


Ballers learn 'Skills for Life'

TOWN OF FARMINGTON

The car lying upside down in the ditch, t-boned against another right side up, was fake. This time.

Emergency personnel from Fillmore, Newburg and Waubeka know it all to be too real.

The three units combined on training exercise complete with fake blood Monday night at the corner of Highway M and River Road. Two people had to be extricated from both vehicles, each with its own set of challenges.

Aside from rehearsing their skills in a realistic simulation, the three departments got practice in working together, which they do often given the borders of their coverage areas. "That's probably the number one goal," said Ryan Mueller, an EMS lieutenant with the

Newburg Fire Department. "Kind of a team-building moment. You understand what each other has to do.

Practicing together helps since each department has its own way of doing things, said Eric Spaeth, first responder lieutenant with the Fillmore Fire Department.

"You've got to rely on other departments for mutual aid," he said.

The better they know each other, the better they can respond.

"It's very good because you know who they are and you know their skill level," said Pete Wagner, member of the Waubeka Fire Department.

Wagner said some "hiccups" in communication occurred on Monday but were cleared up at the scene.

"Communication is always critical," he said.

Personnel knew they

would be responding to an accident but not what kind. The page went out about 7 p.m.

"We want to make it as realistic as possible so that they don't know what's coming," said Spaeth.

Crews peeled off the roof and windshield of the right side up car and slid the victims out the back. Crews placed wooden blocks under one end of the upside down car to prop it up, then peeled off sheet metal to cut door hinges and open them backward to get to the victims. It never rained, but mud puddle developed next to the car and crews worked through it.

"It wasn't that muddy when we placed the cars there," said Spaeth.

Victims were taken in an ambulance and driven around the block as emergency medical technicians called St. Joseph's Hospital to describe

injuries and receive approval to administer drugs for treatment.

More than 20 people combined worked on the cars at any given time. More than 35 participated.

"This is actually an excellent educational experience. It gives some of the newer members time to hone their skills under a realistic situation," said Wagner, a 30-year veteran who said he still responds to situations he has never seen.

One of the victims was Derrick Biermann, a 2008 Kewaskum grad and former classmate of Spaeth's from the Town of Farmington. Crews asked how he was doing and told him to prepare for loud noises when they cut out the doors. Biermann had a

broken femur and a cut on his forehead. He laid on the ceiling as the passenger in the upside down car.

"I was fine. I was on my stomach," he said.

Flight For Life didn't participate because of the fog.

Spaeth said fire department practices are held a couple of times per month, but larger scenes like Monday's are rare.

Are you aware that our School Board, our employees, voted to approve a 1.6% increase for the administration despite the lack of performance evaluations? That is unacceptable.

After attending the school

board meeting on June 13th, to address some of my concerns with current events at Wayne Elementary School, I quickly discovered there are much deeper concerns at a District level.

A parent from Kewaskum Elementary came forward looking for a plan of action on a series of issues her family had to endure the past school year. Instead of receiving reassurance that the issues were going to be evaluated and that they would get back to her in a specific period of time, she was addressed in a very dismissive manner. I felt the exchange was highly condescending to the parent. That is unacceptable.

A real jaw dropper, the attendees were "forcefully scolded" by a veteran school board member, our employee, for not attending a committee

meeting... a committee meeting by the way, that the board was not certain would be the proper place to discuss the current concerns. Parents are bringing forward their concerns for their children's education; being scolded by an employee, is unacceptable.

When Mr. Hanson proposed a motion that would provide an additional communication opportunity between parents/teachers/taxpayers with our school board, it was voted down 5-2. The ability to bring things up as a public forum at the tail end of the meeting could be vital to brainstorming solutions, or addressing concerns before they are becoming bigger issues.

As the meeting went on, I had questions I wanted to ask and new concerns that perhaps should have been brought up. Instead of being able to

address them that night with all board members present, we are expected to wait until a committee meeting to do so. My understanding is that the Policy Committee is scheduled to meet in September. The last Buildings and Grounds Committee meeting met in March with no further meetings scheduled as of yet, and the Finance Committee will meet right before the next school board meeting... which means that it will be another month before any concerns could be addressed... IF that is the correct committee meeting we should be attending.

My understanding is that board members can not vote on anything not on the night's agenda... understandably. I don't believe any of us were asking for that. What this motion

Globetrotters' Curley Boo teaches 'Skills for Life'

Kewaskum never had a basketball camp like this before, not one run by a retired pro player.

Curley "Boo" Johnson, known as the world's greatest dribbler when he played with the Harlem Globetrotters, brought instant credibility to his week-long camp last week at Kewaskum Elementary School.

It was Kewaskum's Jenni Kieckhafer who brought Johnson here. The two had mutual friends and bumped into each other at Los Angeles International Airport. They got to talking online, and Kieckhafer, a former college hoops player herself, had planned to take her children to Johnson's camp in Peoria when the two developed the idea to hold one in Kewaskum.

Johnson said he got the "entertainment" portion out of the way on the first day, showing off his dribbling skills. What he told children off the court was as important as what he showed them on it.

"First and foremost they're here for basketball so I basically gave my life story," he said.

Johnson played professionally for 18 years, from 1988 to 2006, with the Globetrotters. He insists he is a basketball player first, an entertainer second.

Johnson is a Peoria, Ill. native who attended Loras College in Dubuque, Iowa. He starred in basketball both places, and at the end of college received a letter from then Los Angeles Lakers coach Pat Riley asking him to play in the prestigious California summer league with NBA stars.

But the Globetrotters offered a contract, and Johnson didn't have any money. He ended up traveling to 81 countries with the Globetrotters, including seeing Pope John Paul II, Nelson Mandela and Mother Theresa; and he was part of the team when the Globetrotters were inducted into the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame in 2002.

Curley is Johnson's given name and it was his father, the first black player in Bradley history who led the school to a national title in 1957, who nicknamed him "Boo." He is not related to "Curley" Neal.

Growing up, Johnson said he had a good friend who was better than him in every sport except basketball. While Johnson made the right decisions, his friend got caught up in drugs. Johnson tried to keep in touch and once ran into his friend in a prison in Ohio. Johnson was there as a guest speaker; his friend was an inmate.

In college, Johnson roomed with the backup point guard and, despite the two being friends, proceeded to kick his butt every day in practice. Sometimes, the two wouldn't talk all night afterward.

Johnson has met Michael Jordan and once played him one-on-one and in pickup games during Jordan's comeback after baseball. That was Johnson's example of respecting one's opponent without being in awe. He remembers in a pickup game Jordan faked out a 6-7 player, drove the lane and faked out teammate Bill Wennington and Craig Johnson (Barack Obama's brother-in-law).

Johnson was in the lane watching while he should have helped on defense.

"I was stuck in my tracks," he said.

During a make it, take it one-on-one game, Johnson scored twice before losing to Jordan, 10-2, hence the lesson on beating an opponent despite being respectful.

"It was a good thing I got the ball first," he said. "He's my friend but he treated me like I slapped his momma."

In college, Johnson developed his around his head dribbling move.

"You can't put a patent on what you do with a basketball. At times I wish I could have."

Beyond teaching the physical fundamentals, Johnson focused on the mental aspect of the game, something

many children don't yet understand.

"Talent is probably 60 percent of it and mental toughness, determination is 40 percent," he said. "Now they call it passion."

The key to his camp, he said, is to teach fundamentals but make it fun. He made it clear he is not a high school basketball coach.

"I let 'em play," he said. "You go to a camp where they're doing drills all day, but it's not going to be very fun," he said.

Johnson said he is good with children and ran about 75 camps in the off-season as a Globetrotter.

"Maybe it's 'cause I'm still a kid. My job didn't force me to seriously grow up," he said.

Johnson has his campers play actual games with scorekeeping and awards.

"You have to make these camps fun," he said. "You can be authoritarian and be a nice guy at the same time."

It's hard to tell Johnson is a star given his down-to-earth, unassuming disposition, not to mention his average size of 5-11, but he had no trouble keeping the attention of the 72 children or high school and adult helpers.

"It was a lot of fun. It was a lot of practicing," said Bree Trepes of the Town of Farmington.

"Really good experience. I learned some new moves," said Felix Chavez of West Bend.

Some area high school and college players helped out as coaches of the 9-to-14-year-olds. Even some of the high schoolers picked up some tips.

"A lot of it was respect and how to play with each other," said Kewaskum guard Mallorie Kreis. "Learn how to play with other people and just have a good attitude."

"Respect for our teammates," said forward Ashlee Stahl.

Point guard Eric Perkins said he was aware of the game's mental aspect but, like everyone else, was blown away by the dribbling exhibition.

"It was ridiculous the stuff he can do to what I think I can do," he said.

"He did, like, the best ball handling I've ever seen," said Trepes.

"It was really exciting being up close," said Chavez.

Kieckhafer served as camp director and Kewaskum Youth Basketball hosted the camp. She put the week together in three months. Next year, she said, she'll have a year to plan.

"It went really smooth. The kids are excited for next year," she said.

Johnson, given some Kewaskum Indians gear during the award ceremony on the final day, said he will come back.

But he said a referee gave him a bad roll, and Johnson kept backing up. He ended up next to the basket when a teammate yelled "Kick it in!"

Johnson booted the ball high into the air as he and 18,000 people watched. The ball came down through the middle of the hoop so much that it barely touched the bottom of the net.

"The most improbable shot I've ever tried," he said.

The game couldn't even start on time. The crowd gave a 10-minute ovation.

Johnson said the owner of the Globetrotters came to him after the game and said he thought it would be a good idea to try that move every night. Knowing its rarity, Johnson was quick to put that one to bed, and he never did it again.

Along with many other concerned parents, I attended the June 13 school board meeting. I was very pleased at the large number of parents who came to voice concerns about the board's direction. The board has told us countless times that all decisions are made with the best interests of our children in mind. I find that hard to believe when they say one thing yet do another. For example, we were told they regrettably had to combine 2 grades into one class at Wayne Elementary due to budget constraints and

eliminate a position. Yet, they then took that 'saved money' and gave the administration a 1.6% pay raise -- approved by a vote of 5 - 2.

We were also told there is a current budget surplus of \$350,000- \$500,000 and enough funds for a 1/2 position at \$40,000 to help with the newly combined grades at Wayne. So, in a \$21 million budget, how can we not find another \$40,000 needed to fund a full-time teacher for the students at Wayne Elementary to keep the grades separate?

The board has also told us that communications between the board and the public is key to a successful school district. But when the board had the opportunity to add an additional 15 minutes at the end of that meeting for community participation, it was voted down by the same vote of 5 - 2: by the same voting parties.

Board members always encourage the public to express their opinions and attend board meetings. When the community overwhelmingly attends a meeting, they are now told to take their concerns to a sub-committee or that they are campaigning or grandstanding. It should not matter where I, or anyone else, sits or stands in a room. What matters is that those attending are engaged; a campaign is to inform and influence opinions with both helpful and more informed dialogue.

I look forward to continuing to listen to the concerns of the public and whenever possible, assist in voicing their concerns to the board in open meetings.

Campbellsport man killed in silo incident

TOWN of EDEN- A 49-year-old Campbellsport area man was killed Monday afternoon after falling into a silo.

According to a press release, Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Deputies, Eden First Responders and The Campbellsport Fire Department and Ambulance were dispatched to N2759 Hilltop

Dr. at 1:53 p.m. for a man who became trapped in a silo auger after he lost his balance and fell feet first into the auger. Flight for Life Helicopter was later dispatched and responded.

The Sheriff's Office reported that four employees of the Philip Majerus Dairy Farm were working in the silo cleaning out old feed when Mark Krewald fell. Another employ-

ee was able to shut the auger down, however Krewald's legs remained entangled in the auger.

After approximately 40 minutes, rescuers were able to free the man and he was taken to the helicopter standing by at the scene. A short time later the man died as a result of the traumatic injuries he sustained.

The auger inside a silo is commonly used to pull material to a blower.

Investigators from the Sheriff's Office are working with the Medical Examiner at the scene.

Ewald officially given interim superintendent position

The Kewaskum School District officially has an interim district administrator after the School Board unanimously approved the contract on Monday.

A contract for David Ewald, a retired superintendent who served South Milwaukee in that capacity the past 11 years, was retroactive to June 6.

Ewald will be paid \$435 per day and for expenses covered under School Board policy for three days per week, less if his duties are addressed and he provides the School Board

prior notice. He may work more than three days per week with concurrence of the School Board and recommendation of the leadership team.

Ewald replaces Mike Krumm, who is retiring this year.

Ewald is slated to serve until the board selects a new superintendent.

The Board's last experience with an interim superintendent was Scott Peterson who served after the resignation of Wayne Graczyk. The board in 2005 approved spending \$289 per day for Peterson.

When Evan Kelley, a Marquette University junior, studying at Sophia University in Tokyo, Japan this year, set out with friends on March 11 to hike Mount Takao, about 300 miles from Sendai, he anticipated a four-hour trek.

What he had not bargained for was that a 9.0 magnitude earthquake and subsequent tsunami would devastate Sendai that day, resulting in a halt to train service. The contingent of five students had taken the train to Takao, some 35 miles from their dormitory in Musashi-Koganei. Due to the disaster, they would be forced to hike some 13 hours to return to the dorm. They began their venture at 9 a.m. -- returning to their dorm at 1:30 a.m. the following day.

Evan is the son of Dennis and Monica Kelley, Fond du Lac. Evan's grandparents are Joe and Taeko Gruber, Town of Auburn. Taeko is a native of Okinawa, Japan, and Joe met her there while he was stationed in Okinawa with the U.S. Army in the Korean War.

Joe took Evan to Okinawa during his senior year at Campbellsport High (2007-08), to visit with relatives and for Evan to attend an agricultural high school for a few days while there. Evan has been smitten with Japan ever since, planning to live and work there after his college graduation.

He aspires to either apply for the JET (The Japan Exchange and Teaching Programme), a program offered through the Japanese government, hiring adults with Bachelor's degrees, whose native language is English, to teach English as a second language to Japanese students. Or, he may enter the Peace Corps and be stationed in Japan.

"I want to live in Japan," Evan affirmed. "I love the culture there, and the people

are very friendly, nationalistic, accommodating and polite. They are so helpful to foreigners."

At Marquette, Evan is majoring in international affairs, with a concentration in East Asian studies. At Sophia University, he enrolled in the FLA (Faculty of Liberal Arts) program, in which classes are taught in English. He completed courses in Japanese, Japanese religion and Japanese literature during the first semester, which runs from October through the end of January.

During his spring break this year from February to April, he and four friends, also students this year at Sophia University, Marquette University's sister school, did some sightseeing. Mount Takao was one of the places they visited.

"An hour into our way down the mountain, Alex, Yuki and I felt dizzy and light-headed," Evan recalled. "I mentioned to Alex that I felt like I was experiencing vertigo."

They noticed too that a group of elementary students they had met at a rest stop on the mountain suddenly ran down the mountain. Evan thinks perhaps someone alerted them via cell phone about the earthquake, adding that no one in his group, however, was able to get a signal, so the five of them were not aware of the disaster until later.

Upon their descent, they purchased some souvenirs, and the shopkeeper informed them about the earthquake, which had occurred around 1:30 p.m. That was the time that three of the students experienced light-headedness.

They arrived at the train station and waited an hour, but unfortunately there was no service. So they walked to the next train station, another 45-minute hike. "We heard there that the trains might not be running," Evan said. "So we walked another 15 minutes to the next station.

By that time, "We were

exhausted. There were some officers there who said that the trains would not be running that day and suggested we get on a bus instead."

Around that time, Evan received some e-mails on his cell phone from his parents, officials of Marquette University and officials of Sophia University. They wanted to know if Evan was safe, in the wake of the disaster. (Thirty percent of that university's FLA Program enrollees are international students).

"It wasn't until then that we realized the severity of the earthquake and tsunami," he said. "I e-mailed back that I was fine."

The five students walked another 90 minutes. At 7 p.m., they reached a bus station. When a bus finally stopped, it was completely full. "The bus driver said there was no more room," Evan said. "He also told us that it was the last bus."

At 8:30 p.m., they arrived at a city about 17 miles from their dormitory. "We could not walk any farther because of a mountain range there," Evan noted. "An officer told us about a monorail that runs north and south, so we took that, but then we still had to walk another three hours to arrive back at the dorm."

Upon reaching the dormitory, they discovered the occupants sitting outside on lawn chairs in the middle of the street. "My friend Aaron ran up to me and gave me a huge hug," Evan said.

He began hearing accounts of friends who were involved in the earthquake. "One of my friends, Mark Garrett from England, was in Yokohama with his girlfriend at the time. They were under one of the world's largest Ferris wheels, when the Ferris wheel began swaying," Evan said. "He thought he would die."

Fortunately, they were able



to reach safety. This friend's girlfriend Chihiro Sato's family resided within 30 miles of the Fukushima nuclear power station, which experienced explosions in the wake of the earthquake and tsunami.

Due to the dangerous radiation levels in the vicinity following the explosions, "Her family members had to evacuate, and they are living with relatives in Tokyo," Evan noted.

In another account, two dorm residents had been studying at the time of the earthquake. "Aaron was sitting

at his computer, and the room started shaking," Evan said. "It went on for 20 seconds and then got fierce. He walked out into the hall and had to shout to the other student.

"As they were talking, the security doors slammed shut, blocking them from each other in separate hallways. Then they ran outside."

Meanwhile, Evan had purchased an airline ticket to Okinawa, planning to spend two weeks there visiting his relatives and members of the family with whom he had resided while

attending the agricultural high school for a few days back in 2007.

"I was really looking forward to seeing my relatives and friends," he said. "He flew to Okinawa, about 1,000 miles from Tokyo, on March 15.

"The morning after I got there, I received a call from my adviser at Marquette, she wanted to know how I was, and I said fine. She called again the following morning to say the Emergency Disaster Board required I had to return home.

They had purchased my ticket out of Okinawa," Evan stated.

Evan was devastated. "I only had one full day in Okinawa," he said. "And I only had one hour to see my host family from 2007. I felt really sad too, because I realized I lost a whole semester there, and classes for second semester at Marquette had started in January."

Evan has revised his study itinerary and has come up with a plan. He left June 2 for Tokyo. "I will spend two weeks there to say goodbye to my friends.

Sophia University has cancelled their programs for this spring and summer."

Evan will spend one month studying at Sogang University, a Jesuit university in Seoul, Korea. His courses will include Korean literature, Korean War narratives, Korean cinema and Korean politics. He will return to Marquette for the fall semester and would like to return to Sophia University in Tokyo for the spring 2012 semester.





CAMPBELLSPORT - Brad Boegel did it again and he didn't want to talk about it, using that classic sibling line.

"My brother started it," he said after a final at-bat win at Campbellsport.

Well, yes. Little brother Brett, a lefty, started the one-run rally with a two-out single through the shortstop hole as the shift was on.

Two batters later, big brother finished it.

After Brett, leadoff hitter Sam Olla dribbled a grounder to third and sped down the line for a single. With two on and two out, up stepped Brad with the game tied, 4-4.

The junior smashed a line drive to left field. The Cougar left fielder took a couple of steps in and realized too late it

was over his head.

Brett came around to score and the Indians escaped to remain undefeated in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference.

It was Brett's first varsity hit, something Brad was more excited about than his own game-winner.

"To see him get a hit, that made my day," Brad said, "and then to score him..."

Brad said the two often practice at a field near their home.

"He helps me just as much as I help him," he said.

Fate may have helped in Tuesday's dramatics. Mother Nature inspired the game be moved from Kewaskum to Campbellsport after an afternoon storm made Kewaskum's field too wet to play. The junior varsity teams were scheduled to play at Campbellsport, but that game got rescheduled as the varsity game took priority.

Brett is a junior varsity player. He never would have played in the varsity game if both games went as planned.

Coach Doug Gonring said he brought Brett up to give him more varsity experience. The seventh-inning at-bat was his first appearance in the game. His jersey didn't even have his name on it.

But Gonring doesn't call teams junior varsity anymore, not midway through the season.

"At this point in time they're on the Kewaskum Indians baseball team. (Junior varsity) is our minor league," he said. "Brett Boegel made a hell of an at-bat."

It took major league perseverance to pull this one out. Brad Boegel was 1-for-2 with an RBI sac fly when he came up in the final inning. Gonring

described his first two plate appearances as "somewhat horrible."

Boegel wasn't exactly happy with himself, either. He was tagged out at home earlier in the game while not sliding, and wanted to make up for it. That calmed any nerves he would have had.

"I was just looking to hit the ball in a gap pretty much. Just hit the ball hard," he said. "I didn't want to let the team down."

The team almost let itself down, building a 4-1 lead through five innings. The Indians stranded 11 runners in the first six innings and had base running blunders that blew more scoring chances.

Mike Schladweiler started and went 5 2/3 innings, allowing four runs on five hits, whiffing five and walking three.

Brad Boegel relieved in the sixth, allowing an RBI to score an inherited runner, and got out of a first-and-third jam in the seventh with a strikeout looking.

The Indians scored two runs in the third. Olla roped double to right center, took third on a wild pitch and scored on a Boegel sac fly. Garrett Yahr reached on an error, and Austin Goeden knocked him in with a line drive to left.

Kewaskum got one run in the first inning after Olla was hit by a pitch, stole second and took third on a wild pitch. Tony Gonring singled to right center to bring him home.

Kewaskum is now 8-0 in the EWC (11-5 overall), two and half games up on Sheboygan Falls' 6-3. Kiel and Plymouth are both at 5-5.

Looming is a rematch Friday night against New Holstein at home. On June 9 on the road, Boegel threw 120 pitches in nine innings and Olla hit a ninth-inning homer that was the difference in a 4-3 victory. As of Tuesday, New Holstein was 3-5 in the EWC, 6-5 over-

all.

The Indians play at non-conference foe New Berlin Eisenhower on Saturday and return to EWC play at Sheboygan Falls on Monday.

Kewaskum took a 6-1 lead through two innings. Boegel pitched the first three and Cody Nuernberg the final four. Boegel allowed one run on two hits, whiffed two and walked one. Nuernberg allowed two hits and whiffed six.

"I felt like I had my stuff today, felt like I had my velocity," Nuernberg said.

At the plate, Nuernberg clocked a three-run homer over the left-field fence in the second, and scored three runs. It was the second straight day Nuernberg homered.
