WES to combine class - parents perturbed

Several Wayne Elementary School parents blasted the Kewaskum School Board on Monday after they found out last week that first- and second-grade classes would be combining this fall due to low enrollment.

A letter arriving home last Friday was the first most parents heard of it, aside from some members of the parent teacher organization. Parents claimed that wasn't efficient notice and that combining the two grades isn't the best way to educate their children.

"I don't know what's going on. I feel very uninformed as a parent. I don't think that's fair as a parent," said Jennifer Rinzel, mother of a second-grader.

Tracy Herman said she was told combining classes was a last resort.

"Were other scenarios even looked at?" she said.

Julie Heino said the decision should have been discussed and made at an open meeting.

"I don't understand how this could be done. How could all this have happened without anybody knowing it?" she said.

Wayne and Farmington Principal Janet Molebash said she made the decision to combine classes on Monday, June 6.

"This was not an easy decision," she said. "The main reason we waited as long as we did is we waited for registrations to get back in."

The first-grade class went from 13 to nine - now all boys - and the combined classes will have 24 students.

Second-grade teacher Anne Wheeland will teach students the entire day,

aside from special classes like gym, etc., and 4K teacher Heather Collien will come in to help for half days during the afternoon, she said.

"How that will look I don't know," Molebash said.

The model on how students will be taught will be determined this summer, she said.

Parents expressed concern that given the late notice it is now too late to open enroll their children to another district. Had they known combining was a possibility earlier, some would have at least explored the option.

Molebash said did research and put thought into the decision to combine.

"I wasn't going to make a rash decision," she said.

In the end, she said she couldn't justify nine students in one class when 30 are in another. Neither could newly

hired interim superintendent David Ewald.

"At some point we must decide in Kewaskum schools do we have class sizes of nine," he said.

The letter said a 15-minute meeting to explain the scenario would be held the night before school starts, another bone of contention among the parents. They said 15 minutes was not enough time, not to mention the day before school.

Molebash said she and teachers will stay as long as needed that night to answer questions, and that she would dis



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KSD administrators will receive pay raises in 2011-12 budget

The Kewaskum School District's administrators will receive 1.6-percent pay increases this year after the School Board approved the bump Monday night.

The raises total \$14,000, but district business manager Paul Reichert said they will be losing a combined \$54,000 in compensation due to the budget repair law, which the State Supreme Court reinstated about 24 hours after the School Board meeting. Kewaskum had been budgeting as if the law was in effect.

The 1.6 percent raise is what the budget repair law recommended, Reichert said.

The board passed the raises, 5-2. Timothy Ramthun and Troy Hanson voted against. Neither explained their votes during the meeting but talked with the Statesman later.

While both said they support the administration, they said they

would have liked to see performance evaluations first.

"I need more data to make a yes vote for a wage issue like that," said Hanson.

Ramthun said he doesn't want to give raises without performance evaluations. He understood the School Board is supposed to do those but was told the board delegated that to administration and the evaluations weren't yet complete.

Ramthun said contracts were already in place so he wanted to hold off on the salary portion. He said the savings to the district of \$88,000 via the budget repair law - not yet reinstated during his conversation - could be better spent on teacher contracts, which are not yet completed. He said teachers should come first, before administration.

Ramthun said he would also rather see that money go toward textbooks.

He said he respects administrators and his decision was "not a people concern but a priority concern."

'Little bit scared, tiny bit sad'

For Kewaskum grads, this is only the beginning

Kewaskum High School sent 154 graduates out into that proverbial real world last Saturday, though not without years worth of memories that could last a lifetime.

Student speakers reminded their classmates of where they've been and that they're ready for where they're going. Both mentioned this was the class that helped start the Kewaskum Food Pantry.

"Once we leave this place today, things will never be the same," said Brandon Speirs. "Wherever we all go in the future we will always have the memories of the past 13 years." Kate Winkler listed successful celebrities like Bill Gates, Oprah and Mark Zuckerberg, wondering who from her generation would be the next in this line. She reminded students they didn't get their start on their own. They had help from family, friends and educators, just like the class of 2011.

"Now we are set. We are molded for anything," she said. Winkler told her fellow graduates to hang on to their friends, those they sat with at lunch and with whom they trusted every word.

"Remember to keep them close. We have been shaped by everyone in this room. Now it is up to us to take what we've learned from them and believe what we see in us," she said. "Now we are ready to go, ready for the future because this was only the beginning."

Teacher Bill Lickel provided the farewell remarks, saying he did a survey among the adults. Nearly 70 percent of teachers and 60 percent of parents are at least "slightly sad to see you leave," he said, tongue in cheek.

He referenced the food pantry as well, and said the world needs the class to be a positive force as it already has been.

"You can help people just because it's the right thing to do," he said.

While graduation leaves people "a little bit scared and a tiny bit sad," Lickel said "We have hope for your future, faith in your abilities and loving memories in our hearts."

Beth Wodsedalek presented the class gift, two GPS units for school vans and tools for the maintenance department, and money for a new, hanging mural of an Indian in the Fieldhouse, after the Indian on the wall was painted over last fall.

Eighty of the 154

graduates either graduated with honors (3.0 grade-point average) or high honors (3.5). Valedictorians were Courtney Krueger and Valerie Paulus. Salutatorian was Rachel Ogi.

Four graduates are going into the military. Coleman Bartow has joined the Army National Guard, Joel Bentley the Army, and Nicholas Ray and Dillon Thelen the Marines. The crowd gave them a standing ovation.

Associate Principal Kristine Dreher said she will miss the "little conversations we've had over the years" and provided some advice.

"Stand up for what you believe in. Be true to yourself," she said. "Continue to build the bridges for your successes."

Wayne

Discuss the issue with parents in July.

Some parents said they were worried that Wheiland, though a good teacher, is also assistant principal. Time would be taken out of her day from teaching for disciplinary and other issues, they said.

Molebash said Wheiland's title is director of discipline and that she only takes care of those duties during recess or lunch; she does not leave class.

Parents expressed their concerns during the public comment portion near the start of the meeting as the issue was not on the agenda. In other business, the board voted down adding a "community participation" element that would allow the public to speak at the end of meetings as well.

Newly elected board member Troy Hanson suggested the addition. He said the first public comment session could address what happened at prior meetings or in between meetings. The second could address that same night's meetings.

Former board member Jim

Leister said it gives "another opportunity to communicate." Ewald said to have public comment twice at meetings would be "extreme overkill" and "could be a big problem."

Board member Mary Miller said the law doesn't allow board discussion on items not on the agenda, so the board could only listen to what the public discusses.

Board president Bruce Braidigan said he had "a lot of concerns" over adding a second public comment session and said the board "kind of broke the law" on Monday.

"We're going to open ourselves up to a big can of worms," he said.

Hanson said he wanted to implement the change at Monday's meeting.

Board member Steven Jensen said the agenda listed the community participation to be done at "future meetings" and, raising his voice, said he didn't want the board to get in trouble because "someone is running amok." He suggested the crowd upset at the Wayne issue come to subcommittee meet-

ings where issues are debated yet nobody attends, though the board had a difficult time in picking out at which subcommittee meeting the parents should attend to discuss combining classes, and decided the Finance Committee would be best.

Jensen said some people came to the meeting to "campaign" as he glared at Leister, who often interacted with the board and administrators at the meeting while standing behind a bookshelf with a few others. Leister lost his seat on the board by several votes in April and requested a recount that didn't change the outcome.

Hanson amended his motion to include future meetings and not Monday's meeting. The board voted down the idea, 5-2, with Hanson and Timothy Ramthun voting for it.

On Tuesday, Hanson expressed his disappointment with the board and Ewald.

"All they did last night is to solidify that they weren't being listened to. I was blown away. I really was," he said.



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Centenarian believes in keeping busy

Ray Schaefer, who turned 100 on April 20, affirms there are three factors to his longevity -- being a non-smoker, a non-drinker and remaining busy -- being involved in an active lifestyle.

The Town of Kewaskum resident isn't just talking the talk, but walking the walk, and then some. For the past 10 years, the retired dairy farmer has belonged to the Half Century Class, an exercise program for those 50 and up, at the Kettle Moraine YMCA in West Bend.

According to Laura Balkevich, fitness director at the YMCA, the class is held for one hour each Monday, Wednesday and Friday and includes chair exercises, strength training, exercises with ther-a-bands and light weights, muscle-toning exercises, and cardio workouts -- all of these led by an instructor.

One of the more complicated, fast-moving dance routines in a cardio workout is known as the grapevine. "Ray would jump right out of his seat and join in," Balkevich said, regarding the grapevine. "He has a great personality and spirit and is a go-getter."

His Half Century classmates hosted a party for Ray on his birthday, at the YMCA. "He

wanted to celebrate his birthday with his Y family," said Shanna Leider, Kettle Moraine YMCA marketing director.

About 30 people, including some YMCA staff members were present for the gala event. They sang "Happy Birthday" to Ray and enjoyed homemade baked treats and conversation in a room decorated with balloons.

Ray attended a second birthday party at Hon-E-Kor Golf and Country Club in Kewaskum on April 23. Ninety-two family members, friends and acquaintances were present. Unfortunately, he fell during the event, due to having fractured his hip.

Despite this injury, he remained present throughout the dinner and slideshow, featuring photographs of him and his family, taken throughout his lifetime.

The following day, Ray underwent surgery at a Milwaukee-based hospital and is currently undergoing therapy at the Samaritan Health Care Center in West Bend and making good progress.

Regarding his feelings of having reached the age of 100, he said, "It feels good, but I am no longer a young man and not as fresh as I think I am."

Ray has witnessed dramatic changes during his 10 decades, noting, "We went from horse

and buggy days to what we have today," adding that he considers the computer as the most intriguing invention during his lifetime."

The son of the late Emma and Louis Schaefer, Ray was born on April 20, 1911 in the farmhouse where he has resided ever since, at 3200 County Road H. He had one sister, who died in 1974.

On Oct. 13, 1934, he married the late Agnes (Meilahn) Schaefer at St. Lucas Evangelical Lutheran Church in Kewaskum. After nearly 66 years of marriage, Agnes passed away on June 2, 2000.

The couple had three children -- David Schaefer, Kewaskum; Dan Schaefer, Madison; and Audray Weisen, Cleveland, Ohio. Ray has six grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

During his farming career, he began by milking cows on his 220-acre farm he took over from his dad. In 1946, he had an auction and sold his dairy cows, converting the barn to handle

beef cattle. He retired in 1985. His son David took over the farming operation at that time. Currently David maintains a herd of cattle on Ray's farm.

Throughout his life Ray earned a Washington County Conservation award and served on his church council for St. Lucas Evangelical Lutheran Church. He was also a member of the Kewaskum Board of Education a number of years ago.

Ray has been legally blind since 1994, so he has had a caretaker residing with him at his home.

Ray is a charter member of the Kiwanis Club of Kewaskum, which was chartered in 1947. The club currently meets each Monday evening at the Old Hotel, in Kewaskum. When Ray joined the organization, meetings were held in the basement of Peace United Church of Christ in Kewaskum. Kiwanis is a service organization with a mission of bringing aid to children in need. Until the time of his injury, he faithfully attended club meetings.

According to Larry Ammel, former president of the Kiwanis

Club of Kewaskum from 2002-04, Ray has been a very active member of the group and faithful participant at weekly meetings. "He has handed out turkeys at the annual turkey shoot up until two years ago," Ammel said, noting that the turkey shoot is held the second Saturday of September at the New Fane Sportsman's Club.





Indian mural returns to Fieldhouse wall

An image of an Indian is back on the wall of the Kewaskum High School Fieldhouse, although this time it's mobile in case reaction to a state law calls for it to be removed.

Four seniors worked on the mural, and the class of 2011 got to see it first. It was unveiled at graduation practice last Friday. Rachael Gonias, Terrina Fellenz, Georgiana Abfall and Kelsey Koller worked together

to complete the mural in about 15 hours, including on Memorial Day.

The group was impressed with its work.

"I'm really proud of it," said Fellenz.

"Better than I thought it would be," said Gonias.

"It's better than a big K," said Abfall.

"Pretty good," said Koller. "I think it was good that we brought back the Indian."

Painted over during teacher's convention weekend last fall. Superintendent Michael Krumm took responsibility, claiming the image put the

instead of the accuser proving why it is.

Krumm said authenticity would be a key defense if the district was challenged, and the old image, a class gift from 1976, was not authentic.

A portion of the community, including students and the class of '76, became upset at Krumm, not only for having the Indian painted over, but for not telling the public about the plan beforehand.

"I was really upset. I felt like they should have told us before doing it," said Fellenz.

"I was mad," said Abfall.

"Disrespectful," said Gonias.

While at first administration and the School Board turned down the idea of a new mural on the wall, high school principal Tom Fischer and newly elected School Board member Timothy Ramthun convinced the board it was a good idea. A Mascot Subcommittee was even formed in case Kewaskum, named after a Pottawotomi Indian Chief, Kewaskum, had to switch nicknames.

The new image is based on a photo in the Village Hall. A big key is the image is hung instead of painted right on the wall.

"This way if they have to take it down from there they can put it somewhere else," said Fellenz.

Student Council picked up the cost for the wood frame and the shop class did the framing.

VILLAGE BOARD MEETING MAY 16, 2011 7:00 P.M.

The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. Board members present were Craig Garbisch, Harry Roecker, Mike Berger, Andy Pesch, Norman Kufahl, Kevin Scheunemann, and Jim Hovland. Staff members present were Matt Heiser, Mark Groeschel, Richard Knoebel, Jerry Gilman, Janet Knops, Stephanie Justmann, Jim Noren and John Knepel from Baker Tilly. The news media and members from the community were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office, and at the Municipal Building on May 12, 2011. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer, and the News Media.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Jim Hovland to approve the minutes from the May 2, 2011 meeting, second by Craig Garbisch. Voice vote, motion carried.

David Cooper from Family Dairies was on hand to review a request to amend the sanitary sewer surcharge for the 2011 first quarter billing. David Cooper reported on the spike in the February 2011 billing and changes in state certified lab being used. Family Dairies has experienced a difference in lab testing results since a different State Certified Lab Testing facility started being used in October 2010. Historically the billings for sanitary sewer charges have been consistent. In February 2011 the sample may have been compromised therefore triggering the spike in costs. The spike in costs has caused the cost per truck wash to go from \$38.00 to \$99.00. Mr. Cooper asked the Board to consider averaging the February billing.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to suspend the rules and bring up items C then A and B under New

Business: "Discussion and possible action on request by Family Dairies to amend sanitary sewer surcharge for 2011 first quarter billing", "John Knepel, Baker Tilly Virchow Krause LLP, will present the audit prepared for the Village of Kewaskum for the year ended December 31, 2010", and Review and discussion on acceptance of the audit for the year ending December 31, 2010" second by Jim Hovland and carried by roll call vote. Garbisch-aye, Roecker-aye, Berger-aye, Pesch-aye, Kufahl-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye (7-0-0).

The Board discussed the option of utilizing different state certified labs for testing samples from Family Dairy and averaging the billing for February 2011 by using the previous eleven months of billings. Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to amend the billing for February by using the method that was used in December 2008 when they also experienced a high test level by billing Family Dairy for the actual concentration levels for one day and then charge them for an average concentration for the remaining days of the month, second by Craig Garbisch and carried by roll call vote. Garbisch-aye, Roecker-aye, Berger-aye, Pesch-aye, Kufahl-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye (6-1-0).

John Knepel from Baker Tilly Virchow Krause, LLP presented the 2010 audit. The Financial Statements were given an unqualified opinion and were presented "fairly" in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. The internal controls included all communications required under the professional standards and the Tax Incremental District Financial Statements activity was summarized from date of creation through December 31, 2010. The Governmental Funds and Enterprise Funds were reviewed showing the Sewer Utility rates were not sufficient in the past resulting in the General Fund borrowing the Sewer Utility approximately \$1.6 million. Other contributing factors included an estimate of approximately \$2 million in impact fees from the TID #2 that never materialized. The Village made the change of utilizing the State Health Insurance Plan in 2010 resulting in the Other Post Employment Benefits (OPEB) liability being removed from the Financial Statements.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to accept the audit as presented for the year ending December 31, 2010, second by Jim Hovland. Voice vote, motion carried.

Lady kickers finish sixth in EWC; Bohn named first team all conference

Despite finishing in sixth place of eight teams in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, Kewaskum had four players receive all-conference honors, three of whom for the third straight season.

Lightner had to move from her first team all-conference goalie position to defense after injuring her hand early in the season. EWC coaches recognized her contributions.

"She can play anywhere on the field. She picked up the defense quick," said Piwoni.

He said Lightner, a two-year captain, brought some intangibles, always staying

positive and helping out her teammates.

"She'll definitely be tough to replace for next year," he said.

Lightner and the Smallish twins have received all-conference honors for three years in a row.

"Her biggest games were non-conference games," Piwoni said of Bastian. "She really stepped in there and helped us."

In team awards, the players voted Lightner team MVP, Bohn offensive player of the year and Bastian defensive player of the year.

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'Contagious hitting' equals win for Indians

Coach Doug Gonring keeps referring to that old cliché: Hitting is contagious.

At times this season, Kewaskum's baseball team has contracted the plague.

Tuesday was the biggest outbreak yet as the Indians fell behind 4-0 in the first inning on two hits and two walks at home against Southeast Wisconsin Christian Homeschool Athletics (SWCA).

Down 5-0 in the bottom of the third and looking sluggish, Kewaskum got the snowball rolling down the hill for six runs on seven hits and one walk.

In the fourth inning, that snowball turned to an avalanche that buried SWCA. The Indians plated 11 runs on eight hits, three walks, one hit batter and one error. Three outs later, the game ended in five innings,

17-5, via the 10-run mercy rule. It was the largest inning of the season so far, topping June 7's nine- and eight-run innings in a 19-3 win at Campbellsport.

While the Indians have some prominent hitters, led by first team all-state player Brad Boegel, nobody had more than two hits in the game as Gonring inserted some junior varsity players to get experience since JV doesn't play this week.

"Once we get on a roll, hitting is contagious," Gonring said. "It's part of the game of baseball for years."

Boegel said once one Indian gets a hit, others want to follow.

"We get momentum on our side," he said.

It starts with the eyes. "Those walks help a lot. It makes everyone patient," Boegel said.

Lucas Kopeschka was 2-for-2 with a double and three RBIs. Brandon Chapman was 2-for-3 with one RBI and two

"We haven't been behind too often. This is a good little test to be down 5-nothing and come back," Gonring said.

The key is as simple as hitting the ball. Kewaskum struck out four times in the first two innings.

"We have to be able to put the ball in play," Gonring said. "If they have to pick the ball up, they will make mistakes."

Reaching base lets Kewaskum use one of its strengths this season, base running. That puts even more pressure on a defense.

"The kids have run hard," Gonring said.

From the JV team, Ethan Vetter hit a line drive single to left and Jake Hardy courtesy ran twice and scored two runs, one on what Gonring called "a hell of a slide" to the inside of the plate to avoid the tag.

"It only does your program

better giving these kids opportunities," Gonring said.

Mike Schladweiler started and got better after the rough first inning. Garrett Yahr pitched the final two innings and didn't allow a hit while whiffing four.

The Indians have now won four in a row, outscoring their opponents 54-15. They are 5-0 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and 8-5 overall heading in to today's game at Kiel (3-4 EWC, 7-7 overall). They host Plymouth (4-2, 6-4) Friday night and host next-door rival Campbellsport (2-5, 5-6) on Tuesday.

On Monday, the Indians beat up on Sheboygan Falls, 14-4, at home in six innings. Cody Nuernberg was 2-for-2 with a double and RBI. Tony Gonring was 2-for-4 with a double and three RBIs. Chapman was 1-for-2 with three RBIs.

Nuernberg pitched the first five innings and gave up four runs, whiffed four and walked three.

The Indians built a 9-2 lead through four innings and scored another five runs in the sixth to end it.

Falls is 3-2 in the EWC, 6-3 overall.

Last Thursday, the Indians beat New Holstein in a nine-inning thriller, 4-3. Junior shortstop Sam Olla hit a home run in the ninth that proved to be the winning margin.

Boegel pitched all nine innings, throwing 120 pitches, Gonring said. He whiffed 10 and walked one.

At the plate, Boegel was 3-for-5 with a double, home run and one RBI. Olla was 2-for-5 with a double, RBI and two runs.

"That was a very good baseball game," Gonring said. "They had the lead; we got the lead; they tied it."
