Board member Steve Jensen said he would like all the footage unedited, and Hanson and the rest of the board agreed.

Hanson said he was told the district's website cannot hold two hours worth of video. He said options would be explored.

A cost estimate on filming the meetings was not yet available.

Education esteemed in Okinawa

When students and their parents encounter teachers outside the school setting in Okinawa, Japan, they bow to the instructors. Okinawan students do likewise upon greeting their teachers in the classroom each morning.

Teachers are highly respected in Okinawa, and are very well compensated for their work. This is the word from Hatsue Yoshimoto, daughter of Joe Gruber, town of Auburn resident, and from Shizue Okamura, Joe's sister-in-law.

Hatsue and Shizue, Okinawa residents, are retired teachers, each with 38 years of experience. They both retired within the past 13 years.

The two women, along with Shizue's grandson Keito, 9, arrived Sept. 1 for a month-long visit with Joe

and his wife Taeko, Shizue's sister.

Hatsue first visited the United States in 1980, and Shizue, in 2000. Since then, the two have come to spend time with the Grubers annually. This year's visit is particularly significant, because Joe and Taeko celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary on July 5, so a celebration was on their travel itinerary.

Joe and Taeko were married in Okinawa in 1951. Joe met Taeko there while serving in the U.S. Army during the Korean War. The late Father Valentine Thibedeau, a Capuchin priest, who attended Mount Calvary Seminary in Fond du Lac County, and who was involved in missionary work in Okinawa, performed the ceremony.

The Grubers commemorated their anniversary on Sept. 4, with a dinner for their 10 children and spouses, Hatsue, Shizue and Keito at Sebastian's

Steak House in Fond du Lac. A few of the relatives provided musical entertainment. One of these was Keito, who played the sanshin, a three-stringed, fretless, plucked instrument with a long fingerboard. He also sang traditional Okinawan tunes.

Meanwhile, Hatsue and Shizue enjoy sharing information about their culture with interested area residents. On Sept. 8, they discussed education in Okinawa with a Statesman correspondent, with Taeko graciously taking on the role of interpreter, whenever necessary, because Hogan is the native language of Okinawa. The group gathered around the Grubers' kitchen table, enjoying tea and authentic Okinawan doughnuts, during the conversation.

Gov. Walker approves project at West Bend airport


Governor Scott Walker has approved a \$422,032 project to reconstruct pavements at the West Bend Municipal Airport. The Governor's action releases \$10,560 in state funds to help complete the project. The city of West Bend is also contributing \$10,560 and the Federal Aviation Administration is providing \$400,912.

According to Craig Butler, airport project manager with the Wisconsin Department of Transportation, the project will reconstruct the parallel taxiway along the airport's primary runway and also complete pavement repairs to the terminal apron area where aircraft taxi and park. The pavement's deteriorating condition has become a safety and maintenance issue.

Work on the project should be completed in the fall of 2011.

Facilities at the West Bend Municipal Airport include the 4,500-foot primary runway and 3,900-foot secondary runway

that together accommodate a variety of economic activity including some 60,000 aircraft take-offs and landings each year.

Points-Of-Interest: Several. Dated questions unanswered, lack of responsiveness to agenda item requests, I-Pad expense (current use) clarification, 48 projects/\$520,543.00; all lack proper follow-up and closure. Please know that efforts to obtain answers and to hold those responsible and accountable will continue, until all are resolved. Recently, supportive feedback about forward movement did come from the Superintendent, so there is anticipated hope. I promise to continue pursuit of justice in these types of matters and will keep you informed...

Recent news about Berlin High School being told by the DPI that they needed to change their Native-American Mascot, fuels our community need for an update. To that end, please know that I am in direct communications with State reps Glenn Grothman, Daniel LeMahieu and Speaker Fitzgerald's offices on: 1) repealing the existing law or 2) amending the existing law to put the burden of discrimination proof on any complaint. My personal preference is #1 as the current law (my opinion) is in itself reverse discrimination, and I will go to Madison to have that discussion if needed. The Washington County Full Service Clean Sweep is an opportunity for county residents to properly dispose or recycle unwanted hazardous chemicals, electronic goods, pharmaceutical medication, and used tires. This is the second event being held this year for the Full Service Clean Sweep Program which is coordinated by the Land and Water Conservation Division of the Planning and Parks Department; partnering with the County's Health Department, Sheriff's Department and the Highway Department.

The drive-through collection stations make this program simple and efficient for participants. A \$10.00 preregistration fee is required for the hazardous waste and

electronic goods; participation is limited to 250 vehicles. The Pharmaceutical Drug Collection does not require anyone to pre-register and participation is unlimited. The Used Tire Collection is also unlimited; however a maximum of 20 tires will be accepted per participant and per tire disposal fees apply.

The Clean Sweep event will be held on Saturday, October 15th. Collection will be from 8:00 am. - 12:00 (noon) at the Washington County Highway Facility located at 900 Lang St., West Bend, WI 53090.



Teachers in Okinawa are required to change schools every five years, so Hatsue and Shizue were employed at eight different schools. During Hatsue's tenure, "I taught all subjects in first through sixth grade," she said. Shizue taught fourth, fifth and sixth grades, in addition to teaching music to students on both the elementary and high school levels.

What did they enjoy most about teaching? "Being a music teacher," Shizue said.

"I liked that after I teach kids, they go to college and are then successful," Hatsue said, adding that one of her former students is now a highly acclaimed physician.

Students in Okinawa attend six years of elementary school, three years of junior high school and three years of senior high school, with senior high school being optional. More than 90 percent of students graduate from high school, with 40 percent graduating from universities or junior college. Public schools in Okinawa are overseen by the

Okinawa Prefectural Board of Education.

Hatsue and Shizue both graduated from Ryukyu University, a prestigious school. Entrance exams to that school are difficult to pass. Shizue noted that after senior high school, most students hire tutors to help them prepare for several months to take the entrance exam. Others opt to attend a year or two of a special

school, known as a juku, to help them prepare for their entrance exams. Those who do not pass the exam must attend other area colleges.

Class sizes for elementary and high-school students are approximately 35 students per teacher in Okinawa. Students remove their shoes before entering the classroom, place them in cubicles and put on slippers. Junior and senior high school students are required to wear uniforms.

Students serve lunch, which is delivered to the school by truck, to their fellow students on a rotating basis, and they must clean the classrooms and restrooms daily and maintain the school grounds, planting and watering the gardens, etc.

Sports in which students participate include baseball, soccer, volleyball, basketball and swimming. There are other extra-curricular activities as well, such as music and drama.

The school year consists of three terms. The first term begins in April and ends in July. August is a month of vacation. The second term begins in September and concludes the second week of December, with two weeks of holiday vacation following, and the third term runs from January through March.

The school week runs from Monday through Friday. According to Shizue, "While we were teachers, school was held too on Saturday morning. But now the weekend is off."

Hatsue noted also that while they were teaching, they were required to join the Japanese Teachers' Association, but this is no longer the case. "Union used to be very strong," she said. "Now union is weak."

Hatsue and Shizue have

visited schools in the local area from time to time to give presentations on Okinawan calligraphy, demonstrating the method of writing the characters in the Hogan alphabet.

During their visits to the United States thus far, they have visited most of the states. Joe recalled an incident during Hatsue's first visit in 1980. She brought her son Kuni, then 6, and daughter Masayo, then 12 with her for a two-week stay.

"I asked Hatsue, 'What do you want to see?'" Joe recalled. "She said, 'Niagara Falls, the Grand Canyon and Golden Gate Bridge.'"

"I told her, 'First, we will go to Niagara Falls. Then I will show you on the map where we were and where the rest is.'"

They took the ferry across Lake Michigan, then went on to Niagara Falls. "We came around through Cleveland, went to Chicago to the Sears Tower, and then I brought them home," Joe said. "I showed Hatsue on the map where we had been in four days."

When Hatsue realized the great distance for traveling to the Golden Gate Bridge, she agreed they would sightsee there on their next trip. That trip was a one-month journey.

"That time, we were gone nine days and put on 4,500 miles," Joe recalled. "We drove to the Grand Canyon, Las Vegas, Yellow Stone National Park, the Black Hills and then on to Iron River, to visit our daughter Cathy."

Soon it will be time for Hatsue and Shizue to return to their families in Okinawa.

In addition to Hatsue's two children, she has a husband Hisao, also a retired teacher.

Shizue and her late husband Tetuo, who was a school principal, have four children -- sons Jun, Shin and Tetu and daughter Ichiko.

18th Annual KEYS 5K Run/Walk Oct. 9



25 Years Ago

August 22, 1986

The Memories column featured a 1936 photo of the remains of the old stone dam in the Milwaukee River, just north of the Main Street Bridge. The original dam washed out in 1911 and in later years a new dam was constructed in the present River Hill Park, south of the Main Street Bridge.

In 1891 a move was made to construct a larger church edifice on its present and the new building was dedicated in December 1891. The Old Stone Church was used as a Sunday School and Confirmation Instructional Building until it was razed in the 1930s.

There's one time when a golfer may not mind finishing in second place in a tournament. That's when the event is won by his son.

This year he was ready, and the 68 helped his confidence soar.

His philosophy for Sunday was, "just get off to a good start, which I did. I had seven straight pars," he said, and even though he went bogey, double bogey — his only one of the tournament — on Nos. 17 and 18 Sunday, he had enough of a cushion to win.

"At that point (on the tee at No. 17), I still had five shots to work with. I wanted to have a comfortable lead because anything can happen on 17 and 18," Anderson said.

Hey readers, remember all those leads from the football article a few weeks ago capturing that blowout against New Holstein?

That was not a good idea.

The Statesman should not have done that. It's starting to run out, and it's not funny.

Not that anyone could have predicted the Indians turning the season into a video game, and not a competitive one at that.

Last Friday, after all the distractions of homecoming week and playing a game that could have caught Kewaskum looking ahead, the undefeated Indians zeroed in.

Poor winless Waupun was in the crosshairs.

The final tally was 66-6 and it could be argued the game wasn't that close. It's the third time in four weeks Kewaskum eclipsed 50 and could rest starters the entire second half. Coach Jason Piittmann said he doesn't remember ever lighting up the board like that in one game in 13 years or in a several-game stretch like this.

"I don't know how to explain it. It's one of those things - we're fortunate right now and just kind of enjoy the ride because it's special at this point in time. It's definitely going to get tougher the next two weeks with Two Rivers and Plymouth," he said. "Just gotta enjoy it and make sure the kids stay focused and keep doing the right things, whether it be in school, out and about in the community and out on the practice field and the game field."

For the players, it was a homecoming to remember. Senior quarterback Sam Olla had four touchdowns and 131 yards rushing, and was 9-for-10 through the air for 102 yards

and a score.

"It was great. Seeing all those fans up there. We haven't had a full student section the whole year. It was a good feeling," he said.

"It was memorable," said senior wideout and linebacker Brad Boegel, who caught a touchdown and had three tackles. "Definitely going to look back on it. It was a great victory. We all played well. We had fun. Never forget it."

Three Indians had triple digits rushing. Besides Olla, Eric Perkins had 12 carries for 184 yards and three scores, and fullback and backup tailback Teddy Wollner ran for 110 and a score.

The game was 46-0 at half, which is only the second-biggest lead the Indians had at the break this season and one point ahead of third place. At halftime, the starters talked Piittmann into one more series in the third quarter since it was homecoming.

The defense forced a three and out, and Perkins ended any fun the offense would have on the second play, kicking it into high gear and zinging down the left sideline for a 77-yard touchdown run to make it 53-0.

"It feels good to come down and score 66 points," he said. "We're not trying to show any teams up or anything. Our second- and third-team guys are doing a good job, scoring points just like we were."

Olla kept the ball more than usual on the option, but he said it wasn't because he was tired of Perkins getting all the touchdowns.

"No, it was just - every team - they were keying on Perkins. And when it happens there are other players on this team who can make plays," he said.

Perkins said he wasn't

mad at him for hogging the scores on homecoming night.

"Oh no. No," he said.

Senior linebacker Kenny Gigstead was one of several Indians who prevented Waupun from coming close to scoring most of the game, and one of a few who could have switched their mailing addresses to the Warriors' backfield. The defense held Waupun to barely 100 yards.

"It was fun," he said of the homecoming domination. "I don't know. I can't really explain it 'cause of the excitement right now. It was fun coming out all pumped up and stuff."

Piittmann said the teens stayed focused and had a good homecoming week. Nearly the entire team went to see John Underwood speak last week, and got his message. Underwood is the founder/director of the American Athletic Institute and director of Pure Performance, both high school and NCAA anti-drug programs.

Piittmann said one of Underwood's messages was a teen getting drunk once negates 14 days of training.

"He's worked with Olympians and has the data and research to prove it. These kids are getting it and understand that. Hopefully, we make good decisions in that respect," he said.

On the down side, the Indians lost the turnover battle, 2-0, had some questionable execution on extra points (it's not like they don't get enough practice at those) and had eight penalties for 75 yards. They also missed running through the sign to start the second half, but that's at least partly the cheerleaders fault for not getting the gate in time.

"We keep making mistakes and we're fortunate it hasn't

hurt us because somewhere down the line in a big game it's going to bite us, and we've got to clean that up," said Piittmann.

Kewaskum's starters have yet to be pushed for four quarters though Campbellsport forced them to about three and a half a couple of weeks ago. Piittmann said he isn't concerned because plenty of other top teams are blowing out opponents in similar fashion. It is unknown whether or not the newspapers covering them are running out of leads or if they are willing to trade some with the Statesman.

The win guaranteed the Indians a spot in the playoffs again, though that was no shock the way this season was going.

The Indians this Friday travel to Two Rivers, where two years ago the visiting sideline smelled like dead fish but the big cookies still tasted good. The Purple Raiders are 2-2 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference (4-2 overall) after losing two straight to Kiel, 30-12, and Sheboygan Falls, 21-16. The following week, Plymouth looms in what could decide the conference, just like the last few years. Both Kewaskum and the Panthers are 4-0. Plymouth has been blowing out its EWC competition, too, with scores of 49-13, 48-12, 48-0 and 40-7. Plymouth plays at Campbellsport Friday.
