St. Lucas students soar with test scores

St. Lucas students took the annual Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Exam (WKCE) late in 2010.

This year St. Lucas students in the fourth, fifth, sixth, and eighth grades tested 100 percent in the proficient and advanced categories in Math and Reading.

The third and seventh grades students tested at 91 percent in the proficient and advanced categories in Math and Reading. In addition the fourth and eighth graders tested 100 percent in the proficient and advanced categories in language arts, science, and history. Finally, the eighth grade class tested 80 percent in the advanced category in all five tests.

The tests involve testing students in third through eighth grade in Math and Reading skills. In addition the fourth and eighth grade students also take tests in language arts, science, and social studies. The test results fit into four categories: minimal, basic, proficient, and advanced.

"The test scores are consistent with the last four years of taking the WKCE tests," said Principal Stoltz. "We are very proud of our students and the hard work that they demonstrate both in the classroom and at home."

Boehlke ends her Survivor Story

"Survivor" maybe over, but Andrea Boehlke's celebrity status may just be starting.

The 21-year-old soon-to-be college graduate from a Random Lake dairy farm who placed in the top five on the show that wrapped up Sunday is getting recognized even by actors in New York, where she is spending the week with her theater class.

Families were flown to New York City to watch the final two episodes and for the reunion show. The Boehlkes sat in the third row.

"We were right there," said Andrea's dad, Royal.

"It was a lot of fun and it was really overwhelming but it was really cool to see everybody," said Andrea, a dean's list regular who graduates from the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point on Saturday.

The families got to meet the other cast members and their families, and hang out with them for much of the weekend.

Andrea's sister, Sabrina, a junior at

Kewaskum High School, said Phillip, the former federal agent known as the show's weirdo, was really nice.

"Now he's, like, one of my favorite characters," she said.

Mom Linda isn't quite sold.

"I'm still not sure about him, but he was sure nice to my girls. He went out and bought a gift for my youngest," she said.

One night after meeting him, Phillip gave a framed, 3D photo of the New York City skyline to 12-year-old Sharla.

The families packed the Ed Sullivan Theater, the same place David Letterman tapes his show, to watch the conclusion of "Survivor" and then film the live reunion show. Royal said contestants were kept separate from their families, so they didn't get to join Andrea in watching her survive one challenge and win another to get back into the game from Redemption Island. The second challenge included balancing a vase on the end of a wooden plank using only one leg. Andrea beat three other guys, including a former NFL player.

Royal said his family was on the

edge of its seat with every lean of Andrea's vase. It was sure elation when she won.

"I don't think we jumped up but we were pretty excited," he said.

Andrea was promptly voted out a second time, getting knocked out of a chance to win the \$1 million first prize, after nearly winning immunity in the next challenge. Royal said he knows why.

"They didn't want her around no more because she would have gotten more votes than I think Boston Rob if she would have made it," he said.

Royal said it was fortunate Andrea's tribe had won so many challenges in a row and didn't have to vote off someone for most of the season.

"She could have been gone halfway through the season, I think. Then they started winning all these challenges. And she tried, she really pushed all those other guys in those challenges," he said.

Mom and Dad said they were proud in how Andrea played the game. Royal said he was impressed she stayed on the island for 37 of the 39





No progress on EMT shortage

Kewaskum's emergency medical technician shortage remains a work in progress.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel had pegged a May 10 meeting as a possible turning point to convince nearly half of the village's 24 EMTs to start signing up for shifts. He told the Village Board as much on May 2.

This week, he declined comment on how the May 10 meeting went with the EMTs, saying the issue is "ongoing" and "contentious."

The village's EMT service covers Kewaskum, the town of Kewaskum and parts of the towns of Farmington, Wayne and Auburn. It is a user-based service that is not supported by taxes, but on May 2 trustees Mike Berger and Kevin Scheunemann suggested

looking into privatizing the service if staffing is difficult.

Groeschel disagrees, saying the service doesn't cost the taxpayers anything since it is user based. Privatizing would require tax money.

Groeschel said he has seen hours be cut since last December. Some have moved out of the village and one retirement is pending, creating another hole.

Just getting people to be on call for shifts has been difficult. Some are signing up for 90-minute slots when shifts used to cover 12 hours, Groeschel said.

As of May 2, 11 of the 24 EMTs were inactive, meaning they don't sign up for shifts.

Two weeks ago, Groeschel said Memorial Day Weekend was "wide open." On Monday, he said he isn't sure if it is covered because he hasn't looked at it.

Interim superintendent to be interviewed next Thursday

An interim, part-time superintendent will replace Mike Krumm for one year as the Kewaskum School Board evaluates internal candidates and its new members become more familiar with their roles.

Krumm, who announced in spring he was retiring at the end of the school year, said the district is waiting on making a permanent superintendent decision to allow internal candidates to finish their degrees and continue their career development. He said he doesn't know the number of internal candidates.

In addition, the extra time allows three new School Board members elected in April to get their bearings and help evaluate who should next lead

the school district, Krumm said.

The district is again using Carl Hertz, a superintendent search consultant, the same one used in finding Krumm. Hertz will help guide the board and district through the search for internal candidates and, if need be, external ones.

"He's going to help them through the process entirely," said Krumm.

An interview with an interim candidate is scheduled for next Thursday in closed session.

Krumm said the board will decide soon on an interim candidate to allow time for a transition before the end of the contract year on June 30.

He said the board next spring will select a full-time superintendent.

Better Safe Than Sorry

Now that a late spring is here and fields are finally drying out, farmers are doing field work. Because of the late spring, there is a tendency to rush to get the crops in as early as possible, "Haste makes waste" and may take the place of "safety first." Many farm accidents result from being hasty or careless and not using common sense. For example, how many times have you stepped between the rear and front wheels of a tractor to talk to the operator while the engine is still running? Or stopping the PTO before checking out a problem?

Here are five dangerous situations to avoid:

1. Always use the steps for mounting the tractor.
2. Never operate drive levers from an off seat position. A little too much pressure on the lever could cause the tractor to lurch forward.
3. Wear safety goggles and gloves when working with pesticides.
4. Don't get under a tractor to work on it while the engine is running. Block wheels when you change a tire.
5. Never stand in front or back of a wheel to the driver while engine is still running but have the operator shut off the engine.

Have a safe planting and harvesting season.



Steiner to temporarily take over as Chief

When Police Chief Richard Knoebel retires, office Mark Steiner will take over as officer in charge, at least until a new chief is hired.

The Village Board on Monday unanimously approved Steiner to the post.

The search process for a new chief is expected to take four to five months.

The board changed the job requirements from 10 years experience to eight to allow more Kewaskum officers to apply for the job. The change makes all but one officer eligible, said Knoebel.

The board chose to keep

the salary range of \$56,671 to \$65,125, covering step one to step five on the village's salary scale. The problem is top officers in the department make \$58,900 per year not counting overtime.

"You're going to have patrolmen making more than the chief," Knoebel said.


Village Administrator Mathew Heiser said Kewaskum is the lowest paid department in the county, including the Sheriff's Department.

The board unanimously voted to keep the salary range and negotiate salary with potential job candidates. For instance, a more experienced candidate could start at step three, higher than the minimum but lower than the maximum.

days. Linda said her daughter kept her integrity, was physically strong and well liked.

"I was glad she was the hard-working girl, not the lazy one. She played a good social game. It was obvious when we were in New York a lot of these people were friends with her," she said.

"I love the way she played. I really do. They gave her a very, very good edit," said Royal.

Linda said Andrea lost 13 pounds on the island. She said Steve, the former NFL player, lost 33 in 30 days. Once the tribes merged, she said they were moved to a new location without crabs and rice was all they had to eat. She said Andrea snuck some extra rice.

It makes it all the harder to keep a clear head.

"That, I think, adds to the drama because you're hungry, you're weak, you're fatigued. It's raining every night. You've got that constant battle with paranoia - can you trust people," she said.

Linda said she can somewhat relate to the mindset.

"I miss one meal I get

crabby," she said with a laugh.

Family members wore their Team Andrea shirts in New York, instantly letting others know who they supported. Linda said one of the production people was impressed. A number of other contestants didn't have that level of support, she said. Linda said Andrea became good friends with Ralph, the long-bearded farmer from Virginia. He would often get recognized and they got stopped for photos nearly every 20 yards walking down Times Square.

The trip was an exciting finish to a whirlwind 18 months, from the family keeping it secret Andrea was a finalist and then a contestant, having fun playing jokes on their family and friends about it and attending "Survivor" parties every week. Linda said it got to the point where many local venues that wanted to host a party couldn't because crowds swelled to 200.

"Yeah, that was a good investment," she said.

The experience may continue, at least for Andrea. Linda said "Survivor" contestants often get involved with CBS charities, and Andrea is already participating in Dave and Carole's Miracle Marathon on 96.5 WLKH, which benefits Children's Hospital of Wisconsin.







50 Years Ago

February 24, 1961

75 Years Ago

January 10, 1936

Two West Bend young men, Harvey Held, manager of Held's Meat Market and Otto Zahn Sr., head of the West Bend Engineering Company, have developed a new meat tenderizer on which they have received a patent and which they will start manufacturing soon. Offices of the new firm, to be known as the "Tender Tasty Corporation of America" will be located in Milwaukee while the manufacturing will be done in West Bend. The new machines are described as a finer and better way of preparing meats at a sensationally lower cost.

The city of Mayville is endeavoring to settle the slot machine question as not being a gambling device by placing a license on it at a cost of \$35 per year. Without the license the machines will be established as gambling devices and will not be tolerated, but if the license is applied for the machines, they will come under the heading of "games of amusement."

Anthony J. Hammes, young man from Random Lake, has composed the words and music to a song entitled, "On a Journey in Montana," which is now copyrighted under the number 114,657. He is now making arrangements for publishing the song, which is a very pleasing hillbilly composition. It is hoped to hear the young composer's work on stage and radio soon.

A fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed a large two-story frame house belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Peter Kolber of the Town of Farmington at about 2 am on December 28.

Only a few household belongings were saved. The Kolber family was awakened by the crackling of flames in the basement, where the fire started. The Fillmore fire department responded to the call but was unable to check the fire. The loss is fully covered by insurance and the family intends to rebuild.

January 17, 1936

State Treasurer Robert K. Henry today placed in the mails the sum of \$1,472,253.50 in 1,783 checks payable to a like number of villages, cities and towns, representing their shares of the net proceeds to the state for the period July 1, 1935 to January 1, 1936 from the occupational tax on intoxicating liquor. The Town of Kewaskum with a population of 730, will receive \$365.99. The Village of Kewaskum with a population of 799 will receive \$400.69.

Pirmin Kohler, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Kohler of this village and a senior in the local high school was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital at West Bend on Wednesday morning of this week suffering from an attack of appendicitis. He underwent an immediate operation and at present is doing very nicely.

Slot machines have disappeared from taverns, filling stations, drug stores, and restaurants in Washington County as a result of an order by Sheriff Joseph Kirsch, to remove them and keep them removed. The Attorney General's office at Madison has asked L.A. Buckley, district attorney, for a letter on the county and if machines are still in operation, there will be trouble for the county officers.

Mr. and Mrs. Ferd Weiland of St. Kilian are the parents of a baby girl born on Monday.

January 24, 1936

This village and state was gripped with a severe snowstorm and one of the coldest waves ever recorded here this week when snowdrifts piled up higher than automobiles in many places and on Thursday morning the temperature dropped to a mere 30 degrees below zero, according to the thermometer at the local post office. Schools were closed, highway crews gave up the task of fighting snow drifts in the unbearable weather, hospitals and doctors were kept busy treating frost bites, fire departments moved continuously to battle blazes caused by over-

heated stoves, train service was delayed, trucking service was stopped completely, mail carriers were unable to make their routes and a number throughout the state are dead as a result of freezing.

In a recent statewide intelligence test administered to high school seniors, those listed below did exceptionally well, namely: Dorothy Backus, Delbert Backus, Viola Backhaus, Marie Beilke, Clyde Darmody, Kilian Honeck, Janice Koch, Armond Mertz, Ray Pfenning, Doris Rosenheimer and Howard Schmidt. Of the 29 seniors who took the test, 19 ranked higher than the average for the state. Five students ranked in the upper ten percentile. This is indeed a creditable showing for the school.

Lehman Rosenheimer Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. L.P. Rosenheimer, who for the past six months has been employed with Marshall Field and Co. Wholesale in Chicago, left last Monday for Watertown, South Dakota, where he has been promoted to assistant manager for a Marshall Field store in that city.

Othmar Bonlender of St. Kilian, a graduate of Kewaskum High School and the Marquette University, Milwaukee, is now employed in the offices of Gehl Bros. Mfg. Co. in West Bend as a traffic manager.

The Kewaskum Public School will receive \$96 as its share of the school fund income as apportioned by State Supt. Calahan on December 30. The amount apportioned as calculated on the basis of 50 cents for each person of school age. The local school has 192 pupils and at 50 cents each the total is \$96.

100 Years Ago

April 15, 1911

Joseph Schmidt, proprietor of the Eagle Hotel, and who has conducted a hotel in this village for the past 17 years, has decided to retire from said business within the near future. The building will undergo extensive improvements, at which work has already commenced. The improvements are of a nature that the building is to be divided so that it will consist of two separate business places. The north half will be fixed for a printing office and flat, and will be the home of the Kewaskum Statesman. The south half will be remodeled for a saloon, living rooms and millinery store. An entire new front will be built in the south half. The insurance offices will be moved into the upper floor of the new bank building of the Bank of Kewaskum as soon as same is completed. The north half of the building has been purchased by the proprietor of this paper. This course has been found necessary as the Statesman was compelled to seek new quarters, as the present quarters lacked the necessary floor space.

A new residence district will be platted in this village some time next week, when Moritz Rosenheimer will have the surveyor of West Bend here to plat out about five acres of his land. The district will be just off of Fond du Lac Avenue near the rear of his store. It will be known as Rosenheimer's First Addition. The addition after being platted will contain about 100 lots. Streets will be at once graded, trees planted and also some houses built.

2. After the first meeting of the board of review and before the board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the board of review may contact, or provide information to a member of the board about the person's objection, except at a session of the board.

3. The board of review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at least 48 hours before the board's first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good cause and the submission of a written objection, the board shall waive that requirement during the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, and the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48-hour notice requirement and failure to appear before the board of review during the first 2 hours of the first scheduled meeting.

4. Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require such objections to be submitted on forms

approved by the department of revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who owe land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land. No person shall be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board, under oath of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.

5. When appearing before the board of review, the objecting person shall specify in writing, the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

6. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board, or by telephone, or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using the income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under s. 73.02 (2a), Wis. stats., that the assessor requests. The Town of Wayne has an ordinance about the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph, which provides exceptions for person using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their officer or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under s. 19.35 (2), Wis. stats.

7. The board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the board a letter from a physician, surgeon, or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability. No other person may testify by telephone.



Kewaskum's soccer team has exacted revenge on one of its conference rivals.

The Indians last Thursday beat Kiel, 3-1, avenging a 4-2 loss on April 11.

Senior Christine Bohn got the scoring started 5:50 into the game on an assist from Shannon Miller. At 13:19, Sam Smallish scored to make it 2-0.

Kiel's Niki Meunier scored at 30:00, and the halftime score was 2-1, just like it was in the first game.

This time, however, the Indians hung on.

At 47:29, George Abfall, a veteran player who recently rejoined the team, put the ball in the back of the net on an assist from Bohn.

Goalie Kayla Bastian made five saves.

"The girls came out ready to play. The earlier loss was on their minds," said Coach Luke Piwoni. "In the second half we came out, kept the energy up. Really, the whole time we kept the pressure on."

The Indians followed that with two tough games against conference title contenders. On Monday, they lost, 3-0, at New Holstein. On Tuesday, they survived a shooting barrage and only lost 2-0 at Plymouth.

Kewaskum is 4-5 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and 4-7-2 overall. Sheboygan Falls leads the conference at 6-1. New Holstein is 7-2-1 and Plymouth 6-2-1.

Against New Holstein, the Indians gave up a goal at 15:00 and held the Huskies scoreless until 68:00. They added one at 79:00.

Bastian made 21 saves.

Piwoni said scoring opportunities were there.

"We had plenty of chances, just couldn't finish," he said.

Against Plymouth, Piwoni said the Indians didn't have many chances, getting outshot, 23-2. The Panthers controlled the ball and kept the pressure on the entire game as Bastian made 21 saves. It didn't help that injuries and illness made Kewaskum's usually thin bench even thinner.

Even still, the Panthers only scored early and late, getting shut out in the middle, he said.

"They got a goal in the first five minutes and kept attacking. Our defense played really well. We shut them out until the 78th minute. The girls didn't give up, they held in the second half. I thought our effort alone was phenomenal for them to keep

fighting," Piwoni said.

Aside from Bastian, Piwoni singled out his two middle defenders, Cori Hoss and Paige Lightner, for helping keep the score down.

After two games in two days, the Indians repeat the feat as they host Sheboygan Falls on Thursday and travel to Campbellsport on Friday. Kewaskum lost its first meeting with powerhouse Falls, 6-0, and beat Campbellsport, 4-3 in an overtime thriller on April 7. Sam Smallish scored a hat trick, including launching the long game-winner 1:01 into overtime.

Playing four games in one week has Piwoni concerned.

"Hopefully we can come out with enough energy to go the distance," he said.

Dwyer comes home with bronze from national test

COPPER MOUNTAIN CO- Slowly but surely, Cayden Dwyer has been climbing the ladder of the United States of America Snowboard Association's ladder for boys his age, but this year the sixth grader at Kewaskum Middle School reached one of the top rungs in the national competition.

Also for the 2011 nationals, Dwyer had a companion at the

meet, as another Kewaskum boarder, Ayrton Lehmann, qualified for the week-long competition.

"I placed third in the GS (Giant Slalom) this year," Dwyer said recently, indicating there were at least 70 in this competition in which the gates on the course are much farther apart than in a regular slalom. The times on his runs were 34.10 seconds and 36.44 for a total of 70.54.

This was the first time Dw-

yer won a medal in a major competition, but he won plenty of gold medals in the Wisconsin snowboarding competitions, earning him another trip to nationals.

Dwyer participated in the Tyrol Basin Series this past winter, and, "I won all of them," he said, meaning he was the top board in the Menehune division for boys ages 10 and 11. His point total hit 2,120, which was 130 more than the second-place finisher.

All his work meant another trip to Copper Mountain in April where he and other boarders from all over the U.S. spent the first week practicing and the next in competition.

Dwyer was entered in all five events, the GS, Slalom, half-pipe, slope style and border cross, which is a race where six boarders try to get to the finish line first and three continue to advance. The border cross is Dwyer's least favorite competition because "You go for blood, it seems," he said, indicating there were both highs and lows in his performances at the Nationals.

One high was obviously his third place in the GS, Then there was the slalom, which started out extremely well but ended in disappointment.

"I had a gold in my hand," Dwyer said, reporting his was first after the initial run, then his coach told him to go all out and unfortunately he hit a patch of ice on the second run and wound up ninth out of 70. "I was pretty bummed."

There was also a problem in his preparation for the

slope-style. Dwyer had been told what his practice time was scheduled to be, and it turned out to be the wrong time, so he fell on both runs.

Overall, Dwyer still had a good meet. "I ended up getting seventh overall of all the 70," so he considered the year a success, especially considering he learned to do back flips this year. "It's my favorite trick," he said.

Matt Doman of West Bend coaches Dwyer, and to help with more conditioning this season, he also played on a Kewaskum Youth Basketball team.

"My muscles got stronger," Dwyer said, but participating in the two sports did pose a few extra challenges, like double practices on the same night. Still he is confident the extra work will help him earn a fourth trip to Copper Mountain next April.

Lehmann, competing in snow boarding for the first time this year, was on the go

most weekends, participating in meets at Granite Peak in Wausau, Tyrol and Sunburst.

The Holy Trinity fifth grader qualified for nationals by taking the regional title for his Midwest Best division (Menehune). This was Lehmann's first time on a mountain, and he was hampered by the fact his family had a mechanical breakdown on the way to Colorado and slowed by an avalanche warning. Because of these problems, Lehmann missed two days of practice on the mountain.

"I also got sick ... oxygen sickness," Lehmann, who is 10, said, still he totally enjoyed the experience. "Yes, it was very fun," he said.

Lehmann's best finish was 28th in the GS (40.82 and 40.19 for 81.01), but because he qualified for all five events, he finished 17th out of 50 boys in the division. Not bad for his first try, and he is already looking forward to next year.

Indians slip back into old scoring ways after consistent scoring provides low total for the year

Three days after their best showing of the year at Yahara Hills in Madison, the Indians golfers went back into their old pattern of inconsistent scoring from 40 to 45, finishing last in the seventh mini-tour event hosted on May 16th by Two Rivers.

Plymouth came out on top again; its sixth win of the season, posting a 167, and Sheboygan Falls was nine shots back at 176. Playing on the Fox Hills National course, the surprise of the night was Waupun, which jumped up into fourth place at 181, and the Indians came in with a 190.

Gene Kiela III of Plymouth dipped 1-under-par with his 35, and then there was a logjam among five golfers at 41.

KHS was led by Mike Holt's 45. Next came Dan Bohn and Tony Gonring with respective scores of 47 and 48, and Alex Larsen struggled to a 50.

The team made a quick 360-degree turn at Yahara Hills, however, finishing with a 169 that put them 15th place in the 23-team event.

Middleton captured the title with a combined 1-under-par

(-1) score from its four counters, while Kettle Moraine and Madison Edgewood tied for second with 3-over-par (3+) totals. All three are powers in the state.

The tournament was stopped after nine holes because of heavy rains, so the relation to par on whatever holes had been played by respective teams were used to determine 9-hole totals. In the PGA's scoring, Kewaskum was +25.

It took a 2-under par to win the medal.

"That is, by far, our best score of the year," KHS coach Glenn Eichstedt said, noting the players he used in this inaugural Foundations Rewards Invitational, sponsored by the Wisconsin PGA, were swinging well, making good decisions, and as a result, "Our kids played pretty solid."

Leading the KHS parade was junior Bohn, who came in with a 5-over par 41, which put him in a tie for 45th, according to Eichstedt, who reported both Gonring and Larsen were next with 42s (tied for 55th) and finishing off the scoring were Mike Holt and Nick Banks, each carding 44s.

Eichstedt said the PGA was sponsoring the meet to spark interest in its summer Junior Tour-

name program and that it may have four such meets next year.

The good showing boosted Eichstedt's hopes that Indians will reach their goal of finishing fourth in the upcoming Eastern Wisconsin Conference Tournament.

In the only EWC meet held last week, the Indians shot a 194, putting them in seventh place. Plymouth was way out front with a 160, followed by Campbell's 177. Kiela captured the medal with a 1-under-par 35 on the Rock River CC course.

"We didn't play very well at all," Eichstedt said, reporting he had only two players, Gonring and Larsen, break 50 with their 45 and 48. Gonring was just 5-over-par until the final hole when he lost a ball and had trouble in a bunker and came away with a nine.

Indians come back from behind to win game one in doubleheader; lose game two

Kewaskum entered the bottom of the seventh inning down five runs in the first game of Tuesday's doubleheader against Plymouth.

The team had one run and five hits at the time, down 6-1, and all hope was nearly lost. Some fans were already looking to Game 2.

Not so fast. Leadoff hitter Courtney Krueger started with a single. Michele Marquardt followed with another. Jenny Reicher flew out and moved the runners to second and third.

Abby Amerling reached on an error, and two runs came across. Liz Schaller walked and later stole second, drawing a throw. That allowed Amerling to score, as she had taken third on a wild pitch.

Rachel Backhaus hit an infield single that bounced off pitcher Kaitlyn Krzyaniak. Schaller took third.

Jenny Beiswenger grounded out and scored Schaller. It was 6-5 with two outs and No. 8 hitter Olivia Gitter at the plate. The senior singled to center.

Up came sophomore Erica Chesak, who annihilated the ball twice up the middle already but didn't have a hit to show for it. One line drive was caught by Krzyaniak and another bounced off of her before she threw to first for the out.

That was about to change. Chesak lifted a fly to left center that the Panthers couldn't reach in time. Two runs scored. Kewaskum went crazy. The Indians had escaped, 7-6.

Chesak said her head was clear at the plate.

"I didn't feel any pressure," she said. "I was, like, really relaxed. Just needed to hit the ball."

"She's been hitting the ball very hard all year long. That's why she's been brought up (from junior varsity)," said Coach Jeff Gosse. "She was crushing the ball tonight. Perfect person to come up in the game, and she stroked it."

That rally became even bigger in the second game, as the Panthers kept up the hitting, scoring seven runs. Kewaskum went ice cold, getting five hits off freshman pitcher Rachel Romps. The Indians lost, 7-0.

"We were lucky. We should have walked out of here with two losses tonight," said Gosse. "We didn't hit, we didn't execute. We didn't field. There was no communication. Our probably worst two games."

He had hoped the first game's dramatics would carry over into the second.

"I thought we were ready to play, I thought especially after coming from behind in the first game they would be pumped up and they would take it to this young freshman pitcher, but no, we regressed. The hitters were too anxious. How many popups tonight, 10, 12, 15 popups? Just way too impatient," he said.

Sophomore Jenny Reicher pitched both games. In the first, she allowed six runs on nine hits, whiffing six, walking five and hitting a batter. In the second, she allowed seven runs on six hits, whiffing four, walking two and hitting one.

Plymouth senior baseman Shyanne Heimerl went 6-for-7 on the day with three RBIs.

Kewaskum made three errors in the first game and one in the second, but it looked worse than that.

"They had some good hitters. Jenny didn't fool them tonight. They hit her and they hit her hard. I think that was

sort of a shock to our defense," said Gosse. "Way too many errors behind her, way too many mental errors. We threw to bases, I don't know why we were throwing to certain bases. There was no communication. Nobody was telling our outfielders where to throw. The cuts weren't in the right place. It was just one thing after another. It snowballed."

The split came a few days after a 10-1 non-conference home loss to Howards Grove in which Gosse rested some starters, and after last Thursday's split at Eastern Wisconsin Conference powerhouse Waupun.

Kewaskum won the first game, 5-1, before dropping the second, 8-1. It was the first time Gosse or former softball coach and athletic director Jason Piittmann could remember beating the Warriors.

Game one wasn't without its own drama, and Chesak, Beiswenger and Gitter again played a crucial role. After scoring two runs in the first inning, the Indians held a 2-1 lead entering the seventh.

Beiswenger hit a one-out double to the left-center gap, and moved to third on a Gitter loop single to right field.

Chesak followed with an RBI single to a hole vacated by

the shortstop moving to cover third.

With two outs, junior Caitlin Rinzel cracked a home run over the left field fence. It would have been a three-run blast, but Rinzel was called out for missing home plate before getting swamped by giddy teammates.

"It was exciting. I was kind of in a daze running around the bases, so one of the reasons I didn't touch home plate," she said.

That run wouldn't matter as Reicher allowed a single and nothing more in the bottom of the seventh.

Assistant Coach Dallas Wodsedale gave Rinzel a big hug as she returned to the bench after the game, drawing a smirk.

Reicher, a sophomore fireballer, allowed one run on six hits, whiffing eight and walking two, in helping Kewaskum make school history.

"The first game I went into it knowing it was a very important game for us and I kept energy pitching all the way through," she said. "We put our hearts out there tonight."

Reicher got out of a huge jam in the fifth. Waupun loaded the bases on a walk and two hits with two outs. With the No. 4 hitter up, Reicher struck her out looking to end the threat.

"Bases loaded, that was huge. I had a lot of excitement after that," she said.

The Warriors bounced back in the second game, jumping on first pitch strikes. Pitcher Tiffany Killam allowed one run on four hits, whiffing five and walking three.

"First win was huge. It put us in control of our destiny," said Gosse. "We exerted a lot of energy in that first game. You

could see in the second game we were flat. We lost our focus, we lost our edge."

Kewaskum had a chance to score in the first inning, with runners on second and third and one out. But Reicher popped out and Amerling fouled out.

"We had a chance in the first inning. If we could get a run or two across that first inning ... who knows what happens? Do they deflate?" said Gosse.

After splitting both doubleheaders, Gosse said the Indians are still in position to win conference. On Friday, Kewaskum has a doubleheader at Kiel. Next Monday and Tuesday come two games against rival and fellow conference frontrunner Campbellsport. But Gosse said he is concerned with his team's hitting slump, especially against slower pitchers.

"We're still in good position. If we can sweep Campbellsport, then we're fine. We can't afford any more losses," he said.

Notes: In Game One against Plymouth on Tuesday, Caitlin Rinzel hit a foul ball into a garbage bucket behind her team's bench to mild amusement from the crowd and teammates. Unfortunately, it did not count for seven runs that could be deferred to Game two, which would have helped the Indians sweep.

The seeding meeting for the playoffs was already held and will be released this week. Gosse said he expects Kewaskum to get a 2, 3 or 4 seed and at least one home game. Regional games start next Thursday.
