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
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## Chamber sponsors annual Milwaukee River cleanup

## KPD to mobilize for Click It or Ticket safety belt enforcement

The Kewaskum Police Department will intensify its enforcement of Wisconsin's mandatory safety belt law during the annual Click It or Ticket mobilization from May 21 to June 3. Approximately 400 law enforcement agencies throughout the state are expected to participate in this year's Click It or Ticket mobilization.

To prevent deaths and injuries, the Kewaskum Police Department along with law enforcement agencies from all over Wisconsin will be out in force to crackdown on unbuckled motorists during the annual Click It or Ticket mobilization.

Consistent safety belt use is the single most effective way to protect people from being ejected from a vehicle or thrown around violently inside it during a crash and possibly hitting another vehicle occupant with massive force. According to the Department of Transportation, traffic deaths in Wisconsin so far this year have increased compared with the same time last year. A

major reason for this increase has been unbelted drivers and passengers who were ejected from their vehicles in crashes.

Wisconsin's safety belt use rate is approximately 79%, which is substantially lower than the national average of 86%, and only about 68 percent of driver's ages 16 to 25 buckle up, which is the lowest safety belt use rate of any age group in Wisconsin. Therefore, in an effort to increase safety belt use, law enforcement agencies throughout the state will mobilize for the national Click It or Ticket campaign from May 21 to June 3, which includes the heavily-traveled Memorial Day weekend.

"During Click It or Ticket and throughout the year, we're not striving to write more tickets. We simply are trying to end the senseless tragedies on our streets and highways. Ultimately, our goal is to reduce the number of preventable traffic deaths to zero in Wisconsin, and we need everyone to do their part by buckling up," stated Chief of Police Tom Bishop.

## May 14 - 18 Lottery Credit Week

The Washington County Treasurer's office is dedicating the week of May 14 to help all real property owners who were eligible to receive the lottery credit on their 2011 tax bill. If the property owner did not receive the credit and meets the eligibility requirements, the Treasurer's office will assist you in completing the required paperwork. Last year the average lottery credit in Washington County was approximately \$89. The exact amount is based upon the school district in which your home is located.

To qualify for the lottery and gaming credit, an owner must be a Wisconsin resident, the owner of the dwelling, and use the dwelling as their primary residence as of the certification date (January 1, 2011). If temporarily absent, typically for a period no longer than 6 months (hospital, vacation, incarcerated, etc), it is the home to which the owner returns. A property owner may claim only one primary residence. The lottery and gaming credit cannot be claimed on business property, rental units, vacant land, garages, or other property that is not the primary residence of the owner. [sec. 79.10 (1) (dm), (9) (bm), Wis. Stats.].

To verify if you received the lottery credit, please check your 2011 tax bill to see if there is an amount listed on the "Lottery & Gaming Credit" line. If you did not receive the lottery credit, please visit the Washington County website [www.co.washington.wi.us](http://www.co.washington.wi.us) and click on "Departments"

and then click on "County Treasurer". From the Treasurer's web page under Documents there is a Lottery & Gaming Credit FAQ link, a 2011 Lottery Credit Late Claim form, and a 2012 Lottery Credit Application. Late Lottery & Gaming Credit claims must be submitted prior to October 1 to the Wisconsin Department of Revenue. If you do not have a computer or need assistance to determine whether you received the Lottery & Gaming Credit, please contact the Washington County Treasurer's office at 262-335-4324. The Treasurer's office will assist you in completing

the necessary paperwork in order to receive the credit for this year and on next year's tax bill.

If you have purchased a new property that qualifies as your primary residence as of January 1, 2012, please complete and submit a 2012 Lottery Credit Application to the Washington County Treasurer so the credit will appear on your 2012 property tax bill.

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

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

## Friends of Lac Lawrann Wild Flower and Perennial Sale May 12

In 25 years the Wildflower and Perennial Sale at Lac Lawrann Conservancy had grown from several hundred wild flowers dug from conservancy trails and perennial plants from volunteer's gardens, to more than 5,000 plants, trees, and shrubs.

This year's sale is Saturday, May 12 at Lac Lawrann Conservancy, 300 Schmidt Rd., from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. A presale for members of the Friends of Lac Lawrann Conservancy will be held Friday, May 11 from 3 to 6 p.m. A new feature at this year's sale will be a garden related rummage sale in the conservancy orchard, adjacent to the parking lot. It will open at 8 a.m. May 12. More information on the sale may be obtained at [info@lACLAWRANN.org](mailto:info@lACLAWRANN.org) or by calling 262-335-5085. Popular features at the flower sale include handmade willow and grape vine trellises and nature themed wood carvings by Joan Rimmel, a LLC volunteer. Wildflowers for woodland, prairie and wetlands, such as little blue stem grass, red, yellow and white trillium, ferns, coneflowers, New England asters, three varieties of black eyed Susan, and marsh marigolds, will be available.

Perennial flowers, trees and shrubs are offered in the conservancy barn and include new varieties, ordered from nurseries, plus hardy, tried and true perennials from volunteer's gardens. The selection includes the popular fern leaf peony, tree lilac, ornamental grass, hosta, coneflowers, groundcovers,

Christmas rose, Russian sage, peonies, forsythia, spruce trees and hundreds more.

West Bend Mutual Insurance Company has donated more than a hundred black hills spruce for this year's sale. This variety of spruce is a good choice for city lots as it doesn't get as tall or wide as other varieties of spruce. It has dense growth habit and tolerates disturbed soil.

All proceeds benefit the Learning Center at Lac Lawrann. Hundreds of volunteers have worked thousands of hours in the past 25 years to raise money for the learning center. Ground was broken on April 3 for the learning center and construction is underway. Next year, for the first time since the conservancy was donated by Lawrence and Ann Maurin to the City of West Bend in 1980, there will be a heated facility to use for teaching about nature to school groups and the general public.

Through donations and city

acquisitions, the conservancy has grown from the original 20 acres to 136 acres. It is located in the kettle moraine area on the east side of West Bend in what was formerly the Village of Barton. The area was designated by the Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission a "high value wildlife habitat" in 1979. Land features at the conservancy include glacial eskers, kettle lakes and a kame. It is also located in the "floristic tension-zone", a narrow strip of land that diagonals across the state where the southern and northern floristic provinces meet. This gives the conservancy a wide variety of vegetation.

The last acquisition was the "rainbow lake" property with a high quality deep water kettle lake. Hiking trails on the esker, railroad spur and around the lakes are open free of charge from dawn to dusk daily.

## Public meetings scheduled for US 41 Interstate conversion study

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) Northeast Region has scheduled a series of public information meetings to discuss the conversion of US 41 from Milwaukee to Green Bay to an Interstate highway. People who travel, live or do business along the US 41 corridor are encouraged to attend to learn more about the planning study.

According to WisDOT Secretary Mark Gottlieb, "Converting US 41 to an Interstate will encourage economic growth, increase safety and create an identity for the corridor from Milwaukee to Green Bay."

The public is encouraged to provide comments and suggestions. Project staff will also be available to answer questions.

Each will be held from 5 to 6:30 p.m., with a brief presentation at 5:15 p.m., followed by an open house format where WisDOT representatives will be available to discuss the project on an individual basis. 

## Washington County to celebrate Courthouse's 50th Anniversary

Washington County, in cooperation with the Washington County Historical Society, Inc., will hold a program celebrating 50 years of county government and the courts at 432 E. Washington Street on May 16 at 12:10 p.m. in room 2024. Featured speakers will include retired Judges Richard T. Becker and Patrick J. Faragher, and recognition of other honored guests. The program will be recorded by West Bend community Television and will be available for later rebroadcast on cable television and as a linked video on the Washington County website. An historic exhibit of pictures and articles about the Courthouse and construction prepared by the Historical Society will be on display for public viewing on the main floor of the Courthouse starting on May 16 through Monday, May 21, 8 am - 4:30 p.m.

After years of discussion, debate and planning, the County Board approved plans and specifications for construction in 1961-62 of a new Courthouse and Jail on Highway 33, on then east limits of West Bend. In 1960 the Washington County population was 46,119; in 2010 it was 131,887. This location has allowed for numerous expansions as services have increased to accommodate the growth of the county, most recently with the construction of a separate, secure Justice Center for the courts, and remodeling of the previous courtrooms for office space to support efficient operations of other departments. The Old Courthouse and Jail remains on S. Fifth Ave. near West Bend's downtown and has been preserved by the county as a historical museum and memorial to men and women who have died in military service of our nation.

Mary Ann Secor is one of those people who can never really leave us. Her life intersected with mine on many levels; the primary one gave me the courage to jump into writing.

I first met Mary Ann through the Farmington Historical Society. We both lived in historical homes in Farmington, and Mary Ann was one of the original founders of the society. When we put together the first edition of the book *Footprints Through Farmington*, Mary Ann took on the chapter about the early schools in our town. She worked with friends to gather information, but being a former teacher, she had contacts with other teachers and records that kept that chapter from being a simple report. When she finished writing about the schools, the teachers, the classes, I could practically smell the chalk dust, and smoke from the wood stoves.

She shared not only her love of bygone eras, but the real life of neighborhood reminiscences, her own life as a mother raising wonderful children, and pieces of her husband's life in service, her love of gardening and flowers, of the simple rural life that is the backstay of Wisconsin. I'll always remember the too few

visits to her home where she showed me new plantings or shared a cookie recipe. She encouraged me to go into writing after reading my little reports of historical society events, the faithfulness of her praise of my articles and early novels kept me going through many rough patches.

Mary Ann had many talents and joys. She and her late husband sang in the Moraine Chorus, which I looked forward to especially after I learned they would be there. She loved her family and drove states away to spend time visiting and caring for them. It was a great example to me about taking time for the things that are most important in life. The last couple years of her life I was privileged to be in the same book club, and honestly, if I'd known she'd been a part of the Kewaskum Bookies, I probably would have joined earlier. Mary Ann had opinions for certain, but the negative ones were shared generally with "the look." What patience! And kindness.

Her other example was one of being available. She jumped in and made time for things that were important to her, most of which I'm sure I'm not aware, besides supporting the community through the scholarship foundation, KEYS; through church; 4H; and our historical society. Even after she no longer traveled, after she lost her husband, and after she became ill, she carried her oxygen tank to events, never complaining of pain or tiredness. She came to help set up our historical society history room and work on the scrap books. She brought in loads of newspaper articles to preserve, including the obituaries. To me, and to the historical society, Mary Ann Secor, who passed away March 31, 2012, will always be more than a page in our scrapbooks. She's one of the heroes who won't be forgotten.







The regular portion of the 2012 prep golf season is winding down, and Indians coach Glenn Eichstedt is still waiting... waiting for warm weather and for all four of his counters to come in with good scores on the same day.

The Indians played three times in the past week, in windy and cold conditions, and while one of two of the players came in with good rounds in each of those competitions, the others struggled.

Kewaskum's best team finish was a second place in the Badger Creek Invitational hosted Saturday (May 5) by New Holstein.

The Indians combined for a 340 total from the top four players, and that figure was eight shots behind fellow Eastern Wisconsin Conference member, Campbellsport, with its winning 332 total.

New Holstein finished third at 351, followed by Hilbert, 356; Kiel, 370; Howards Grove, 374; Random Lake, 376; Shorewood, 392; Manitowoc Roncalli, 395; Chilton, 406; and Menasha Sr. Mary Center, 408.

The Indians received silver medals for their efforts. Senior Dan Bohn and junior Nick Banks went home with two medals after placing among the top 10 individuals.

"A little hardware helps to boost the confidence," KHS coach Glenn Eichstedt said about his team's bringing home medals.

New Holstein's Joel Feider captured the medal with a 5-over-par 77. Bohn was tied for fourth place with two others at 82, while Banks and Campbellsport's Jack Adams tied for ninth with 85s.

Both Mike Holt and Tony Gonring fired 87s for the final scores.

"The real reason we got into the tournament was because the WIAA no longer allows practice rounds at regional sites," Eichstedt said. "It was not so much the finish (we were after) but the preparation (for the regional), and I think our kids are getting familiar with the course."

Still he was pleased all four counters were in the 80s. "In the last couple of years, to get four scores in the eighties has been difficult for us," he said.

On Friday, Kewaskum was involved in the annual Port Washington Invitational held at the Hawthorne Hills Golf Course near Waubesa. In this 18-hole meet, Gonring was extremely steady with his 39-40-79, which put him in a five-way tie for fourth place. After going back on the cards over the highest handicap holes, Gonring emerged with the medal for fifth place.

# Walleye bag limits revised on some ceded territory lakes

MADISON - The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is adjusting sport angler daily walleye bag limits on 250 lakes speared by Chippewa Bands in the Ceded Territory.

"This year's early spring gave us the opportunity to make final adjustments in bag limits for the first time ever before the opening of fishing season," said DNR Secretary Cathy Stepp. "Fishing is the cornerstone of the North's tourism industry. People are eager to get this information as early as possible.

The early warm spring weather followed by a cool spell lead to a long spearing season. Tribal spearkers have harvested 32,308 walleye from 184 different lakes, through April 30; Tribal declarations totaled 54,507 walleye.

Of the roughly 900 walleye lakes in the Ceded Territory, 165 will have a daily sport angler bag limit of three; 83 will have a daily bag limit of two; one will have a daily bag limit of one, and one lake will be catch and release only. All other lakes will have a daily bag limit of five unless otherwise listed in the 2012-13 Guide to Wisconsin Hook and Line Fishing Regulations.

Grindstone Lake, Sawyer County, was declared by the Chippewa Bands at a one-bag level. On Buckskin Lake, Oneida County, a tribal spearing violation resulted in the total safe harvest being exceeded. As a result the lake will be posted for catch-and-release fishing for walleye. Tribal courts are expected to follow through on the tribal citations.

"Though some sporadic spearing continues, primarily for musky, walleye spawning is for all intents and purposes done. We have completed this year's walleye population surveys and have a good handle on tribal success rates.

We are comfortable setting bag limits now," said Treaty Fisheries Coordinator Joe Hennessy. "Getting bag limits out now allows us to save money on posting and to avoid the confusion of bag limits changing in the middle of the season," he said.

Due to the timing of setting these bag limits, it will not be possible to have printed bag limit pamphlets in the hands of anglers and license vendors prior to opening day of fishing. Printed bag limit pamphlets will be distributed as soon as possible - in the meantime, anglers should consult the 2011-12 Guide to Wisconsin Hook and Line Fishing Regulations, signs at boat landings, and the Revised Ceded Territory Walleye Bag Limits pamphlet [PDF] for lake-specific information.

As part of a 1983 Federal Appellate Court decision affirming Chippewa off-reservation hunting, fishing, and gathering rights, the six bands of Wisconsin Chippewa set annual harvest quotas for off-reservation lakes in the Wisconsin Ceded Territory. To assure the combined tribal and recreational angler harvest does not exceed a sustainable level, the state reduces recreational bag limits in lakes declared for harvest by the Chippewa bands.

"We are working with the tribes to assure the health of the fishery while they exercise their court-affirmed hunting and gathering rights," said Stepp. "Annually setting the bag limits is a key component of sport anglers and the tribes sharing the resource and harvesting fish sustainably."

An administrative rule passed by the state Natural Resources Board in 1998 allows the department to adjust initial bag limits annually to reflect actual spring spearing harvests and projected summer harvests.

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# KHS relays teams put up good numbers; Stahl, Backhaus shine in Vanderpan test

No matter where they seem to go this spring, the Indians track teams score big points in the sprints, relays and some jumping events.

The boys finished in sixth place (56 points) in Friday's annual Vanderpan Invitational in Sheboygan Falls behind wins in both the 4x100-meter and 4x200 relays and did it in grand style. The Indians also picked up good points in the 100-meter dash and the pole vault.

The ladies were unable to win any events but Ashlee Stahl's second in the high jump and the second by Aly Backhaus in the triple jump, along with some thirds, fourths and fifths, all added up to a fourth-place finish (61 points).

Along with these highlights, there were several disappointments, which hampered the Indians' effort.

Win No. 1 came from the 4x200 relay, with Eric Perkins, Teddy Wollner, Joey Wollner and Jordan Hanson "dusting" the rest of the field with a sizzling time of 1 minute, 33.29 seconds (1:33.29), .45 of a second ahead of Waupun and

five seconds ahead of third place Falls.

"I was very happy with that, and they likewise were happy," KHS coach Jerry Gosa said about his speedy quartet, which bettered its previous best (1:34.69) by 1.40 seconds. "Two of the three passes were good ... They're getting better."

The 4x100 relay was pretty much the same story, with the Indians (same runners) far in the lead, this time ahead of Plymouth, 44.38 to 45.67.

KHS added 12 points in the 100, with eight coming from Perkins' second (11.46) and four from Teddy Wollner's fifth (11.71).

Joey Wollner cleared 11 feet, 6 inches (11-6) to take second in the pole vault, an event which felt the effects of the winds coming off Lake Michigan.

Andrew Buelow again ran well in the 800, posting a time of 2:10.92, which was good enough for third place.

In the weights, senior Andy Doll provided a pair of places with his fifth in the shot put with a good throw of 43-10.75 and a sixth in the discus (123-03). Doll is currently the only weight man on the team.

Gosa had penciled in a couple places in the pole vault, but Corey Burdick was held out of the meet for a disciplinary reason, and freshman Tristin Marx, who had been jumping very well in recent meets, failed to clear the opening height. Marx "is nicked up" with a hip problem, according to Gosa.

Hanson did not long jump or high jump because of tightness in his back, Gosa said, indicating he could have placed in both.

In the girls' high jump, Stahl cleared a season-best 5-0 for her second place and just an inch from victory.

"That equals her best from last season," Gosa said. "She's got her steps down, and she's more confident than she was earlier in the year."

Backhaus is also starting to peak. She came up with a solid jump of 31-07 for a runner-up finish in the triple jump.

"They were jumping right into the wind," Gosa said, figuring Backhaus may have gone over 32 feet in other conditions.

The best finish in the individual running events was Val Hedlund's third in the 100 hurdles. Hedlund's time was

18.45.

The Lady Indian foursome of Tess Bandy, Aly Backhaus, Natalie Bandy and Stahl finished third with their 1:57.93.

Kelsey Phillips had the sixth-best 100 time in the prelim and moved up two spots to take fourth in the finals with a 13.78 clocking.

Sheboygan Falls had far and away the best time in the 4x100 relay, but the Indians were respectable, with Tess Bandy, Heidi Johnson, Natalie Bandy and Phillips teaming with for a 56.94, good for fourth overall.

Phillips rounded out her day with a fourth in the long jump (13-08).

Backhaus, Stahl, Jenne Fisher and Jessica Nurkula claimed a fourth in the final running event, the 4x400 (4:42.28).

Tess Bandy also added a sixth in the 200 (29.82). Other top-eight efforts included: a 4th by Nurkula in the pole vault (7-5) and 8th in the 800, 2:48.15; a 7th by Natalie Bandy in the triple jump, 28-05.50.

On Tuesday, May 1, the Indians finished last in a triangular meet with

Sheboygan Falls at Two Rivers. There were some good individual efforts, however, including a win by Hedlund in the hurdles (18.59) and a personal best long jump of 15-0.75 by Phillips, which was good for third place.

Another good effort was the discus throw of Jess Etta (92-5), "That was nice to see," Gosa said, further reporting Backhaus went 31-11.5 in the triple jump.

On the boys' side, Burdick equaled his personal best of 12-0 in the pole vault to take second place.

Perkins did not run the 100 or relays. That opened the door for Ted Wollner to win the 100 (12.15).
