Village approves budget with no discussion, debate

The Village Board approved its 2012 budget at Monday night's meeting with no discussion from the public and no debate among trustees. 2010's mill rate of \$7.15 per \$1,000 of equalized value went to \$5.91 in 2011, mostly due to the village's reassessment. This year's mill rate is \$5.92, meaning the owner of a \$150,000 home would pay \$888.

The entire 2012 budget is available on the village's website at <http://www.village.kewaskum.wi.us/>.

General fund revenues are up 2.64 percent from \$1,338,514 to \$1,373,907. Total revenues are down from \$2,461,167 to \$2,429,907. Expenditures are down 1.81 percent from \$2,461,167 to \$2,416,506.

The budget carries about an \$8,000 surplus and taxes residents the as much as the state allows.

The board approved the budget, 7-0.

The village is closing in on advertising for two part-time emergency medical technicians.

The Village Board approved hiring two EMTs as opposed to hiring another service earlier this year as filling shifts became difficult. Fire Chief Mark Groeschel said Monday criteria for the positions have been established and he is waiting for the Police and Fire Commission to schedule a meeting and approve it.

After that, the positions may be advertised.

That Highway 28/Main Street reconstruction project slated for 2014 just got a little more complex.

Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles on Monday told the Village Board after 18 months of waiting he got word last Friday that the state Department of Transportation (DOT) will not allow a water main on the new

bridge over the Milwaukee River. The reason why was not project specific.

"That's their policy not to allow it," he said.

An appeal is possible but Gilles said it would take a large amount of engineering work.

"I'm wondering what alternatives there are," he said.

Gilles questioned if a separate pier above the water would be cost effective.

Trustee Kevin Scheunemann said he estimated boring a water main could cost \$200,000 to \$500,000.

"I'm not voting to move this project forward until they (DOT) become more cooperative on this," he said.

Scheunemann suggested maybe putting up another water tower instead.

Gilles said improvements made on water tower no. 2 were only designed

Small turnout for Farmington budget meeting

TOWN OF FARMINGTON - Town residents - five of them - on Tuesday night approved the town's 2012 tax levy of \$432,097.30, followed by unanimous Town Board approval with next to no discussion.

The votes were the same for the 2012 highway expenditures of \$353,438.75. Of that, \$210,000 is budgeted for snow removal and salting.

In 2010, the town spent \$167,000 on snowplowing and salt. To date this year, the town has spent \$124,775. The number varies with the severity of the winter.

The town's mill rate per \$1,000 of equalized value is \$1.0347, down ever so slightly from 2011's \$1.0361. That means the owner of a \$200,000 home will pay \$206.94 in 2012.

The town carried a balance of \$152,363.47 from last year, which is used to make up a \$99,000 difference between revenues and expenditures. Much of the surplus is from the Jay Road bridge project, said town treasurer Ken Ramthun.


Town Chairman Chris Elbe said the board will examine the recreational fund, which is on pace to run out in a few years. It is funded through lot splits, which are down.

At the Town Board's regular meeting before the budget hearing and approval, the board approved mill rates for the town's two light districts. Boltonville will pay 0.33 cents and Fillmore 0.187 cents. Boltonville's rate is higher because the town spent \$850 to move a streetlight, said Elbe.

Town residents will be getting some money-saving advice in a letter with their tax bills. In addition to garbage pickup and other town information, the Town Board on Monday approved adding a line about Washington County libraries.



to extend the tower's life by 10 years, and now nine are left.

Board President Andrew Pesch said the village may need another water tower if development comes west of the river.

The board didn't take action on the issue or determine its next course of action.

Hiring a full-time police officer to help bring the force back up to staff will be going through the Police and Fire Commission.

The Village Board on Monday voted 4-3 to have the PFC approve who to hire and requested it be put on the fast track given the shortage of officers. Craig Garbisch, Harry Roecker and Norman Kufahl

voted against.

The board has the authority to hire the officer without PFC approval, but Board President Andrew Pesch suggested hiring go through the PFC to avoid negative feedback from residents.

Pesch said he's trying to avoid complaints like the ones he received when the board hired Richard Knoebel back as police chief in August. He said some residents weren't happy about it.

Officer Mark Steiner attended the meeting and said the department is down two squad shifts since Knoebel isn't full time and Troy Ellis is on leave until he retires in May. Steiner said he is scheduled to

work Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve and Christmas, and that he has 62 hours of vacation he can't schedule due to the officer shortage.

"It's burning us out. You can't take time off," he said.

Steiner said the department's two part-time officers are interested in the job. Hiring both as part-time officers had already been approved by the PFC.

Trustee Mike Berger asked to schedule a PFC meeting as soon as possible and put the hiring on "the fast track."

Berger said some of the PFC members were upset at the proceedings for the last personnel move involving a Kewaskum police officer's disciplinary measure.

Clerk Stephanie Justmann said she could call the PFC members this week and schedule a meeting.

Farmington Budget

Town resident and County Supervisor Brian Bausch, who represents much of the town on the County Board, said the county loses a net \$120,000 per year because county residents use libraries outside the county. Every time one county resident checks out material in a library in another county, the resident's county pays money. Washington County has a couple of out-of-county libraries close to a couple of towns like Farmington (Random Lake Library) and Erin (Merten).

The Kewaskum Library picks up some residents from Fond du Lac and Sheboygan counties, but Washington County as a whole is losing money in the system.

Bausch requested putting a notice in the tax letter since using other counties' libraries is costing the county taxpayers.

The Town Board agreed to add a line encouraging town residents to use Washington County libraries to save taxpayer funds.

The Town Board approved a three-year extension for recycling pickup with Veolia on Monday night.

The contract maintains the rate at \$1.88 per household for monthly pickup for 2012 and allows for limited rate increases in 2013 and 2014. Increases follow the Consumer Price Index (CPI) but may not exceed 5 percent. If the CPI increases by 3 percent, then the recycling cost increases by 3 percent; if the CPI rises 8 percent, the recycling cost only rises 5 percent.

Paper, cardboard, bottles, cans, glass, aerosol cans and nos. 1-7 plastics may be recycled.

The Town Board was

scheduled to meet at 7 a.m. today (Thursday) at 1260 Lakeview Road to examine damage for which a property owner wants reimbursement.

On Oct. 3, Town Chairman Chris Elbe got a call from the Washington County Sheriff's Department asking he move a tree that fell down and was blocking Lakeview Road. Elbe said his chainsaw was at his other farm and the one at the Town Hall didn't have a chain, so he used a tractor to push the tree off the road.

Property owner Mark Boettcher in a letter to the town alleged some of his fruit trees were damaged to the tune of \$8,175.

"So it's not a little deal," said Elbe.

Boettcher said he wished that by Monday's meeting Elbe would have examined the damage.

"I'm shocked that you hadn't," he said.

Elbe apologized and said he hadn't had time to get out there yet.

Boettcher said a Sheriff's deputy who watched Elbe work but soon left for another call said he was surprised the tractor was moving so fast when it hit the tree and how far the tree was moved off of the road.

Town resident and Washington County Board supervisor Brian Bausch later suggested the town have its insurance representative come along to inspect the damage, and Elbe agreed.

The board will assess the damage Thursday but will not vote on how to proceed until its next meeting.

Intoxication to blame for incident with off-duty village cop

KEWASKUM- An evening of drinking for two individuals appears to be the root cause of an incident between a village man and a off-duty Kewaskum police officer that ultimately left investigators shaking their heads with a he said-he said incident.

After making an open-records request, The Washington County Sheriff's Office produced a copy of the incident report along with follow-up reports. That report revealed that on Friday, May 20, a village police officer was called to the 200 block of Main Street for a complaint involving an off-duty Kewaskum Police Officer at 10:15 p.m. who was allegedly trespassing on private property.

Due to the involvement of the off-duty police officer, Washington County Sheriff's Office handled the complaint. The Wisconsin State Patrol also became involved on the evening of the incident.

A sergeant with the sheriff's office met with the complainant, the owner of 222 Main Street, who reported his son found the off-duty officer walking out onto the sidewalk of Main Street from a dark driveway between 222 and 224 Main St., appearing to be intoxicated.

The complainant was not home at the time but caught up with the off-duty officer on Forest Avenue as he was walking home and began yelling at him. He admitted to using obscenities to get the officer's attention and admitted to drinking prior to confronting the officer. The two became involved in a verbal argument with allegations of it becoming physical. The complainant called 9-1-1 and the village police officer was dispatched to the scene and subsequent law enforcement officers arrived to assist. The off-duty officer was removed from the scene by State Patrol and held at his residence while the homeowner was questioned.

After questioning the complainant, the off-duty officer was questioned. He stated "nothing had happened and that he was being bothered for trying

to walk home," according to the incident report. According to the sergeant, the officer adamantly denied walking onto/into any driveway while on Main Street, stating that he was simply walking home from a residence on Riverview Drive. He stated he crossed over Fond du Lac Avenue and began walking west on Forest Avenue when he turned around to look towards a man yelling from behind him.

The off-duty officer stated he was not sure what was being yelled and stated the male subject came towards him two to three times. The officer denied attempting to strike the complainant but "placed his arms up in a defensive manner to protect himself." He further stated he was attempting to walk away from the complainant but the subject continued to follow him and at times pushed and attempted to strike him.

The officer said the physical contact between the two was a result of the complainant initiating it by pushing him and himself attempting to defend and protect himself. He stated he was not injured and would not have contacted police in regards to the incident.

When asked how much alcohol the off-duty officer consumed that evening his response was "enough."

Neither individual filed a formal statement after questioning.

The sergeant then responded to the residence on Main Street and spoke with the complainant's son. He made it clear the off-duty officer was coming from the driveway when he first saw him but was not sure how far back on the property he was and/or what he was doing there.

At the conclusion of the investigation, the sergeant stated it appears the off-duty officer may have been on a private driveway at some time but this could not be confirmed by an additional witness.

That following Monday, May 23, the original complainant wanted to provide a written statement in regards

to the disorderly incident. In this statement, the complainant stipulates that the off-duty officer did indeed attempt to strike him a total of three times, swinging his arms each time, after the officer attempted to walk away on two separate occasions from initial contact. The complainant stated he blocked all alleged punches and was uninjured. Upon giving his statement, the sergeant detected the complainant was intoxicated and the complainant admitted to drinking prior to giving his statement.

The complainant's son also provided a written statement. His statement was the same as the evening of the incident.

The off-duty officer also spoke with two of his fellow police officers after the incident. They also made statements outlining their discussions with the officer. The officer declined numerous times to meet with the sergeant after the initial incident and did not provide a written statement.

After receiving the written statements the sergeant was unable to determine who actually, if anyone, took swings at each other. The complainant alleges the off-duty officer swung at him and the officer alleges the complainant swung at him.

"What is clear to me is both subjects were intoxicated during the incident," the sergeant reported.

Both subjects were issued verbal warnings on June 2nd for their respective involvement in the incident.

Editor's Note- The names were removed from this report as is our policy in reporting disturbances. Furthermore, neither subject was charged with anything and we do not release names from incidents unless those individuals are charged with a crime. This story is appearing because it involved a village police officer. We can not confirm or deny the off-duty officer involved in this incident is that of Troy Ellis who was given a settlement from the village to end his employment.

World War II Veteran goes on honor flight to D.C.

On October 8, 2011, Doug White and over 400 other World War II veterans flew on the Stars and Stripes Honor Flight to Washington DC. There were two planes leaving from Milwaukee's General Mitchell Airport and also one plane each from Madison and Appleton. In addition to the 400+ veterans, there were 400+ guardians. The guardians sole purpose that day was to make sure the veterans had a wonderful time and were well cared for.

In addition to the veterans and guardians that went there was a team of doctors, nurses and volunteers from the Stars and Stripes Honor Flight Organization. This non-profit organization offers the veterans a once in a lifetime

opportunity to see the war memorial and all at no cost to the veteran. The guardians do pay a fee that is tax deductible. The money to pay for the veterans is all donated by business and private donors. The Stars and Stripes Honor Flight Organization in nationwide and only has two paid positions, the rest are all volunteers. They are a very detail oriented group of people. The flight on October 8, 2011 was the largest endeavor thus far. The airplanes for the flights take the group out to Washington D.C. and stay there to wait for the veterans and guardians to come back at the end of a very long and emotional day. My dad (Doug White) and I had to be at the airport in Milwaukee at 5 a.m. on the Saturday morning and did not return

until approximately 9:30 p.m.

Because it was such a big endeavor, there were many surprises in store. Gov. Scott Walker was at the airport to greet us in the morning while we had breakfast and waited to board the planes. WISN TV Channel 12's Patrick Paolantoni, his camera crew, and producer were in the Alpha plane. Ted Perry from FOX 6 was on the Bravo plane. They remained with us all day, filming, interviewing and completing footage to be shown later the next week.

When we landed in D.C. our planes were treated to a water cannon salute from the firetrucks at Dullace airport. There was a large crowd to greet us on the tarmac when we got off the planes. They cheered and thanked the veterans for their service. The veterans were helped down the stairs by military persons. There was a bagpipe band, "The Rogues" that serenaded us and went along for the rest

of the day.

We got on the buses and were were off for the memories of the day. First was the World War II Memorial. A huge group photo was taken there. We looked for and found the saying "Kilroy was here." On to the Lincoln Memorial, Washington Monument (in the distance), Korean Memorial and Vietnam Memorial sites. During the day I heard many veterans saying in disbelief "I can't believe they are doing this for us."

Back to the buses and on to the Iwo Jima memorial. Another group photo was taken and the bagpipe band played the Marine Corp Hymn. After that, we went to Arlington Cemetery. We were in awe at the amount of white tombstones and the idea of all the lives given so we can have and enjoy the freedom that we have. Once at the cemetery we watched the changing of the guards at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. I have never had respect and honor be so palpable, to see that many people watching and you could have heard a pin drop. As we left to go to the buses, the other visitors spontaneously formed lines and cheered and thanked the veterans. It was very moving.

We headed back to the airport. We were never lacking for food or water that day. We boarded the planes with help from the military again. As they helped the veterans aboard, they thanked them for their service also.

On the plane ride home there was a surprise "Mail Call" for the veterans. In the days that they served they couldn't email or phone home, they only received letters from home.

When we arrived back at





Collection of Brian Eckert on display

'The Art of the Guitar' Exhibit at UW-WC

WEST BEND - UW-Washington County (UW-WC) is hosting The Art of the Guitar, an exhibition of handcrafted guitars, made by West Bend native, Brian Eckert. The handmade musical instruments along with some of the tools utilized and photos of the building process will be on display in the campus art gallery, located on the second floor of the campus adjacent to the theatre. The exhibit will be open to coincide with upcoming concerts at the campus. Dates include: Friday, November 18 (Venere Lute Quartet concert, 7:30pm), Friday, December 2 (John Doyle Trio, 7:30pm), Saturday, December 10 (Moraine Symphonic Band, 3pm), and Sunday December 11 (Moraine Chorus, 2pm). Brian will be available at the November 18 and December 2 concerts to answer questions about his guitar building hobby. Admission to the art exhibit is free of charge.

Guitar building requires strong woodworking skills as well as an artistic flair and so it isn't too surprising that Brian's father, Dale is a carpenter and his mother, Eileen is an artist. Eckert, himself is a toolmaker by trade. He developed his interest in guitar building about seven years ago. His mother was President of the Barton Historical Society at the time and was working with Neil Ostberg of Slinger who did blacksmith work. It turns out that Ostberg also built guitars. Soon after visiting Ostberg's woodworking shop, Brian decided to build his first guitar. Ostberg had also told him about a website, <http://myplace.frontier.com/~nostberg/> that provided helpful information about guitar building. Working with

a block of spruce, Eckert used some power tools, including a band saw, table saw and drill press to create the basic shape. Most of the remaining work is done with hand tools - including chisels and planes.

Now an official "luthier" (one who makes stringed musical instruments), Eckert likes the idea of "playing something that you make." "A lot of art hangs on the wall, but this is art that makes art," he said.

Each guitar takes about 150 hours to build and Eckert has completed eight guitars (seven acoustic and one electric). As wood is not uniform, each instrument has a different sound. "There are lots of variables when you build a guitar," Eckert explains. "I try to get it right the first time by tap tuning and checking as I build it." Each guitar's rosette is different too. Most are adorned with intricate colored herringbone patterns. One has a beautiful heart pattern done in red tones. Eckert has entered his work in the Washington County Fair where it won grand champion twice, as well as the Wisconsin State Fair, where it took a blue ribbon.

In 2009, when the economy took a nosedive, Eckert found himself laid off. He had built several guitars at this point and unsure whether he would ever be called back to work as a toolmaker, he decided he would learn how to repair guitars as well. Eckert enrolled in Galloup School of Guitar Building and Professional Guitar Repair in Big Rapids, Michigan and completed the eight-week journeyman program that focused on repair and construction. In addition to learning how to repair guitars, Brian learned the

industry standards for guitars and was also able to fine-tune his guitar building techniques. His training as a toolmaker, a profession where precision is so critical, helped him succeed. Now when Eckert requires a fixture for a particular repair, he has the knowledge to build it himself.

Brian who lives in West Bend with his wife Sherry and their three sons, Aaron, Kyle and Jonah, wound up being called back to his full time job at Weasler Engineering about seven months later. His love of guitar building and repair now continues as a hobby. In his spare time, Brian serves as the certified repair technician for "Play it By Ear," a guitar store in downtown West Bend.



St. Lucas embracing technology through pilot program

Rayn Chipman blogs, does video editing and sends her teacher homework via the Internet.

Not atypical in today's world. But Chipman is in third grade.

St. Lucas Lutheran School had its third- and fourth-grade parents purchase computers for their children to use in the classroom this year.

"I think it's more fun to use the computer than a blackboard because you can type," said Chipman.

After a year of study, technology director and third- and fourth-grade teacher Kurt Gosdeck convinced Principal David Stoltz it was a good idea, and they presented their research to the Christian Board of Education. Several parent meetings later, the program was a go.

Students have taken to the new technology.

"It's much easier to do our assignments. He puts them on Edmodo and we can down-

load them and we send them back to him and he sends us our grades," said fourth-grader Olivia Swenson.

Edmodo is a free social learning network that has an appearance similar to Facebook. Gosdeck sets up groups within the program for classes and can track students' messages to each other, their homework and grades, and administer quizzes. Parents also have access to the same material.

Edmodo can be accessed from anywhere. One time a student went to Florida and could still do some of her homework, Gosdeck said.

Like an online class, Gosdeck requires students to respond to a certain number of their classmates' blogs. While they're on the World Wide Web, students' blogs, however, are set up to only be read by the teacher, their parents and classmates.

"I can see everything that they do and parents have access to the students' account and can see everything their student does," Gosdeck said.

Students will keep their computers throughout their time at St. Lucas and use them each year. Next year, the fifth- and sixth-grade teacher will set up curriculum using the Notebooks, and Gosdeck will get new third-graders coming in and have them use computers.

Hence Gosdeck teaches more than students; He educates colleagues.

"I have the difficult task because I have to train them all," he said.

Gosdeck said some students who have computers at home picked up the skills instantly; some took a little while. Like any skill, he said it's not unlike children whose parents read with them compared to those who don't.

"I'm pleased with the students' progress," Gosdeck said.

Gosdeck said students use their computers 40 to 60 percent of the day and for every class but math. The classroom is set up with students sitting in groups of four, and Gosdeck said it has not hurt student in-

teraction.

The initiative continues St. Lucas' trend of staying on the cutting edge of technology - it added SmartBoards in 2004 and now nearly every classroom has one - and follows the Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Schools' advancements. Kettle Moraine Lutheran High School already offers online classes allowing any students in its high school association to attend.

Stoltz said he wanted to see the facts before recommending the board add the computers. Once Gosdeck showed him the research, he supported the "leap of faith."

"One day you realize kids will all have laptops on their desk," he said. "We started to develop the idea of why can't that be now."

Ten weeks into the program, Stoltz has noticed students' interest.

"It's awesome when you walk down the hall and see kids working on their computers," he said. "It's learning on their level. This is how kids relate to things now."

They're getting a little history, too. For a digital presentation about their grandparents for grandparents' day, students had to do research, including interviews. Gosdeck said they weren't familiar with black and white photos.

Stoltz said he knows it won't be too long before Gosdeck will be his teacher. He teaches seventh and eighth grade.

"As a teacher it's just as much of a learning experience as it is for the kids," he said. "And that's exciting."





- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 carton (26 ounces) *Swanson* Chicken Stock (Regular or Unsalted) (about 3 1/4 cups)
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon dried basil, crushed
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme leaves, crushed
- 1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper

1. Remove giblets and neck from turkey cavity. Rinse turkey with cold water and pat dry with paper towel. Tie ends of drumsticks together.
2. Place turkey, breast-side up, on rack in roasting pan. Brush turkey with oil. Insert meat thermometer into thickest part of meat, not touching bone.
3. Stir stock, lemon juice, basil, thyme and black pepper in large bowl. Reserve 1 3/4 cups stock mixture for the gravy. Pour remaining stock mixture over turkey.
4. Roast at 325°F for 3 hours, or until thermometer reads 165°F, basting occasionally with pan drippings. Begin checking for doneness after 2 1/2 hours roasting time.
5. Remove turkey from pan, cover and keep warm. Spoon off any fat and pour off all but 1 1/2 cups pan drippings.
6. Stir reserved stock mixture and flour in medium bowl until the mixture is smooth. Add flour mixture to the pan. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture boils and thickens, scraping up browned bits from bottom of pan. Serve gravy with turkey.

Don't fret about what's left!

Want to make leftovers seem a little less left over? Plan ahead by stocking your kitchen with the basics — eggs, milk, cheese, bread, canned soup and broth. Makes: 10 servings

- 2 1/2 cups *Swanson* Chicken Broth (Regular, Natural Goodness or Certified Organic)
- Generous dash ground black pepper
- 2 stalks celery, coarsely chopped (about 1 cup)
- 1 large onion, coarsely chopped (about 1 cup)

Former KHS wrestler comes back to coach

After approval by the Board of Education, Kewaskum High School will have a new assistant wrestling coach, but he is not new to the program.

An item on the agenda for November 14th includes the appointment of Scott Rhoads as the assistant to long-time coach Dennis Aupperle. Rhoads is the school's only two-time state champion (2005-2006), and he has worked with several of the current wrestlers in the program who have been involved in off-season programs.

Rhoads graduated from KHS in 2006 and originally hoped to continue his career in the sport at the University of Wisconsin. After spending a semester in Madison and making the Badgers team, Rhoads decided to switch schools, enrolling at UW-Oshkosh where he wrestled for the remainder of his freshman season before a neck injury sidelined him.

Rhoads was later an assistant at the school and ran Domination Wrestling Camps while finishing up his degree in elementary education. Currently, Rhoads is working as an eighth grade language arts teacher at Kewaskum Middle School.

While Aupperle was sad to see Joel Dzedzic leave the program, he said Tuesday he is excited to have someone of Rhoads' caliber coming on board.

"I think he's a great choice," Aupperle said, indicating, "Joel just had a lot going on right now, with the new baby and his graduate classes ... That's unfortunate because he's done so much for the program."

Dzedzic is currently helping coach middle school wrestling and will continue to be involved with KIWC (Kewaskum Indians Wrestling

Club).

Concerning Rhoads' wrestling attributes, Aupperle said, "Technically he's as sound as they come," adding, "He loves wrestling. It's kind of a perfect fit."

Rhoads agrees. "After coaching college wrestlers, I've been interested in seeing what I can do for a high school team," he said. "I want to see how I can get them to improve" and how quickly he can make this happen.

"Considering that Scott was a very good wrestler, has experience coaching at UW Oshkosh, has gone into education, and has been working in the district, we are glad to have him join our program," Athletic Director Jason Piittmann said Tuesday.

High school wrestling practice officially begins on Monday (Nov. 14th). Aupperle said 18 came for the first skin fold test last week and another dozen were expected to come on Nov. 9th. "We'll have 30 or so," he said.

Currently a home match against Freedom kicks off the season on Nov. 29, but, "That might be changed," Aupperle said because the team also has a match against Campbellsport on Dec. 1 and the rugged Luxemburg-Casco Duals are on Saturday, Dec. 3rd.
