Board of Education authorizes borrowing \$1.7 million for retirement debt,

The Kewaskum Board of Education on Monday took the first step in eliminating their \$1.9 million unfunded Wisconsin Retirement Service debt. Members also chipped away at a deficit in the upcoming budget without cutting any jobs and heard plans for remodeling at the middle school with entitlement funds that must be spent by September.

State laws enacted in the 1970s and 1980s led to a merger of a large number of local municipal and teacher pension funds into the current Wisconsin Retirement System (WRS). After the merger took place, many of the employers that joined the WRS were assessed a Prior Service Liability for those employees who would receive benefits from WRS but had not paid into the system.

Prior Service Liability can also be created by the state through legislation. Several times in the past the state has enacted legislation that increased retirement benefits for participants in WRS. The service credits attributable to the time period before the effective date of the legislation improving retirement benefits results in an

increase in the Prior Service Liability.

Business Manager Paul Reichert explained that in 1989 WRS established a plan whereby employers in the system having a Prior Service Liability pay it off by making additional monthly payments to WRS. The WRS plan established an amortization schedule to pay off the Liability over a 40-year period. Employers with a liability are required to contribute a small percentage (between one and two percent) on a monthly basis towards reducing the liability on top of regular payments.

The district makes monthly payments equal to 1.3% of its covered payroll to WRS to reduce the liability. As of Jan. 1, the district's liability to WRS was \$1.9 million. The WRS assesses interest annually on the liability and is currently charging an interest rate of 7.2% on the unpaid balance.

Borrowing and paying off the liability will end the 1.3% monthly assessment and Reichert explained the district will see an annual savings of \$145,000.

Board members unanimously approved a resolution authorizing the district to borrow \$1.7 million to pay off the liability. Preliminary interest figures for financing the repayment are

at between 2.1 - 2.2%. The remaining \$200,000 will be taken from a 2011-'12 budget surplus predicted by Reichert.

The final dollar amount and interest rate will be given to the board on May 21 and said funds will be delivered to the district on June 4th so they can pay off the WRS liability. Financing will cost the district about \$32,150.

The financing would be repaid through the annual operating budget at a rate of \$195,000 per year over a 10-year period. Member Troy Hanson advocated for elimination of the liability a number of months ago.

Hanson explained the payment on the loan will be higher than what the district currently pays annually to WRS by about \$45,000, but the overall cost will drop and the liability will be eliminated in 10-years at a total savings of up to \$1.8 million.

"We're locking in a historically low interest rate. Cash flow wise we're tying up other funds but the sacrifice is well worth it," Hanson explained.

The electorate now has 30 days (from April 19) to file a petition to hold a referendum on the borrowing. If 20% of the electorate file a petition, a

Newest Hwy. 28 plans revealed at public meeting

Highway 28 from Fond du Lac Avenue to Highway 144 could be closed to through traffic as soon as early winter 2014.

The State Department of Transportation is slating to start reconstruction of the road in less than two years. Residents and business owners eager to learn the details of the plan came to a public information meeting Tuesday night at the Village's Municipal Building Annex.

Cost of the project wasn't yet available, but the breakdown has federal funds covering 80 percent and state funds the remaining 20 percent. The village is scheduling its own improvements along with the project that it will pay for itself, but it doesn't have a cost estimate yet.

DOT Project Manager Christine Rawson said the road will be closed at the start of the project, scheduled to be February or March.

The detour route takes motorists along Highway 45 to Highway H east to Highway 144. Rawson said residents who live in the area may take alternate routes off of H like Forest View Drive or Highway HH to get to their homes.

The bridge over the Milwaukee River, scheduled for repairs - is being taken down and rebuilt slightly north. But emergency vehicles will have one lane to get through at all times.

"We are planning on having one lane open on the bridge during construction," said Rawson.

Moving the bridge means the village will have to determine an alternate route for its water main. The present line is attached to the bridge, but the DOT won't allow the line to attach to the new bridge to help keep stability of the structure.

The village is examining sending the pipe under the water, but soil boring tests that will determine feasibility have yet to come back, said Village Director of Public Works Jerry Gilles.

The other option is to run the pipe across the river north in River Hill Park. That, Gilles said, would be more expensive because it would take more

referendum will be held and repayment of the funds would be added to the tax levy. If there is no petition filed, the district will enter the municipal bond market to solicit financing the week of May 14. On May 21, the board will choose their lender and the district should receive the funds on June 4. Repayment will then be made through the general fund, not adding to the tax levy.

Moving forward on the 2012-'13 working budget deficit, board members unanimously approved suspending Kewaskum University (saving \$118,500), ending block scheduling at the high school (saving \$267,177), changing contributions to support staff retirement and health care saving \$156,385). The changes result in \$542,062 worth of savings. These are estimated figures and may change according to Reichert.

Interim School District Superintendent David Ewald reported the district has three additional retirements that will result in additional savings to the budget.

Hanson suggested involving the current cleaning/maintenance staff to gather thoughts on outsourcing and see if the district can involve in-house staff and increase efficiency. That process will be discussed in the near future.

Director of Special Education Anne Ignatowski presented plans for remodeling at KMS to accommodate special education students that will soon be attending the school. She also presented plans for an

improved sensory room at KES and adding assistive technology like iPads and Promethean boards throughout the district.

Funding for the projects will come from Individuals with Disabilities Education Act funding of \$242,000. Those funds must be spent by September 30, 2012 or the district will lose the funding. The entitlement funds are strictly monitored by the Department of Public Instruction and can not be used to offset the general budget.

"We have nothing at the middle school, we can get by this year, but we have students coming up and we could end up paying to send these kids to an alternative location," Ignatowski explained.

Ignatowski wanted to see an apartment-type setting be constructed at KMS so life skills could be taught to those students. She also wanted to use a portion of the funds to replace furniture at KHS and FES.

Ignatowski also revealed that Autism is an emerging need in the district and something that will require attention in the future.

Board members unanimously accepted her plan. The projects are planned to be completed over the summer.

The 2012-'13 School District Calendar was accepted unanimously by members of the board. School will start on Tuesday, Sept. 4 and will conclude, 180 calendar days later, June 7, 2013. Considerations to the calendar were made with input by parents who took an online survey.

Fall and Spring conferences will be held two evenings after full school days as preferred by parents. Those days were scheduled with extra curriculums in mind, as well as dates for elementary, middle and high schools do not conflict with each other.

Students and staff will have an 11-day Christmas break from Dec. 22 until Jan. 2, 2013. Students will be off Good Friday through April 2, 2013, a five-day Easter break.

The calendar reflects nine staff development days. Four in late August and the remaining throughout the school year. Students will have a four-day weekend after being off Thur., Oct. 25 and Fri., Oct. 26. Two snow days are built into the calendar, Feb. 18 and April 29. If they are not used they will be staff development days, if they are those, development days will be pushed to June.

State Law requires a certain number of hours in addition to the 180 days of instruction. The approved calendar exceeds those requirements by 4.5 - 7.5%. With this calendar, teachers will work 1,524 hours during the school year.

Outgoing board members Bruce Braidigan and Stephen Jensen were honored for their terms on the board as new members Grace Mueller and Jim Leister were sworn in. They will begin their term of office on April 23 at a reorganization meeting that will be held in the Rose Library at the high school.

It was also noted that finance committee members Janet Hubbell and Ruth Schmidt submitted their resignations from the committee.

Project design changes since the first public information meeting in 2007 have more property being impacted than before. One residence on the northwest corner of the bridge must be relocated.

Town of Kewaskum holds annual meeting

Residents in the Town of Kewaskum met for their annual meeting on Wednesday, April 11. Besides the normal annual business, Chairperson Dan Schmidt and supervisors discussed purchasing a generator for the town hall.

The building has had some electrical issues in the past, and in the event there was ever a town emergency, the hall would need to act as a shelter for local residents. Schmidt stated it is important the community center

have "heat, water, sanitation, and lights," which a generator would help provide if needed.

An initial bid of \$25,000 was received for a generator. Schmidt stated he would like to downsize from this and possibly look at a budget of \$5,000 to \$10,000. The item will be added to future agendas for discussion and possible action as other bids are received.

The Town also considered discontinuing mailing the spring newsletter. The Board discussed possibly having the newsletter online and having hard copies available to those who still

pipe. Cost estimates have not yet been determined on either option.

Building a third water tower was mentioned at a Village Board meeting a year ago or more, but that was deemed too pricey of an option given development hasn't yet triggered the need for it.

"That's definitely being put off," said Gilles.

Another element the Village Board will determine is lighting. The project will require street lighting be taken down, and the village could replace it with standard lighting or go more decorative.

The DOT will pay for standard lighting; the village has to pick up the difference if it wants anything more.

The village will replace its decades-old water main across the entire project and repairing portions of the sanitary sewer line. It is still considering whether or not it will replace or repair part of the sanitary sewer line from Railroad to Fond du Lac Avenue, about 2.5 blocks, said Gilles.

Parking along the road won't be available during the project, but visitors and employees of area businesses may use the village lot. Vehicles may not be parked there overnight, however.

The project calls for some bump-outs - curb extensions

designed to increase pedestrian safety when crossing the street - but less than originally planned. Village President Andrew Pesch said the state has research that bump-outs do increase safety, but he said he's not sure they're of much help. He said bump-outs are difficult to navigate for snowplow drivers.

First painting comes up a winner

Until recently, Dolores Watry-Tock's passions have been puzzles and reading, but the resident of Kettle Moraine Gardens I, who suffers with memory loss, has learned she possesses impressive artistic abilities.

Watry-Tock is one of 16 winners in the "Memories in the Making" art contest, and her painting will be on display with the others at the Plaid Tuba Studio in the Third Ward in Milwaukee this coming weekend.

"Memories in the Making," a rather new program sponsored by the Alzheimer's Association, is opening a whole new world to people with Alzheimer's disease. Watry-Tock was introduced to the program thanks to the efforts of her sister, Catherine Kearn, who lives in Waukesha.

"I've gone to a lot of workshops on Alzheimer's," Kearn said by phone last Saturday, and when she heard about how painting can help its victims, she found more about it on the Alzheimer's Association's web site.

While Kettle Moraine Gardens does not currently have a "Memories in the Making" program, there is one in Ozaukee County.

"I picked her up and took her to Thiensville," Kearn said, explaining a gallery in the community opened up a back room so that Nancy (Armitage) could have the program there." Armitage is from the Alzheimer's Association's main office in Milwaukee and

is the program coordinator for "Memories in the Making."

There were several two-hour painting sessions the participants were involved in, and Watry-Tock displayed a great deal of creativity brushing the water colors on the canvas.

Watry-Tock's finished product shows three beautiful flower blossoms in soft pink tones. "She titled it "Midnight Trio," according to Kearn. "The way she shaded it gives it real appeal."

Kearn was told 700 paintings were submitted, and, "They juried it down to 31 and then down to 16. Hers was one of them."

When asked if her sister had been an artist, Kearn said no but that she did enjoy painting while attending an adult day care a couple years ago.

"I never felt I had any artistic talent, but I like doing it," Watry-Tock said. Watry-Tock's room is now decorated with a

photo of her and the painting, along with a cherished framed puzzle of a colorful tea pot and two matching cups. The tea pot puzzle had 1,000 pieces, according to Watry-Tock, who said, "It wasn't terribly difficult, but it is very big."

After Saturday's show at the Plaid Tuba, the winners and families are invited to a tea in May. It will be held at the Milwaukee Catholic Home on the east side of Milwaukee.

This is not the end of the story, either. Professional artists from the Milwaukee area are doing "companion pieces" of the 16 winning paintings, and those, along with the originals, will be auctioned off June 5th at the Plaid Tuba. The proceeds will benefit the Alzheimer's Association.

"I'm really excited about it," Kearn, who drives to Kewaskum at least once a week to visit her sister, said, indicating Watry-Tock doesn't always remember the specifics

of these events but is confident about going because Kearn is taking her.

The two women originally came from Dacada, which is near Random Lake. They grew up on a farm with a family that had enough members for its own baseball team, plus eight reserves.

Kea.n said her sister was a teacher for over 40 years. "She taught at Alverno Elementary School and several parochial schools in Milwaukee. "She also taught literature to adults," Kearn said, noting when Watry-Tock was recovering from cancer surgery and treatment, she lived with Kearn, and then in the summer of 2010 she moved to Kettle Moraine Gardens.

"She's willing to try just about everything at the home," Kearn said, excited to report "Memories in the Making" may be coming to Kewaskum. "What Kettle Moraine Gardens is hoping to do is train one of its employees so they can have the program right there ... It would be good for her. It would be good for everyone (there)," she said.

"The arts bring out things in Alzheimer's patients," Kearn said, and having to remember special rules or steps are not required. "It (painting) helps the residents become more alert and more social, and they feel good about themselves."

25 Years Ago

February 20, 1987

A long gunman robbed the Kewaskum Shefond Mini-Mart and gas station at 1149 Fond du Lac Avenue early Monday evening, getting away with approximately \$300 in cash. Kewaskum Police Chief Donald Hlavaty said the robbery occurred at 7:30 pm, when a man came into the store. No other customers were on the premises at the time. The man walked to the bathroom area, came out and asked employee Kathy Gudex if she had any magazines. She replied no. He walked over to the card racks and then to the cooler where he got a bottle of Gatorade. The suspect walked to the counter, put the drink down and asked Gudex how much it was. He then pulled out an automatic gun, cocked it, and told Gudex, "this is real, give me all your money." The man then ran out the door, down the street toward the bank and disappeared. Gudex went to the office and called the police. The Kewaskum squad was about two blocks away from the robbery scene. Upon arrival police searched the area but the suspect was not found.

On behalf of Kewaskum School District Administrator Penny Kleinhans and Business Manager Cherna Gorder, Milwaukee lawyer Alan D. Eisenberg has filed petitions in Washington County Circuit Court seeking permanent injunctions to stop alleged harassment by a Kewaskum School Board member.

Mark D. Durian, 21, of Milwaukee, died after midnight Sunday when the car he was a passenger in went out of control on a snowcovered road in the Town of Barton and struck a utility pole. He was a 1983 graduate of Kewaskum High School.

Tuesday's Kewaskum School District primary election narrowed the field of candidates by one, eliminating Neal Wear, who received 231 votes. Top vote-getter was Ruth Schmidt with 557 votes, followed by Ronald Beimborn with 457, Jean Goeden, 315, Donald Nowak, 315 and John Spoerl with 281 votes.

Administrator Dan Schmidt advised the Kewaskum Village Board that plans for the first two phases of Kewaskum's Capital Improvements Sidewalk Extension Program are progressing. Project One consists of 14,980 feet, or 2.84 miles of new sidewalk, said Schmidt. Project Two contains 14,700 feet, or 2.8 miles. The cost of the two phases is expected to run \$240,000 each, with \$60,000 of that amount assessable.

An estimated \$15,000 was done when the second and third stories of the Stella Cheese Company factory at Campbellsport were destroyed by fire on Thursday evening of this week. The plant is one of Campbellsport's most important business institutions and is one of the largest in Wisconsin. It is one of three factories owned by the company. The main plant and warehouse building, which is near the high school, appeared doomed when flames shot from the roof after the fire had burned for about an hour. Burning cheese vats sent heavy black smoke over the village and countryside making highways and streets nearby almost impossible for travel. The fire started when the engineer at the plant threw in an electrical switch which, because of defective wiring, set fire to the first floor wall and the second floor where paper boxes were stored. Within 15 minutes the first and second floors were in flames. The largest damage was done when three large vats of milk literally boiled while water from the hoses poured into them. The vats, some of which were wood, also were destroyed, as well as a quantity of cottage cheese stored on the second floor for drying. Thousands of paper boxes stored in the third floor attic went up in flames and the roof and floor caved into the first floor when the fire ate away the wooden supports. The factory's main warehouse was not endangered by the fire, being located two blocks away.





"The Learn to Hunt Bear program represents an opportunity of a lifetime for novice hunters of any age," said Keith Warnke, hunting and shooting sport coordinator for the Department of Natural Resources. "Working in partnership with many dedicated bear hunters and local conservation organizations, wardens and wildlife managers, successful Learn to Hunt Bear events have been held across northern Wisconsin during the last several years."

Participation in the DNR Learn to Hunt Bear program is limited, so qualified applications will be evaluated and winners drawn and notified in mid-June. Documents and applications for the Learn to Hunt Bear program can be found by searching the DNR website for "LTH."





Newcomers struggle in EWC golf debut

SHEBOYGAN- With its Nos. 1 and 2 players cracking the 90-mark and two others coming in with scorers under 100, Indians golfers climbed to third place in the annual Sheboygan Falls Early Bird Invite on April 11 at The Bull.

Manitowoc Roncalli and the host Falcons led the field of 18 teams, posting respective scores of 340 and 345, then came the Indians with a 365 on the par 72, 6,027 yard layout.

What was especially encouraging about the Indians' finish is they finished 13 strokes ahead of arch rival Campbellsport, a team which Eichstedt said could be a top four finisher in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference this spring.

"We were very pleased," Coach Eichstedt said, especially considering, "We did not go into the meet with high expectations."

It was no surprise that Chris Bachmann was among the individual leaders. Bachmann captured the medal and was the only player in the

70s. His 5-over-par 77 was four strokes ahead of Roncalli's Nick Bohman and Nate Strigenz of St. Mary's Springs (whose dad is a KHS alum).

Leading KHS was senior Dan Bohn, with an 86, putting him in a tie for eighth place overall. The veteran Tony Gonring was next with an 89 where he was tied for 11th overall.

"We're going to rely on Tony and Dan ... Dan was especially good," Eichstedt said. Bohn's 9-hole scores were 43-43 while Gonring went out in 43 and carded a 46 on the back.

The Indians' other counters were Nick Banks and Mike Holt, the top juniors on the team. Banks was tied with three others in the 18th spot after carding a 92, with Holt posting a 98.

On Saturday, the Washington County Invitational competition was a lot stiffer, and with two regulars missing, the Indians struggled. In a field dominated by Division 1 powerhouses, Kewaskum finished 27th out of 28 teams with a 427 total.

Eichstedt said Holt and

Banks were taking their ACT tests, and other possibilities to fill in for them were on the trip with the music department, so the Indians took only three golfers and had to use a score of 81-81—162 (9 shots per hole) for the fourth counter.

Gonring had an excellent outing, breaking 80 with his 41-38—79 total, putting him in a tie with two others for 29th place. Hartland Arrowhead's Matt McIntosh captured the medal with a sizzling 32-37—69. McIntosh and his Warhawk team combined to win the title with a 299 total for four players.

"Tony played so solid on the back side," Eichstedt said, reporting his No. 1 man started on No. 11 and was 1-over for his first eight holes. On the front side, "He almost played cautious," the coach went on, noting when he got to 10, he finished with a bogey. Still, "It was a good overall day for him."

Bohn started out with a 46 on the back and trimmed three strokes off that number on the front for a 43 and an 89.

Adam Waala had one good nine and one where he carded a 10 for a 45-52—97.

A band trip and a couple of injuries had Kewaskum's fast-pitch softball team shorthanded last week.

Enter three freshman outfielders and a starting freshman third baseman.

Kewaskum went 4-0 in two doubleheaders, including three blowouts.

OK, so much of that was due to the pitching of junior Jenny Reicher, the catching of senior Michele Marquardt and the base running of an annoyance to her opponents, senior Caitlyn Rinzel.

But the youngsters stepped up their games, for some their first varsity experience. The outfielders didn't make an error and third baseman McKenzie Rosenthal had seven putouts without an error in two games Saturday.

"It was cool being the young people on the team and doing good," said Melanie Juech, who patrolled left field. "I felt honored."

"It was good. I really like being up on varsity," said Lindsay Winkler, centerfielder.

Right fielder Caley McClyman said she was nervous, especially being around such talent.

"These guys are immaculate," she said.

But the youngsters fit right in.

"A lot of the girls welcomed you with open arms," she said.

That, said Coach Jeff Gosse, was key.

"The biggest thing is the upperclassmen accepted them," he said. "The girls are all having fun with each other."

"I'm completely confident in them," Reicher said of the ninth-graders. "They've been working real hard at practice."

Against Kiel on Saturday, the Indians won, 11-0 in five innings via the 10-run mercy rule, and 14-0 in six innings. Reicher tossed a one-hitter in game two, whiffing three and walking none.

Against New Holstein last Thursday, Kewaskum won, 15-1 and 11-7. The Indians took a 7-1 lead after an inning and a half and then gave up five runs to make it a one-run game.

Two days later, they kept the pedal on the medal in the second game.

"I think we just realized what could happen from Thursday's game," said Reicher.

"They got a little talking to Thursday night after letting up," said Gosse.

Coach said he may have the team with the smallest stature in the Eastern Wisconsin Conference so he used it to his advantage.

"I developed the speed," he said. "I put race horses out there."

None are faster than Rinzel, who took second base on a walk as Kiel's infield fell asleep just for a second. Rinzel so far has an on-base percent in the .750 range with around 15 walks and 16 steals.

"That is so huge, the pressure that she puts on teams out there," said Gosse.

Marquardt, swinging a hot bat this year, was 4-for-6 with two RBIs on Saturday with two doubles. Reicher had three hits with three RBIs. Rinzel had two hits, three RBIs and four steals. The freshman chipped in at the plate, too. Rosenthal had three hits and three RBIs. McClyman had two doubles and an RBI. Winkler had three hits, a double and four RBIs. Juech had one hit and an RBI.

"They gave us four unbelievable games," Gosse

said of his freshmen. "They hit. They fielded. They did everything we asked of them. They listened to the captains. No attitude."

Rosenthal has been up all season, filling in at third lately for Marquardt, who is catching because of an injury to Erica Chesak. She looks plenty natural at the hot corner and has a specific brain reaction when a ball comes bouncing her way.

"Nothing," she said. "It just blanks."

On Thursday against New Holstein, Marquardt had three hits and seven RBIs, including an absolute rocket over the centerfield fence for a home run. She said she was just looking for good pitches in the first game before her home run. She wasn't sure the ball was out until it cleared since

she said she's had a ball hit the top of the fence before.

Juech had two triples on the day and two RBIs. McClyman had three hits and four RBIs. Reicher had three hits and three RBIs but was a part of two bigger plays in the field.

With the bases juiced and five runs already in for the Huskies in the bottom of the second inning of game 2, the Indians got their first of two colossal double plays. It was as easy as 1-2-3 for those scoring at home.

A hard grounder came to Reicher, who threw home for one out. Without hesitation, Marquardt revved up and fired to Taylor Kohn at first to end the inning.

"It's what we've been practicing," said Marquardt. "It just goes to show we were working at it. Both of 'em are big. You never know what could happen if you don't make that play."

In a non-conference game against Hartford on Monday, the Indians lost their first game of the year, 5-0, in a strikeout fest. Reicher had 13 and Clare Robbe had 15. Both pitchers were their teams' stars at the plate, too, with Robbe going 2-for-4 with a double and Reicher 2-for-3 with a double.

The Indians host Plymouth on Thursday in a huge EWC doubleheader as Plymouth and Waupun are two of the top teams in conference, right alongside defending
