

## Experienced local restaurateur will open The Old Hotel

*Former owner of Eckl's Main Street Inn to get back in the kitchen*

**KEWASKUM-** A successful local restaurateur will be back in the kitchen as she embarks on another restaurant inside the village's landmark eatery. The new restaurant brings the building's history into its name, "The Old Hotel Restaurant & Lounge".

Karen Callen will open the new restaurant with the building's owners Gary and Linda Gavin who will manage the business. The opportunity arose as the Gavins' tenant; Victoria Feucht vacated the building after running Victoria's Cornerstone Inn since June of 2008.

Gary Gavin stated the restaurant

will be getting new paint and a few other facelifts but will largely remain the same. "Vicki left the building in great shape," he added.

Gavin stated a new menu is being developed and plans call for a lounge upstairs with a full bar.

Joining Callen in the kitchen will be her right hand, her twin sister Sharon Ellis.

"Together we make a great team, being twins, we know what each other is thinking and make things happen," Callen explained.

The building which has been in existence since Kewaskum's humble beginnings has been become a local landmark starting as one of Kewaskum

most popular meeting places, S. Witzig's Hotel to The Republican House at the turn of the century to The Glacier Inn in 1963.

Gavin purchased the building in 1997 and gave it a significant four-month remodel. It was then re-opened as The Gateway Supper Club and Lounge. Other businesses to take residence included, Salt H2O Café and Woody's Steakhouse before Victoria's Cornerstone Inn.

Callen stated she is looking for all positions at the restaurant. Resumes are being accepted by mail to: P.O. Box 356, Kewaskum, WI 53040.

The two hope to open in March.





## ~ OPINION ~ Change is Here

On Monday, January 3rd I started my fifth term as the State Representative for the 59th Assembly District. It was a joyous day in Madison as Scott Walker was sworn in as our 45th Governor. In addition Republican majorities in the Assembly and Senate were sworn in as we celebrate our historic 100th legislative session.

The celebration didn't last long because Gov. Walker immediately called the state legislature into Special Session to deal with jobs and the economy. Since that day in early January, the legislature has been busy having public hearings and votes on a series of bills sending a clear message to the business community in Wisconsin and the whole country that Wisconsin isn't just "Open For Business" but is there to help you be successful and won't punish your success.

Legislation dealing with tort reform, tax incentives for existing and new businesses, regulatory reform and health savings accounts have already been part of this Special Session. Still to come are bills dealing with changing the Commerce Department to an Economic Development Agency and changing bureaucratic rule and regulation making authority, taking rule making power away from bureaucrats and putting it in the governor's and legislature's control.

None of these bills, by itself, will create 250,000 jobs. What we are doing and will continue to do through the next year and a half is pass legislation that will make Wisconsin a friendlier and easier place to do business. Government can't create the jobs. The private sector can and will create jobs. We want them to stay in Wisconsin and come to Wisconsin when they are starting or expanding their business. They will only do that if we have a business environment in Wisconsin that doesn't punish them and is easy and prompt to work with.

Starting on November 3rd, the day after the election, I began getting phone calls and e-mails suggesting things that needed changing in Wisconsin. Things like photo ID for voting, same day registration, concealed carry, prevailing wage laws, mediation/arbitration, high cost of public employees, and the list goes on and on.

Many, if not all, of these issues are being worked on, bills in drafting, etc. With the emphasis right now on jobs and the economy, it is difficult to get all of these issues dealt with at the same time. We have already passed more bills in January this year than any of the other four terms I have been in Madison.

The expectations are very high right now among the residents of Wisconsin. With Republican majorities in both houses and a Republican governor we have a responsibility to our constituents to produce results. But those results need to come in a transparent way, with public hearings and debates where citizens can come and be heard. That takes time. Please be patient. The effectiveness of this legislature and governor will be determined by two years of work,

not one month.

This term I am honored to be appointed to the Joint Committee on Finance. The biggest and most important role of this committee is to get the Biennial State Budget passed by June 30th.

We are facing a structural deficit of over \$3 Billion. That means we have to either find \$3 Billion in new revenues, cut \$3 Billion in spending or a combination of the two. New revenues come from only one place, the taxpayers in the form of new or higher taxes. I don't believe our problem in Wisconsin is that we don't tax enough; our problem is we spend too much. That is also the message the taxpayers sent last November.

When our committee gets the budget from Governor Walker in late February I will be looking for ways to make state government smaller and leaner. If you have suggestions I will be happy to hear from you. I will certainly, and have already, heard from advocates for the many programs contained in that budget.

We also have a short term problem with our current budget. We recently found out that there were a number of budget accounting tricks used by the previous administration that show a deficit in the current budget that is greater than we thought. Plus Medical Assistance {MA} was expanded too much in the previous budget and the deficit in that part of the budget continues to grow. These findings might force us to do a Budget Repair Bill to just make it to June 30th.

As always, I love to hear from you. Hopefully, my e-mail newsletters will be more frequent this year and this will spur more dialogue between me and my constituents. I am also available to speak to groups like service organizations, church groups or school groups. If you want to know what is going on with a certain issue don't be afraid to call.

Thanks for your support in the past and I look forward to serving you for the rest of this two year term.

Johnson Bus Company recently had vandalism which occurred on a Wednesday night also. I have a feeling that it probably was a group of kids that had too much time on their hands and dreamt this up. This cost the taxpayers a lot of money. With the cost of diesel fuel high and still rising, I don't understand why they don't go for the full day. By the time the kids get picked up, the buses turn around and start dropping kids off.

I have talked to a lot of residents of Kewaskum and they all voiced the same opinion as I - these kids should be in school. There are students that can't get their projects finished in the shop because there isn't enough time during the day. There was a student who left town to go to West Bend and had to get back for baseball practice and was severely injured in an automobile accident.

was bottled in glass mostly gallon jugs. By the middle of the afternoon we had everything cleaned up and ready for production the next day. The only thing left to do was to haul the broken glass and garbage to the dump, which was, located a mile or so east of Kewaskum.

The driver of the ton and 1/2 truck was my friend Einar H. Ingman Jr. we called him "Junior". We hauled the glass and garbage to the dump and on our return as we approached the railroad track I saw the train coming at a clip from the north, I hollered at Junior and he slammed on the brakes, the motor choked off and he couldn't get it started.

We jumped out of the truck and ran to the rear. We turned just in time to see the train miss the truck by inches. We were really shaking and it didn't help that some of truck drivers that were back from delivering milk in Milwaukee saw the whole thing go down. After we backed the truck up to the dock, one of the drivers scolded us by telling us we were supposed to stay in the truck because the insurance

would not cover the truck if it would have been hit by the train. They had their own and we were shaking in our boots.

In the fall of 1948 three of us from Kewaskum, Allen Mertes, "Junior" Ingman and myself joined the U.S. Army at West Bend. After Basic Training at Camp Breckenridge, Kentucky we parted. I never saw Allen Mertes again he gave his life in the Korean War. President Truman presented the Congressional Medal of Honor Junior Ingman for his action in the Korean War.

Last week I went to visit "Junior" Ingman at a nursing home in Tomahawk Wisconsin. He had a stroke eight years ago and has been there ever since. His wife Mardelle visits him every day. We had a good visit and talked about old times. President Truman gave him the Medal of Honor on the July 5, 1951 and they were married on July 5, 1952. My wife Taeko and I were married on Okinawa July 5, 1951.

There are others around who remember "Junior" Ingman who grew up on a farm just east of Kewaskum. He is our hero "Lest we forget."

At Holy Trinity Catholic Church, Roberts attends Catholic Work Heart Camp, a program where teens spend a week in Rockford, IL., helping the poor and elderly of the

community with painting and projects cleaning up their neighborhood.





## Register now for April ACT test

Registration is now open for the April 9, 2011 ACT achievement test. Students who wish to take the college admission and placement exam must register before March 4, 2011.

The ACT is a curriculum-based achievement exam. It tests what students have actually learned in school, not their aptitude for learning. The ACT also measures what students need to know to be ready for first year credit-bearing college courses based on ACT College Readiness Standards™. Every student's results can be tied directly to these consistent standards.

The ACT has four sections—English, mathematics, reading and science—and takes about three hours to complete. Students who take the ACT Plus Writing complete an optional writing test that requires an additional 30 minutes. Unlike

other exams, students are not penalized for guessing or answering all the questions on each test section. In fact, it is beneficial for test takers to answer all questions within the time allowed.

During registration, students may select up to four universities to receive their score reports. ACT scores are accepted by all four-year colleges and universities across the United States. ACT reports scores only when requested to do so by the student. Additional score reports are available for a small fee.

All students complete a detailed inventory of questions during ACT registration. Each test taker receives an ACT score report that includes a wide variety of information to assist with high school course selection, college readiness, career planning, and college admissions.

The cost for the ACT test without writing is \$33. When combined with the optional ACT Writing Test, the total cost is \$48. Students who qualify may apply for a fee waiver through their high school counselor.

The ACT website, [www.actstudent.org](http://www.actstudent.org), has helpful information, free sample items, and options to order inexpensive test prep materials to assist test takers get ready for the exam. However, the best preparation is to take rigorous core courses in school, study hard, and learn the academic skills needed in college.

Most students register online at [www.actstudent.org](http://www.actstudent.org). Students may also pick up registration forms from their high school counseling offices. Late registration is available until March 18, 2011 for an additional \$21 fee.



## 25 Years Ago

November 1, 1985

Killed in the crash, which occurred on Highway 45, just south of the Kewaskum village limits, were Brenda Oelhafen, 15, daughter of James and Carol Oelhafen, Allenton, and David T. Wendelborn, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Wendelborn, Kewaskum.

On November 2, area residents will have the opportunity to participate in the rededication of the Village of Kewaskum's newly remodeled Municipal Building. Included with a short program and an inspection tour of the building will be bus tours through the village with stops at some of the village's municipal facilities, including the village's water pollution facility, new water department pump house No. 3,300,000 gallon water sphere and village garage. The remodeling project, from planning to construction stage, covered seven years.

The cast, crew and band members of the Kewaskum High School musical, "Once Upon a Mattress," have finished up this week of rehearsals and all systems are go for their production set for November 8 and 9. Members of the cast include Tom Strigenz, Dani Rogne, Mitzie Nigh, Andy Medley, Leah Kuphal, Ada Thull, Anne Rosenberger, Craig Hubbell, Ron Theusch and Joel Fleury.

The Kewaskum girls volleyball team won the WIAA Class A Regional title October 29 by beating very strong teams from Hartford and Beaver Dam. The championship matches were played at Hartford Union High School. Now the girls move on to sectional play at Kaukauna on November 2.

November 8, 1985

It has stood as the pillared brick giant on Kewaskum's Main Street for almost 75 years, but last Tuesday the Old Bank of Kewaskum building on North Main Street (now the site of Silbernagel-Jasen Financial Service and their parking area) was reduced to a pile of unstately rubble. Built in 1911, and put into operation in 1912 by Adolph Rosenheimer, who with his brother Moritz, had operated a small bank in the Rosenheimer store, the building served as a bank until the early 1970s. With its opening, the first floor was occupied by the bank's offices and Malt and Grain Company. The Kewaskum Fire Insurance Company occupied the second floor. Also in 1912, the Bank of Kewaskum merged

with the Citizen's State Bank in Kewaskum. In 1932, the bank again became part of a merger, this time with Farmers and Merchants Bank. In 1940, Maurice Rosenheimer became Bank President, and in 1965, chairman of the board. The death of Maurice in 1967 ended the active participation of the Rosenheimer family in the bank's operation. Near the end of 1971, the Bank of Kewaskum joined the Village Bancorporation and in 1973, Kewaskum merged with the Allenton State Bank and its operations were moved into new quarters at its present Fond du Lac Avenue location.

The Kewaskum High School Class of 1945 held their 40th reunion at the Glacier Inn in Kewaskum on September 21. Members in attendance included Francis Volm, Alton Schrauth, Francis Braun, Henry Schacht, Ralph Koth, Walter Pamperin, Lois Koch Rossmiller, Shirley Backus Gaffke, Ruth Birkholz Ramel, Marilyn Perkins Schommer, Mary Schmitz Hergert, Evelyn Techtmann Krueger, Audrey Ehner Schroeter, Eleanor Schaeffer Neckuty, Roger Schleif, Margaret Nigh Blanke, Myrtle Schmidt Hanrahan, Carolyn Bremser Mueller, Bea Hafemann Landvatter, Byrdell Firks Schulz, Betty Probst Giese, and Leland Schaub.

The Kewaskum High School girls volleyball team traveled to Kaukauna November 2 for Class A Sectional play and found themselves by far the smallest school competing with an enrollment of less than 700 students. Kewaskum was pitted against Neenah with almost three times the enrollment of Kewaskum, Sheboygan North and Kaukauna, both of which have over twice the enrollment of our school. The Kewaskum girls ended their season there by winning only one of nine games in their three match playoff series. Host Kaukauna won the meet and a trip to state.

Notice is hereby given of a general election to be held in the several wards in Washington County, on the 2nd day of November, 2010, at which the officers named below shall be chosen. The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office and under the appropriate party or other designation, each in its proper column, together with the questions submitted to a vote, in the sample ballot below.

### INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall state his or her name and address before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon

being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

A straight party vote is a vote for all the party's candidates listed on the ballot, unless the elector casts a vote for a candidate of another party, writes in the name of a candidate or applies a sticker. A straight party vote cannot be cast for Independent candidates. At the general election, if an elector wishes to cast a straight party vote for all candidates nominated by any party, the elector shall select the party of his or her choice and:

Where an optical scan system is used, fill in the oval next to the party designation. Where touch screen voting systems are used, the elector shall select the button next to the party designation.

To vote for individual candidates,

where an optical scan system is used, fill in the oval next to the candidate's name for whom he or she intends to vote. Where touch screen voting systems are used, the elector shall select the button next to the candidates' names for whom he or she intends to vote.

To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, where an optical scan voting system is used, the elector shall write the name of the candidate of his or her choice in the space provided for a write in vote. Where touch screen voting systems are used, the elector shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write in vote.

An elector must vote for Governor and Lieutenant Governor jointly on one ticket. A vote for Governor is also a vote for Lieutenant Governor. To vote for persons whose names do not appear on the ballot, write the names of individuals for both offices on the lines provided.

On referenda questions, where marksense voting is used, the elector shall fill in the oval next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elec-

tor shall fill in the oval next to "no" if opposed to the question.

On referenda questions, where touch screen voting systems are used, the elector shall select the button next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the elector shall select the button next to "no" if opposed to the question.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If an elector spoils a marksense ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. The elector may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the elector in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the voting booth, properly deposit the ballot, and promptly leave the polling place.

After an official marksense ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. The elector shall then insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit.

After an official touch screen ballot is marked, the elector shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.

# Scoles, Maertz, Seibel claim EWC titles; Indians finish fourth

**PLYMOUTH-** Kewaskum tied for having the most champions, three, but neighboring Campbellsport used overall depth to successfully defend its Eastern Wisconsin Conference Tournament crown last Saturday and earn a bit of revenge in the process.

The Cougars finished the meet with 168.5 points, 9 more than Two Rivers (159.5), which easily won the dual meet between the two teams, 44-21.

Sheboygan Falls, behind three champions, finished third with 159, while the Indians, hampered by the fact they had no 112-pounder all season, were still without a top seed and lost a wrestler to injury, had to settle for fourth at 151.5.

"Overall, not bad," KHS coach Dennis Aupperle said; indicating he figured five or six of the Indians would reach the finals.

As it turned out, there were six Indians in the finals, with Brett Scoles (125), Rob Maertz (152) and Bo Seibel (189) all coming away as winners.

Seibel was dominant in winning his second EWC crown and improving his record to 31-1.

After receiving a bye in the

first round, Seibel pinned Mike Kaschner of Campbellsport in 29 seconds (:29), and in the finals, he put Drew Setzer's (of Sheboygan Falls) shoulders to the mat in a mere 1:12.

Adding the two times together, Seibel was only on the mat one minute and 41 seconds.

A year ago, Ben Chappa of Sheboygan Falls, the eventual state champion, in the semifinals, defeated Seibel. He ended up taking third.

And which title did Seibel enjoy the most, his sophomore win or this one? "Any tournament win is a good day," Seibel said.

And what he likes about wrestling is the top spots are determined in competition, not on a vote. "That's always on your mind. It gets you to work harder," he said. "It's just you and the other guy out there!"

Seibel is currently ranked No. 1 in the state at 189, and he has placed in his three previous state appearances.

Maertz, another of the six KHS seniors in the meet, had a real battle on his hand before defeating Payden Salm of Campbellsport, 6-4 on a late reversal after penalty point. In the dual meet, Maertz, now 28-5, won in overtime, 7-5.

This was Maertz's second

title, and he said, "Senior year, a good way to finish it (career)."

"I'll have him (Salm) again next Saturday at Campbellsport," Maertz said, indicating, "I'm excited for next week and the following weeks."

Maertz also started with a bye, then he sidelined Kevin Messer of Waupun by major decision, 17-8.

Both Maertz and Salm are ranked in Division 2, and both went to state a year ago.

Scoles, a sophomore won his first EWC title quite handily, defeating Two Rivers' Derek Taylor by a score of 7-2.

Scoles started with a bye, then he beat Mark Roecker of Waupun, 12-4.

Scoles (28-5) was disappointed he didn't get a first round match. "It gets you warmed up for the day," he said, and concerning the finals, he said, Taylor "got in on my legs a little but, but I sprawled" to keep him from scoring.

The Indians' three others finalists were sophomores and cousins, Logan Dreher (119) and Austin Goeden (135), and freshman Joe Seitz (140.)

After a bye, Dreher nipped Campbellsport's Beau Oestreich 1-0 on an escape in the third period.

In the finals, Dreher (18-9)

was pitted against freshman Mitch Lambrecht of Sheboygan Falls, who used a throw in the first period to take a 7-1 lead, which he nursed until the end when he was called for locking his hands, making the final 7-2.

Goeden wrestled three times, opening with a 3-2 decision over Austin Wiese of Plymouth, then scoring a last-second reversal to top Jeff Becker of Sheboygan Falls, 4-2. Becker is currently ranked in Division 2.

In the finals, Chet Floyd of Campbellsport, another ranked wrestler, beat Goeden (19-12) by major decision, 11-3.

Seitz opened with a 7-5 victory over Brett Fulleylove-Krau of New Holstein in a match that had some anxious moments, then he looked more confident against Waupun's Taylor Huenink, pinning him in 4:34.

In the finals, Seitz (18-11) faced top-rated (in the conference and the state) Mitchell Lambrecht and was pinned by the experienced Sheboygan Falls wrestler in 1:13.

Senior Cole Roberts (18-13) placed third at 215, winning a 9-1 decision before getting pinned by Brian Duerschmidt in 4:33 after being down by just

one point with two minutes to go.

The Indians lost senior Jared Koffke (19-6) after his 5-0 semifinal loss to Plymouth's Colin Rortvedt. Koffke may have hyper extended his elbow, according to Aupperle, who said, "We'll have to see Monday if he can go (in the regionals)."

Koffke, a defending champion, had to default his wrestle back and placed fourth.

KHS also got fifths from Steven Bohn (loss by pin, bye and win by pin), Ted Wollner at 171 (loss via pin, bye and win by injury default) and Brandon Ehn at 285 (loss via pin, bye and win by pin).

Brad Bentz, currently ranked No. 1 at 160 in Division 2, returns to action Saturday at the Campbellsport Regional.

While there are seven teams assigned to the regional, Aupperle said, "I think it's going to end up to be a dual meet between us and them (Cougars)."

The top two individuals at each weight class advance to the sectionals, and the winning team advances to the team sectional at Whitewater on Tuesday, Feb. 15.

In hand grenades and horse shoes, Kewaskum's girls' basketball team would be faring OK.

Improvement continues for the Indians but it hasn't yet translated to victories as the girls lost, 38-27, on Tuesday against Kiel.

Kewaskum moved to 1-9 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, 3-13 overall. Kiel is 3-7 in the EWC, 8-8 overall.

Once the Indians find their shooting touch, they'll start racking up some wins. On Tuesday, they were 12-for-50 from the field and 3-for-10 at the free throw line, including missing the front end of three bonuses.

Senior point guard Christine Bohn led the team with eight points and four steals, hustling all over the court. Junior Kayla Bastian didn't score but had six rebounds and three steals.

The Indians finally won the turnover battle - 16 to 22 - but didn't convert its advantage into points.

"I thought we broke the press. We did a pretty good job against their 1-3-1," Kleinhans said.

In the second quarter, the turnover bug struck again as the Indians committed nine, leading to an 18-10 quarter deficit and 28-25 halftime defi-

cit. "If we wouldn't have had all those turnovers - we had nine turnovers in the second quarter. That made the difference again," Kleinhans said.

In the third quarter, Kewaskum came out flat and the Panthers took advantage.

"Can't turn the ball over to start the second half three times in a row," Kleinhans said. He just assume miss a shot.

**MILWAUKEE** - Kewaskum's boys' basketball team almost let a huge lead escape on Saturday but this time hung on in double overtime.

But nobody was complaining about playing an extra eight minutes on the floor where Ray Allen started his record-setting career of three-pointers.

The boys beat Random Lake, 71-67, after blowing a 12-point lead going into the fourth quarter, turning a rout into a nail-biter. Point guard Eric Perkins scored a game-high 26 points, including a key three-point play in overtime to tie the game and hit three of four free throws in double OT.

"We're pretty fortunate to come out with a win," said Coach Quinn Heintz. "We were the better team in the first half, definitely not in the second half."

Kewaskum moved to 9-8 overall and remains 4-5 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference. Random Lake is 7-10.

The Rams had a chance to win at the end of regulation as Evan Rathke stole an inbounds pass right under Kewaskum's own basket and was fouled. Kewaskum called one timeout before each free throw, but Rathke made the second to tie the game at 56 and send it into overtime. Heintz would have liked the ball to be tossed deep - like the Indians did the play before for a layup - with one second left. No way Random Lake gets off much of a shot at

"I don't know why we throw the ball under the hoop. That could have lost us the game," he said.

The Rams came back from a 40-28 deficit and out-scored Kewaskum 28-16 in the final eight minutes to extend the game.

In overtime, Kewaskum fell behind 63-60 with less than 30 seconds left. Perkins drove in from the right, went airborne, got fouled and hit a short shot, igniting his bench and fans. He made the free throw to tie the game.

"Had to make the play, get us back into a tie game," he said.

"That was the play of the game," Heintz said. "He made a play and took it hard. Up to that point we were scrambling."

In double overtime, Random Lake's coach got a technical foul and Lucas Kopeschka hit both free throws to make it 66-63.

The Rams later closed to 68-67, but missed two free throws with a chance to tie or take the lead. Brad Boegel drew an offensive foul and Kyle Tessar hit one free throw with 31.2 seconds left to make it 69-67. Perkins later added a free throw and Tessar another as the Indians held on when the Rams' shooting went cold.

The Indians were happy to escape but know they must play better. Losing big leads has been a disturbing trend this season.

"Take care of the ball and make your free throws," Heintz said. "We lost guys on defense. Our help defense wasn't there."

"We get lazy and then they creep up and next thing you know it's a tie game or they're up. We've just got to get over that. I don't know what it is," said Hunter Flanders.

"Turnovers is the main problem for us. We've got to learn how to take care of the ball better," said Kopeschka.

"Got lazy on defense. We didn't play very good tonight," Perkins said.

Last Friday, the Indians got beat 59-40 at Plymouth, evening the season series at one game each. Perkins scored 13, Brett Nuernberg seven and Flanders five.

The Indians next host Waupun (5-5 EWC, 8-9) on Thursday and play at Kiel (8-2, 15-3) on Tuesday.
