School district to implement Response to Intervention strategies in all schools

Kewaskum School District students in grades 1-12 will receive educational interventions in the next school term through a strategy called Response to Intervention (RTI). This philosophy allows educators to identify students with difficulties in core subjects, while also finding students who need to be challenged.

Anne Ignatowski, director of pupil services for the Kewaskum School District, and Darcy Budnik, the district's director of curriculum, have been collaborating with both administrators and staff to implement the RTI strategies throughout the school district. School District administrators have been visiting school districts that have implemented the RTI process, such as Pewaukee, Slinger, Campbellsport and West Bend.

"Throughout this process, the administrators will continue to meet and assess our strategies of meeting the needs of our students," Ignatowski said.

As a result of this work, which has taken place over the past several years, Student Intervention Teams (SITs) have been utilized in each district building. These problem-solving

teams meet to discuss the specific needs of a student who may be in need of intervention.

Using data obtained through an assessment tool, a specific learning problem can be identified and an intervention created. Once that area is identified, then specific small group interventions will take place with the student and others who are struggling in this same area. The intervention is a tailored learning plan for a specific student's needs whether they are struggling, comprehending or advancing faster than other students.

The intervention will take place three times per week for a minimum of 30 minutes each. The intervention coach will assist in the development and delivery of quality interventions. Progress will continually be monitored using the assessment tool on a periodic basis. If the intervention plan was successful, based upon data, it is continued. If minimal or no progress resulted from the intervention, a new intervention is put into place. The progress continues until the student's needs are met.

On Monday evening, the Board of Education approved reallocating up to \$70,000 for the hiring of an Intervention Coach. The district in

prior years spent those funds with a variety of intervention strategies. This person will work in all district buildings with teachers on professional development and technical assistance to meet student leaning needs. It was unknown if this person will come from inside or outside the district. At this same meeting, the board approved the \$45,000 purchase of the STAR Assessment tool. More information on this program will be included in next week's edition.

"RTI is a proactive, rather than a reactive process, supported by research," Ignatowski explained. "Research shows the sooner we help them, the more likely it is that the student will be successful in school."

RTI will involve all teachers, both regular education and special education. The strategy demands a change in thinking. Instruction must be matched to the student's current level, and the best place to start correcting learning problems is in the instructional process.

"We must shift our focus from just the struggling students to making sure all students are challenged," Ignatowski affirmed. "Children with and without

Village Trustees hear plans for fire station; parking concerns

The Kewaskum Village Board learned about a plan expanding the bunk quarters at the fire station and discussed a parking issue on Midland Avenue. Feral cats was also discussed with more information forthcoming.

Fire Chief Mark Groeschel updated the Village Board on the fire department's current building project. The fire department will be updating a current storage room into sleeping quarters, or a "bunk room," that will help members of the fire department that do not live in the village.

The existing room will be divided into two rooms. All work will be done by department members, which will help alleviate costs to the village. A deck will also be put above the bunk room for additional storage. Groeschel stated they have already obtained a permit and work is expected to start in the next couple weeks.

Board members also discussed feral cats within the village. As of now, there is no ordinance regarding the feeding of any feral cats. Police Chief Tom Bishop stated there is a program where the Washington County Humane Society will spay

On April 18, at 9:20 p.m., a Kewaskum Police Officer was dispatched to a complaint of a possible impaired driver heading towards the Village. Dispatch advised the vehicle was traveling southbound on Hwy 45. The officer waited for the vehicle at First Street and Fond du Lac Avenue.

The complainant was willing to make a statement. A Wisconsin State Trooper who subsequently arrived on scene took the statement.

The vehicle was located and subsequently traveled west on Badger Road and into a gas station. The officer made contact with a female driver. The officer smelled a strong odor of burnt marijuana from the vehicle. Later, a male passenger was identified.

Both stated they did not have anything drug related on them. The male later admitted to items in the vehicle. However the officer found a glass pipe and a baggy of marijuana, later weighing approximately four grams in his coat. A grinder was also found on him. He was subsequently arrested.

The female stated the marijuana was not hers, but they were smoking it in Campbellsport before they came to Kewaskum. A search of her purse was then conducted after she told the officer there was nothing in the purse illegal. The officer opened a smaller purse and located a used syringe along with two cards and a spoon with white powder on it. There was also a belt that looked as though it might be used to cinch the skin

and cause a vein to protrude. The female stated it was not hers when the officer located the smaller purse.

The vehicle was searched. No contraband or illegal items were located.

Since the violations and original complaint happened outside the Village of Kewaskum, the Trooper would handle the OWI investigation. The female was arrested after failed sobriety tests for operating under the influence.

The Kewaskum officer transported the male subject to the Washington County Jail. A correction officer there located a hard object in the subject's pants pocket. Once removed from the subject's pocket the officer found a pill case with 19 pills inside. The subject later revealed that while he and the female were in the back of the squad car kissing he removed them from the female subject and placed them in his pocket.

Due to the high amount of pills located on the male subject, he was charged with possession of Schedule IV narcotic with intent to distribute, possession of a prescription, possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia.

identified disabilities can receive instruction using RtI strategies."

Additional challenges are intended to meet the needs of students who are exceeding benchmarks. Educators use data in a collaborative process to determine appropriate interventions or additional challenges, which are matched to a student's particular area of need.

Within this process, the intensity of intervention or additional challenge is also determined. Students continue to access core curriculum, instruction and assessment in addition to these small-group or individual interventions or additional challenges. In certain cases, when students exceed benchmarks, a collaborative team may determine that an additional challenge may most appropriately take place in lieu of core instruction.

Ignatowski noted the RtI process is often implemented as a three-tiered model. In Tier 1, typically in a class of 25 students, about 20 students' needs would be effectively met through universal, classroom-based differentiation.

In Tier 2, the targeted tier, teachers identify students who are struggling in a particular area and request that a Student Intervention Team meeting be held. Through this problem-solving approach, the specific deficiency is targeted -- reading comprehension,

written expression, multi-step math problems, etc.

The team, along with the teacher, then develop evidence-based interventions to address those struggles. Typically, about three to four students would be on this level in a 25-member class.

In Tier 3, students' needs are met in the same manner as in Tier 2, except the intervention is increased. Typically, no more than two or three students in a class of 25 would be on this level of the pyramid.

The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) has mandated that by Dec. 1, 2013, all learning disabilities (LD) special-education referrals must utilize the RtI process. "As a district, we must work toward full implementation of an

identification process by that date," Ignatowski emphasized.

Kewaskum has been working and continues to work with the Wisconsin RtI Center. Nationally, RtI is often represented visually by a triangle separated into three tiers that depict levels of intensity, based on student need. The Wisconsin model outlines the parameters of a high quality RtI framework, while maintaining the flexibility that districts require to build systems to meet local needs. This allows individual districts to use a three-tiered system to organize their RtI system.



EWC track test has highs, lows for Indians

The Kewaskum's girls track team had a good outing at the Eastern Wisconsin Conference Track and Field Meet hosted by Waupun and held at the North Fond du Lac track on May 15th. For the boys, the story was quite different. The injury bug struck just at the wrong time, taking away chances for an anticipated sweep in the 4x100-meter and 4x200 relays.

Senior Joey Wollner had cleared 12 feet, 9 inches to win the pole vault, but while attempting 13-0, "He bailed out, came down in the box and twisted his knee, according to coach Jerry Gosa. The injury kept him out of his normal No. 3 spot in both relays, and when Eric Perkins hurt himself in the finals of the 100, the relay teams scratched out of the events.

In the competition the team titles, it was Plymouth making it a clean sweep. The Panther boys nipped Kiel and Waupun for top honors in a very close race, 145 to 143 to 142.

The Lady Panthers were convincing, piling up 188 points, with Sheboygan Falls a distant second at 123.5.

The KHS girls, behind a win by Aly Backhaus in the triple jump, a pair of seconds and one third, finished sixth with 50 points, while the boys missed getting sixth by one point to Sheboygan Falls, 45-44.

In both case, the teams had far too few athletes to be competition, according to Gosa.

Backhaus had jumped 31-07 in the Vanderpan event recently, and she added another five inches when it counted, going 32-0 to win the

event 4.5 inches to spare.

The seconds came from junior Kelsey Phillips in the long jump and sophomore Jessie Nurkala in the pole vault.

After a disappointing run in the 100-meter trials, Phillips got focused for her jumping specialty, leaping 14-05.25 for runner-up honors.

"She has been suffering with some breathing problems," Gosa said about Phillips' run in the 100.

Nurkala had been clearing 7-6 in most of her vaulting appearances this spring, then added another six inches for 8-0. She got the second-place points on the basis of misses.

"She had to pole vault, then run the 800 and then go back and vault," Gosa said. "That's been tough on her."

KHS did well in one other field event, the high jump where Ashlee Stahl jumped third with a jump of 4-8, although, Gosa said, she was very disappointed with her effort.

Senior Val Hedlund added five team points with her fourth place in the 100 hurdles. She was clocked in 18 and .34 seconds (18.34) in the preliminaries, then slipped a little in the finals with an 18.66 clocking.

Kewaskum's two sprint relays both took fourth and fifth. Tess Bandy, Backhaus, Natalie Bandy and Stahl passed the baton to a 1:56.54 clocking in the 4x200 relay, good for the fourth. "That's their best time by over a second," Gosa said.

The 4x100, comprised of Tess Bandy, Heidi Johnson, Natalie Bandy and Phillips ran a 56.41 in the 4x100.

Backhaus, Stahl, Jenne Fisher and Nurkala added three points from their sixth place in the 4x400 (4:35.15).

While she did not place, Stephanie Henk threw the discus 95 feet. "She's making good progress and has good potential," Gosa said.

Wollner had not been the front runner in the pole vault, but it picked a good time to notch a season best 12-9. "He made it on his first try," Gosa said.

Junior Corey Burdick also had his best jump of the season in the meet, going 12-0 which gave him fourth place.

Perkins claimed a second in the feature 100-meter dash. After posting the third best time in the prelims, Perkins moved up one spot with his 11.756, which was just .04 slower than the champion, Aaron Field of Kiel.

Junior Ted Wollner also moved up one place in the finals, taking fourth with an 11.99.

Another second place came from Jordan Hanson in the long jump (19-07) where he just an inch out of first place.

Senior Andy Doll placed in both the shot and discus. Neither effort was impressive. He finished fifth in the discus at 130-09 and was seventh in the shot at 40-00.

Gosa was counting on Hanson picking up some points in the high jump, but he didn't make the opening height.

The Indians are hosting a Division 2 sectional this afternoon (May 24) starting at 4 p.m. The top four finishers in all events automatically qualify for the state competition, which will be held in La Crosse on June 1-2. Also advancing to the state are those whose times or distances are among the top eight from all the sectionals.

Kewaskum fell to 2-10 in the EWC and 2-18 overall.


Sheboygan Falls leads the conference with a 10-0 record. Plymouth is in third at 9-3 and New Holstein fifth at 7-5.

The Indians missed out on defending its conference title, but the second season starts Thursday.

Kewaskum's fast-pitch softball team finished off its regular season by seeing a school record fall. Senior leadoff hitter Caitlin Rinzel stole her 26th consecutive base, a single-season record.

"That's friggin' awesome," she said. "I did not know that."

Coach Jeff Gosse has often praised Rinzel's proficiency for prancing the bases this season. She annoys opposing pitchers and even once stole home to win a tournament game in early May.

Rinzel's record came during the Indians' 1-2 finish in a round robin tournament in West Bend last Saturday. It was the third time the Indians played multiple games in one day since May 8, and it has taken its toll.

If they win, the Indians face the winner of No. 3 Kettle Moraine Lutheran and No. 6

Grafton on Tuesday.

On Saturday, the Indians beat West Bend East, 7-6; lost to Franklin, 5-4; and lost to West Bend West, 11-1, in six innings.

Ace Jenny Reicher, last year's Eastern Wisconsin Conference Player of the Year, didn't pitch at all. Gosse rested her arm and moved some players to different positions to give others a chance to play.

Against East, Michele Marquardt went the distance and helped herself at the plate. She went 3-for-4 with two doubles and two RBIs. Reicher was 1-for-4 with a double and three RBIs. Lindsay Winkler was 2-for-3 with one RBI and McKenzie Rosenthal was 2-for-3.

Knowing a conference title was out of reach, Gosse rested Reicher and the Indians lost the second game, 10-5. Kewaskum struggled against Two Rivers' slow pitcher and made some mental mistakes.

At 10-4, Kewaskum finished tied for third in the EWC with Two Rivers. Waupun, the usual conference winner, returned to the top at 12-2. Plymouth finished 12-3.

But today, everyone's record returns to 0-0.

"We've got to play our game," said Rinzel. "We've gotta keep our defense clean. If we can hit, we're good."

Bohn earns 2nd team honors; Indians are 5th in EWC golf

After disappointing finishes in their final Eastern Wisconsin Conference two mini-tour events, the Kewaskum's golfers finally came through with scores coach Glenn Eichstedt was hoping to see from them all season.

In the EWC Tournament held at Whispering Springs in Fond du Lac, Senior Tony Gonring fired a 6-over-par 78, leading the Indians to a 340 total for third place in the meet behind Sheboygan Falls (325) and Plymouth (329).

Unfortunately, the effort was not enough to boost the Indians into the upper division in the final standings. They had to settle for fifth place overall.

Sheboygan Falls was crowned as the 2012 champion, unseating Plymouth, which had won the title eight years in a row.

Sheboygan Falls wound up with 15 team points, eight ahead of Plymouth. Then came Campbellsport, 36; New Holstein, 39; Kewaskum, 46; Waupun and Two Rivers, 62; and Kiel, 77.

Despite the poor showing in the final mini-tour events, We kept our focus on the goal," coach Glenn Eichstedt said. "Needless to say, I was pleased to finish third."

Plymouth's Garrett Beger and Tyler Siech finished 1-2 in the tournament with their respective scores of 74 and 77, while Dan Bohn, the other of the two KHS seniors, earned some individual recognition. His late-season surge landed him a spot on the all-conference second team.

At Waupun, in the final mini-meet, KHS came in with a 180 for sixth place.

Bohn was among four players at 41 with his 5-over 41. Gonring posted a 44, followed by Holt's 45 and a 50 by Waala. Banks missed the final two meets because of a pre-ACT seminar and a physics trip to Great America.

The Indians were at Badger Creek in New Holstein for a Division 2 regional on May 22. If the Indians finish among the top four teams, they advance to the May 29 sectional, which is being hosted by Jefferson. The top four individuals not from the qualifying teams also advance to the sectional competition.
