

State test scores drop for District students, trends show pattern of decline

Kewaskum Superintendent Michael Krumm isn't concerned about some lower-than-normal test scores on last fall's Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Exam (WKCE).

One notable score includes 10th grade reading, with sophomores slipping to 68 percent proficient or advanced from 89 percent in eighth grade. Fifty-three of Kewaskum's 166 sophomores were below proficient. The state average for 10th grade is 74 percent.

"All 10th-grade state averages dropped. We're not sure exactly why that particular score is the way it is," said Krumm.

Krumm said 10th grade scores could be different because new students, like those from K-8 private schools, come to Kewaskum High

School.

In math, the class of 2016 (seventh-graders) went from 92 percent proficient/advanced in seventh grade to 82 percent in eighth grade, below the state average of 86. Test scores for that class had been 90 percent and above since fourth grade, after 79 percent in third grade.

All other scores were above the state average but some still slid.

In reading, the class of 2017's (sixth-graders) score dropped from 90 percent in sixth grade to 81 percent proficient/advanced. Those students' scores vary wildly the past five years. Students went from 76 percent in third grade to 79 percent in fourth to 92 percent in fifth. The score fell to 90 percent in sixth grade before this year. The class of 2018 (fifth-grade) shows consistent improvement. Reading scores in third grade were 82 percent,

in fourth grade 88 and in fifth grade 92. Math scores were 84, 87 and 89 percent, respectively.

Krumm said one or two students could make the difference in a few percentage points in the scores. He said some students may be proficient/advanced one day and not the next.

"There's quite a bit of variability in these things," he said.

He said the scores won't change what the district has been doing, including its focus on regular independent reading and writing.

"We're just keeping on things that we've been keeping working on," he said.

While he said districts always like to see better scores, they are just one piece of the assessment puzzle.

"It's not to be overemphasized, either," Krumm said.

County's worst road to receive makeover

The worst road in the county is getting a makeover.

Washington County's Transportation Committee on Tuesday approved a bid to reconstruct Highway H to Highway 144 to Highway XX in the Town of Farmington.

Wondra Construction of Iron Ridge won the project over eight other bidders. Wondra's project cost of \$2,999,440.081 was the lowest bid, said committee member Brian Bausch. Bids went up to \$3.9 million, Bausch said.

Work is slated to start in June and the project is expected to be done by winter. The project reconstructs the entire road and includes precast concrete box culverts at six locations.

Bausch said the speed limit has been posted at a 45 mph advisory the last two years because the road is so rough. He said he received complaints of drivers' front ends being knocked out of alignment due to the road.

"Right now it's the worst highway in county," said Bausch. "It's way past due and I feel very excited we're going to get it done."


The project was originally slated to start in May but replacing wetlands held up the start date. The State Department of Natural Resources requires every one acre of wetlands affected be replaced with 1.5 acres somewhere else. Bausch said the committee could have found wetlands up north but wanted to find land within Farmington in the same watershed.

"We want to make sure we absorb the water here in Farmington," he said.

Water from Farmington eventually flows to the Milwaukee River in Saukville, he said.

A public meeting notifying area residents of the project's details has yet to be scheduled.



Newcomers unseat incumbent in Board of Education race

Tim Ramthun ran away with the Kewaskum School Board race, and two fellow newcomers will be joining him on the board.

Incumbent James Leister came in fourth and out of the running in the six-person race.

Ramthun unofficially received 3,724 votes. Troy Hanson was a distant second with 2,460, and Sue Miller third with 2,427. Those three earn seats on the board.

Leister had 2,400 votes, Andrew Kuehl 2,126 and Jessica Baker 1,459.

Write-in votes totaled 392 but it was yet unknown how many votes outgoing School Board president John Kenworthy received. Kenworthy didn't file papers to run again but a late write-in campaign was started that

included a Facebook page with 25 likes as of Tuesday night.

Ramthun, 54, is a lifelong resident of the district who is married with two adult children. His first of four grandchildren enter the district this fall.

Ramthun is a business management technology consultant. He has no political experience and got into the race because of the Indian in the gym was painted over last fall. He said the issue revealed a "dysfunctional situation" between the board and administration. He said his "robust experience in management and oversight" could help fix it.

Hanson, 40, has lived in the district 11 years. He is married with four children, three in the district.

Hanson is a certified public accountant with no political experience. Since he has children in the district he

said he wants to make sure decisions made ensure quality education. He said he brings a level of expertise to "tricky finances." He said he wants to help strike a balance between overspending and spending so little it hurts education.


Miller, 36, has lived in the district for five years. She is married with two children in the district.

Miller is a regional branch manager of a credit union and said her financial background can help current and future financial challenges. She said she is passionate about students being taught to manage their finances.

Leister has served on the board for three years and has served on four different board committees the past seven years.

Pesch said the next priority for the village is to wait and see.


"Really the next priority is see what happens in Madison right now. Definitely going to be tight in the budget," he said. "I hope we can just continue working together and keep things going."





Mike Otten and Scott Wollner are the Town of Kewaskum's new supervisors after beating two other challengers Tuesday night.

Otten unofficially received 246 votes and Wollner 245. William Butzlaff received 176 and Glenn Goodearle 85.

Otten and Wollner replace supervisor Daniel Schmidt, who ran unopposed for chairman, and supervisor Allen Hron, who did not seek re-election. Chairman Ellis Kahn did not run for re-election.

Otten, 42, is co-owner of West Bend Elevator. He said he wants to maintain the town's fiscal responsibility,

improve communication with its state representative and help the town maintain its independence from being taken over by the county or state.

Wollner, 46, owns an excavating and plumbing company. He said he wants to help make sure the town watches what it spends and maintains good roads.

The two differ on ideas if the state cuts recycling money, per Gov. Scott Walker's budget proposal.

Otten said he is open to a user fee and looking into a bid from a waste management service.

Wollner said he doesn't want to implement a fee and would look into outsourcing the work.





The film also includes footage of police interrogations involving allegations of the murders of unarmed Iraqis as well as how the servicemen were forever changed by the war.





They are: Retired Chief Augie Bilgo, 35 years; Raynor Heriges 29 years; Clayton Stautz, 26 years, and Hugo Straub, 21 years. Together they total 111 years with the department.





From the Heart...USSA helps disabled and sick children, wounded veterans

When it's impossible to do what you would like to for children and their families with life threatening illnesses, or for disabled veterans, many people just do what they can. That's the essence of these many volunteers who make up the United Special Sportsman Alliance, most recently this past weekend to coordinate a special turkey hunt near Wausau. They help young people in need and their families. They help disabled vets. They help from the heart. Until it's time to do it all again.

The United Special Sportsman Alliance is a "dream wish granting charity" that specializes in sending critically ill and disabled youth and disabled veterans on their outdoor adventure of their dreams. Families, according to the organization's website, "are whisked away from the mundane world of hospitals and high medical bills to places of peace to focus on the quality of life, family ties and the wonders of our natural world."

"I didn't know anything about USSA until I drew my first bear tag in 2004," said John Haydock, Wisconsin State representative for the nationwide organization launched from Pittsville Wisconsin in 2000 by founder Brigid O'Donoghue. "I met a 15 year old girl with cystic fibrosis who had her tag donated through the USSA to hunt too. She changed my life. I told my wife when I got home it was going to change the way I lived. It did. I became more and more involved in USSA as time went on. Susan had two brothers, both with cystic fibrosis too. She lived long enough to see both of her brothers fill their bear tags before she died."

Haydock guided his first trophy deer hunt for the USSA in northern Illinois in 2006. In January 2007, seeking to establish a Wisconsin based USSA turkey hunt, Haydock was having a casual conversation with a casual acquaintance and neighbor, Larry Trelka in a Junction City gas station. Although the conversation had nothing to do with USSA, Trelka, at the time battling cancer, mentioned that he hoped to utilize his personal property nick-named the Pumpkin Patch in some way to help disabled kids.

"I said, 'Larry, that's what I do,' Haydock said. "The Lord put us together. It was divine intervention"

The Wisconsin USSA

turkey hunt was launched in 2007 from the Pumpkin Patch with two youths and their families participating. Eight youths or wounded veterans participated the second year, 17 the third, and 25 or the maximum that the facilities can provide for due to space restrictions, the last two years. The 2011 hunt, which ran April 2nd and April 3rd, included 35,000 acres of public property and 15,000 acre of private land donated for use by property owners. Hunters (including four disabled veterans and 21 critically ill children) and their families were given gas cards for travel expenses, provided lodging at a Motel, provided meals, and partnered with veteran turkey hunters who served as guides and increased the odds of filling tags with Toms or Jakes.

First, hunters gathered at the Pumpkin Patch in the township of Eau Claire April 1st to meet their mentors, and sight-in shotguns. They also participated in hunter's education curriculum presented by trained instructors and a game warden, and learned about the turkey as a big game bird including eating habits, calling, identifying gobblers from hens, and calling techniques.

This reporter had the privilege of joining mentor Steve Henske of Stevens Point, hunter Matthew Johns of Minnesota, 11, his father, Doug Johns and video expert Mike Mancl, who would film our hunt. Doug and Jodie Johns, Doug Johns said, had lost an older son, Nathaniel, two years before. They are strong as a family but in their great loss, extremely appreciative of the people of and support provided by the USSA.

The alarm clock roused us at 4:45 am and we were on the farmer's field set up in twin blinds 30 minutes before first light. The blinds would allow Henske and the Johns boys safe hunting and mentoring from one tent while Mancl and I would work video and still cameras from the other. Although Doug and Matthew had never before hunted, their physical toughness in cold weather was amazingly "veteran" like, with Matthew once even electing to forfeit a USSA meal to extend his vigil into a fifth and sixth hour hoping for a close encounter with a Tom.

Pre-light gobbling from the roost was non-stop as the Toms and hens awakened to

another day. Periodically, hens or Gobblers made appearances on our field, mostly beckoned by Mancl's superb calling. With the exception of a gobbling Tom that came within 50 yards of us for 45 minutes on day two, none of the legal targets came within range. Just flirting from a distance with the gobblers though, was plenty to keep Matthew totally involved. His father, a true class act from the moment of our introduction, expressed gratitude to the USSA and all the volunteers who made the trip possible for his family.

"I think it's great...all the things that USSA does for the kids," he said. "They make it very easy and tailor everything to kids even if they're in wheelchairs. Everyone is friendly. It's nice to have things that can take us away from some of the stressors. Matthew is very excited about it. Losing Nathaniel has made us evaluate some of our priorities. Life is really short. These people help."

When your time is spent with such good people, even a weekend hunt can be too short too. We said goodbye to Matthew and Doug too soon. Although we weren't fortunate enough to fill a tag, 11 turkeys, including six Toms and one rare bearded hen, were harvested. In the end though, with the USSA it's all about being together, and making things perhaps, a little easier for a little while.

"I had wanted to put together a hunt like this for disabled kids and veterans for several years," said Larry Trelka, who owns the Pumpkin Patch on 40 acres of Junction City property. "I was actually having health problems myself when I bumped into Big John at the gas station and just mentioned what I was thinking. I really didn't know him at all. The words just came out. For some reason the good Lord just made it happen. In my eyes the whole thing is community. We wouldn't be here if it wasn't for friends and family. It's one of the things in life that you just can't explain. Look at the hunters, look at the guides, look at all the volunteers. If we need something, the word somehow gets out that we need it...and somehow...we get it."

USSA...Helping People and their Families

According to Doug Johns, Nathaniel and Matthew Johns were born in Washington State. Nathaniel, was born in May 1997. He developed newborn jaundice, which is very common, but he was not treated appropriately, resulting in a preventable medical injury. He suffered permanent brain damage and had a condition called kernicterus. Nathaniel was very bright cognitively, but severely disabled physically.

"When Nathaniel was almost two, and shortly after we were pregnant with Matt, doctors discovered he was "spilling protein," indicative of a kidney disorder called nephrotic syndrome, which eventually requires kidney transplant," Doug said. "Children with this condition eventually stop growing because their kidneys spill and their bodies do not retain necessary proteins. Initially it was thought Nathaniel's kidney problem was a symptom of kernicterus. However, kidney specialists advised that it was more likely genetic, and that if we had another male child there was a one in four chance he too would have nephrotic syndrome."

"Matthew was born in October 1999 with nephrotic syndrome. Because we now had two boys needing transplant we did some research and discovered that the University of Minnesota was the leading pediatric transplant center in the world, having pioneered the procedure. So in March 2000, we moved to the Twin Cities, not knowing a soul out here. Nathaniel was transplanted in November 2001, receiving one of my kidneys. Shortly thereafter, Matt had open heart surgery in April 2002 to correct a sub-aortic stenosis. Both boys remained very healthy until Matt required a kidney transplant in April 2006, receiving one of my wife's kidneys. Both transplant surgeries were and have been tremendously successful, and both boys remained very healthy. However, after his best Midwest winter ever health-wise, Nathaniel developed pneumonia in April 2009 that he never recovered from, passing in May 2009."

"This was a tremendous loss, as we all miss him terribly. Going forward, my wife and I want to work toward helping people and/or families with special needs to negotiate the complex medical world they are thrown into. There is no playbook, and we hope our experience can benefit others."

Spring turkey season opens April 13

The April 13 opening of the 2011 spring wild turkey hunting season is just around the corner, and state wildlife officials say hunters can look forward to a good spring hunt. They are also encouraging experienced hunters to consider taking a youth out during the April 9 and 10 statewide spring turkey youth hunt.

More than 225,700 permits were made available for this spring's hunt, the same number of permits offered for the 2010 spring season. More than 145,500 of those permits were issued in the preference drawing for the spring 2011 season, leaving 80,178 tags available for sale. Remaining permits went on sale March 21. As of April 5, there were still permits available for three zones in later hunting periods. Remaining permits can be purchased until they are sold out or the season ends. Visit the spring turkey leftover permit availability page for up-to-date information.

"From the information gathered during annual surveys, the wild turkey population continues to show relatively good, healthy numbers," says Scott Walter, Department of Natural Resources upland wildlife ecologist. "The results of the 2010 10-week brood survey were mixed, indicating a downturn in the number of turkey broods observed, while brood size increased slightly from 2009 levels. Overall, turkey brood production appears to have leveled

off somewhat but remains slightly below the statewide long-term goal."

Hunters harvested 47,722 turkeys in 2010, a 9 percent decrease from the near-record harvest of 52,581 birds in 2009. Spring success rates over the past few years have been in the 22 to 25 percent range.

The 2011 spring turkey season starts on April 13 and consists of 6 five-day time periods that end on May 22. Find out more on the wild turkey page of the DNR website.

Turkey Youth Hunt set for April 9 and 10

The 2011 Spring Turkey Youth Hunt will occur statewide on April 9 and 10. The two-day spring youth hunt, successfully initiated in 2007, occurs each year during the weekend preceding the opening of the regular spring turkey season. The youth hunt allows close one-on-one mentoring of future hunters in a relaxed atmosphere without competition for hunting spots from regular season hunters.

Thanks to the Mentored Hunting Program that took effect starting with the 2009 fall season, youth hunters aged 10 and 11, in addition to youth ages 12 through 15, may now also participate in the 2011 youth turkey hunt.

Under the Mentored Hunting Program, youth ages 10 through 15 may hunt during the two-day youth turkey hunt without first having completed hunter education, so long as they do so with a

qualified adult mentor and follow the rules of the program. Youth ages 12-15 who have already completed hunter education may hunt during the youth hunt while accompanied by an adult 18 years of age or older. Each youth must have a valid spring 2011 turkey harvest permit, license, and stamp.

Youth are allowed to hunt on April 9 and 10 in the turkey management zone for which their permit is valid, regardless of the time period their permit is issued for, and may harvest only one male or bearded turkey during the two-day hunt. A youth who does not successfully harvest a turkey during the two-day youth hunt may use the unfilled permit during the time period and in the zone for which the permit was issued. There is no special application procedure for the youth hunt, but young hunters must either be issued a tag through the drawing or purchase a leftover tag. All other spring turkey hunting regulations apply.


