## Knoebel is top vote getter in Village race, Leister leads School race

Kewaskum's former Chief of Police was the top vote getter in a race for a seat on the Kewaskum Village Board while Jim Leister took the top number of votes in the race for a seat on the Kewaskum Board of Education.

Losing his seat was incumbent Harry Roecker who has served as a Trustee a total of 19 years. Roecker garnered 438 votes. Incumbents Craig Garbisch and Mike Berger received 507 and 452 votes respectively.

In the race for Kewaskum Board of Education newcomer Grace Mueller won a seat alongside Leister. The pair unseated Stephen Jensen in the primary and current board president Bruce Braidigan Tuesday. Harry Roecker came in third with his 738, ahead of Braidigan who received 718. Leister and Mueller received 2,115 and 1,763 respectively.

Leister and Mueller will begin their terms on April 23.

Political newcomer Michael Parsons unseated Brian Bausch in District 11 for Washington County Supervisor. Parsons received 556 votes, Bausch 444.

Gerald Schulz will keep his seat in the new District 13 over Richard Bertram. Schulz received 641 while

Bertram received 492.

In the Village frontrunner Mitt Romney took the lead as he did in the state in this presidential primary race. Romney received 404 votes, Rick Santorum 317, Ron Paul 58 and Newt Gingrich 25. Romney was the favorite in Washington County with 15,528. Santorum followed with 9,848, Paul with 1,829 and Gingrich with 889.

## Community fixture, Aurora Pharmacy closes in Kewaskum

**KEWASKUM-** Imagine this scenario: You report to your job of many years, when a company official announces that the business which employs you has been sold and will be closing its doors the following day.

This is the scene that greeted the eight employees of the Aurora Pharmacy formerly located in the Kewaskum Mall at 927 Fond du Lac Ave., on Wednesday, March 28, when an Aurora official announced the pharmacy was sold and would be closing March 29.

For the first time in several decades, the village is without a pharmacy, and some of its customers relied upon and purchased items from its Home Health Care Department. Many others purchased greeting cards and gift items there.

Some of the Aurora Pharmacy's employees had worked at the store for a few decades, including Audrey Krueger, the store's retail merchandiser, with a 32-year tenure. She worked for various owners at the pharmacy, since Aurora did not purchase the business until 1998.

The Kewaskum-based pharmacy was one of 11 of Aurora Health Care's 82 eastern Wisconsin pharmacies that were closed on March 29. The others were located in Sheboygan, Sussex, Milwaukee, Twin Lakes, Paddock Lake, Brookfield, East Troy, Waukesha, Watertown and Green Bay.

According to Adam Beeson, an Aurora Health Care spokesman, Aurora Health Care sold the patient prescription list from the Kewaskum store to Walgreen's at 1720 W. Washington St., West Bend. Customers can use any Walgreen's store to have their prescriptions filled. West Bend has two Walgreen's locations.

Of course, customers can also go to other Aurora pharmacies or to pharmacies of their choice.

Beeson said the 11 pharmacies were selected for closure, because they are the lowest volume locations in the Aurora Health Care network. Aurora will now have 71 retail pharmacies in Wisconsin, excluding those located

## Little direction given at forum on school budget deficit

Over 65 people, nearly half of them district staff attended a community forum to offer ideas on cuts to the 2012-'13 budget including Kewaskum's new superintendent. All but two, offered ideas for district administrators and the board of education to consider when making the \$900,000 budget shortfall whole.

An outpouring of admiration for support staff, paraprofessionals and janitorial staff showed residents and staff are not in favor of outsourcing. Staff complained of broken equipment and shoddy work done at district buildings that already have their cleaning outsourced. They also thought it was important the district employ local residents who spend their money at community businesses.

District staff plead their cases to save their jobs. Laurie Beimborn volunteer director for the district spoke about the dangers of reducing her position at this time. She explained she assists students at KMS, KCA and KHS with volunteering in the community and within the schools. She coordinates parent help within the schools as well.

Michael Kunkel asked about a benefit teachers receive for not taking health insurance. Currently, educators who do not opt in to the district's health plan receive \$7,000. Support staff receive \$9,332. He expressed displeasure at staff taking advantage of this by having their spouse take insurance and the other taking the benefit.

Business Manager Paul Reichert stated there are currently 24 teachers taking advantage of the buy out and six support staff.

Kunkel also stated he didn't think the district was taking advantage of the benefits of Act 10. Currently staff members in the health plan pay nine percent of their health care insurance, Kunkel said state workers are paying sometimes more than 13 percent. He stated in the private sector, he pays 30 percent.

KES Librarian Denise Spaeth, also asked to reconsider the elimination of her position. "Our district has been promoting reading and literacy in our schools and the community. Why would you want to remove someone who has this much experience in the reading? She later asked angrily "Why does support staff always has to take the cuts and not administration?"

Interim Superintendent David Ewald explained the proposals he and administrators proposed were just starting points. He stated he hoped through the forum that the community would offer up suggestions or ideas, instead of saying what not to cut.

"We are asking you how would you do it? How can we do it better? At some point it has to go beyond you can't do this, something has to happen. We have to do something. Please give us your ideas, call us, email us," he pleaded.

FES parent Lisa Sullivan stated she has been surprised to see the fantastic summer school offerings and sadly wondered what the cost was and what the benefit was to the students. Ewald deferred to Reichert, who could not give specific detail, but stated the summer school program allows the district a larger revenue limit bringing in state aide to the district, that more than offsets the cost of the program. Last year the district spent about \$130,000 to run program and received about \$30-40,000 over that cost of the program.

Ewald explained real decisions will start being debated at a meeting on April 16.

## Fire Chief updates board on Village ambulances

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel provided Trustees with an update on repairs and replacement options for their 2005 and 1999 Ford ambulances. The failing 2005 ambulance has been a topic of discussion the last few months and it has reached a point of significant repairs or ultimate replacement. The 1999 Ford was scheduled to be replaced two years ago but was put off due to financial concerns, even though funding for new ambulances come from the fees garnered by users of the ambulance service. Trustee Craig Garbisch, a member of the fire department asked about the replacement at a meeting in February.

In February it was revealed the newer 2005 Ford was having engine problems and Chief Groeschel was asked to report back on repair versus replacement costs. At this time, it does not appear a new

ambulance will be purchased. The 1999 Ford is now entirely operational, with having its brakes and rotors recently replaced.

The 2005 ambulance has been at a Ford dealership since Thursday, March 29. Groeschel said they would need to continue troubleshooting until a more definitive answer regarding the power issues can be determined. He explained that it could be the turbo charger, but without running further tests, no decisions on repair will be made.

An accurate repair cost at this time is unknown. Groeschel stated if it were the turbo charger, the part alone would be \$1,500, not including labor. He expects a call from the dealership this week with a final answer on what the problem is.

Due to only having one village ambulance currently in use, Groeschel stated the fire department has been utilizing West Bend's EMS as needed.

## TIF District No. 2 declared 'distressed,' public hearing set for Hwy 28 project

A joint Plan Commission and Village Board public hearing was held March 27, to discuss Tax Incremental Finance (TIF) District No. 2. Later that evening Trustees took the appropriate action to make the declaration.

In February of 2005, the Village of Kewaskum created Tax Incremental District No. 2 with the intent to promote commercial, residential, and industrial development within the community. As of January 1, 2011, the District had reached an increment value of \$13,500,000, which is less than what was initially anticipated. The purpose of the public hearing was to allow the public a voice in considering the project plan amendment that would designate the district as "distressed." By declaring TIF District distressed, the Village would gain an additional ten years to continue collecting increment from the district and pay off project costs. The final termination date of the district now will be February 5, 2035.

The Village Board and Plan Commission adopted a resolution approving the project plan amendment. By

doing so, the Village will be in a better position to pay the District's project costs off and keep the Village in a stable financial status.

Trustees and Plan Commission members also discussed options for the Main

Street/Highway 28 project. More information will be presented by the Department of Transportation at a public hearing on April 17, at 5-8 p.m. in the Municipal Building Annex on Fond du Lac Avenue.

## Severe Weather Spotter Training

On Tuesday, April 10, 2012, a presenter on behalf of the National Weather Service (NWS) will conduct Severe Weather Spotter Training at the Jackson Fire Dept. located at W204 N16722 S. Jackson Dr. in Jackson, WI. Two identical sessions will be held - an afternoon session from 1-3 PM and an evening session from 7-9 PM. This training is free, open to the public and does not require any pre-registration.

This is a basic level class that includes video and photos of past weather events and recognition training on weather features that are indicators of severe weather potential. The causes and dynamics of differing forms of severe weather and safety issues will also be discussed.

This training is recommended for members of local police, fire and EMS departments as well as amateur radio operators and anyone else with an interest in weather. There will be ample time allowed for questions.

This training is sponsored through the cooperation of: Village of Jackson Emergency Management, Washington County Office of Emergency Management, Wisconsin Emergency Management, Milwaukee Area Skywarn Association and the National Weather Service.

The seminar will feature Skip Voros, Executive Director of the Milwaukee Area Skywarn Association (MASA). The Milwaukee Area Skywarn Association (MASA) [pronounced "May-sah"], established in 1992, and incorporated in 1995 is a Wisconsin registered non-profit and I-R-S 501(c)3 tax exempt corporation operated for charitable, educational, and scientific purposes. 

inside hospitals.

He noted that 82 employees at the 11 sites that were closed have lost their jobs. However, "Our intent is to redeploy them for other jobs within the Aurora system," he said.

"As of now [March 28], about half of the employees have been offered jobs within the system," he added. "By April 20, our intent is to offer the others jobs, if they are in good standing. We cannot guarantee that, but that is our intent."

All of the current employees in Kewaskum have been offered positions within the Aurora network, however, not all have accepted those positions for various reasons. Krueger, who is retiring, provided a history of Kewaskum's pharmacies during the past six decades.

The Aurora Pharmacy received its roots as The Corner Drug Store located at 102 Main Street, the current site of Coffee Corner Bistro. In 1980, pharmacists Tom

Kennelly and Tom Leitzke, co-owners of Kennelly Pharmacy moved the business to the then newly constructed Kewaskum Mall on Fond du Lac Avenue. In 1987, Letizke left the business, and Kennelly continued to operate the pharmacy.

In 1990, Steve Neibauer, owner of Kewaskum Pharmacy, located in the Sison Medical Clinic (now Kewaskum Veterinary Clinic) purchased Kennelly Pharmacy, merged the two and began operating as Kewaskum Pharmacy in the Kewaskum Mall.

In 1998, Aurora Health Care purchased the business, which became the Aurora Pharmacy.

Employees of the pharmacy have many memories, as they reminisce about their employment there.

"I helped open and stock the store in 1980 and started as part-time evenings and weekends," Krueger recalled. "Recently, young mothers came into the store and would stand with their children and remember how they had

come in with their parents to purchase candy treats. Many children learned good shopping skills in the store."

"A young man came into the store just a few months ago and remembered me from when he was a child growing up, and I would offer to wrap the presents he purchased throughout his teenage years," she added.

Another long-term employee (1988-March 2012) was Janice Koch, pharmacy services clerk, gift buyer and gift and card displayer. "I had a wonderful time working at the pharmacy," Koch said. "I made many friends and enjoyed getting to know our customers. I will truly miss them all."

Linda Kirst, lead pharmacy technician (1990-2012) said, "Thank you to all our customers throughout the years. I enjoyed the cookies and flowers brought in many times to brighten my day."

Deborah Strassburg, services clerk, was employed at the pharmacy from 1994-2012.

Janice Vandehie, pharmacy technician

from 2004-12, said, "Since joining my Aurora family in Kewaskum, I found the most amazing community. I really enjoyed getting to know the people of Kewaskum and came to love their friendliness and good humor. They made my job fun."

Tamara Ravn, pharmacist/store manager, worked at Aurora Pharmacy from 2004-12.

Sherri Cullen, durable medical equipment technician, was employed there from 2011-12.

Matthew Bantz, pharmacist/acting store manager, was employed at Aurora Pharmacy in Kewaskum from 2011-12.

Krueger summed up the employees' bittersweet

Because of the center of the structure being cinder block, and the men's restroom being on the left side of the structure the fire was contained to only the women's side.





Jenny Reicher likes pitching better when it's not snowing.

Though on Tuesday with her flame ball going, Reicher could have melted any flakes away.

The Player of the Year in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference fired a five-inning, no-hitter in a 10-0 victory over non-conference foe Cedar Grove-Belgium in the fast-pitch softball team's home opener. Reicher whiffed 10 and walked three while mixing speeds and locations to keep hitters off balance all day.

Temperatures were in the 50s, an improvement over the snow flurries and freezing temperatures during last Thursday's season-opening 13-6 win at Howards Grove.

"I think everyone just gets a better feel when it's warm out," she said.

But the three free passes drive her insane.

"I hate walks," she said. "Walks always come back to haunt you. Luckily, in this game that didn't happen."

"For the most part, she was on her A game tonight," said Coach Jeff Gosse.

The Indians took a 5-0 lead in the first inning on three walks by an error and two RI singles by Reicher and Danielle Rodenkirch. They added two in the second on an RBI double by McKenzie Rosenthal and a bloop single from Michele Marquardt. Two more came in the fourth on another RBI single by Rodenkirch and an error. Marquardt ended up 2-for-2 with a walk, RBI and run scored. Rodenkirch was 2-for-3 with two RBIs.

Leadoff hitter Caitlin Rinzel walked four times, stole four

bases and scored the winning run in the fifth on a wild pitch. The senior shortstop has timing down and thus has the green light as she pleases on the base paths, though sometimes it's a flashing yellow or yield.

"She goes anytime she wants within reason," said Gosse. "I trust her. She's smart."

For the Rockets, Coach Scott Soerens said his ace just got back from a trip and isn't quite yet in shape so Kewaskum pitched the junior varsity game. Freshman Mandi Race went the distance for the varsity in the team's season opener. She allowed 10 runs on eight hits and walked six.

Marquardt had the biggest bomb of the game, a shot off the centerfield fence to lead off the bottom of the fourth. The first team all-conference third baseman was filling in for catcher for Erica Chesak, who was resting with an injury. Gosse said she should be back Thursday.

That's when the Indians face off at home with adjacent conference rival Campbellsport, the team Kewaskum beat in the final two games of last season to clinch the EWC title outright. The Cougars come in 1-1 with a win over West Bend East and a loss to Lomira with results of a Tuesday game against Mayville unknown as of press time.

Against Howards Grove last week, Reicher walked seven in going the distance in the cold. She allowed three hits and six runs (two earned), and struck out 11.

At the plate, Reicher was 3-for-4 with 3 RBI. Lindsay Winker was 3-for-5 with three RBI. Rosenthal was 2-for-3 with a double, and Marquardt was 1-for-3 with a triple and three RBI.

Once the Indians' wrestlers were able to field a full team midway through this past season, their fortunes certainly improved.

The Indians posted a dual meet win over a formidable Oostburg squad, earned the title at the Waupun Invitational, and came through with a second place in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Tournament.

Those good fortunes should continue for the 2012-'13 season as 11 of the 14 regulars will be back, and help could come from several JVs who show promise.

When the wrestlers and their parents gathered for the annual banquet, coach Dennis Aupperle spoke of the possibilities of next year being special. One can see why, considering the returnees had a total of 200 varsity wins this season.

The regulars earning letters included: seniors - Lance Pinchard, Joey Wollner, and Garrett Yahr; juniors - Brett Scoles, Austin Goeden, Nick Bier, Derek Aupperle, Logan Dreher and Ted Woller; sophomores - Joey Seitz, Max Maertz, and Andy Pryor; and freshmen - Max Vetter and Garrett Buth.

Aupperle also lettered three others who competed on

the JV level, junior Tyler Laufer, and sophomores Andy Buelow, the Most Improved Wrestler on the team, and Brandon Susan, the JV award winner.

As far as special awards, Scoles, who finished second in the Oshkosh On the Waters Tournament, was an Eastern Wisconsin Conference champion and qualified for his third straight berth in the state tournament, was named as the MVP. He finished with a mark of 30-6 and is now just two wins from reaching the 100-win mark, which was delayed another year because of a foot injury he sustained in the meet against Waupun.

"Brett is disappointed. His foot is in a boot for a month, and then he plans on starting to wrestle again," Aupperle said. "He needs to put this year behind him and prepare for next season. I am sure he will do just that."

Goeden (28-9) and Seitz (25-13), the others who advanced to the state meet, finished 1-2 as far as the most points scored for the team. Goeden, an EWC champ and the lone KHS regional champ, finished first by scoring 128 team points, and Seitz was seven points back with 120.

Scoles was fourth in this department with 116. He won the takedown award for the year, posting 62 takedowns.

"The three state guys, they

all had great years. For Austin and Joey, they got some great experience for next year," Aupperle said. "Austin should have some high goals for next year, Joey for the next two years."

Ted Wollner (18-17) received the pinning award. He had 12, and Seitz and Dreher (19-18) also each had a dozen pins.

"I counted forfeits as pins," Aupperle said concerning how Wollner's total reached 16.

Derek Aupperle surpassed the 20-win mark for the first time, going 23-14 and reaching the finals in the EWC Tournament, while Bier, who came out for a sport a couple weeks late, came close by finishing at 17-7.

Kewaskum loses three seniors and only Wollner, 11-20 this season, was a regular for more than one year. His three-year mark came to 30-56. Pinchard, who finished the year at 13-7, ended his career with two second-place finishes in EWC Tournaments.

Yahr helped out the team, taking the spot at 220 pounds, and even though he only wrestled one season, he improved greatly to finish at 5-10.

When asked if the new weight classes helped or hurt his team, Aupperle said, "I think it hurt us. It took a spot out of the middle where we have numbers and put another one in towards the end where we had less kids. I think many teams are in that situation."

defeated Maria Ebert of Sparta 6-1.


