## Board approves hiring of officers; update given on Hwy 28/Main Street project

Kewaskum's new Chief of Police took one of his first steps in his new position, hiring someone to fill his former officer position. Chief Bishop also wished to hire two additional part-time officers. Trustees also learned about a public meeting to discuss the Highway 28 reconstruction project slated to begin in 2014.

Village Administrator Matt Heiser spoke on behalf of Police Chief Thomas Bishop at Monday's Village Board meeting. Bishop requested the Board approve filling the full-time officer position left when he became chief. Additionally Bishop would like to hire two part-time officers.

Trustees deferred the decision to fill the open officer positions to the Police and Fire Commission. Candidate selection will be at the commission's discretion.

Director of Public Works, Jerry

Gilles, provided Trustees with an update on the Highway 28 project. The Village will need to make a decision regarding lighting on Main Street. Gilles explained that there did not seem to be much cost difference between using decorative lighting versus standard streetlights.

A public meeting will be held April 17, at the Municipal Building Annex to further discuss this issue as well as address any local concerns or questions community members may have. The final meeting time has not yet been confirmed, but will be published in the future.

Gilles also discussed replacing the sewer main on Main Street from Railroad Street east to Fond Du Lac Avenue. He estimated the cost of this project to be \$68,612. If the sewer main is replaced, it will be done at the same time as the Highway 28 project, which is estimated to begin in 2014.

The Village will need to look

into payment for the laterals, which could become responsibility of the homeowners. The Board will also discuss some liner replacements, which could be done at any time. This topic will be added to future agendas.

The Board also addressed previous unfinished business on the issuance and sale of \$1,525,000 in general obligation-refunding bonds. With the bond issuance the village will refinance its state trust fund loans, saving the Village about \$141,000 over life in interest. Additionally, the Village will spend \$51,645 less than originally projected.

The original loan proceeds were used to purchase the fire department's aerial ladder truck and complete a road project on Highway H in the village a number of years ago.

The Board also decided to remove winter parking restrictions effective March 15. Chipping of curbside brush will resume in April.

## Former player shares importance of Gridiron

*Maul, Craig honored at annual banquet*

He always looked right at home in a green and white, heavily grass-stained Kewaskum uniform, but on Feb. 11, Joe Paulus appeared looking dapper in a shirt and tie to address those present for the annual Gridiron dinner for coaches and their wives.

"It's a blessing to be able to play college football," Paulus, a junior majoring in accounting at UW-Madison, told the audience, and said this dream would have not been possible, without their help.

Paulus recalled how he and his dad and brother would run outside during the half-time of Green Bay Packer football games to get in a little game of their own in the backyard. He also remembers being one of the biggest kids in his middle school years, and then when he got to eighth grade the growth spurt suddenly stopped and others passed him by.

Still, Paulus wasn't worried about his size, stating, "It's about who has the most heart, more pride .... who wants it more."

Paulus was instrumental in the football program's success at Kewaskum High School and then moved on to Whitewater where the Warhawks have won three straight national titles and "We are on a 45-game winning streak."

It took time to adjust to the speed and strength of the college game, but Paulus said, "This year I got two sacks in our Homecoming game against Stevens Point" and got to suit for the championship NCAA 3 game in Virginia. UW-Whitewater defeated Mt. Union (Ohio) 13-10 to claim the Stagg Bowl in Salem, VA.



## The biggest snow storm of the season didn't put a damper on Cabin Fever Reliever

Okay, so maybe the weather wasn't ideal last Friday for a free community comedy event benefitting the food pantry, but that didn't seem to stop everyone. Despite record snow fall so far this year, more than 200 people braved the elements, bringing with them more than 500 food items, and showed up at St. Lucas Lutheran School to support Cabin Fever Reliever.

When deciding if the event should be canceled and rescheduled due to weather conditions, Whit Shiller of Fish Sticks, the professional improv comedy group, said, "Don't cancel on our account, we're still planning on coming. If not enough people show up to make this a success we'll come back and do it again at a later

date." How can you go wrong with an offer like that?

As the snow continued to fall, many calls were received at St. Lucas, asking if the event was still on and how to contribute their food donations. "We felt comfortable saying if you don't live close and don't want to be on the roads, we understand. Fish Sticks said they'd put on another show at a later date, so wait and come to that one," said David Stoltz, principal of St. Lucas.

But the people still came. Locals from Kewaskum, Campbellsport and Wayne showed up as well as guests from West Bend and Slinger. "We were prepared for a small gathering of maybe 20-40 people but were pleasantly surprised at the big turnout

regardless of the weather," says Tammy Heckendorf, event coordinator. "God works in mysterious ways. Who would have thought that a snow storm could be a blessing for this event? Thanks to the generosity of Fish Sticks, we get to do this twice while hopefully benefitting the pantry even more."

From games of Kids Props, where Fish Sticks used actual kids as their props for bicycles, toothbrushes and vacuum cleaners to Moving Bodies where adults had to move the comedians' bodies to match their conversations and actions, the audience was thoroughly entertained.

## Construction beginning on WIS 33 in Washington County

Work will begin early next week on the WIS 33 (Washington Street) project from the Milwaukee River to Wisconsin Street in West Bend, announced the Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT).

A construction kick-off meeting will be held for local businesses and residents on Tuesday, March 13, at 2 p.m. in the Council Chambers at the West Bend City Hall. Any interested parties may attend to hear more about the project

and construction staging.

This \$2.1 million reconstruction project will widen the Milwaukee River Bridge from two to four lanes, as well as the approaches, for improved safety and increased capacity.

WIS 33 will remain open to traffic during construction with one lane open in each direction at all times.

The contractor, Lunda Construction, will finish work by this fall, weather permitting.

One question I have that should perhaps be explained in more detail is his statement, "When it snows, they meet at the KHS first..." - then, why is it necessary to take a district vehicle home in the first place?

When you stop and think about it, this just doesn't make any sense! Let's think about the scenario:

1. An employee already has his privately owned vehicle parked at the high school,
2. There is a weather forecast for snow the next day,
3. The employee then takes a district vehicle home with him and leaves his privately owned vehicle parked at the high school,

4. The next day same employee returns to the high school (where his privately owned vehicle is still parked) to start the day of snow removal.

In other words - the employee makes a round trip home with a district vehicle rather than his privately owned vehicle, to wind up at the same destination he started from the previous day. Again I ask, why was the vehicle taken home in the first place? In case of an accident, what is the liability to the district for this practice? What is the district policy concerning this process? And finally, how does taking a district vehicle home make the students and staff safer? - enable busses to do their jobs? - and, enable schools to run on time? Where is the common sense to this

logic?

In closing, I hope this letter is not misconstrued as a "shout out" as Mr. Braidigan referred to in his letter about Mr. Leister at the 2-20-12 Building and Grounds Committee meeting. I was at this meeting, and what I heard and observed was a concerned individual (Mr. Leister) asking questions for which he had never received viable answers to. It is at these Committee and regular Board meetings where important issues should be addressed and discussed in order to find solutions! If not here, then where?



## Convenient commuter service – ride the WCCE

A 2011 statistic speaks volumes about the growing popularity of the Washington County Commuter Express (WCCE), which operates on weekdays, providing the public with express, deluxe motor-coach service between Washington and Milwaukee Counties.

The total ridership, measured in one-way rides, last year was 127,551. That same statistic in 2000 was 8,347 one-way rides.

Washington County contracts for the buses and drivers for this popular service through GoRiteWay. The eight buses, which can carry a maximum of 55 passengers, are equipped with wheelchair lifts for those with disabilities.

According to Joe Steier, Washington County transit manager, "The driver helps load and unload the passengers with wheelchairs, but does not provide door-to-door service like the Shared-Ride Taxi Service does."

Riders can board the WCCE at three Park and Ride locations in Washington County. These are located in West Bend, Richfield and Germantown:

- West Bend -- Paradise Park & Ride lot -- next to the West Bend Tire Co., on Parkway Drive, off of Hwy 45 and Paradise Road.

- Richfield -- Richfield Park & Ride lot -- Endeavor Business Park on Richfield Parkway, south of Pioneer Drive, west of Hwy 41 (just south of Pioneer Plaza).

- Germantown -- Lannon Road Park & Ride lot -- located at the northwest corner of the intersection of Hwys 41/45 and Lannon Road.

Michelle Wagner, an independent transit consultant for Washington County, explained that the majority, 95 percent of WCCE riders, are Washington County residents. However, one does not need to be a Washington County resident to use this service.

"If you come to one of the three Park and Ride lots in Washington County, you can board the Washington County Commuter Express," she said.

The WCCE routes serve the following areas and facilities in Milwaukee:

- Wisconsin Avenue in downtown, from 35th Street to Cass Street.

- Marquette University and Marquette High School.

- Clement Zablocki VA Medical Center, Children's Hospital of Wisconsin, Froedtert Hospital, Froedtert East & West Clinics, the Medical College of Wisconsin, Milwaukee Area Regional Medical Center, and

- Milwaukee County Research Park.

There are several reasons commuters prefer riding the WCCE, rather than driving

their own vehicles. They find having someone else do the driving is less stressful. They can save money on fuel, vehicle depreciation and parking fees.

Passengers can read, study or sleep en route to and from Milwaukee. They can also eliminate the need to walk several blocks from a parking spot to work or shop. Then too, they are helping protect the environment by having less cars on the road.

Wagner pointed out another trait about the riders using the service on a regular basis. "They form a bond," she said. "Riding together five days a week, they form a little community."

Town of Trenton Lee Hovorka has been riding the WCCE for the past three years, five days per week to her job. She is a program assistant for the Applied Investment Management Program in the College of Business at Marquette University in Milwaukee.

She boards the WCCE at the West Bend Park & Ride. "I love the WCCE," Hovorka said. "It drops me off at 12th and Wisconsin in Milwaukee, which is less than 50 yards to my work."

Hovorka owns a hybrid vehicle. "I still choose to commute on the WCCE," she said. "On the very seldom days I need to drive, I dread it. I really enjoy not worrying about driving, weather and parking."

"The WCCE provides excellent service, in regard to schedule options, very reliable departure and arrival schedule time," she added. "What gives me the most confidence are the professional drivers. Also, I have made friends with other riders and really enjoy the good people who ride."

Wagner noted that the reason the WCCE service was originally initiated in 1999 was to bring employees from Milwaukee County to Washington County to work.

"It was not intended to be taking employees to work in Milwaukee at that time," she said. "But later on, with the decline in the manufacturing industry and the resurfacing of Hwy 45, many passengers began using the Washington County Commuter Express for



going to work in Milwaukee." Wagner added that any time there is a sharp spike in gas prices, ridership on the WCCE increases.

Steier provided statistics related to rider ship on the WCCE. Ninety-two percent of passengers own their own vehicles but choose to ride the WCCE to save money and to reduce stress.

Ninety-four percent use the service to get to their work sites; 5 percent are students, and about 1 percent ride the WCCE to get to their medical appointments.

He noted that a survey conducted within the past two years revealed that 39 percent of passengers have been riding the WCCE for more than four years; 27 percent, between two to four years; 27 percent, from six months to two years and 7 percent, less than six months.

The fact that the service is highly acclaimed was clearly demonstrated last year. The Washington County Board had considered funding cuts to the program, due to budget constraints. However, many riders contacted their supervisors to voice their dissatisfaction about the cuts. Many showed up at a meeting, held to voice their opinions. As a result, the funding cuts were not made.

Regarding fares for the WCCE, a one-way ticket costs \$3.75 in exact change. Driv-

ers do not carry cash. Reduced cost fares at \$3.25 each are available by purchasing a \$32.50, 10-ticket strip, sold at the following outlets:

- Kewaskum -- Geidel's Piggly Wiggly
- Germantown -- Pick 'N Save on Mequon Road
- Hartford -- Hartford Country Market
- Jackson -- Fox's Piggly Wiggly
- Slinger -- Fox's Piggly Wiggly
- Richfield/Hubertus -- Fox's Piggly Wiggly, and
- West Bend -- Pick'N Save -- North and South.

The Washington County Shared-Ride Taxi can provide service to and from the Park & Ride locations at the reduced fare of \$1 for a one-way ticket.

For seniors 65 years and older, Medicare card holders and persons with disabilities, a discounted fare of \$1.75 is available only on mid-day

northbound, downtown Route Runs 13 and 15 and on Froedtert Run 14.

Wagner noted that some employers offer reimbursement or purchase tickets for their employees who ride the WCCE, to encourage public transit use. Among these employers are Northwestern Mutual and Assurant health companies.

## Local Purple Martin Association to meet March 15

America's most wanted bird is the Purple Martin, which are the largest species of the swallow family. They are a native song bird that migrates here from Brazil. These birds arrive in mid-April and then leave in mid-August. During this time a typical pair will lay between four and five eggs. The hatchlings will fledge in August and join their parents on the migration back to their winter range in Brazil.

Unfortunately the Purple Martin population is in decline and in need of our help. Reasons for the decline are: they raise only one brood per year; they rely on constructed (man-made) bird houses for egg laying and raising their brood and from stiff competition from non-native species like the European Starling and English House Sparrow.

The Eastern Wisconsin Purple Martin Association (EWPMA) is a newly formed club that has as its goal to increase the population of Purple Martins in this area with an educational emphasis on attracting, managing and maintaining Purple Martin Colonies for current and future generations.

The group is planning monthly public meetings starting March 15, at 6:30 to 8 p.m. at Generations Intergenerating Center, (1500 Douglas Drive). County High E goes past this building. The group will conduct seminars, workshops and develop relationships with interested partners.

## An Inspector Calls on UW-WC stage

UW-Washington County will present four performances of the English drama, *An Inspector Calls* in March. Evening performances take place at 7:30pm on Friday and Saturday, March 9-10 in the campus theatre, located on the second floor of the campus at 400 University Drive (exit off Hwy. 33) in West Bend. Free parking is available.

A classic in mid-20th century English theatre, *An Inspector Calls* was written by J. G. Priestly. The three-act drama focuses on the affluent Birling family and takes place on a single night in 1912 in the Birling's comfortable home, located in Brumley, an industrial town in England. The Birling family includes Arthur, (played by Pat Perkins, Kewaskum); his wife Sybil (played by Debbie Woldanski, Slinger); daughter Sheila (played by Anna Miller, Waukesha) and son Eric (played by UW-WC student, Aaron

Hetzel, West Bend). The family is visited by a man, calling himself Inspector Goole, (played by Carl Liden, Waukesha) who questions the family about the suicide of a young working-class woman, Eva Smith. Over the course of the evening, the entire family, under interrogation by Goole, are revealed to have been responsible for the young woman's mistreatment, abandonment and social ruin. The surprising revelation turns out to be in the inspector himself (you'll have to see the play to find out what happens). The play is classic "drawing room" theatre and has been recognized as a mocking assessment of the hypocrisies of Victorian society and as an expression of author, J.B. Priestly's political principles. The play is often studied in English high schools as one of the prescribed texts for the English Literature examination.

Other characters include: Sheila's fiancé, Gerald Croft

(played by Juan Garcia, Germantown, a UW-WC student) and the Birling's maid, Edna (played by Aja Zarling, Slinger, a UW-WC student). The play is produced and directed by UW-WC Professor Brad Ford. Jessica DeLaurier, a student at UW-WC, serves as Assistant to the Director. Stage manager is Dan Kaneiss, lighting board operator is Chris Giebel, videographer is Michelle Nobbe, scenic artist is Lisa Rowe, costume manager is Pat Fox and props master is Carl Liden. 



## 25 Years Ago

January 2, 1987

As the deadline for filing nomination papers nears, the number of candidates seeking a seat on the Kewaskum Board of Education continues to increase. To date, seven individuals have taken out papers. They are Ronald Beimborn, Tom Brigham, Jean Goeden, Ruth Schmitt, Robert Schulteis, John Spoerl and Neal Weare.

The Legislature's Joint Committee on Finance has preserved much of the Department of Transportation's 1987 plan to improve existing state highways by approving \$36 million in state transportation funds in place of federal highway funds that were stalled in Congress this year. Legislative authorization permits the DOT to go ahead with early 1987 contract awards on 33 projects in 20 counties. A list of highway improvement projects salvaged and re-instated by the legislative action for 1987 construction includes the following: Washington County - Resurface State Highway 28 (Main Street) from Fond du Lac Avenue to Carroll Road in Kewaskum; resurface State Highway 28 from Kewaskum east to Highway 144; resurface State Highway 145 from US Highway 41 to old 45. Fond du Lac County - Recondition State Highway 67 from Campbellsport to US Highway 45.

Without the funds, the DOT had warned that it would be forced to eliminate 95 miles of resurfacing, 16 miles of reconditioning work and 18 miles of reconstruction.

With a perfect record of three wins and no losses, they defeated West Allis Central, West Bend and Hartland Arrowhead. They have now compiled a season's total of eight wins and one loss.

December 25, 1936

Music furnished by Dodo Ratchman's old time and modern orchestra, who are noted for their radio and stage appearances. Balloon and snowball shower and novelties galore. January 1, 1937

As a climax to the mild, above-freezing temperatures and heavy rainstorms the past week in the vicinity, a severe short, but snappy windstorm accompanied the rain early Wednesday afternoon which did considerable damage in numerous places. In this village a number of trees were uprooted and broken off, two of which on the parochial school grounds snapped off simultaneously, being witnessed by this writer. In various buildings and business places, a number of broken windows and doors were reported. Many smaller objects were given in to the wind, which lasted a few minutes and vanished as suddenly as it arrived. The most serious damage reported was at the old Sebastian Pflum farm, several miles southwest of the village, where the bulk of the storm struck. On the farm which is now being occupied by John Felten, a smokehouse and shed were blown down, the barn doors were ripped from their foundations and were blown about, windows were broken in the house and bricks were torn out of the side of the building and strewn about the premises. The car garage, which was also damaged, was completely lifted by the wind and turned slightly so that it now rests at an angle from its original foundation. The weather during the past week has been most unusual for this time of year in Wisconsin.

EXTRA! As we go to press we receive the bulletin that Arnold Kohn, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Kohn of the Town of Kewaskum, died at St. Catherine's Hospital, Kenosha, from injuries received at about 2:30 am Thursday morning when the Kewaskum Creamery truck he was driving to Chicago crashed into a parked truck without lights, south of Union Grove. A passenger, Herbert Backhaus, Jr., of this village, was also severely injured and is confined to the same hospital. Laborers worked three hours to remove the victims from the wreckage.

Two daring young men who must have been hard up for a ride or were in a hurry to get somewhere visited this village early last Sunday morning and made off with a milk truck and its contents, owned by Joseph Schoofs, local milk-

man, while it was parked on the street. Theodore Schoofs, who is employed by his father in the business, had parked the truck in front of the Ramthun Hardware store while he carried the milk to the rear of the building. Upon coming back he saw two unknown men jump into his truck and drive away before he could attempt to stop them. He immediately notified Chief of Police Brandt, who in turn notified authorities in surrounding cities but to no avail. The truck was not recovered until Monday, when abandoned and milkless, it was found by a Milwaukee patrolman.

The new tavern and lunch room on Fond du Lac Avenue in this village, managed by Lester Dreher, which had been without a business name since its opening last summer, received the title, "The Archway Cafe," in the contest which closed last week. Mrs. Edward Weddig of this village suggested the winning name.

Mrs. Peters, before her marriage, was Miss Evelyn Perschbacher, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A.A. Perschbacher of here. A Christmas gift in the form of a baby boy was presented to Rev. and Mrs. A.A. Graf of Wayne on December 24.

## 100 Years Ago

December 23, 1911

The Old Settlers' Club of this village held its annual meeting at N.J. Mertes' place last Sunday afternoon and re-elected the following officers: President, H.W. Krahn; Treasurer, N.J. Mertes; Secretary, Val Peters.

Jacob Schiltz, Frank Ehner and Theodore Dworschak of New Fane are busy hauling stones and sand for a new wall which will be built under Ramthun's store next spring.

Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Reysen of Beechwood had their twin boys which were born last week Wednesday, christened on Sunday. Both are doing nicely. A baby girl was born to Mr. and Mrs. Henry Schultz of New Fane last Wednesday.

December 30, 1911

Miss Leona Backhaus had a narrow escape from being crushed under the wheels of a freight engine last Saturday morning when the engine of northbound way freight struck her on the Main Street crossing in this village. The train at the time was going very slow and only presence of mind of the engineer saved her life. Miss Backhaus, who is employed as clerk in the L. Rosenheimer store was sent to the express office to get an express parcel. When she got to the crossing she saw that a train was coming and thinking that the train was coming up the main track, she stepped on the side track and waited for it. However, the train was coming

on the track she was standing on. Not paying any attention to the train she did not get out of the way and the next thing she picked herself up on the other side of the track. The engineer was unable to see Miss Backhaus until after the engine had struck her. He at once stopped the train which saved her life.

The new bank building of the Bank of Kewaskum has been completed. Occupancy of the same will take place on January 1, 1912, when the Bank of Kewaskum, Kewaskum Electric Light Co., and the L. The cold weather connected with this blizzard made it so much the worse. Drifts of 12 feet high could be seen on all roads.

Mrs. Anna Emmer, age 82 years, died at the home of her son, William, 2-1/2 miles south of St. Kilian last Wednesday.

## NOTICE TO ALL WASHINGTON COUNTY DOG OWNERS

Pursuant to Section 174.052, Wisconsin Statutes, notice is hereby given to all owners of dogs in Washington County that dog licenses and rabies vaccinations are required.

Vaccination by a licensed veterinarian against rabies is required of all dogs (Section 95.21(2)) within 30 days after the dog reaches 4 months of age and revaccinated within one year after the initial vaccination. The owner of a dog shall have the dog revaccinated against rabies by a veterinarian when the certificate expires or within three (3) years of previous vaccination. The certificate of rabies vaccination

must be presented to the collecting official before a dog license may be issued.

All dogs five (5) months of age or older require a license. The minimum license fee for neutered males or spayed females is \$3.00, upon presentation of evidence attesting to the same, and \$8.00 for the unneutered male or unspayed female dog or one-half of these amounts if the dog became five (5) months of age after July 1, of the license year. The governing body of any town, village, or city may raise the minimum dog license tax. Any person who keeps multiple dogs or operates a kennel may apply for a multiple dog license. The fee is \$35.00 for twelve (12) dogs or less and additional \$3.00 for each dog in excess of twelve (12).

Dog licenses may be obtained from your local town, village or city treasurer or designee during the course of any given year. Dog owners should notify their treasurer if their dog is given away or has died, so that you will not be considered delinquent. An affidavit of death is available.

## PENALTY

Every owner of a dog 5 months of age or older who fails to obtain a license by April 1, will be assessed a late fee of \$5.00.



### Slow Cooker Marmalade Pork Tenderloin

- Cook Time: 4 hours  
Prep Time: 20 minutes  
Yield: 8 servings
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
  - 3 pounds pork tenderloin
  - 1/2 cup teriyaki sauce
  - 1 cup chicken broth
  - 1 10-ounce jar Smucker's® Sweet Orange Marmalade
  - 2 teaspoons fresh ginger, grated
  - 1/4 cup brown sugar
  - 3 cloves garlic
  - 1 large onion, sliced

### Citrus Apple Tart

- Prep Time: 25 minutes  
Cook Time: 1 hour, 5 minutes  
Yield: 8 servings
- 1 9-inch single Crisco® Pie Crust
  - 4 medium Granny Smith apples (about 2 pounds)
  - 1/2 cup sugar
  - 3/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
  - 1/4 teaspoon salt
  - 2 tablespoons butter, diced

### Strawberry Spring Salad

- Prep Time: 10 minutes  
Yield: 6 servings
- 1/2 cup Smucker's® Strawberry Syrup

## DNR needs partners for loaner life jacket pilot 'Kids Don't Float' project targeted to start Memorial Day weekend

MADISON -- In an effort to help boaters of all ages stay safe on the water this summer, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is seeking partners to help run a loaner life jacket pilot of the Kids Don't Float program at several boat landings.

"This program is all about keeping everyone - especially kids - safe while out enjoying Wisconsin's many rivers and lakes," said Chuck Horn, the DNR acting boating law administrator and former conservation warden heading the effort. "There are cases when people launch the boat thinking they have a life jacket for each passenger, and they don't. This program will HELP ensure all in the boat will have one, as the law requires."

The DNR Bureau of Law Enforcement hopes to replicate the successful life jacket program started in Homer, Alaska, in 1996 to combat that state's high rate of child and youth drownings. Alaska started the program with several boat landing stations where life jackets were available to be borrowed at no cost and returned after use. Today, Alaska has more than 500 loaner stations statewide.

"This is definitely an honor program. If you need a jacket, take one before you launch and simply return it to the station once you're off the water," Horn said. "We are optimistic we will have partners because Wisconsin is fortunate

to have so many organizations and citizens who care deeply about the resources and the people who enjoy them." Donated jackets needed, partner duties

Horn says the DNR will provide the plans and materials for the loaner stations along with a starter supply of loaner jackets. "And the program also would gladly accept donated life jackets. If the pilot grows into a program, the jackets will be needed."

The partners could be groups, clubs, associations, agencies or individuals interested in boating safety. The partners would have several responsibilities, including:

- constructing and placing the loaner board station;
- getting permission to locate the loaner station from the local governing body of the boat landing or individual property owner;
- periodically checking the station and replace jackets if necessary; and
- removing and storing the station at the end of the boating season.

*What's the law on life jackets?*

The U.S. Coast Guard and Wisconsin law require a boater carry one wearable life jacket, also known as a PFD, or personal flotation device, for every passenger on board - including the operator. Boats that are 16 feet and longer must have a throwable type PFD -- such as a ring buoy or

Type IV cushion. The cushion can be a square with handles on the side.

Also, the U.S. Coast Guard requires children 13 and younger to wear their life jackets on federal waterways such as the Great Lakes or Mississippi River.

Why are the wardens doing this?

Horn says since 1994, 13 kids have drown in boating related incidents in Wisconsin and 92 percent of those were not wearing life jackets.

"That 90 percent-plus statistic of drowning victims not wearing life jackets extends to all ages," he said. "This program has helps highlight safety and the role of life jackets play while boating."
