Kewaskum residents encouraged to participate in statewide tornado drill

The week of April 16-20th has been proclaimed Tornado and Severe Weather Awareness Week in Wisconsin. Kewaskum Chief of Police Tom Bishop says the village will take part with a drill next week.

The Village of Kewaskum in cooperation with Washington Co Office of Emergency Management and the National Weather Service will be participating in a Statewide Tornado Drill on Thursday, April 19th. The drill tests the notification procedures that take place during a severe weather event. Various types of weather warnings are issued by the National Weather Service and disseminated to local dispatch centers. From there the information to local public safety agencies and key personnel.

On Thursday, April 19th at 1:00 p.m. the National Weather Service will issue a "test" tornado watch. The drill will continue with a "test" tornado warning at 1:45 p.m. At that time, the

Village of Kewaskum Emergency Sirens will activate for three (3) minutes, as if this was an actual tornado warning. The drill will conclude at 2:00 p.m. with an "all clear".

Testing in the village is done monthly, April through October on the first Thursday at 10:30 a.m.

Kewaskum has four warning sirens in the village; one each in the 1500 block of Reigle Dr., the 300 block of Knights Ave., County Road H and Kettle View Dr and at the Fire Department. Those in rural areas usually do not have access to warning sirens, unless they can hear them from a nearby municipality; therefore they are forced to be informed via TV, radio or weather radio.

In the village, police officers can activate the warning sirens from patrol cars if an emergency presents itself. Otherwise they are activated from the Village Hall.

Chief Bishop explained warning sirens are only set off in the event that the National Weather Service has issued a tornado WARNING for an area including Kewaskum, they will

not be activated just for a WATCH.

"The warning sirens are activated for a duration of three minutes. After the three minute duration, they are normally not reactivated, so people should take cover and turn on the radio for updates," Chief Bishop stated.

He explained it is important for people to have a weather radio or some device to alert them when conditions improve as there is no "all clear" signal. "People need to stay alert and tune into their local news station or weather radio," he reiterated.

Chief Bishop also advised that people take time to know what their plan is going to be in the event of an actual warning. "Seconds count in those situations and everyone in the family should know where to go, hopefully they have a basement to go to. Stay away from windows and at no time should they go outside in an effort to see the tornado."

If actual severe weather occurs anywhere in the State on April 19th, the drill will be postponed until Friday, April 20th.

Kruegers to close Fin-N-Feather Supper Club

NEW PROSPECT- The area will lose another pillar of the business community today as Fin-N-Feather Supper Club will close their doors after 33 years. The Krueger family says the restaurant is not sold, they are simply closing.

The announcement was made via the social media website Facebook on Tuesday evening. Fin-N-Feather posted "Please join us Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday for \$1 beers, \$2 mixers and half off all menu items. We will be accepting gift cards but, unfortunately, we will no longer redeem loyalty points."

Fin-N-Feather is believed to have opened in 1950 by Jerry Haushalter and Maybelle Prange. Bob and Bea Hatch would run the restaurant next until they sold the restaurant to their daughter and son-in-law Judy and Doug Christensen. In 1979, Dennis and Betty Krueger purchased the restaurant and began their career as restaurant owners.

Fin-N-Feather went through many expansions and remodeling projects through the Krueger's ownership in addition to winning state awards. The latest remodeling was in 2009 when their Riverbend Outdoor Patio and Garden area was added.

"We cannot thank all of you enough for your business and continued support. The success of our 33 year old business was made possible because of our dedicated customers. This will be a difficult time for all of us but we are looking forward to the future," Tom Krueger posted.

Fin-N-Feather is the third restaurant in the New Prospect area to close in the last decade. Next to the Fin was a popular eatery called The Everglades which thrived next to Fin-N-Feather until it was sold and rebranded The Pony Express in the 1990's, owners Wayne and Deb Kanneberg closed that restaurant and converted the eatery into a residence in the late 1990's.

One mile south was the ever popular Bar-N-Annex Supper Club that flourished in the late 1970's and '80's. The Annex closed in the 90's and remained vacant until Alice Linnabury purchased the building in 2006 and remodeled the building into The Forest House. That restaurant closed a few years after opening and in 2009 The Forest Lake Pub & Grill opened and closed shortly as did the latest eatery that came next, The Forest Lake Supper Club which was only open a few months.

Kewaskum man injured in rollover crash



A Kewaskum man was injured Friday evening, after a single-vehicle rollover crash on Valley View Drive in the Town of Farmington. Washington County Sheriff's deputies were joined by Boltonville and Kewaskum Fire Departments and West Bend paramedics at 8:28 p.m. The fire fighters quickly took to the scene of extricating the driver after he and his passenger became trapped when the small truck landed on the driver's side and remained upright. According to the Sheriff's office Dale Krause, 58, was traveling eastbound on Valley View when his vehicle left the road and struck several large trees, overturned and spun, resting upright in the center of the roadway. Krause was transported to Froedtert Hospital in Milwaukee by Kewaskum EMS. His passenger did not require medical transport. According to the Sheriff's office, it is believed alcohol was involved in the crash.

"This is the third year we've done this," Al Zehren, who has been a member of the Legion for 54 years, said. "We're giving them a pretty nice package."

Assisting Zehren were

Lloyd Herriges and Vincent Nigh, a Legion member for 47 years and, like Zehren, a veteran of the U.S. Army.

Zehren explained the Legion included money in its budget to sponsor the event, and donations also come from Ike's Repair Shop, Piggly Wiggly and the Junior Woman's Club. Each bag also contained a certificate from McDonald's for an ice cream sundae.

The children all brought big smiles to meet the Easter Bunny, and Nigh remarked, "Somebody brought the bunny a carrot, and someone else brought dandelions."

WIS 144 Improvement project starts in Washington County

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) Southeast Region in Waukesha is announcing that work will begin on the \$9.7 million project to improve the 8.4 mile stretch from West Bend to the north county line, in Washington County.

Improvements will include grading, culvert replacement and extension, pavement replacement, surface milling, intersection improvements, permanent signing, pavement marking and beam guard improvements.

WIS 144 will be closed

from Skyline Drive to County A for approximately three weeks, but will remain open to local traffic for that period. The detour during the closure runs from WIS 144 to County H to US 45 to County D (Main Street), back to WIS 144. The majority of the project will be constructed while open to through traffic, using staged construction and flagging operations.

The contractor, Super Western Inc., is scheduled to complete the project by June 2012, weather permitting.

In the upcoming months, the Kewaskum School District administrators and school board have a difficult task ahead of them. They have to balance next year's budget. It is a task I neither envy, nor pretend to know how to accomplish.

I have been a support staff employee for the school district for over thirteen years. I also have a teaching degree and have been in the classroom. Therefore, I have had the unique opportunity to be on "both sides of the fence". There is no doubt that teachers have a very important job. They have a profound influence on the lives of their students. However, members of a school's support staff are important as well.

I have seen paraprofessionals work with students with unending patience and understanding. I have seen a custodian hold a frightened student with Down's syndrome during an assembly, when no one else was able to comfort him. I have watched a kitchen staff employee be in constant communication with a parent of a child who had special dietary needs. I have seen secretaries comfort students that are frightened,

confused, hurt or sick. School district support staff members do not just clean, cook, correct papers and answer phones. We care for students and develop relationships with families. We may not be compensated as well as teachers or administrators, and we may not be respected as much, but the job we do does matter and we take pride in it.

Over the next few months, it is my hope that our administrators and school board will keep these things in mind as they make their very difficult decisions. These decisions could not only negatively affect the lives and livelihoods of our support staff, but they could make an impact on the lives of the students we serve as well.



From blah to bling, Trend Setters opens shop in Village

KEWASKUM- Randy Gremminger, owner of Trend Setters, a one-man shop, says "from blah to bling" when he describes his business's services. Customer feedback confirms the accuracy of that statement, as Gremminger is complimented frequently for his attention to detail.

This past December, the 1986 Kewaskum High School graduate moved the business he initiated in 1991 -- providing quality graphics, design and lettering -- from

his Beechwood home to a new site, at 1206 Fond du Lac Ave., Kewaskum.

The company's mission states, "We strive to provide attention to detail, quality workmanship and products at a reasonable price. Our goal is to allow you an avenue to promote your company, services, products and personal pride in your vehicle."

Trend Setters, which is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, offers the following services:

- Manufacturing of signs and banners -- door-lettering, real estate signs, job-site signs, etc.

- Lettering for vehicles, race cars, motorcycles, boats and truck fleets.

- Customized vehicle graphics -- high-quality graphics and pin striping, skillfully installed on cars, boats, motorcycles, trucks or trailers.

- Vehicle and trailer wraps -- the process in which the entire vehicle or trailer is

covered with a custom-printed design on vinyl.

- Supplier of smaller bumper stickers and small business decals.

- Residential, commercial and vehicle window tinting -- decorative, reduced-glare and privacy window films in a variety of colors and styles. Gremminger also applies rear-window banners in trucks and SUVs.

- Vehicle lettering -- lettering or logos for businesses or toys.

- Customized mailboxes for homes or businesses -- mailboxes dressed-up with pictures, graphics, business logos, and if desired, names and addresses.

- Large-format laminator.

Gremminger has earned special certifications for his career. He earned his certification in window tinting through Energy Control Products.

He is also a certified

Oracal Wrap Installer, a vehicle wrap expert. And, he is one of only two Wisconsin residents certified for the Fellers Corporation as a vehicle-wrap trainer.

The most rewarding aspect of his business, he said, is the enjoyment of designing a product and then observing the end result.

Prior to opening his business, he was the assistant supervisor for Custom-Pak Products, a paint-manufacturing company, located in Germantown.

He then began doing custom graphics for car lots, and that skill evolved into making signs. The rest is history, and Gremminger is convinced he has found his vocational niche.

When clients visit his showroom, he presents them with the endless options available to enhance their businesses, homes or vehicles.

What's Up with Our Bats?

This April there will be a bonus program in the Evening with Nature Series at the Kettle Moraine State Forest - Northern Unit - "What's Up with Our Bats?" 



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Strong faith makes beating the odds possible for Kewaskum man

The Easter season is especially meaningful for Kewaskum resident Mark Cassidy, 60, who has been in remission from stage 4 brain cancer for the past several months, attributes the reason he is still alive to miracles.

A man of faith and a member of St. John's Lutheran Church in West Bend for the past 30 years, he said he made God a promise, following surgery and six months of radiation and chemotherapy treatments in the aftermath.

"I told God that my wife [Gloria] and I would kiss the grass right in front of the outside crucifix at Holy Hill, if they gave us good news," Cassidy said.

He held true to his word, when he was told he was in remission last May. Cassidy noted that throughout his ordeal from mid 2010 to May 2011, he clung closely to a couple of lines from Proverbs 30 in the Bible, "Every word of God is pure. He is a shield on them that put their trust in him."

He realizes the odds were stacked against him, since brain cancer is one of the worst forms of the disease to treat. Less than 20 percent of patients with stage 4 brain cancer survive.

For patients with this diagnosis, there are often markedly limited treatment options. In his case, he was given six months to a year to live.

"I owe it all to the boy upstairs," said Cassidy, who prior to his illness, drove a semi truck for 23 years for Gundrum Trucking Inc., Slinger. He also was employed for Gehl Company, West Bend, and Tecumseh Products Company. A Vietnam veteran, he served in the U.S. Navy from 1969-71.

He has been unable to work for the past two years, due to a series of misfortunes, including seizures. It was in spring of 2010 that he tripped over a water hose and fell face

down on the concrete at the Shell Station in Slinger. "A guy was spray painting the ceiling, and I fell over the water hose," Cassidy said.

"I had a bump on the front and on the side of my head. The doctor said later it was an aneurysm."

Meanwhile, he felt quite ill while driving his semi within the next week. "My head hurt, and I felt sick. I found out later this was because there was bleeding in my brain," Cassidy explained.

The following week in May 2010, he was on vacation in Port Clinton, Ohio and went fishing with his wife and four friends in his 23-foot fishing boat. "I fell asleep in the boat and slept three hours," Cassidy recalled.

After fishing, he carried a cooler to his friend Russell Guerdnt's trailer near the dock and fell over. "I had a major seizure," he said. "I had no pulse. My wife came and gave me CPR and brought me back."

The ambulance took him to Magruder Hospital in Port

Clinton. "The doctor said I was bleeding in my brain, and they could not save me," he said.

Life Flight then transported Cassidy to Mercy St. Vincent Medical Center in Toledo. "They pumped steroids into both arms to stop the hemorrhaging on my brain," he said. "It was so painful. It felt like cigarette burns on my arms."

Two Cat scans, x-ray images, revealed a mark on Cassidy's brain. "It was a hematoma [liquefied blood clot in the brain caused by a break in a blood vessel]," he said. "They had thought I would not make it through the night, or if I did, I would be paralyzed."

Fortunately, he survived. "They gave me medication to stop the seizures. I took this medication for a couple months," he said.

Back home in Kewaskum, he applied for disability. "I could not drive a truck, due to the seizures," he said.

In September 2010, Cassidy went to Clement Zablocki Medical Center in Milwaukee for a check up. "They gave me an MRI, and I had a seizure on the table," he said. "The MRI, an x-ray technique that uses radiation, found a tumor on my brain."

"My oncologist is Dr. Pingali. Once they found out it was stage 4 cancer, [following Cassidy's 4½-hour surgery in October 2011], he said he could only keep the cancer under control and gave me six months to a year."

Cassidy had 42 large staples placed into his head during the surgery. "I had lots of pain," he said, adding that he returned home four days after surgery.

"My brain had to heal

a whole month before the stitches could be removed," he noted, adding that he started a series of 30 radiation treatments last November. "The radiation was painful, and after treatments, I smelled like I was burning," he said.

He also took chemotherapy pills at the same time. "I was only sick once," he noted.

The treatments ended in May, and he was told he was in remission. He returns for check-ups with Pingali every three months. In his last check-up, "My blood counts were all good," he said.

Currently, "I feel alright, except for the burning in my head at times, since they cut all the nerves in my head," Cassidy said. "I was told the nerves would heal. I can't work, but I'm feeling pretty good and getting my strength back."

He is following a healthy regimen at this time. He purchased a \$4,000 Kangen/Enagic water ionizer machine, which produces alkaline, ionized water. "This is special water, the highest anti-oxidant water in the world," Cassidy explained.

"The machine purifies the

water and purifies the body. "I've devoted my life to helping others and will give this water to anyone who is sick."

Regarding his diet, "I eat venison, buffalo and elk, purple vegetables and purple potatoes, but no beef, pork or chicken, dairy products, or fried foods," he said. "I also keep my sugar count down and am taking 16 pills daily."

He is enamored with his cockapoo, Rocky, and says the dog saved his life last year. Cassidy was drinking some water and began choking. His wife was outside in the garden.

Rocky pushed the door open, and ran outside barking. Gloria returned to the house and gave Cassidy the Heimlich Maneuver, an emergency technique for preventing suffocation when a person's windpipe is blocked.

For now, he is counting his blessings and sending up abundant prayers that the cancer will remain in remission.

This village suffered little damage compared to many other places in the state from the flood waters caused by the exceptionally heavy rain and

thunder showers last Saturday night. Due to frozen fields and streams none of the water soaked into the ground but ran off the surface to the lower spots. Saturday's all night rain caused rivers and streams throughout this vicinity and state to overflow their banks and in many cities bad floods were reported causing many to be homeless. In Fond du Lac a large majority of the west portion of the city was under water causing much damage and many families had to evacuate their homes and move to higher ground. Rescuers were kept busy. Creeks were swollen to overflowing and water ran over roads and tracks causing washouts and train derailments. Some roads were closed for several days. In Kewaskum the Milwaukee River raised many feet and overflowed its banks and covered many fields. A number of basements of village buildings were filled with water. Em-

ployees at the L. Rosenheimer Store were forced to work late Saturday evening and Sunday morning to bail water from the basement to protect their stock. Electric power was shut off for short intervals Saturday evening. Still local people were very fortunate, to say the least, as the worst did not arrive here, as it did in the lower cities.



Director Gilles also reviewed the deficient areas in the sewer main east of Railroad Street including areas of defective connections, protruding laterals and the area where the sewer main sags for approximately 42 feet.

Administrator Matt Heiser reported the first meeting of the Joint Review Board to declare the TID#2 Distressed has been scheduled for March 27, 2012 at 6:30 p.m. and the Public Hearing will be conducted by the Village Board and Plan Commission beginning at 7:00 p.m.



Refrigerate 4 to 6 hours. Butter will keep for several weeks in refrigerator.

Ribeye Steak with Shallot Demi-Glace

Serves 4

- 4 Omaha Steaks Rib Eye Steaks
- Kosher salt and ground black pepper to taste
- 1 cup Shallot Demi-Glace

Prepare Shallot Demi-Glace sauce.

Blot steaks dry with a clean paper towel.

Preheat grill on high. Season steaks with salt and pepper.

Grill steaks to desired doneness using Steak Time app or grilling chart.

Place steaks on serving plate and sauce with the Shallot Demi-Glace.

Shallot Demi-Glace

Serves 4

- 1 tablespoon cooking oil
- 1 medium shallot, minced
- 1/2 cup red wine
- 1 cup demi-glace (can be found in most grocery and specialty food stores)
- Salt and pepper to taste

Preheat oil in a small sauce pan.

Add shallots and cook them for 1 1/2 to 2 minutes. Shallots should be well browned and some should be blackened.

Add red wine and reduce liquid by 2/3.

Add demi-glace and bring to a boil. Reduce sauce while stirring for 2 to 3 minutes or until desired consistency reached. If desired, add salt and pepper.

Peppercorn Crusted Strip Steaks

Serves 4

- 4 Omaha Steaks Strip Loin Steaks
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 3 teaspoons coarsely ground black peppercorns
- 1 teaspoon coarsely ground sea salt
- 4 teaspoons garlic cloves, minced

Preheat grill on high.

In small bowl, combine black peppercorns, salt and garlic.

Blot steaks dry with a clean paper towel.

Brush both sides of steaks with olive oil.

Evenly apply rub on to one side of each steak.

Grill steaks to desired doneness. Use Steak Time app or grilling chart to determine correct cooking times.

Serve steaks with rub side up.

Buffalo Sirloin Tips

Serves 4 to 6

- 1 pound Omaha Steaks Sirloin Tips
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2 teaspoon chile powder
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 4 to 6 bamboo or stainless steel skewers
- 1 recipe Buffalo Sauce
- Leaves green leaf lettuce
- Optional celery sticks, ranch or blue cheese dressing

Preheat grill on high.

Prepare Buffalo Sauce.

Blot sirloin tips dry with a clean paper towel.

In small mixing bowl, combine sirloin tips, salt, chile powder and pepper.

Thread seasoned sirloin tips onto skewers, keeping the thickness even and allowing space between each piece.

Place skewers on grill and cook to desired doneness. Use Steak Time app or grilling chart to determine correct cooking times.

Remove skewers from grill and use tongs to slide cooked sirloin tips into a large bowl.

Toss cooked tips with Buffalo Sauce until well coated.

Use a toothpick to lined with lettuce leaves.

Pour extra sauce into a dipping cup and serve with tips. If desired, serve with celery or dressings.

Buffalo Sauce

- 4 tablespoons butter, softened
- 2 tablespoons hot sauce

Indians have Gonring and Bohn, then there are questions

Kewaskum's golfers haven't played in any matches this year, but already coach Glenn Eichstedt sees an improvement over the 2011 season.

How so? For starters, the warm spring weather, which Eichstedt said has allowed the players to have more practice at Hon-E-Kor Country Club, the team's home course, which is in "the better shape at this time of year than we've ever had it."

Last spring "Our season was compressed into about three weeks in May," Eichstedt, starting his 14th year as head coach, said. "It just made for a tough year" because that just wasn't enough time for his younger players to gel.

Back to lead the KHS contingent this season are seniors Tony Gonring and Dan Bohn, both regulars for the past two seasons. Both of them missed time last year due to family vacations, and, as a result, "Neither of them was consistent," Eichstedt said, indicating, Tony was around 42 (for a 9-hole average), and Dan right around 43."

Gonring advanced to the section as a sophomore and lost in a playoff for the fourth and final spot in 2011. He finished 19th in points among EWC regulars.

Eichstedt and his longtime assistant, Scott Rohlinger, are currently working with a squad of 20 to find three other varsity regulars. This number includes three seniors, seven juniors, two sophomores and eight freshmen.

Juniors Mike Holt, Nick Banks and Adam Waala appear to have the inside track on the Nos. 3-4-5 positions. "Mike Holt played in a number of varsity matches (last year) as did Nick Banks, but I don't think it was enough for them to letter," Eichstedt said, adding Waala also saw varsity action in a few varsity matches.

The third senior on the team is Jake Vanhaalen, who was a leading JV a year ago and could see action on the varsity.

Among the freshman candidates is Everett Dean, and Eichstedt said, "He shows promise but needs match experience."

Kewaskum finished last in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference a year ago, and Eichstedt feels the team will

move up in a standings a couple places but maybe not in the top four.

While Plymouth is always the perennial favorite, he thinks Sheboygan Falls may be able to unseat the defending champion Panthers. "Plymouth will always be strong but they lost some seniors," Eichstedt said, while the Falcons challenged in 2011 with a young team, including Chris Bachmann and Aaron Krueger, who finished second and fourth individually last spring.

Eichstedt also looks at Two Rivers to be in the mix and adds Campbellsport won the JV title, so the Cougars could be another group to watch.

"For us to finish in the top four will be a challenge," Eichstedt said, and that will depend on Gonring and Bohn dropping their scores a couple strokes each round and staying consistent.

Kewaskum was set to open its year at the Bull on Tuesday, April 10 and is scheduled to be part of the 30-team Washington County Invitational meet this Saturday at the Washington County Golf Course in Hartford.
