Woman with local ties appearing on 'Survivor'

Andrea Boehlke on winter break 2009 turned in an audition tape to "Survivor" on a bit of a whim.

Her parents and her father's friend sent in tapes, too. She didn't think anything of it and didn't even think CBS watched all the tapes, especially hers, which included riding a horse and catching a pig.

"It turns out that they actually do look at the tapes and I got a call," she said Tuesday on a conference call with a CBS media relations coordinator.

Fast forward months later: After another audition tape - this time of herding cattle, climbing a silo and catching pigeons - and interviews, the Random Lake native and St. Lucas school alumna is on national television.

The 22nd season of "Survivor" started Wednesday night with "Survivor: Redemption Island."

Boehlke, 21 and a senior at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, said she went in prepared, both

physically and mentally.

Already a fan of the show, Boehlke re-watched episodes and went running, biking and swimming. She fished by herself without a pole and made sure she knew how to tie all the knots. She even used a fire pit in her family's backyard, one of many items on her list.

"It was a big chart and we put it in my room," she said. "I'm a nerd when it comes to studying for things. I'm such a perfectionist."

Boehlke grew up hunting, fishing and camping, including sleeping outside with her family without tents, like in the show - so she thinks she had a leg up on city slickers. But she could only do so much.

"Wisconsin is a lot different than Nicaragua but it helps. You can prepare a ton but once you get out there it's 'Survivor' and anything can happen," she said.

History was not on Boehlke's side. She noticed young girls were often voted off early so she felt she had something to prove. She was given

the nickname "Barbie" in high school and takes joy in proving people wrong. After all, Boehlke has shot seven deer.

The buzz about Boehlke being on the show spread quickly, though many people don't recognize her in public just yet.

A few days ago, she overheard two people in a coffee shop talking about the show. She stopped over and asked who they were rooting for. The pair said they heard someone from Wisconsin was on it. Boehlke informed the two that the person was her.

At a bar in Stevens Point she heard a guy asking if people had heard the "Survivor" girl was here.

"Oh really," Boehlke said. "Where is she?"

She eventually told him.

The outgoing, friendly and confident woman doesn't mind the extra attention, though it has been an adjustment.

"I do have a lot more people recognizing me or talking to me than I normally would, which I love," she said. "It's a little overwhelming. It's weird, too. It's something you're not ready for, that strangers know a lot about you."

Boehlke herself hasn't fully grasped that she is on a national TV show with millions of viewers.

"The whole thing is really surreal and hard to sink in," she said. "The other day I was thinking I was already there. I went through this. Everything is really hard to comprehend."

For those already heading to Facebook, hang on a few months. Boehlke can't accept friends until after the finale, which is tentatively slated for sometime in May.

That's going to be a big month as Boehlke is scheduled to graduate from college with a degree in theater. She is close to a second degree in communications and may go back to school and get it later, she said.

Boehlke wants to work in the entertainment business - either behind the scenes, in communications or in travel - but she said that's not why she went on the show. She went on "Survivor" because it was "such a fantastic opportunity," she got to live in the jungle and she could win \$1 million.

"I think it could open doors. I'm

School refinances debt, accepts retirements

The Kewaskum School Board on Monday approved the borrowing of \$236,000 for possible high school locker room remodeling and roof work at the middle school and Wayne Elementary.

The board also approved refinancing existing debt for a lower interest rate, from 4.5 to 2.91 percent, saving \$42,000.

District business manager Paul Reichert said he and buildings and grounds director Jim Palmer propose doing the roof and locker room work, but the School Board hasn't approved what to do with the money yet. If approved, work would be done over summer, Reichert said.

Reichert said the estimate on the work now is \$246,000 so \$10,000 would have to be used from the operating budget or fund balance to do the projects.

The district is slated to pay off the loan by March 2019. It locked in to an interest rate so the rate will not increase or decrease.

In other business, the board accepted the resignation of Superintendent Michael Krumm and the retirement of 33-year FFA teacher Dave Rizzardi. At last month's meeting the retirements of long-time educators Eric Christie and John Breese were accepted.

Rescue personnel team with snowmobile club in mock rescue

TOWN OF KEWASKUM – Two children laid motionless on the freezing cold ground, one with his leg stuck under the drag behind a snowmobile groomer, another near the front of the cab. A third, a bleeding teen who became confused from a head injury, wandered off into the darkness and collapsed.

This was a mock snowmobile-versus-groomer accident that drew the Kewaskum Fire Department and rescue unit last Thursday night to Kevin Thull's farm, most recently known for hosting Breakfast on the Farm. Sometimes, the accidents are real. That's why Thursday was so important.

The accident was a collaboration between the fire department and New Fane Kettle Riders Snowmobile Club. The department came to the club and asked for help, and the club instantly obliged.

"One thing we as a club learned is we're willing to help anybody out which is a good thing," said Rick Kreif, club director.

Kreif said each snowmobile club has two members are on a list given to every first responder in the county in case of help with a snowmobile accident. Thull is on the list for Washington County, Kreif for Sheboygan County.

Thull's farm was perfect since practices can't be held on state lands, and Thull isn't sure if county property can be used, either. He had enough land just off of the trail that runs along Highway 28, keeps the groomer in one of his sheds and has a big enough driveway for the ambulances and trucks so traffic control wouldn't be an issue.

"It was a good learning experience for both of us," said Kreif said.

"Not a problem. Glad to help any way I can. It just worked out great because we usually had the groomer here anyway," said Thull, club president. "Everybody said it went very

well. They know the limitations of their equipment now a little bit."

Kreif said one of those limitations was the fire department's six-wheeler. It got stuck in snow.

"We hauled all the blocks and air bags back. They realized their six-wheeler doesn't pull through everything," Kreif said. Most of the department was kept in the dark about the accident to simulate reality. Upon arrival at the farm, Kreif said a 6-year-old told the department a snowmobile accident happened and showed the general direction. Rescue personnel took snowmobiles to the scene, assessed the situation, got the necessary equipment and went to work, stabilizing the victims on gurneys and using air bags to lift the drag to release a boy's leg.

A trail of blood – ketchup – led to the wandering boy's location, at least a couple of hundred feet from the accident scene in pitch darkness.

Crews battled temperatures near zero as wind chill warnings had expired hours before. They kept some snowmobiles running to use their headlights to see what they were doing.

The accident only involved youth with a scared straight-like atmosphere, kind of a mini-

scale Every 15 Minutes program that recreates a drunken driving accident. The children involved were from firefighters' families.

"That's one thing we made sure – it was all kids involved with it, not adults," Kreif said.

"Maybe they'll tell their friends, and those people tell other people," Thull said.

Thull said conditions had to be right, namely having enough snow on the ground. The club was contacted Monday for the Thursday event, given the forecast.

"It's hard to imitate some things. You've got to have snow," Thull said. "This week maybe wouldn't have worked."

Ultimately, Thull said the fire department and the club "wanted to help community get pr in case a real live situation would arise."

Snowmobile accidents aren't necessarily the first thing people think of when it comes to fire and rescue, but in Wisconsin, it's a reality.

"That's like the dive team. That's another part of rescue, and the fire department and rescue squad are able to rescue things – no matter what the accident – they've seen it, they know what goes on," Thull said.

Family and friends of Kenneth and Jeannette Mueller are planning a spaghetti dinner benefit for the pair who lost their home, belongings and three family dogs in a blaze on Friday, January 7. The fire created a total loss for the Muellers.

Kenneth also suffered burns and smoke inhalation and was hospitalized for a few days. He has since been

released. The event will be held at Amerahn in Kewaskum on Sunday, February 20 from noon until 3 p.m. The dinner includes garlic bread, salad, dessert, milk and coffee. Adult tickets are \$8, children age eight and under are \$4.50. Tickets are available at Gateway Café and Amerahn, both in Kewaskum.

First of all, I am not a member of a collective bargaining unit nor have I been for twenty years. Governor Walker has made some proposals on his budget Repair Bill that are not all factual and have some omissions. According to the respected Washington Based Think Tank, a public employee makes an average of 6% less than a similar job in the private sector. If you factor in the 5.8% pension the total compensation package is about the same. Public employees have normally taken less pay raises in exchange for fringe benefits.

What I do see missing here is why when private businesses do work for the state they are not included in their workers taking a 5.8% wage deduction. I am talking about roads, building construction, and anything else that is done for the state. They are basically state employees as all the money comes from the state coffers. We all know the answer to that as it is as political as the ex-sheriff from Dodge Co being appointed to head the State Patrol.

As far as health insurance, it does seem unusually low but I do not know what wage concessions were made to get it that way. As for his ideas on Collective Bargaining, there is

no questions some things could be changed. Nevertheless, the Governor's ideas are nothing more than trying to throw every Collective Bargaining agreement in the garbage by heavy-handed methods. Parts of this might well be illegal.

Also, when the Governor makes statements like, "if the prison guards walk off the job, I will just bring in the National Guard: they are ludicrous and only add fuel to the fire. This nothing but a bull in the china shop approach.

Everyone knows that Wisconsin had budget problems that need to be addressed immediately. We have to look at the total picture of the state's finances and not just one segment. Unfortunately, until things improve, we will probably have to see a reduction of services using possibly more furlough days, reduced hours and layoffs.






KHS students earn Scholastic Art Awards

A Jaw-Dropping True Story Local Author Pennington to Present 'The Endurance' at Library

Join author Rochelle Pennington at the Campbell-sport Public Library on Monday, February 21, 2011 at 6:30 p.m. for a program on her title *The Endurance*. The book details the extraordinary events surrounding Sir Ernest Shackleton's Expedition which departed England aboard the sailing vessel *Endurance* in August 1914. The crew of twenty-eight sailors and scientists on board the ship set sail to conquer one of the few remaining explorative feats which had not yet been accomplished by others before them—a complete on-foot crossing of the Antarctic continent, end to end.

Before reaching land however, their ship became trapped in the rapidly forming ice 100 miles off the coast. The crew, stranded 11,000 miles from home, waited for the spring thaw through nine long months of blizzards, gales, and temperatures nearing 100 degrees below zero. The men then watched in horror as their ship succumbed to the pressure of the frozen ocean, breaking to rubble and sinking before the waters around it had a chance to melt.

In one of history's most daring and harrowing tales of adventure, the crew then attempted an escape across the most treacherous waters on the face of the globe in three lifeboats salvaged from their ship before it went under.

Nearly two years were spent on ice and ocean, and the epic journey was recognized as "the greatest survival story in human history." *Endurance* was more than the name of a ship; it was also the Shackleton family motto: "By endurance we conquer."

"Shackleton was a

leader among leaders," said Pennington. "He taught his men how to employ their thoughts to overcome every obstacle and to intentionally concentrate on victory. He refused to allow even the possibility of failure to enter his thinking. Success was the only option Shackleton would entertain, and if there wasn't a way, he would make one."

Pennington and her son traveled to Europe, specifically to the British Isles, to research the story. While in Edinburgh, Scotland they stayed in Shackleton's former home, which is now a bed-and-breakfast establishment. They conducted research at Dulwich College in London where the famed adventurer was educated. On permanent display there is one of the lifeboats used to escape Antarctica.

The Penningtons also visited the National Maritime Museum and the Royal Geographic Society, both in London, to view existing artifacts from the expedition. They completed their time in England at the Scott Polar Research Institute at Cambridge University where they examined the only surviving piece of *Endurance*, a spar. Captain Steven Bull, a master sailor who built an exact replica of the lifeboat used by Commander Shackleton on his extraordinary 800-mile trip through the Drake Passage, met with the Penningtons in London.

The *Endurance* book includes dozens of diary and journal entries penned by Shackleton and crewmembers who served on board during the two-year plight.

"The entries pay tribute to the unique and effective leadership style Sir Ernest

Shackleton used to safely deliver every one of his men from nearly two years of disaster and perils in the frozen world of Antarctica," said Pennington, adding: "Danger threatened their lives, their limbs, and their sanity—almost daily."

The hardcover book is complemented by thirty-five remarkable, century-old photographs documenting the hurdling of this cruel fate. Frank Hurley, a professional photographer on board *Endurance*, immortalized the events of the adventure which he said "were so extreme they would have strained credibility without the pictorial documentation."

Shackleton's death-defying voyage has inspired generations in every corner of the globe over the past century, and has provoked management studies in leadership at many corporations throughout America, as well as at Harvard Business School.

"The story lives on today as an extraordinary example of courage, determination, strength of heart, and perseverance against all odds," said Pennington, adding: "Shackleton's 'invincible optimism' is permanently bound to the success of the story. Through his example we are reminded that ordinary people, armed only with the simple power of attitude, can dive head-first into immense adversity and emerge victorious."

Following the program, Pennington will answer questions about her other books and the writing process.

Refreshments will be served. The program is free and open to the public.





averaging 184 pins a game, the boys qualified for the step ladder finals and ended up being the 6th team to qualify for State.


Joe Stoffel earned 1st team All Conference Honors and also qualified for the Singles Event at State.

25 Years Ago

Shortly before the fire, the Millers had purchased the furniture and undertaking business of Mrs. Clem Reinders, so they temporarily ran their business out of that establishment until the new furniture store on Fond du Lac Avenue was completed and in 1975 they opened a large new addition to that building. Joe attended mortuary school and received his license in 1938 and also worked for the family furniture business installing carpet and linoleum until his retirement in 1981. Fred, the youngest of the family, worked at the furniture store, served in the Army and when he returned from overseas, purchased his parents interests in the business becoming an active partner. He received his funeral director's license but sold his shares when he moved to California

where he eventually owned and operated two interior decorating stores. At Pat's request, Fred returned to Wisconsin and purchased an interest in Miller's Incorporated. Pat's son, Edward J. Miller, now serves as president of the furniture store, running the business with his wife Sherie, sisters Mary Ellen, Joan, Isabelle and Clare, and brother Ted, who is treasurer, and Pat's grandson, David.

The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were Craig Garbisch, Harry Roecker, Mike Berger, Andy Pesch, Norman Kufahl, Thomas Piwoni and Jim Hovland. Staff members present were Matt Heiser, Mark Groeschel, Richard Knoebel, Jerry Gilles, Chad Knobel, Stephanie Justmann and Attorney Kiefer. Members from the community and the news media were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office, and at the Municipal Building on January 7, 2011. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer, and the News Media.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Jim Hovland to approve the minutes from the December 6, 2010 meeting, second by Craig Garbisch. Voice vote, motion carried.

Motion by Norman Kufahl to suspend the rules and bring up item C under New Business: "Discussion and possible action on request by the Town of Kewaskum for easements along Badger Road and reimbursement of associated legal fees" second by Jim Hovland and carried by roll call vote. Garbisch-aye, Roecker-aye, Berger-aye, Pesch-aye, Kufahl-aye, Piwoni-aye, Hovland-aye (7-0-0).

Attorney Kiefer and Administra-

tor Heiser informed the Board on the history and recent development in pursuing the Badger Road easements pursuant to the Town of Kewaskum. The easements requested by the Town are for the storm sewer culvert under Badger Road west of Eagles Nest Drive, for a sanitary sewer main that extends under Badger Road at the intersection of Eagles Nest Drive and for the right-hand turn lane onto south-bound Highway 45. The Town of Kewaskum has also requested reimbursement of legal fees associated with these easements the total cost thus far is \$1,166. Village staff has attempted to obtain the requested easements. In return the Town has requested that language be included in the easement that would hold the Town harmless, repair the dip in the road by the sanitary sewer, provide some kind of warranty and pay \$30,000 for all three easements. 52 fish over 100 pounds speared in first three days of sturgeon season

OSHKOSH - Big fish and challenging travel conditions were the story during the first three days of the Lake Winnebago System sturgeon spearing seasons.

Through the end of spearing hours Monday, 881 fish system-wide had been harvested, with 52 of them, or 5.1 percent, weighing more than 100 pounds, according to Ron Bruch, Department of Natural Resources fisheries supervisor.

That includes the 185-pound, 80.2-inch female that Josh Genske of Sheboygan registered at the Calumet Harbor Station on Valentine's Day, and the 172.7-pound, 76.9-inch female registered by Jeffery Nozar of Oshkosh on opening day.

Those fish weigh in as the third and fifth largest sturgeon speared since DNR began keeping harvest records in 1941. Registration of all harvested fish began in 1955.

Seven of those top 10 fish have been speared in the last three years, Bruch says.

"The big fish we see now began growing into the 'big fish' category (100 pounds or more) just at the time when our new regulations were put in place to provide greater protection to them," Bruch says. "That's resulted in the impressive numbers of big fish in an expanded population overall of lake sturgeon we currently have in the Winnebago System."

Bruch says it's possible that the season could run the full 16 days allowed under law.

"Given the changing travel conditions on Lake Winnebago, it appears speared fish will have many more days, possibly a full 16 days this year, to add to the top 10 list of biggest fish."

A list of the top 10 largest fish can be found on the Lake Winnebago System Sturgeon Spearing Season page of the DNR website.

Travel will likely be difficult for speared

The deep snow and drifts speared encountered on opening day of the

seasons, Feb. 12, made it difficult to get around on the lake. That problem was compounded when warmer temperatures melted snow and made travel very sloppy. Windy conditions forecast for this week will push ice around, although colder temperatures forecast for the weekend may freeze up the slop and improve travel conditions by next week. "There's going to be a major adjustment for speared to contend with over the next few days," Bruch says.

Speared fish were closing in on the number of adult females that would trigger closure of the Upriver Lakes season. After Monday, there were 16 adult females left before hitting the trigger for the Upriver Lakes adult female harvest cap.

Lake Winnebago speared after Monday were about one-third of the way to hitting the trigger for adult females on the big lake.



KHS boys basketball team makes history with first ever victory over Waupun

Kewaskum's boys made a little basketball history last Thursday, albeit not without their patented late-game jitters enough to give the entire field house a heart condition.

Tied into Waupun at 51-51 headed into the fourth quarter, junior point guard Eric Perkins drained two of his game-high six three-pointers and drew the defense in for an easy assist to Brad Boegel inside on three straight possessions.

It was 61-54 with 3:20 to play. If the Indians could run enough clock, the game would be over.

But this is Kewaskum, and fans need to get their money's worth. Waupun didn't exactly have any interest in folding, either.

The Warriors' press turned up the heat and the Indians, who are not exactly used to holding small leads against good teams of late - or any lead for that matter - started to turn the ball over and took an open three-pointer and missed when they could have run clock.

Waupun took advantage but missed some key free throws and closed to 64-62 with 41.4 seconds left.

When the Indians did hang on to the ball and got fouled, they uncharacteristically

struggled at the line, which they have used as a strength all season.

Waupun missed two free throws with 21.4 seconds to play, and Boegel hit one of two to make it 65-62 with 18.6 seconds left.

A Warrior three-pointer then hit the rim, bounced up to the backboard, came down and hit the rim twice and bounced away. The ball moved in slow motion as both benches and fans of both teams held their collective breaths and whatever they could dig their fingernails into.

Kewaskum got the rebound and senior Lucas Kopeschka hit one of two free throws with 6.5 seconds left to make the final tally, 66-62.

"Great win. One of the best games we played all year. They played pretty well, too. They were tough to stop," said Coach Quinn Heintz. "We were able to get enough stops to win the game. Back and forth pretty much the whole game."

It's the first time in school history the Indians beat Waupun. Heintz thinks Kewaskum is 1-14 against the Warriors. It helped that Waupun's leading scorer, Ryan Gerritson, didn't play.

"It feels good. It will go down in history in Kewaskum. It feels good to be the first team," Boegel said.

Perkins scored a game-

high 25 points, including his six bombs. Boegel scored 19. Nobody would have figured Perkins would have lit up the gym in pre-game.

"I was missing my shots in warm-ups. Just came out and still played good in the game," he said. "Just got open shots and I was takin' 'em and they were falling for me tonight."

Heintz remains concerned about closing out games. The Indians blew a 40-28 lead in its game before on Feb. 5 against Random Lake at the Bradley Center and needed double overtime to win. Against Waupun, Kewaskum broke the press with relative ease most of the game and got points off of it, until crunch time.

"Pressure is everything you put on yourself because nobody else is pressuring you ... it becomes mental after a while. That's something we need to get cleaned up here still," he said.

Much of it comes from experience. Kewaskum hasn't had a winning season in years

and is not known as a basketball powerhouse.

"In my opinion that's definitely it. As you're growing, it's not being used to those situations. And you panic because you're in a situation that's not familiar to you," Heintz said.

His team is seemingly trying to solve that all in one season.

"Gettin' used to them now. We've had a lot of them this year," he said.

When the pressure comes, Perkins is the guy who wants the ball and the pressure shots, though the clutch shooter missed a few free throws against Waupun.

"I just think of myself as the leader of the team and it's what I've got to do to keep us in the lead and keep us in the games," he said.

"Perkins was hitting shots from everywhere tonight. Other guys stepped up and hit shots," Heintz said.

On Kopeschka's late three-point attempt, Heintz would have rather seen a large amount of passing.

"It's wide open, normally in the flow of the game it's a good shot. But when you're in the last two minutes you've got to make better decisions and realize the clock is more important than the score," he said.

The team knows closing out games has been an issue and hopes to fix it by playoff time.

"We're a young team. We've got to learn how to close these games out right now so next year we can win games by a larger margin," Perkins said. "Guys are making too quick of decisions."

"I just think we need to

work on it more and go through more real-life scenarios during more practice more fast-paced. We work on it in practice, it's just not as fast as we need to," Boegel said. "We seem to crumble under pressure when we inbound so we've just got to work on passing the ball, confidence."

He hopes this gets the Indians over its midseason slump when they lost six of seven from Jan. 6 to Feb. 4.

"We've been in a slump in the middle of the season. It's always good to pick it up towards the end of the season when you're going into the playoffs. You want to be strong going into the playoffs because it's all about making a run," he said.

On Tuesday, the Indians lost at Kiel, 66-54, as the Raiders completed the season sweep.

Kewaskum is now 10-9 overall, 5-6 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and in third place. Two Rivers leads the conference at 11-1 and Kiel is right behind at 10-2.

Kewaskum next hosts Sheboygan Falls (3-8 EWC, 9-9 overall) on Saturday night in a blizzard makeup game.



CAMPBELLSPORT Wrestling's "second season" started last Saturday and from all indications of what transpired at the Division 2 Campbellsport regional, Kewaskum is in for plenty of excitement in the upcoming weeks.

With Jared Koffke out of action with an elbow injury and the team still forfeiting at 112 pounds, Kewaskum wasn't able to win the team title. That honor went to Campbellsport, which piled up 266.5 points.

Still the Indians, who finished second with 242.5, advanced the most athletes, nine, including five champions — Brett Scoles at 125, Joey Seitz at 140, Rob Maertz at 152, Brad

Bentz at 160 and Bo Seibel at 189, along with runner-ups Logan Dreher (119), Austin Goeden (135), Joey Wollner (145) and Cole Roberts (215).

KHS coach Dennis Aupperle was thrilled to have nine qualify for the sectional (at Milwaukee Lutheran). "The kids we got through are all quality kids," he said, indicating they all have a chance to go even farther.

Defending state qualifiers Scoles and Seibel breezed through the competition, while a third 2010 qualifier, Rob Maertz, posted another exciting win over Payden Salm of Campbellsport, who also wrestled in state a year ago.

Seibel pinned Nate Olson of Campbellsport in the semi-finals and then won a comfort-

able 9-1 decision over David Starkey of St. John's/Northwestern Military Academy in the finals.

The lone point he gave up came via a stalling call, and anyone who has watched Seibel over the years, knows it is rare he is not working hard for a pin.

With these two wins, Seibel's record soared to an impressive 34-1.

Scoles, who normally wins on takedowns and escapes, had two of the teams 11 pins on the day, putting away Forest Hanold of St. John's in 2:59, then pinning Nik Seilenbinder of Campbellsport in 3:29.

Scoles is now sporting a 31-5 mark for the year, the same record as Maertz, who pinned Austin Slack of Milwaukee Lu-

theran in 4:41 before taking on Salm for the third time this season.

Maertz used a beautiful double leg takedown for a 2-0 lead he maintained until Salm escaped. In the second, Salm gained another escape to tie the score at 2-all, then Maertz got away for a point and posted another takedown try after Salm's attempt backfired.

Now the score was now 5-2 in Maertz's favor, but Salm narrowed the gap to 5-4 with a reversal.

After missing several meets because of an athletic code violation, Brad Bentz returned and looked sharp in his two matches, which included a :52 pin against Seth Schroeder of Wisconsin Lutheran and a 9-2 win over Jordan Newman of St. John's, who came in with a record of 23-4.

The non-qualifiers fared as follows: 103 — Steven Bohn (9-15 overall) went 1-2 and finished third; 130 — Cody Muckerheide (5-8) 2-2, 3rd; 171 — Derek Aupperle (10-19), 0-2, 4th; 285 — Brandon Ehn (14-17), 1-2, 3rd.

Campbellsport had eight wrestlers advance, led by sophomore Ryan Costello, who improved to 35-0. He was the only unbeaten wrestler in the tournament.

There will be eight wrestlers at each weight class in Saturday's sectional at Milwaukee Lutheran, with the top three earning berths in the state competition.
