

# PFC ok's promoting officer; New chief candidates to interview in December

The village has the go-ahead to promote a part-time police officer to full time to ease some of the burden of the shorthanded department.

The Police and Fire Commission on Tuesday agreed to let Interim Police Chief Richard Knoebel decide on whom to promote. Kewaskum has two part-time officers who are both interested moving to full time. "It's going to be a tough decision," said Knoebel.

The department has officers working 12-hour shifts due to a staff shortage. One officer retiring in May is already off the force and Knoebel, the chief the last 23 years, is only working limited hours as he was hired back after retiring in summer to handle an officer's disciplinary measure.

"If we'd get someone hurt right now we'd be in dire straits ... even if

someone got sick," said Knoebel.

He said he would like to have the officer working full time by Thanksgiving.

The Commission was given the task to give Knoebel permission by a 4-3 vote at Nov. 7's Village Board meeting.

Village President Andrew Pesch said he's trying to avoid complaints like the ones he received when the board hired Richard Knoebel back as police chief in August. He said some residents weren't happy about it.

Trustee Mike Berger said some of the commission members were upset at the proceedings for the last personnel move involving a Kewaskum police officer's disciplinary measure.

The commission didn't vote on the measure but four members gave unanimous support. Robert Beisbier was absent.

Police chief candidates have been narrowed to seven, and interviews

have been set.

The Police and Fire Commission on Tuesday scheduled two nights of interviews, Dec. 7 and 8, to interview the finalists.

A panel of outside chiefs narrowed the field, but some candidates didn't want it knocked down to five or less because then their names may be released.

The new chief would replace Interim Chief Richard Knoebel, who retired in summer after 23 years as chief and 38 with the department. He was hired back as interim soon after to work limited hours and handle a disciplinary measure within the department.

Knoebel's interim contract is set to expire Dec. 2 but has a clause allowing for an extension. Knoebel said he would like to do the background investigation on the new chief and

# Community Pantry costing school district

KEWASKUM- The Board of Education received unpleasant news Monday evening regarding the popular Community Pantry. Interim Superintendent David Ewald stated the project is currently \$36,340 over the original \$50,000 budget. Currently the district has only received about \$28,000 in repayment for the building's construction that began in 2010.

Upon the request of some board members and taxpayers, Ewald says he was directed to report on the history and current financial status of the project.

Former Superintendent Mike Krumm championed the project in mid-2009 that saw a grassroots effort of organizing a food pantry in the Municipal Building Annex. It was decided in 2010 that a building should be constructed. The project quickly got underway with school district taxpayers fronting the construction cost of a building. The School District provided land for the project and currently pays all utilities. The pantry uses no tax dollars to feed families.

Business manager Paul Reichert explained the average cost of utilities to the pantry building are approximately \$131 per month for electric, \$67 per month for natural gas and \$30 per month for sewer and water.

While the idea of the school district acting as a lender isn't a unique practice, Ewald admitted it being a food pantry makes the situation unique. He went on to point out schools in the district do play a role in the pantry. The pantry has and continues to serve families in the school district and students in the district are given opportunities there whether it be volunteering or the class that assisted in constructing the building.

The pantry is a collaborative effort of students, community members and local churches. Ewald explained they are governed by a board of directors and their finances are run through the district.





help with CPR and automated external defibrillator training.

Kewaskum may now advertise to hire part-time emergency medical technicians to help alleviate an EMT shortage.

The Police and Fire Commission on Tuesday approved a list of qualifications from Fire Chief Mark Groeschel, the final step before advertising for the positions.

The list has 11 qualifications in order of priority: flexible work schedule, 911 emergency response versus inter-facility transports (hospital to hospital), years of experience, firefighter 1 and 2 skills, auto extrication skills, familiarity with Wisconsin Ambulance Rum Reporting System, familiarity with Kewaskum's ambulance district, familiarity with Phillips' automated

external defibrillators, foreign language skills, office skills (basic computer knowledge) and any other pertinent job skills that could benefit the fire department.

Commission member Jeffrey Rohrer said the list could be used for more than hiring.

"This is not only a criteria of how you're going to hire somebody. This is how you get rid of somebody," he said.

Police Chief Richard Knoebel said he gave Groeschel his scoring matrix system of how he hires officers in which each qualification receives a score.

Groeschel said he specified the second most important quality - 911 calls versus inter-facility - because there's a big difference between transporting from an accident scene to a hospital than from

one hospital to another.

"There's a lot of EMTs out there who have never run 911 calls," he said.

Rohrer said he would like to see a no smoking qualification to protect the village from liability if someone becomes disabled. It would be hard to determine if the disability is from smoking or from the job.

"The dollar amount could be huge," he said.

Village Administrator Mathew Heiser said the village is working on requiring a physical of firefighters, who are all volunteer aside from Groeschel.

"I'm happy to hear you are addressing that aggressively," said Rohrer.

Groeschel will interview candidates and forward recommendations to the commission for final approval.

## Pantry needs volunteers at Enchantment in the Park

The Kewaskum Community Pantry needs volunteers to work at Enchantment at the Park this season.

Enchantment at the Park, held at the Washington County Fair Park, collects food items for local food pantries. "Kewaskum's share filled our shelves and fed our families for months," Pantry board member Jennifer Schultz stated.

The pantry is currently seeing overwhelming need in our community, feeding almost 200 individuals each week.

Volunteers would be responsible for collecting food items from vehicles at the end of the route, sorting those donations into boxes and loading them into a van. We work in teams so that she work is shared and so that volunteers can get breaks. This is a family-friendly opportunity, older kids can volunteer with their parents. Volunteers are provided snacks, dinner and an opportunity to see the light displays.

Volunteers are needed on three nights: Saturday, December 3; Sunday, December 18; and Tuesday, December 27. Hours are 5:00-9:00 each night.

when the building construction was approved, to which Ewald said he could not find a document where such an approval was given.

"It does raise an issue," Ewald said.

Clerk Mary Miller said she could not recall a vote on the project ever coming before the board. However she remembered the high school's Booster Club partnering with the school district to construct the high school's athletic complex concession stand and bleachers. That project has since been paid back in full to the district.

Ewald added the board was probably never made aware of the fact it was going over budget.

"That money will come

back to us eventually," President Bruce Braidigan stated.

Board member Tim Ramthun stated, "I like the theory of this program, my concern is the method by which we implemented this program." He continued, "I see this as a wound to the taxpayer."

Ewald stated the district is currently working on updating its financial policies because of situations like this. However when asked if changes were forthcoming for the pantry, he stated, "We are not anticipating any changes at this point, things seem to be going well."



## Taste of Washington County: Enjoy a feast at rainbow's end

The annual Taste of Washington County is next week with all proceeds going to the Boys and Girls Club of Washington County.

Sixteen local restaurants, some beer and wine vendors, and Coca-Cola have come together for the people in Washington County to enjoy a night of sampling of what they have to offer.

"It sells out each and every year, so we sell 1,000 tickets to the event. We hope to raise \$75,000-80,000 from this event," Executive Director Jay Fisher said.

Fisher said they like to keep the same restaurants to come back every year. This year a few new restaurants namely Coachman House and Grasshopper join the vendors.

Fisher said the vendors are set up in three pods. People attending the Taste of Washington County will come in and be given a wine glass for wine tasting and a program of the vendors.

"You walk around with the wine glass and try different wines. And the food, there's plates at each different vendor. You can decide to try one or you can try them all," Fisher

said. "Once you pay the \$40 for the ticket, that is all included."

What is not included are the beverages sold. There will be a full service bar. The wines for tasting can also be purchased by the bottle.

Food is not the only attraction to the Taste of Washington County. There are some live and silent auction prizes to bid on. The live auction preview starts at 5:30 p.m., with the auction itself starting at 8:15 p.m.

Mike Paul will auction off 12 live auctioned items. Some of the items on auction are a 24-tickets suite at Miller Park, hands on training with the City of West Bend SWAT team, four month lease on a 2012 Honda Pilot, a wine tasting cruise with Green Bay Packer great Charles Woodson and more.

"People will get a paddle with a number and they can raise it up when the auctioneer is talking about the items," Fisher said. "We go one by one with the live auction items and they can bid on those and the auctioneer kind of controls each of the individual items."

Fisher said there are also 74 silent auction and raffle items. Items include the Fireside Room rental at Chandelier Ballroom,

brunch for eight at Timmers, jewelry, autographed sports memorabilia, a three-hour rental of the Boys & Girls Club facility in West Bend, Regal Ware cookware, dining package and theater tickets are some of the items up for bidding and raffle.

"Usually the silent auction is \$1,000 or less and the live auction is \$1,000 or more," Fisher said.

# Indians rake in EWC honors KMS students embrace Veteran's Day

The Eastern Wisconsin Conference football title returned to Kewaskum this season, and countless awards and accolades came with it.

The conference title banner was hung in front of the stage of the Kewaskum Theatre on Sunday, before making its way to the Fieldhouse, during the annual awards ceremony.

The Indians went 7-0 in the EWC to take the championship back from two-time defending title-holder Plymouth. Kewaskum went 10-1 on the season, its seventh straight year of double-digit wins, and earned a standing ovation from parents, fans and friends.

"This is truly a special group of young men," said Coach Jason Piittmann.

Nobody was more special than Eric Perkins, who Piittmann said rewrote the school's record book. Perkins rushed for 1,891 yards and scored 27 touchdowns, both single-season school records - and sometimes he and the starters didn't even play the entire game because the games were blowouts. Perkins broke the record of his half-brother, Garrett Donath, who ran for 1,441 yards in 2005. He finished his career with 3,386 yards and 46 touchdowns, both likely school records though complete historical information isn't available. He rushed 414 times and averaged 8.18 yards per carry.

Perkins was chosen as the EWC's Offensive Back of the Year and Player of the Year and was one of six unanimous first team all-conference selections. He was chosen the top back in all-region voting and was honorable mention on the all-state team.

All five of Perkins' offensive linemen received all-conference honors. Mark Miller was selected to the honorable mention all-state team and named EWC Lineman of the Year. He and Joey Herriges were unanimous first-teamers. Brad Bettleman made the second team, and Garrett Yahr and Justin Zolp received honorable mention.

Mack Donath was named EWC Defensive Lineman of the Year and Player of the Year, was a unanimous EWC first-teamer and made the all-region team. He made 50 tackles in the EWC and had two sacks.

Brad Boegel was a unanimous EWC first-teamer at outside linebacker and made the all region team. He tied for the team lead with three interceptions.

Other first team all-conference players include defensive end Mike Bier, who missed the end of the season with an injury, and defensive back Dan Bohn.

Kicker Hunter Flanders, defensive end Alex Fechter, defensive tackle Kenny Gigstead and defensive back Joey Wollner made the second team.

Quarterback Sam Olla and inside linebacker Lance

Pinchard made the honorable mention team.

One thing Piittmann is most proud of is his team's performance in the classroom. The program's combined grade-point average slipped to 2.98 this season but is 3.15 the past six years.

Students earning a 4.0 for the first quarter are: Derek Aupperle, Mike Bier, Taylor Toth and Joey Herriges.

Those earning a 3.5 to 3.99 are: Brad Boegel, Joey Wollner, Garrett Buth, Andrew Buelow, Eric Limberg, Justin Zolp, Joey Seitz, Sam Olla, Brendan Dowd, Josh Rahlf, Casey Steinman, Teddy Wollner, Lance Pinchard, Michael Holt, Tyler Hetebrueg, Cody Muckerheide, Garrett Yahr, Colton Gruber, Billy Lehman, Jim Bucheger and Josh Limbach. That totals more than 30 percent of the program.

"Academics came first," said Piittmann.

This season featured a new element to the team, the Leadership Council led by Assistant Coach Jason Last. Twelve players applied and were accepted. They met over summer and will continue to meet throughout the year to help provide student leadership and a student voice in the future of the program.

The Indians won the Kettle Moraine Bowl Trophy for the seventh straight year with their 34-3 victory over Campbellsport. Kewaskum was only pushed to the limit twice all season, a 38-28 win at Two Rivers and the season-ending, 22-21 playoff loss to Pewaukee. The Indians manhandled Plymouth in the second-final EWC game of the year, 33-21, and won every other game by at least 17 points.

Kewaskum won its homecoming game, 66-6, over Waupun, scoring the most points Piittmann can remember in his 13 years with the program. And the Indians for once didn't struggle at Kiel, winning 53-12.

Kewaskum again swept both West Bend schools - each of which has nearly double Kewaskum's enrollment - to start the season and go 2-0 headed into non-conference play.

Kewaskum's junior varsity team won the conference with a 6-1 record, rattling off five wins in a row before a forfeit win over Sheboygan Falls. The team finished 7-2 since it split with West Bend.

## Freshman finish .500

Kewaskum's freshman team went 4-4, including a win over Campbellsport for its only conference loss.

"We had some adversity," said Coach Dave Rockhill. "We always hung in there and bounced back"

Autumn Flasch suggested people "take the chance to shake their hand."

Jaya Monte described them as "a dedicated emotionally strong man or woman."

Brandon Prim said to make every day Veterans Day.

Kewaskum middle-schoolers had different ways of saying it, but the theme was the same: appreciate and thank veterans.

The school observed Veterans Day last Thursday with a moving ceremony that included music, videos, speeches from veterans themselves and short speeches from students.

Middle school technology teacher and Staff Sgt. Rob Wilmas served from 1997-2006. He was sent to the Middle East shortly after 9-11. The biggest thing he got from the military was an appreciation for his family and friends.

"You really learn not to take things for granted anymore," he said.

Students can come to school and get an education, and people may talk freely about the government.

"We have so many things and freedoms in America - it's pretty darn amazing," he said. Computer teacher and Staff Sgt. Dave Schultz served in Desert Shield in the early 1990s. He walked away from his family not knowing if he would ever see them again. Once in the Middle East, he stood in line for two hours to talk to his family once a month for five minutes.

"Veterans put their lives on hold to defend their country," he said. "That's why we should thank them."

Lawrence Wergin, grandfather of middle school teacher Nick Brettingen, joined the Air Force when he was 17 and later joined the Air National Guard. He served for 30 years, retiring in 1998. Wergin remembers being in combat support in Desert Storm in 1991.

"The Iraqis were surren-

dering as fast as they could. We couldn't even handle them," he said.

To the veterans, he said, "I'd like to say this to you: Thank you."

While that is the prevailing sentiment now, it wasn't always that way, said retired Army Sgt. First Class Phil Jens. Everyone was happy after World War II but got sick of war and didn't understand the Korean Conflict.

When veterans returned from Vietnam, the American public's reaction moved to polar opposite. He remembers coming across peace demonstrators while giving tours in Washington D.C.

"We were called everything under the sun," he said.

Jens said veterans aren't the only ones facing the challenges of fighting and spending time overseas.

"The hardest job for veterans is family," he said.

While as a veteran "you've got your own destiny in your hands," family members worry since they don't know where their loved ones are or what they're doing.

"Respect the military families," he said.

Like the story Monte told of Justin, a 25-year-old in the Army. He went overseas for a year as his wife just had their son. Justin came home to see him and went back overseas. Today, he has a baby girl born a month ago.

"Thank you veterans for everything you are and everything you've done to keep our country safe," she said.

Sean Bruss wants to honor veterans in other ways but for now words will have to do.

"I wish I could do more but now all I can say is thank you," he said.

Brettingen reminded students to honor all veterans, still here or not.

"Remember those who have fallen. Remember those who are still standing and remember those who are not able to stand," he said.





Staff members present were Matt Heiser, Mark Groeschel, Richard Knoebel, Jerry Gilles, Chad Cook and Stephanie Justmann. The news media and members from the community were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office, and at the Municipal Building on October 13, 2011. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer, and the News Media.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Craig Garbisch to approve the minutes from the September 22, 2011 and October 3, 2011 meetings, second by Jim Hovland. Voice vote, motion carried.

A public hearing was conducted on an ordinance to amend Chapter 4 of the Public Facilities Needs Assessment-Park and Recreation Facilities. Zoning Administrator Chad Cook presented an explanation of the changes needed to amend the Needs Assessment. Table 11 changes include a switch from the construction of three neighborhood parks to two neighborhood parks and an addition to Kiwanis Park. According to Table 12 there would be a shift of five acres from neighborhood parks to community parks therefore resulting in park fees eligible to contribute to the project increasing from 82.13% to 100%. The text amendments also reflect the designation of 100% of park fees contributable to future projects due to growth. No further comments were received.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to close the public hearing, second by Craig Garbisch and carried by roll call vote. Garbisch-aye, Roecker-aye, Berger-aye, Pesch-aye, Kufahl-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye. (7-0-0)

Kevin Struck from the UW Extension Office was on hand to provide the draft village-wide survey results. The surveys were mailed on July 27, 2011 and 539 surveys were received back for a 37% response rate. The average age of respondents were in the 40-50 year old category and lived in the village on average for 21 years. The overall quality of life in Kewaskum was rated as good or excellent. Various questions were reviewed including road maintenance, property tax levy, entrance sign and small town atmosphere. The final results of the survey will be available on the village's website.

The Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles reported:

1. The Scour Stop and sod have been installed at 510/520 Jefferson Drive and the existing rip rap rock was removed.

2. Due to an accident the fire hydrant on Timblin Drive was broke off below the ground and will be replaced.

3. DPW has an employee on light duty and wood chipping and leaf collection are still being completed as scheduled.

Administrator Matt Heiser:

1. Provided an update on the new conceal and carry law. Other municipalities in Washington County are choosing not to pass a resolution to ban fire arms from public buildings. By adopting a resolution there may be a loss of protection provided through the law for municipalities.

2. Provided an update on the Police Chief hiring process. The deadline for applying for the position was September 30th and twenty-two applications were received.

Jim Hovland, representative for the Plan Commission reported the October 25, 2011 meeting has been cancelled.

Norman Kufahl, representative for the Library Board, reported on the October 10, 2011 meeting. The circulation for September 2011 was 6,478 compared to 5,627 in 2010.

Matt Heiser, representative for the Mid-Moraine, reported the next dinner meeting has been scheduled for October 26th and will be hosted by the Village of Jackson. No one attended the legislative Sub-Committee meeting held on October 12, 2011.

Motion by Craig Garbisch to adopt Ordinance #11-05 To Update Compensation of Elected Officials, second by Kevin Scheunemann and carried by roll call vote. Garbisch-aye, Kufahl-aye, Berger-aye, Pesch-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye (4-3-0). The ordinance will reduce the Village Trustee annual salary from \$1,500 to \$1,000 and it will reduce the Village President's annual salary from \$2,000 to \$1,500.

Motion by Harry Roecker to adopt Ordinance #11-04 To Amend Chapter 4 of the Public Facilities Needs Assessment - Park and Recreation Facilities, second by Kevin Scheunemann. Voice vote, motion carried.

The cost to construct a baseball field at Kiwanis Park was reviewed along with the collection schedule of impact fees. The majority of the impact fees were collected in 2006 and according to state statutes they are required to be spent on new construction due to growth by 2013. Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to proceed with the project and maximize the use of impact fees up to \$117,000, second by Mike Berger and carried by roll call vote. Garbisch-aye, Roecker-aye, Berger-aye, Pesch-aye, Kufahl-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye (7-0-0).

Administrator Heiser explained the 2012 budget and the changes since the last Village Board meeting. The employee contributions toward health insurance premiums were entered into the budget at the actual premium rates for 2012, the sale of the squad car was entered to reflect the revenue that could be generated and the savings realized with a first year officer. This resulted in

an excess of \$8,500 which will need to be designated. Budget items discussed were additional contributions toward health insurance premiums by employees, furlough days and eliminating the donation toward music in the park. The Budget Public Hearing was scheduled for November 7, 2011 at 7:00 p.m.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to convene into Closed Session at 8:46 p.m. pursuant to Section 19.85 (1) (c) Wis. Stats. considering employment, promotion, compensation or performance evaluation data of any public employee over which the governmental body has jurisdiction or exercises responsibility as authorized by sec. 19.85 (1) (c) Wis. Stats. and Section 19.85 (1) (e) Wis. Stats. The purpose of the meeting is deliberating or negotiating the purchasing of public properties, the investing of public funds, or conducting other specified public business, whenever competitive or bargaining reasons require a closed session §19.85(1) (e), Wis. Stats. considering financial, medical, social or personal histories or disciplinary data of specific persons, preliminary consideration of specific personnel problems or the investigation of charges against specific persons except where par. 
