## KMS Principal Christine Horbas will retire from district

Former Kewaskum Middle School principal Ken Soerens is back at the helm as he fills in for Christine Horbas who last week was on a leave of absence according to district officials. As of last Wednesday afternoon it was announced she would retire from the district on June 30.

Interim Superintendent for the District, David Ewald stated, "For personal reasons, Christine Horbas will take early retirement at the end of the school year and will be working from home until then."

Horbas has been on paid leave since Wednesday, April 30. Ewald explained Horbas is currently collaborating with Soerens writing teacher's evaluations and working on the development of a new schedule amongst other tasks.

It is unknown how long Soerens will fill the position. He is paid \$383 per day and has no benefits.

The Board of Education met in closed session Tue. May 8, to hear about a personnel problem involving

an employee of the district. District officials would not comment if Horbas was the employee in question.

Parents and community members are being asked for input on the district's website on what they feel the qualifications for the new principal should be.

At Monday's Board of Education meeting, Ewald invited incoming Superintendent of Schools James

Smasal to handle the hiring process. Ewald expected the new KMS principal to start July 1.

"We have the good fortune of having several highly regarded persons who are certified for the position. They will receive serious consideration for the position," Ewald explained.

Horbas was in charge of communicating school closures for the district. KES principal Darcy Budnik will handle that communication in the interim.

Horbas started her career at Kewaskum High School as principal in 2003. In 2010 she was placed at Kewaskum Middle School. In January of 2012 she was the only Kewaskum School District employee to interview for the open Superintendent position that was ultimately given to Smasal.

Horbas' retirement will be officially acted on at a special board meeting on Mon. May 21.

"I appreciated the opportunity to serve the community for the last nine years," stated Horbas on Tuesday morning.

## Fire depts called to kitchen fire in Kewaskum home

**TOWN of KEWASKUM-** Members of the Kewaskum Fire Department joined the Kewaskum Fire Department County Sheriff's Office at a Badger Road home on Saturday, May 12, at 7:59 p.m. for a fire on the stove inside the kitchen.

The caller, William Olewinski, 27, attempted to search for a fire extinguisher, but was forced to evacuate from the home as a result of heavy smoke. On arrival it was confirmed that the caller was the homeowner's son and nobody else was inside the residence.

Kewaskum Fire Department entered the home and extinguished multiple areas of fire within the kitchen area and interior wall spaces near the electric stove. The residence was also ventilated to remove heavy smoke from inside.

Assistance was received from West Bend, Kohlsville and Boltonville Fire Departments; however on arrival of those departments assistance was no longer needed.

The point of origin was determined to be the electric stove, where Olewinski had placed a frying pan containing vegetable oil on a burner. After leaving the kitchen for a short period of time, the son returned and observed the stove on fire.

There was extensive damage to the 3839 Badger Rd. residence owned by Thomas and Susan Olewinski. Damages are estimated to be in excess of \$75,000. Firefighters were on the scene for close to three hours.

There were no injuries as a result of the incident and occupants of the residence had other family in the area to assist with immediate living arrangements.



## 'Overwhelming' community support provides own building, volunteer help

Jennifer Schultz became emotional barely words into her welcome.

That's how much the Kewaskum Community Food Pantry means to her, and she's not alone.

"You can't throw a rock," the pantry board president said at Saturday's grand opening, without finding someone involved with the pantry. "When we talk about being a community pantry, we really are."

Efforts began among area churches and the school district a couple of years ago.

The pantry eventually was able to use space in the back of the Village Annex Building, which most people called a closet because of its size. A grand opening wasn't held because "you could get three people in there," said Tom Knorr, who, along with his wife, Barb, serve as two of the pantry's most committed volunteers. The Town of Auburn couple who had run St. Lucas' pantry now work every week at the community pantry.

Kevin Hein's high school construction class built today's facility behind Kewaskum Elementary School, giving students the opportunity to practice real-world job skills and letting them see the fruits of their labor.

"It was a good project for them," said Luke Piwoni, high school teacher and vice president of the pantry board. Piggly Wiggly owner Mike Geidel donated "regular grocery store shelving" because he wanted to give back to a community that's been good to him over the years, and volunteers from churches, school and countless community groups like the Kiwanis, Boy Scouts and Girl

Scouts chip in to help with donations and manpower. Even the Kewaskum Community Garden donates produce.

"We do feel like we have angels all over town," Schultz said.

Students who helped start the pantry stuck with it. Student Council member Rae Monte volunteers every Monday. She'll miss it next year when she's in college.

"It's amazing. I've been saying for a while it's my baby and I got to watch it grow up," she said.

Monte and Piwoni pulled off the blanket to unveil the pantry's donor wall, done by some Kewaskum art students. Certificates were presented to the Kewaskum House of Prayer, Kiwanis, Mike Geidel and Holy Trinity Catholic Church for their support.

"Without you this wouldn't be possible," said Piwoni.

The pantry has served more than 1,600 families so

far. It checks identification and requires people live in the school district boundaries, have children attend the school or belong to a church within the district, but beyond that runs on the honor system; it doesn't ask families for proof of need.

The pantry has some clothes and other odds and ends, but its mission is food. Knorr does the majority of the shopping, scouring sales flyers to get the best deals.

"It's really amazing. We started in a conference room with an idea," said Schultz

## Batavia, Beechwood, Fillmore all help battle S.C. blaze

**SILVER CREEK-** Batavia, Beechwood and Fillmore Fire Departments were among the contingency of local firefighters who fought a blaze in a side-by-side duplex on Sat., May 12 at 5:30 p.m. When all was finished, three more local departments assisted Silver Creek Fire Department in fighting the fire.

The Sheboygan County Sheriff's Office says they received a call from a subject reporting a structure fire at W6519 State Highway 144. Visible flames were observed emanating from a rear bedroom window.

Several fire departments were dispatched to the scene including, Silver Creek, Random Lake, Batavia, Beechwood, Adell, Waubeka and Fillmore. An ambulance from Random Lake was

also dispatched as well as a paramedic unit from West Bend. Several deputies from the Sheriff's Office also responded to assist.

As initial first responders arrived on-scene it was learned the owner of the property, Dean L. Risse, 71, Random Lake entered the duplex and sustained a severe head injury. He was transported by ambulance to St. Joseph Hospital in West Bend and then by helicopter to Froedert Hospital in Wauwatosa. No other injuries were reported to the Sheriff's Office.

The duplex sustained severe damage to the southwest corner of the structure and all the occupants have been displaced. The monetary loss is not known at this time. The incident remains under investigation.

Children's Hospital. For a period of time she wore a brace from her mid-section up to her chin which also supported the back of her head. Both her arms were in casts from above her elbows to her fingers. She still only has partial sight in her left eye. She continues to receive physical therapy as well.

"With all of these injuries, she continues to make progress each day," Jenny Harbin concluded.

"The flyer is quite meaningful to all of us because the artwork is KHS graduate, Terrina Fellenz, a local artist's rendition of a dream Jesse had when she was in the hospital. The vine represents the life of the six girls that survived, each being represented by a flower on that vine. The three butterflies that fly over the vine represent Katie Berg (pink butterfly), Caitlin Scannell (coral butterfly) and Sabrina Stahl (purple butterfly). In this dream were the words "Love Lives On." Jesse woke up from the dream and asked her Mom to write down all of the details because she knew it was a message from someone very special. That's also how the event's name came to be and why we chose the artwork that we did," Hanson said.

totally reconstructed. She was at Children's Hospital a total of 10 days.





## Public invited to upcoming mission festival

Immanuel Lutheran Church (south of Beechwood) and St. Stephen Lutheran Church (Batavia) will once again hold a mission festival this coming weekend, May 19-20. All events will take place at Immanuel. Immanuel is located just 1 1/2 miles south of Beechwood in County HH.

The Mission Festival speaker for special services of worship is the Rev. Dr. James P. Dretke. Rev. Dretke presently serves as Executive Director of the Lutheran Institute for Global Healing and Training (LIGHT). The focus of his weekend messages will be on the role of Christian people in proclaiming the Gospel among the spiritually lost, both at home and abroad.

Dr. Dretke grew up in the Town of Union in Waupaca County, where his father farmed the land homesteaded by his grandfather. After graduating from Concordia, Milwaukee (now Mequon), he continued his training for the ministry at Concordia

Seminary, St. Louis, graduating in 1956.

His first call, under the Lutheran Synodical Conference, was to serve in Nigeria, but while awaiting passports and visa processing, he with his new wife, the former Barbara Biar of Dallas, TX, and sent to start a new church in an African-American suburb of Orlando, FL. When they left for Nigeria 13 months later, with 3-month old Diana in tow, they left behind the new Our Savior Lutheran Church, which this year is celebrating its 55th Anniversary.

After serving 26 years in Africa (Nigeria, Ghana, Kenya) and four years in the Middle East, the Board for Mission Services of the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod loaned Dr. Dretke to the Zwemer Institute of Muslim Studies, based in Pasadena, CA. The Institute later moved to the campus of Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, IN.

Since returning to

live and work in the USA, Pastor Dretke has been deeply involved in training missionaries in cross-cultural communication of the Gospel. He was recently named to his present leadership position with LIGHT, a research and training institute designed to equip Christians for a faithful witness to the Gospel among new immigrants to America, as well as Christians who move to work in other countries. The Dretkes now live in central Texas.

Dretke will preach at Immanuel Lutheran Church (south of Beechwood) on Saturday, May 19 at 6:30 pm and on Sunday, May 20 at 10:00 am. A more in depth presentation will be held for children and interested adults at 9:00 am on Sunday as well. The public is cordially invited to the mission festival services, as well as to the free pig roast luncheon which follows the Sunday morning worship.



NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Board of Review for the Town of Wayne, Washington County shall hold its first meeting on the 6th day of June, 2012 from 5:00pm to 7:00pm at the Wayne Town Hall, 6030 Mohawk Road, Campbellsport, WI 53010.

Please be advised of the following requirements to appear before the board of review and procedural requirements if appearing before the board:

1. No person shall be allowed to appear before the board of review, to testify to the board by telephone, or to contest the amount of any assessment of real or personal property if the person has refused a reasonable written request by certified mail of the assessor to view the property.

2. After the first meeting of the board of review and before the board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the board of review may contact, or provide information to a member of the board about the person's objection, except at a session of the board.

3. The board of review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at

least 48 hours before the board's first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good cause and the submission of a written objection, the board shall waive that requirement during the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, and the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48-hour notice requirement and failure to appear before the board of review during the first 2 hours of the first scheduled meeting.

4. Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require such objections to be submitted on forms approved by the department of revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who owe land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land. No person shall be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board, under oath of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.

5. When appearing before the board of review, the objecting person shall specify in writing, the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

6. No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board, or by telephone, or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using the income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under s 73.02 (2a), Wis stats., that the assessor requests. The Town of Wayne has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph, which provides

exceptions for person using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their officer or by order of a court. ## Relay members heed words of their coach

How low can the Kewaskum High sprint relays teams bring their times this spring?

Let's see, the 4x200-meter relay was clocked at 1 minute, 34.70 seconds (1:34.70) at the Washington County Meet on April 24, then a 1:34.69 at the Altheimer Invitational and that was followed by a 1:33.29 at the Vanderpan Invitational, so it was obvious the speedy foursome has continued to get better.

Coach Jerry Gosa keeps urging them on, however, considering the competition they might face when it comes to sectional time.

His words didn't fall on deaf ears. Eric Perkins, Teddy Wollner, Joey Wollner and Jordan Hanson won the competition at the Plymouth Triangular on May 8 with an amazing time of 1:32.95.

"Another drop," Gosa said about the effort, explaining he told his sprinters the Kiel team was excited about running against them and that was taken as a challenge.

The 4x100 relay was more

competition, but again the Indians came out on top with a 45.08, with the host Panthers second at 45.68.

"Right now both our relays are rated second in the state (in Div. 2)," Gosa said, but we've got to keep working" because most teams get faster at the end of the season.

Kewaskum's girls' soccer team hit another rough patch, netting one goal in its last three games and losing all three.


On Monday, the Indians lost to Mayville, 2-0. Goalie Brianna Jacak made 10 saves, allowing one goal in each half.



They shared two doubleheaders against top competition last week and are still in position to do the same for the conference title.

The Indians' fast-pitch softball team went 1-1 at Waupun and Plymouth, and is now tied with Waupun for the Eastern Wisconsin Conference lead with two losses apiece. Plymouth is right behind with three losses.

This week, the Indians were scheduled to play at Two Rivers on Tuesday and at Sheboygan Falls on Thursday.

Against Plymouth on Thursday, the Indians stranded 10 runners in the first game, including not scoring with the bases juiced and one out in the second inning. They lost a heartbreaker, 2-1, but bounced back with more enthusiasm in the second game and got the bunting going. In the second inning, Kewaskum bunted six times in scoring five runs on the way to an 8-3 victory.

"We kinda seem quiet, a little slower going out for the first game. By the second game, we're all worked up from the first one. We've got to do that earlier," said senior catcher Michele Marquardt.

Kewaskum struggled early against Plymouth's left-handed pitcher, who regularly painted the outside corner, despite Coach Jeff Gosse saying the team worked in practice on outside pitches. Kewaskum struck out nine times.

Reicher lost a pitcher's duel in allowing two runs (one earned) on six hits, whiffing seven and walking two.

Gosse said after the third-inning rally fell short the team deflated.

"I felt like I was in a mortuary," he said.

The Indians resurrected to keep their conference hopes alive. They scored one run in the first, five in the second

and one each in the third and fourth innings.

"The second game to their credit they came out," Gosse said.

Marquardt was 3-for-4 with two doubles, including one blast that sailed over the left-fielder's head to score two runs in the pivotal second inning. Caitlin Rinzel, McKenzie Rosenthal, Danielle Rodenkirch, Taylore Kohn, Georgiana Haugen and Cassidy Enright all executed bunts in the big inning.

Against Waupun, the Indians were shut down in the first game, 5-1. They only managed three hits against Waupun's ace.

In the second, Kewaskum jumped on Waupun's No. 2 pitcher for five runs in the first inning before the Warriors switched back to their game 1 winner. Kewaskum didn't score any more but hung on for a 5-3 victory. Rosenthal, the team's standout freshman third baseman, squeezed a popup for the final out with one runner on.

"It was a relief," she said.

Waupun didn't score until the fourth. Reicher allowed three runs in scattering eight hits. She whiffed nine and walked three, often pitching out of jams with runners on base.

"Very nerve-racking," said Rinzel, captain of the infield at shortstop. "But we know we just had to come in and we're just as good a team as them. We showed a lot of character."

"Something we really needed," Gosse said of game 2. "We lost our focus and I had to go out and give them a little chewing."

The Waupun doubleheader was scheduled but the Plymouth one was forced due to a rainout earlier in the season. Four games against the other two top teams in conference has taken its toll, not to mention coming off of a weekend tournament.

"Pitching just about every game - it really wears on your body," said Reicher, last year's EWC Player of the Year.

Now, the focus has to stay up to get a share of the conference title and take some momentum heading into the playoffs. The Indians play in a West Bend tournament on Saturday to close out the regular season. Kewaskum is 9-2 in the EWC and 13-3 overall.

"We need to keep practicing hard," said Reicher. "We've got the big things down. We need to keep working on the little things."

## Different players take the lead; Indians have to settle for fifths

In a double Eastern Wisconsin Conference mini-tour competition held on May 9, the Kewaskum Indians finished fifth (176 strokes) on their home Hon-E-Kor Country Club course and a couple hours later turned in a 169 on the much shorter Auburn Bluffs layout. This score was also good for fifth place.

Plymouth won at Hon-E-Kor, shooting a 156, while the Campbellsport golfers showed they know their home course, posting an impressive 151 to beat Plymouth for top honors by a single shot.

Individually, it was a roller coaster for the Indians who had hoped to use these meets to propel them to a strong conference finish.

Senior Dan Bohn continued his hot shooting in round No. 1, posting a 4-over-par 39 on the White Nine at Hon-E-Kor to tie for fourth place with two others.

Tyler Siech of Plymouth was the medalist after finishing with a 2-over 37, a stroke ahead of his teammate, Garrett Begger, and New Holstein's Joe Feider.

Bohn's card included five pars and a birdie 3 on No. 12. His only trouble hole was the 192-yard, par 3, 16th hole where he had to take a six.

"I think he hit it in the water," Eichstedt said.

The shortest par 4 gave Tony Gonring fits en route to his 42 (tied for 13th), while Mike Holt came in with a 44, and Adam Waala was the final counter with a 51.

Eichstedt said Gonring had

a good round going except for some three putts.

At Auburn Bluffs, Waala emerged with the best KHS score with his 5-over-par 41, good for a tie for 15th. This was Waala's best round of the season.

Campbellsport's Logan Eisch was firing darts at the Auburn Bluffs greens, to the tune of a 3-under-par 33. (According to EWC Commissioner Craig Hoffman, this is the lowest score in the EWC since Kiel's Brandon Gries scored a 33 at Auburn Bluffs in April of 2010.)

In addition to Eisch's 33, Jack Adams and Jake Blaatz carded 39s for the Cougars, who also counted a 40 and 41.

After Waala, Gonring finished in a tie for 15th with a 42, then came Bohn and Nick Banks at 43.

"We got into the 160s (a team goal), but we still ended up in fifth place," Eichstedt said.

With these two scores figured in, Sheboygan Falls still leads the EWC with 11 points, but Plymouth has closed the gap to three points (14), while Campbellsport is third at 18, followed by New Holstein with 23. Kewaskum is currently fifth with 28 points, followed by Two Rivers, 39; Waupun, 39; and Kiel, 46.

Begger and New Holstein's Bill Jones are currently tied for first in the race for the EWC medal. They both have 36 points, one ahead of Siech.

"We certainly have to develop some consistency this week," Eichstedt said, referring to the final two EWC competitions and the conference tournament.
