School Board election will see primary, retired police chief runs for Village Board

KEWASKUM- Interest in the operations of the Kewaskum School District continues to spark interest in residents and will force a primary election in February. Retired police chief Richard Knoebel will challenge three Village Board incumbents. Incumbents Stephen Jensen and Bruce Braidigan will seek re-election to the Board of Education. Braidigan currently serves as President while Jensen serves as Treasurer. Challenging the incumbents are former board member Jim Leister, of the Town of Wayne, who lost last year's election after serving two terms; Village Trustee Harry Roecker and village resident Grace Mueller. There are two seats open on the Board of Education. That primary will

be held on Tuesday, Feb. 21. Members of the Board of Education are paid \$262.50 for each regular board meeting they attend. Craig Garbisch and Mike Berger will seek a second term as Trustee. Roecker also will seek to retain his seat. Roecker has served over the last decade. Garbisch attempted to unseat Village President Andy Pesch but was unsuccessful last year. Village Trustees receive an annual salary of \$1,500 in 2012 and \$1,000 in 2013. They also receive a \$30 per diem for each village board meeting they attend. After redistricting in Washington County, Supervisors Gerald Schulz and Richard Bertram will face off in district 13. The townships of Barton and Wayne now make up that district. Both have served prior terms on the County Board. Bertram is the current town chairman for the Town of Barton

while Schulz is the Treasurer for the Town of Wayne. Long time supervisor Brian Bausch will receive a challenge from Michael Parsons in district 11. That district is made up of the Town of Farmington. Bausch has served three terms as supervisor and is a former Deputy Sheriff from Washington County. Daniel Stoffel will run unopposed in district 10. Stoffel has served district 10 the last few decades only receiving a handful of challenges. He is also the current Vice Chairman for the County Board and Treasurer for the Town of Kewaskum. The Spring Election and Presidential Primary will be held on Tuesday, April 3. The Statesman will run information on the candidates closer to the Primary and Election day.

Village loses another high profile resident in Amerahn's Kleinke

For over a half century, the Amerahn has been a fixture in Kewaskum, and for better than three decades of that period, Earl Kleinke has been an Amerahn fixture. Along with his wife, Marie, Kleinke played host for showers, wedding receptions, birthday parties, scouting awards nights, Packer games, year-end sporting celebrations, and that's not all. The amiable Kleinke, who died unexpectedly on Dec. 28th at his home, also was visible in the community as a school bus driver, at events sponsored by the Kewaskum Lions Club and at his church, St. Lucas Lutheran Church. Now those who knew and worked with Kleinke are remembering him as a dedicated father, a man with a great deal of faith, and a person who was willing to find time to pitch in on a project that would benefit the village. Rev. Timothy Henning, the pastor of St. Lucas Church, referred to many of these characteristics while talking about Kleinke at the funeral service. "We talked about his faith" and about his business and wondered how many wedding receptions have taken place at the Amerahn since the Kleinkes owned the business, Rev. Henning said Sunday evening, noting "what a joy this was for him" and how in the Book of Revelations, heaven is compared to a wedding banquet.





basically by his example, to get involved in community activities like the Lions Club. While Brian said his dad never prodded him to join the club, "He was the reason I got involved in it," the son said.

And how long did Earl Kleinke help keep the Lions Club tradition alive in Kewaskum? "Twenty five years ... I actually looked up the record," Brian said, noting his dad had been the president of the club four or five times, "and this year he was the immediate past president. Chuck (Kleinke, Earl's brother) is the president."

One could say with a great deal of certainty that being a Lion is a Kleinke family tradition. "Dad, Chuck and I were all Lions. My grandfather, Marvin, was a Lion. My wife (Jennifer) and my mother are also Lions," Brian Kleinke said.

Over the years, Earl helped with the Lions' Kettle 20 and Chicken Barbecue, Pork Chop Dinner and Beer Tastings and the annual golf tournament.



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
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ALBERT A. FEUCHT



For the shrimp

- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- Pinch red pepper flakes
- 1 pound medium shrimp, deveined
- 3 tablespoons high-quality tequila
- Salt, to taste
- 1 teaspoon dried chipotle powder
- 2 to 3 tablespoons fresh cilantro, chopped

For the salad

- 4 cups dark, leafy mixed greens
- 1/2 cup roasted red peppers, sliced thin
- 1/2 cup black beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 avocado, sliced thin

For the dressing

- 1/2 cup nonfat plain Greek yogurt
- 3 tablespoons high-quality tequila
- 1 tablespoon grated lime zest
- 1 teaspoon hot sauce
- 2 tablespoons fresh lime juice
- Pinch of sea salt to taste

Add olive oil to a large skillet over medium heat. Once oil is hot, add chopped garlic and cook for about 1 minute. Add cumin and red pepper flakes, and let flavors blend together.

Add shrimp and toss. Carefully add tequila and cook until alcohol burns off. Season with salt, and add dried chipotle powder. Once shrimp are cooked, add chopped cilantro, toss and put aside on a plate.

Toss mixed greens in a large salad bowl and add in roasted red peppers and black beans. In medium bowl, whisk all of the dressing ingredients together and alter to desired taste by adding additional hot sauce and salt. Top with avocado slices and sautéed shrimp.

Roasted Fig and Blue Cheese Salad

Prep Time: 10 minutes
Cooking Time: 20 minutes
Serves: 4

For the figs

- 2 cups fresh black mission figs, sliced in half
- 2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar
- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 1 teaspoon honey
- 1/4 teaspoon sea salt

For the salad

- 1/2 cup blue cheese, cut into elegant wedges or thin slices
- 6 cups mixed salad greens with arugula
- 1/2 cup candied walnuts
- Sea salt to taste

For the dressing


- 3 tablespoons honey
- 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
- 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar
- 1/4 teaspoon sea salt

To roast figs, preheat the oven to 350°F. Remove stems off end of each fig, then slice fig in half. Roast for approximately 30 minutes or until a bit golden brown. Remove and cool slightly.

In small mixing bowl, mix 2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar, olive oil and honey. Add figs and toss to coat evenly. Marinate for 5 to 10 minutes.

Whisk honey, mustard, 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar and sea salt together to create dressing.

Place greens in large salad bowl; toss in candied walnuts. Serve with two fig halves on top of each salad with a blue cheese wedge.



Spinach Salad with Walnuts, Strawberries and Goat Cheese

Prep Time: 10 minutes
Cooking Time: 10 minutes
Serves: 4

For the salad

- 1/2 cup walnuts
- 4 cups fresh spinach, stems trimmed
- 8 large strawberries, hulled and thinly sliced
- 1/4 cup crumbled goat cheese

For the dressing

- 3 tablespoons honey
- 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
- 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar
- 1/4 teaspoon sea salt

Heat the oven to 375°F.


Place walnuts on rimmed baking sheet and bake until fragrant and toasted, about 8 minutes. Transfer to a plate to cool.

Toss spinach with strawberries in a large bowl.

In small bowl, whisk together honey, mustard, vinegar and salt. Sprinkle walnuts on top of spinach and strawberries mix.

Serve sprinkled with goat cheese, with remaining dressing on the side.

OSHKOSH- The team effort was far from what it was in 2010, but Kewaskum's wrestling team still had a finalist in the two-day prestigious Oshkosh Lourdes On the Water Classic, which concluded last Friday at the Kolf Field House in Oshkosh.

The Indians scored 99 points, good for 31st place out of the 56 teams, and Brett Scoles shook off all ill effects from the neck injury he suffered in the recent Marty Loy Tournament, to win five straight matches before being beaten by Mitch Champagne

of Coleman in the finals at 145 pounds.

Champagne won by 12-3 major decision over the junior Indian, who is now 15-3 on the year.

"That kid was tough," KHS coach Dennis Aupperle said about Champagne. "He just kept after Brett the whole time. Brett just couldn't get going."

To reach the finals, Scoles started with a bye, then shut out Menasha's Bailey Whipple 13-0, topped Jack Rettler of West Bend West, 5-2, and nipped Hortonville's Cole Parker 6-4, setting the stage for one of the highlight match-

es of the tournament against Nick Mudloff of Random Lake, who had been voted as the MVP of the Loy Tournament.

The two wrestlers battled to a 1-1 stalemate after six minutes of attacking and countering, and neither managed a takedown in the first extra period.

Scoles chose the down position for the 30-second next overtime and managed a reversal for a 3-1 lead, then all he had to do was keep from giving up two points in the final 30 seconds. He gave up the escape to Mudloff but no more.

Perhaps Scoles was spent after this match or maybe it was just that Champagne is that much better, but the final match was never close.

The Statesman tried to get comments from Scoles, but he did not return phone messages.

The only other KHS wrestler to reach the second day was junior Derek Aupperle, the coach's son, who took eighth at 170.

Aupperle opened with a bye and then received a forfeit (because a Ripon wrestler failed to make weight) to move into the top 16. Aupperle finally got to wrestle about 6 p.m. Thursday and certainly was fresh when he stepped on the mat against Coleman's Jordan Schaal.

Schaal scored first on a double leg takedown and took a 4-0 lead when he gained a reversal early in the second period.

Aupperle escaped with :03 remaining in the second period, then got another escape in the third period and was awarded a stalling point near the end of the match and lost 4-3.

Going to the loser's bracket, he posted back-to-back decisions (9-3 over Alex Van Boxtel of Freedom and 5-2 over Ray Hibbs of Chippewa Falls) before going to the matches that determined places. First, Aupperle was pinned by Zach Groen of Illiana Christian (of Illinois) in 4:47, and then he lost a 12-3 major decision to Vernon Rash of Milwaukee Bradley Tech in the battle for seventh place.

"His goal was to make it to the second day," Dennis Aupperle said.

Aupperle's record currently stands at 14-8, which is four wins better than he had all last season, and there is still a lot of wrestling on the schedule.

Three others, Logan Dreher (8-11) at 120, Austin Goeden (10-6) at 132 and Joey Seitz (10-7) at 138, came within one match of wrestling on Friday. They all finished 3-2 and lost to wrestlers who finished third or fourth in the competition.

Among Dreher's victories were two pins, and he lost his last match to Bobby Uttecht of Wittenburg-Birnamwood 5-3 after a controversial call by official sent the match into overtime.

Goeden also had two pins and a major decision, and Seitz had one pin and one major decision.

"Really that was a tough Thursday night," Aupperle said, noting those three were all close to advancing.

Only 10 KHS wrestlers competed in the event. Three were missing due to injuries and a family commitment, and the team forfeits at 106 pounds. Results for the other Indians are as follows: Nick Bier (3-4) went 0-2 at 113; Max Maertz (6-8) finished 1-2 at 152; Joey Wollner (5-10), 0-2 at 160; Ted Wollner (10-7), ended up 2-2 at 182, including a bye and major decision; and Garrett Buth (5-8) was 1-2 at 285. Buth had a come-from-behind pin over a DePere wrestler in the first round before he ran into the No. 1 seed, John Jude of Bradley Tech.

The Indians have a rare Friday night match this week, hosting Plymouth for the annual Alumni Night. "We have a big week coming up," Aupperle said, noting the Indians are at Oostburg and Kiel on Jan. 9 and 11, respectively.
