Former South Milwaukee Schools Superintendent hired for interim position here

David Ewald is just getting to know Kewaskum this week, but he has more than 20 years as a superintendent behind him.

The newly named interim superintendent of the district is slated to officially take over on July 1 for Mike Krumm, who is retiring. The Board of Education approved his contract on a 4-3 vote Wednesday evening, June 1.

Voting against the contract were the three newcomers to the board, Sue Miller, Troy Hanson and Tim Ramthun.

Ewald has most recently served as superintendent of South Milwaukee schools for 11 years. He was retired one year before taking the Kewaskum job. Before that, he spent 11 years as superintendent at Denmark, and 11 years before that he was a middle and elementary

school principal in New York.

This job, however, is slated as a one-year gig, and that's how Ewald is approaching it.

What he knew of Kewaskum before he learned on his drive up to Appleton to see his grandchildren. Ewald and his wife stopped off for a detour through Kewaskum on the way.


"We were just impressed with the community and the beautiful land that surrounds it," he said.

Ewald has since learned people in Kewaskum value education and their schools, he said.

This week, he is visiting each school before summer break because "schools look a lot different" when students are in them.


Like many superintendents, Ewald said he is taking a wait-and-see approach to some of the major issues out

Schlice ties for fourth at state meet

LA CROSSE- Timing is everything in athletics.

For senior T.J. Schlice, he peaked at the right time, clearing 13 feet, 6 inches (13-6) in the pole vault in the regional, sectional and finally at the Division 2 State Track and Field Meet on June 3, placing him in a tie for fourth place and earning him a medal in the event.

Members of the 4x200-meter relay team weren't quite as fortunate. Two of them suffered injuries in the week before the state competition, and that took away any chance of the quartet's making the finals.

They ran a time of 1 minute, 35 and .34 seconds (1:35.34) in Friday's preliminaries and ended up last of the 16 teams in the event.

"Yeah, I'm satisfied, but I wish I could have gotten the record (14-0)," Schlice said his day of vaulting, reporting he only missed once at 13-0. "All of the rest of them I made" until going right to 14-0.

"The first one (at 14-0) was real close," Schlice said. "The others weren't very good."

The winner and second place vaulters both cleared 13-9.

Schlice credits his quick move up the ladder in the event to the knowledge



Fire Chief recommends hiring part-time EMT's to solve shortage

Hiring three or four part-time emergency medical technicians just might be the solution to Kewaskum's EMT shortage.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel presented that as his recommended option at Monday night's Village Board meeting as many of the village's EMTs showed up to fight for their jobs.

The board had mentioned possibly hiring a private service to alleviate the EMT shortage.

Groeschel brought the issue to the board weeks ago when he had difficulty filling shifts. At times, the village did not have proper EMT coverage, which he said was on its way to becoming a crisis.

"We have a problem during the day. There's no business in town. People have to leave town to work," he said. "It's hard to schedule people when they're not there."

The cost of three or four part-time EMTs at 24 hours per week would run \$12,480 per year, which could be covered with the money made from the ambulance service. In 2010, the user-based service made \$71,000.

Groeschel recommended raising fees of the ambulance service to help offset the cost of the part-timers.

The part-timers would be on call at the fire station ready to go, Groeschel said. They would be paid differently than the other members of the association, but Groeschel said the association has already discussed that and it is not a problem.

Groeschel needs Village Board approval to do it, though Village Board president Andrew Pesch didn't think so. Pesch said he didn't want to tell Groeschel what to do, despite the board discussing the issue for the past month.

"We have a private ambulance service that does a great job," he said.

Trustee Craig Garbisch said Pesch and the board already told the service what to do when it recommended pushing back the purchase of a new ambulance.

Village Administrator Mathew Heiser said the relationship changed several years ago when Groeschel was hired as a full-time fire chief by the village and thus became a village employee. He said the ambulance service then became a function of a village department.

Pesch said he didn't think the decision had to come through the board, but understood after having it explained to him.

Groeschel argued against privatizing the service, as he has since the issue came to light weeks ago. Lifestar had been mentioned as the service to consider hiring.

"I want to stress to the board right now the ambulance is run with zero tax dollars," he said.

Beyond that, the service is profitable.

"It's making money," Groeschel said.

The ambulance service has been running for 60 years, he said.

"We're a proud group of people. We always have been," Groeschel said. "We don't call them Lifestar. We call them death star."

Trustee Jim Hovland said if the part-timers solve the issue to let Groeschel go out and hire them.

Another option was to include the village's Public Works Department as EMTs, as Grafton does. Heiser said Public Works Director Jerry Gilles had many questions about that, including what to do if a disaster requires the service of EMTs and the Public Works employees at the same time.

Trustee Kevin Scheunemann said he was hearing a "global frustration" with the board controlling the money for the ambulance service. He said he would like to see the board in time eliminate the fire chief position and go back to the village hiring the firefighters association as it did before Groeschel was hired as a village employee. The firefighters association could pay the chief itself and be used as a contracted service.

That way, Scheunemann said the fire association gets its "autonomy" back and avoids the "slow, lethargic process" that is fixing issues through the Village Board.

"That's the position I'd like to see this board eventually go," he said.

In the short term, Groeschel asked what he should do.

"Do what you think is best and we'll see if we agree," Pesch said.

In other business, the board slightly altered the requirements for police chief to replace Richard Knoebel, who retires next month.

The job description as it was only left three of Kewaskum's six officers qualified for the job, but the board had said it wanted to make the job open to all current officers.

Two changes made that possible. The job description now only requires a high school diploma, though an associate's degree is "preferred," and requires three years of experience but eight years is "preferred."

The changes passed 6-0. Mike Berger was absent.

Area residents injured after bonfire explosion

CAMPBELLSPORT - Five local individuals sought treatment at St. Joseph's Hospital in West Bend and were later transported to Columbia St. Mary's Burn Unit in Milwaukee after a bonfire incident that occurred on Saturday, June 14.

One of the individuals' injuries was severe enough to warrant transportation via Flight for Life.

The Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office who is investigating the incident, stated an explosion or combustion of gas from a five-gallon gas can occurred and resulted in the injuries.

The bonfire occurred at

639 Stonehedge Circle, a home owned by Dustin J. Mueller.

Chief Deputy Mark Strand from the Fond du Lac Sheriff's Office stated that his department was still investigating the incident. He went on to say the incident was not revealed to them until Monday after a parent contacted the Washington County Sheriff's Office and they contacted Strand's office.

Those involved and receiving treatment were: Nicole Meyer, Bill Otten, Joshua Mueller, Tammy Mueller, Craig Kell and Ben Carlson.

Strand did not expect charges to stem from the incident.

of the hands of local school boards, like the Budget Repair Bill being debated at the State Supreme Court and the mascot law that could force Kewaskum to change its Indian if a district resident complains.

Ewald grew up in southern Illinois, the third of six children whose father was a parochial school principal. He earned his undergraduate degree at Concordia in River Forest, Ill., and his master's in education at City University in New York. He earned a specialist in school administration degree at Fordham University at Lincoln Center.

Ewald taught in a New York parochial school for a year or so before becoming a teacher and a principal at the same time.

He said he never considered a career aside from education.

"The whole culture - the kids, the staff, the parents," he said he likes best. "Communi-

ties working together for the betterment of the kids, and to be part of that is very rewarding."

Ewald lives in Milwaukee with his wife, and he will stay there. The district is not requiring the interim superintendent to move into the district.

"It's a beautiful drive up here," he said.

Ewald is just beginning to settle in, but he does have one goal of where he would like the district to be next year at this time: financial sustainability. He said he would like to leave the district in a good financial situation for whoever is taking over.

In general, he wants to maintain continuous improvement, namely in student learning.

"I think it's a real special place and I hope when my tenure is up that I added to the good things that happen here," he said.

Routine screening is very important for the early diagnosis and treatment of skin cancer. When detected in the early stages, skin cancer is highly curable. Skin self-examinations consist of regularly looking over the entire body, including the back, scalp, soles of feet, toes and on the palms of the hands. If there are any changes in the size, color, shape or texture of a mole, the development of a

new mole, or any other unusual changes in the skin, you should see your dermatologist immediately.

The American Academy of Dermatology recommends that everyone Be Sun Smart. Here's how to do it:

- Generously apply sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 15 that provides broad-spectrum protection from both ultraviolet A (UVA) and ultraviolet B (UVB) rays. Re-apply every two hours, even on cloudy days, and after swimming or sweating;

- Wear protective clothing, such as a long-sleeved shirt, pants, a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses, where possible;

- Seek shade when appropriate, remembering that the sun's rays are strongest between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.;

- Get vitamin D safely through a healthy diet that includes vitamin supplements. Don't seek the sun.



KHS seniors put business concepts to use

Heather Zuehlke and Kate Winkler took their service learning project to the streets to help feed those in need.

The seniors in Tim Rohlinger's business concepts class did more than help the school store or a private business with advertising. The pair got four gas stations involved and through

customers donating spare change raised more than \$100 for the Kewaskum Food Pantry.

"I guess we just wanted to go above and beyond," said Winkler.

"I thought it went well. I

had fun with it," said Zuehlke. "It wasn't too hard to do but it was worth it."

The pair asked Kohn's CornerMart, Kewaskum Mobil, J-Stop and BP of Kewaskum, if they would allow jugs for spare change to be put on their counters. Any customers with extra change could donate to the food pantry.

"They were so welcoming of the idea," Winkler said.

The drive ran for about a week in April before spring break. The girls were surprised at the amount of dollar bills donated, rather than just change.

Mobil earned the largest amount because its employees specifically told customers about the jug.

The total came to \$103.71, "which we think was pretty good for only running it a week and only one gas station asking," Winkler said.

The girls said they didn't want to hit every business in town, since some rely on jars for tips and too many spots would be overwhelming for the community.

Rohlinger was impressed,

as was high school teacher Luke Piwoni, who manages the pantry.

"They had to do it in a small window of time and were very successful," Rohlinger said.

"That was phenomenal that they were able to do that," said Piwoni.

Money will go toward the pantry's \$20,000 left of debt. The goal is to raise \$50,000 to cover the cost of building the facility, and Piwoni said about \$30,000 so far has been raised.

The girls said they got the idea from former high school principal Christine Horbas, now the middle school principal. She suggested a roundup of grocery bills to the nearest dollar.

"We kind of took that idea and put it into action," said Winkler.

Piwoni said the project served as a test run and he hopes it will be done again and for a longer time period.

Every penny counts.

"It was \$100 we got from spare change," Winkler said.

"If they do continue it, the little things add up," said Zuehlke.

College for Kids at UW-FdL

The University of Wisconsin-Fond du Lac will offer an ACT Preparation course this summer as part of the College for Kids program at the university.

College for Kids is designed for gifted and talented students entering grades 5-8 and will be held 9 a.m.-3:20 p.m. July 25-28. College for Kids is designed for highly motivated students possessing special talents and gifts. Parents are strongly encouraged to confer with their child's gifted/talented coordinator, principal or teacher prior to making course selections. Tuition for this program is \$129.

Typically College for Kids students will take two courses during the week; however, if the ACT Prep is selected, this will be the only course students will participate in during the week. This course will be taught by UW-Fond du Lac math, physics and English faculty.

At the first meeting students will take a retired ACT test to identify areas of both strength and need. Subsequent meetings will include a review of the pretest results in English/reading/writing and math and



CHLORIDE REDUCTION

A wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) is designed to remove pollutants from the influent or untreated wastewater coming into the plant before the water is released into the environment. Wastewater treatment plants are very efficient at removing many pollutants found in the waste stream, but some things cannot be removed with conventional processes. One element that can not be removed is chloride. (salt, sodium chloride) Chloride passes through a treatment plant and is discharged to the receiving stream without being removed. The DNR is setting limits on chloride discharges from treatment plants.

The Kewaskum WWTP is working towards reducing the chlorides in our effluent, with a long term goal of keeping it below water quality levels prescribed by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

The best way to reduce chlorides in the effluent is to reduce the amount entering the sewer. One of the main sources of chlorides is from home water softeners. Water softeners regenerate using a salt brine which is a sodium chloride solution.

You can help by using an "on demand" sensor type, these are the most efficient. This type only regenerates when the sensor indicates the need to regenerate. Check your softener to make sure it is operating correctly,

minimizing salt consumption. If your water softener seems to be using more salt than normal, the softener needs to be looked at. If your softener works on a timer, check that the intervals are set to the longest time period possible, and still provide soft water. Visually inspect your water lines because not all water used in the home requires softening, such as drinking water, or outside faucets. If your water passes through the softener before going to these faucets, consider having a plumber make the necessary changes. Saving salt saves the consumer money, and at the same time helps maintain compliance with regulations at the wastewater treatment plant. If you do not own a water softener, and can live without one, that is even better! Please help us to protect our environment.

'Best season ever' says Indians softball coach Gosse

The Indians were the best team in the conference, had the best player and best coach in the conference, and were the best team in school history. Hence Coach Jeff Gosse summed up his team's fast-pitch softball season at Sunday night's team banquet.

"Best season ever."

Kewaskum won its first Eastern Wisconsin Conference title in school history and set a record for wins with 18, breaking last year's record of 16.

The Indians finished 12-2 in the EWC, edging conference heavyweight Waupun's 11-3, and shut out rival Campbellsport in the final game to win it outright. They beat Waupun for the first time in program history, 5-1, on May 12.

Sophomore pitcher Jenny Reicher was named EWC Player of the Year. Reicher was 18-4 on the season with a 1.31 earned-run average. In facing 452 batters in 117 innings, she struck out 130. She allowed 78 hits, 37 runs, 22 earned runs and walked 37.

She was about as fierce with a bat in her hand instead of a ball. Reicher had team highs for average (.429), home runs (three) on-base percentage (.506), slugging percentage (.651) and walks (11), was second in total bases (41) and hits (27) and was tied for third in RBIs with 15.

Senior catcher Abby Amerling joined Reicher as a unanimous selection to the EWC first team, the second straight year Amerling made the first team. In addition to calling pitches as the other half of the EWC's best duo up the middle, Amerling hit .338, led the team in total bases (43), doubles (six), tied for the team lead in RBIs (16) and was second in slugging percentage at .581 and home runs (two).

The Indians had the best corners in conference, with junior Michele Marquardt at third and senior Courtney Krueger at first. Both made the all-conference first team.

Marquardt hit .350, tied for the team lead in RBIs (16), hits (28) and was second in walks (10). She also served as backup pitcher, going 4-1 with a 3.375 ERA and whiffing 31 in 37 and a third innings.

Krueger, the Indians' lead-off hitter, scored a team-high 20 runs and hit .291.

Senior centerfielder Liz Schaller and senior second baseman Jennifer Beiswenger were named to the second team.

Schaller was a menace on the base paths, leading the team with 17 steals and only getting caught twice. The Indians' next closest thief had six swipes. She tied for the team

lead in hits (28) and was second in average (.378).

From batting sixth in the lineup, Beiswenger hit .324 and was tied for third in RBIs (15). In a 3-2 win against Campbellsport that sealed a share of the conference title, she smoked a line drive up the middle that scored two runs in the fourth inning.

Not surprisingly, though it took Assistant Coach Dallas Wodsedale to announce it, Gosse was named EWC Coach of the Year.

In the playoffs, Reicher pitched a five-inning no-hitter against Brown Deer and at the plate went 3-for-3 with a home run, double and four RBIs in the opening round. Kewaskum won, 10-0.

The Indians' playoff bid fell short against Slinger, 5-2, in an uncharacteristic performance. Despite Mother Nature's valiant effort to cancel the season, games went on, albeit many postponed. Between rain and spring break, the Indians had a 17-day break just two games into the season, followed a week later by 15 games in a 22-day stretch. They went 11-4.

Gosse thanked the seniors - Amerling, Schaller, Krueger, Beiswenger, Rachel Backhaus and Olivia Gitter - for their leadership and help with the underclassmen.

"They held everything together," he said.

Upholding tradition, seniors received fleece blankets with their jersey numbers.

Gosse thanked the parents for working the concession stand and helping with fundraising. Parental support is key to the program's success, he said.

The team presented Gosse and Wodsedale with photo books of the season, and presented all the coaches with cheesecakes.

With success now comes some expectations. The Indians for the first time will be the hunted as defending conference champions. Gosse reminded players that summer league starts Monday and passed around a sign-up sheet.

Kewaskum's junior varsity team went 7-9 and for the first

time beat Waupun and swept Plymouth.

Coach Jason Last said the girls got along well, so much so that the entire team sat at one table at the banquet.

"I'm not sure how they ate there, but they did," he said.

Season highlights: Kewaskum shuts out Campbellsport, 4-0, on the final day of the regular season to win the EWC title outright. The Indians beat the Cougars, 3-2, the day before that sealed a share of the title; The Indians score six runs in the bottom of the seventh to beat Plymouth, 7-6, on May 17, a game that proved crucial to winning the EWC. Krueger, Marquardt, Backhaus and Gitter all had hits before sophomore Erica Chesak ended the game on a two-run fly to left center; On May 12, Kewaskum makes school history by beating Waupun for the first time, 5-1. In the seventh, junior Caitlin Rinzel clobbered a home run over the left-field fence. A three-run homer was decreased to two when she missed tagging home plate, but the run wouldn't matter; Reicher pitches a no-hitter in the first round of the playoffs and goes 3-for-3 at the plate with a homer, double and four RBIs in a 10-0 win over Brown Deer.

Indians unable to hold Vikings in playoffs

For one half in last week's regional playoff game on the road, Kewaskum stayed right with Wisconsin Lutheran.

The second half went too much the Vikings' way.

The Indians couldn't keep up after 1-1 half and lost, 4-1, to end their season.

Junior Jess Smallish scored at 8:40. It was an uncharacteristic fast start for Kewaskum, which often came out of the gates slowly this season.

"We got out early, hit Jess in the open field and she cut it in and put a good shot on the goal," said Coach Luke Piwoni. "That gave us momentum and the energy we needed to play a good first half."

The Indians had a few other scoring chances the first half but couldn't finish.

The Vikings fired away from long range, but in the first half goalie Kayla Bastian was in good position to make saves, Piwoni said. One got through at 22:40.

At halftime, Lutheran regrouped and found some chinks in the Indians' defensive armor. The Vikings put Kewaskum on the defensive almost the entire second half, Piwoni said.

"It was basically 40 minutes on D," he said.

Goals came at 41:09, 57:19 and 63:22, the final one taking whatever wind Kewaskum had left in its sails.

"They fought and they did what they could, we just couldn't muster any offensive attack," Piwoni said.

Bastian finished with 16 saves.

Kewaskum finished 7-11-2, 6-8 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, one game from a tie for fourth with Campbellsport and Kiel.

"I thought we were competitive in pretty much every game except the first time we played Falls (a 6-0 loss, worst of the season)," Piwoni said.

"We were able to compete with the top three in conference - right in cluster of Kiel and Campbellsport right in the middle of conference," he said. "The goal was to crack the top three. We had plenty of scoring chances but were just not putting it through."

Piwoni said due to injuries and an already thin bench, many players stepped up who never played varsity before.

"I thought it was a good season overall," Piwoni said.

The Indians lose seniors Christine Bohn, Paige Lightner, Rachel Ogi and George Abfall.

"I can't really say enough about them; the example they set for other girls and helped them get ready to play varsity," he said.

Piwoni said Bohn's speed and skill at midfield will be missed. Lightner made a near "flawless transition" to defense after a hand injury moved her out of goalie. Abfall's size and talent will be hard to replace.

Piwoni said Ogi battled injuries all season but never asked out of a game.

"Rachel's just a warrior. She gets beat up every game," he said.

The Indians return the talented Smallish twins - Sam and Jess - and may move Bastian to the field if a junior varsity goalie pans out, Piwoni said.

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
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Hustling in the heat sends C-port home early Kewaskum 3-0 in EWC, faces New Holstein today

CAMPBELLSPORT - That heat advisory on Tuesday should have been issued twice for Campbellsport.

The oven bake weather was the first; then Kewaskum baseball team's bus rolled in. It's hard to say which was worse.

After falling behind 3-0 in the first inning, the Indians scored 19 unanswered runs, nine coming in the third and eight in the fifth, to win 19-3 in a mercy-shortened five innings.

"Pretty good game for a hot day," said Coach Doug Gonring, who emptied his bench once the score got out of hand.

Senior Kyle Wesenberg got his first base hit as a varsity player. The lefty looped a liner to left field in the fifth inning as Kewaskum teammates and fans cheered.

"I almost jumped out of my skin right away," Gonring said.

"It felt good for a change. It

really did. It felt awesome," Wesenberg said.

He said he was looking fastball, "and that's what I got. Just went the other way with it. Took it where it was pitched."

Wesenberg came around to score on a grand slam by Kewaskum's power hitter, Brad Boegel. The junior came up with the bases loaded and two outs, about the last guy a team would want to face in that situation. Boegel clocked a towering flyball over the fence in left center.

Boegel finished 3-for3 on the day with a single, double, homer and walk. He and lead-off hitter Sam Olla each scored three runs.

Three Cougar pitchers combined to walk nine and hit one as Kewaskum hitters used good eyes after getting behind in counts. Runs came easy and often as there wasn't so much as one play at a base the entire game.

In the fourth, Boegel lined a ball that hit starter Tim Whitty in the arm. He stayed in the

game and walked the next two batters before being taken out.

The Indians didn't get a hit until the third inning, when they racked up eight. The first eight hitters each scored one run, and Olla scored two. Four walks and an error helped key the big inning. Eleven Indians were sent to the plate.

In the fifth, the Indians scored eight runs on three hits. Three walks, an error and a hit batter helped.

The explosions helped erase a 3-0 deficit in which Kewaskum looked sluggish. Pitcher Cody Nuernberg was on the verge of getting out of a bases-loaded jam in the first inning, after a triple, two walks and a pop out. But Lucas Kopeschka backpedaled on a fly to right field and couldn't turn around in time to catch the ball. Three runs came in.

"We started off like the weather - hot dreary, slow," Gonring said. "But we certainly played well for a couple innings there."

Gonring said he liked his team's aggressiveness on the bases. Several wild pitches had the Indians on the move, and they took an extra base on any throw off target or to another base.

"You can beat teams just by hustling alone," Gonring said. "Once you get ahead it's real simple. When other teams get behind it's hard for them to stay focused."

Nuernberg ended up allowing three runs on five hits, whiffing five, walking four and hitting one.

"Cody did a good job today. Once he got ahead he threw better," Gonring said.

Kopeschka had two hits and three RBIs. Mike Schladweiler had two hits and two RBIs, and Tony Gonring had two hits.

The defending conference champion Indians are now 3-0 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and 5-5 overall headed into today's big conference matchup at New Holstein (2-0 EWC, 4-0 overall).

On Saturday, Kewaskum lost, 5-3, to Germantown (4-2)

after blowing a 3-1 lead in the fifth. But Gonring was encouraged by playing a quality team. Nuernberg was 2-for-4.

Last Thursday, Kewaskum beat EWC foe Plymouth, 5-1, on the road. Boegel pitched six innings and whiffed 12 while walking one. Kopeschka was 2-for-4 with a home run and two RBIs. Corey Burdick was 2-for-3 with a double and one

RBI, and Boegel was 2-for-4.

Today's game at New Holstein starts at 4 p.m., earlier than originally scheduled, to accommodate sectional soccer at 7 p.m. After that, Kewaskum hosts EWC foe Sheboygan Falls (2-1 EWC, 5-2) on Monday and non-conference opponent Southwest Wisconsin Christian Homeschool Athletics (12-9).
