Bauer, Deheck, Muckerheide lead KIWC contingent to state

FOND DU LAC- As is always the case in youth tournament wrestling, there were surprises and disappointment for the KIWC (Kewaskum Indian Wrestling Club) at Fond du Lac last Saturday.

"We had nine... a little less than last year, but they all wrestled pretty well," coach Justin Rhoads said Monday. The nine, who finished either first or second, along with one third, qualified for the WWF Kids Folkstyle State Tournament, which will be held at the Alliant Energy Center in Madison this Friday and Saturday, March 23-24.

A returnee for Kewaskum is Eric Bauer, a fifth grader at Kewaskum

Elementary School, who won a title at 81 pounds for those born in 2001 or 2002. Bauer, who finished 4th as a second grader, won a state title in third grade and qualified but did not place a year ago, dominated his bracket with a pair of pins and two major decisions.

Bauer opened the day with an 8-0 decision over Blake Pfeiffer of the Port Washington Piranhas, then disposed of Garrett Jeanquart of Luxemburg-Casco by the same score.

Many times the competition gets tougher when athletes hit the semis, but Bauer just kept rolling, needing just 1:45 to pin Colton Harrington of Valders.

The story had a similar ending in the finals when the diminutive Indian pinned Slinger's Scott Hellesen in 1:26.

On the day, Bauer did not give up a single point.

Also climbing to the top rung of the victory stand were Alex Deheck at 87 pounds and Kannon Muckerheide at 100.

Deheck, competing in the six-man bracket, went 3-0 on the day. He opened with a pin over Hunter Jeranek of Slinger in 1:55, then out pointed Horicon's Ian Wendt-Utrie by a 5-1 score to move into the finals.

With the championship on the line, Deheck shut out Bodhi Albrent of West Bend, 4-0.

Muckerheide opened with a bye, then had his toughest match of the day, edging West Bend's Dominic Robson

Farmington holds March meeting

At last Tuesday's regular board meeting, Farmington supervisors discussed hiring a commercial building inspector for Washington County's building project at Leonard J Yahr Park and possibly for other future town needs. Supervisors took no action on ordinances that would address adult establishments in the town due to their complex nature and cost involved.

Washington County would like an inspection done on a pavilion being constructed at Yahr Park. Town officials spoke with Inspector Roger Kison present at the meeting. Kison agreed to complete the inspection and bring in a fee schedule to next month's meeting for possible future projects. The agenda item will be readdressed at that time.

Supervisors also discussed changing the town's annual meeting for 2013. Due to election law changes in the state of Wisconsin, Farmington would face a gap in board coverage between the second and third weeks in April following the election. Because of this, the Board adopted Ordinance 2012-02 to extend town officer terms. Due to the lapse in coverage, the annual meeting will now be moved to the third Tuesday in April 2013.

In light of the recent happenings in the Town of Trenton, Supervisors discussed implementing a plan to address adult oriented establishments. Clerk Chris Schellinger received copies of plans from several municipalities throughout the state, which proved to be quite complex. It is recommended to go through an attorney before any type of ordinance is put into effect. Due to the cost it would incur on the town, Farmington has decided to take no action regarding a plan for adult establishments at this time.

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Board of Education election has four running for two seats

A historic primary in February edged out an incumbent in the race for a seat on the Kewaskum Board of Education. Board President Bruce Braidigan faces a challenge from two newcomers and a former board member looking to get the seat back he lost last year.

The winners of the two seats will serve a three-year term on the board. Board of Education members receive \$262.50 per regular monthly board meeting.

Those two individuals will also get right to work as the district begins working with its new superintendent of schools and cracks an over \$900,000 budget deficit.

Bruce Braidigan, 69
Town of Farmington
Married w/adult children
Retired firefighter

Seeking his third term Braidigan stated his top priority was the children in the district. "I want to give kids the best education possible," he stated.

He also thought the district faced challenges with a new superintendent coming on board and thought his experience would be helpful moving the district forward.

"I think in the last six years we've gained a lot of respect as a district," he explained.

Jim Leister, 46
Town of Wayne
Married, 4 children in the district

Employed with Ingersol-Rand Leister had previously served on the board from from 2005-2011. He will attempt to reclaim his seat lost in last year's election to newcomers. He believes his experience and

ability to work with and listen to people on both sides of the issues are what make him a valued asset to the Board of Education.

"Over the past year, I have been highly engaged with parents, teachers, support staff, students, and other community members, regarding our school district. The common concern from everyone is the lack of effectiveness with the current leadership," Leister stated.

If elected, Leister said he hopes the board can work together and will be open for public input and debate to find the best solutions for the district. He also stated he believed Board members should always be accessible and never hide behind excuse or deflection.

"The board should always work together with our employees and our community, and by doing this we will solve any obstacles that are before us," he concluded.

Grace Mueller, 68
Village of Kewaskum
Single, adult children, grand children in the district
Retired from CESA #1 (Cooperative Educational Service Agency #1)

A newcomer to the board and political life, Mueller says, "My vision for a sound school board is to be accountable not only to the taxpayers of the district, but to school staff and especially to the parents and students who are promised a quality education which they so dutifully deserve."

Mueller says she is deeply passionate about quality education and proper process in all financial matters. "There are current

accounting practices that are highly disturbing to me such as administration not getting Board approval when it is warranted. Equally disturbing is lack of communication between Administration/ Board and members of the community. I am confident I can improve upon these practices with an assertive, diligent, and common sense approach to prohibit them from occurring in the future."

Harry Roecker, 54
Village of Kewaskum
Married w/adult children, grandchildren in the district
Self-employed, LR Trophy

Roecker says making Kewaskum schools better for his granddaughter is a driving force in his decision to run for the board of education and school board at the same time. As far as being able to handle both, he stated the meetings are held on different Mondays so he does not see any reason he can't do both.


Class size is a concern of Roecker who believes the district needs to cut spending in other areas and focus on hiring enough quality teachers to alleviate large class sizes.

KCK sponsors Food Night to encourage healthy eating

Kewaskum Cares About Kids (KcK) recently sponsored a Food Night parent workshop that was well-attended by families of the community. Several presenters spoke about various wellness topics and allowed time for questions to be answered.

A short video, which can be seen at www.thevisualmd.com/interactives_library/child_health/childhood_obesity_minisite, started the evening, introducing concepts including the concern of food choices, disease consequences, and how parents are instrumental in playing a vital role in their children's health.

Paula Carlton, Nurse Practitioner at Aurora Advanced Healthcare, discussed the importance of making the "right" choices within each of the five food groups. She also discussed how sugar negatively affects the body, showing a short video clip (found at www.youtube.com/watch?v=k1JZ3MLS-k0). Additional fun food activities and information can be found at www.choosemyplate.gov.

Heidi Anderson, Registered Nurse of Aurora and Behavioral Specialist for the Fit Kids Fit Families program in conjunction with the Kettle Moraine YMCA, discussed the behaviors developed around food, based on Ellyn Satter's theories. Simply put, the parent is responsible for what the child eats, when the child eats, and how often the child eats. Consequently, the child is responsible for if he/she eats and how much he/she eats.

Joel Dzedzic, Kewaskum Middle School Math Teacher, crunched some numbers to prove the unhealthy aspects of junk food on not only the diet, but the pocketbook. Consuming a healthier snack rather than a bag of chips, snickers bar, and soda 5 days a week for 30 years would save you about \$17,000 based on current prices! He also explained the concept of "food density", explaining how nutrient dense foods play a very important role in building a strong body.

Last, but not least, Jeff Grotenhuis, KMS Wellness Teacher, demonstrated how any homework activity can be converted into exercise. For example, the simple multiplication problem, 5 x 5 turned into 25 jumping jacks. Additionally, he provided many fantastic local resources for family activity outings. Check out <http://www.getmoving-washingtoncounty.com/> for some of this information.

Throughout this evening, Terri Miller, the Food Service Director for the Kewaskum School District, created samples of easy, homemade snacks for participants' tasting pleasure. The smoothies, hummus with veggies, and turkey/cheese/pepper wraps

were such a hit that leftovers were nonexistent. Kids could also taste-test unique "superfoods", including blueberries, nuts, Jerusalem artichokes, sprouted crackers, and canned beets from the garden.

Enjoy Terri's simple smoothie recipe (Makes 4 servings): Blend together 1.5 cups chopped mango, 1 banana, 1-8oz. fat-free, plain yogurt, 1.5 cups ice, 1/2 cup skim milk, 1/2 cup sliced strawberries. Top each with 1 whole strawberry for presentation and enjoy. If you're feeling adventurous, add some spinach for the added nutrition benefit - Terri promises you won't be able to taste it.

Many questions were asked throughout the evening, and we recommended answering many by discussing as a family. The hot topics of the evening were as follows:

1. Butter or margarine? Technically, both are fats. Butter is a saturated fat but comes from a "natural" source, a cow. Margarine, a man-made, chemically created fat, may contain trans fats, i.e. look for the words hydrogenated or partially hydrogenated on the ingredients list. Polyunsaturated or monounsaturated fat options are better as they promote heart health and improved cholesterol and lipid panels such as those found in extra virgin olive oil. Canola oil has some omega 3's which are great for body and brain function. Many other omega 3 oils are available depending on your taste and diet patterns. All things fit into your meal plan in moderation -- a pat of butter on your buckwheat pancakes is okay.

2. Diet soda? The added artificial sweeteners are the concern as studies have indicated a possible link between the sweeteners and cancer and stroke risk. Additionally, the added sweetness affect,

since artificial sweeteners are many hundreds of times sweeter than table sugar, provides a high threshold of sweetness without providing the energy our body expects, thus possibly increasing one's appetite or cravings for additional sweetness. Studies show that diet soda drinkers take 200 calories more from other foods than do their non-soda drinking counterparts. That can add up to 1/2 pound per week. Water, leaf tea and low fat milk are suggested as healthier, nutritionally beneficial beverages. Four ounces of 100% juice per day can be okay, but the real fruit is always a better choice.

3. Bread? Patti Schmidt, Dietician from Kettle Moraine YMCA says that "Choosing a healthy bread option can certainly be a headache. Be very picky about the food labels. The first ingredient of a good choice should be 100% Whole grain product to ensure that it is a whole grain product and not just a white, enriched flour product, and as a result, the nutrition facts should indicate that there are at least three grams of fiber per slice. New healthy bread products are out on the market now with 'Whole Wheat White Flour', a whole grain flour that just happens to naturally be lighter in color than the regular whole wheat flour - feel free to give these a try as long as they meet all of the other criteria!. Also, try to avoid breads that contain high fructose corn syrup."

Village receives new lawnmower



The Village of Kewaskum recently took delivery of a 2012 John Deere front mount mower. The purchase was made because of a surplus in the snow removal budget in 2011. The DPW realized an unaudited savings of \$15,314 according to Gilles. The tractor was purchased locally from Serwe Implement of Ashford for \$15,950. The mower is front wheel drive, has a 72" side discharge mower deck, a hydraulic weight transfer kit, turf tires and an air ride suspension kit. The village traded a 1996 John Deere.

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Muench signs letter of intent for Midland University

She started in second grade with bumpers, and now it's going to pay for about half of her college education.

Kewaskum landed a scholarship for bowling at Midland University in Nebraska, signing a letter of intent last week.

"I'm very excited. They're giving me a great opportunity. They're giving me a scholarship to do something I love to do," she said.

Muench has helped lead Kewaskum's bowling team to state three years in a row, and qualified in singles as well. This year, Muench placed fourth of 70 girls at state, her best finish in the tournament. The team took third.

Muench averages in the 200 to 205 range. Her best game was a 278 and her best series a 765. She has a laundry list of accomplishments, including several tournament championships.

Last year at national competition in Las Vegas, she finished 84th of 578 girls, missing the first cut by 18 pins. She said that was when she realized she could compete with the best.

"I kinda knew I was good all along, especially last year at nationals. I think that was my turning point," she said. "I could be very good if I keep working hard."

This year, Muench has big goals for national competition in July.

"Before I get to nationals I'd like to average at least a 210 because that should for sure get me into the top 16, I'm thinking. I want to make junior team USA at nationals and I'd also like to land the top five this year," she said.

Muench said she will begin training soon, working out in the morning and practicing two to three times per week with her coaches, Ben and Geri Hoefs. She keeps a busy schedule between school and working at Ace Hardware.

Though often seen as recreation, bowling, Muench said, takes dedication and physical and mental skill.

"Most people don't consider it a sport but if they'd get into it and learn about it, it's just as much of a sport as anything else," she said. "They don't understand all the time and effort you have to put into it. To get to the professional level it takes so much more. And it's not even your physical game; it's your mental game."

That, Muench said, is where she has an advantage.

"Even if you have one bad game you have to bounce back and be able to redeem yourself," she said. "I had a

7-10 split in the last frame this weekend. I had to let it go."

Muench said she is grateful to her parents, who have sacrificed for her to be able to go to various tournaments, and to her coaches for their help.

Muench plans to major in business and psychology or nutrition. She would someday like to own her own clinic or go farther with her business education. She visited Midland once and was impressed.

"I love the coaches. They actually scouted me last year at nationals and that's where I met them. They're great," she said. "I met some of the teammates. They're very welcoming."

Eventually, Muench would like to become a professional bowler. She's not far from it as pros average 220 to 230.

"That's what I'm working toward. That's the goal," she said.

College tryouts start in September and Muench expects to be on varsity. The season consists of 10 tournaments before the playoffs, running through March.

"It's a long season which is fine with me. I could go all year 'round," she said.





BOARD OF EDUCATION – A MEMBER EXPRESSION



Use of the Kewaskum Statesman as a communication tool for all residents of this community has been my practice this past year. The purpose was to keep you informed, to share the difficulties, facts, and vision of our school district, and to allow for dialog regarding efficiency and results. Feedback obtained from this approach has been highly favorable from the majority. I am grateful and promise not to stop! Recently however, driven by desperation from an impending election, this communication tool was unfortunately used to attack.

These attacks were against people trying to do the same-to communicate their views and positions on issues that were then forced to respond to agenda-based accusations. Is this politics? Maybe, but is it proper? That can be argued, as it was in expression from a Wayne resident. To me, what we are ultimately experiencing is freedom of speech and like it or not, what we can't afford is to have that right squelched. In the end, the people will come to see the truth as it does reflect intent. It is a pivotal time for our State, Local and School District governments, and those campaigning for change know this intention.

Speaking on behalf of the many, what is desired is for every candidate to qualify their claims with factual evidence of accomplishment or to state what they will accomplish. For example, to say "putting education of our students #1"; what does that mean in action, policy, or voting record to prove the claim? Does it include proper oversight of financial processing and the avoidance of unauthorized spending or an explanation of declining test scores since 2006? Also, to state opposition to raising taxes and/or a referendum is simply a scare tactic. Odd as the candidate making the claim is also the one whose majority of tenure had the benefit of \$430,000 annually from a referendum. No opposition was stated then, nor was a plan once the 'subsidy' was exhausted. Additionally, to project a value on testifying in Madison to fight for the Indian logo, is also not qualified. The cause and solution of the mascot law is solely that of the State Legislative Branch and Governor, so there is little anyone can do except write letters and call representatives to push for a bill that either amends the current law, or repeals it. Has this been done by the claimant? What was in district control and should have been done 10 months ago was to restore the mascot gift in the field house. Was it?

Anyone who serves or wants to serve in a public role deserves recognition. It is not a simple endeavor yet, as within the private sector, it is highly critical that those chosen for any public role are deemed the right and best person for the role. In the case of our district and Board of Education, the best way to move our district forward to higher levels is to ensure two new members are chosen to be part of the new leadership. It is without question, time to show this community what an effective Board can do!

Shakespeare on UW-WC's Stage

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





January 22, 1937

Moon Lake in the Town of Auburn, located several miles northeast of this village, is to have its name changed to Mauthe Lake, in honor of William Mauthe of Fond du Lac, pioneer in the field of conservation throughout Wisconsin, according to action taken by the Fond du Lac County board of supervisors last week at the suggestion of the state geographic board. Mr. Mauthe, who is now vacationing in Texas, was the first chairman of the state conservation commission. It was

desired by the current President of this commission, H.W. MacKenzie, to make an enduring memorial while Mr. Mauthe is still living, and as Moon Lake is located in Mr. Mauthe's home territory, its name was chosen to be dedicated to him. The lake is completely surrounded by the newly state-acquired Kettle Moraine forest, formerly a refuge operated by the Milwaukee Izaak Walton League.

A big modern dance will be held by Al Naumann at the Kewaskum Opera House on January 31, featuring a local orchestra leader, Earl Etta and His Music of Distinction, a popular 11-piece organization. Admission will be 25c per person with lunch and refreshments served.

According to County Clerk M.W. Monroe, who recently received the appointment of the common school fund income for Washington County, Kewaskum with 200 children of school age, will receive \$100 as its share. The amounts apportioned to the several towns, incorporated villages and cities of the county are calculated on the basis of 50 cents for each person of school age residing in districts which maintained a school as required by law.

Explosion of a coke salamander, being used to thaw out the ground in the new addition of the Pick Manufacturing Company plant, owned by Carl Pick at West Bend last Friday was believed to have caused a fire which completely destroyed a warehouse and the newly built addition, along with a large amount of stock, with loss estimated at \$45,000. The plant manufactures automotive parts. The explosion took place as Roland Weber, a fireman at the warehouse, went into the new addition to replenish the salamander. The explosion shook the room, which was filled with flames almost instantaneously. He was not injured. The West Bend Fire Department upon arriving found the entire warehouse aflame, ignited by the gas evolved by the salamander. Nothing could be done to save the building, the firemen labored six hours to keep the flames from entering the factory.

On Monday of last week the Beechwood Fire Department was called out when it was learned that the Batavia grade schoolhouse was on fire. With the aid of the Batavia firemen, the blaze was soon put under control, although the entrance hall and belfry roofs were

burned quite badly and the interior of the school rooms were damaged by water and smoke.

On Monday a group of men in the employ of Otto Backhaus, local ice dealer, began the harvest of ice on the Milwaukee River and filling the new spacious ice house recently erected by Mr. Backhaus for distribution to Kewaskum residents next summer. The ice is good this winter, being very clear and close to 17 inches thick.

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
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

The Kewaskum Village Board, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular session in the Council Room of the Municipal Building, 204 First Street.

President Andy Pesch presided and called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. Board members present were Craig Garbisch, Harry Roecker, Mike Berger, Andy Pesch, Norman Kufahl, Kevin Scheunemann and Jim Hovland. Staff members present were Matt Heiser, Mark Groeschel, Thomas Bishop, Jerry Gilles, Chad Cook and Stephanie Justmann. The new media and members from the community were also present.

Notice of the meeting had been posted at the PNC Bank, Kewaskum Post Office, and at the Municipal Building on February 16, 2012. Notice was also forwarded to the Village Board, Village Attorney, Village Engineer, and the News Media.

The meeting was opened with a Moment of Silence and Pledge of Allegiance.

Motion by Craig Garbisch to approve the minutes from the February 6, 2012 meeting, second by Harry Roecker. Voice vote, motion carried.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to suspend the rules and bring up items F under Report of Department Heads: "Administer the Oath of Office to the newly appointed Police Chief, Thomas Bishop", second by Jim Hovland and carried by roll call vote. Garbisch-aye, Roecker-aye, Berger-aye, Pesch-aye, Kufahl-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye (7-0-0).

The Clerk Stephanie Justmann administered the Oath of Office to the newly appointed Police Chief Thomas Bishop. Administrator Matt Heiser pinned the chief badge on Thomas Bishop and introduced him to the Village Board.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel presented the January 2012 report:

The Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles reported:

1. The current status for the 2011 DPW budget is a surplus of \$15,314. This money could be used to purchase or designate funds toward a future purchase of a lawn mower. Three price quotes were obtained and the most economical price was from Serwe Implement for \$15,950.00 which includes the trade-in. There was discussion on the current age of the lawn mowers, repairs and putting money for street outlay. Motion by Mike Berger to purchase the John Deere 1445 front mount mower from Serwe Implement for \$15,950.00 including the trade-in, second by Craig Garbisch. Voice vote, motion carried.

2. Jerry Gilles also reported he didn't receive a response from SEWRPC on the floodplain and storm water modeling and management schedule.

Administrator Matt Heiser reported:

1. A meeting with the Joint Review Board to declare the TID#2 Distressed has been scheduled for March 27, 2012.

2. The Kewaskum Chamber is busy planning "Party on the Pavement" for 2012. The event will end at 11:00 p.m., prices are being obtained for a tent that will not be spiked into the parking lot, portable toilets and installing poles along Fond du Lac Avenue to hang a banner are some of the items being resolved.

Jim Hovland, representative for the Plan Commission announced the February 28, 2012 meeting has been cancelled due to a lack of agenda items. A public hearing to declare the TID #2 Distressed is scheduled for March 27, 2012 at 7:00 p.m.

Norman Kufahl, representative for the Library Board, reported on the February 13, 2012 meeting. The circulation for January 2012 was 6,442 compared to 5,719 in 2011.

Matt Heiser, representative for the Mid-Moraine, reported on the February 8, 2012 Legislative Committee meeting. The topic of the meeting was the interest payment municipalities have to pay on the loan from the federal government for unemployment benefits.

A revised amortization schedule for Ehlbers and Associates for the \$1,525,000 General Obligation Refunding Bond was compared to the current amortization schedule. The revised schedule would shorten the debt repayment by one year resulting in the majority of the savings being recognized in 2019. Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to adopt the original amortization schedule with no structure change, second by Norman Kufahl. Voice vote, motion carried.

Motion by Craig Garbisch to approve the request by the Wisconsin Cycling Association Cycle Cross Series to use the River Hill Park for an event, second by Harry Roecker. Voice vote, motion carried.

Motion by Kevin Scheunemann to adopt Ordinance #12-03 To Repeal and Recreate Section 6-120 of Chapter 6 of the Municipal Code Alcohol Beverages (Closing Hours), second by Norman Kufahl. Voice vote, motion carried. (Vol. 2, pgs. 860-861)

Motion by Jim Hovland to adopt Ordinance #12-04 To Repeal and Recreate Section 94-68 of Chapter 94 of the Municipal Code (Cross-Connections Prohibited), second by Mike Berger. Voice vote, motion carried. (Vol. 2, pg. 862)

Motion by Craig Garbisch to adopt Resolution #2012-03 To Amend the 2011 Village of Kewaskum General Fund Adopted Budget, second by Jim Hovland and carried by roll call vote. Garbisch-aye, Roecker-aye, Berger-aye, Pesch-aye, Kufahl-aye, Scheunemann-aye, Hovland-aye. (7-0-0) (Vol. R3, pg. 1331)

Administrator Matt Heiser reported on the job descriptions for the administrative staff including clerk/deputy treasurer, treasurer/deputy clerk, administrative assistant/utility clerk and building inspector/zoning administrator. Heiser reviewed what the jobs were envisioned to include and what the jobs actually involve including the seasonal and sporadic projects. The job descriptions are not updated for the treasurer/deputy clerk or the administrative assistant/utility clerk. There were 6,073 interactions in 2011 with the public including walk-ins and phone calls averaging out to 28 a day not including water/sewer bills or tax payments. Recommendations from the Board were to update the job descriptions, promote cross-training and propose ways to consolidate positions.

Motion by Harry Roecker, second by Craig Garbisch to approve the issuance of an operator's license for 2011/2012 as listed. Voice vote, motion carried. No objections were noted by the police department.







- 3 tablespoons melted butter
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 12 links Johnsonville Original Breakfast Sausage

- 2 cups (8 ounces) shredded 4-cheese Mexican blend cheese
- 1/4 cup chopped red bell pepper
- Chopped fresh chives or green onions, for garnish

- 7 links Johnsonville Original Breakfast Sausage
- 3 tablespoons canola oil
- 4 cups refrigerated shredded hash browns
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/4 cup chopped orange bell pepper
- 1 jalapeño pepper, seeded and chopped
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup (4 ounces) shredded 4-cheese Mexican blend cheese

In large skillet, cook sausage per package directions. Cut links into 1-inch pieces and set aside.

In the same skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Add hash browns, onion, green and orange peppers, jalapeños, salt and pepper. Cook for about 10 minutes until hash browns are lightly browned and tender, turning occasionally.

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 2 packages (20 ounces each) refrigerated shredded hash browns
- 2 cups (8 ounces) shredded cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup diced sweet red pepper
- 1/3 cup thinly sliced green onions
- 2 cups salsa or picante sauce, optional

Place sausage on a 15 x 10 x 1-inch baking pan. Bake at 375°F for 15 to 20 minutes or until sausage is no longer pink, turning once; drain and slice into 1/4-inch coins.

In large bowl, combine eggs, milk, mustard, salt and pepper. Add hash browns, sausage, cheese, sweet red pepper and green onions; mix well. Pour into a greased 13 x 9 x 2-inch baking dish. Cover and refrigerate overnight.

Remove from the refrigerator 30 minutes before baking. Bake, uncovered, at 350°F for 65 to 70 minutes or until set and golden brown. Let stand 10 minutes before serving.

Serve with salsa or picante sauce if desired.

Easy Sausage Roll-Ups

Prep Time: 15 minutes
Cook Time: 15 minutes
Yield: 16 roll-ups

- 1 package (12 ounces) Johnsonville Breakfast Sausage Links
- 2 containers refrigerated crescent rolls (16 rolls total)
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 2 tablespoons sugar

Prepare sausage according to package directions. Drain and set aside.

Unroll crescent roll dough according to directions on package. Place one cooked sausage onto one end of a dough triangle. Roll dough around sausage according to directions on dough package and place on jelly-roll pan with the seam side down. Repeat with remaining sausage and dough. (You will have 2 extra rolls. Bake and enjoy with jam.)

Mix cinnamon and sugar together and sprinkle evenly over roll-ups. Bake according to directions on dough package. Serve hot.

OSHKOSH- After just one full week of practice, it was hard to know how Kewaskum's track athletes would perform in the season indoor opening Oshkosh High School Invitational (March 15) held at UW-Oshkosh.

Veteran coach Jerry Gosa was pleasantly surprised after the Indians notched a pair of first places and added a couple more places to finish eighth overall among the medium sized schools.

Freedom and Luxemburg-Casco finished 1-2 in the event, scoring 85 and 70 points, respectively, while the Indians finished eighth out of 24 with 23 points, a total that would have been higher had two of their sprinters been at full strength.

Eric Perkins won the 55-meter dash for KHS with a clocking of 6.79. His time was .04 of a second ahead of Johnny Eagan of Wautoma.

"He (Perkins) was close to the school record held by Chris Canter," Gosa said, noting Canter ran a 6.70 when he competed in track nearly a decade ago.

The other first place came in the pole vault where Joey Wollner cleared 11 feet, 6 inches (11-6)

"He actually didn't have a good day, but he still won it," Gosa said, noting Wollner, who went over 12-6 last spring and

is expected to clear 13-0 this year, won by a foot over the runner-up.

The Indians were expected to do well in the 4x200meter relay, but Gosa reported Teddy Wollner "tweaked his hamstring" in the preliminaries of the 55 dash, and, "Eric didn't run it either. His knee has been bothering him."

Ted Wollner had been clocked in 7.04 (15th place) in the prelims of the spring event.

Andy Buelow subbed for Wollner and Joey Seitz took the place of Perkins. Along with Joey Wollner and Jordan Hanson, the foursome was clocked in 1:46.83, good for 14th out of 25 teams.

Hanson scored three points for the Indians when he jumped 18-02.50 in the long jump, which was good for sixth place.

One highlight in the shot put was the effort of newcomer Kenny Gigstead, who threw the iron ball 40-01.50, which was good for 13th overall.

Efforts by other KHS athletes are as follows: Buelow, 800, 2:19.29; Zachary Luedtke, 800, 2:26.48; Ricky Heinen, 1,600, 5:30.38; 4x400 relay, 4:07.65; and Andy Doll, shot put, 38-01.5.

The Kewaskum girls will travel to Oshkosh on March 27 for the Oshkosh High School Indoor Invitational.
