


'Alice in Wonderland' to be presented Saturday

Another candidate declines Chief position

Another candidate for the Chief of Police of the village has declined the position putting further action in the hands of the Village's Police and Fire Commission (PFC). Village Trustees on Monday evening also received notice from Acting Chief Dick Knoebel his last day would be Friday.

Trustees met after the regular meeting Monday in closed session to hear that South Milwaukee Lieutenant Chad Milow had declined the offer over the weekend. According to Clerk Stephanie Justmann, Trustees sent the matter back to the PFC requesting another candidate choice.

Justmann did not know at press time when that meeting would be held.

After coming back to handle a personnel matter late this past summer, retired Chief Knoebel was set to go back to retirement on Dec. 2 of last year. Trustees at that time asked if he would consider staying on in a limited capacity until a new chief was hired to which he accepted. However after more than a month, he officially submitted a letter requesting the village allow him to continue his retirement. Trustees accepted his request. Knoebel is set to go back into retirement on Friday, Jan. 13.

Knoebel is set to challenge Trustees Harry Roecker, Craig Garbisch and Mike Berger in the Spring Election for a seat on the Village Board.

In the interim, Police Officer Mark Steiner has been designated as Officer in Charge of the department until a new chief is hired.

Workshop on paying district bills Monday

The Board of Education will host a work session on Monday, January 16, to discuss how it pays its bills. This comes after action on paying bills failed Monday evening.

Board members Troy Hanson, Tim Ramthun, Mary Miller and Bill Kesting voted against paying the bills at Monday night's meeting. Previously, Hanson and Ramthun made a practice of voting against the measure since being elected last April due to the district not following a district policy on how bills are paid.

The workshop, which could include revising that policy, will take place at 5:00 p.m. in the District Office. Also being discussed is refinancing a retirement liability.

Currently a district policy allows some bills to be paid without board approval. However, currently all bills are paid as they arrive in the district office and not when they are approved by the board.

Letters to the Editor

Dear community,

After reading a letter to the editor regarding my motion on the Food Pantry building I feel clarification is definitely in order. Mr. Leister attempted to oversimplify a very complex problem. The issue began with an agenda item proposed by Mr. Ewald that the District would continue to pay ongoing occupancy costs (insurance, utilities, and maintenance) for the Food Pantry building. When I saw the proposal I did not think it was right to ask taxpayers to continue to pay the bills for a project that was not properly approved in the first place. There were many reasons that I made the motion for the Food Pantry to start paying the costs of the building and stop diverting some of their cash contributions to the District. They included the following accounting, legal, and practical issues.

The accounting issue is that the original verbal agreement was to pay the District back \$50,000, they have paid \$31,500 to date. They have zero responsibility to pay the District back the full \$86,500 that was actually spent. That \$36,500 overage was the direct fault of the project managers and the people that approved the checks. For the record, \$86,500 doesn't even count the student labor that went into the project. If we had to pay that we would have a \$100,000 garage sitting by the elementary school!

The important legal issue is that we have no written contract to guarantee the District would even receive \$50,000, much less the full cost of \$86,500. Here is a quote I heard recently, "A verbal contract is only as good as the paper that it is written on". Another legal issue is if they paid the \$50,000, does the Food Pantry then own the building that we paid \$86,500 for?

The practical issue is that the District will never be made whole on this project. The local people and businesses were asked to contribute to the building project and they did.

The money is just not there and what is there is needed to serve the mission of feeding Kewaskum's hungry families.

Spending all that money on a fancy four car garage was a giant mistake that came out of a budget from three years ago. What's done is done. I couldn't resurrect the money from an ineffectively run capital project that went 73% over budget but I could stop our tax dollars from paying the ongoing expenses of the building, so I did.

If this responsibility is asking too much, it is obviously time for changing out those who perpetuate this same practice by electing new Board members!


Taylor's receive Blue Star banner





Days Gone By

25 Years Ago

November 21, 1986

The last thing residents of Melvin Tompkins' mobile home park located on Highway 45 at the south end of Kewaskum, in the Town of Kewaskum, wanted or expected was an eviction notice telling them they and their trailers must be gone by March 31, 1987. The park's closing is the result of many things but basically the fact that its septic system is no longer operating properly and Tompkins decided he could not afford to replace or repair the system. It appears to be more than just a matter of putting in a new septic or holding tank, but in all likelihood, the sewer lines would also have to be repaired. The project could conservatively cost from \$150,000 on up and that could easily more than double tenants' rent. There are approximately 38 tenants who call the park home and wanted to remain there.

The Kewaskum Village Board began looking into the possibility of rate hikes for the Sewage and Water Departments as it reviewed the two proposed departmental budgets for 1987. Village Administrator Dan Schmidt told the board Monday night the village has not had a Water Department rate increase since 1982, or Sewage Department increase since 1983.

On a 19-7 vote, members of the Washington County Board of Supervisors defeated a proposal to enact a 0.5% county sales tax for 1987. The plan however, is not completely dead as the board let the door open by directing its Finance Committee to evaluate such a tax's impact on the county before it begins work on a 1988 budget.

This area was greeted by record-breaking cold weather for the 13th of November last Thursday when the thermometer dipped below zero. Accompanied by high winds with gusts of up to 45 miles an hour, the wind chill dropped far below zero. Rivers and some lakes froze over so ice fishing was possible before deer hunting this year.





Kewaskum had it going. Brett Nuernberg was on fire again, scoring 16 points in the first half on 7-for-10 shooting.

Senior point guard Eric Perkins launched a three as the second quarter buzzer went off and drained it. The

Indians had a four-point lead on Waupun.

"Too bad that doesn't win you games," said Coach Quinn Heintz.

Indeed.

Kewaskum went cold in the second half and Waupun heated up.

Waupun put on the defensive pressure, forcing turnovers and a Kewaskum

timeout in the third quarter. The Warriors took the lead on a three-pointer, 32-31, and the game flip flopped until the third quarter buzzer. Waupun hit a turnaround three that made it 40-36 and Kewaskum didn't get any closer the rest of the way.

The 56-42 loss snapped Kewaskum's two-game winning streak after taking the

Hustisford Tournament over the holidays.

Nuernberg ended with 21 points, his first 20-point performance at home, and Perkins had 11. Nobody else scored more than three.

"I thought we played hard but we couldn't put the ball in the hoop," said Heintz. "We got out of focus a little bit and we couldn't get it back."

Senior center Brad Boegel became a non-factor, picking up his third foul with 1:01 left in the first half and his fourth with 1:49 left in the third quarter. Kyle Tessar saw more playing time.

"They're long enough. They rebound well," Heintz said of Waupun. "Kyle stepped in and did a good job."

In the holiday tournament, Nuernberg led the Indians to a 74-48 win over Hustisford and a 62-52 win over Horicon. Nuernberg scored 24 against Hustisford and 14 against Horicon and was chosen the tournament's most valuable player.

"He had a really good tournament. It was nice for him to come alive," said Heintz.

Against Hustisford, Perkins scored 12, Hunter Flanders nine, and Boegel and Tony Gonring eight apiece.

Against Horicon, Gonring led with 16 points. Perkins scored 15 and Flanders 11. Perkins made the all-tournament team.

It was Perkins' first signs of last season's second team all-conference performance. Teams began to key on him,

and Nuernberg's hot shooting has helped.

"It's opened up Eric's game. The more balanced we are the better we're going to be because they can't focus on one guy," Heintz said.

Heintz said Gonring shined defensively, shutting down two of the best scorers in the tournament.

The Indians, 1-4 in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference and 4-8 overall, play at Two Rivers (3-2 EWC, 4-7) on Friday.

Heintz said he wants the Indians to get on a roll and become that team going into the playoffs that nobody wants to face.

"We've just got to keep getting better. We've got to just get better in situations at the end of games. We've got to win some close games," he said.



With low numbers and just two athletes in the lineup with winning records (and one of them out with an injury), it's obvious the Plymouth wrestling team has fallen upon some hard times.

Still, Kewaskum coach Dennis Aupperle doesn't have much time to provide sympathy for the Panthers. He's concentrating on getting his Indians to build some momentum for an upcoming battle with unbeat-

en Two Rivers and the tournaments.

They took a step in that direction last Friday night, soundly defeating the Panthers 61-16 in the annual Alumni Night celebration. Kewaskum won four matches by pin, five via forfeit, one by major decision and one by regular decision to improve to 3-1 against Eastern Wisconsin Conference foe.

"That was a short night," Aupperle said after the competition, quick to add, "It's good for the kids to get some momentum."

The match started with a forfeit win at 285 and another came at 113 where, when Nick Bier stepped on the mat, Plymouth took its announced wrestler out of the weight class and bumped him up to 120 to receive a forfeit.

The visitors took a brief lead after J.J. Seifert won by major decision over Andy Pryor at 126. Pryor battled hard in what was just his fifth varsity match but couldn't overcome Seifert's experience.

From then on, Kewaskum rolled, starting with Austin Go-

eden's 6-2 victory over Trevor Miske, who came up with a record of 8-5, the only winning record posted by any of the Panther starters.

The first period of this match felt unusually short ... and it was. Only a minute had been put on the clock, and after a conference between the coaches and official, another was added.

Miske used a slideby to take a 2-0 lead, but those were the only points he scored. In the second period, Goeden (11-6) needed just 10 seconds to reverse Miske and put him in a nearfall for a 4-2 lead.

In the third period, Goeden added a takedown for the winning margin.

At 138, Joey Seitz was slated to take on Austin Wiese, the other Panther with a winning mark, but Wiese is injured and could not go.

Lucas Johnson, Wiese's replacement, was no match for the powerful Seitz, who went to work quickly with a takedown and cradle for a 4-0 lead and later in the period, another near fall (7-0)

Seitz (11-7) applied a very tight half early in the second period and pinned Johnson in 2:12.

Brett Scoles (16-3) followed with the quickest pin of the night, in 1:07, after scoring several takedowns, and Max Maertz (9-10) took just four more seconds, putting Jake Ohman's shoulders to the mat in 1:11.

In the remaining two matches, Joey Wollner won by a

9-1 major decision over Tim Edwards and Derek Aupperle (15-8) pinned Bryce Lueck in 1:25.

Aupperle was happy to see Wollner do well, noting his senior at 160 seems to do well in practice but is hesitant in a lot of his matches. "Tonight he didn't look like that. He did a really good job," the coach said.

With the win, Wollner is 2-2 in EWC action and 6-10 overall, inching closer to the .500 mark.

Those still unbeaten in EWC action include: Bier, Goeden, Scoles, Aupperle and Butch.


KHS was scheduled to be at Oostburg for a non-conference match Tuesday and tonight (Thursday) the Indians are at Kiel.
