

## Maebel Green selected to take the field in PNC contest

## Gubernatorial recall primary Tuesday

Seven-year-old Maebel Green got the experience of a lifetime last Sunday at Miller Park, and so did her dad.

Green was randomly selected in a PNC Bank contest to take the field next

to a Milwaukee Brewer at his position during pre-game.

A random draw at the game gave Green the shortest trip, out to home plate. She watched Jonathan Lucroy asked if she wanted to stand next to him during the national anthem, and she said yes.

"She was nervous at first, but after being down there with the other kids she enjoyed it," said Rich Green, Maebel's father.

Dad said he tried to wave to her to get her attention for a photo but Maebel was too busy checking everything out.

The first ever Gubernatorial recall election in state history, will begin with a primary election as its first step for Democrats and Republicans on Tuesday across the state. The official recall election will take place on Tuesday, June 5 between the winners of Tuesday's race.

Governor Scott Walker has not only received a challenge from Democrats Gladys R. Huber, Kathleen Vinehout, Doug La Follette, Kathleen Falk and Tom Barrett, he has also received a Republican challenge from Arthur Kohl-Riggs.

Lieutenant Governor Rebecca Kleefisch does not have a Republican challenger, but three Democratic challenges in Isaac Weix, Mahlon Mitchell and Ira Robins.

In order to advance to the June 5th election Governor Walker must defeat Kohl-Riggs. The highest vote getter from that race will face the winner on the Democratic side. Lt. Governor Kleefisch does not have a challenge so she will face off against one of the three Democratic challengers.

This recall election is only the third in U.S. history for a sitting Governor.

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## Student threatens harm to students, staff at KMS

**KEWASKUM-** Kewaskum Police dealt with a threat made by a student to kill students and staff at Kewaskum Middle School on March 13. According to a police report, bullying is to blame for the student's threats that ultimately ended without any incident.

A Kewaskum Police Officer started an investigation upon meeting with an individual reporting his daughter noticed a notebook in the trash at KMS where a student made comments about damaging the school and killing students.

He reported the owner of the notebook, removed it from the trash after his daughter noticed it and a teacher then confiscated it from the

notebook's owner.

It was decided the school liaison officer would handle the complaint the following morning.

That officer met with the principal and the notebook owner. The officer was given the notebook with notes that read: "I hate everyone - I will kill everyone - Eat #### and die - Go #### yourself - #### you all ##### - This school sucks. I hope everyone dies. I will kill everyone. #### this ####. Hasta la vista."

There were also pages containing numerous drawings of weapons including hand guns and a rifle.

The student stated he has been bullied and teased the last couple of years. He stated last year he thought he would take a gun to school and shoot everyone. He admitted what he

did was wrong, but he was angry and frustrated. He stated he knows he went too far.

The principal and officer spoke to students involved in the bullying and teasing.

The officer also met with the student's parents and advised them what happened. The student was advised that if he is being teased or bullied, he should contact the teacher, his principal, or police officer.

A note was sent home to parents following the incident. It is unknown if the student is still attending classes at KMS or any punishment he faced. Kewaskum Interim Superintendent of Schools David Ewald stated he could not comment on the issue when asked for a statement.



The exceptional quality of meat products produced by Kewaskum Frozen Foods of Kewaskum, was recognized at the 73rd annual convention of the Wisconsin Association of Meat Processors, held in Madison on April 13-15. At the Meat Product Show held in conjunction with that meeting, Kewaskum Frozen Foods received the following product awards: Ring Liver Sausage-Grand Champion, Ring Bologna-Reserve Grand Champion, and Natural Casing Wieners-Reserve Champion.

The Wisconsin Meat Product Competition is the largest of its kind in the United States. Meat processing

plants and meat markets from throughout the state this year entered 1,059 individual products into 36 categories, including summer sausage, bratwurst, ham, bacon, smoked poultry and a variety of other types of meat products. Over 40 judges including food scientists, out-of-state meat processors, and other food industry professionals were required to effectively evaluate the many products during the product evaluation

session on Saturday, April 14th. Individual products are scored for external appearance and eye-appeal, internal appearance, aroma, and taste, using a scale of 1,000 points.

The size of this product show and the quality of its entries demonstrates the important role that sausage and processed meats play in Wisconsin's meat industry and among consumers across the state.

All the children on the field had their players sign a baseball, and each received a Brewers T-shirt and hat. The family of four - the others are mom Lynn and daughter Mary, 10 - got four free tickets to the game in section 209. Just dad and Maebel got to go on the field.

That now makes half of the Green family with a special connection to Miller Park. Rich did some of the wooden trim when the NYCE Stadium Club

(then the 300 Club) was being built.

"That was the very first time I've been on the field. It was neat being able to take it all in," Rich said.

His family took it in quickly. A friend of Rich's niece saw Maebel on the big screen and emailed his niece, who was visiting friends in Minnesota. She called her aunt and uncle on the way home to talk about it.

The Brewers lost the game, 4-1, but this one was a winner according to the Greens.

"I've been to a handful of games there and I'd say that's definitely been the best one even though they lost," said Rich. "Overall it's a neat experience and something you're going to do once in a lifetime if you're lucky."

Maebel doesn't play baseball but Rich said she usually sits on the couch and watches the Brewers before she goes to bed.

Maebel has picked out a particular favorite player.

"Right now it's Lucroy," said Rich. "But she likes Ryan Braun, too."

## Nation's largest single day food drive May 12

On May 12, local communities across America will be asked to join the U.S. Postal Service and its letter carriers to combat one of this nation's growing problems — hunger.

About 50 million Americans — including 17 million children — now live in families that lack sufficient food.

The Postal Service, the National Association of Letter Carriers (NALC), Campbell Soup Company, Feeding America and other partner organizations are working together to collect food donations on May 12. "The Postal Service is

pleased to continue supporting the National Association of Letter Carriers as we enter our 20th year together to help Stamp Out Hunger in America," said Kewaskum Postmaster Monica Lepak. "I am confident the 2012 campaign will be our best ever because the need continues to grow."

In 2011, letter carriers collected 70.2 million pounds of food donated by customers on their delivery routes, which marked the eighth consecutive year the total food collection was at least 70 million pounds.

To participate in the 20th Stamp Out Hunger food drive, residents are encouraged to leave a sturdy bag containing non-perishable foods, such as canned soup, canned vegetables, pasta, rice or cereal next to their mailbox prior to the time of regular mail delivery on Saturday, May 12. Letter carriers will collect these food donations as they deliver the mail and take them to their local food bank or pantry.

Postcards and shopping bags promoting the food drive will be delivered by letter carriers to more than 90 million homes across the country as a reminder to participate in the drive.

Other partner organizations supporting the Stamp Out Hunger food drive are the National Rural Letter Carriers' Association, Valpak, United Way, AFL-CIO, Uncle Bob's Self-Storage and AARP.



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
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## Career switch leads Kneever's to courtroom from classroom

"My client is my boss. I try to keep that in mind."

So said Sara Kneever's, 39, attorney at Kewaskum's new law firm, in noting that she accommodates clients, unable to come to her office, by meeting them in their home towns at locations such as libraries or court houses.

She also meets with clients on evenings or weekends, if they have conflicts with her 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. office hours.

"If people need evening or Saturday hours, I can be flexible," she said.

Last July, Kneever's, a Campbellsport resident, moved her practice, Kneever's Law Office LLC, from the upper level of the firehouse in Barton to 355 Main St., next to the Kewaskum Post Office.

An attorney since 2009, her specialty is criminal defense law. "My favorite thing is the revocation hearing," Kneever's said, "assisting individuals on parole who are facing the possibility of having to go back to prison. I like to try to get them into a treatment program, which is better and less costly than going back to prison."

Kneever's primarily practices in Washington and Fond du Lac counties, but also has clients in Ozaukee County.

Prior to opening her own law firm, she was employed from July to December 2009 at the Skyberg Law Office in Manitowoc.

"I loved my job, which was very interesting, and my boss was great," she recalled. "But I had a one hour and 45-minute drive each way."

The catalyst to her starting her own practice occurred one Friday, when she returned home, and her son Reno, then 4, said, "I love weekends, cause that's when mommy visits."

In addition to Reno, now 7, Kneever's and her husband

Shawn have two more children -- Tanis, 15, and Cali, 3. Cali was born three months before Kneever's graduated from Marquette University Law School, in May 2009, with a Juris Doctorate degree.

Her first career aspiration was to study law. However, she changed her mind, because her first child was born during the final year of working on her Bachelor of Arts degree, with a major in Spanish, at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

While working on her Master of Arts degree at the same university, she was employed as a teaching assistant in the Spanish department, and subsequently studied for her teaching certification at UW-Milwaukee.

"I went into teaching instead of law," Kneever's said. "I thought it would be a better fit for being a parent."

She taught Spanish for two years at Dominican High School in Whitefish Bay, two years at Hustisford High School, and one year at Cedarburg High School.

While she enjoyed teaching, she desired a more flexible schedule. "There is no flexibility with a teacher's schedule, during the school year," she said.

So Kneever's took the LSAT test, the entrance exam for law school students.

"I did well enough to receive scholarship offers to a few schools," she said. "I chose Marquette, a fantastic school, and I got a scholarship for most of the tuition."

She attended law school from 2006-09. For six months during her law school career, Kneever's worked part-time through a PILS Fellowship at Catholic Charities Immigration Services, assisting non-

resident citizens to obtain their visas.

"This was very rewarding," she recalled, helping people who were afraid of being sent back to their native countries to become part of the U.S. society."

Attending law school held its challenges for the young mother of two children, with another one on the way during her final year. "It was very hard to balance the work load with my family life," she admitted.

"I was so tired after the children went to bed, and then I faced hours of reading. Staying awake was the challenge."

With that challenge now behind her, Kneever's is confident she has found her vocational niche.

"I like to help people solve problems," she emphasized. "I face a new problem or challenge every day. My work never gets boring. Every day I learn new things and meet

new people."

The flexibility of being her own boss has also enriched her family life.

"When I was working at Skyberg, Tanis was in cross country, and I missed his meets," she noted. "Now I make it to all meets."

Another aspect of her career that Kneever's finds enriching is volunteering at various locations on some Saturdays for the Wisconsin Bar Association's Wills for Heroes program.

"They do wills free of charge for fire fighters, law enforcement members, first responders and spouses of all three groups," she said. "I'm glad I have this opportunity."

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
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## WCREA honors outstanding volunteer of the year



The names of the candidates for each office to be voted for, whose nominations have been certified to or filed in this office, are given under the title of the office, each in its proper column in the sample ballot below.

### INFORMATION TO ELECTORS

Upon entering the polling place, an elector shall give his or her name and address and sign the poll list before being permitted to vote. If an elector is not registered to vote, an elector may register to vote at the polling place serving his or her residence if the elector provides proof of residence. Where ballots are distributed to electors, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the elector

shall retire alone to a voting booth and cast his or her ballot except that an elector who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the elector's minor child or minor ward. An election official may inform the elector of the proper manner for casting a vote, but the official may not in any manner advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

### WHERE OPTICAL SCAN VOTING SYSTEMS ARE USED

Where optical scan voting is used, the elector shall fill in the oval next to the name of the candidate for whom he or she intends to vote. The elector may only vote once for each office. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall write in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote, and fill in the oval on the write-in line.

### WHERE TOUCH SCREEN VOTING SYSTEMS ARE USED

If a party preference screen is provided, the elector shall select the party of his or her preference by touching the party name or by using the keypad. The elector shall then select the candidate for whom he or she intends to vote by touching the candidate's name or using the keypad. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the elector shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote.

The vote should not be cast in any other manner. If the elector spoils an optical scan ballot, he or she shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place,

but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one elector. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the elector shall return it to the election official, who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. The elector may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station. Not more than five minutes' time shall be allowed inside a voting booth or machine. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the elector in casting his or her vote may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked.

After an official optical scan ballot is marked, it shall be inserted in the security sleeve so the marks do not show. After casting his or her vote, the elector shall leave the booth, insert the ballot in the voting device and discard the sleeve, or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit. The elector shall leave the polling place promptly. After an official Touch Screen ballot is marked, the elector shall leave the polling place promptly.

An elector may select an individual to assist in casting his or her vote if the elector declares to the presiding official that he or she is unable to read, has difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English or that due to disability is unable to cast his or her ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the elector's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the elector.

## Track athletes are up to the task After firing a pair of 174s, Indians just a point out of 4th

**GERMANTOWN** - Kewaskum's track athletes have been discouraged going into the April 24th Washington County Track meet against several pretty impressive programs ... Or they could have been eager to for the competitive push they would encounter.

In many cases, the Indians did the latter, and producing some good efforts both individually and by the relay units.

For the record, the West Bend West girls literally ran away with the title, winning 11 of 18 events en route to scoring 197 points, 67.5 points ahead of Slinger (129.5) and 71 in front of Germantown (126). On the boys' side of the ledger, it was the host Warhawks with West Bend West and Hartford second and third with 118.50 and 99 respectively.

The KHS boys, behind two seconds and three third places, wound up seventh in the 8-team field with 53 points, while the Lady Indians used a second by Kelsey Phillips in the 100-meter dash to score 32.5 points, also good for seventh place.

"I counted it up, and I think 20 athletes had their personal bests," KHS coach Jerry Gosa said.

Once again, relays, sprints and the pole vault were the KHS boys' best events.

In the 100, it was Eric Perkins earning eight team points with his second place behind Germantown's Chasen Brown. The two were clocked

in 11 and .21 (11.21) and 11.57 seconds, respectively.

After a visit to the college he is attending next year and missing the Indian Invitational, Perkins didn't have any 100 times to send in to the Germantown officials, so he wound up in an outside lane for the preliminaries and nearly didn't make finals.

Ted Wollner added a sixth (11.81), giving the Indians 11 points in the event.

Later, Perkins, sporting his bright chartreuse shoes, successfully led off both the 4x200 (1:34.70) and 4x100 (44.94) relays where the Indians placed second and third behind some mighty nice handoffs.

In the 4x200, Joey Wollner started a bit early but his brother fully extended to reach the baton to him.

Perkins looked like he was shot out of a cannon in the shorter event, giving the Indians a good chance for a top-three place. When anchor Jordan Hanson took the baton, he looked to be second, behind Hartford, but Brown caught him and passed him in the last 10 meters.

Still, the 1:34.69 is a mighty fine time for late April.

In the pole vault, Joey Wollner cleared 12-6 for the first time this spring and finished third. Freshman Tristin Marx had a personal best 11-0 for seventh place and another two points.

KHS received a third place in the discus with senior Andy Doll coming up with a toss of 127 feet and 3 inches (127-3).

Another nice effort was

provided by sophomore Andy Buelow in the 800. Buelow toured the two laps in 2:11.55 for fifth place.

Phillips has been a nice addition to the girls team, more than making up for a couple who left the sport this spring. She is proving to be a good sprinter. Her time Tuesday was 13.90, and Gosa expects that number to drop as the weather gets warmer.

Phillips chipped in another two points with her seventh in the long jump (14-03.25).

The girls also performed well in the relays. In the 4x200, Jenne Fisher, Aly Backhaus, Natalie Bandy and Ashlee Stahl combined for a 1:58.02, giving them third place. It was their best time of the year by over a second.

The same four girls ran well enough to take fifth place with a time of 55.95.

Three of Kewaskum's points came from the sixth place (4:44.13) in the 4x400 relay, a unit made up of Backhaus, a senior, Stahl, a junior, and two freshmen, Amanda Plachinski and Jessica Nurkala.

Stahl participated in a fourth event, the high jump, and by clearing 4-8 she tied for seventh.

Nurkala, a first year vaulter, cleared 7-6, good for fourth place.

After four competitions, Sheboygan Falls is way out front with four firsts for four points. Plymouth is next with 11 points, and Campbellsport is in the third spot with 14. Then comes New Holstein with 17 points and the Indians at 18. Waupun, Two Rivers and Kiel hold down the sixth through eighth spot with 23, 25 and 32 points, respectively.

On Saturday at Auburn Bluffs in Campbellsport, the Indians were fifth out of eight teams in the Cougar Scramble. Gonring, Bohn, Holt and Banks combined for a score of 67 in conditions that featured, wind cold, rain and even a little sleet.

## KHS trio provide key efforts at Pewaukee

Neither of Kewaskum's track teams were among the leaders at the April 27 annual Alzheimer Invitational in Pewaukee, but several of the Indians provided top efforts in the event.

Junior Jordan Hanson broke the 20-foot barrier in the long jump with his winning leap of 20 feet, 5.5 inches (20-05.50) after never having gone over 18-05 this spring.

Kewaskum continued to do well in the 4x200-meter relay, winning the race by over three seconds. Even with one of its regulars missing, the Indian quartet of Eric Perkins, Ted Wollner, Brandon Mikolajczak and Hanson posted a time of 1 minute, 34 and .69 seconds. Pewaukee, in the Indians' wake, had a clocking of 1:38.38.

For the girls, Ashlee Stahl

came up with a season-best 4-10 to win the high jump.

Hanson had been taking off too far back on the board, according to KHS coach Jerry Gosa, who said jumping coach Jason Meinen finally found the right takeoff spot for him, and, "He had three really good jumps."

Gosa went on that Joey Wollner was in Minneapolis registering for college, so freshman Mikolajczak took over his spot. "They had their best time of the year," Gosa said noting "Brandon did fantastic for a freshman."

About Stahl, Gosa said when she came back from a family vacation, she struggled to find her steps. In the last week the problem was resolved, and, "Consequently, she jumped really well and felt really good about her jumps."

Pewaukee and New Berlin Eisenhower finished 1-2 in the

boys' competition, while KHS finished sixth out of the 10 teams with 69 points.

Mayville claimed the girls' title, amassing 103.5 points, with Pewaukee and Elkhorn tied for second at 92. The Lady Indians wound up ninth out of 11 with 29 points.

In addition to those events already mentioned, the boys' top finishes came in the pole vault, 100 meter dash, discus and the 800.

In the pole vault, Corey Burdick cleared 10-6 to take second, with freshman Tristin Marx making the same height while taking third.

Had Joey Wollner been at the meet, it could have been a 1-3-4 finish for the Indians.

Sprinters Perkins and Ted Wollner earned 14 points for their 2-3 finish with respective times of 11.88 and 11.96. Perkins had a rather mediocre 12.05 in qualifying but then

turned on the jets in the finals.

Perkins still isn't 100 percent, however, according to Gosa, who said his senior ace still has pain in the injured leg.

Even though he only made 5-6, Hanson also came in second in the high jump.

Andy Doll tossed the discus 121-8, good for third place and a bronze medal, while sophomore Andy Buelow continues to chip time off his 800. His time of 2:08.89 (fifth place) is over two seconds faster than he had run in the Washington County Meet last Tuesday.

Other top-eight finishes were: shot put — Doll, 7th, 38-

10; and 4x400 — Jared Monk, Buelow, Mikolajczak and Casey Steinman, 8th, 4:15.24.

For the girls, after Stahl, the next best finishes were fifths in the 100 by Kelsey Phillips (14.14), fifth by the 4x100 relay (Heidi Johnson, Aly Backhaus, Stahl and Jenne Fisher, 58.24), sixths by Backhaus in the triple jump, 30-02; by Jessica Nurkala in the pole vault, 6-6; Jess Etta in the discus, 83-05; and seventh by Val Hedlund in the 100 hurdles, 18.82.

"We didn't have a 4x200 relay because we didn't have enough people," Gosa said.
