## Board to conduct hiring process internally for Superintendent

The Kewaskum Board of Education on Monday put together a plan to hire the district's next Superintendent. That plan includes handling the hiring process internally, saving the district thousands of dollars.

Coming out of Monday night's meeting that was attended by five district employees and just as many citizens, the next course of action will see freshman board member Tim Ramthun chairing and forming a committee to oversee the hiring of the next chief of the district.

That committee will be tasked with accepting and vetting applications, interviewing and hiring. Ramthun told his fellow board members they can be as involved in the process as they wished, but would be required to give up three nights during the final interviewing process, similar to if they had hired a search firm.

After last week's regular board

meeting Ramthun was given the green light to begin working with the district's administrative assistant, Jeanne Jacak to put together materials for the hiring project.

The deadline for applying will be Friday, Dec. 16, with the new superintendent starting Monday, July 2, 2012.

Ramthun stated the posting will be done locally and statewide. He expected between 30-100 applicants.

A status update will be monthly at regular meetings of the board of education, the first being December 12. At that meeting the vetting process will be discussed as well as establishing a firm hire date.

A community forum, similar to one held early this fall on the district's nutrition program will be held on Monday, Dec. 19. Ramthun stated he hoped to include district students, employees and residents to be part of the hiring committee.

Applications will be first reviewed

sometime between Dec. 19 and Jan. 2. A vetting sub-committee will review the applicants and present their choices at a special board meeting on Monday, Jan. 2. Ramthun indicated his plan was to allow all internal applicants a guaranteed interview, thus avoiding the vetting process.

At the regular meeting in January, a contract will be approved with a salary and benefit package. He indicated residency will be required of the new superintendent.

The first round of interviews is tentatively scheduled for January 11-12 with the final round taking place January 13, 16 and 17th. From the final interview three finalists will be presented to the board of education.

The position will be offered sometime around February 3 with an announcement taking place at the regular board meeting on February 13. Showing some continued

## Hunting is good on opening weekend; Hammes lands 12-pointer

Deer registration was fairly brisk at the Kewaskum BP Station at 890 Fond du Lac Avenue over the opening weekend of the 2011 gun deer season. By the end of the weekend, a preliminary call-in tally throughout the state showed hunters registered 112,581 deer over the two day period.

"We had 186 (deer registered)," Cindy Scheid, the assistant manager at the station, said Monday just after noon.

Of that total, 92 were bucks and 94 does, according to Scheid, who was unable to make a comparison with the opening weekend of 2010 because she did not have access to those numbers. "She did say, 'I'm guessing it's higher (than last year).'"

Concerning larger deer that were registered at the site, Scheid said, "Today we registered a big 12-pointer," which was shot by Doug Hammes of rural Campbellsport. "I know we had a couple other bigger ones, too."

"I'm happy ... it's a nice one," Hammes said, indicating he shot the deer on the first drive Monday morning about 7:30 a.m.

"It's 150 pounds. We weighed it," Hammes said, adding, "It's the biggest one I ever shot," and he plans to have the whole deer mounted.

This is the second year BP of Kewaskum has served as a registration site for Washington County, according to Scheid, who said the station is open from 4 a.m. to 10 p.m. each day and hunters are reminded they must register their deer by 5 p.m. on Monday, Nov. 28.

"As I listened to deer hunters over the opening weekend, there is a lot of excitement about the changes implemented this year; particularly the fact that hunters are no longer required to harvest an antlerless deer before harvesting their first buck in the CWD zone," said DNR Executive Assistant Scott Gunderson. "As we all expected, this change is extremely popular amongst hunters which is important as the DNR wants the

## Brodzy's Auto purchases former Honeck building

Mark Brodzeller, nickname Brodzy, a Kewaskum resident, has spent much of his time during the past 31 years between and underneath bumpers of domestic and foreign vehicles.

If the dramatic increase in business he has experienced at Brodzy's Auto, the business he and his wife Gayle have owned since 1995, is an indication, he has definitely mastered his craft.

Additional evidence is the fact that their business outgrew its 4,500 square-foot space in its former location at 1823 Barton Ave., West Bend. As a result, they moved Brodzy's Auto to 1242 Fond du Lac Ave., Kewaskum,

five employees, opened for business at its new location.

"We repair domestic and foreign vehicles, excluding European cars," Brodzy said, adding that their business does offer front-end alignments on its slate of services.

A West Bend native, Brodzy enrolled in shop classes while in high school. He then worked for 15 years at Waala Wheel and Tire (now Z's Wheel and Tire), in West Bend.

Realizing he had found his career niche as an auto technician, "I had a desire to own an auto repair business," he recalled.

He and Gayle then went into business in Barton in 1995, in the facility that had previously been an auto body shop. Gayle provides the bookkeeping services for Brodzy's Auto. Currently, in addition to Brodzy and his wife, the business has three other employees: Bryan Werbelow as service writer and auto technicians Matt Brodzeller and Wayne Werbelow.

In reminiscing about their early years in business, Brodzy shared an interesting episode. "I placed a small ad in the Yellow Pages when we first opened our shop," he recalled. "I then had customers coming in from as far as Port Washington and Fond du Lac.

"I could not even find the ad in the phone book, but that small ad definitely worked for me."

Business continues to be brisk at Brodzy's Auto. "With the current economic conditions, people are keeping their cars longer," he said.

The automotive repair industry has witnessed considerable changes, since he began his career, Brodzy noted.

"The newer vehicles are now computerized," he said.

As a result, he and Wayne Werbelow attend classes offered through Car Quest Automotive, West Bend. These classes, facilitated by an instructor from Illinois, are held in Allenton. Wayne also attends classes in Fond du Lac.

As to what he enjoys most about their business, Brodzy had a two-word response, "The customers."

Gayle agreed, adding, "We would like to thank the Honeck family for giving us the opportunity to move our business into this building. We also want to thank our family and friends for lending us moving equipment, helping us move, clean, paint and even providing meals for us during

the move."

Brodzy and Gayle say they have appreciated the warm welcome they are receiving in their new Kewaskum location. "It's an ideal spot, just a block away from Coffee Corner," Brodzy said.

"The summer time will be exciting for our customers. We can refer them to Coffee Corner, the area restaurants, the antique mall, the museum and other shops, while their vehicles are being repaired. They can walk around, with all of these businesses nearby."

resistance to Ramthun's plan, board president Bruce Braidigan stated he thought this was very serious (hiring a superintendent) and that if a bad superintendent is hired "we have to live with this."

Braidigan ultimately went along with the plan. However Vice President Bill Kesting was absent.

Jacak then presented a webpage on the district's website <www.kewaskumschools.org> that is being created for the posting. All application documents, information about the district; including a slideshow of district buildings and the hiring timeline that will be updated frequently will be on the page

as well as local website links for Kewaskum.

The job description will remain unchanged from that of former superintendent Michael Krumm.

The special meeting was held after a vote to hire a search firm failed at the regular meeting last week. Board member Bill Kesting motioned to have the district spend \$15,000 on an independent firm to search for a superintendent.

Ramthun made his initial pitch at that meeting gaining the trust of all but two of his fellow board members. The vote failed with Kesting and Braidigan voting for the search firm.



# Campbell had a knack for cooking and enjoying life

"Best boss I ever had."

"I just loved her, and I think most of her employees did."

"She just was a fun person to work for."

It's not often former employees are that complimentary about a boss, but Ruth Campbell was definitely one in a million. Pretty much all those in the Village of Kewaskum and many others from the surrounding area are aware of the skills she possessed in the kitchen and in dealing with people.

Campbell, who passed away on November 14 after a brief illness, owned and operated Campbell's Village Inn for 24 years. In that time, the number of friends she made probably equaled the total number of pies she baked and the cups of coffee she poured.

Among those friends were waitresses and cooks who were part of her business team from a decade to the full 24 years.

Cordell Kern had a 43-year history with the building at 1526 Fond du Lac Avenue, starting with Roy and Gert Schultz, right on through Campbell's, Buffy's, and then Brothers until she retired when she hit age 75.

Kern worked both with

Campbell and for her, and she recalls the tragic accident that claimed the life of Roy Schultz, and later how Gert Schultz offered the restaurant to her.

Kern said she didn't feel she wanted to buy the business but said to Ruth, "Why don't you buy it?"

And she did.

The kitchen was a bit smaller in the early years, then there was an expansion and the numbers of those coming in for their morning coffee and eggs or the full meals at lunch continued to climb.

"We had a lot of people who even came from Milwaukee," Kern said.

Kern agreed the restaurant had a special, family atmosphere. "We just all got along ... You know how it was when you came in," she said to this reporter, adding, "The kitchen was always open," meaning patrons could come to the open window to greet Campbell or the cooks. Campbell would always greet them with a smile and friendly banter.

After both stopped working, they were still members of a group that met every Tuesday at the Gateway Cafe for breakfast. Kern remembers the last day Campbell met with the group, parting with the usual, "We'll see you next week," but God had

other plans.

Carrie Struebing knew Campbell for four decades and worked with her for 12 years. She was actually related to Campbell (Carrie's mother-in-law was a sister to Ruth's husband, Bud).

"She welcomed me with open arms. We became friends ... she was a confidante ... a mother ... almost anything. She had such a big heart," Struebing said, adding, "Her daughter Kari was my best friend."

While Struebing is understandably saddened by Campbell's passing, she said memories of their years together will sustain her, like the time Augie Bilgo spread peanut butter on the door, which one of the workers grasped while going to get some supplies.

"Then they got his truck," Struebing said, noting how they retaliated by putting peanut butter on the door handle. "Did we laugh!"

Bilgo, then director of the Village's Department of Public Works, and crew often stopped in for breakfast, especially after plowing snow all night. Struebing said they would bring the plow to Campbell's home and to hers to make sure they could get to the restaurant to open up.

The late, Roger Reindl was a joker, and once brought

the legs of a mannequin and situated them in the freezer in such a way that one of the waitresses thought a real woman had been stranded in the freezer.

"When Phyllis Jandre saw the legs, she screamed so loud they almost heard her in Campbellsport," Struebing said, recalling another time when she was carrying a peach half in a dish, slipped and the peach flew down the counter and landed in a customer's lap.

One scary remembrance was when the restaurant was being robbed as Struebing was coming to work at 4:30 a.m. "I knew I had to find a quarter to call the cops," she said, then before they arrived, she started the coffee and put the grill on.

Campbell scolded her a bit that day, asking if she considered the thief may have had a gun. Struebing said she hadn't, and only then did it sink in how dangerous the situation could have been.

About the only regret Struebing experienced at the restaurant was not being able to duplicate Campbell's delicious German Potato Salad.

"She gave me her recipe ... I stood next to her and did it step by step like she did, and still it never tasted like hers!" she said.

Another Struebing, Joan, was a waitress for Campbell for nine years. She echoed the others in praising Campbell's dealings with her employees.

"She had a nice way of treating all her employees very fairly," Joan Struebing said. Concerning fond memories, she said, "There were so many," then pointed to "the fun you could have with the customers," rattling off names like Bilgo, Willie Goeden, Reverend Paul Hoenecke and those from Regal Ware.

When Campbell wasn't cooking, she loved trips to casinos or playing cards with friends. Rosie Kuehl was a member of her Wednesday afternoon Sheepshead club.

"We had many good times together," Kuehl said, recalling how Campbell once came

with her to a tavern owners convention in Las Vegas. "That was her first plane trip," she said.

Kuehl was among several hundred who said good bye to Campbell at a funeral Mass at Holy Trinity Church last Thursday. "Father (Ed Kornath) gave her a good sendoff," she said.

By their presence, all agreed they were thankful to have known Campbell.

## Packer Party will benefit Ziebell

Thanksgiving -- a time of reflection and gratitude.

For town of Farmington resident Greg Ziebell, 55, his wife Connie and their children -- Kewaskum High School graduates -- Adam, 24, and Katie, 21, this holiday is truly a time to give thanks that Greg has survived colon and lung cancer. All four remain guardedly optimistic.

The past 2½ years have held more than their share of crosses for them. Greg was originally diagnosed with colon cancer in August 2009, and his family has stood by faithfully throughout his ordeal.

Many will be grateful for his leadership in their Thanksgiving prayers. Greg has shared his time and talents through his civic-minded endeavors, as a seventh-grade Kewaskum Gridiron Club coach for the past 12 years.

For more than 15 years, he was a baseball coach and volunteer for the Farmington Athletic Club. This organization operates boys and girls baseball and softball in Fillmore. Greg has also assisted in running the concession stand at the Farmington Baseball Field.

"He still helps out in summer as much as he can," Adam noted.

Greg's family, employer, fellow employees and the community are now rallying to his support. Adam and Katie have planned a Dec. 11 Packer Party Benefit on their father's behalf, open to the public, beginning at 11:30 a.m., at Hon-E-Kor Golf & Country Club in Kewaskum, with all proceeds earmarked to help pay his skyrocketing medical bills.

"Katie and I got the ball rolling for the Packer Party," Adam said, adding that another individual helped initiate the event.

"The President of the company my dad works for, Dave Tomczek, of Federal Tool & Engineering LLC, [Cedarburg] and I had the idea for the fundraiser," Adam recalled.

"The company's owners and co-workers have been incredibly helpful to conceive of and help organize the event," Adam added. "The company has been helpful monetarily with the event too."

In addition, the Kewaskum Gridiron Club's Board of Directors, affiliated coaches, some of Connie's fellow employees and Hon-E-Kor staff are assisting with the event.

"A lot of individuals helped also by offering donations for the silent auction," Adam said, emphasizing, "The event is to support both of our parents, who have been through all of this together."

The Packer Party event will include food, drinks, a raffle and/or silent auction, with

prizes from local sponsors.

Among other prizes are: a picture signed by University of Wisconsin-Madison Badgers football coach Brett Beilma; UW-Madison tickets for a Badgers men's basketball team game and a stay at a beautiful bed & breakfast in Cascade. Attendees at the Dec. 11 fundraiser will be able to watch the Packers play the Oakland Raiders.

Katie is elated at the support she and her brother are receiving in organizing the party and in their allegiance to her father.

"Everybody has been so wonderful to our family, and we are blessed to have such wonderful people in our lives," she said.

The people whose lives Greg has touched felt likewise about him. Julie Craig, a member of the Kewaskum Gridiron Club's Board of Directors, commended Greg for being a positive role model for youth and for having a good sense of humor.

"Greg is awesome," she said. "He was my son Tyler's first football coach."

Now a senior at Kewaskum High School, Tyler is a member of the school's varsity football team.

Julie recalled an incident that occurred during a football practice, when Tyler was in seventh grade, with Greg as his coach. "Greg went to use the porta-potty," Julie recalled. "Tyler decided to play a prank on him and tipped the porta-potty but did not knock it over."

"Greg came running out, looking for the person responsible. Tyler owned up to it, and they both laughed," she added. "The two of them bonded over that prank and have been close ever since. Tyler even went to visit Greg, while he was in the hospital."

In initiating the upcoming benefit, Adam, a student at the University of Wisconsin-Madison's Law School, sent an e-mail to Kelly Nerat, secretary of the Kewaskum Gridiron Club's Board of Directors, who is also manager of the Hon-E-Kor.

Adam's e-mail, which Julie Craig forwarded to The Statesman, describes some of the fallout of Greg's condition during the past 27 months. It also commends Connie for her courage amidst Greg's struggles.

"My mom has been incredibly strong throughout the whole process and for Katie and me," the e-mail states.

After being diagnosed with colon cancer, Greg underwent two surgeries to remove the tumor. Despite this ordeal, he put his family's needs first.

"At the time of his first surgery, I told him I was going to put off going to law school for a while," Adam said. "He told me to take care of my business, and he would take care of his. That really helped me know he was going to fight this. He wanted my mom and

Katie to carry on with their lives too."

They did just that. Adam will graduate from the University of Wisconsin-Madison Law School in May.

Connie continued her employment as a dental hygienist for Dr. Gerald Vogler's Gentle Family Dentistry, Random Lake, where she has worked for 15 years. "Her co-workers have been equally supportive and helpful," Adam said.

Katie, who is enrolled in the nursing program at Moraine Park Technical College, is employed full-time as a psychiatric care worker for Wheaton Franciscan Healthcare, Milwaukee.

Following Greg's two initial surgeries, A one-month recuperation in the hospital followed, and then six months of chemotherapy treatments, culminating in April 2010.

"Then a CT scan revealed the cancer had traveled to both lungs," Adam's e-mail points out. Thus, in fall 2010, he underwent two surgeries to remove two tumors."

The second surgery resulted in a severe staph infection. Months of home care, wound care, rounds of antibiotics and another surgery to remove (de-bride) materials that may cause infection from the wound ensued.

"After that, another CT scan revealed more spots on his lungs," Adam said. "The doctors determined the spots would be treatable by radiation."

Several weeks ago, Greg completed his sixth and final round of radiation. The follow-up scans are inconclusive at this time. "But we are optimistic," Adam noted. "He is back at work through much of this, and he remains positive."

Katie added, "The tumors are getting smaller. We are praying this isn't false hope and that this is the end of our family's hell."

Hopefully, Hon-E-Kor will be filled with dozens of well-wishers for Greg on Dec. 11. It's time to offer thanks to him for what he has meant in others' lives.







hunting public to 'buy-in' to our herd management structure."

The 2011 preliminary state count was up about 5.6 percent from the opening weekend count of 106,404 from 2010. Preliminary buck harvest statewide in 2011 was 57,977 (54,263 in 2010) and preliminary antlerless harvest was 54,604 (52,141 in 2010).

The department's license sales office reported 603,919 gun deer licenses sold by the start of shooting hours on Nov. 19. Deer license and tag sales will continue through the hunting seasons. DNR licensing managers reported

selling a record 99,998 licenses on Friday, Nov. 18. At one point in late afternoon Friday, computers showed license sales coming in at a rate of 220 per minute.

There were no fatal shooting incidents recorded during the first two days of the hunt and two non-fatal shooting injuries -- one to a non-hunter doing a deer drive in Clark County on Sunday and another in deer drive in Waukesha County on Monday.





September 30, 1911

Local capital only is interested in the new factory, but a number of experienced aluminum workers will look after the mechanical part of the business. Orders for machinery have been placed and the new works will be ready for operation some time in October.

The barn of Jacob Scheid, two miles north of the village of Campbellsport, was struck by lightning early Wednesday morning and totally destroyed by fire. The loss on the building and the contents amounts to fully \$2,000. The fire is a severe blow to the family. This has been the second fire that destroyed their barn within the past 12 years.



Receiving Water and Location: East & West Branches of the Milwaukee River/East Branch of the Rock River

Brief Facility Description: Volm Farms is an existing cash cropping and custom heifer operation located in the Township of Wayne, Washington County, Wisconsin. There are a total of 3 sites: one located on the north side of Sunset Drive (directly across from the Main Farm), the Main Farm located on south side of Sunset Drive and the third site located 1300 feet east of the Main Farm. All 3 sites will be covered in this permit. Facilities at Volm Farms include: a double ten milking parlor, 2 free-stall barns for milking and dry cows, a steer barn, 2 heifer barns with attached outdoor feedlots, 1 barn for housing both steers and heifers, 2 calf barns, anaerobic digester, solids separator, solids stacking area, machine shed, shop, well pump house, electrical building, 5 upright silos, 4 concrete feed bunkers and 2 concrete manure storage structures (5,600,000 gallons combined manure storage). Digested manure solids are used for bedding in 2 free-stall barns, corn stock bedded pack is used for bedding in the steer and heifer barns and straw is used for bedding in the calf barns. Volm Farms is being issued a WPDES permit because the proposed number of animal units exceeds the 1,000 animal unit threshold that requires a WPDES permit. 1,650 heifers, 30 calves and 60 steers (1,781 animal units) are housed mainly in confinement. During the course of the permit, the operation does not have any plans to expand.

Volm Farms currently has 259 days of manure storage. Volm Farms currently meets the 180 day storage requirement of NR 243. To comply with federal laws, Volm Farms must have 180 days of storage available by January 1, 2010.

If Volm Farms stacks manure, all concrete stacking pads must meet NRCS 313 standards and headland stacking site requests must be approved by the Department, prior to use.

With 1,781 Animal Units (AU), annual manure production is estimated to be 8,000,000 gallons of liquid manure and 7,000 tons of solid manure. Volm Farms has approximately 3,000 acres available for land spreading. Volm Farms owns approximately 336 acres and rents an additional 1,548 acres, under long-term cropland rent agreements. In addition, Volm Farms crops over 1,000 additional acres that may be included in

the NMP. Volm Farms spreads manure in accordance with a Manure Management Plan approved by the Department. Manure will be incorporated within 12 hours of application, to eliminate run-off and odor. Manure will not be field applied when there is the potential for adverse weather conditions. No runoff of manure or ponding in fields is allowed at any time. The permittee must meet additional spreading requirements of NR 243. Manure samples will be analyzed in accordance with the requirements of the proposed permit. Land spreading rates must be adjusted based on sample analysis.

A phosphorous strategy for manure management will be submitted to the Department, as required by the proposed permit. Set-back distances for phosphorous based manure management are more stringent than those for a nitrogen-based manure management plan.

The proposed permit requires that a Nutrient Management Plan be submitted and updated annually. The Nutrient Management Plan must be approved by the Department and cover the handling of all manure. The permit will restrict winter spreading of liquid manure on frozen or snow covered ground to only emergency situations and restrict solid manure applications on frozen and snow covered grounds.

Feed leachate is not currently collected and will be required as a condition of this permit. Any upgrading or modification of feed storage areas, leachate collection systems or stormwater runoff controls requires that plans and specifications and a written description to correct the adverse runoff conditions be submitted to the Department.

The Department discussed the compliance schedule with Shaun Volm on 11/16/11 and he found it reasonable and acceptable.

All runoff control and manure storage systems at all sites will be monitored by Volm Farms and will be reported according to the permit schedule.

Volm Farms has a high capacity well permit. Water usage is measured by meter. There are no spray irrigation systems on site.

The Department has tentatively decided that the above specified WPDES permit should be issued for this new discharge.

Limitations and conditions which the Department believes adequately protect the receiving water are included in the proposed permit. Land application of waste shall be done in accordance with permit conditions and applicable codes. All land application sites shall be approved prior to their use. To receive a list of approved sites, or to be notified of potential approvals, contact the permit drafter.

Persons wishing to comment on or object to the proposed permit action, or to request a public hearing, may write to the Department of Natural Resources at the permit drafter's address. All comments or suggestions received no later than 30 days after the publication date of this public notice will be considered along with other information on file in making a final decision regarding the permit. Anyone providing comments in response to this public notice will receive a notification of the Department's final decision when the permit is issued. Where designated as a reviewable surface water discharge permit, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is allowed up to 90 days to submit comments or objections regarding this permit determination. If no comments are received on the proposed permit from anyone, including U.S. EPA, the permit will be issued as proposed.

The Department may schedule a public informational hearing if requested by any person and shall schedule a public informational hear-



ing if a petition requesting a hearing is received from 5 or more persons or if response to this notice indicates significant public interest pursuant to s. 283.49, Stats. **WINTER PARKING**

Reminder that the Winter Parking Restrictions and Snow Emergency Parking Restrictions go into effect at mid-night (12:00 a.m.) on December 1, 2011 and is in effect until 12:00 am on April 1, 2012.

Municipal Code Section 90-96(c) Night Parking Restrictions, reads as follows: No person excepting physicians or licensed emergency vehicles on emergency calls, shall park or stop any vehicle on any public street or highway within the village between the hours of 2:00 A.M. and 6:00 A.M. from December 1, to April 1, of each year; provided that, notwithstanding such restrictions vehicles, may be parked a period of time not longer than 3 minutes for actually loading or unloading of passengers, and provided further that no other regulation restricting parking as to place, time, or manner violated thereby. Signs have been erected at or reasonably near the corporate limits as provided in Section 349.13, Wisconsin Statutes.

The fine for violating the ordinance is:

- \$20.00 if paid within five (5) days of the issuance of the parking citation.
- \$30.00 if paid between six (6) days and before twenty-eight (28) days.

After 28 days, the amount is \$40.00 and a notice will be sent to the Motor Vehicle Department to suspend any and all vehicle registrations held by the owner and refuse renewals of the same until the citation is satisfied.

**An important fact is the owner of the vehicle is responsible for the payment of the citation whether or not he or she was the operator.**

Municipal Code Section 90-96(d) Removal of Illegally Parked Vehicles. This section covers the issuance of citations and to the possible removal of such vehicles in violation of this ordinance. In addition to other penalties provided by Section 90-96 of this code, the owner or operator of a vehicle so removed shall pay the cost of the towing and storage.

# Candy Tree owner sharing The Elf on the Shelf Tradition

**KEWASKUM-** One local retailer has been captured by the Christmas spirit displayed in a popular children's Christmas story that is gaining national attention. The Candy Tree has everything you need to start the Elf on the Shelf tradition in your home.

The Elf on the Shelf: A Christmas Tradition is a self-published children's picture book written in 2005 by American mother-daughter duo Carol Aebersold and Chanda Bell, and illustrated by Coë Steinwart. The book has been adapted into an animated movie that will air on CBS Friday, Nov. 25 at 7:30 p.m. central. The following day it will be released on DVD and Blu-ray.

Jung says The Elf on the Shelf comes in a keepsake box that features the hard-bound book and a small, pixie scout elf, or the elf can be purchased separately in her store. She will also carry the DVD after it is released.

The book is written in rhyme with accompanying watercolor illustrations. The book explains the authors' family's Scandinavian tradition of placing a pixie doll elf named Fisbee who appeared every Thanksgiving in a different place around their home. Fisbee would fly to the North Pole each night to tell whether the Aebersold children were "naughty or nice," playing off the 1934 song "Santa Claus is Coming to Town."

The elf's presence helped keep children well-behaved so they could get the presents they want come Christmas. Before the family wakes up each morning, the scout elf flies back from the North Pole and hides. By hiding in a new spot each morning

around the house, the scout elf and the family play an ongoing game of hide and seek.

The Elf on the Shelf explains that elves get their magic by being named. Once the elf is named, the scout elf receives its special Christmas magic which allows it to fly to and from the North Pole. However, the magic might go if touched, so a rule is put in place for the elf:

"There's only one rule that you have to follow so I

will come back and be here tomorrow: Please do not touch me. My magic might go, and Santa won't hear all I've seen or I know." Although families aren't supposed to touch their scout elf, they can talk to it and tell it all their Christmas wishes so it can report back to Santa accurately.

The authors say The Elf on the Shelf may never have gotten published, after sending out The Elf on the Shelf

to major publishing houses, only to receive rejection letter after rejection letter, Aebersold and Bell decided to self-publish. They started with only 300 copies; by the end of 2007, it had sold more than 200,000 copies and has since sold over 1.5 million copies.

The movie adaptation shows nine-year-old Taylor McCuttle who has reached a crossroads. Does he believe Santa Claus really knows who is naughty or nice or even believe in Santa Claus

anymore? Cue Chippey, the young scout elf who is assigned by Santa to restore Taylor's believe in Christmas magic. When the boy breaks the number one elf on the shelf rule, he loses his Christmas magic; the entire McCuttle family loses its scout elf. Through the power of love and forgiveness, both of them learn the most important lesson of all that true beliefs cannot be taught.







## 2011 Holiday stamps now on sale



"In this small way, the Postal Service extends its warmest wishes to you and yours for a very festive, healthy and happy holiday season," said Lepak.

The stamps are on sale at the Kewaskum Post Office, online at usps.com and by phone at 800-782-6724.

The Postal Service receives no tax dollars for operating expenses and relies on the sale of postage, products and services to fund its operations.

It's hard to believe, but Christmas is only a month away. To help get everyone in the spirit, the Postal Service is kicking off the 2011 holiday season by issuing its new Christmas stamps. This year, all holiday stamps will be Forever stamps.

"Holiday gift catalogs are already in the mail," said Kewaskum Postmaster Monica Lepak. "Soon we'll be delivering extra packages, cards and letters. Many of them will be dressed in their holiday best — wearing one of the 2011 holiday stamps."

"Last year, we sold 1.3 billion holiday stamps from October to December," added Lepak. That amounts to one in every 10 stamps we sell for the year. We hope to sell even more this year."

Inspired by 1950s-era ornaments, the festive Holiday Baubles Forever stamps feature four colorful ornaments sure to add to the joys of the season. These baubles may inspire fond memories of beloved ornaments from childhood, while still having the power to enchant us today. Art director William Gicker used illustrations by Linda Fountain of Hilton Head Is-

land, SC, to create the ornaments shown in the stamp art.

For many years, the Postal Service has issued traditional Christmas stamps featuring the Madonna and Child. The Christmas stamp for 2011 presents a detail from a painting by the Italian master Raphael, entitled Madonna of the Candelabra. This circular painting dates to 1513 and is now in the Walters Art Museum collection in Baltimore, MD.

In 1508, Raphael was summoned by Pope Julius II to Rome, where he spent the last dozen years of his short life in an inspired burst of activity. The masterpieces he produced in Rome include the painting reproduced on this stamp. The stamp art is a detail of the painting, as the original photograph was cropped to fit the stamp format. Richard Sheaff served as art director for this issuance.

Both the Holiday Baubles and Madonna of the Candelabra by Raphael stamps are being issued as Forever stamps which make them good for one-ounce First-Class Mail postage forever.



- Carve detailed designs into pottery. Moisten the tool to put the finishing touches on sculptures.

- Touch-up hard-to-reach areas on freshly painted model airplanes and cars – or even dollhouses.

Have fun with your family making this adorable snowman that's simple for children to create with a little help from mom or dad.

#### Cheery Snowman

Skill Level: Intermediate

Prep Time: 2 hours

Dry Time: 30 minutes

Materials:

1 Standard pack (500-count) of cotton swabs  
3 Styrofoam balls; 1 large, 1 medium, 1 small, (no smaller than 2 inches in diameter)

1 brown pipe cleaner

1 sheet wax paper

1 Popsicle stick or floral stake

Child-safe scissors

Child-safe, non-toxic black paint

Child-safe, non-toxic orange paint

Have an adult cut the bottom off the largest Styrofoam

ball, so the piece can lay flat upon a table or surface.

Using a Popsicle stick or floral stake, stack all three Styrofoam balls from largest at the bottom, to smallest at the top to form one standing figure.

Fold and twist 4 cotton swabs in half; dip 6 halves into the black paint and 1 into the orange paint. Lay flat on wax paper to dry.

Cut pipe cleaner in half; insert into sides of middle Styrofoam ball as arms.

Begin folding cotton swabs; insert into foam balls until completely covered.

Insert black cotton swabs into top ball for coal eyes and mouth. Insert orange cotton swab as the carrot nose.

## Safe ways to set up your home

(NAPSI)—Heeding a few hints from the experts at the Electrical Safety Foundation International can help you have a beautiful home for the holidays and a safer and happier new year:

- If you are purchasing new decorations, shop only at reputable retailers that you trust.

- Make sure your decorations have been approved for safe use by a nationally recognized testing laboratory.

- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions that accompany your decorations.

- Carefully inspect each electrical decoration and extension cord before use; discard any damaged items. Cracked sockets, bare or frayed wires, and loose connections may cause a serious shock or fire.

- Never connect more than three strands of incandescent lights together to make a longer string.

- Consider getting LED

lights, which use less power and burn cooler than traditional incandescents, allowing you to safely connect more sets.

- Avoid overloading electrical outlets, which can overheat and start a fire.

- Don't pinch cords in windows or doorways or under heavy furniture.

- Keep cords out of walkways and high-traffic areas.

- If you get a live Christmas tree, check it for freshness. A fresh tree will stay green longer and is less of a fire hazard than a dry tree.

- Heated rooms dry out even fresh trees quickly. Be sure to keep the stand filled with water.

- For artificial trees, look for a "fire-resistant" label.

- Put the tree at least three feet away from all heat sources, including fireplaces and space heaters.

- Decorate your tree with non-combustible or flame-resistant materials.

- Avoid using candles

when possible. Consider using battery-operated candles in place of traditional candles.

- When decorating outside, make sure all decorations and extension cords are marked for outdoor use.

- Always use a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI)-protected outlet outdoors.

- Exercise extreme caution when decorating near overhead power lines. Use a wooden or fiberglass ladder instead of metal. Keep yourself and your equipment at least 10 feet from power lines.

- Outdoor extension cords and lights should be kept clear of standing water and snow.

- Remember to turn off and unplug all decorations before leaving home or turning in for the night.

## CHOCOLATE BUTTER PECANS

4 dozen cookies

### INGREDIENTS

Cookies:  
1/2 cup (1 stick) butter, softened  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 cup light brown sugar, packed  
1 large egg  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 teaspoons Mexican or pure vanilla extract  
1 1/2 cups flour  
1 to 2 teaspoons pure chili powder, to taste  
1 cup (4 ounces) pecans, toasted and finely chopped  
sea salt, optional

### Mexican Chocolate Icing:

1 pound bittersweet chocolate, coarsely chopped  
1 teaspoon Mexican or pure vanilla extract  
1/2 teaspoon pure chili powder  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
pecans halves for garnish

### COOKING DIRECTIONS:

Cookies:  
Preheat oven to 375°F. Beat butter and sugars in large bowl with electric mixer until light and fluffy. Add egg, salt and vanilla; blend until incorporated. Stir in flour and chili powder; blend well. Add chopped pecans; mix to combine.

Shape dough into 1-inch balls; place on parchment-lined baking sheets. Bake for 12 to 15 minutes or until very light brown and crisp at the edges. Cool cookies on pan for two minutes or until set, then transfer to wire rack to cool completely.

### Mexican Chocolate Icing:

Place chocolate, vanilla, chili powder and cinnamon in large microwave-safe dish. Microwave 30 seconds on high, stir and continue to microwave in 10- to 20-second intervals, stirring after each until chocolate is melted and smooth. Using teaspoon, drizzle chocolate over cooled cookies; press a pecan half on top and sprinkle with sea salt.

Store cookies in airtight container at room temperature, separating layers with parchment paper, for up to 1 week.

## WINTERMINT WAFERS

Makes 3 dozen cookies

### INGREDIENTS

Chocolate Cookies:  
1 cup (2 sticks) butter, softened  
1 cup confectioners' sugar  
1 teaspoon peppermint extract  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 cup unsweetened cocoa powder  
1 1/2 cups flour

Chocolate Coating:  
1 pound semi-sweet chocolate, chopped  
1 teaspoon peppermint extract

### DIRECTIONS

Chocolate Cookies:

In large bowl, beat butter and confectioners' sugar with electric mixer until light and fluffy. Stir in peppermint extract followed by salt and cocoa powder; mix. Add flour and mix to incorporate.

Divide dough in two pieces and place each on large sheet of plastic wrap. Flatten into 1/2-inch thick discs, wrap and refrigerate until firm enough to roll out, about 45 minutes.

Preheat oven to 350°F. Remove chilled dough, place disc between two sheets of parchment; roll out to 1/8-inch thick. Cut desired shapes and place on parchment-lined baking sheets. Bake 5 to 6 minutes. Remove cookies from oven; cool on pan 3 to 4 minutes. Remove to wire rack to cool completely.

### Chocolate Coating:

Place chocolate in large microwave-safe dish. Microwave 30 seconds on high, stir and continue to microwave in 10- to 20-second intervals, stirring after each until chocolate is melted and smooth. Stir in peppermint extract.

To frost cookies, place one cookie on slotted spatula, carefully dip into the chocolate, coating completely; lift cookie out. Hold cookie on spatula, allowing excess chocolate to drip off. Place cookie onto wire cooling rack to let chocolate set. Repeat with remaining cookies.

Place coated cookies in freezer for 1 hour to set before storing or serving. Store cookies in airtight container for up to 1 week, or in freezer for up to 3 weeks.

## EGGNOG CREAM CHEESE CUPS

Makes 2 dozen

### Dough:

2 cups all-purpose flour  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 cup (2 sticks) cold butter, cut into 1/2-inch pieces  
1/2 cup sour cream  
1 egg yolk

### Filling:

8 ounces cream cheese, at room temperature  
1 egg  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 teaspoon pure vanilla extract  
1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg  
Powdered sugar

### DIRECTIONS

In large bowl, combine the flour and salt. Add the butter and mix the ingredients with an electric mixer on low speed until they form a sandy, crumbly mixture, about 1 minute.

In a small bowl, whisk together the sour cream and egg yolk until very smooth. Add the sour cream and egg mixture to the flour mixture and mix until the dough comes together, about 30 seconds. The dough may feel a little dry. Form the dough into a disk, wrap in plastic wrap, and chill at least 4 hours or overnight.

In a large bowl, beat cream cheese,

egg, sugar, vanilla and nutmeg with an electric mixer until smooth; set aside filling.

On a work surface thickly dusted with powdered sugar, roll out the chilled cookie dough to form a 12x18-inch rectangle, about 1/8-inch thick. Using the tip of a sharp knife or a pizza cutter, cut the dough into 2x2-inch squares. Place a teaspoon of the cream cheese filling in the center of each square.

Grease the cups of a mini muffin pan. Gather the points of the dough square around the filling to make a cup, open

at the top. Place the cookie directly into a mini muffin pan or place the cookie in a mini muffin paper liner and place the paper liner in the pan. Repeat with the remaining squares and refrigerate 30 minutes. Meanwhile, preheat the oven to 375°F.

Bake cookies until golden brown, about 15 minutes. Let cookies cool completely in the pan on a wire rack before removing. Store cookies in an airtight container in the refrigerator, for up to 1 week.

**Parmesan Pepper Spritz Crackers**

- Makes about 7 dozen crackers
- 1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
  - 1/2 teaspoon cracked black pepper
  - 1/2 teaspoon ground white pepper
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 2 cups (about 8 ounces) grated Parmesan cheese
  - 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter, softened
  - 2 cloves garlic, finely minced
  - 1/3 cup milk

Preheat oven to 375°F. In small bowl, combine flour, black pepper, white pepper and salt. In large bowl, beat cheese, butter and garlic until smooth. Gradually add flour mixture to cheese mixture. Mix until dough forms a ball. Gradually add milk, mixing until fully incorporated. Shape into small logs and place in Cookie Master Ultra II. Using desired disk, press crackers onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 11 to 13 minutes or until edges are light golden brown. Cool 2 minutes on cookie sheet on cooling grid. Remove from sheet and cool completely. Store in airtight container up to 1 week.

**Merry Mushroom Bites**

- Makes 24 bites
- 1/3 cup diced yellow onion
  - 3 tablespoons butter
  - 12 ounces portobello or baby portobello mushrooms, coarsely diced
  - 4 teaspoons finely chopped fresh rosemary
  - 1-1/4 teaspoons black pepper
  - 3 eggs
  - 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
  - 1-1/4 teaspoons salt
  - 1 package (4 ounces) water or other favorite crackers
  - 1/2 cup sour cream
  - 1/2 red bell pepper, thinly sliced
  - Chopped rosemary or parsley (optional)

Preheat oven to 350°F. Prepare Bite-Size Silicone Tree Mold with vegetable pan spray. In large skillet, cook onion and butter over medium-low heat stirring occasionally until soft, about 5 minutes. Add mushrooms, rosemary and black pepper; cook until liquid has evaporated, about 10 minutes; cool slightly. Transfer mixture to food processor. Add eggs, flour, and salt. Pulse until mixture is pureed with no large pieces of mushroom or onion. Fill cavities of silicone mold completely with mushroom mixture, patting flat. Bake 15 to 18 minutes or until top of the mushroom mixture is firm. Cool in pan 15 minutes; carefully remove and place on cracker. Top with sour cream, sliced red pepper and, if desired, rosemary. Serve warm or at room temperature.

**Savory Southwest Donuts**

- Makes about 36 mini donuts
- 1 tablespoon ground paprika, divided
  - 1-1/2 cups cake flour
  - 1-1/4 teaspoons baking powder
  - 3/4 teaspoon ground cumin
  - 1/2 to 3/4 teaspoon ground chipotle chili powder
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 3/4 cup milk
  - 1 egg
  - 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
  - 1 garlic clove, finely minced
  - 2 tablespoons finely chopped cilantro
- Topping**
- 1 ripe avocado
  - 1 teaspoon lime juice
  - Salt to taste
  - Additional chopped cilantro

Preheat oven to 400°F. Spray Mini Donut Pan with vegetable pan spray. Lightly sprinkle wells with some of the paprika. In large bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder, cumin, chili powder and salt. In second bowl, whisk together milk, egg, oil, garlic and cilantro. Add wet ingredients to dry ingredients and stir just until flour is moistened. Fill each donut cavity about 1/2 full. Bake 5 to 7 minutes or until the top of the donuts spring back when touched. Let cool in pan 4 to 5 minutes before removing. Wash pan, dry thoroughly and prepare with pan spray and paprika. Repeat with remaining batter. For topping, mash avocado with lime juice and salt; stir until smooth using a whisk or in a food processor. Pipe avocado mixture over top of cooled donuts. Sprinkle with cilantro. Serve immediately.

**All Aglow Melon-tinis**


- Makes 1 cocktail
- Wilton Red Sparkle Gel
  - 2 ounces green melon liqueur
  - 1 ounce lemon flavored vodka
  - 1 ounce bottled sour mix
  - 2 ounces club soda
  - Maraschino cherries (optional)
- Squeeze Wilton Red Sparkle Gel around the inside of a martini glass. In cocktail shaker filled with ice, combine melon liqueur, vodka, sour mix and club soda; shake well. Strain into martini glass. Garnish with maraschino cherries.

**Cheery Cranberry Mojitos**

- Makes 1 cocktail
- 6 fresh mint leaves, plus additional sprigs for garnish
  - 1/2 lime, cut into four wedges
  - 1 tablespoon dried cranberries
  - 2 tablespoons Wilton Red Colored Sugars, plus additional for garnish
  - 3 ounces rum
  - 3 ounces cranberry juice
  - 2 ounces club soda
- In tall glass, thoroughly muddle mint leaves, lime wedges, cranberries, and red sugar. Add rum, cranberry juice and club soda and stir. Add ice and additional club soda to fill glass.

**Peppermint Blitz Hot Chocolate**

- Makes about 4 servings
- 1 quart (4 cups) milk
  - 1 cup (about 6 ounces) Wilton Dark Cocoa Candy Melts, roughly chopped
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
  - 3/4 teaspoon peppermint extract
  - 3 ounces chocolate liqueur (optional)
  - 1 ounce peppermint liqueur (optional)
- In a large pot over medium-low flame, heat milk and Candy Melts, whisking frequently, until boiling. Remove from heat. Stir in extracts and liqueurs, if using. Garnish with peppermint sticks or curls or snowman decorations and serve immediately.
