

KHS students get history lesson from seniors School Board reorganizes

Living history came to the Kewaskum High School library last week. It sat across from students face to face, telling them tales textbooks wouldn't and opening their eyes to a local past many never knew existed.

That history is now permanent in the form of students' reports and in recordings sent to the Wisconsin Historical Society. It's a new project social studies teacher Jeffrey Steers embraced for his American history students to help preserve local history and connect the past to the future.

High school librarian Jan Donahou said she had no problem helping round up 28 local senior citizens to tell the real stories of Kewaskum's past.

"They were so excited about coming," she said. She instantly saw the value for students.

"I think it connects them with a part of their heritage that they really don't have a concept of," she said. "It roots them."

Isabelle Muckerheide, 93, brought a folder packed with newspaper clippings, photos and some of her poems. She spread them out across an entire table as props to help describe the "early days."

"I said milk was 7 cents a quart at

the time, 28 cents a gallon," she said.

Kewaskum's first village administrator, Daniel Schmidt, hoped the experience sparked interest in the Kewaskum Historical Society. His interviewers asked about the impact of the Vietnam War on the area.

Schmidt spent seven months in Vietnam, his plane landing hours before the first Tet Offensive. He took photos and put together 100 slides of his experience but never once looked at them. He did open his memory for students, however.

"They probably know more than I ever told my kids," he said.

Longtime Regal Ware employee Kim Peterson told his students Ted Pinchard and Leah Rodenkirch how Regal Ware and the dairy industry brought people to Kewaskum. Those jobs were appealing for veterans returning from World War II.

"It made the town thrive," said Pinchard. "It was great to see how Regal Ware shaped the community."

Shannon Miller and Mike Holt got to see who shaped it close up and personal. They interviewed James D. Reigle, son of the founder of Regal Ware, along with his former secretary, Darlene Pesch.

"It's a lot more interesting learning from people who were actually there," Holt said.

Miller said she likes that it was

Kewaskum and not the United States, Wisconsin or Milwaukee.

"It's really nice to learn about your town," she said.

The pair was surprised to hear how Regal Ware changed with the times, going from 1,800 employees to 400, and that the company looks for places to sell its cookware other than Wal-Mart, which sells cheaper brands.

Reigle called the two "good listeners" as he was leaving. "Hope you get an A," he said.

Peterson said some of the learning was mutual. He got an education on today's educational system, and a reminder of his career statistic. He said he worked for Regal Ware for 33 years. Rodenkirch quietly muttered "34."

"She's right," Peterson said with a laugh.

The students, however, received the brunt of the education.

"It's great to learn how past generations were," Rodenkirch said. "Now you know the roots of Kewaskum."

"It was the kind of stuff you don't learn in the textbook. You can't find this stuff on the Internet," Pinchard said. "I just thought it was a great experience."

"I do, too," said Peterson. "I'll put 100 percent on that one."

New leadership was elected on the Kewaskum School Board, but old names still apply.

Three new board members were elected last month, but all four officers chosen on Monday were incumbents.

Bruce Braidigan was elected president on a 5-2 vote over new board member Tim Ramthun. Bill Kesting was also nominated but didn't receive a vote.

Kesting was unanimously chosen as vice president, and Mary Miller was again chosen as clerk.

Steve Jensen was again elected as treasurer on a 5-2 vote over new board member Troy Hanson.

School Board vice president Bill Kesting moved for the board to approve the working budget Monday night, but withdrew his motion after learning the Finance Committee hadn't yet had a crack at it.

"There's been no discussion by the Finance Committee at all," said Finance Committee Chairman Steve Jensen.

There isn't much of a Finance Committee right now, either. Three of the five members need to be replaced as Jim Leister lost the School Board election, John Kenworthy didn't run for re-election and Janet Hubbell resigned.

The budget must be approved in June.

District business manager Paul Reichert said questions remain about the budget as the Budget Repair Bill is slated to be taken up by the State Supreme Court on June 6 and state's biennial budget that will determine aid to school districts is still in the Joint Finance Committee.

Should the Budget Repair Bill remain law, Reichert said its impact would make up for the estimated loss in state aid.

The estimated 2011-12 revenue limit is \$1.17 million less than this year's limit, down from \$19.7 million to \$18.6. In addition, the district was

estimating about a \$500,000 shortfall, meaning the district had to make up closer to \$1.6 million.

Gov. Scott Walker's budget calls for a 5.5 percent reduction in per-student spending, moving Kewaskum's from \$9,749 to \$9,213.

But with the Budget Repair Bill requiring teachers to contribute more to their pension and

health care plans, the district's ability to drop the expensive Wisconsin Education Association Trust and offer cheaper coverage, along with some attrition, Reichert said the district should be able to balance its budget and possibly lower local taxes.

KYSO to provide youth recreational soccer here

Parents in the Kewaskum School District now have a local option for getting their children involved in youth recreational soccer. Kewaskum Youth Soccer Organization (KYSO) will hold a registration Saturday and their first ever Soccerfest in June.

After the need presented itself more than five years ago a group of parents and soccer aficionados began the tedious task of forming the KYSO. The group received help from the Kewaskum Athletic Association and this year, the group became official, aligning itself with the Kettle Moraine Soccer League (KMSL) based in Hartford. They currently are awaiting official non-profit status from the Federal

Government.

The KMSL is made up of players from West Bend, Jackson, Erin, Hartford, Hustisford, Slinger and Richfield. Kewaskum is their newest affiliate. KYSO is targeting boys and girls ages 6-13, as of August 1, 2011 for play in U5-U14.

Games will be played at Kiwanis Park. League play takes place in fall and spring.

On Saturday, the group will hold registration for the fall 2011/spring 2012 season. Registration will take place at Kewaskum Middle School from 9 a.m. until noon.

A second opportunity for registration will take place at the group's first annual Soccerfest at Kewaskum High

School on Saturday, June 25 from 11 a.m. until 5 p.m. That event will feature skill sessions, skill competitions, face painting, entertainment and an alumni game at 3:30 p.m. Sign up for summer clinics will also take place at that time.

A birth certificate is required at the time of registration.

The registration fee is \$50 for both the fall and spring sessions. Those wishing to sign up for just one session are able to but the price is the same.

Body found in Riverhill park

KEWASKUM- Kewaskum Police are investigating a body discovered in Riverhill Park, Sunday, May 8. Authorities believe the death may have been a suicide.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel stated, "At approximately 7:55 a.m. on Sunday, a jogger running through Riverhill Park discovered the body of a white

male under the trestle on the south end of the park. The body found was that of a 22-year-old Kewaskum man.

An autopsy was performed on Monday results have not been released.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Under normal circumstances, this newspaper does not report suicides. Because this happened in a public place and the suicide has not been confirmed we are reporting on the incident.

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To the Editor:

I write this letter in response to the many questions I have received since the April 5 election. Nearly all who have approached me have asked, "What happened?"

I share with them information that has been brought to my attention. On April 1st, four days before the election, a union employee from the Kewaskum Middle School filed the candidate-required Government Accountability Board (GAB-1) paperwork directly in Madison. Talking to the write-in candidate, I found out that he had nothing to do with the mailings

with his name on it. He also told me that he would not take the position.

When the district's support staff (KAP) and teachers (KEA) got together and decided to support a candidate, they chose Ms. Sue Miller. I do not have a problem with this. However, I disagree with having teachers from our middle school, on our time, calling local business' to ask for their support of Sue Miller. When the school was notified of this, they said they would look into it. I have heard of nothing being done.

I would also like to share with you the fact that three active board members campaigned for Sue Miller. One gentleman was caught stuffing mailboxes with fliers for Sue Miller. When the Farmington resident notified the Postmas-

ter of this illegal procedure, the Postmaster told her that she would take care of it.

In closing, I would like to share how our school board looks to me. One gentleman is retired from the Milwaukee Fire Department Union. Another has a wife who is a teacher. The third gentleman's wife is a retired teacher from our district. (Both are on the district's insurance). The fourth member's husband is retired from our district and still gets paid for substituting in our district. One of the new board members is supported by the district's support staff (KAP) and the teacher's (KEA) union.

The other two gentlemen come from the private sector and both have a business background. Speaking now as a taxpayer, in a year with con-

tract negotiations and a Superintendent to be chosen by the board, I am curious to see how fair-minded the board will be when it looks like a 5-2 vote for

all district matters.

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
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



WEST BEND- The metallic-painted wording on the wall above West Bend physician Dr. Michael Mangold's desk, a quotation by the great physician, Hippocrates, speaks volumes about Mangold's approach to healthcare -- "Wherever the art of medicine is loved, there is also a love of humanity."

A Barrington, Ill. native, Dr. Mangold, a general practitioner and former emergency-medicine physician, and his wife Angie, B.S.N., clinic administrator at the Mangold Center, believe that every human being is sacred. They treat their patients accordingly.

This is apparent upon observing the unique, welcoming setting at their Mangold Center for Family Health and Wellness, which opened two years ago at 120 N. Main St., Suite 120. "Experience the Excellence" is the Center's slogan.

Aretha, a medical assistant student, completing an externship at the clinic, greets patients warmly. She offers them their choice of beverages -- coffee, herbal tea or hot cocoa -- served in China cups.

Patients are allotted up to one hour with Dr. Mangold on their first visit. Rather than wearing paper gowns for their exams, they are presented with plush spa robes. "The robes open in the front," Mangold said, smiling.

You won't find paper liners on the examining tables either, but linens instead. Even the lighting in the patient rooms, provided by home-like lamps, is subdued, when brighter lighting is not required.

The walls of the Center are reserved for artists with special needs to display their works. Currently, the walls are adorned with the breathtaking works of Kewaskum artist Christopher Schoofs, who is legally blind, due to a condition

known as retinitis pigmentosa.

Mangold Center offers both primary care and cardiology services, provided by Dr. Burton Friedman, a cardiologist, with more than 30 years experience. Friedman is acclaimed for helping patients understand their health and how to improve their well-being.

A massage therapist is also available for patients who desire this service.

After completing his training, Mangold had 15 years of experience in emergency medicine, where he cared for patients of all ages in critical situations. Many of those years were spent at Hartford Memorial Hospital in Hartford.

For the three years prior to opening the Mangold Center, he filled in for other family practitioners. He enjoys becoming acquainted with his patients as both a primary-care physician and an expert on the health issues associated with Down syndrome.

His son Jon, 10, has Down syndrome, and Dr. Mangold has been actively researching how to increase the quality of life and address the many medical and psychosocial needs of those with Down syndrome, since Jon's birth. Special hours are offered for patients with Down syndrome from 1-8 p.m., on the second and fourth Wednesdays of the month, or at other times, by appointment.

In addition, "We are in the planning stages to also hold special hours for those with autism and for those in need of weight-loss services," Mangold noted.

His practice is an independent one. "We accept all types of insurance," he said. "The advantage to this system is that patients can be referred to specialists who are the best for their specific needs."

When Dr. Mangold's patients require hospitalization, Mangold stays

abreast of their care, via fax and frequent reports.

Another service the couple provides is sponsoring events at the Center, which are free of charge, for the public. "We have had personal trainers, a neurodevelopmentalist, a music therapist, art therapist, caregivers who provide respite care, and speakers on domestic violence, healthy eating, and others," Angie explained.

The Mangolds have a passion for mission work, which they have done in the past both in inner cities and in Mexico. Another philanthropic endeavor of theirs is to award an annual scholarship, in the name of Mangold's parents -- the Norbert and Esther Mangold Scholarship -- to a junior or senior at Northern University in DeKalb, Ill., who has a 3.5 or higher grade-point average and who is majoring in biological sciences.

Mangold aspired to become a physician since he was a child. "I used to carry a little medical bag," he recalled. "I always wanted to be doctor. I like to serve others."

And since she was 14, Angie's desire was to become a nurse. At that age, "I saw a cover of a Northwestern Lutheran Magazine," she recalled. "It had a photo of a medical missionary in a tent, with long lines of people, waiting for care."

That photo was the catalyst for her vocation. Ironically, it was Mangold who provided her with a scholarship to attend Marian University in Fond du Lac, where she earned her Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree, with honors.

Her husband has also found his niche in medicine. The most rewarding facet of being a general practitioner is "being family-oriented," he said. "We have nice feedback from patients, when they know someone cares."

He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Biology at

Northern Illinois University, a Master's Degree in Biological Sciences from that same university and a Doctor of Medicine degree at Chicago Medical School, in 1990. Dr. Mangold did his internship at the Medical College of Wisconsin in Wauwatosa and finished at Chicago Medical School.

The challenge Dr. Mangold faces, he said, is having enough hours in a day. "We give so much time to our patients," he admitted.

The Mangolds visit patients in two nursing homes and in assisted living facilities and sub acute rehabilitation centers in the area. They are also involved in multiple hospice situations, for patients located within a half hour of their clinic.

Then too, Mangold gives presentations to students at McLane Elementary School in West Bend. A few of their children attend that school.

Their children include: Teresa, 25; Amanda, 23; Jacob, 18; Mickey, 18; Jon, 10; Ben, 9 and Savannah, 6.

Dr. Mangold affirmed he has a new lease on life, since opening his Center. During the time he worked in emergency medicine for various hospital systems, he was required to attend as many patients as possible.

In one situation, "There were three doctors, and we

were asked to see 80 patients a day," Dr. Mangold recalled. "That is one every six minutes."

"This type of system of healthcare is very impersonal for the patients," he affirmed. "Angie and I feel people should not be treated like that."

The long hours in emergency medicine began to take their toll, Dr. Mangold admitted. "On weekends, I was sometimes working a 70-hour shift in the emergency room," he said.

Thus, the couple decided to shift gears and set up their own Center, one focused on family care. Slinger area residents, who had resided in West Bend from 2005-10, they began searching for a site for their Center about four years ago.

"We opened here in the Centrum Building in June 2009," Mangold said. "We found the best building in the world. We are so blessed to have found this. There is a ramp at the back door for patients who have disabilities."

Most of their patients are West Bend residents. However, some reside in Manitowoc, Milwaukee, Madison, Germantown and Menomonee Falls and even Illinois.

Moraine Park Technical College downsizing to address projected budget shortfall

FOND DU LAC - Moraine Park Technical College, with campuses in Fond du Lac, West Bend and Beaver Dam, has announced a downsizing of staff and services to meet a projected \$3.1 million shortfall in its 2011-2012 budget. The proposed budget will go into effect July 1.

The budget shortfall is due to the proposed provisions of the State Biennial Budget and Budget Repair Bills, which include a freeze on the operational tax levy coupled with an anticipated 30 percent cut in state aid to the technical college system. The downsizing recommendations, presented by College leadership to the Moraine Park District Board, came after review of the College's strategic plan, analysis of multiple budget scenarios, and with input from staff. The key consideration throughout the budget-balancing process was to limit the impact on student programming and services, while simultaneously addressing the strategic growth needs of the College.

Reductions cut across many departments at the College. Staff downsizing accounted for an \$800,000 reduction in personnel budget dollars with a net downsizing of 20 positions. Staff downsizing was addressed through layoffs, retirements, consolidation of duties and not filling certain vacancies. Additional non-personnel cuts led to a \$2.3 million reduction in operational dollars and include the suspension of two credit and two apprenticeship programs: Engine Research and Development Technician and Veterinary Technician programs, and Steamfitter and Plumbing apprenticeships. Program suspensions were based on one or more of the

following considerations: student demand, enrollment, retention, number of graduates, and available employment opportunities.

All affected employees were personally notified, followed by a general announcement to all College staff and students. The College is providing assistance to affected employees.

"Balancing our budget was an extremely difficult process. These decisions will have a profound effect on the lives of loyal and dedicated employees who have provided high quality service to Moraine Park, making it extremely difficult to put these changes into motion," said Moraine Park Technical College President Dr. Gayle Hytrek. "While the state budget is yet to be sorted out, we simply had to move forward in an effort to be operationally sound with the start of the new fiscal year quickly approaching."

Dr. Hytrek retires June 30, with Dr. Sheila Ruhland recently announced as her successor. Dr. Ruhland currently serves as Vice President of Instruction at Rockingham Community College in Wentworth, N.C.

The college will continue to move forward with the preliminary budget that was presented to the District Board on April 20 and will next hold a public hearing at the May 18 District Board meeting. Final budget approval by the District board is slated to take place in June.

Moraine Park Technical College employs 450 faculty and administrative staff across its three campuses and offers associate of applied science degrees, technical diplomas, apprenticeships, certificates, continuing education units and articulated credit for high

school students throughout the district. It also offers training and technical assistance to businesses and personal enrichment courses to community members. It was established in 1912 and is one of 16 technical college districts that make up the Wisconsin Technical College System. For more information, log on to www.morainepark.edu.



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
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Zoo tour gets KES kids Movin and Munchin

Adding up the entire school's miles posted a total of 96,436.5. The winning







Lack of depth continues to hamper track teams

SHEBOYGAN FALLS- It's looking more and more like Plymouth will be the favorite to win both the boys' and girls' titles in the upcoming Eastern Wisconsin Conference Track and Field Championships.

The Panthers took both ends of the annual Vanderpan Invitational meet on May 6th and did so impressively. The Plymouth girls just missed the 200-point mark, hitting 198 to end with a rather comfortable 19.5 point win over Sheboygan Falls, while the boys amassed 189.5 points, far out front of runner-up Wau-pun, which came in with 152.

The Kewaskum boys, who collected two first places, were fifth with 83 points, while the Lady Indians finished in the same spot, only with 65 points.

"Things went well," KHS coach Jerry Gosa said, meaning his top-level athletes gave good accounts of themselves, especially T.J. Schlice and Eric Perkins, who each claimed a first place.

Schlice cleared 12-feet, 6-inches (12-6) to win the pole vault, while Perkins' leap of 18-11 was good enough to take first in the long jump.

Schlice also placed second in the high jump (5-08.5), and was instrumental in the 4x100-meter and 4x200-meter relays posting season best times, even though they were unable to beat the Panthers in either race.

"We ran good times, but got beat by good relay teams," Gosa said, reporting Teddy Wollner, Schlice, Joey Wollner combined for a 1:34.54 in the 4x200 and a 45.45 in the 4x100.

The Indians also did well in the open 100, with Perkins and Teddy Wollner second and third in a photo finish.

"Teddy won the preliminary," Gosa said, adding Hayden Potts of Plymouth posted an identical time in the second race, then in the finals, the three were so close, "From the naked eye, you couldn't tell who won."

Potts was awarded first at 11.77. Perkins next at 11.78 and Wollner just .02 back off the leader with an 11.79.

Kewaskum earned 18 points in the pole vault, 10 from Schlice and eight from Joey Wollner, who made 11-6.

The high jump was also good event, with the Indians picking up 14 points as sophomore Corey Burdick added a third (5-8) to go with Schlice's second.

Others placing in the meet were: Joey Seitz, 6th in the 200 (25.89); Burdick, 3rd in the triple jump (36-05); and Joey Wollner, 7th in the triple jump (35-05).

The KHS girls didn't have any firsts but Ashlee Stahl had a good outing, clearing 5-0 in the high jump and finishing third on a tiebreaker. "That's her personal best," Gosa said.

Stahl also turned in a time of 2:40.91 to place fourth in the 800.

Aly Backhaus competed

well, taking second in the triple jump with her best effort of the year (31-03).

Freshman Kate Schrauf-nagel was a triple place winner, taking fifth in the 400 (67.15), sixth in the (29.41) and eighth in the long jump (14-06).

In the 4x100 relay, the quartet of Tess Bandy, Backhaus, Megan Ringwell and Natalie Bandy managed a fourth place with a time of 55.61.

Gosa figured the 4x200 unit would do the same or better, but "They just did not have a good night," getting disqualified.

Mikkin Abfall was taken out of the relays and instead ran an open sprint. She placed fifth in the 100 (13.82), while Bandy placed third in the pole vault (7-0).

April Stahl showed good improvement in the 1600, cutting almost eight seconds off her previous best time for a 6:13.98, good for fifth.

Stahl also combined with Tess Bandy, Backhaus and Ringwell, to take a fourth (4:29.06) in the 4x400 relay.

Other KHS places included: 400 — Britney Peterson, 8th, 74.78; 100 hurdles — Val Hedlund, 6th, 18.55; high jump — Brianna Jacak, tied for 6th, 4-06; pole vault — Lauren Treptow, 7-09; triple jump — 27-11).

Bohn broke 40 with his 39 on the front nine at Hawthorne Hills in Fredonia and finished with an 82 (tie for 16th) in the annual Port Washington Invitational, which was won by New Berlin West's 405 total. West was eight shots ahead of neighboring Brookfield Central (412). Nicolet, Cedarburg and Slinger rounded out the top five, shooting respective scores of 421, 428 and 429.

Wins and losses produce roller coaster season

The Kewaskum soccer team's roller-coaster season continued the past couple of weeks as the Indians went 2-3-1.

On Tuesday, the Indians lost at defending conference champion Sheboygan Falls, 6-0.

"We knew it was going to be tough going in. We were hoping to keep it close but they put in a couple pretty early on us and that kind of set the tone," said Coach Luke Piwoni.

It was 4-0 at half. The deep Falcons, sporting 20 girls, scored twice in the first 12 minutes on crosses and headers. Piwoni said there was nothing goalie Kayla Bastian could have done. Two headers hit the corners.

Piwoni said Kewaskum was often first to the ball but not the first to touch it, which led to good crosses and scores. "It's just a matter of not allowing them to get a good shot off when they get down there," he said.

Offensively, Kewaskum had its shots but couldn't find the back of the net.

"We controlled the ball pretty well and we had some scoring chances and we just couldn't put any in. We just weren't able to capitalize on our opportunities," Piwoni said. "They were good at finishing, that was probably the big difference."

He said Sam Smallish played well at center midfield.

"She was real aggressive and fighting for the ball," he said.

Last Friday, the Indians lost 2-1 in overtime at Port

Washington in about as heart-breaking, heart-stopping fashion as possible.

After controlling the ball for maybe two minutes of the first half, Kewaskum's defense kept it in the game, 0-0.

The Pirates scored early in the second half, but senior Christine Bohn tied the game at 75:12.

With about five seconds left in overtime, a Pirate got past the Indians' defense and passed to a teammate, who sent the ball through the net as the buzzer rang. Kewaskum lost, 2-1.

"A couple of seconds we go into a second OT," said Piwoni. "Just a tough way to lose but the way we played the last 35 minutes of the game was real encouraging."

He said Bastian was "phenomenal in goal," making 20 saves.

"She's coming out for more balls and calling off defenders," he said. "Her and the defense, if they didn't hold the way they did, it could have been a different game."

Bastian and Paige Lightner traded spots a couple of weeks ago after Lightner got a hand injury and now sports a cast. Piwoni said Bastian will play goalie the rest of the season and Lightner will be her last line of defense.

Last Thursday at home, the Indians put down the hammer early against Waupun in a 6-0 thrashing.

The Indians have sometimes struggled out of the gate this season, and Piwoni didn't want to give the Warriors any confidence.

"That was probably my worry going into that game. How are we going to start here.

We haven't gotten off to the best starts most of the time," he said.

His team answered the call, scoring twice in the first 2:24.

"They came out right away and set the tone for the game," he said.

Scoring went like this: Shannon Miller (Bohn assist), 1:30; Bohn, 2:24; Miller (Jess Smallish), 5:55; Bohn (Sam Smallish), 18:19; Jess Smallish (Bohn), 35:52; and Sam Smallish (Desiri Jantz), 46:37.

Bastian made two saves. Kewaskum is 3-3 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and 3-5-2 overall. Piwoni now looks to Thursday in a rematch at Kiel. The Indians lost, 4-2, the first time.

"We dominated in the first half, they tied it early in the second half and we were a different team. We've just got to cover the middle of the goal and play the way I know we can play," he said.
