the fish. And don't forget the salmon charters. Where else can you catch the quantity we catch out of Algoma with salmon in the 20 pound class?" he asked.

Okay...we believe. Heaven in Wisconsin starts on the Green Bay hardwater.

**GREENFIELD-** While they may have been aware of the size of the schools they were up against, the Kewaskum High School wrestlers never let that fact bother them as they competed and competed well last Saturday in the annual Zelinski Memorial Dual Invitational at Whitnall High School.

Kewaskum, which had the smallest enrollment of the 16 teams, finished 6th in the field, which included such powerhouses as Mukwonago, Hartford and Pulaski.

The Indians were also without two senior starters, Jared Koffke, recovering from a concussion and Brad Bentz, out on an athletic code violation.

"Our kids did a great job. There were very few forfeits. They wrestled a lot of matches," KHS coach Dennis Aupperle said after watches the Indians battle to a 3-2 record in the meet, which was divided into four pools determined by the

outcome of the first match of the day.

In the opening round, Kewaskum drew Germantown, featuring Jesse Thielke, who is heading to the University of Wisconsin after concluding his prep career in February.

Starting at 189 pounds, the Indians jumped out to a 12-0 lead but after the 130-pound match found themselves down 30-16, and the thoughts of advancing to a winners' pool didn't look promising.

A first-period pin by Austin Goeden and a thrilling 5-3 win (with a reversal at the buzzer) by Joey Seitz at 135 and 140 drew the Indians within five points (25-30), then freshman Max Maertz and sophomore Tyler Laufer made their first varsity starts very memorable, winning by pin and decision, respectively, to put the Indians in the lead 34-30.

**WAUPUN-** The Kewaskum High School wrestlers kept their Eastern Wisconsin Conference title hopes alive Thursday night, using four pins, a technical fall and three decisions toward a 50-21 victory over host Waupun.

With the win, the Indians improved to 5-1 in the EWC, with one match left on its schedule, a home date tomorrow night (Jan. 28) with Two Rivers, the only undefeated team left in the conference. Two Rivers stunned Campbellsport 44-21 a week ago, in taking a giant step toward a first wrestling title since the 1970s.

All three of the KHS seniors who wrestled in the meet notched pins, including Rob Maertz at 152 pounds, Bo Seibel at 189, and Cole Roberts in 215.

His win tied the team score at 15-all, and the only other points earned by the Warriors came via a forfeit at 112.

Roberts (4-2 and 12-8) made quick work of Ashten Alexander, pinning him in 1:53.

The fourth pin came from the smallest guy on the team, 103-pound Steve Bohn. He won in :45 over Richard Emmer. Even though Bohn is still one win short of the .500 mark (5-6) overall, he is a perfect 5-0 in EWC action.

Sophomore Brett Scoles (5-0, 18-5) put on another of his takedown clinics in his 22-7 tech fall over Josh Cypert. Scoles had eight, first-period takedowns.

Winning by decision were Joey Seitz (11-8) at 140, Cody Muckerheide at 130 and Austin Goeden (5-1, 13-8) at 135.
