


Snowflakes and Angels grace Christmas Parade

Semi driver charged in 2010 fatal Hwy 41 crash charged

WEST BEND- Charges have been filed against Robert M. White, 63, of Malone for his alleged involvement in a major crash that occurred on December 15th, 2010 in the Town of Wayne on US Highway 41.

In that crash, White is alleged to have driven into the back of a slow line of vehicles that were following a detour off of US Hwy 41 southbound. That detour was in progress due to an earlier crash further south on the highway.

The crash, which occurred north of County Hwy D saw a total of four passenger vehicles and White's semi tanker involved. Two were killed and three others were injured. Two Flight for Life helicopters were dispatched to the scene as well as several fire departments including Kohlsville and Kewaskum.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office was the primary investigating agency. Due to the large scene, its reconstruction team was assisted by the Wisconsin State Patrol team.

The Sheriff's Office requested charges on October 26, 2011 as the investigation provided probable cause to believe White had committed several crimes. White made an initial appearance in court on December 1st, and was released on a \$2,500 signature bond.

Charges filed by the District Attorney included: Homicide by Negligent Operation of a Vehicle-Felony, Homicide by Negligent Operation of a Vehicle-Felony, Reckless Driving-Causing Great Bodily Harm-Felony, Reckless Driving-Causing Great Bodily Harm-Felony and Reckless Driving-Causing Bodily Harm-Misdemeanor.

Together We Can Make a Difference

The filing of sexual assault charges against former football coach Jerry Sandusky and subsequent actions have led to a barrage of media coverage. The constant coverage of this "sexscandal" has led to ongoing victimization and torment for young adults who experienced horrible trauma at the hands of someone they trusted, someone they respected, and someone they considered a role-model during some of the most influential years of personal development.

It is regrettable that a case such as this is needed to invoke community conversations and awareness about the growing epidemic of sexual violence.

Statistics indicate that one in four girls and one in six boys will experience sexual abuse before they turn eighteen years of age. The manipulative behaviors used in the Penn State case are the same tactics used by those perpetrators in our own community who often go undetected and never face punishment from the criminal justice system.

I am pleased to see that much of the coverage has now been shifted from Mr. Sandusky's actions to the inaction of many individuals who had they intervened could have prevented another decade of victimization. The lack of action not only permitted the abuse to continue but it perpetuated the stigma of "keeping quiet" which surrounds sexual abuse and the effects it has on the individual, the family unit and the community at large.

Sexual abuse is preventable. We must shift the responsibility from children

to adults and counter the denial, the silence, and the misconceptions which allow abuse to continue. Silence only serves as a message condoning the heinous actions of perpetrators. Adults must be educated about the red flags and grooming tactics - we must give our children and young adults the confidence and the tools to question inappropriate behavior, criminal or not. If an action or statement makes them uncomfortable, they need to use their voice loudly and know adults will support and applaud their self protection.

As adults we must not minimize the occurrence and severity of abuse, "horsing-around" is an unacceptable if not laughable statement for describing in-appropriate sexual behavior. Adults must actively address real and perceived barriers to the disclosure and reporting of abuse. Our schools, community organizations, businesses, and

other institutions must take a stand - doing what is right for our children and young adults is more important than reputation and politics.

Everyone in our community has a role in preventing abuse and supporting survivors. To learn more about how you can help prevent abuse and



Amanda and Jairo reside in Green Bay.


Breese receives football honor

UWWC announces winterim session

Registration is underway for The University of Wisconsin - Washington County's (UW-WC) Winterim session, which runs January 3 - 20. Winterim provides a great opportunity for students and community members to use 13 days of winter break to complete a course in an accelerated format. Most UW System campuses have winter breaks that correspond with this session, allowing area college students home on break to also pick up some extra credits.

The six Winterim courses include: Medical Anthropology (ANT 350); Foundations of Chemistry (CHE 112); Introduction to Public Speaking (CTA 103); Theme in Literature: Ballroom Dancing (ENG 281); Trigonometry (MAT 113); and Jazz History & Appreciation (MUS 273). The Foundations of Chemistry and Trigonometry are 2 credits each and meet Monday through Thursday. The remaining courses are three credits each and meet Monday through Friday, allowing students to earn

three credits in 13 days. There are no classes on Monday, January 16 (Martin Luther King) holiday.

Before registering for classes, students must be accepted for admission. To apply, visit www.uwhelp.wisconsin.edu or pick up an application from the Student Services Office at 400 University Drive, West Bend. Tuition of \$187.61 per credit is due January 3, which is also the last day to register. The Foundations of Chemistry class is taught via streaming video and has an additional course delivery fee of \$60. No advance deposit is required to register, however

a fee of \$100 is charged for any withdrawals after December 19, 2011.

Spring semester begins January 23 and the course schedule is now available in print as well as online (www.washington.uwc.edu). 

Technical colleges produce leaders in law enforcement

Whether a new recruit or a seasoned veteran, many of Wisconsin's law enforcement officers are graduates of the Wisconsin Technical College System, including Moraine Park Technical College. More than 50 community police chiefs in the state received their initial training through a technical college and continue their education in specialized short-term courses.

"Moraine Park was certainly a great starting point for me in realizing what I wanted to do for a career," said Dean Schmidt, who serves as the Chief of Police in Slinger. "The education I received was beneficial for giving me an understanding of what is involved in law enforcement. Completing an associate of applied science degree opened the door for opportunities in this field that I would not have otherwise had."

Schmidt also added that he is a big proponent of continuing education and stresses to his officers to continue with education.

All 16 Wisconsin technical colleges offer some courses in Criminal Justice either online or in the classroom. Currently, 6,620 students are enrolled in Criminal Justice programs throughout the state, and 1,265 students graduated from Criminal Justice programs in 2010. These grads find jobs as police officers, sheriff's deputies, conservation officers, security officers, correctional officers, public safety officers, detectives, security supervisors or dispatchers.

In addition to becoming heads of law enforcement agencies, technical college graduates also become leaders in corrections.

Moraine Park alumni Tina Beres and Holley Dornfeld are paving the way for women by their success in the

traditionally male-dominated field of corrections. Beres is a correctional officer at Washington County Jail, and Dornfeld works in records at Waupun Correctional Institute.

Moraine Park was an important start for both Beres and Dornfeld. The Criminal Justice - Corrections associate of applied science degree gave the women a solid foundation to be confident on the job site. "Moraine Park's program was so hands-on and seemed very real," said Dornfeld. "It's amazing how highly Moraine Park's program is valued in this area."

Another example is Mark Wildman, a 1996 graduate of Moraine Park Technical College who is the deputy warden at Taycheedah Correctional Institution in Fond du Lac. Wildman, who went on to earn several other postsecondary degrees while gaining valuable experience in the correction system, has enriched the lives of many individuals as a mentor, counselor and teacher. He says it wasn't until he arrived at Moraine Park that he discovered his passion and realized what a difference he could make in the lives of others.

25 Years Ago

The Milwaukee River East-West Branches Priority Watershed was the subject of a recent one-day tour through portions of Washington and Fond du Lac Counties. The tour's purpose was to inform both public officials and private citizens of the need to locate and remedy the sources of non-point source pollution which are, along with point source pollution, contributing to the destruction of the Milwaukee River's water quality. On the tour, Bill Stoffel of Campbellsport explained his community's mill pond cleanup project. Approximately 125,000 cubic yards of sediment are expected to be dredged out during the cleanup which is expected to be completed by 1988. The Watershed Tour also stopped at an EPA funded water quality monitoring station on the Howard Proeber farm, 5036 Highway D, West Bend. The purpose of the research data gathered during the 1970's was to compare storm water runoff samples before and after conservation practices were applied. The date was also used to evaluate the effects of common conservation practices on non-point water pollution. The Watershed Tour viewed the drawn down impoundment behind the West Bend Woolen Mills dam. There is presently a controversy over whether or not the dam should be removed or replaced. Besides the highly contaminated sediment in the basin, there are three landfills along its banks which may have water back charging into them which could again pollute any cleanup measures taken in the near future. One of the DNR's options is to remove the dam and fill in the impoundment making it a grass area. Property owners along the dam area are opposing that action.



On Monday, December 5, 2011, Washington County opened the Richfield Park and Ride in the Endeavor Business Park, located on the south side of Pioneer Road, west of Highway 41. The park and ride includes 275 parking stalls, seven handicap stalls, a bike rack and four bus shelters.

For close five years, the Washington County Commuter Express (WCCE) has been using the Highway View School, on the corner of Mayfield and Pioneer Road, as a temporary park and ride stop. Highway Commissioner, Jon Edgren, stated, "We are pleased to be offering this permanent park and ride site to our residents and anyone else who might be passing through our county. We encourage residents to use it for carpooling and/or for commuting on the WCCE. It will reduce congestion on the highways if more people are willing to use public transportation or ride to work with colleagues. In addition, residents can save money by using public transit or by taking advantage of the Wisconsin RideShare program."

There was a need for a permanent park and ride in the Richfield area as the number of individuals using the WCCE continued to increase. The WCCE started using the

temporary Richfield site in February 2007 and has out grown that location. Since the transit program began in 2000, it has grown from 8,347 annual trips, between Washington and Milwaukee Counties, to an estimated 125,500 trips by the end of 2011. Year-to-date ridership for the WCCE has increased by 15% over 2010.



Forfeits hamper KHS effort in opening meets

In the next week, Dennis Aupperle might begin combing the halls of Kewaskum High School, looking for some boys who could fill three of the lighter weights for the wrestling team.

The Indians had to forfeit three weight classes and gamble by moving four of the higher weights, resulting in a 42-25 loss on Dec. 1 to arch rival Campbellsport.

"It's frustrating when you have these kids (who could help the team) walking the halls," Aupperle said afterward. Still he remained upbeat. "It's early, and you learn something from these matches."

Kewaskum started out with a bang, jumping out to a 19-3 lead.

"Brett (Scoles) got us started off right," the coach said about his state runner-up's 13-4 major win over Clark Kelley at 145 pounds.

Sophomore Max Maertz followed with a pin in 4:58 over Tyler Kohlman, and then Campbellsport had to forfeit to Cody Muckerheide.

"The first win of the year and it's a pin," Aupperle said about Maertz, adding, "They're (Cougars) tough to pin."

But Aupperle still had 18 free Campbellsport points in the back of his mind, so it was here the coach gambled to find another win or two, moving Joey Wollner, Derek Aupperle, Teddy Wollner and Lance Pinchard up a weight class.

The move paid off in two of the four as young Aupperle improved to 2-0 on the year with a hard-fought, 4-2 decision over Zach Gassner.

Gassner took a 2-1 lead into the third period when Aupperle escaped to tie match, then spun around behind his Cougar opponent with :21 left for the win-

ning points.

"It was good to see him stay patient and wrestler smart," Aupperle said of his son, adding the two had met in club wrestling several times and, "Zach is a decent wrestler."

Pinchard also came through for the Indians, using a "stack" in the second period to pin Justin Lauber in 2:42.

"He's got it in him to have a good season," Aupperle said about Pinchard, who was giving up over 20 pounds to Lauber.

Both Wollners lost. Especially disheartening was the fact Joey Wollner was leading with :21 to go when he gave up a 5-point move and lost 11-15.

The wheels started coming off for the Indians at 285 after the match between Newatterman Garrett Yahr and Seth Batterman ended abruptly with :45 remaining.

The referee disqualified Yahr for allegedly biting Batterman in the arm, so Campbellsport received six points for the DQ win and Kewaskum lost three points, putting the score at 25-15 in the Indians' favor, but adding in forfeit points at 106, 113 and 120, the Cougars jumped out front 33-25.

Kewaskum only managed one win in the final three bouts, that coming at 132 where Austin Goeden decisioned Beau Oestreich 6-5.

"Austin had a good match for his first match of the year," Aupperle said.

The two losses came at 126 and 138.

"Logan (Dreher) ... the first three minutes, he was right there," the coach said about his battle vs. Ryan Costello, who placed fourth in Division 2 in state last year.

And the match between the Indians' fine sophomore Joey Seitz and senior Rashaun Sparks was a battle of power and quickness. Experience

LUXEMBURG- Nothing came easy for Kewaskum's wrestlers at the annual Luxemburg-Casco Dual Meet Tournament held on Dec. 3.

Individual wins, especially pins, were difficult to secure against the powerful host Spartans, Port Washington and Marmion Academy of Illinois. Capturing team victories were more of a challenge, especially considering the fact the Indians were forced to forfeit at three weights, were missing one regular and had first-year wrestlers at three spots.

"What weight class didn't have a lot of good kids," KHS coach Dennis Aupperle said. "Every team we faced was very good." He wasn't kidding.

For the record, LC, top-rated in Division 2, waltzed through the first four matches, blasting Port Washington (which had beaten Hartland Arrowhead the night before then losing only 34-33 to Hartford at the Hartford team meet) 57-9, Sheboygan Falls 66-7 and Kewaskum 69-9 before battling right down to the wire in a 33-28 win over Marmion.

The Indians wound up going 1-4, defeating Sheboygan Falls 37-27 in the opening round before falling to Marmion 40-18, the host Spartans 69-9 and Bayport, 47-24. In the process, the Indians only posted five pins on the day.

Junior Brett Scoles was the Indians' lone undefeated wrestler. He went 5-0 on the day and is now 7-0 for the year.

Four other Indians, including Austin Goeden at 132, Joey Seitz, 138; Derek Aupperle at 170, and Teddy Wollner at 182, finished with winning marks. They were all 3-2.

The Indians, 0-4 on the season, host Sheboygan Falls on Thursday and play at West Bend West on Tuesday.


