High speed chase ends in crash



Monday afternoon found deputies for the Washington and Dodge County Sheriff Departments and members of the State Patrol involved in a high speed chase on Hwy. 41. The chase began after the vehicle was pulled over and then took off while the officer was getting out of his squad along Hwy

Two Dodge County men are at the center of a possible burglary that started a high-speed chase on USH 41 Monday. That chase ended with the vehicle crashing in a Dodge County farm field at the STH 28 off ramp from USH 41.

Authorities continued their investigation into the high speed chase which occurred on Monday, March

26, they were able to locate evidence inside the suspect vehicle that linked them to a possible burglary the two suspects may have been involved in prior to the chase.

The Washington County Sheriff's Office was called Monday afternoon by a Town of West Bend resident who reported a suspicious vehicle that had stopped at their residence and had two adult male occupants ask for directions. The alert homeowner watched the car leave and observed

that it left in a different direction then he had directed them too. The homeowner provided the sheriff's office with a vehicle description.

A Washington County Sheriff's Deputy observed a vehicle matching the description about ten minutes later on USH 41 near STH 144 in the Town of Polk.

The deputy attempted a traffic stop on the vehicle based on the matching

School budget forum to take place April 2

District officials will hear ideas on fixing near million dollar deficit

Kewaskum School officials will hold a public forum Monday, April 2 to discuss their \$904,000 budget deficit for the 2012-'13 school year. Interim Superintendent David Ewald announced the meeting at this month's regular school board meeting.

Members of the board of education, received a proposal of budget cuts and increases at that meeting. Ewald was criticized by some for not sharing the document with board members prior to the meeting.

The district's business manager Paul Reichert, forecast the nearly \$1 million deficit on a \$591,000 revenue loss and an increase of \$313,000 in expenditures.

Final adoption of the budget is scheduled for June, it is presented to the community at the annual meeting in August and finalized by October when the district receives its final numbers from the state regarding state aid, property values and revenue cap.

Reichert stated the revenue limit should remain the same. Even though enrollment in the district is declining, current law provides a \$50 increase per pupil, that will make up for the declining enrollment. The end result though is a \$251,000 decrease in the revenue limit.

A new categorical aid, Per Pupil Budget Effect, takes effect in this budget cycle and provides up to \$50 per pupil to match the increase in the revenue limit. Through this the district will receive \$97,600.

The district will save money through Governor Walker's Act 10, however, base salaries are increased by the consumer price index which is expected to be an increase of 3.5% in this budget cycle. This means the district will see an increase in funding for staffing. The district will save \$86,000 in health insurance costs when the support staff's collective bargaining agreement expires on June

Retired Chief challenges incumbent Trustees

Residents in the Village of Kewaskum have a new but familiar option on the ballot next week. Retired Chief of Police Richard Knoebel is challenging incumbent trustees Harry Roecker, Mike Berger and Craig Garbisch.

Candidates running for a two-year term as village trustee include:


Richard Knoebel, 61, the retired police chief for the Village of Kewaskum. He is married and with an adult daughter. He attended UW-La Crosse and UW-Stevens Point. Knoebel is a member of



Wings Over Wisconsin and has been a Hunter Education instructor for twenty-four years. As a regular attendee of village board meetings, Knoebel believes he can "offer a perspective that is not present on the board now."

If elected as Village Trustee, Knoebel would like to control the budget while keeping the Village and its citizens in mind. He believes in open government and would like to see the community involved with decisions at all times. To help accomplish this, he would like to limit closed sessions. Knoebel believes that "open government is essential to our way of life," and if elected, he would like the opportunity to carry out that vision.

Mike Berger, 64, is a retired journeyman electrician and also currently serves as Village Trustee. He has a wife, two children, and two grandchildren. After high school, he



completed a four-year electrical apprenticeship. He is actively involved with the New Fane Sportsman's Club. If re-elected as Village Trustee, Berger "will represent the Village residents to the best of [his] ability." He plans to

work at keeping costs down without taking away or reducing any of the services that the Village residents have come to expect.

Craig Garbisch, 45, has served as Village Trustee for the past two years. He has two children. He attended technical college and is the owner of Black Coat Asphalt Sealing LLC. If re-



elected, Garbisch would like to work toward saving money and finding additional funds for upcoming village projects, including the reconstruction of Main Street. Garbisch states, "We as a board need to continue to look for what's in the best interest for our residents [and] to progress forward in a fiscally sound way."

Harry Roecker submitted no information.

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Two County Board incumbents face challenge

Two county board supervisors that fight over a district will join them together through redistricting completed last year and a long-time supervisor in Farmington receives a challenge from a newcomer to the political stage. Richard Bertram and Gerald Schulz face off in district 13 while Incumbent Brian Bausch receives a challenge from Michael Parsons.

District 11

Brian Bausch, 65, retired Washington County Deputy Sheriff is a resident of Farmington the last 35 years. Bausch is a graduate of UW-Platteville, BS in Education and married with three adult children and two adult step

children.

Bausch has served on the Washington County Board of Supervisors, 2003-present. He has also served in the Town of Farmington on the Plan Commission and Board of Review

Bausch says if elected, "I will continue to represent and be responsive to my constituents and make positive changes. In this unstable economy, there is an increased demand for public services. While serving on various committees, my goal is to preserve vital services and make public safety a priority, while decreasing the tax levy. My goals are not self-serving and I take pride in being responsive to the needs of my constituents."

Mike Parsons, 54, an Air Systems Engineer with Ingersoll

Rand Corporation has spent the last 20 years in district 11. He is an MATC graduate is married with three adult daughters.

This is Parsons' first political endeavor.

If elected, Parsons says, "I believe in government 'of the people, by the people and for the people' and plan to be the voice for the citizens. We need to change board meetings to evenings creating more opportunities for taxpayers to attend. I will communicate and gain feedback from the citizens and become their voice so no one is unheard. I will look to introduce cost saving measures that will make our county government more efficient and still maintain public safety and high quality services.

description as well as an equipment violation. The vehicle pulled over to the side of the road on USH 41. As the deputy exited his squad car the vehicle took off at a high rate of speed. The deputy got back into his squad car and began pursuing the suspect vehicle. The suspect vehicle exited on CTH K and then got back onto USH 41 northbound. The vehicle continued northbound and once again exited on CTH D. The suspect vehicle again got back onto USH 41 northbound and continued at a high rate of speed until they attempted to exit on STH 28. The suspect vehicle lost control attempting to negotiate a curve on the STH 28 off ramp. The vehicle crossed over the on ramp to USH 41 northbound from and rolled over into a farm field.

Both occupants of the vehicle were trapped in the car and required extrication by Kohlsville and Theresa firefighters. The adult male passenger was transported by Flight For Life Helicopter to Froedtert Hospital. The driver, who was not wearing a seat belt was transported to St. Joseph's Hospital by Kewaskum Ambulance. The injuries to both do not appear to be life threatening.

The 20 year old driver of the crash remains hospitalized, with non-life threatening injuries. The 35 year old passenger was treated and released to authorities. He remains in custody at the Washington County Jail.

The Wisconsin State Patrol is conducting the accident investigation. The Washington County Sheriff's Office was also assisted by the Dodge County Sheriff's Office, Lomira Police Department, as well as West Bend Rescue Intercept.

The pursuit covered approximately 12 miles and speeds at times were in excess of 100mph. At this time it is unknown why the suspects fled from the deputy. The case remains under investigation. Detectives were able locate the

address in the Town of West Bend. The homeowner was unaware of the burglary until notified by the Washington County Sheriff's Office. Additional charges of burglary

are being referred to the Washington County District Attorney.



Our Boys and Girls Club is working on a gardening project.





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

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25 Years Ago

January 23, 1987

In one of the largest turn-outs in recent years, electors of the Kewaskum School District voted a resounding 224 to 56, Monday night, to keep the Beechwood Elementary School property and not put it up for sale as recommended by the Beechwood School Disposition Committee. The school, which was closed, effective this school year, will remain the property of the district unless the recommendation to sell the property is again addressed in the future and the electors reverse their decision.

The Kewaskum School Board during a special meeting Monday night, approved the drilling of a new well at the Wayne Elementary School in the hope that will finally solve its contaminated water problems. The board considered going ahead with a deeper well which was recommended by the driller, but then opted to stay with the original specifications for the shallower well. The basis for that decision was the cost factor and if good water was found at that level, the district would avoid the added expenses of the deeper well and new pump.

The Kewaskum Village Board again reviewed its sidewalk extension program and after some discussion formulated a timetable for the laying of new sidewalks throughout the village. The board also discussed the Department of Natural Resources' proposal to develop canoeing facilities on the west side of the Milwaukee River in River Hill Park. Administrator Dan Schmidt said the plan has been put on hold for the time being because the DNR's available funds of \$7,000 would not cover the entire cost of the project.

It was Washington County's loss when Ivan Kumrow, better known as "Ike," by everyone that knows him, left the drawing board when he retired on January 3, 1987. Born and raised on a dairy farm in Sheboygan County, it was a "natural" for accepting a position with the U.S. Soil Conservation Service back in August of 1965. In his years as a conservation technician, he estimates he has laid out over 4,000 acres of contour strip cropping, 40,000 feet of diversions and terraces, over 200 acres of grass waterways, 200 fish and wildlife ponds and 285 miles of tile drainage. This tile laid end to end would almost reach from West Bend to St. Paul, Minnesota. In 1983, Ike was nominated with Don Kurer for the USDA's highest honor award, The Superior Service Group Award.

moved their equipment and trucks into its recently completed building located just east of its old quarters on the corner of Highway S and A, in Beechwood. The new 48 by 84 foot building has five bays and about one-third, or 2,400 square feet more space than the old garage.

A huge 12 foot by 9 foot by 9 foot boulder was a real surprise for the employees of Mueller Excavating as they laid the sewer and water lines for the Timblin apartment project being constructed west of the Kewaskum Shopping Mall. In order to remove the giant, a ramp had to be built and pushed out. (Through the march of progress, that area and west became notorious for the large rocks that were pulled from the ground. Ever wonder how those rocks got there in the first place???)

Kewaskum's hopes for a successful season in Class B Gymnastics got a boost Saturday when they finished third in the Chilton Invitational, only two points out of second place. Receiving honors for KHS were Chris Kirchner, third balance beam - 7.1; Sherri Batzler, sixth uneven bars - 6.6, and Renee Kapp, sixth vaulting - 7.1. Sherri took seventh on beam and eighth on floor, tying Chris with 7.6 on that event. Despite an incomplete team, the girls placed well against West Bend West last Thursday. Missing Shelly Petsch because of illness and Carrie Batzler because of an ankle injury, the varsity team had to compete with three girls on floor and only two on uneven bars and beam. Those two girls, Chris Kirchner and Sherri Batzler, led the team with second and third place finishes respectively on beam and floor. Also having fine performances for Kewaskum were Nanci Gochen, second vaulting; Jackie Voge, third vaulting, and Sherri received second on bars.

Construction work was recently completed on the installation of a wheelchair lift at Kewaskum Elementary School. The lift will now enable students and visitors who are confined to a wheelchair and cannot travel the stairways, to reach the main and lower levels of the school including the gym area.

Administrator Dan Schmidt

advised the Village Board Monday night that the village's new sidewalk extension program has been broken down into three phases of construction for completion over the next two years. Schmidt informed the board that Phase One would consist of all the sidewalk work west of Highway 45 and north of the creek. Phase Two would be Bel Ric subdivision, all of the old parts of the village and east of the river. Phase Three would be comprised of all the major problem areas throughout the village. Plans are for Phases One and Two to be completed this year with target completion dates of August 8 and September 8. Phase Three will be held off until 1988.

It has been exactly two years since the Department of Natural Resources brought wild turkeys back to the Kettle Moraine, an area that once abounded with the birds until logging and land clearing in the early 1900s took away much of their natural habitat. The first year the DNR recorded two fatalities of young birds. In one sighting, a hen who chose to nest near a hiking trail was frightened of her nest of over two dozen eggs. She did not return to the nest. If the population continues to grow at its present rate, the flock's size should reach 800 birds by the spring of 1989.

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

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall state his or her name and address and sign the poll book before being permitted to vote. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector shall retire alone to a voting booth or machine and cast his or her ballot, except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

At the Spring Election
Where an optical scan system is used, the elector shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the person

of his or her choice in the space provided, and fill in the oval next to the write-in line.

Where touch screen voting systems are used, the elector shall touch the screen next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

At the Presidential Preference Vote:

Where an optical scan system is used, the elector shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice, within the party of his or her choice; or shall, in the alternative, fill in the oval next to the words "Uninstructed Delegation," within the party of his or her choice; or write in the name of his or her choice for a candidate in the space provided, within the party of his or her choice.

Where touch screen voting systems are used, the elector shall touch the screen next to the name of the candidate of his or her choice, within the party of his or her choice; or shall in the alternative, touch the screen next to the words "Uninstructed Delegation," within the party of his or her choice; or type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote, within the party of his or her choice.

AN ELECTOR MAY CAST ONE VOTE ONLY IN THE PRESIDENTIAL PREFERENCE PRIMARY.

The vote shall not be cast in any other manner. Not more than five minutes time shall be allowed inside a voting booth. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the elector in marking his or her ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to

anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

If an elector spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. After the elector has cast his or her vote, the elector shall leave the voting booth, properly deposit the ballot, and promptly leave the polling place. The elector may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve. The elector shall leave the polling place promptly. After an official touch screen ballot is cast, the elector shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector. 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


Impressive efforts net Bauer and Deheck silver medals

MADISON- Two members of the Kewaskum Indian Wrestling Club reached the podium at Saturday's Wisconsin Wrestling Federation Folkstyle State Championships and just missed their goals of standing on the top rungs.

Eric Bauer and Alex Deheck were both unbeaten through their first three rounds but were turned back in their championship matches.

Bauer, competing at 78 pounds in the division for boys born in 2001-'02, lost in the finals to Mavrick Licciardi by a score of 4-0. Those four points — a takedown and third-period reversal — were the only ones given up by Bauer in the regional and state tests.

Deheck and his opponent in the finals, Maguire Fitzgerald of Boscobel, were deadlocked at 0-0 after three minutes of regulation, and Fitzgerald won the match when he secured a takedown in the first overtime period.

None of the other seven KIWC qualifiers placed in the meet.

It was pretty nice," coach Justin Rhoads said about having two runners-up and most others winning at least one match.

Bauer opened the tournament with a pin in

1:32 over Dagan Lance of Mukwonago, then followed that win with a 4-0 shutout over Cole Wisnieski of Sparta and next came a 9-0 major decision over Baldwin-Woodville's Jordan Bonte.

"He dominated his first three matches," Rhoads said about Bauer, who has been to state four times and won a title as a third grader.

At 87 pounds, Deheck (in the 2001-'02 division), making his first state appearance, was convincing in his opener. He only needed :42 to win Mukwonago's Alex Larson.

From then on, the matches were extremely close. First, he edged William Ahnen of Westby 4-2 in overtime, and in the semifinals, he survived another overtime battle, edging Mitchel Harmon of Colfax, also by a 4-2 decision.

"Alex had three overtime matches. He's tough," Rhoads said, adding Deheck never missed a practice all season.

Most of the other KIWC entries finished 1-2 or 0-2 in the tough competition, which included 16 wrestlers who had finished first or second at last week's regional tests.

First timers Braeden Scoles and Ben Butler both won one match. Scoles, competing at 57 pounds, started off with a 14-4 loss to Riley Dutton of the Kenosha Wrestling Club, but he bounced back to beat

Tanner Anderson of GET Blue Demons, 11-9.

In his third match, Scoles was eliminated when he was pinned in 2:18 by Cooper Willis of Higher Level.

Butler fell to Tyler Goebel of Mukwonago 12-1 in his first match but also came back strong, defeating Josh Boardman of Desoto, 4-2. He then lost to Cael Grotenhuis of Slinger in a close 6-4 match.

In the 2001-02 division, Jonathan Schellinger, at 78 pounds, was pinned and later lost a 2-0 decision and was eliminated from further competition.

Nathan Laverenz finished 1-2, winning via a pin in 1:40 over Cotton Oas of Sauk Prairie in between two pins at 135 pounds.

Kannon Muckerheide was winless at 100 pounds (boys 2001-02), as was Alex Vogt at 100 pounds (1999-2000).

The only KIWC eighth grade representative, Andy Doll, went 1-2 at 160 pounds. He started off with a tough 2-1 loss to Todd Willims of Union Grove, then won the next via disqualification over Tomah's Josh Peardot before losing a 16-1 technical fall to Dustin Setzer of Sheboygan Falls.

Talking about the extra pressure at the meet, Rhoads said, "It didn't seem to bother any of them. They were ready."

Final 2011 deer harvest numbers

MADISON - Final 2011 deer harvest numbers and statewide deer population estimates are now available in Wisconsin, and the Department of Natural Resources is asking hunters and other interested citizens to attend one of many deer forums in the state to provide comments as the department begins developing recommendations for 2012.

Hunters registered a total of 347,711 white-tailed deer in all combined deer hunting seasons in 2011, including 257,511 harvested in all gun seasons, and 90,200 harvested in the archery season.

The recently finalized harvest numbers are being shared with the public at the deer hunter forums, which continue through the end of March.

"Last year's harvest numbers are just one piece of information that hunters provide every fall when they register a deer, and the information is used to help estimate the size of the deer population on a unit by unit basis. This information, along with the input provided by the public all help to shape the season framework proposal, and quotas, that we'll propose to the Natural Resources Board in late April," said Kevin Wallenfang, DNR Big Game Ecologist.

In addition to department staff being on hand to answer questions and provide information on the deer herd, the focus of these forums is to seek input from hunters and those interested in deer.

"All comments will be

taken into consideration when we make decisions about the upcoming season. It is important for deer hunters to understand that population estimates are just one of the factors that go into the annual decision making process for establishing the upcoming season. Another important factor is input from the public. You can provide your observations and input at one of our remaining Deer Hunter Forums," added Wallenfang.

The harvest totals for 2011 are available on the Department of Natural Resources website and can be found by searching the keyword "deer harvest." Harvest figures are broken down by buck or antlerless deer in each of 136 deer management units and county by deer season type.

Anyone who missed a forum in their area, still has an opportunity to participate by using the new on-line survey. Go to the DNR website and type in keywords "deer hunter forum."

"We've been getting a lot of positive feedback on the survey option and the efforts we've undertaken to get the word out on the forums and the survey," stated Wallenfang. "I want to encourage everyone interested in deer to attend a deer hunter forum to give their perspective on the 2011 season, or please fill out the survey. Our goal is to make the fall seasons enjoyable for hunters while at the same time addressing all the other factors that make deer management so challenging in Wisconsin."

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Help is needed to back up top track athletes

To field a successful track program, one that will contend for a conference title, a team requires at least three dozen athletes. Less than that mean perhaps the goals are shifted more to individual improvement and victories.

The latter may be the case at Kewaskum High School this spring as coach Jerry Gosa, starts his 21st season as head coach. Gosa has a core group of six to nine athletes who can win consistently, but no hurdlers, very few distance runners and weight men, which will hamper team efforts in quad meets and invitationals.

The good news is the Indians will field strong sprint relays and some excellent pole vaulters and jumpers.

Leading the returning letter winners is senior Eric Perkins, who definitely used his experience and training in track to help become one of the top running backs in the state.

"Eric ... he's our best sprinter," Gosa said, and that fact was proven on March 15 when Perkins won the 55-meter dash in the annual Oshkosh Indoor Invitational.

"To the best of my knowledge, we have never had anyone win the 55 in this meet (before)," the coach said, noting Perkins will again play a major role in the success of the 4x100-meter relay and 4x200 relay.

Perkins will also place consistently in the long jump, according to Gosa, looking at the fact his ace jumped 20 feet,

5 inches (20-5) a year ago.

The other two senior lettermen are Joey Wollner and Andy Doll, and Gosa insists both have a chance to advance to the WIAA Division 2 state competition in La Crosse in early June.

Wollner cleared 12-6 last spring to get to state but only managed to go 12-0 in La Crosse and was not close to placing.

Wollner also is quick enough to help on the relay teams. "We're optimistic he will do well this year," Gosa said.

"Andy Doll, if he works hard, has a chance to make it to state in the discus," Gosa went on. Doll's best a year ago was 133-10.

The two junior lettermen are Corey Burdick and Ted Wollner. Burdick specializes in the pole vault, but also high jumps and triple jumps, while Wollner is a sprinter and relay runner.

Perkins and the two Wollners form 3/4th of the team's 4x200 relay that made it to La Crosse a year ago but was unable to reach the finals.

Joey Seitz and Casey Steinman both lettered as freshmen and will be called on to compete in a variety of events.

Seitz ran the 100, 200 and helped with relays in 2011, and Steinman will be the team's main 400 runner. Gosa said his best time in the 400 last year was a 65 and at Oshkosh recently, he was clocked in 59, showing a big chunk of improvement.

One junior Gosa is

counting on this spring is Jordan Hanson. Hanson should do well in the long jump and perhaps the sprint relays. It will take a while to determine his best events because he was ineligible most of last season with an athletic code violation.

Hanson jumped 18-2.50 in the Oshkosh meet, so the team should have two good long jumpers.

As far as promising newcomers, Gosa said freshman Ricky Heinan looks good in the 1,600 while Tristan Marx could develop into a good pole vaulter. Gosa thought he might have another good weight man in junior Alex Fechter, but he injured his shoulder, so at present the coaches are not sure if he will be able to help the team.

Gosa will be assisted this year by: Jason Meinen, jumping events; Josh Parrent, pole vault; Matt Gundrum, weights; Randy Backhaus, distance races and newcomer Jim Brock, hurdles. Brock is taking over for LuAnn Potter, who retired from coaching.

Concerning the top teams in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference, Gosa points to Plymouth, which won the boys title a year ago, and Kiel, which is "up and coming."

The first outdoor meet is Tuesday, April 10 when the Indians host a quad meet with Campbellsport, Kiel and New Holstein.

Young anglers receive free instruction at 28th Annual Kids' Fishing Clinics

Kids 15 years and younger can mark the arrival of spring by attending free fishing clinics on Saturday, April 14, at several lagoons and ponds in Milwaukee, Racine, Washington and Waukesha counties. Clinics will be held every hour beginning at 9:00 a.m. with the last clinic starting at 2:00 p.m.

"These clinics give kids a chance to learn about fishing, especially those who might not otherwise have the opportunity to find out what fishing is all about," said Matt Coffaro, Statewide Urban Fisheries Biologist. "And it's just a great opportunity for kids to get outside away from the electronics, get some exercise and enjoy the outdoors and all it has to offer."

Members of local fishing clubs organize the clinics, and instruction includes fishing techniques, equipment use, knot tying, safety rules and fish identification.

"Sport fishing groups are the heart and muscle of this program," Coffaro noted. "They do an outstanding job

of teaching kids the basics of fishing and that fishing is fun. None of this works without the dedication of the volunteers."

The Department of Natural Resources and the Hunger Task Force Fish Hatchery will stock fish in the urban waters before the kids' clinics are held. Fishing equipment is provided, but bring your own rod and reel if possible.

Adult anglers are reminded that from March 10 through April 27, urban fishing waters are restricted to fishing by juveniles 15-years-old and younger and certain disabled anglers. Urban fishing waters are small lakes and ponds under 25 acres that are intensively and cooperatively managed with a municipality. The 2012 - 2013 fishing regulations list urban waters with these special regulations. The rule is designed to give young anglers and persons with disabilities an opportunity to fish close to home before competition from adults limits their chances to catch fish.

Coming off of its best season in school history, continued success won't come easy for Kewaskum's fast-pitch softball team.

But Coach Jeff Gosse has one thing going for him that makes Kewaskum at least in part the envy of every other team in the state: an experienced, talented pitching staff.

Eastern Wisconsin Conference Player of the Year Jenny Reicher is back for her junior year, senior Michele Marquardt, returns as well.

"It's nice and comforting knowing I got my two pitchers back from last year," said Gosse. Last year, Reicher went 18-4 with a 1.31 earned-run average. In facing 452 batters in 117 innings, she struck out 130. She allowed 78 hits, 37 runs, 22 earned runs and 37 home runs.

Marquardt went 4-1 with a 3.375 ERA and whiffing 31 in 37 and a third innings.

They were huge keys in leading the Indians to their first EWC title in school history with a 12-2 record and a program-best 18-6 overall.

But Kewaskum lost six seniors to graduation, four of whom made all-conference teams.

"We'll be inexperienced," said Gosse. "We'll have some growing pains to learn at the varsity level."

Talent, however, is there.

Reicher and Marquardt will be firing over Erica Chesak, who is taking over at catcher for two-time EWC first-teamer Abby Amerling. Chesak saw some playing time last season and had key hits in some big victories.

At shortstop, Caitlyn Rinzel is back for her senior year and second as a starter.

"I'm very comfortable there. She's one of the better shortstops in the conference," said Gosse.

"She improved on her range this year."

At third, Marquardt will see the bulk of the time coming off of an all-EWC first team season.

At second, sophomore Cassidy Enright replaces Jennifer Beiswenger, who made the all-EWC second team.

Gosse is trying out a couple of different girls at first. Whoever wins the spot replaces first team all-conference selection Courtney Krueger.

Gosse said talented freshman McKenzie Rosenthal may see time at first or second.

In the outfield, Gosse said four girls will see playing time: Danielle Rodenkirch, Georgiana Haugen, Mallorie Kreis and Hunter Holz.

Gone is centerfielder Liz Schaller, who earned second team all-conference honors.

At the plate, Reicher brings her team highs in average (.429), home runs (three) on-base percentage (.651), slugging percentage (.506) and walks (11). She was second in total bases (41) and hits (27) and was tied for third in RBIs with 15.

Marquardt hit .350, tied for the team lead in RBIs (16), hits (28) and was second in walks (10).

"Michele Marquardt has a great bat," said Gosse.

They'll be chasing Rinzel around the bases, whom Gosse said is a smart runner.

"I think Caitlin Rinzel is going to have a breakout season. She's going to be our table setter. She's going to bat leadoff and have the green light on those base paths," he said.

Gosse's bench will not be deep as 25 girls fill the varsity and junior varsity boxes. Hard work may be the X factor that sets the Indians apart.

"There's a lot of talent on both teams and it should be interesting. We're going to be a team in progress," said Gosse. Team goals remain the same as last season.

"I don't want to use the phrase defending champions. That was last season," Gosse said. "We want a team that's going to compete. We want to be in the mix again. We wanted to be in the mix last year. Things

just fell right for us and we were able to sneak through."

So far, the season has already seen its first shock for Gosse and JV coach Jason Last. They actually practiced outside on the first day, the first time that's happened in their decade of coaching.

"We didn't know what to do," Gosse said with a laugh. They figured it out quickly.

"If we can get out on those diamonds we're going to work nothing but defense," he said.

Mother Nature may be making up for lost time. Record-breaking high temperatures come a year after the Indians

had a 17-day break two games into the season and a stretch of 15 games in 22 days due to constant rain.

The weather has helped provide the Indians with well-groomed fields for practice and games, and next year they'll have a new field and be able to host tournaments and deeper playoff games.

"They are beautiful. I've never seen them in such great shape," said Gosse. "The KAA (Kewaskum Athletic Association) has done a great job of taking care of them."

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
