Kewaskum man leads police on chase through village

A 35-year-old Kewaskum man was charged Tuesday, April 24 for his involvement in leading a Village police officer on a nearly 30-minute chase throughout the village. No one was injured in the chase but speeds outside the village topped out at 80 miles-per-hour.

The chase began shortly after 2 a.m. on Saturday morning, April 21, when a village police officer checked on the vehicle's registration and it came back stolen. The officer attempted to stop the vehicle near the intersection of Roseland Dr. and Fond du Lac Ave. but the driver, John Tarasoff, fled.

Chief of Police Tom Bishop, stated the chase went east on Clinton St. from Roseland where Tarasoff failed to stop for a stop sign. The officer then activated his siren as Tarasoff proceeded to Fond du Lac Ave., where

he went north, turned east onto Main, north on Railroad St., west on Second St. and back to Fond du Lac Ave. The chase continued northbound to Old Fond du Lac Rd. where they intersected with Wildlife Dr. and Tarasoff traveled south to Reigle Dr., south to the one-way Kewaskum Elementary exit where he went through the parking lot, south to First St. and east to Parkview Dr. From there, north to the Third St. intersection, entering the high school campus' east side to the middle school parking lot where Tarasoff made a U-turn and went back the way he came to the front of the building at the Reigle Dr exit. There he went north to Wildlife Dr./Old Fond du Lac Rd. and eventually to northbound Highway 45, north out of the village.

The chase ended just into Fond du Lac County as Tarasoff bailed from the vehicle and fled on foot. The City of Fond du Lac K-9 unit came on scene and pursued Tarasoff on foot,

but lost his scent. Four Washington County Sheriff's deputies assisted Kewaskum in locating papers thrown out of the vehicle near Amerahn Bar and Hall. Due to the chase ending in Fond du Lac County, deputies from that department also responded to the scene.

Tarasoff was taken into custody by Kewaskum Police Officers late Saturday afternoon at his Courtney Lane apartment.

Plates from the vehicle are believed to be stolen from Milwaukee, however that is being investigated further. The vehicle itself was not reported stolen.

Chief Bishop stated the charges being prosecuted against Tarasoff in Washington County Circuit Court were Fleeing an Officer and Operating without a License. He was unsure if any charges were forthcoming from Fond du Lac County or Milwaukee County were the license plates were registered.

Kewaskum Board of Education reorganizes with new members

Kewaskum's Board of Education on Monday met for a special meeting to reorganize the board and appoint committee chairpersons. Starting his second year of his first term, Timothy Ramthun was unanimously elected Board President.

Ramthun addressed the board and community members present and stated, "With great change comes great responsibility and also great promise." He thanked everyone for their continued support and looks forward to serving as Board President.

Jim Leister, recently re-elected to the board after being defeated in the 2011 election was elected Vice President. Mary Miller will continue to serve as Clerk, and Troy Hanson, who is also in year two of his first term accepted the Board's Treasurer position.

Ramthun recommended freshman board member Grace Mueller as the CESA representative since she has previous experience with the agency. Kewaskum is a part of Cooperative Educational Service Agency 6 (CESA). CESA 6 makes it possible for schools, regardless of size, to work together to share staff, save money, and extend educational opportunities to all corners of our region and to all children.

Miller will act as the Board's Wisconsin Association of School Board (WASB) delegate due to her experience with the Association.

Along with the reorganization of the board, committee chairpersons were selected. Hanson was appointed as chairperson on the Finance-Transportation Committee. Miller will continue her role as chairperson for the Policy Committee.

Leister was appointed as chairperson of the Building and Grounds Committee. Ramthun will be in charge of the Personnel Committee and will also act as the alternate for all committees.

The Board addressed possibly having two regular meetings per month. Hanson suggested having all meetings from 6:30 to 9:00 pm, with the exception of the regular board meeting scheduled May 14, 2012.

In addition to the time change, Superintendent David Ewald suggested using "consent agenda items." These items will not require discussion; the board will simply need to approve them. Doing so will limit discussion and help save time during the meetings.

Hanson made a motion to move forward with the 2.5 hour time limit for regular meetings. The motion was approved. Ramthun stated they will try the recommendations, which will hopefully "increase efficiency at board meetings." The new start time will begin after May's regular board meeting.


Village eyeing property



Community rallies to help the pantry – twice!

Another big crowd gathered for Spring Fever, a community event held at St. Lucas featuring Fish Sticks Comedy on Sunday, April 22, benefitting the Kewaskum Community Pantry. This was an encore performance since the first show, Cabin Fever Reliever on March 2, took place albeit with some winter weather issues, specifically too much snow. About 500 people attended both performances, a total of nearly 1000 food items were donated and \$400 was raised for the pantry.

"We are so thankful that St. Lucas hosted this community-wide event to help the pantry - not once, but twice, says Barb Knorr, food pantry board member and weekly volunteer. "Both events couldn't have happened at better times, each time our shelves were bare and in need of restocking."

The number of patrons using the food pantry has nearly doubled since last year at this time. Currently the Kewaskum Community Pantry serves an average of 35-40 families per week. That amounts to roughly 125-150

people. It takes a continued supply of food donations to be able to feed those families on a regular basis.

When asked how the community can continue to help the pantry, the response was simple. Please keep the pantry in mind when doing your regular grocery shopping throughout the year - especially during the summer months. Even buying a few extra items each week to donate goes a long way. Items that can easily be made into basic meals such as: instant potatoes, boxed dinners, pastas, sauces, taco seasoning and shells, peanut butter, jellies, canned fruits and vegetables, soups and cereals are always needed. Pay attention to expiration dates though, because any out-dated products can't be used.

Pantry hours are Tuesday and Thursday afternoons from 4:15 p.m. - 6 p.m. Volunteers are on hand to

take your donations and distribute groceries for those in need. Pantry volunteers are also working most Tuesday mornings and are willing to accept donations then too.

Since this is a community pantry, donations are accepted at any community school including those in Wayne, Farmington and Kewaskum. The following churches serve as donation sites: Holy Trinity, House of Prayer, Peace, and St. Lucas all in Kewaskum, Salem in Wayne and St. John's in New Fane. Piggly Wiggly also has a bin for contributions. For larger donations, contact Luke Piwoni, Pantry Board vice president and treasurer at (262) 626-8427 ext 4362 and he can arrange for a pick-up. WES chaperon who brought heroin on field trip pleads guilty

The mother of a Wayne Elementary School first grader who had heroin on her during a field trip pled guilty and was convicted in a recent court appearance for the charge of possession of narcotics. Sentencing will take place on May 22.

Stephanie F. Bailey, 28, was a school chaperon on Oct. 7 during her daughter's trip to Pioneer Village in Ozaukee County. While on the trip, parents found her unconscious on a bathroom floor.

Bailey denied taking heroin at Pioneer Village, but told a Sheriff's Deputy that she had been out the night before and had a concoction of heroin and OxyContin and became dehydrated while on the trip.

Deputies also found drug paraphernalia on Bailey.

At the hearing Kewaskum Board of Education President spoke after addressing Judge Peter Malloy in a letter.

"The intent of the letter was fueled by indications that a plea deal was in-the-works

and that Ms. Bailey would be getting off with essentially a slap on the hand," Ramthun stated after the hearing.

In his letter to Judge Malloy Ramthun stated, "Wayne Elementary School is a posted "Drug Free Zone". The Kewaskum School District also has published rules and policies which address possessing or using illegal drugs at school and during school sponsored events. These policies and rules are in place to help ensure the safety of all the children. Students, faculty and parents are expected to abide by these rules that keep the children out of harm's way while on the school premises and when attending any school-sponsored events. The fact that Ms. Bailey did violate these policies and rules is a direct reflection on the seriousness of her condition, something that will not be cured in with any short term (mild sentence) or superficial program (counseling)."

Ramthun stated that he will attend the sentencing in May.

Second ambulance back in service

The Kewaskum Fire Department's second ambulance is back in service after experiencing engine problems.

Early this spring Fire Chief Mark Groeschel informed the Village Board their 2005 Ford Ambulance, at times could not reach speeds over 45 miles-per-hour. At that time it was decided fixing the ambulance was the route to go instead of replacing the ambulance.

The department was to replace their 1999 Ford, two years ago but funding was not available.

A local Ford dealership was

able to find the problem over the course of a week, the unit's turbo charger and replaced it.

That cost was \$2,300 which was paid for through fees generated by ambulance users.

Intersection of WIS 60 and County G set for reconstruction

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) is announcing that work will begin next week on the reconstruction of the intersection of WIS 60 and County G in Washington County.

The intersection will be reconstructed as a single-lane roundabout. The current intersection has a crash rate that is above the state average. Roundabouts have been shown to reduce crash rates, with a 76% reduction in injury crashes. The reconstructed intersection will also help alleviate existing delays in the area.

WIS 60 will remain open to traffic throughout the duration of the project, with one lane open in each direction. County G will be closed half at a time and detoured when necessary.

The contractor, Denny Rahn Excavating, will finish work by this fall, weather permitting.







Accomplished musician Asch had many other interests

At first glance, it appears Albert "Bud" Asch was totally wrapped up in the word of music.

After all, Asch, who passed away unexpectedly on April 14 at the age of 79, taught at UW-Washington County for 29 years and he threw tons of his energy into the successful Kettle Moraine Symphony which he founded and directed.

There was more to Asch than just music, however. A lot more in fact, according to his son, Glenn, who remembers his dad as a man who had time to throw the football and baseball around in the back yard and to expose his five children to a multitude of outdoor experiences.

"He encouraged us all to go out for high school sports and to be involved in outdoor activities, along with music," Glenn Asch said earlier this week.

"He always made life interesting," Glenn Asch, who has played violin professionally for the Milwaukee Symphony for 32 years, said. He noted his mother (Anna), "Kind of cracked the whip as far as daily practices (with musical instruments)," while dad "would get us interested in fun things."

Glenn Asch said his dad started out as a band director and professional musician with the symphony in Louisville, Kentucky, but neither job paid very much so the family moved to Illinois where Bud Asch could work on his master's degree (at Illinois-Urbana-Champaign) under the G.I. Bill.

"We lived in a cornfield for a year," Glenn Asch said, going on to explain Ogden, Illinois had a population of right around 200, so it was very rural. Still the previously city-oriented Asch family adapted to their new surroundings very quickly.

"We were doing a lot of gardening and harvesting apples trying to make ends meet," Glenn Asch said, indicating while they lived in Illinois, he was in the Little League and his dad always found time to help him practice catching and throwing skills.

"He was a good baseball player," Glenn Asch went on about his dad. "When we lived in Louisville, he was one of the top home run hitters" on a softball or baseball team he was on.

Add to all these interests, talent on the tennis courts and at playing table tennis and riding and refurbishing motorcycles, now we are getting close to the well-rounded Bud Asch his family and friends knew.

"His interest in motorcycles happened in Wisconsin," Glenn Asch said, noting in recent years his dad took two of the vehicles apart and refurbished them.

"He was good at anything he put his hands on," Glenn Asch said about his father, but while all Bud's interests, and Anna's, were available to the couple's children, "They didn't control. They encouraged us."

Evidence of this fact is in the different directions the children have taken in their careers. Dan Asch is involved in computer science, while David Asch operates a goat and chicken farm on the top of a mountain in Colorado, and Carol (Stubbs) is a Lutheran missionary in Tanzania.

The Asch's other daughter, Laura, passed away in 2000.


"I like to think my style (of parenting) is similar (to dad's)," Glenn Asch said, noting his own children loved playing tennis or soccer and are involved in other outdoor activities. "That's just his strongest legacy with me ... All kids need to play. This should be a top priority because physical health leads to (good) mental health."

While Glenn and his family were able to see his father quite often, because of distance the others live from the Kewaskum area, that isn't always the case for others.

"I was glad dad got a chance to visit David before he had his heart attack," Glenn Asch said, explaining his mother and dad went to Colorado this past Thanksgiving for several days. "I'm real happy they did."

A memorial was held for Bud Asch on April 17 at St. John's United Church of Christ in Boltonville.







Inland fishing season opens May 5

MADISON -- The early ice-out across Wisconsin lakes and rivers is good news for anglers venturing out for the May 5 inland fishing season opener: many game fish are done spawning or wrapping up and ready to take the bait, state fisheries biologists say.

"This has been the most extended spawning season I've experienced in nearly 30 years as a fish biologist," says Terry Margenau, Department of Natural Resources fish supervisor based in Spooner. "This year the water temperatures hit 45 degrees and went backward. The result was a greatly protracted spawning period for fish in many lakes. Regardless, I expect that by the season opener fish will be active and feeding and we'll see a very good opener."

The 2012 Wisconsin Fishing Report gives anglers a line on the size and numbers of fish populations in many of their favorite waters, but anglers may need to change tactics and where in that water body they fish.

Anglers may need to look in deeper water for walleye and in shallower water for bass than normal at this time of year, says Bob Hujik, fisheries supervisor for west central Wisconsin. "We

got so warm and then everything stabilized and spawning dragged on," he says. "But my gut is telling me our fish are still two weeks earlier than normal."

"The walleye are done spawning so they'll be feeding heavily and the bass waters warmed up and the fish are moving around in the shallows," Hujik says.

Mike Vogelsang, fisheries supervisor based in Woodruff, agrees that anglers may have to change up tactics and look for fish in a little deeper water and near newly emerging weeds.

"Given that everything is about three weeks ahead, it would not be surprising if crappies are already in spawning mode so they may be an alternative fish to target if the walleye don't cooperate," he says. "They will be found in shallow bays with weeds, or in areas of rushes which provide spawning habitat."

Scot Stewart, district fisheries supervisor for southern Wisconsin, says that "fish populations are terrific in most waters." Anglers should plan on fishing in the exact same waters they would normally fish in, but to expect fish to be advanced compared to a normal season.

Randy Schumacher, district fisheries supervisor for

northeastern and southeastern Wisconsin reports that walleye and northern pike are through spawning in northeastern Wisconsin. Muskellunge have just begun their spawning cycle. Musky anglers fishing southern zone waters may still find some muskellunge in spawning condition.

Largemouth bass fishing should be excellent as abundant sunny days have increased their metabolism, Schumacher says. Look for largemouth on the northern ends of lakes especially over dark-bottomed weedy areas, he says. Bluegills and crappies should be taking advantage of these early spring zones of warmer water temperatures and early food production as well.

Trout anglers in northeastern Wisconsin will find a mixed bag of water levels with the Northwoods streams of Marinette and Oconto counties exhibiting flows below normal while streams in the central sands of Waupaca, Waushara and Marquette counties are closer to water levels expected for the spring opener, Schumacher says.

Lower water levels in the north may make some smaller trout streams harder to fish by concentrating trout in deeper

pools and increasing their awareness of angler movement along stream banks. Trout anglers may want to check out recent trout stamp habitat projects on the Mecan River downstream of Highway 21 and the Waupaca River in the City of Waupaca.

In southeastern Wisconsin, the early ice out has contributed to vegetation growing early which gets insects growing early, Schumacher says. "The bass have been drawn into the shallows earlier, especially when the sun is high in the sky. The bluegills and bass are feeding so it should be a really good opening day if anglers can find these patches of early growing vegetation."

Season dates and major new regulations affecting musky anglers and others

The hook-and-line game fish season opens May 5 on inland waters for walleye, sauger, and northern pike statewide.

The largemouth and smallmouth bass southern zone opens May 5, while the northern bass zone opens for catch and release only from May 5 through June 15, with the harvest season opening June 16. Statewide, the harvest seasons for bass have a minimum length limit of 14 inches with a daily bag limit of five fish in total.

Musky season opens May 5 in the southern zone and May 26 in the northern zone. The

northern zone is the area north of highways 77, 64 and 29, with Highway 10 as the dividing line. New this year is that the statewide minimum length limit for musky has increased to 40 inches from 34 in order to help boost natural reproduction. Research suggests muskellunge are more successful at producing young after their second or third year of maturity (up to 40 inches in length). The greater protection afforded by a higher length limit will allow more muskellunge to spawn more than once before they are vulnerable to harvest.

Also new this year, anglers must use a quick strike rig or a non-offset circle hook if they are fishing a minnow 8 inches or longer. When using a quick strike rig and a minnow 8 inches or longer for bait, anglers must immediately attempt to set the hook upon indication of a bite to avoid deep hooking the target fish.

The seasons for rock, yellow and white bass, panfish, bullheads and rough fish, catfish, cisco and whitefish are open all year. Check the "2012-2013 Guide to Wisconsin Hook and Line Fishing Regulations" for special regulations listed by county, for regulations on the Great Lakes and boundary waters, and for tributary streams to Green Bay and Lake Michigan. The complete guide is also available at DNR offices and license agents.

Piittmann told Herriges he was chosen during school. He received a letter that day.


"I was actually a little surprised. It's a small amount of kids that get it. I was really excited," he said.

KEWASKUM- It wasn't the warmest of days, but athletes on Kewaskum's track teams battled the elements and competition well enough to earn fourth place finishes in the ninth annual Indian Invitational on Friday.

The boys, missing ace runner Eric Perkins and several other regulars, came in with 78 points. Oostburg won the team title with 143 points, then came Ripon with 111 and Winnebago Lutheran at 95.

The lone win for the boys came in the pole vault where Joey Wollner cleared 11 feet (11-0). With freshman Tristin Marx taking second (10-0), the Indians scored 18 points in this event.

Val Hedlund won the 100-meter high hurdles and three other seniors, Tess Bandy, Natalie Bandy and Aly Backhaus, teamed up with junior Ashlee Stahl to win the 4x200-meter relay team, helping the Lady Indians pile

up 71 points. Ripon ran away with the title, scoring 179 points, with WLA in second at 117.50 and Random Lake third with 96.

"Eric left on Thursday to go to North Dakota (where he will play football next year)," coach Jerry Gosa said about Perkins' absence, and that definitely hurt because the talented senior would have likely helped the relay teams and sprints.

As things turned out, KHS still had a top-three finish in the 100-meter dash as Ted Wollner was clocked in a time of 11 and .78 seconds (11.78), good for second place behind Corey Peters of West Bend East (11.71).

"Teddy had confirmation Friday night, so he left right after the 100," Gosa said, reporting Corey Burdick was missing because of the death of his grandmother, and "Jordan Hanson was suspended for the meet."

Despite the absences, the sprint relays units did OK. Andy Buelow, freshman

Brandon Mikolajczak, Marx and Joe Seitz teamed up for for a second place in the 4x200 relay, with a time of 1:43.59.

Another second was provided by the foursome of Seitz, Mikolajczak, Marx and Joe Wollner in the 4X100 relay (49.25).

The sophomore Buelow had a nice outing. Along with being in the 4x200 relay, he placed third in the 800, crossing the finish line in 2:13.81. Then in the final event of the day, Buelow, along with Jake Duff, Kevin Etta and Casey Steinman placed fourth in the 4x400 relay (4:00.29).

The men in the field events, Andy Doll and Ken Gigstead, contributed points to the effort. Doll took second in the discus with a toss of 129-09 going right into the wind, while Gigstead was sixth in the shot put (37-07).

Other points came in the following: long jump — Steinman, 8th, 17-01; 400 — Steinman, 6th, 1:00.56; and 200 — Mikolajczak, 7th, 25.37.

Gosa said Marx is showing

real promise in the pole vault.

Hedlund skimmed over the 100 hurdles in 17.84, .20 ahead of Ripon's Kiana Platte.

"She's been working real hard on trying to three-step the hurdles," Gosa said. "She ran well." Hedlund added a sixth in the 300 hurdle at 57.66.

Gosa is happy to have the Bandy sisters, who made up half of the two sprint relays. With Backhaus and Stahl, they won the 4x200 relay in 2:00.58, and in the 4x100, it was the same quartet, this time with Natalie Bandy anchoring, circling the track in a time of 56.90, just .01 out of second place.

"There were some good efforts, but they need to keep working on their handoffs," Gosa said.

Stahl, who ended up fifth in the high jump (4-6) and Backhaus, who placed fifth in the triple jump (30-02) had enough energy left to run the 4x400 relay with Amanda Plachinski and Jessie Nurkala,

to earn a second with a time of 4:44.57

Going to other individual races, one top place came in the 100 where newcomer Kelsey Phillips, sprinted to fourth place by hitting the finish line in 14.21; Plachinski, fourth in the 400 in 73.35; Tess Bandy, fourth in the long jump, 13-07; Nurkala's sixth in the 800, 2:50.97 and second in the pole vault, 6-6; Stephanie Henk, sixth in the discus, 73-09 and 7th in the shot put, 25-08.

The Indians were in Germantown for the Washington County Meet on Tuesday, and on Friday head for Pewaukee and the annual Altheimer Invitational.

KHS Principal Tom Fischer indicated that after a recent away track meet a member of the team threw a plastic bottle out of a moving bus on the way home. The bottle hit a passing car and a complaint was made to law enforcement. The student was suspended from participating in track events.

Sprint relay, pole vault wins highlight Indians' efforts

The vacationers and members of the band and choral groups are back, and Eric Perkins appears healed, so the results from the April 17th Eastern Wisconsin Conference Relays were more encouraging for the Kewaskum High boys and girls track teams.

A sprint relay, the pole vault and the high jump were the best events for the Indians boys, who finished sixth in the field with 50 points. A resurgent Waupun team won quite comfortably with its 113 points, ahead of Plymouth, which came in with 96.

Kewaskum's two wins came in the pole vault and the 4x100-meter relay, and the latter was amazing considering the few times they have been able to practice handoffs with all four runners.

In the pole vault, Joey Wollner cleared 12 feet (12-0) to finish second overall, while Corey Burdick made 11-0 (third overall). Freshman Tristin Marx had an excellent outing, clearing 10-6, giving the Indians a total of 33-06.

Individually, Hanson cleared 5-6 to finish in a tie for second in the high jump, and he was fourth overall in the long jump (18-5.25).
